






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the honorable JOHN Y. BROWN, JR. Governor of Kentucky



JOHN Y. BROWN, JR., became Kentucky's 55th governor on December 11, 1979, succeeding Julian M. Carroll.

Born on December 28, 1933, Governor Brown graduated from Lafayette High School in his hometown, Lexington, and obtained a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Kentucky in 1957. He graduated from the UK College of Law in 1960.

The Governor served in the U. S. Army from 1959-1965.

He has been named the Outstanding Young Man of America by the National Junior Chamber of Commerce (1965), as one of the Outstanding Civic Leaders of America (1967) and Louisville's Outstanding Young Man by the same group. Lions Club International named him to a recipient of the Outstanding American Award (1974) and he is the youngest person to be named to the University of Kentucky Hall of Fame.

He has three children, John Y. Brown, III (16), Eleanore (14) and Sandra (13). He is married to the former Phyllis George. They attend the Walnut Street

Church, Louisville.

JAMES G. AMATO Mayor Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government

JAMES G. AMATO took office as mayor on January 2, 1978. In doing so, he became the second mayor of the consolidated city and county governments.

A native of Lexington, Amato has been a practicing attorney since 1964. He is a member of the Fayette County Bar Association, the Kentucky Bar Association, and the Kentucky Law Enforcement. He formerly held positions as Alcoholic Beverage Control Commissioner for the Commonwealth of Kentucky, Director of Citizens for Judicial Improvement, Inc., Municipal Court Judge and City Prosecutor.

As chief executive of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, the mayor is authorized to supervise, administer and control all departments of government.

The mayor is elected on a non-partisan ballot every four years. He is assisted principally by the Chief Administrative Officer and commissioners of the six departments.

DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY President, University of Kentucky

The University of Kentucky has become one of the major institutions of higher learning in the United States under the leadership of Dr. Otis Singletary, the eighth president of the University.

Dr. Singletary was named president

of the University in August, 1969. He had previously served as executive vice-chancellor for academic affairs in the University of Texas System and director of the Job Corps program for the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Dr. Singletary, a native of Gulfport, Miss., holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University.

As president of the principal institu-

tion of higher learning in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land-grant institution, a "people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

In the nine years he has been president, the University has grown to where there are now more than 22,000 students on the Lexington campus and more than 17,000 students in UK's 13 community colleges, and the University has become one of the major research institutions in the country.

Recognition of his service to the University was evidenced by the UK Alumni Association, which presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award—an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

Dr. Singletary is the author of two books and several monographs.

A Navy veteran of World War II and the Korean Conflict, he is a commander in the U. S. Naval Reserve. He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot and Kendall.

The Singletarys live at Maxwell Place, traditional home of UK presidents.

Athletics Department

CLIFFORD O. HAGAN Director

Expansion of the football training room and addition of a beautiful player's lounge at Shively Sports Center, new carpeting in the stadium football offices, a new basketball office complex in Memorial Coliseum, re-arrangement of the baseball fences and a new surface for the running track are just a few of the recent improvements that signify the continuing progress of UK athletics since Cliff Hagan joined the Wildcat Staff seven years ago.

Recognized nationally as a progressive, business-oriented and promotion-minded administrator, Hagan has seen and overseen vast improvements in all phases of an ever-expanding operation that has encompassed 16 sports since the men's and



women's programs were merged in July of last year.

The merger, under Hagan's direction, has been orderly, with office space remodeled and in some cases created to make room for the women's coaching and administrative staff.

The indoctrination of Hagan into the UK athletics administrative structure

came in 1972, when he was named assistant to Harry C. Lancaster and given the task of implementing the Blue & White Fund for 57,600-seat Commonwealth Stadium and later for Rupp Arena. The fruits of his labors in this area have provided the additional financial support that has elevated the UK athletics program into a first class operation.

Hagan was named Athletics Director in July 1975 following Lancaster's retirement.

Hagan also has been an advocate of a strong scholar-athlete program, feeling "a genuine commitment to provide all the academic support and encouragement we can to help our athletes leave our campus with a college education and a degree."

On the personal side, Hagan received one of his highest individual honors last May when he became the first University of Kentucky basketball player to be installed in the Naismith Memorial National Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass.

He is married to the former Martha Milton of Owensboro. They have four children: Lisa, Laurie, Amy, and Kip.

FRANK HAM Assistant Director of Athletics

FRANK HAM became Assistant Director of Athletics in July 1975 soon after Cliff Hagan succeeded Harry C. Lancaster as Director of Athletics.

A native of Scranton, Pa., Ham came to the University in 1969 as administrative Assistant to footpall coach John Ray, and was reassigned to the Athletic Director's staff in 1972 when Ray resigned.

Ham graduated from high school at Niles, Michigan, and completed his undergraduate work at Indiana University and coached high school football and track at John Adams High in South Bend in 1944-46 and then returned to Olivet as athletic director and head football and basketball coach.

In 1951, he became assistant to the president at Olivet, with responsibilities in public and alumni relations. He was in private business from 1954 until 1968.



SUE FEAMSTER Assistant Director of Athletics SUE FEAMSTER joined the athletics recreation in 1972



SUE FEAMSTER joined the athletics association July 1, 1978, with the merger of the men's and women's programs. Feamster had been the director of women's athletics prior to her appointment as assistant director of athletics.

A native of Frankfort, she came to the University as a graduate student in 1970, was named assistant director of campus recreation in 1972 and director of women's athletics in 1974.

Feamster graduated from Franklin County High School where she was an outstanding tennis player and athlete. While in college she earned letters in tennis, field hockey, basketball and track from Indiana University and Kentucky State University, where she earned her B.S. degree and graduated with honors.

LARRY IVY Assistant Director of Athletics for Finance

Adding a new dimension to UK athletics was the appointment three years ago of LARRY IVY as Assistant Director of Athletics for Finance.

Ivy, who came to the University as Director of Housing in 1969, is involved primarily with the administration and management of financial aspects, and develops and initiates policies for accounting procedures and related business management activities of the department.

JOE B. HALL **Head Basketball Coach**

JOE B. HALL is beginning his eighth season as coach of the Wildcats, coming off a year in which he took a team depleted through graduations and molding them into a contender for the SEC title and receiving an invitation to enter the National Invitation Tournament. The team finished with 19 wins and 12

Since becoming head coach in 1972, succeeding the legendary Adolph F. Rupp, Hall has accumulated a record of 154 wins and 54 losses. His eleven year coaching record stands at 230-110. Broken down, it shows a 57-50 five year mark at Regis College, a 19-6

LEONARD HAMILTON is beginning his sixth year at Kentucky after serving three years as assistant coach at Austin Peay. An outstanding recruiter with seemingly tireless energy, Hamilton has contributed heavily to maintaining a high level of young talent at UK. Specializing in coaching defense, Hamilton has had a positive impact on Wildcat defensive

JOE DEAN, JR., played against the Wildcats for three years at Mississippi State University, before serving as Bulldog assistant coach while earning a masters degree in physical education. An outstanding student, Dean was named to the 1976 Academic All-SEC second team. A native of Baton Rouge, record at Central Missouri, and 154-54 record at UK.

Hall became Rupp's top assistant in 1969 when Harry C. Lancaster was named athletics director. His record as freshmen coach was 60-15, including an undefeated (22-0) season (1971-72) which resulted in the Kittens being crowned National Freshmen Champions by Basketball News.

A popular personality on the clinic and convention circuits, Hall also has had much international exposure. In addition to the Globetrotters tour in 1951, and the "Down Under" tour in 1974, he has helped conduct basketball clinics for the U. S. Army in Anchorage and Fairbanks, Alaska (1968) and at Ramstein Air Base, in Frankfurt, Germany and the RAF Base at Mildenhall, England in 1975. He also was Olympic Trials coach under

DICK PARSONS, in his eighth year as Joe B. Hall's No. 1 assistant, returned to the University as baseball coach in 1969. Before giving up his position to join the basketball staff on a full time basis, he molded a baseball team (1971) which established or tied 15 school records. He is a graduate of UK where he played guard under former Coach Adolph F. Rupp.

Parsons came to the University in 1958 after an outstanding career as a foursports star at Harlan High School, where



He is married to the former Celia Cawood of Harlan. They have a daughter, Kathy, and a son, Ed.







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
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



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Behind the Scenes:

Television Quiz

True or False

1. Television cameramen get to watch the University of Kentucky Wildcat Basketball games from the best positions in Rupp Arena. _

2. It's harder to run camera for basketball games than it is for baseball games because game action is faster.

3. Cameramen don't have to know too much about the sport for which they are running camera because they are only following orders from the program's dir-

4. When a director asks a cameraman to

give him a "hero shot" he wants the cameraman to show him pictures of John Wayne.

5. Television, and especially a live sporting event, is a perfect example of Murphy's Law: everything that can go wrong, will . . . and probably at the worst possible moment.

6. University of Kentucky Wildcat basketball fans are so exuberant that vibrations from their cheering can actually shake the lens of the camera causing a rippling of the picture on viewers' sets at home.

Answers

1. FALSE.

This is a tricky question. The television cameramen, located mid-way up the bleacher section and right on the floor, do indeed have some of the best seats in Rupp Arena. What isn't true is that the cameramen get to watch the basketball games from these terrific positions . . .

During a game, cameramen must concentrate solely on that portion of the game which they have been assigned to cover. Rarely does a cameraman even see all the action as it occurs on the floor. For example: a cameraman covering over-all game action follows the ball with a "wide shot" and must overlook sideline action or other action occurring away from the ball; cameramen assigned to highlight and follow key Wildcat players during a game, will not be looking at game action in which those key players are not involved.

WKYT-TV cameraman Bo Gray comments, "The only time I see a University of Kentucky basketball game is when I watch it on a delayed broadcast . . . or if I'm not running camera."

2. FALSE. Surprised? Most people think that it must be harder to operate a television camera for a basketball game than a baseball game because basketball is a much faster-paced game. But it's just the opposite. Basketball is one of the easiest sports to operate camera for, while baseball is probably one of the most difficult. In basketball the play is limited to a confined area, and while game action is fast paced and constant, there is little game strategy and action is generally centered around the basketball. Baseball involves a great deal of game strategy and game action is never centered solely around the pitcher and the baseball, i.e. stealing bases, fielding, etc.
3. FALSE.

While it is true that cameramen are following directions from the show's director, the cameramen are the "eyes" of the director. During the game, the director is sitting in a control room inside a mobile television unit located underneath Rupp Arena. The only game action he ever sees is what his camermen are shooting; this appears on the four camera monitors in the mobile unit. It is the responsibility of the cameramen to work as a team and cover all the action on the floor allowing the director to pick

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which camera shot and what game action will be transmitted to home viewers. For cameramen to be able to give the director the shots necessary for good game coverage they must be knowledgeable about the sport, the officiating, and game strategies.

4. FALSE.

A "hero shot" is simply a close-up camera shot of a player who has just completed an outstanding play.

5 TRUE

"Everything can be operating perfectly and then five minutes before the game begins anything can go wrong," explained C. Gregg "Figg" Newton, cameraman for WKYT-TV, "and the possibilities of




what can go wrong are virtually limit-less."


Because Murphy's Law seems to have been written about the television industry, and especially about live sporting events, cameramen must be versatile enough to cover for any unforeseen equipment problems. Should the game action camera go on the blink, one of the other cameras must be relegated to game action immediately.

6 TRUE

It's called microphonics. And the University of Kentucky Wildcat fans are so exuberant that vibrations from their cheers can actually shake the lenses of the cameras. At home this is seen as a rippling of the picture.

DeWayne Scales and Lionel Green paced LSU with 14 points each.







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


The LSU system is a co-educational, state-supported institution of higher learning comprising seven major divisions located on eight campuses in five cities across the state.



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

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Academic Common Market Cuts Costs

University of Kentucky library science student Rick Buchanan paid a visit to his home library of Williamsburg, Va., last winter to find out where he could study library science. Virginia does not have a graduate library science degree program.

The Williamsburg librarian referred him to the state librarian. She told Buchanan about several schools of library science and then gave him the good news about a little-known program that helps Buchanan to save lots of money in tuition fees.

The program is called the Academic Common Market. Coordinated by the Southern Regional Education Board, the common market permits waiver of out-of-state tuition for a pool of specialized graduate programs in state supported schools in all of the Southern states except North Carolina. This means that the out-of-state student pays the same fees as the resident students.

Kentucky is among the first states to participate in the common market.

"It took quite a bit of work to get the program going," said Dr. Wimberly C. Royster, dean of the UK Graduate School. Graduate education leaders like Royster set up the market so that students going to another state don't pursue degrees offered in their home states.

"For instance," said Dr. Michael J. Gardone Jr., director of academic programs at the Kentucky Council on Higher Education, "Kentucky does not offer Kentuckians an opportunity to study for

a doctorate in animal science out of state because such a program exists at UK."

A Kentucky resident wishing to become a market student must first be accepted at the university of his choice, and the university chosen must be one for which Kentucky has obtained access for its residents. The Kentucky student must then apply for certification as a legal Kentucky resident to the Kentucky Council on Higher Education.

Kentucky residents going to universities in other states as common market students may choose from 152 degree subject headings. Some examples are the study of theater arts for a doctorate at Florida State University; environmental design and planning for a doctorate at Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University and a master's degree in fisheries science at Louisiana State University.

UK offers common market students seven master's degree programs—diplomacy and international commerce, housing and interior design, library science, medical radiation dosimetry, philosophy, radiological health and toxicology.

Five doctoral degrees also are offered to common market students at UK—agricultural engineering, musical arts, musicology, animal sciences and higher education

Sometimes one state will offer a particular degree to residents of only one other state at the common market rate.

For instance, UK offers the Ph.D. degree in animal science only to South Carolina residents and the doctorate in higher education only to Louisiana residents.

On the other hand, UK offers, a master's degree in medical radiation dosimetry to residents of Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, South Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia.

Kentucky has received more certified students from common market states than it has certified Kentucky residents to study in other states, Gardone said.


"UK's library science program has had an arrangement similar to the common market program with West Virginia for some years," Dr. James Sodt, associate dean of the UK College of Library Science, explained.

A library science student, Debbie Cochran of Little Rock, Ark., said, "The South is far ahead of the rest of the country in cooperating to provide a good education at a reasonable cost to all people in the area."

"The volume (of students) probably never will be large," Gardone said, "but the program assists all graduate students and provides educational opportunities to Kentucky students.

"This program is helping students with their educational needs," Royster said, and "it is saving duplication of educational resources."

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

GATE INFORMATION

Rupp Arena will normally open one hour prior to any scheduled event. Please do not leave the arena until the conclusion of an event or game or at half-time if you plan to re-enter. No "Passout" tickets will be issued and you will not be permitted to re-enter.

LIQUORS

Alcoholic beverages are strictly prohibited within the arena as are all foods and drink containers including hard surfaced materials of any type, bottles, cans, thermos bottles, ice bags, ice chest, and any object related to above. Arena personnel are instructed to enforce this rule in the interest of safety.

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Messages for the public address announcer are acceptable only in emergencies and must be approved by the Sports Information Director at University of Kentucky basketball events.


SIGNS

- (6) We call upon all who join us in the support of the University of Kentucky athletic teams to join us likewise in support of this code.



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


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
