A large majority of the measures enacted by the Kentucky state legis-lature affect us directly as young citizens of the Commonwealth, and one which especially does so is the Substitute Liquor Control Bill which was approved by the house a few days ago.

The National Prohibition amendment has been a thing of the past for some months now and since Kentucky voted overwhelmingly wet in ratifying the twenty-first amendment, the question before us now is not whether or not we shall have fulgors, but the manner in which the dispensing of them is to be controlled.
