Some want more representation in search

Several members of the University community do not think there is sufficient campus representation on the chancellor for the Lexington Campus advisory search committee.

After receiving several complaints from professors and department heads, especially in the College of Arts and Sciences, the University's Senate Council wrote a letter expressing its disastisfaction with the committee's make-up.

"We wrote the letter because we had gotten several various con-

we had gotten several various con-cerns that the committee did not have full professional, research-

type people on it," said Raymond Cox, Senate Council chairman and an advisory committee member.

Cox said, as a committee member, he thinks more representation is necessary.

"I wish there were one or two more people of high-caliber research faculty," Cox said.

"But, I think the committee is still workable. There are some strong research people in the group."

Other council members think more research-oriented people are necessary to make a balanced committee.

Since the chancellor makes direct decisions concerning

"It's important that the research faculty on the Lexington Campus have a voice," said Seate Council member Thomas Garrity. "There are several ways this can accomplished, however." Council member Mike Nietzel said the letter asked Wethington to appoint "a couple of more faculty associated with research to the committee."

Greg Watkins, a student representative on the council, said he thinks Wethington's concerns about the size of the committee are fair, but he argued that the College of Arts and Sciences should have further representation because it is UK's biggest academic college.

"I recently spoke with Dr. Wethington, and he said he thinks the committee is the right size to pick a chancellor, and I trust that," Watkins said. "But I understand the faculty's concerns, too."

Soldiers honored in **UK exhibit**

erans. Photographs of World War I's Photographs of World War Is-bighest ranking black army offi-cer, Charles D. Young, and other black soldiers from the Revolu-tionary War to post-Vietnam mark the walls of this exhibit. It is part of a humanities series to educate the public about the significant contributions blacks have made to medicine, science, arts and history.

Doris Y. Wilkinson, professor of sociology and director of African-American Studies, brought the exhibit to the University.

African-American Studies, brought the exhibit to the University.

"The primary focus is to inform and educate the public about the significant contributions of African-Americans to the history and culture of this country," Wilkinson said.

The exhibit is an outgrowth of an African-American Physician's Exhibit Wilkinson developed in 1988-89 that was displayed across the country, including Harvard University's medical library.

When researching physicians, the presence of blacks in the military sparked interest for UK's new exhibit, Wilkinson said.

"In the display, the faces of numerous unknown but courageous men and women who gave their lives for democracy confront us," she said. "They fought and died for freedom in a nation that denied rights and privileges."

Berryman Foster, who served in World War II and is a Lexington resident, aided Wilkinson in her research. While compiling the exhibit, Wilkinson consulted Foster about his experience as a stewardmate.

"I learned how to cook and run

"I learned how to cook and run a diner for officers and clean up their quarters. I was just like a butler," he said. The eshibit is located in the Peal Gallery in Margaret I. King Library-North and the main lobby of King Library-South.

Students have good time in Good Barn

Landscape architecture students are not raised in a barn, but they spend a majority of their college careers in one. The students spend anywhere from 20 to 100 hours a week on South Campus at the E.S. Good Barn participating in a rigorously competitive program. Michael Hasenmyer, a fourth-year student, said landscape architecture means many sleepless nights and bad habits.

"You don't really know why you get into it," he said.
"I still don't know. There are days and weekends I don't leave (the barn). I don't eave think about anything except the project I'm working on."

thing except the project I'm working on."

Although Hasenmyer sometimes questions his choice of majors, there are a lot of other students who want to get involved in the program.

The landscape architecture department, affectionately known as "L.A." to its students, is a selective program. It only takes 25 students a year.

About 200 students apply each year and are interviewed and about 50 or 60 take the aptitude test to get into the program.

take the aptitude test to get into the program.

First-year students fill their basic requirements. Second-year students spend about 20 hours a week in the barn and learn basic principles of design and spatial element design. Hasenmyer said "life ends" in the third year when students can spend from 40 to 80 hours a week in the barn. In their third year, students take classes in construction, design and plant identification, and they start analyzing and inventorying sites.

tification, and they start analyzing and inventorying sites.
Fourth-year students begin basic projects combining what they've learned, and they spend about 100 hours working on them in the studio. Fifth-years wrap up the things they have learned and spend up to an entire semester working on a single project.

Many of those projects are implemented in the community.

Hasenmyer said the work pays off,

The group designed an entrance driveway, residential garden, private residential area, surrounding lands and a park that sits on the corner.

Sam Graper, president of the UK chapter of the American Society of Landscape Architecture, said there are many misconceptions about landscape architecture.

many misconceptions about landscape architecture.

He said the first thing people ask him when they find out he is in land-scape architecture is how to fix the dying pansies in their backyards.

The second thing people tell him is, "Oh, really, I have a brother who is an architect."

"Oh, really, I have a brother who is an architect."

He could probably tell you how to help the dying pansies, but he said that is not all he does.

And, he said, there is a big difference between landscape architects and other architects.

"Architecture is the design of a structure inside, the building and struff," Graper said. "L.A. deals with everything outside of that."

In addition to saving pansies, they must have advanced knowledge of fields like natural, social and behavioral

must have advanced knowledge of fields like natural, social and behavioral sciences.

They often have to play mediator between different groups, such as settling disputes between engineers, architects, businessmen and environmentalists.

Second-year student Chad Hunt said although landscape architects suggest and implement changes they try to be considerate of the environment.

"That's Why we analyze and survey a sight, to make sure we're doing what's best for everyone involved," Hunt said.

"We try to enhance a sight instead of destroying it."

Hasenmyer said landscape architecture provides him with a nice mix between the artistic side and the calculated, organized side of things and nature.

"I don't think landscape architecture is all creativity," Hasenmyer said. "It's all sensitivity to the people of that community, to the land and to all of the other factors that get involved in a present."

Graper said landscape architecture and the students that do it cannot be summed up in a few simple words. "We know the ins and outs of every person in here," Graper said. "Spending 40 or 60 or 100 hours makes you realize how much you like and enjoy what you are doing. There's a certain passion and insanity that is involved in this."

NATION Tax cut plan is unveiled by Republicans

WASHINGTON — House Republicans presented their long-promised tax cut for families, businesses and investors yesterday, declaring that it would ease financial burdens on Americans and help companies create more jobs. But it faces political difficulties shead.

Portraying the measure as a boon to ordinary Americans, House Ways and Means Committee Chairman Bill Archer, R-Texas, unveiled the package in a speech to the conservative Family Research Council in a House office crammed with couples and small children. The pep-rally amosphere, however, did little to cloak the fact that its introduction formally ignites what will be one of Congress fercest and least predictable battles this year: an effort to slash taxes even as lawmakers try to crase the mammoth budget deficit. The measure would cost \$189 billion over five years, though its 10-year price tag is likely to balloon to about \$700 billion.

DEERFIELD, Ill. — Michael Jordan, estranged from the sport he adopted, may be returning to the game he once ruled, Jordan practiced again with the Chicago Bulls vesterday, the third straight day he appeared at team headquarters, fueling speculation that he'll trade in his baseball spikes for a new pair of Air Jordans.

"As far as Michael and all the speculation in basketball, we just have to hang tight here and wait to see what goes on," Chicago Bulls coach Phil Jackson said.

comment. And spokesmen for the Bulls, the Chicago White Sox and Jordan's agent said no announcement was forthcoming. Jackson said the distraction

Cocaine may have led to Lewis' death

Cocaine may have led to Lewis' death NEW YORK — Cocaine may have contributed to the death of basketball star Reggie Lewis, but people around him ignored that possibility to proter reputations and financial interests, The Wall Street Journal reported yesterday. The newspaper said while a definite connection cannot be shown, many doctors suspect the Boston Celtics captain died in July 1993 from a heart damaged by cocaine. "What is undeniable: Cocaine was a central, explosive issue for the doctors, the Lewis family, the Celtics and the pathologists who conducted his November 1993 autopsy — an issue that became untouchable because Mr. Lewis was a basketball superstar," the newspaper said. The Boston Celtics threatened to file a \$100 million lawsuit against the reporter, the Wall Street Journal and its parent company, Dow Jones and Co. Inc. NBA deputy commissioner Russ Granik said the Journal's story "is based entirely on speculation and has no real factual basis."






"I encourage students to go across campus to see what life is on other parts of campus," Roth said.


RHA is working with UK Food Services to advertise a lite menu for each day of the RHA week. The special menu is in recognition of National Nutrition Month.
