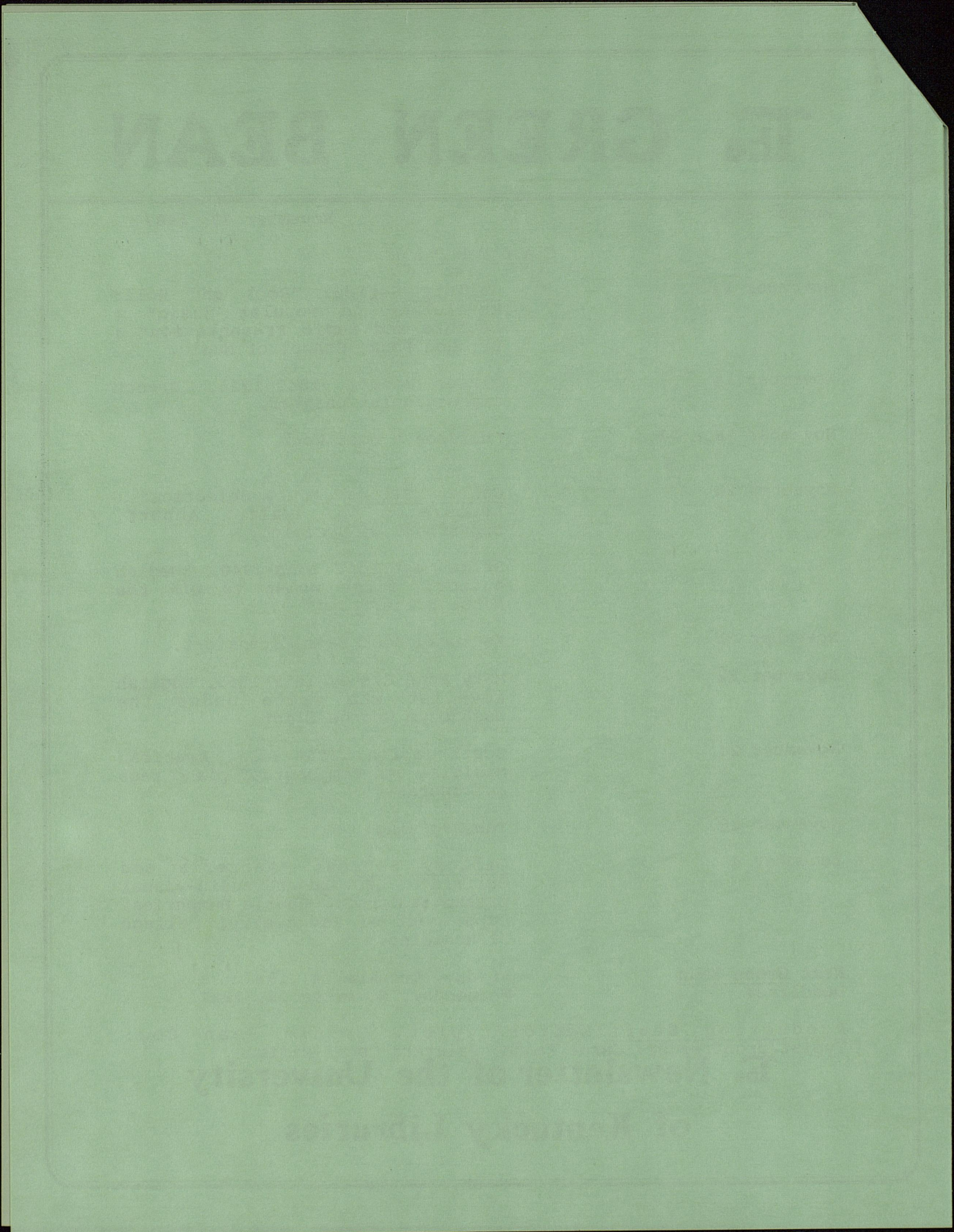

USING JOB MANAGEMENT ---  
OUTPUT A JOB

When you've had problems with printing your job notices and you need to reprint them, you can use the subfunction Q in /JO.

Follow the procedure below:

1. Type /JO <CR>
2. Type O <CR>
3. At REPORT: prompt, type in the code for the notices you need to reprint. If you do not remember the code, type a ? <CR> and type the index number for the notices and <CR>.
4. The system will list the last time that notice was run.  
GENERATED: 10/21/87 9:41 AM/  
But this is not necessarily your set of notices. Type a ? <CR> to see the listing of notice dates and times. Unless there is only one set of notices of this type, the system will want you to choose an index number for your set of notices. Use /F and /B to move through this list. This is where the guessing game starts.
5. Choose the date and time closest to when you think the notices should have run. Type the index number and <CR>.
6. The system now gives the following prompts.

FROM PAGE:1/      Hit  <CR> .
TO PAGE:##/      Hit  <CR> .
PRINT OR VIEW:PRINT/
Type V<CR>.
EVERYTHING OK? YES/ Hit <CR>.
The system will show you the first notice on your screen.
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7. Look at the address at the top of the notice.

a) If it is your library's, then the notices are yours. Use the ^ <CR> to Quit looking at these notices. Now use the O subfunction in /JO to print these notices.

b) If the address is not for your library, repeat the procedure above until you find your notices.

This procedure saves paper

and time going to the printer. It also cuts down on confusion when people only request their own notices be printed.
