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College Graduates

For the pass several years many educators have been stating their beliefs that a college degree no, longer assures the possessor of a good job, and that consequently the greatest problem fac-ing the college student of tools is his possibility of securing employment upon graduation. As a result, most of the pictures pointed of the colle-gian's future have been rather dark in hue.

Now, however, comes a revealing report from
the United States office of education which
throws an entirely different and decidedly promising light on the subject. According to the
findings of this study, of the men and women
graduates who wanted jobs, 95 per cent are temporarily or permanently employed. Three-fifth
have never been idle and only two per cent of
the men and one per cent of the women have
ever heen on relief.
Wages and salaries, while still far beneath
"good pay" level of the prosperous 29's, are not
exactly discouraging. College men, the report
shows, earned an average of \$1.314 the first year
after graduation. At the end of the eighth year,
however, the average had risen to \$2.885. College women averaged \$1.092 the first year, \$1.606
the eighth.

Although these findings fall far short of perfection, they surely serve to dispel some of the clouds of pessimism and discouragement which have been formed by persons not able to adjust themselves to the rapidly changing times in swhich we are living.

The report proves that a college degree and especially a college education still mean a good deal to prospective employers, and, from a job-getting point of view, are still decidedly worthwhile things to possess. Consequently, the 'dark' future which so many picture for this June's graduating (assa may not turn out to be so "dark" after all.—J. C.

Much more important than individual points for clarification and revision in the constitution for student government is an alarming attitude among a certain group of students and faculty members concerning any type of faculty-student relationships on this campus.

Blatant at some of the committee meetings and noticeable in general, the attitude really boils down to plain old distrust. Extremely sheptical students are leary of allowing faculty members to sit on any of their committees for fear of being dominated. Conversely, extreme skeptics among the faculty dislike relegating power to the students for fear it will be misused. They point to the past with its examples of poorly-managed student committees. From this corner, both sides appear to have certain good points but in turn are overlooking the best bet by not supporting a move for cooperation. The faculty is here to educate the students, not to control them. The students are here supposedly, to become educated, not to run the place. Faculty members who assert that students are children, can not be trusted with power, and can not assume responsibility are in no greater roor than students who over that the facility is over-bearing, "old-fogeyish," and grasping. Between the two extremes is a medium where everyone shares responsibility and makes the most of that responsibility by cooperation.

Although lapsing at times to a mere visionary dream, cooperation is worth fighting for. 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
