Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, Tuesday, May 9, 1972

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in regular statutory session in Room E on the 18th floor of the Patterson Office Tower on the University campus at 2:00 p.m. (Eastern Daylight Time) on Tuesday, May 9, 1972, with the following members answering the call of the roll: Mr. Jesse M. Alverson, Mr. Thomas P. Bell, Mrs. Rexford S. Blazer, Mr. Stanley Burlew, Mrs. Robert O. Clark, Mr. Albert G. Clay, Mr. Richard E. Cooper, Mr. George W. Griffin, Mr. Eugene Goss, Mr. James H. Pence, Mr. William B. Sturgill, Mr. Floyd H. Wright, non-voting faculty members Professors Paul Oberst and Paul G. Sears, and non-voting student member, Mr. Scott Wendelsdorf. Absent from the meeting were Governor Wendell H. Ford, Mr. Wendell P. Butler, and Dr. Lyman V. Ginger. Representing the University administration were: President Otis A. Singletary; Vice Presidents Alvin L. Morris, Lewis W. Cochran, A. D. Albright, Glenwood L. Creech, Lawrence E. Forgy, Jr., Peter P. Bosomworth, and Robert G. Zumwinkle; Dr. Charles Wethington, Assistant Vice President for the Community College System; Dr. Donald Clapp, Director of the Budget; and Mr. John Darsie, Legal Counsel. The various news media also had representatives present at the meeting.

A. Meeting Opened

Mr. Clay, Vice Chairman of the Board, presiding in the absence of Governor Ford, called the meeting to order at 2:00 p.m. Following the invocation pronounced by Mr. Clay, Mr. John Darsie administered the oath of office to Mr. Stanley Burlew, Mr. William B. Sturgill and Mr. George Griffin. Mr. Burlew and Mr. Sturgill were appointed by Governor Ford for four-year terms ending December 31, 1975, to replace former Governor Albert B. Chandler and Dr. N. N. Nicholas, whose terms expired on December 31, 1971. Mr. George Griffin was reappointed for another four-year term to end December 31, 1975.

The Secretary reported a quorum present and the meeting was declared officially open for the conduct of business at 2:04 o'clock.

B. Executive Committee Elected

At the request of Mr. Clay, Mr. Pence, chairman of the nominating committee composed of Mr. Pence, Mrs. Clark and Professor Sears, placed in nomination to serve on the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees the names of Mr. George W. Griffin, Mr. Thomas P. Bell, Mr. Richard E. Cooper, Mr. Eugene Goss and Mr. Albert G. Clay, Mr. Alverson moved that

nominations be closed but before a second, Mr. Wendelsdorf placed in nomination the names of Professor Paul Sears and Mr. Scott Wendelsdorf. There being no additional nominations, Mr. Clay requested the Secretary to distribute ballots to the voting members of the Board. Following a count of the votes cast, the Secretary announced that the members of the Executive Committee for 1972-73 will be Mr. Griffin, Mr. Bell, Mr. Goss, Mr. Clay, and Mr. Cooper.

C. Minutes Approved

On motion by Mr. Cooper, seconded by Mr. Wright, and passed, the reading of the Minutes of the April 4, 1972 meeting of the Board of Trustees was dispensed with and the Minutes were approved as published.

D. Resolution Adopted

Mrs. Robert Clark read a resolution of appreciation for the three members of the Board of Trustees whose terms expired on December 31, 1971 and who have now been replaced by new appointees. She moved that the resolution, a copy of which appears at the end of the Minutes, be approved, spread upon the Minutes of the meeting, and copies sent to former Governor Albert B. Chandler, Dr. N. N. Nicholas, and Mr. J. Robert Miller. Her motion was seconded by Dr. Sears, and passed. (See resolution at the end of the Minutes.)

E. President's Report to the Trustees

After reviewing some of the items in the President's monthly report to the Trustees, President Singletary recommended that the report be accepted. Mr. Clay accepted the report for the Board and it was ordered filed.

F. Recommendations of the President (PR 2)

There being no questions relative to the recommendations in PR 2, a copy of which had been in the hands of the members of the Board prior to the meeting, on motion by Mrs. Clark, seconded by Professor Sears, and passed without dissent, PR 2, Recommendations of the President, was approved as a whole and ordered made an official part of the Minutes of the meeting. (See PR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

G. Appointments and/or Other Staff Changes (PR 3, IV)

President Singletary explained that the items in PR 3 concerned matters

which had not been brought to the Board's attention prior to the meeting and suggested that each item in the report be acted on individually.

He called attention to Item IV, Appointments and Other Staff Changes, and recommended that approval be given to the appointment of Dr. W. D. Ehmann as Chairman of the Department of Chemistry, effective July 1, 1972, and that the appointment by the administration of Professor Louis Swift as Acting Chairman of the Department of Slavic and Oriental Languages be accepted.

On motion by Professor Sears, seconded by Mrs. Blazer, and passed, Item IV of PR 3 was approved. (See PR 3, IV at the end of the Minutes.)

H. Appointment of Dean of Architecture (PR 3, I)

Explaining that since Dean Charles Graves had requested his return to professorial status in the College of Architecture, a request acceded to with regret by the administration, a search committee had been seeking a replacement for him. The committee unanimously chose Professor Anthony Eardley, presently on the staff of Cooper Union for the Advancement of Science and Art, and recommended his appointment. President Singletary, saying that he concurred wholeheartedly in the committee's selection, recommended to the Board of Trustees that Professor Anthony Eardley be appointed Professor of Architecture (with tenure) and Dean of the College of Architecture, not later than July 1, 1972. Mr. Bell moved approval of President Singletary's recommendation. His motion was seconded by Mr. Sturgill, and passed. (See PR 3, I at the end of the Minutes.)

I. Affirmative Action Office Established and Coordinator Named (PR 3, III)

Stating that the recommendations he was about to make were in further implementation of the Board's clearly established policy of providing equal opportunity for all members of the University community, President Singletary recommended that an Affirmative Action Office be established under the Vice President for Administration and that Mrs. Nancy T. Ray be appointed as Coordinator of the University's Affirmative Action Plan, effective July 1, 1972.

On motion by Professor Sears, seconded by Mr. Wendelsdorf, and with all present voting "aye", the recommendation was approved. (See PR 3, III at the end of the Minutes.)

J. <u>Legal Proceedings Authorized Relative to</u> Collective Bargaining (PR 3, II)

Mr. John Darsie, Legal Counsel of the University, explained that because

of the ambiguity of the Kentucky statutes relative to the collective bargaining rights of public employees, it would be desirable to obtain a declaratory judgment to determine the rights and duties of the Board of Trustees regarding collective bargaining for its employees. After brief discussion, it was moved that the University's attorneys be authorized and directed to institute legal proceedings necessary to obtain a declaratory judgment determining the rights and duties of the Board of Trustees regarding collective bargaining with its employees. His motion was seconded, and a roll call vote was taken. The following members voted "aye": Mr. Thomas Bell, Mrs. Rexford Blazer, Mr. Stanley Burlew, Mrs. Robert Clark, Mr. Albert Clay, Mr. Richard Cooper, Mr. George Griffin, Mr. James Pence, Mr. William Sturgill and Mr. Floyd Wright. Voting "no" were: Mr. Jesse Alverson and Mr. Eugene Goss. (See PR 3, II at the end of the Minutes.)

K. Approval of Degree Candidates (PR 4)

Without discussion, on motion by Mr. Cooper, seconded by Mr. Pence, and passed, the President was authorized to confer upon each individual whose name appears on the list attached to PR 4 the degree to which he is entitled upon certification by the Dean of Admissions and Registrar that said individual has satisfactorily completed all requirements for the degree for which he has made application and as approved by the University Senate. (See PR 4 at the end of the Minutes.)

L. Budget Revisions 1971-72 (PR 5)

There being no questions, on motion by Mrs. Blazer, seconded by Mr. Griffin, and passed, the budget revisions for 1971-72 recommended in PR 5 were authorized and approved. (See PR 5 at the end of the Minutes.)

M. Fee Schedules Confirmed and Effective Date Established (PR 6)

President Singletary explained that the Council on Public Higher Education has the duty of determining the amount of entrance and/or registration fees for admission to the Commonwealth's public institutions of higher education. The fees for the University of Kentucky were established at the Council's meeting on April 11, 1972, and the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky must now establish the effective date for the fees. The administration recommends that the new fee schedule become operative to coincide with the opening of the fall semester. He continued that the higher fees will work a hardship on certain groups of students. To offset this in some measure, the University has increased the budget for student financial aid by over a half million dollars during the coming biennium. Mr. Wendelsdorf commented that he wished to call a problem to the attention of both the administration and the

Board relative to the fact that the Financial Aid Office has been critized for channeling the maximum amount of financial aid into low need level and overlooking others, thus leaving many people perhaps not so needy out in the cold.

There being no further discussion, on motion by Mr. Pence, seconded by Mrs. Blazer, and passed, the fee schedule established by the Council on Public Higher Education was confirmed and the effective date of the new fees was set to coincide with the beginning of the fall semester 1972. (See PR 6 at the end of the Minutes.)

N. Bachelor of General Studies Degree Approved (PR 7)

Since the Board members had had an opportunity to examine the requirements for the Bachelor of General Studies degree prior to the meeting and since no one had any questions, Professor Paul Sears moved that approval be given to the new degree in the College of Arts and Sciences, Bachelor of General Studies, on an experimental basis until June 1, 1980. His motion was seconded by Mr. Griffin. Prior to a vote on the motion, Mr. Wendelsdorf moved that the requirements for the degree be amended by striking the following sentence in the second paragraph of the proposed requirements for the degree: "In order to receive the Bachelor of General Studies degree the student must complete at least 30 hours of credit after officially entering the Bachelor of General Studies degree program." Professor Oberst seconded Mr. Wendelsdorf's motion, and after considerable discussion the question was called for. At the request of Mr. Wendelsdorf, a roll call vote was taken. Those voting in favor of the amendment: none; those opposed: Mr. Jesse Alverson, Mr. Thomas Bell, Mrs. Rexford Blazer, Mr. Stanley Burlew, Mrs. Robert Clark, Mr. Albert Clay, Mr. Richard Cooper, Mr. George Griffin, Mr. Eugene Goss, Mr. James Pence, Mr. William Sturgill and Mr. Floyd Wright.

The motion to the amendment having been defeated, Mr. Clay called for a vote on the original motion and it passed unanimously. (See PR 7 at the end of the Minutes.)

O. Graduate Residence Center for Teacher Corps Cycle VII (PR 8)

Without discussion, on motion by Mr. Sturgill, seconded by Mr. Alverson, and passed, approval was given to the establishment of a Graduate Residence Center on an experimental basis for Teacher Corps Cycle VII in Louisville for a two-year period. (See PR 8 at the end of the Minutes.)

P. Internal Budget for 1972-73 Approved (PR 9)

Before recommending approval of the internal budget for 1972-73, President Singletary made the following points which were shown graphically on charts prepared by the Budget Office:

- 1. Budget based on biennial budget request approved in November
- 2. Budget provides for continuation of existing programs by meeting fixed costs, providing cost-of-living increases averaging 5.5%, and current year enrollment increases
- 3. Budget does not provide for all of the critical needs in terms of new and expanded programs nor for catch up dollars
- 4. University only institution in state which did not request increase in debt service costs

In conclusion President Singletary commended Don Clapp, Budget Director, and his staff who have been preoccupied with the budget for some time and who put forth an extra effort to prepare the budget for presentation in the short period between the Legislature's approval of the University's appropriation and the May meeting of the Board of Trustees. Mr. Clay seconded President Singletary's complimentary remarks on behalf of himself and the other members of the Board.

The members of the Board having had the budget document in their hands for a week and having no questions, on motion by Mr. Cooper, seconded by Mr. Wright, the recommendation for adoption of the budget as presented in PR 9 was approved with all present voting "aye.". (See PR 9 at the end of the Minutes.)

Q. Board Meeting Dates for 1972-73 Established (PR 10)

It being customary to establish at the May meeting each year the dates for meetings for the next fiscal year, President Singletary called attention to the proposed dates as shown in PR 10 noting that the March 13, 1973 meeting should be changed from an Executive Committee meeting to a full Board meeting.

On motion duly made, seconded, and passed, PR 10 was approved with the correction in the March date being accepted. (See PR 10 at the end of the Minutes.)

R. Amendment to Governing Regulations Presented

Mr. Wendelsdorf distributed copies of a proposed amendment to the Governing Regulations which would alter the composition of the University Senate (University System). Pointing out that this proposed amendment would change student membership on the University Senate from 17 to 25, Mr. Wendelsdorf noted that the University Senate had passed it by a substantial margin at its meeting on Monday, May 8, 1972.

Since all proposed amendments to the Governing Regulations must lie on the table for a month, Mr. Clay received it and ordered it placed on the table for action at the meeting of the Executive Committee in June. (See amendment at the end of the Minutes.)

S. Student Code Revisions

After reminding the Board members that at the April meeting the Committee on Student Code Revisions had been asked to review some of the recommendations in the committee's March 1972 report in light of Vice President Zumwinkle's memorandum to President Singletary under date of March 31, 1972 and calling attention to the report of the committee relative to this review, copies of which were made available to each member, Mr. Griffin moved that the Student Code be amended effective August 15, 1972 in accordance with the majority report as amended by the Code committee. His motion was seconded by Dr. Sears.

The Chairman, noting that there were two minority reports to be disposed of prior to taking a vote on Mr. Griffin's motion, called for a motion relative to the second minority report submitted by Mr. Bell. Mr. Bell said that he wished to withdraw his report from consideration.

Mr. Clay then called for a motion on the other minority report submitted by Mr. Wendelsdorf. Mr. Wendelsdorf indicated that he would withdraw his minority report from consideration but moved that the majority report be amended by adoption of Recommendation 6, 3.29 of the minority report (see March 21, 1972 Minutes). The motion died for lack of a second. Mr. Wendelsdorf then moved that the majority report be amended by adoption of Recommendation 7, 3.316 (see March 21, 1972 Minutes). There being no second, the motion died.

After Mr. Wendelsdorf indicated that he would offer no further amendments to the majority report, Mr. Clay called for a vote on the original motion made by Mr. Griffin, and seconded by Professor Sears. On voice vote the Student Code was amended effective August 15, 1972 in accordance with the majority report as amended by the Student Code Revision Committee. (See amendments appended at the end of these Minutes.)

Mr. Griffin requested permission from the chair to speak further on behalf of the Student Code Revision Committee. Permission being granted, he read the following statement:

In conjunction with the change of its recommendation on Section 3.31 to involve no modification at present, the Committee on Student Code Revisions suggests that the Residence Hall Judicial System and the counseling processes be thoroughly studied or reviewed by a committee appointed by the President and that a report on these be made available to the Board of Trustees as soon as reasonably feasible.

President Singletary indicated that he would act in accordance with the suggestion made by the committee.

T. Interim Financial Report (FCR 1)

Without discussion, on motion by Mr. Cooper, seconded, and passed, the interim financial report for the nine months! period ending March 31, 1972 was accepted and ordered made a matter of record. (See FCR 1 at the end of the Minutes.)

U. Receipt and Release Authorized in Connection With Estate of Virginia Duke Kelley (FCR 2)

On motion duly made, seconded, and carried, the Vice President for Business Affairs and Treasurer was authorized to execute for and on behalf of the University of Kentucky a Receipt and Release fully and completely releasing the Executor of the estate of Virginia Duke Kelley from any further liability or responsibility in connection therewith. (See FCR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

V. Lease of Property in Texas (FCR 3A)

Without discussion, on motion duly made, seconded, and carried, the recommendation in FCR 3A relative to the execution of a lease of grazing land in Young County, Texas, for a period of one year was approved and the Vice President for Business Affairs was authorized to make an investigation of the current market value of this land tract with the view to selling the land upon the termination of this lease. (See FCR 3A at the end of the Minutes.)

W. Sale of Certain Property Authorized (FCR 3B)

The University has acquired from time to time certain real property

transfers under life annuity contracts. The Finance Committee having determined that these properties are no longer needed by the University recommends to the Board that they be disposed of.

On motion made, seconded, and carried, the recommendation relative to these properties as made in FCR 3B was approved. (See FCR 3B at the end of the Minutes.)

X. Sale of Property in Erlanger Authorized (FCR 3C)

The Finance Committee so recommending, on motion by Mr. Griffin, seconded, and passed, the Vice President for Business Affairs and Treasurer was authorized to sell at present market value 10 vacant lots of the Alice S. Hallam Estate in Erlanger, Kentucky, the net proceeds from such sale to be added to the Alice S. Hallam Fund (Endowment) for the benefit of the History Department. (See FCR 3C at the end of the Minutes.)

Y. Option to Purchase Certain Lots Authorized (FCR 3D)

Property owned by the University at 118, 120, 122 West Virginia Avenue and 701, 703 South Limestone having been determined to be no longer needed by the University, the Finance Committee recommended that the Vice President for Business Affairs and Treasurer be authorized to enter into a contract with Mr. Charles Bohmer giving him an option to purchase said property at an appraised value relating to the purpose for which the property is to be used. Mr. Griffin explained that the lots involved in the contract were not those in which the students had expressed an interest as a possible site for a People's Park. He then moved approval of the Finance Committee's recommendation. His motion was seconded, and passed. (See FCR 3D at the end of the Minutes.)

Z. External Auditor for 1971-72 Engaged (FCR 4)

After careful consideration of proposals submitted from three firms, the Finance Committee recommended to the Board of Trustees that Lybrand, Ross Bros. & Montgomery, Certified Public Accountants, be engaged to perform an examination of the accounts of the University of Kentucky, the University of Kentucky Research Foundation, The Fund for the Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center, and the University of Kentucky Athletic Association for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1972.

On motion by Mr. Alverson, seconded by Mr. Wright, and passed, the recommendation of the Finance Committee to engage the firm of Lybrand, Ross Bros. & Montgomery to audit University accounts for 1971-72 was approved. (See FCR 4 at the end of the Minutes.)

AA. Investment Committee Report (ICR 1)

Without discussion, on motion by Mr. Cooper, seconded, and passed, the quarterly report of the Investment Committee relative to changes made in investments for the University of Kentucky and its affiliated corporations was accepted and ordered made a matter of record. (See ICR 1 at the end of the Minutes.)

BB. Student Trustee Year End Report and Resolution

Following his year end report which consisted primarily of an expression of his opinion of the Governor and the Board of Trustees, Mr. Wendelsdorf introduced a resolution calling for the University to divest itself of its investments in all companies directly or indirectly involved in the Vietnam War and moved its adoption. His motion did not receive a second.

Mr. Eugene Goss and Mr. Thomas Bell took exception to Mr. Wendelsdorf's remarks and he apologized to the members of the Board indicating he did not mean anything personal.

CC. Meeting Adjourned

On motion by Mr. Griffin, seconded, and passed, the meeting adjourned at $3:40\ p.\ m.$

He was regular in his attendance and his interest in the University's welfare was evident throughout his tenure on the Board.

Mr. J. Robert Miller, Commissioner of Agriculture and ex officio member of the Board of Trustees, fulfilled his responsibilities on the Board in an exemplary manner. He showed at all times commendable loyalty and devotion to the institution from which he received his master's degree. Recognizing that his prime concern was for the agricultural interests of the people of the state, he was most supportive of the programs of the College of Agriculture but he was also supportive of other programs of the University.

With full awareness of the void which the departure of these three members will create in their ranks, their fellow members wish to say to them that their advice and counsel will be missed, and their absence from the official functions of the Board will be felt keenly by all who have worked so closely with them through these past four years.

Now, therefore, be it resolved that this resolution be adopted, spread upon the Minutes of the meeting and copies sent to Governor Chandler, Dr. Nicholas, and Mr. Miller.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Chairman or Vice Chairman and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky be and are hereby authorized and directed to execute upon behalf of such Board a Supplemental Contract substantially in the form presented at the meeting at which this resolution was proposed, which contract will be between Louisville and Jefferson County Board of Health, County of Jefferson, Kentucky, The Jewish Hospital Association of Louisville. Kentucky, Norton-Children's Hospitals, Inc., Methodist-Evangelical Hospital, Inc., University of Louisville, acting by its Board of Trustees, Rehabilitation Center, Inc., Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky and Louisville Medical Center, Inc., which pertains to the furnishing of steam and chilled water by County of Jefferson, Kentucky, to the Board for its Jefferson Community College in Louisville, Kentucky, and to such other parties hereinbefore named, other than such County and Louisville Medical Center, Inc. The form of Supplemental Contract which was presented to the meeting of the Board on March 21, 1972, will not be executed. The revised form, the execution of which is herein authorized, contains in Paragraph B(4) provisions in addition to those contained in such Paragraph in the previous draft.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that such Chairman and/or Vice Chairman are hereby authorized and directed on behalf of such Board to take such further action and to execute and deliver such further instruments, without limitation, as in the discretion of such Chairman and/or Vice Chairman may be determined from time to time as necessary or desirable to consummate their action as contemplated by such Supplemental Contract, and the execution of such further instrument or instruments by such Chairman and/or Vice Chairman shall be conclusive evidence of the exercise of such discretion.

That the Secretary of the Board shall be authorized to attest the action of such Chairman and/or Vice Chairman in connection with the execution of such further instrument or instruments.

IV. Appointments and/or Other Staff Changes

SUPPLEMENTAL RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

I. Dean of Architecture

Recommendation: that Professor Anthony Eardley be appointed Professor of Architecture, with tenure, and Dean of the College of Architecture, not later than July 1, 1972.

Background: Following the resignation of Dean Charles Graves, who requested his return to professorial status in the College, the President appointed a search committee of faculty members and students August 31, 1971, in accordance with the Governing Regulations, to identify potential candidates for this important position. After a critical evaluation of each of the five candidates interviewed, and following consultation with faculty. students and other appropriate persons, the search committee recommended Professor Anthony Eardley of Cooper Union for the Advancement of Science and Art, as its unanimous first choice for the position.

Professor Eardley was educated at London University and at Cambridge and has had practice experience with the London County Council and with architectural firms in England. He has taught in the University of Cambridge School of Architecture, the Architectural Association School of the University of London, Washington University of St. Louis, and Princeton University, as well as at Cooper Union. He is the author of a number of articles and is now completing a three-volume work dealing with the decorative arts by Le Corbusier, to be published by the Viking Press in collaboration with Thames and Hudson of London.

Professor Eardley brings to this position a rich background of education and experience and the University is indeed fortunate to receive his services for this important academic leadership role.

II. Collective Bargaining

Recommendation: that the University's attorneys be authorized and directed to institute legal proceedings necessary to obtain a declaratory judgment determining the rights and duties of the Board of Trustees regarding collective bargaining with its employees.

Background: Representatives of Public Employees Council 51 of the American

Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, AFL - CIO, with headquarters in Cincinnati, Ohio, have contacted University officials and have expressed a desire to represent University employees as a collective bargaining agent.

In 1940 the Kentucky General Assembly enacted statutes providing employees in private industry with collective bargaining rights; this legislation specifically excluded public employees. House Bill 364, introduced in the 1972 General Assembly, would have provided for collective bargaining by public employees; however, this bill was not enacted by the General Assembly.

This recommendation will permit counsel to seek judicial resolution of the questions regarding the ability of the University to enter into collective negotiations with employees which arise in the absence of legislation or court decisions.

III. Affirmative Action Office

Recommendation: that an Affirmative Action Office be established under the Vice President for Administration and that Mrs. Nancy T. Ray be appointed as Coordinator of the University's Affirmative Action Plan, effective July 1, 1972.

Background: At the February 1972 meeting of the Board of Trustees an amendment to the Governing Regulations was approved, recommending that the President develop an Affirmative Action Plan whereby existing University policy on equal employment opportunity may be implemented. The Vice President for Administration has been designated as the University's Equal Cpportunity Officer with the primary responsibility for implementing the Affirmative Action Plan. An office of Affirmative Action is being established.

Mrs. Nancy Ray has been employed by the University since 1966 and has served as Assistant Dean of Students since 1969. In this capacity her responsibilities have included counseling with minority students, advising the student chapter of the Civil Liberties Union, and involvement with the organization of Associated Women Students and the Council on Womens' Concerns. Mrs. Ray's responsibilities as Coordinator of the Affirmative Action Plan will include the monitoring of employment procedures, the maintenance of records on the employment of minority group members and females, the review of pay equality, and assistance in the process for grievance resolution.

IV. Appointments and/or Other Staff Changes

Recommendation: (1) that approval be given to the appointments and/or other changes which require Board action; and (2) that the report relative to appointments and/or changes already approved by the administration be accepted.

Background: The following recommended appointments and/or other staff changes require approval by the Board of Trustees in accordance with Part VIII-B of the Governing Regulations of the University. These recommendations are transmitted to the Board by the appropriate vice president through the President and have his concurrence.

Under the Governing Regulations the authority to make certain appointments and/or other staff changes is delegated to the President or other administrators who are required to report their actions to the Board. This report follows the recommendations requiring Board approval.

Commonwealth of Kentucky COUNCIL ON PUBLIC HIGHER EDUCATION Frankfort 40601

RESOLUTION ADOPTED BY THE COUNCIL ON PUBLIC HIGHER EDUCATION IN KENTUCKY AT A MEETING HELD ON APRIL 11, 1972

It is shown in the minutes of a properly convened meeting of the Council on Public Higher Education in Kentucky held on April 11, 1972, that the following Resolution was duly introduced, seconded, discussed, put to a vote, and carried:

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, it is provided in KRS 164.020 that it is one of the functions and duties of this Council to determine the amount of the entrance and/or registration fees for admission to the Commonwealth's Public Institutions of Higher Education, these being the University of Kentucky, at Lexington, Kentucky (including its Main Campus in Fayette County, Kentucky, and its Community Colleges elsewhere than in Fayette County, Kentucky, not only those which have previously been established but also any which are in the process of being constructed or established, and those which may be established in the future), Eastern Kentucky University, Kentucky State University, Northern Kentucky State College, Morehead State University, Murray State University, University of Louisville, and Western Kentucky University; and

WHEREAS, it appears that the General Assembly of Kentucky at its regular 1972 Session appropriated to each of said Institutions substantial sums toward the costs and expenses of operating and providing instruction, and the Council has given due and careful consideration to the aggregate money requirements of each Institution with respect to the present and projected academic building needs and programs of each such Institution, monies

available from all sources, and the necessity for providing revenues for the financing thereof, and is otherwise sufficiently advised; and

WHEREAS, by a certain Resolution which was adopted by this Council at a meeting held on April 17, 1970, as subsequently amended by this Council at a meeting held on July 6, 1970 (hereinafter for convenience referred to simply as the "1970 Resolution"), certain entrance or registration fees were approved and specific schedules relating thereto were set forth in Exhibits attached to the 1970 Resolution; and

WHEREAS, in and by the terms and provisions of the aforesaid 1970

Resolution of this Council it was contemplated and provided that certain entrance fees be charged and exacted as an incident to enrollment in such Institutions; and that in each instance a portion thereof be identified, in terms of a specific number of dollars, as "Student Registration Fees," such as each of said Institutions has pledged for the security and source of payment of one or more Series of its "consolidated Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds" with annotated footnotes indicating that the remaining portions of the respective entrance fees (to the extent not specifically designated as Student Registration Fees), constituted and were identified in dollar amounts as representing a "Student Union Fee," or "Student Activity Fee," or "Incidental Fee," or otherwise; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky has previously submitted to this Council a Resolution requesting that with respect to the entrance fees heretofore established for the said University's Community Colleges elsewhere than in Fayette County, Kentucky (and without application whatsoever to the similar entrance fees heretofore established with reference to enrollment at said University's Main Campus in Fayette County, Kentucky), the entire amount of the prescribed entrance fee be identified, designated and constituted the "Student Registration Fee,"

without segregation or deducation therefrom of any sum or amount as heretofore segregated and designated as a "Student Union Fee," or a "Student Activity Fee," or an "Incidental Fee," or otherwise, in order that the total amount of such previously designated entrance fees, whether for resident students, non-resident students, regular session, summer school session or otherwise, might constitute, in the aggregate, the "Student Registration Fee" which is pledged for the security and source of payment of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky's "Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds," and in the 1970 Resolution (and in a similar Resolution adopted in 1968), it was so provided; and

WHEREAS, the Council is fully advised with respect to all of the foregoing, and considers that it is proper and desirable that this Resolution be adopted in accordance with all of the foregoing,

NOW, THEREFORE, THE COUNCIL ON PUBLIC HIGHER EDUCATION IN KENTUCKY DOES HEREBY RESOLVE, AS FOLLOWS:

ARTICLE I. ENTRANCE OR REGISTRATION FEES WHICH MAY BE CHARGED AND EXACTED BY THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF NORTHERN KENTUCKY STATE COLLEGE

Section 101. It is hereby determined that the fees to be charged to students enrolling at Northern Kentucky State College shall

- (a) effective not later than the opening of the Fall

 Term in 1972, be as set forth in the schedule attached hereto

 as Exhibit I, and
- (b) effective not later than the opening of the Fall

 Term in 1973, be as set forth in the schedule attached hereto

 as Exhibit V;

and the Board of Regents of Northern Kentucky State College may, in its discretion, provide that the fees set forth in Exhibit I be made effective with the opening of the Summer Term in 1972, and the fees set forth in Exhibit V be made effective with the opening of the Summer Term in 1973.

Said Board of Regents is hereby given authority to establish such fees and make proper provisions and regulations for the collection thereof.

ARTICLE II. ENTRANCE OR REGISTRATION FEES WHICH MAY BE
CHARGED AND EXACTED BY THE BOARDS OF REGENTS
OF EASTERN KENTUCKY UNIVERSITY, KENTUCKY STATE
UNIVERSITY, MOREHEAD STATE UNIVERSITY, MURRAY
STATE UNIVERSITY, AND WESTERN KENTUCKY UNIVERSITY

Section 201. It is hereby determined that the fees to be charged to students enrolling at Eastern Kentucky University, Kentucky State University, Morehead State University, Murray State University, and Western Kentucky University, shall

- (a) effective not later than the opening of the Fall

 Term in 1972, be as set forth in the schedule attached hereto

 as Exhibit II, and
- (b) effective not later than the opening of the Fall Term in 1973, be as set forth in the schedule attached hereto as Exhibit VI;

provided, however, the respective Boards of Regents of said institutions of Higher Education as hereinabove identified may, in their discretion, provide that the fees set forth in Exhibit II be made effective with the opening of the Summer Term in 1972, and the fees set forth in Exhibit IV be made effective with the opening of the Summer Term in 1973. The respective Boards of Regents of said Institutions are hereby given authority to establish such fees and make proper provisions and regulations for the collection thereof.

ARTICLE III. ENTRANCE OR REGISTRATION FEES WHICH MAY BE CHARGED AND EXACTED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY

Section 301. It is hereby determined that the fees to be charged to students enrolling at the University of Kentucky, including the Community Colleges thereof, shall

(a) effective not later than the opening of the Fall Term in 1972, be as set forth in the two-page schedule attached hereto as Exhibit III, and

(b) effective not later than the opening of the Fall Term in 1973, be as set forth in the two-page schedule attached hereto as Exhibit VII;

provided, however, that the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky may, in its discretion, provide that the fees set forth in Exhibit III be made effective with the opening of the Summer Term in 1972, and the fees set forth in Exhibit VII be made effective with the opening of the Summer Term in 1973. Said Board of Trustees is hereby given authority to establish such fees and make proper provisions and regulations for the collection thereof.

ARTICLE IV. ENTRANCE OR REGISTRATION FEES WHICH MAY BE CHARGED AND EXACTED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF UNIVERSITY OF LOUISVILLE

Section 401. It is hereby determined that the fees to be charged to students enrolling at the University of Louisville shall

- (a) effective not later than the opening of the Fall Term in 1972, be as set forth in the four-page schedule attached hereto as Exhibit IV, and
- (b) effective not later than the opening of the Fall Term in 1973, be as set forth in the four-page schedule attached hereto as Exhibit VIII;

provided, however, that the Board of Trustees of the University of Louisville may, in its discretion, provide that the fees set forth in Exhibit IV be made effective with the opening of the Summer Term in 1972, and the fees set forth in Exhibit VIII be made effective with the opening of the Summer Term in 1973. Said Board of Trustees is hereby given authority to establish such fees and make proper provisions and regulations for the collection thereof.

ARTICLE V. GENERAL PROVISIONS

Section 501. The authority and discretion of said respective Boards of Trustees and of the respective Board of Regents of said State College and Universities is hereby recognized (a) to allocate, set aside, pledge and encumber for academic building purposes and for debt service requirements (including reserves) of Revenue Bonds which may be issued for academic building program purposes all of said Student Registration Fees, or parts thereof from time to time if not already pledged in toto; (b) to segregate and retain the Incidental Fees and apply the same to any proper purpose or purposes; or (c) to allocate, set aside, pledge and encumber for building program purposes (whether the building or buildings involved be for academic purposes or for any other proper educational purpose), and for debt service requirements (including reserves) of Revenue Bonds which may be issued to finance the same, all of said Incidental Fees or parts thereof from time to time; provided, however, that solely in connection with the educational buildings and appurtenant facilities of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky which are provided, or may hereafter be provided, for any of said Board's Community Colleges outside of Fayette County, Kentucky, and as constituting a part or parts of said Board's "Community Colleges Educational Buildings Project" and to be financed through one or more Series of its issue of "Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds," the authority and discretion of said Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky is and shall continue to be restricted, as applicable to the full amount of the "Entrance Fee Schedule" as set forth in the schedules attached hereto as "Exhibits III and VII," to its authority to allocate, set aside, pledge and encumber for academic building purposes, and for debt service requirements (including reserves) of said "Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds," the entire amount of said fees, which entire amount has heretofore been redesignated in full, and is hereby affirmed as constituting "Student Registration Fees," and without previously indicated segregation of any part of such aggregate amounts for a "Student Union Fee" or for an "Activity Fee."

Nothing herein provided shall be deemed to preclude the privilege of said Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, in its discretion, to come before this Council at any future time, with a request that the "Entrance Fee Schedules" so prescribed for all full-time students enrolling in its Community Colleges outside of Fayette County, Kentucky, be added to or increased for any proper purpose and according to any proper segregation or designation; but nevertheless said Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, having requested and having been granted the redesignation herein approved (as to its Community Colleges outside of Fayette County only), and once having pledged the entire amount of such redesignated "Student Registration Fees" for the security and source of payment of its aforesaid "Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds," shall be precluded thereby and may not reduce the same.

Section 502. The schedules of fees which are attached hereto, and which are referred to, respectively, as Exhibits I to VIII, inclusive, shall each be signed on behalf of this Council, and for the purpose of identification as being the respective schedules authorized hereby, by the signature of the Executive Director of the Council; and the respective State Institutions of Higher Learning herein referred to are authorized to accept and rely upon any such schedule (i) identified by the genuine signature of the said Executive Director or (ii) so identified by a reproduced or typewritten signature of said Executive Director if certified over the genuine signature of the Executive Director to be a true copy thereof.

Section 503. This Resolution shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption and shall supersede all previous proceedings in regard to matters embraced herein.

BACHELOR OF GENERAL STUDIES IN COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES

Recommendation: that approval be given to a new degree in the College of Arts and Sciences, Bachelor of General Studies, on an experimental basis until June 1, 1980.

Background: At its meeting of April 10, 1972 the University Senate approved a new degree in the College of Arts and Sciences, Bachelor of General Studies, for transmittal to the Board of Trustees for action.

Following are the proposed requirements for the degree, as approved:

The Bachelor of General Studies is to be an experimental program of the College of Arts and Sciences. Students who qualify may elect to participate in this program until June 1, 1980, but no one may enter the experimental program after that date.

A student may enter the Bachelor of General Studies program upon the completion of at least thirty credits in good standing (not on probation). In order to receive the Bachelor of General Studies degree the student must complete at least 30 hours of credit after officially entering the Bachelor of General Studies degree program. The University requirements for English Composition must be satisfied. Each student in this program shall file a program of study with his advisor.

In the final semester of the degree program, at a time and mode mutually agreeable to the student and his advisor, the student will communicate to his advisor the results, benefits, and values of his work in a way that demonstrates the cohesive character of his individual program. Since these communications constitute an integral portion of the data output of this program, they must be made in some durable medium (e. g. the written word, photographs, magnetic tape).

The degree is awarded upon the completion of at least 120 credits or equivalents, 45 of which must be in courses at or above the 300 level, and 90 of which must be in the College of Arts and Sciences.

Page Two

To facilitate the innovative features of this program, and acknowledging the opportunity for general studies so afforded, the University requirements for General Studies are waived.

In the fall of 1978 the Dean of the College will appoint a committee to evaluate the program and report its recommendations by January 1980. The Faculty will then decide whether the Bachelor of General Studies should become a permanent offering of the College.

GRADUATE RESIDENCE CENTER FOR TEACHER CORPS CYCLE VII

Recommendation: that approval be given to the establishment of a Graduate Residence Center on an experimental basis for Teacher Corps Cycle VII in Louisville for a two-year period.

Background: At its meeting on April 17, 1972 the University Senate approved the establishment of a Graduate Residence Center on an experimental basis for Teacher Corps Cycle VII in Louisville for a two-year period, and forwarded its recommendation to the President for transmittal to the Board of Trustees for its action.

It is proposed that an initial Residence Center arrangement be implemented in Louisville, Kentucky for members of the Teacher Corps, enrolled as graduate students at the University of Kentucky and at the University of Louisville.

Two-year Teacher Corps programs at both universities are funded by the U.S. Office of Education and lead successful corpsmen to one of the master's level degrees conferred by the two universities (M.Ed., M.A., M.A.T.). These programs, at both universities, are committed to the training of teachers specifically for inner-city schools. Urban Louisville, of course, provides a unique laboratory for this training in Kentucky. With the benefit of a Residence Center arrangement, faculty and students can expand their existing cooperative efforts to make this an effective learning experience.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE GOVERNING REGULATIONS ALTERING THE COMPOSITION OF THE UNIVERSITY SENATE (UNIVERSITY SYSTEM)

Recommendation: That the following proposed amendment of Section IV of the Governing Regulations of the University of Kentucky be received for study and consideration, and that this amendment of Section IV be approved at the next regular meeting of the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees.

Background: At its meeting of May 8, 1972, the University Senate (University System) approved and endorsed the proposed amendment and directed that it be presented to the Board of Trustees with the Senate's recommendation that it be adopted. The thrust of this proposed amendment is to increase the student membership of the Senate to 25.

This amendment would provide for more equitable representation of the student body in the University Senate without significantly altering the relative influence of the administration, faculty or student components of the Senate.

Presently, there are 160 faculty, 21 administrators and 17 students comprising the voting membership of the University Senate. If the amendment is passed, there will be 160 faculty, 21 administrators, and 26 students (an increase of nine student Senators). Student influence in the Senate would rise only 3%, from approximately 9% of the voting membership to approximately 12%. However, while the increase in student influence would be slight, the increase in equitable representation would be highly significant.

The following chart shows the enrollment figures in each college and school of the University for the Spring 1972 Semester and the most recent Senate apportionment.

Under the current Governing Regulations, there is one student Senator from each college or school regardless of the relative student population. The resulting disparity is demonstrably acute, ranging from one student Senator per 148 students in Library Science to one student Senator per 5,214 students in Arts and Sciences. One of the purposes of the Senate's action in December, 1970, and the Board's action in February, 1971, was to provide for meaningful input of student influence. However, under the current rule there is unequal representation of the student body. The majority of the student Senators represent the small minority of the students (half of the student Senators represent less than 3,000 students). Passage of this amendment would allow some apportionment of the student Senators to more accurately reflect the student population of each college or school and to make more equal the voting power of each student. Each faculty member now has a relatively equal voice in the Senate through proportional representation. The same goal should at least be approximated for the students of the University of Kentucky. A student in Library Science should not have such a proportionately greater voice in the Senate than the student in Arts and Sciences. (A Library Science student's vote is 35 times greater than an Arts and Sciences student's vote.)

The following chart shows a possible initial apportionment of the 25 student Senators.

As college enrollments change, the 25 elected student Senate seats will be reapportioned to maintain equitable representation. As with faculty apportionment, the Senate Council will assign the number of Student Seats each College or School is entitled to.

This proposed distribution does not provide for the most equitable apportionment possible. That would require many more additional student Senators than are requested here. However, this distribution is a definite improvement over the present apportionment which provides for no proportional representation at all.

The addition of nine (9) student Senators is the minimum required to provide the semblance of proportional representation requested here. It is a modest number. It will allow the Collèges of Arts

and Sciences, Education, Business and Economics, and the Graduate School to be more equally represented.

Proportional representation was the original intent of the University Senate when it proposed in February, 1971, that the student membership of the Senate be increased to 40. This Board rejected that figure as being too large, but did endorse the concept of student representation in the academic decision making process of the University. This proposal would accomplish the goal of equitable apportionment without creating a student component that is too large.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE GOVERNING REGULATIONS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY

IV. THE UNIVERSITY SENATE (University System)

The University Senate shall be composed of both elected and ex officio [members] membership.

The elected membership shall number [177] 185, of which 160 members shall represent the faculty and [17] 25 members shall represent the student body.

The elected faculty membership shall consist of and represent proportionately the members of the full-time teaching and/or research faculty with the rank of assistant professor or higher in the various colleges and the University Libraries, so that the total elected membership shall equal 160. Each elected faculty member shall serve for a term of three years and shall be eligible for reelection for a second consecutive term, but ineligible for further reelection until one year has elapsed. If a faculty member of the Senate should at any time during his term become ineligible to serve (e.g. by reason of assuming an administrative title, resignation or by official leave which precludes attendance) the administrative head of the group represented shall declare a vacancy and designate that member from the eligible faculty who at the last election received the next higher vote to serve for the duration of the elected faculty member's ineligibility.

The elected student membership shall consist of and represent the members of the full-time student body in the various colleges of the University System [and the student body President]. Each college shall be allotted at least one student representative. The remaining student membership positions shall be apportioned among the colleges on the basis of relative student populations of those colleges for the school year in which the student membership elections are held. Students with no declared major shall be represented through the College of Arts and Sciences. Yearly adjustments shall be made to keep apportionment equitable, with the elected student membership maintained at 25. Each elected student member shall be a junior, senior, graduate or professional student, and shall not be on either academic or disciplinary probation and shall serve for a term of one year and shall be eligible for re-

election as often as he or she remains a full-time undergraduate, graduate, or professional student in the University System. If a student should at any time become ineligible to serve (e.g. by relinquishing his or her position as a full-time student, being placed on academic probation or violating the Senate attendance regulations), the administrative head of the group represented shall declare a vacancy and designate that member from the eligible student body who at the last election received the next highest vote to serve for the duration of the elected student member's ineligibility.

The ex officio voting membership shall include the Vice President for Academic Affairs, Vice President for the Medical Center, Vice President for the Community College System, Dean of the Graduate School and Coordinator of Research, Dean of Undergraduate Studies, Deans of the Colleges, [and] the Director of Libraries, and the President of the Student Body.

(No other changes in the UNIVERSITY SENATE section)

At its April 1972 meeting, the Board of Trustees requested the Committee on Student Code Revisions to review some of the recommendations in the Committee's March 1972 report in light of Vice President Zumwinkle's memorandum to President Singletary dated March 31, 1972.

The Committee convened with all members present on April 27 to hear pertinent comments from Vice President Zumwinkle, Dean Hall and Mr. Darsie and then, in private session, amended the recommendations on the following sections of the Student Code to read as follows:

1.2g Unauthorized entry or use of University facilities or any violation of University rules regarding the use of University property. Where entry to or occupation of premises or facilities was initially authorized, opportunity to comply with a lawful order to leave the premises must be given:

2.22 Resident Advisors

Each housing unit shall have a resident advisor appointed by the Dean of Students in consultation with the President of the affected Residence Hall Government, where feasible. This advisor shall have the duty to counsel and advise students having disciplinary problems affecting that student's relationship with the University as a landlord. He shall investigate any complaint of violation of the rules to determine the facts regarding such alleged violation. Such advisor shall have no authority to impose disciplinary punishment upon the student, but, after counseling with the student, may suggest that the student accept certain voluntary disciplinary punishment or counseling and, if the student agrees to accept such punishment or counseling, the resident advisor shall see that the student carries out his agreement. If the advisor and the student cannot agree on the appropriate punishment or counseling, or if, at any time, the student so requests, the resident advisor shall forward the facts and evidence of the case to the Residence Judicial Board for action.

- 3.31 The student shall be guaranteed the following rights in all proceedings of the University Judicial System.
- 1.411 When the Dean, after investigation into an alleged violation of the disciplinary rules, believes a student has committed a disciplinary offense defined in Section 1.2 or 6.1, he shall notify the student that he is charged with said offense. Thereafter he may [counsel]confer with the student and may outline proposed disciplinary punishment and/or counseling. The counseling session is strictly confidential and does not begin until the student admits guilt to the charges placed against him. Information obtained from the student during a counseling session is inadmissible in any judicial proceeding of the University. Admissions of guilt, voluntarily made after notice of rights prior to such counseling session, is admissible in judicial proceedings if the student withdraws from the counseling process or refuses to comply with the conditions of the counseling process.

- 1424a. The legislative branch of Student Government shall screen all applications for voting membership and forward those approved to the President of Student Government, who, with the advice and approval of the Vice President for Student Affairs, and, in addition, for graduate and professional students with the advice and consent of the President of the Graduate and Professional Student Association, shall make the final appointment of the members of the U. J-Board.
- 1.426 Three unexcused absences in any one semester shall constitute automatic dismissal from the U. J-Board. The U. J-Board, acting as a unit, may make such additional regulations regarding absences as it may deem appropriate. All requests for excused absences shall be made to the Hearing Officer [whose decision shall be final]. The decision of the Hearing Officer may be appealed to the whole Board in writing within thirty days of the Hearing Officer's decision. However, such appeal shall not suspend the action of the Hearing Officer.

ARTICLE V-STATEMENT OF FINANCIAL DELINQUENCY

The University expects the student to be financially responsible and not be delinquent in his financial obligations to the University or to any Department or Devision thereof, including room and board payments to sanctioned fraternal student organizations. Such obligations shall not include fines and penalties assessed against the student by other than University officers.

Financial obligations that are not met within 10 days after the date due shall be reported in writing to the proper office. Obligations to any Division or Department of the University shall be reported to the Office designated by the Vice President for Business Affairs and Treasurer.

The appropriate business office shall notify the student of the financial obligation. If the student does not settle the obligation by the date designated on the notice, he shall, subject to regulations promulgated by the Vice President for Business Affairs and Treasurer be considered delinquent, and that office shall notify the Registrar.

After the Registrar has been notified that a student is delinquent, he shall not allow the student to register, or to transfer credits, or certify him for graduation, until he has been notified in writing by the appropriate business office that the obligation has been settled.

If there is a dispute as to whether or not a student is legally liable for a financial obligation asserted by the University, and the student challenges such obligation through either timely administrative or legal means, then the sanctions of Article V with respect to registration shall not apply until final resolution of the dispute.

Background: The University of Kentucky acquired this land through the Estate of Annie Dillard in November, 1951, and since that time it has been leased to Mr. Jim Bob Daws for grazing purposes at prevailing market rates. The leasing has been ably handled for these years by one agency, Graham Land Office, Graham, Texas. Although the lease rate per acre has been at a premium for the area, with additional income received from a ten year oil lease (terminating in 1963), land ownership in Texas by the University of Kentucky is not permanently desirable. The present market value of Texas grazing land should be sufficiently high to warrant the sale of this tract (approximately 316 acres).
