## **Investment Committee Report**

#### Presidential Search Committee Report

Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, Tuesday, December 12, 2000.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met at 3:00 p.m. (Lexington time) on Tuesday, December 12, 2000 in the Board Room on the 18th floor of Patterson Office Tower.

### A. Meeting Opened

Billy Joe Miles, Chairperson, called the meeting to order at 3:00 p.m., and the invocation was pronounced by Mr. Guthrie.

## B. Roll Call

The following members of the Board of Trustees answered the call of the roll: Governor Edward T. Breathitt, Mr. Paul W. Chellgren, Ms. Marianne Smith Edge, Mr. James Glenn III, Mr. Merwin Grayson, Mr. John "Jack" Guthrie, Dr. Loys L. Mather, Dr. Robert P. Meriwether, Mr. Billy Joe Miles (Chairman), Mr. Steven S. Reed, Dr. Daniel R. Reedy, Ms. Marian Sims, Ms. Alice Sparks, Dr. W. Grady Stumbo, Ms. JoEtta Y. Wickliffe, Mr. Billy B. Wilcoxson, Mr. Russell Williams and Ms. Elaine Wilson. Absent from the meeting were Dr. Elissa Plattner and Mr. C. Frank Shoop. The University administration was represented by President Charles T. Wethington, Jr.; Chancellors James W. Holsinger and Elisabeth Zinser; Vice Presidents Fitzgerald Bramwell, Joseph T. Burch, Ben W. Carr, Edward A. Carter, George DeBin and Eugene Williams; Dr. Juanita Fleming, Special Assistant for Academic Affairs; Mr. Larry Ivy, Director of Athletics, and Mr. Richard E. Plymale, General Counsel.

Members of the various news media were also in attendance. A quorum being present, the Chairperson declared the meeting officially open for the conduct of business at 3:05 p.m.

## C. Consent Agenda

Mr. Miles stated that there were three items on the consent agenda:

Approval of Minutes
Candidates for Degrees – Community College System (PR 4A)
Candidates for Degrees – University System (PR 5A)

Mr. Chellgren moved approval of the Consent Agenda. The motion, seconded by Mr. Guthrie, carried. (See PR 4A and PR 5A at the end of the Minutes.)

## D. <u>President's Report to the Board of Trustees (PR 1)</u>

President Wethington stated that PR 1A, "A Decade in Review," will be presented at the end of his report. President Wethington called attention to the following items in PR 1:

1. The University of Kentucky has agreed to be a University of Promise, a part of the America's Promise program that General Colin Powell has sponsored across the country.

- 2. The Partnership on Research Progress Committee, chaired by Mr. Billy Joe Miles, had a very successful conference that focused on the new economy and the University of Kentucky and it's role in the new economy.
- 3. The University of Kentucky signed an agreement with Louisville Central High Magnet Career Academy to enhance the school's ability to prepare students for careers in banking and business, computer technology, legal and governmental services and other fields.
- 4. The University of Kentucky Center for Rural Health received an \$800,000 grant to work with Perry and Harlan counties to prevent and manage common, chronic diseases.
- 5. The College of Education honored 70 teachers who made a difference; one of those was Board of Trustees member Marian Sims.
- 6. The University's Ecology, Evolution and Behavior Program was ranked 14<sup>th</sup> among the nation's 86 programs in a recent ranking by a Vanderbilt University professor.
- 7. The Kentucky Geological Survey, housed at the University of Kentucky, released a digital coal atlas that offers detailed maps and charts of the state's coal resources.
- 8. The University of Kentucky and Georgetown College have finalized an agreement to permit seniors at Georgetown to pursue graduate degrees in Public Administration at UK.
- 9. The UK Graduate School is offering tuition free graduate courses as part of their G.I.F.T. (Graduate Incentive Free Tuition) program in an effort to attract students to graduate education.

President Wethington asked the members to read the other items in the report at their leisure.

## E. Personnel Actions (PR 2)

President Wethington recommended that approval be given to the appointments, actions and/or other staff changes which require Board action; and that the report relative to appointments and/or changes already approved by the administration be accepted. Ms. Edge moved approval. The motion, seconded by Mr. Guthrie, carried. (See PR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

## F. Proposed Amendment to the Governing Regulations (PR 3A)

President Wethington stated that PR 3A is a recommendation that the proposed amendments to the Governing Regulations be received for preliminary consideration and at the next regular meeting of the Board of Trustees, be included on the agenda for final action. He explained that it is designed to bring the University of Kentucky Governing Regulations in-line with state law. He noted that the definition of "relatives" is changed slightly due to having to

include the exact wording from the statute. He pointed out that during this fiscal year, the University will have the election of a staff person to the Board of Trustees, a faculty member to the Board of Trustees, and a student member to the Board of Trustees. President Wethington stated that these regulations need to be in place so that any person interested in running for or being considered for the Board of Trustees know that he or she must not have relatives employed by the University of Kentucky. He expressed his pleasure in recommending PR 3A for the Board's approval.

Ms. Sparks asked if this amendment is retroactive or will only apply to future candidates of the Board of Trustees. President Wethington responded this change is to bring the University's regulations in-line with the statute. He stated that the Attorney General would have to opine whether or not it will apply to current members.

Chairman Miles asked for a motion before further discussion. Mr. Grayson moved the approval of this recommendation. Ms. Sparks asked for further clarification of the opinion they currently have from the Attorney General. President Wethington explained that the most recent opinion that the University has was not concerning an employee of the University of Kentucky. Ms. Sparks questioned whether or not this amendment would apply to all Board members. Mr. Guthrie responded that he understood it to apply to all Board members. President Wethington agreed with Mr. Guthrie. Mr. Miles asked if the faculty and staff representatives on the Board understood this amendment. President Wethington explained that every Board member is included, whether faculty, staff, student or otherwise, by statute. Mr. Williams stated that the Senate Council has discussed this issue. President Wethington noted that he had sent this item to the Chair of the Senate Council back in the spring; however, it will be resent to all of the effected parties prior to its being considered by the Board in January. Mr. Guthrie noted that several years ago at the University of Louisville, there was a member of the Board of Trustees whose daughter-in-law was an employee of the university and when the issue came up, the individual stepped down from the Board. He stated that he was unsure as to whether it is retroactive or not. President Wethington again stated that this action is to bring the University's regulation in compliance with the statute and in compliance with the Attorney General's office.

The motion made by Mr. Grayson, seconded by Ms. Wilson, carried. (See PR 3A at the end of the Minutes.)

## G. Appointment of Dean of the College of Agriculture (PR 5B)

President Wethington stated that PR 5B is a recommendation that Dr. M. Scott Smith be named Dean of the College of Agriculture; Director, Agricultural Experiment Station; and Director, Cooperative Extension Service (pending the customary agreement with the Administrator of the Extension Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture), effective January 1, 2001. President Wethington asked Chancellor Zinser to comment. Dr. Zinser expressed her pleasure in recommending the appointment of M. Scott Smith as the Dean of the College of Agriculture as well as Director of the Agriculture Experiment Station and Director of the Cooperative Extension Service. Chancellor Zinser gave a brief account of Dr. Smith's background as well as the search process for the new dean.

Dr. Mather moved approval of PR 5B. Dr. Mather commented on the commitment of the Search Committee and the support of the faculty of the College of Agriculture on the selection of

Dr. Smith. Ms. Wilson seconded the motion, and it passed. (See PR 5B at the end of the Minutes.)

President Wethington asked for Dr. Smith to stand and be recognized. Dr. Smith received a round of applause from the Board members. Dr. Smith thanked the Board for their support.

Governor Breathitt commended Dean Oral Little for his years of service and commitment to the University of Kentucky. He asked Dean Little to stand and accept a final tribute from the Board of Trustees. Dean Little received a round of applause from the Board members.

## H. <u>A Decade in Review – 1990-2000 (PR 1A)</u>

President Wethington stated that it is his intent to give the Board members a snapshot of some of the key accomplishments of the university, the Board, the administration, the faculty and staff of the University of Kentucky over the past ten years. He noted that he made a similar report to the Board in January of 1996. President Wethington made the following presentation.



President Wethington asked the members to take a closer look at the booklet at their leisure. He expressed his pleasure in making the report and challenged the Board to continue making progress in the year 2001 and thereafter. President Wethington entertained questions from the Board members.

Mr. Reed congratulated President Wethington on the report. He commented that he noted a couple of references to diversity in the report, which he agrees with. He noted that he believes the heart and soul of a university is its faculty and its students. He commented that in the first five years of President Wethington's tenure there was an increase of 43 African American faculty and in the next five years there was an increase of only one. He noted that the University was doing something the first five years that worked very well that doesn't seem to be working now. He stated that at some point, he would like to meet with President Wethington and learn more of what the University community can do, including the Trustees, to improve the recruitment and retention of African American faculty. He summarized that if the University of Kentucky is to become America's next great university, then we will have to find ways to overcome more basic problems of recruitment and retention of African American faculty.

President Wethington responded that he believes the University of Kentucky is a little ahead of some institutions in focusing time, attention, and money on the recruitment of African American faculty; however, he stated that the competition for African American faculty is very intense. He continued by stating that we have attracted African American faculty, have provided a good opportunity for them; however, we have seen them be lured away by other institutions. He noted that we have consistently, over this period of time, provided incentive funds for departments to recruit and attract African American faculty to the university because this is a serious goal of the University of Kentucky. He commented that even though we have made those monies available for the first year salaries of African American faculty members attracted to the University of Kentucky, we have continually lost faculty to other institutions at higher pay. President Wethington stated that we need to constantly work on that as one issue, however we also need to ensure that we are giving attention to the environment on campus. He noted that the Fifty Years of African American Legacy and the inclusive learning community have helped us with. He stated that he firmly believes this is a far better place for all of us now than it was ten years ago. He concluded that these efforts must be constant, but it's difficult to make major headway when the market is as difficult as it is.

## I. Establishment of a Center for Sports Marketing (AACR 1)

Ms. Sparks reported that the Academic Affairs Committee met for the first time earlier in the day and had a very concise and informative meeting. She noted that the Committee had five resolutions for the Board's consideration and approval. She stated that AACR 1 is the establishment of a Center for Sports Marketing. She continued her report by stating that AACR 2 is the establishment of a Center for Historic Architecture Preservation which will focus on creating new knowledge about Kentucky architecture and landscapes for the purpose of their preservation. Ms. Sparks stated that AACR 3 is the establishment of a Center for Micro-Magnetic and Electronic Devices which will bring together, in a formal structure, a core group of faculty with unique research expertise on micro and nano-scale magnetic and electronic device design, fabrication, characterization and application. Ms. Sparks continued with ACCR 4, a new degree program in Exercise Science. She stated that the proposed program is a Ph.D. in Exercise Science within the KHP Department. Ms. Sparks stated that AACR 5 is a new degree program

in Clinical Laboratory Science. She asked Dr. Holsinger to give a few brief remarks concerning the last proposal. Dr. Holsinger commented that over the course of the last five years, the Medical Center has gone through a series of additional degree proposals and this is the last of that group and it will complete our current list of proposed degree programs. He stated that the list includes the creation of the Ph.D. program in Rehabilitation Sciences in the College of Allied Health Professions, the Ph.D. in Gerontology, the Master of Public Health and the Doctor of Public Health degree programs, a doctorate in Nursing Practice, and the Master Degree in Physician Assistant Studies.

Ms. Sparks moved approval of ACCR 1-5. Mr. Grayson seconded the motion, and it passed. (See ACCR 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 at the end of the Minutes.)

# J. Acceptance of Interim Financial Report for the University of Kentucky for the Four Months Ended October 31, 2000 (FCR 1)

Mr. Chellgren reported that the Finance Committee met earlier in the day and has a full agenda for the Board to consider. He stated that FCR 1 is the acceptance of the Interim Financial Report for the University of Kentucky for the Four Months of the Fiscal Year Ended October 31, 2000. He noted that revenues are at 41% of budget with expenses at 33% of budget. He further noted that there were no particular items that need to be brought to the Board's attention in terms of revenues, expenses or the balance sheet. Mr. Chellgren moved the adoption of FCR 1. The motion, seconded by Ms. Wilson, passed. (See FCR 1 at the end of the Minutes.)

## K. <u>Disposal of Surplus Property (FCR 2)</u>

Mr. Chellgren stated that FCR 2 and FCR 3 could be dealt with together. He noted that FCR 2 is a very conventional disposal of surplus properties, which included property from the College of Allied Health that is going with a professor who has accepted a position at the University of Arizona. He also noted that FCR 3 is a very conventional lease, some seventeen months in duration, 4400 square feet of space, with an annual rent of some \$73,309. Mr. Chellgren moved the adoption of FCR 2 and 3. The motion, seconded by Dr. Meriwether, passed. (See FCR 2 and FCR 3 at the end of the Minutes.)

## L. Capital Construction Report (FCR 4)

Mr. Chellgren stated that FCR 4 details the current construction efforts of the University. He commented that the Finance Committee reviewed five of the projects in detail; the progress made on the Seaton Center, the new 301-space parking structure, the Mechanical Engineering building, the Allied Health building, and the early stages of the Bio-Medical Research building. He reported that all of these projects are moving along well, essentially on time and on budget. Mr. Chellgren moved the adoption of FCR 4. The motion, seconded by Dr. Reedy, passed. (See FCR 4 at the end of the Minutes.)

## M. 2000-2001 Budget Revisions (FCR 5)

Mr. Chellgren stated that FCR 5 is the quarterly review of the budget and budget adjustments during the progress of the academic fiscal year. He noted that these revisions are quite small, less than \$700,000 in revenue and expenditures on the general fund and about \$250,000 in income and expenditures on the restricted funds. Mr. Chellgren moved the adoption of FCR 5. His motion, seconded by Dr. Meriwether, passed. (See FCR 5 at the end of the Minutes.)

# N. Funds for the Operation of Kentucky Healthcare Enterprises, Inc. (KHE, INC.) (FCR 6)

Mr. Chellgren stated that in 1995, the Board of Trustees approved the creation of a forprofit corporation by the name of Healthcare Enterprises, Inc. that currently owns and manages fourteen medical practices that have a significant impact on generating patients for the University of Kentucky Medical Center and Hospital. He noted that although this for-profit corporation runs some modest operating losses, it does, in the overall scheme of the Medical Center and Hospital, run a profit. He explained that this is considered a business development expenditure, or patient development expenditure, for the Hospital and the Medical Center. He noted that the acceptance of this resolution would authorize the Hospital to expend \$4.5 million, \$2.5 million, and \$2.3 million in the next three fiscal years to the Healthcare Enterprises, Inc. He further noted that the Board of Directors of the Hospital also supports this recommendation. Mr. Chellgren moved the adoption of FCR 6. The motion, seconded by Dr. Mather, passed. (See FCR 6 at the end of the Minutes.)

Dr. Meriwether commented that the University moved to provide a for-profit institution to buy and/or manage practices. He explained that managed care has taken a different turn and the expected capitation is not taking place and the University has withdrawn from a lot of those areas. He continued by stating that medicine is a business to a certain degree and there's marketing in every business. He noted that we currently have primary care physicians and referring physicians in the community that we can offer services to; and these aren't necessarily black bottom line services that we offer to them, yet they yield a very substantial black bottom line from the stand point of our Medical Center as compared to some of the others in the country. He stated that this is a very conservative figure and the Hospital Board will come back to the Board of Trustees with other marketing ideas with ways to spend money to make money. He noted that it will seem to be a loss on the front end, but when you start to take into account the number of tests, the number of services and the feedback that one gets from patients being sent into the university, then whatever red we have turns to black pretty quick. He commended Frank Butler and Dr. Holsinger on their superb job of managing the facility.

Mr. Williams asked what the totals expenditures are to date. Mr. Butler replied that they are currently at \$24.2 million.

Dr. Meriwether stated that the University of Kentucky has been a participant in CHA for quite some time; however, CHA had to stand up in front of some of these businesses and take a hit for a while on the losses that CHA had. He noted that we are now in the black with CHA and actually making money there. He explained that CHA is a for-profit, insurance company and it's an example of how you get something back from this. He concluded by stating that sometimes it doesn't come in the first year.

#### O. Consent Agenda (FCR 7-25)

Mr. Chellgren stated that the following items would be voted upon as a consent agenda:

- FCR 7 an anonymous gift of \$200,000 and pledge of \$800,000 for the William T. Young Library Endowment to support the library collection for the benefit of research and graduate programs of the University,
- FCR 8 a gift of \$25,000 and a pledge of \$25,000 from Judge Henry Meigs to establish the Class of 1949 Fellowship Endowment in the College of Law,

- FCR 9 a gift of \$5,000 and a pledge of \$43,000 from Frank J. Winchester and gifts of \$2,330 from other individuals to create and endow the James Stephen Brown Graduate Appalachian Studies Fund in the College of Arts and Sciences,
- FCR 10 to establish and endow two professorships in the Department of English in the College of Arts and Sciences from proceeds totaling \$300,000 from a trust established by the late George B. Tuggle,
- FCR 11 a pledge of \$1,000,000 from the Humana Foundation for the William T. Young Library Endowment to support the library collection for the benefit of research and graduate programs of the University,
- FCR 12 a pledge of \$50,000 from Jack W. Graham for the William T. Young Library Endowment to support the library collection for the benefit of research and graduate programs of the University,
- FCR 13 changing the name of an endowment from the Professorship in Obstetrics and Gynecology to the John R. van Nagell, M.D. Professorship/Chair in Gynecologic Oncology and approve setting aside \$55,000 a year for the next five years from the Telford Foundation's annual gift of approximately \$135,000 to the College of Medicine to support the endowment,
- FCR 14 a pledge of \$150,000 from Kentucky River Coal Corporation for the William T. Young Library Endowment to support the library collection for the benefit of research and graduate programs of the University,
- FCR 15 a pledge of \$50,000 from Lion Apparel, Inc. to create and endow a graduate student fellowship in the Department of Interior Design, Merchandising and Textiles in the College of Human Environmental Sciences,
- FCR 16 a pledge of \$100,000 from Morton Holbrook for the William T. Young Library Endowment to support the library collection for the benefit of research and graduate programs of the University,
- FCR 17 a gift of \$100,000 and a pledge of \$150,000 from Mrs. W. L. Lyons Brown for the William T. Young Library Endowment to support the library collection for the benefit of research and graduate programs of the University,
- FCR 18 gifts totaling \$45,500 from Peter Perlman, his friends and colleagues and a pledge of \$4,500 from R. Scott Madden to create and endow the Peter Perlman Fellowship in the College of Law,
- FCR 19 a pledge of \$50,000 from the Paducah Junior College, Inc., Board of Trustees to create and endow a professorship at the College of Engineering's Extended Campus Program in Paducah,

FCR 25 – a gift of \$50,000 from Dr. William A. and Anne T. Withington and pledges of \$18,510 from friends of the Withington's to establish and endow the Dr. William A. and Anne T. Withington Graduate Student Support Fund in Geography in the Department of Geography in the College of Arts and Sciences.

Mr. Chellgren moved the adoption of FCR items 7-25. The motion, seconded by Mr. Glenn, carried. (See FCR 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24 and 25 at the end of the Minutes.)

P. Resolution of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky ("State Agency") Approving a Financing/Lease Agreement Among the State Agency, the Kentucky Asset/Liability Commission, the Commonwealth of Kentucky State Property and Buildings Commission and the Finance and Administration Cabinet of the Commonwealth of Kentucky for the Purpose of Providing Interim Financing for an Authorized Project in Anticipation of the Issuance of Bonds to Provide Permanent Financing for Said Project (FCR 26)

Mr. Chellgren stated that FCR 26 is the first phase of the enabling resolutions to provide long-term bond financing for four capital projects, the Aging Allied Health Building, the Crisp Building replacement, the Center for Rural Health, and the Biomedical Sciences Research Building. He noted that this resolution permits the university to provide interim financing for these building projects. Mr. Chellgren moved the adoption of FCR 26. The motion, seconded by Mr. Guthrie, passed. (See FCR 26at the end of the Minutes.)

Q. Resolution of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky Accepting the Successful Bid for the Purchase of \$10,450,000 Principal Amount of University of Kentucky Housing and Dining System Revenue Bonds, Series R, Dated December 1, 2000 (FCR 27)

Mr. Chellgren stated that FCR 27 is the approval of the sale of \$10.45 million of University of Kentucky Housing and Dining System Revenue Bonds, Series R, at a net interest cost of some 5.0974%. He noted that these were subject to bids with ten competitive bidders. Mr. Chellgren moved the adoption of FCR 27 to authorize the university to accept the successful bid of Paine Webber, Inc. with reference to these bonds. The motion, seconded by Ms. Wilson, passed. (See FCR 27 at the end of the Minutes.)

#### R. Investment Committee Report

Mr. Grayson reported that during the quarter of June 30, 2000 through September 30, 2000, the University had approximately \$400 million in the portfolio. The portfolio had a growth of about \$16 million with \$13 million from actual gifts and \$3 million from investments. He noted that during the change in investment managers, the funds were put in an overnight fund and were not in the market. Due to this and the interest earned on the money, the University gained some \$1 million in its portfolio. He reiterated the committee's confidence in the investment managers despite the current market trends.

## S. <u>Presidential Search Committee Report</u>

Ms. Wickliffe asked if there were any Board members that did not have a copy of the report of the town meetings.

Dr. Stumbo moved that the Board of Trustees go into closed sessions to discuss matters which might lead to the appointment of an individual as President of the University of Kentucky. He stated that the reason for closing the meeting is to allow full discussion and to protect the privacy interests of persons being discussed. He further explained that the Kentucky revised statute section 61.810 (1) (f) authorizes the closing of the meeting and that the intent of his motion for a closed session is to provide an opportunity for the Chair of the Presidential Search Committee to brief members of the Board of Trustees on specifics relating to potential presidential candidates and to protect the privacy interests of these persons relative to details that might otherwise make known their candidacy. Mr. Guthrie seconded the motion. The motion carried. The Board thereupon went into closed session.

## T. Regular Session Resumed

Mr. Miles called the Board back into session. He reported that during the closed session the Board received a report on the qualities and attributes of individuals whose candidacy and potential candidacy for the position of President is under consideration by the Committee. He added that no formal action was taken, nor were any specific recommendations or motions formulated to place before the Board of Trustees at this time.

#### U. Other Business

## Mr. Glenn made the following statement:

I wanted to take a moment to explain the issues between myself and the Student Senate. First, I am not guilty of the charges brought against me by certain senators. And I do not believe the charges brought against me are serious enough to justify my removal as President. I intend to appeal the decision of the Senate, and I intend to defend my actions at any future hearing or trail before the Senate. I was not prepared to fully defend myself at the recent meeting due to lack of notice and chose not to present an unprepared defense. Since, one of the charges brought against me involved my duties as a member of this Board, I might be forced to appeal any improper attempt to remove me from office to this Board.

Ms. Wickliffe made the following statement regarding the Presidential Search Committee.

On behalf of the Presidential Search Committee, I am pleased to report to the members of the Board of Trustees that the committee has made substantial progress in carrying out it's charge. The search process has produced a pool of some 175 to 180 individuals for the position of President. These include individuals who applied, others who were nominated for the position, and individuals identified as potential candidates by the executive search firm of A.T. Kearney. Following the conclusion of statewide town meetings, the committee finalized the profile and desired attributes and qualities of presidential candidates. During the

past four months, small groups from the committee have conducted initial conservations with approximately 23 potential candidates to determine their ongoing interests in the position and the University's interest in having them as declared candidates. Most of the persons currently hold positions as President, Provost, or Senior Vice President at major research universities around the nation. Follow-up conversations have also occurred with a smaller subset of the 23 individuals mentioned above as part of the process of identifying a reduced group of semi-finalists for the position. The Search Committee has been delighted with the quality of potential candidates and in the interest that has been shown in this position. It speaks well of the stature of the University of Kentucky that such a large pool of highly qualified individuals is willing to be considered for the Presidency. The committee is now prepared to enter into the final phase of its activities. This will involve the identification of a group of finalists to be followed by the selection of the most highly qualified person or persons to present to the Board of Trustees for its consideration. At this point, we are unable to present a definite timetable, but it appears likely that the committee will be able to make a recommendation prior to it's target date of March 2001. Because of the conditions of confidentiality requested by potential candidates for this position, I am unable to provide you with specific details about their attributes and experience since greater specificity could lead to a breech of confidence with these persons with particulars of their qualifications specific enough for to lead to their being identified at this time.

Dr. Mather reminded the Board members of the University Senate Council's Annual Holiday Party and invited them all to stop by following the meeting.

## V. Meeting Adjourned

There being no further business to come before the Board, the Chairperson adjourned the meeting at 5:17 p.m.

## 1. <u>'UK's Promise' Offers Services for Area's Youth</u>

President Charles T. Wethington Jr. unveiled "UK's Promise" in late November, announcing the university's commitment to promote character development in young people in the Lexington area and other parts of the state. Several UK colleges, departments and units already have launched programs providing mentoring and other services to young people. UK is the second-largest land grant university to partner with the nationwide program "America's Promise: The Alliance for Youth" directed by retired General Colin Powell.

## 2. <u>College of Agriculture Dedicates Beef Unit at Animal Research Farm</u>

UK officials dedicated a new cutting-edge beef research unit at its Animal Research Center on the former Pin Oak Farm near Versailles in late November. The 700-acre unit features research pastures, a surgical suite, metabolism study rooms, 48 pens that each accommodate four to six animals, a computerized feeding system, a nutrition center and an innovative waste management facility that will facilitate research about nutrient management from animal waste. An education center will be used for field days and instructional activities. Beef cattle production has overtaken tobacco and become second only to thoroughbred horses in farm cash receipts, contributing nearly \$2 billion annually to the state's economy.

## 3. Panel Convenes Conference on Research Universities in New Economy

A special committee established by UK Board of Trustees Chair Billy Joe Miles brought together leaders of government, higher education and business in late October to discuss the role of the research university in the New Economy. Among the speakers were state Budget Secretary James Ramsey and Michael Crow, vice provost at Columbia University, who urged universities to be more flexible in establishing partnerships and licensing relationships with the private sector for products and inventions created as a result of research.

## 4. UK Chandler Medical Center Announces Major Women's Health Initiative

The UK Chandler Medical Center is formalizing a major initiative to tackle women's health issues in Kentucky and the nation by establishing a Women's Health Center and performing several major research projects funded by four grants totaling more than \$15 million over the next five years. The initiative addresses women's health issues through research, clinical, service, educational and leadership efforts.

## 5. UK Partners With Louisville's Central High to Advance Academics

UK officials signed 55 specific partnership agreements with Louisville's Central High Magnet Career Academy early this month to enhance the school's ability to prepare students for careers in banking and business, computer technology, legal and governmental services and other fields. Students at the magnet school regularly record outstanding scores on state achievement tests and are highly motivated to attend college.

## 6. Study Finds Outstanding Research from Gatton College Finance Graduates

Graduates from the doctoral program in Finance at the University of Kentucky Carol Martin Gatton College of Business and Economics are among the most published scholars of finance in the country, according to a study conducted in 1999 by researchers at Cleveland State University and Concordia University (Montreal). The study measured the research productivity of recent graduates of 74 finance doctoral programs during their early years as faculty members and ranked the Gatton College's Finance program ninth. The UK program's graduates have better publishing records than those from programs at Stanford, Michigan, Ohio State, Harvard, Northwestern, MIT and New York University.

## 7. <u>UK Center for Rural Health Receives Major Grant</u>

The federal government has awarded \$800,000 to the UK Center for Rural Health and two community health networks in Perry and Harlan counties to improve health care for people with little or no insurance. The pilot project, the Southeast Kentucky Community Access Program (SKYCAP), could eventually qualify for millions more in federal funding over the next five years. The center will work with Hazard/Perry County Community Ministries and Harlan Countians for a Healthier Community to prevent and manage common, chronic diseases such as diabetes, asthma and heart disease.

## 8. <u>College of Education Honors 70 'Teachers Who Made A Difference'</u>

The UK College of Education paid tribute to 70 teachers in the William T. Young Library auditorium in late November during its third annual celebration of "Teachers Who Made a Difference." Of the teachers nominated, 21 were current or former UK professors representing several of the university's colleges. UK Board of Trustees member Marian Sims was among the nominees.

## 9. Ecology, Evolution and Behavior Program Ranks Among Nation's Best

The UK Ecology, Evolution and Behavior Program in the Department of Biological Sciences was ranked 14<sup>th</sup> among the nation's 86 programs, according to findings by Vanderbilt University professor Hugh David Graham and Nancy Diamond. Graham and Diamond base their rankings on the number of citations a program's faculty receive in the research work of other universities' researchers.

## 10. Twenty-One Medical Researchers Receive Wethington Awards

The UK College of Medicine has presented 21 researchers with the first Charles T. Wethington, Jr. Research Excellence Awards. These awards, funded by the College of Medicine, recognize exemplary efforts in College of Medicine faculty research and encourage research productivity that could move the University toward top-20 status among public institutions. Each researcher receives \$20,000 with the award. The recipients are listed in Significant Activities of Faculty and Staff.

## 11. <u>UK Researcher Discovers New Protein on Leukemia Stem Cells</u>

A research team led by Craig Jordan, Internal Medicine and the UK Markey Cancer Center, has discovered a protein, called CD123, on the surface of leukemia stem cells. Because the CD123 protein is not found on normal stem cells, this research opens up the possibility of designing drugs to attack only the leukemia stem cells and leave normal stem cells untouched. The results of the research were published in the October issue of the journal *Leukemia*.

# 12. UK Study Finds Creatine Protects Against Traumatic Brain Injury

Creatine, a food supplement frequently used by professional and amateur athletes, may prevent brain damage following traumatic brain injury, according to a new research study led by Stephen Scheff, UK Sanders-Brown Center on Aging and Anatomy and Neurobiology. The study was published in the November issue of *Annals of Neurology*.

## 13. Geological Survey Releases Atlas of Kentucky's Coal Resources

The Kentucky Geological Survey has released a digital coal atlas that offers detailed maps and charts of the state's original and remaining coal resources in eastern and western Kentucky. The atlas was completed as part of a national program to assess remaining coal resources available for mining.

## 14. Georgetown College Students Will Take Graduate Courses at UK

UK officials finalized an agreement with Georgetown College to permit seniors at the college to pursue graduate degrees in public administration at UK while they complete their undergraduate work. Credits earned in the UK Martin School of Public Policy and Administration graduate program will be applied toward the students' baccalaureate studies at Georgetown. The program was proposed by former U.S. Senator Wendell Ford, a teaching fellow in the Martin School, and former Governor Martha Layne Collins, Executive Scholar in Residence at Georgetown

## 15. UK Offers 'Sample' of Graduate School With G.I.F.T. Program

Any college or university graduate now has the chance to take one three-credit-hour, non-degree graduate course during the spring semester free of charge under the UK Graduate School's new Graduate Incentive Free Tuition (G.I.F.T.) program. The spring pilot program is intended to appeal to persons who have been considering graduate education but have been hesitant about returning to school.

## 16. LCC Partners With UPS to Provide Classes

Lexington Community College has partnered with United Parcel Service (UPS) and two other local colleges to launch the Delivering College at Work program. LCC is providing onsite accelerated college credit courses to employees of the Lexington UPS headquarters, with a long-term goal of providing UPS employees the opportunity to earn a college degree while continuing to work.

## 17. LCC Team Selected to Design Lexington Legends Retail Store

The Lexington Community College chapter of Students in Free Enterprise was selected to design and implement the complete retail-merchandising plan for the new Lexington Legends minor-league baseball team's retail store. Under the direction of Faculty Advisor Virginia Fairchild, the national award-winning LCC chapter established the store in Turfland Mall in late October.

## 18. Transportation Center Will Assist Russians with Bridge Research

The Kentucky Transportation Center and the Federal Highway Administration will establish a working relationship between the state of Kentucky and the Russian state of Perm to improve bridges in that nation. This work is part of an ongoing effort to share technology with Russia.

## 19. IHDI Joins Fifth-Third Bank on Assistive Technology Loan Program

UK's Interdisciplinary Human Development Institute is providing project management and operational support for a program that makes available low-interest loans to individuals with disabilities who need assistive technology. Assistive technology is defined as items, equipment and devices such as hearing aids, computers, augmentative communication devices, wheelchair ramps and van lifts that improve a person's independence and quality of life.

## 20. Conference Discusses Future of Kentucky's Families, Children

Educators, community service workers and government officials reviewed child and family research and how it can impact their work and the lives of thousands of people at the first "Children and Families Conference: Bridging Research and Practice," sponsored by the colleges of Human Environmental Sciences and Social Work earlier this month.

## 21. College of Education. Athletics Launch 'Books For Children'

The UK College of Education Coalition of Student Organizations and the University of Kentucky Athletics Department have partnered to launch "Books for Children." The program collects new books and provides them to various local agencies to distribute to underprivileged children.

## 22. Constitutional-Change Advocate Wins National Attention

UK journalism Professor Richard Labunski, who recently published *The Second Constitutional Convention: How the American People Can Take Back Their Government*, received national attention before and after the November election for his advocacy of an amendment to eliminate the Electoral College. He has been interviewed by *USA Today*, *Newsday*, the *San Francisco Chronicle* and the *Atlanta Journal Constitution* and has been a guest on numerous radio and television shows throughout the country.

## 23. Student Honors

<u>Suzie Allard</u>, Communications and Information Studies, was awarded a Mensa Education and Research Foundation Scholarship for the 2000-2001 academic year.

<u>Chandra K. Arts</u>, Communications and Information Studies, received the 2000 Mary A. Gardner Graduate Student Research Award at the Association for Education in Journalism and Mass Communication Conference in August.

<u>Vincent Blanch</u>, Medicine, has been named chair of student affairs for the Southern Region of the Organization of Student Representatives to the Association of American Medical Colleges.

### PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE GOVERNING REGULATIONS

<u>Recommendation</u>: that the following proposed amendment to Part X.A. of the <u>Governing Regulations</u> be received for preliminary consideration and at the next regular meeting of the Board of Trustees be included on the agenda for action.

Note: Proposed additions are underlined; proposed deletions are lined through.

Members of the Board of Trustees, except those elected to the Board as faculty, representatives staff, or as a student representatives, and relatives by blood or marriage of any member of the Board of Trustees are ineligible for appointment to any position in employment at the University. "Relatives", as used above, include parents and children, husbands and wives, brothers and sisters, brothers and sisters in-law, mothers and fathers-in-law, uncles, aunts, nieces and nephews, sons and daughters-in-law, and step-relatives in the same relationships. Employment includes regular and temporary full and part-time employment, including student work-study and graduate assistant programs.

No relative by blood or marriage of the President shall be employed in a position at the University. Similarly, no relative of a chancellor/vice president or any vice chancellor in a sector shall be employed in a position in that sector or Central Administration, as appropriate. Waiver of the above regulation may be permitted by the Board of Trustees on a stated temporary basis, not to exceed two years, when it is otherwise impossible practicably to fill a position with a fully qualified person. The same individual shall not be eligible for reappointment under the terms of this exception unless approval is given by the Board of Trustees. No relative by blood or marriage of any administrative officer of the University, or of any member of the University faculty, may be appointed to any position in the University over which the related officer or staff member exercises supervisory or line authority. Employment of persons related by blood or marriage-relatives within the same department or division shall be approved specifically by the chancellor/vice president in a sector or Central Administration, as appropriate. "Relatives-by blood or marriage," as used above, include parents and children, husbands and wives, brothers and sisters, brothers- and sisters-in-law, mothers- and fathers-in-law, uncles, aunts, nieces and nephews, sons- and daughters-in-law, and step-relatives in the same relationships. employment of relatives by blood or marriage of University employees, as described in this

paragraph, whose relationship was not a violation of this section of the Governing Regulations prior to its amendment on April 10, 1984, does not constitute a violation of the amended policy provided the relatives are regular employees of the University and remain in the University employment positions which they held on April 10, 1984. However, the transfer of any such employees described in this paragraph (whose employment relationship was not a violation of policy prior to its amendment on April 10, 1984) to any other regular University position shall require approval of the President.

Background: KRS 164.225(as amended in 1992) prohibits relatives of any board member from being employed by the University of Kentucky. An Opinion of the Attorney General, dated August 8, 1997, clarifies this anti-nepotism statute (copy enclosed). Part X.A. of the Governing Regulations currently includes an effective date for the implementation of the previous anti-nepotism statute, which in effect exempts those individuals employed prior to April 10, 1984. This proposed change in Part X.A. removes any exemption for relatives of Board members, but leaves the exemption in place for relatives of administrators and faculty and for relatives employed within the same department or division. Faculty, staff, and student members of the Board of Trustees will be elected during the 2000-2001 academic year. This proposed change ensures that the University's Governing Regulations are consistent with state law prior to these elections.

Subject: Anti-nepotism statute applicable to regents of state universities

Requested by: John G. Irvin Jr., counsel for Morehead State University; Elizabeth M. Brincoe, counsel for Northern Kentucky University

Written by: Ross T. Carter

Syllabus: Anti-nepotism statute prohibits employment of relatives of university regents; there are no exemptions for appointed regents, part-time employees, or student workers

Statutes construed: KRS 164.360(2); KRS 164.001; KRS 164.020(10); KRS 164.225; KRS 164.830(1)(a)

### Opinion of the Attorney General

We have been asked to construe that part of KRS 164.360(2) which establishes limits on a state university's employment of persons who have a relative on the board of regents. The specific questions presented to us are:

Does the 1992 amendment to the statute apply to persons enrolled before the effective date of the legislation?

Does the statute apply to appointed as well as elected regents?

Does the statute apply to part-time as well as full-time employees?

Does the statute apply to students enrolled in work-study and graduate assistant programs?

It is our opinion that the statute should be construed exactly as written with no implied exemptions. Therefore the answer to all four questions is yes.

### 1. Background

Following a controversial appointment to the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees, the General Assembly in 1992 enacted sweeping changes to the provisions in KRS chapter 164 dealing with the governing bodies of state universities. Ky Acts 1992, c 10. The statute we are examining, KRS 164.360, was amended as part of this reform legislation.

KRS chapter 164 deals with three groups or categories of state universities: the University of Kentucky, which is governed by a board of trustees; the University of Louisville, which is also governed by a board of trustees; and the remaining state universities, each of which is governed by a board of regents. The statute that we are examining, KRS 164.360(2), applies to the third group. Before the 1992 amendment, the statute read as follows:

No person shall be employed for a longer period than four (4) years. No person shall be employed who is related to any member of the board of regents as father, mother, brother, sister, husband, wife, son, daughter, aunt, uncle, sister-in-law, brother-in-law, son-in-law or daughter-in-law; except that upon

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written recommendation of the president of the university or college, one (1) such relative of each member of the board of regents may be appointed by the other three (3) appointed members.

The current version of the statute reads as follows:

No person shall be employed for a longer period than four (4) years. No person shall be employed at an institution where his relative serves on the board of regents for that institution.

"Relative" is defined in KRS 164.001 (enacted as part of the 1992 legislation) as "a person's father, mother, brother, sister, husband, wife, son, daughter, aunt, uncle, son-in-law, or daughter-in-law."

### 2. 1992 changes to anti-nepotism statutes

The act containing the 1992 amendment to KRS 164.360(2) made four changes regarding nepotism at state universities. For the University of Kentucky and the University of Louisville, the following language was added: "No relative of a board of trustee member shall be employed by the university." KRS 164.225; KRS 164.830(1)(a). For the Council on Higher Education, similar language was added: "No relative of a Council on Higher Education member shall be employed by the agency." KRS 164.020(10).

The amended language applicable to boards of regents differs from the pattern established in the other three statutes; it says, "No person shall be employed at an institution where his relative serves on the board of regents for that institution." This difference, in conjunction with the definition of relative in KRS 164.001, creates a peculiar lack of uniformity among state universities. "Relative" includes uncles and aunts but not nephews and nieces. It includes sons-in-law and daughters-in-law but not fathers-in-law and mothers-in-law. This means that the relatives of a nephew include his uncles, but the relatives of an uncle do not include his nephews. For the University of Kentucky, the University of Louisville, and the Council on Higher Education, the statutes refer to the *trustee's* (or member's) relatives; for the other universities, the statute refers to the *employee's* relatives. Thus, at the University of Kentucky, a trustee's nephew can be employed by the university but his uncle cannot; at Kentucky State University a regent's uncle can be employed by the university but his nephew cannot.

We do not know whether this distinction was intentional, but we are confident that the various amendments made in 1992 reveal an overall strengthening of anti-nepotism provisions applicable to state universities. To apply a loose construction to the statutes is to ignore the tenor of the 1992 legislation.

### 3. Analysis

There is only one cardinal rule of statutory construction: statutes must be construed to give effect to the intention of the legislature as expressed in the words of the legislation. *Kentucky Association of Chiropractors, Inc. v Jefferson County Medical Society,* Ky, 549 SW 2d 817 (1977). There are many other rules, any of which might be invoked to yield a particular result, but none of them applies when the words of the statute yield a plainly comprehensible meaning. *Gateway Construction Company v Wallbaum,* Ky, 356 SW 2d 247 (1961).

With this principle in mind, we examine the questions presented to us. All four questions propose the existence of a limitation or exemption in the statute, despite the lack of any statutory language supporting such a proposition. The first question is whether the statute applies to persons who were validly employed under the previous version of the statute; the second is whether the statute applies to appointed as well as elected regents; the third is whether the statute applies to part-time employees; and the fourth is whether the statute applies to work-study and graduate assistant programs. Our answer to each question is the same: there is nothing in the statute to suggest that the General Assembly intended such exemptions, and we will not infer them. We see no reason to construe the statute to mean anything other than what it says.

The only legal argument presented to us is in reference to the question whether the statute grandfathers in those who

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were employed before the amendment's effective date. It is suggested that the word *shall* denotes futurity, so that the phrase "no person shall be employed" refers only to persons hired in the future, effectively exempting those hired in the past.

It is true that the word *shall* sometimes expresses futurity; however, that is not the meaning usually ascribed to the word in statutes, and in any event the use of *shall* to express futurity is readily apparent from its context. For example, the following sentence appears in the Constitution of the United States:

No Senator or Representative shall, during the Time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil Office under the Authority of the United States, which shall have been created, or the Emoluments whereof shall have been increased during such time; and no Person holding any Office under the United States, shall be a Member of either House during his Continuance in Office.

US Const, Art 1, § 6, cl 2. Here the word *shall* is used in both senses: to express command and to denote futurity. The context makes it clear that "shall be appointed" and "shall be a Member" express commands while "shall have been created" and "shall have been increased" denote futurity.

Nothing in the context of the statute we are construing suggests that *shall* is used to denote futurity. We reject the suggestion that the word *shall* as used in KRS 164.360(2) creates an implicit grandfather clause.

### 4. Conclusion

KRS 164.360(2) must be construed to mean strictly what it says. It contains no exemptions of any kind.

Scott Smith be named Dean of the College of Agriculture; Director, Agricultural Experiment Station; and Director, Cooperative Extension Service (pending the customary agreement with the Administrator of the Extension Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture), effective January 1, 2001.

<u>Background</u>: Following Dr. C. Oran Little's announcement of his intention to retire as Dean of the College of Agriculture, a national search was begun in the Summer of 2000. The search led to an outstanding pool of candidates. Four finalists visited the campus during October and November 2000. Dr. Smith was chosen to join our University community in this important role.

Dr. Smith is currently Associate Dean for Research, Associate Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station at the University of Kentucky and Professor of Agronomy. Prior to assuming this position in 1999, Dr. Smith served as Chair of the Department of Agronomy at the University of Kentucky for 10 years. He received his B.A. in Biology from Cornell University, a M.S. in Soil Biochemistry from Cornell University and a Ph.D. in Soil Microbiology from Michigan State University.

Dr. Smith is a recipient of several awards and recognitions, including election as a Fellow of the American Society of Agronomy (1990) and selection as technical editor of the Journal of the Soil Science Society of America. Dr. Smith is Chair-Elect of the Southern Association of Agricultural Experiment Station Directors; has served as Division Chair of the Soil Science Society of America; and has been Panel Manager for a Fund for Rural America program. Dr. Smith has published nearly 60 articles and book chapters; has over 50 published abstracts from scientific meetings and over 20 additional publications.

The University is fortunate to attract a person so well qualified as Dr. Smith to provide this important leadership for the College of Agriculture.

### ESTABLISHMENT OF A CENTER FOR MICRO-MAGNETIC AND ELECTRONIC DEVICES

#### NEW DEGREE PROGRAM IN EXERCISE SCIENCE

<u>Recommendation</u>: that the Board of Trustees approve the Ph.D. program in Exercise Science.

Background: The proposed program is a Ph.D. in Exercise Science within the Kinesiology and Health Promotion Department (KHP). The KHP Department currently offers an Ed.D. degree with an Exercise Science option which allows students to specialize in biomechanics or exercise physiology. These degrees are science-based disciplines, while the Ed.D. suggests a degree based more on educational theory. The American Society of Biomechanics has 547 non-student members, of which 454 hold the Ph.D. while only 3 hold the Ed.D. degree. The most recognized organization of Exercise Science, the American College of Sports Medicine, has 2276 members who list the Ph.D. as their highest degree and 230 that list the Ed.D. degree. Since most people in this field hold the Ph.D. degree, UK graduates are at a disadvantage when applying for jobs, in spite of their qualifications, and many new students look for programs offering the Ph.D. degree. This proposal allows for a transition from an Ed.D. to a Ph.D. degree. Since the curricula for biomechanics and exercise physiology have been in place for many years, this proposal brings the degree in line with the curriculum and the profession.

The Ed.D. degree program will be retained without the Exercise Science option. The health promotion, physical education, teaching/coaching; and sports management areas of specialization will be available for students in the Ed.D. program.

The proposed program is supported by the Chancellor of the Lexington Campus and was approved by the University Senate. Approval by the Board of Trustees is required prior to submission to the Council on Postsecondary Education for registry in the Council's Registry of Degree Programs.

#### NEW DEGREE PROGRAMS IN CLINICAL LABORATORY SCIENCE

<u>Background:</u> The masters and doctoral programs in Clinical Laboratory Sciences are designed to provide a core curriculum and specialized training in hematology/transplantation science and reproductive laboratory science. ### FUNDS FOR THE OPERATION OF KENTUCKY HEALTHCARE ENTERPRISES, INC. (KHE, INC.)

<u>Recommendation:</u> that the Board of Trustees authorize the expenditure of funds from the University Hospital in the amounts of \$4.5 million, \$2.5 million, and \$2.3 million this fiscal year, and the next two years respectively, to provide funds for the operation of Kentucky Healthcare Enterprises, Inc. (KHE, Inc.).

Background: At its meeting of December 12, 1995 the Board of Trustees authorized the formation of a corporation that would have the power to acquire physician and other medical practice/provider sites, and to provide management services to medical practice/provider sites to broaden the Medical Center's network of Physicians who will be available for teaching, research, and service. Health Associates of Kentucky, Inc., a primary care development company owned by KHE, Inc., has engaged in acquisition, partnering, management and development of physician practices.

Currently, Health Associates operates and/or manages 14 practices. These practices provide urgent treatment, pediatric care, primary care, occupational medicine, and ancillary services to thousands of patients annually. In FY-2000 the various clinics had 252,910 patient encounters. These clinics, although operated on a stand alone basis, are a critical factor in the Medical Center's ability to serve an ever widening array of patients.

The current funding request will provide funds for the ongoing operational support of the clinics, as well as funds for capital items and operational enhancement initiatives. Losses in the Health Associates clinics have been significantly reduced; however, on a stand alone basis, Health Associates does not generate a profit and may not do so in the future. However, the continued funding of the clinics is financially feasible because the clinic operation, consolidated with the revenue from services rendered in the Medical Center to Health Associate patients, is positive. The total venture generates a positive return on our investment, while significantly expanding the patient base we serve.

#### GIFTS AND PLEDGES TO THE WENDELL H. FORD PROFESSORSHIP IN PUBLIC POLICY

<u>Recommendation</u>: that the Board of Trustees accept gifts of \$76,660 and pledges of \$213,750 to the Wendell H. Ford Professorship in Public Policy in the University's James W. #### RESOLUTION

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY ("STATE AGENCY") APPROVING A FINANCING/LEASE AGREEMENT AMONG THE STATE AGENCY, THE KENTUCKY ASSET/LIABILITY COMMISSION, THE COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY STATE PROPERTY AND BUILDINGS COMMISSION AND THE FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION CABINET OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY FOR THE PURPOSE OF PROVIDING INTERIM FINANCING FOR AN AUTHORIZED PROJECT IN ANTICIPATION OF THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS TO PROVIDE PERMANENT FINANCING FOR SAID PROJECT.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 56.860 et seq. of the Kentucky Revised Statutes (the "Act"), the Kentucky Asset/Liability Commission (the "Commission") was created and exists as an independent agency and constituted authority of the Commonwealth of Kentucky (the "Commonwealth") and is authorized to issue Project Notes, as defined in the Act, at the request of the Cabinet, as defined in the Act, to provide interim financing for Authorized Projects, as defined in the Act, in anticipation of the issuance of bonds; and

WHEREAS, the General Assembly pursuant to H.B. 321 of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, 1998 Regular Session, H.B. 502 of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, 2000 Regular Session (collectively the "Budget Act") authorized certain expenditures in certain amounts for the hereinafter described Project to be financed with bonds, which Project constitutes an Authorized Project, as defined in the Act; and

WHEREAS, the Finance and Administration Cabinet (the "Cabinet") has applied to the State Property and Buildings Commission ("SPBC") for the issuance of bonds (the "Bonds") on behalf of the Cabinet and various other State Agencies to provide permanent financing for the Projects and has requested, in accordance with the Act, that the Commission issue and sell Project Notes to provide funds for the Projects in anticipation of the issuance of the Bonds; and

WHEREAS, the SPBC has determined, based on such request and the authorizations set forth in the Budget Act, to issue its revenue bonds for the Projects, and in anticipation thereof and based upon the request of the Cabinet and the SPBC, the Commission has determined to provide interim financing for the Projects through the issuance of its Project Notes, 2000 Agency Fund Series (the "Notes");

WHEREAS, the State Agency wishes to authorize the Financing/Lease Agreement (the "Financing Agreement") among the State Agency, the Commission, the SPBC and the Cabinet to provide interim financing for the Project as evidence of its commitment to issue the Bonds, which Bonds constitute the Bonds described in the Financing Agreement.

NOW THEREFORE, it is hereby resolved and ordered by the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky as follows:

Section 1. <u>Determinations</u>. The State Agency hereby finds and determines that (a) it hereby ratifies and affirms its request that the Commission issue the Notes in anticipation of the issuance of the Bonds, for the purpose of paying the costs of the Project; (b) it is necessary to execute and deliver the Financing Agreement in order to provide for a source of payment for the Notes and Bonds; and (c) approval of the Project described in the Financing Agreement is hereby ratified and confirmed.

Section 2. <u>The Financing Agreement and Other Documents</u>. As evidence of its obligations in this Resolution, the Chairman is hereby authorized to execute, acknowledge and deliver, on behalf of the State Agency, the Financing Agreement, in substantially the form submitted to the State Agency, which is hereby

approved, with such changes therein not inconsistent with this Resolution and not substantially adverse to the State Agency as may be permitted by the Act and approved by such officer. The approval of such changes by such officer, and that such changes are not substantially adverse to the State Agency, shall be conclusively evidenced by the execution of the Financing Agreement by such officer. The Chairman and Secretary are hereby separately authorized to take any and all actions and to execute such other instruments that may be necessary or appropriate in the opinion of Peck, Shaffer & Williams LLP, as bond counsel for the Notes, in order to effect the issuance of the Notes and the intent of this Resolution.

Section 3. <u>Effective Date</u>. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

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THIS FINANCING/LEASE AGREEMENT, made and entered into as of the date shown on the cover page hereto, by and among the KENTUCKY ASSET/LIABILITY COMMISSION (hereinafter sometimes referred to as the "Commission"), the FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION CABINET OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY, a department and agency of the Commonwealth of Kentucky (hereinafter sometimes referred to as the "Cabinet"), the COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY STATE PROPERTY AND BUILDINGS COMMISSION ("SPBC") and the STATE AGENCY identified on the cover page hereto (the "State Agency").

#### WITNESSETH

THAT WHEREAS, the State Agency identified on the cover to this Financing Agreement constitutes a "State Agency" within the meaning and application of Sections 56.440, et seq., of the Kentucky Revised Statutes and the Finance and Administration Cabinet of the Commonwealth of Kentucky constitutes the "Cabinet" within the meaning of Section 56.8605 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes; and

WHEREAS, the Cabinet is authorized pursuant to the Act, as hereinafter defined, to take, acquire and hold property, the SPBC is authorized, pursuant to the Act to issue and sell revenue bonds on behalf of any State Agency, and the State Agency, to the extent described herein, is authorized to issue and sell revenue bonds, and the Commission is authorized to issue Project Notes, as defined in the Act, in anticipation of the issuance of such bonds in order to provide interim financing for projects and to carry out proper public purposes; and

WHEREAS, (i) the Cabinet and the State Agency, as applicable, have made appropriate application to the SPBC requesting the SPBC to provide for payment of the costs of the Project, hereinafter defined, pursuant to KRS 56.450 by the issuance of revenue bonds pursuant to the Act or (ii) the State Agency has determined to issue revenue bonds, as further described herein, and the SPBC or the State Agency, as applicable, has requested and authorized the Commission to issue Project Notes for the Project in anticipation of the issuance of such bonds; and

WHEREAS, to the extent applicable and as required by law, the Project has been approved by the SPBC and the SPBC has determined to issue revenue bonds for the Project, it being understood that the State Agency will enter into this Financing/Lease Agreement to provide (i) revenues for amortization of such Project Notes, (ii) for the issuance of the Bonds for the payment of the Project Notes which have not been amortized, (iii) for the transfer of the Project to the SPBC upon the issuance of Bonds by the SPBC; (iv) for the leasing of the Project by the State Agency from the SPBC, if applicable, to provide revenues for amortization of the Bonds, and (v) interim financing for the Project by issuance of the Project Notes by the Commission; and

WHEREAS, in order to provide revenues to reimburse the SPBC, if applicable, and the Commission for its commitment to amortize such bonds and notes, respectively, which are to be issued for purposes of providing funds for acquisition of the Project, it is necessary and appropriate that a Financing/Lease Agreement in respect of the Project be entered into by and between the Commission, the SPBC, the State Agency and the Cabinet;

NOW, THEREFORE, PURSUANT TO THE STATUTORY AUTHORITY CITED IN THE PREAMBLES TO THIS FINANCING/LEASE AGREEMENT, AND FOR OTHER GOOD AND VALUABLE CONSIDERATIONS, THE RECEIPT OF WHICH IS HEREBY ACKNOWLEDGED BY BOTH PARTIES, AND IN FURTHER CONSIDERATION OF THE PREMISES, THE COMMISSION, THE SPBC, THE STATE AGENCY AND THE CABINET DO HEREBY COVENANT AND AGREE, EACH WITH THE OTHER, AS FOLLOWS:

#### ARTICLE I

#### **DEFINITIONS**

Section 1.01. As used in this Financing/Lease Agreement, unless the context requires otherwise:

"Act" means collectively, (i) Section 56.860, et. seq. of the Kentucky Revised Statues, (ii) Section 56.440, et. seq. of the Kentucky Revised Statutes and (iii) Sections 58.010 to 58.140, inclusive, of the Kentucky Revised Statutes.

"Additional Payments" means additional payments as set forth in Section 5.06 hereof.

"Additional Rent" means additional rent as set forth in Section 5.06 hereof.

"Application" means that certain written instrument tendered to the SPBC by the State Agency pursuant to KRS 56.450(4), wherein and whereby the State Agency has requested the SPBC to provide for financing of the costs of the Project (hereinafter defined and identified), through application of the proceeds of the Bonds issued by the SPBC in its own name in the manner authorized by the Act. The Application, if applicable, is contained in this Financing/Lease Agreement.

"Bond Payment Fund" means the fund to be created by the Bond Resolution for the payment of the principal of, interest on, and premium, if any, on the Bonds.

"Bond Resolution" means the Bond Resolution or similar authorizing instrument to be adopted by the SPBC or State Agency, as applicable, authorizing the issuance of the Bonds.

"Bonds" means Bonds as defined in the Indenture.

"Budget Act" means H.B. 321 of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, 1998 Regular Session, H.B. 502 of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, 2000 Regular Session and any future Budget of the Commonwealth or amendment to any Budget of the Commonwealth that may become effective prior to the latest permissible maturity date for any Notes.

"Cabinet" means the Finance and Administration Cabinet of the Commonwealth.

"Commission" means the Kentucky Asset/Liability Commission.

"Commonwealth" means the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

"Credit Facility" means Credit Facility as defined in the Indenture.

"Credit Facility Agreement" means Credit Facility Agreement as defined in the Indenture.

"Credit Facility Obligations" means obligations of the Commission under the Credit Facility Agreement, including without limitation, obligations to reimburse the Credit Facility Provider for drawings under the Credit Facility.

"Credit Facility Provider" means Credit Facility Provider as defined in the Indenture.

"Financing Expenses" means all costs associated with the financing of the Projects, as may be determined by the Cabinet, other than amounts payable as interest, Credit Facility Provider fees, Liquidity

Facility Provider fees and Remarketing Agent fees hereunder, including, but not limited to, fees of the Trustee, Registrar and Paying Agents and unamortized Costs of Issuance.

"Financing/Lease Agreement" means this Financing/Lease Agreement, dated as of the date on the cover page hereto, by which interim and, if applicable, permanent financing for the Project is provided to the State Agency by the Commission and the SPBC, respectively.

"Financing Payments" means the payments required to be made by the Cabinet to the Commission pursuant to Sections 5.01, 5.02 and 5.04 of this Financing/Lease Agreement.

"Fiscal Year" means any period of twelve (12) months commencing July 1 of any year and ending June 30 of the ensuing year.

"Indenture" means the Trust Indenture dated as of November 1, 2000, between the Commission and the Trustee.

"KRS" means the Kentucky Revised Statutes of the Commonwealth of Kentucky as the same are in full force and effect at the date of the adoption of the Indenture, and any future amendments thereof to the extent that the same will not unconstitutionally impair the obligations of contracts created under the provisions of the Indenture.

"Liquidity Facility" means Liquidity Facility as defined in the Indenture.

"Liquidity Facility Obligations" means obligations of the Commission under the Liquidity Facility.

"Liquidity Facility Provider" means Liquidity Facility Provider as defined in the Indenture.

"Note Payment Fund" means the fund created by Sections 5.03 and 5.06 of the Indenture.

"Notes" means Notes as defined in the Indenture.

"Project" means the Projects identified in Annex A hereto.

"Project Fund" means the fund created by Sections 5.03 and 5.05 of the Indenture and, upon issuance of the Bonds, means the fund, if any, created by the Bond Resolution for the payment of costs of the Project.

"Proportionate Share" means a factor determined by dividing the principal portion of the State Agency's Debt Servicing Obligation by the principal amount of all Notes (other than any renewal Notes) issued under the Indenture.

"Registrar" means Registrar as defined in the Indenture.

"Related Notes" means Notes issued or to be issued for the purpose of financing the Project.

"Renewal Term" means a period of two (2) years coinciding with the fiscal biennium of the Commonwealth, which commences on July 1 in each even-numbered year and ends on June 30 of the next ensuing even-numbered year unless hereafter modified by statute.

"Rent" means the payments requested to be made by the State Agency to the SPBC pursuant to Sections 5.01, 5.02 and 5.08 of this Financing/Lease Agreement.

"SPBC" means the State Property and Buildings Commission of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

"State Agency" means the State Agency identified on the cover page hereto.

"Trustee" means Bank One Trust Company, NA, a national banking association organized under and existing by virtue of the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, having proper trust powers, and having its principal office and place of business in the City of Lexington, Kentucky and including any successor trustee designated pursuant to the provisions of the Indenture.

Any terms not defined in this Financing/Lease Agreement but defined in the Indenture, if used herein, shall have the same meanings ascribed to them in the Indenture.

#### ARTICLE II

### AGREED RECITATION OF ESTIMATED TOTAL COSTS OF THE PROJECT

Section 2.01. The Commission, the SPBC, the State Agency and the Cabinet agree that the aggregate of all costs of the Project to be funded from the proceeds of the Related Notes and Bonds will not exceed the amounts set forth in the Budget Act, which amounts are more specifically identified in Exhibit A hereto, plus Financing Expenses and Bond issuance costs, provisions for any debt service reserve fund, any capitalized interest, provisions of contingencies and discount in the sale of the Bonds and Related Notes.

#### ARTICLE III

# APPLICATION AND REQUEST OF THE STATE AGENCY THAT SPBC AUTHORIZE IN SPBC'S OWN NAME BONDS IN AMOUNT OF THE COSTS OF THE PROJECT AND REQUEST OF SPBC THAT THE COMMISSION ISSUE NOTES

Section 3.01. The State Agency hereby makes application to the SPBC pursuant to KRS 56.450, and requests that the SPBC authorize in SPBC's own name and offer, from time to time, SPBC's Bonds in the principal amount not to exceed the costs of the Project established in Section 2.01 hereof for the purpose of providing the costs of the Project, all as is more specifically provided in the Act and the Bond Resolution, it being understood that the Commission may issue Notes in anticipation of the issuance of the Bonds, in accordance with the Act.

Section 3.02. The SPBC hereby makes application, on behalf and at the direction of the State Agency, to the Commission, and requests that the Commission authorize in the Commission's own name and offer, from time to time, the Commission's Notes in the principal amount not to exceed the costs of the Project established in Section 2.01 hereof for the purpose of providing interim financing for the Project, all as is more specifically provided in the Act and the Indenture.

#### ARTICLE IV

# AGREEMENT OF SPBC TO ISSUE ITS BONDS AND COMMISSION TO ISSUE ITS NOTES AND APPLY THE PROCEEDS THEREOF TO THE ACQUISITION OF THE PROJECT

Section 4. 01. SPBC hereby agrees that in accordance with its lawful authority and powers and according to the Act and the application and request of the State Agency pursuant to KRS 56.450, it will, responsive to such request, proceed with all reasonable dispatch to authorize in its own name and issue Bonds to finance the Project, at the time and in the amounts necessary, as determined by SPBC, to provide adequate financing for the Project and to retire, at or prior to maturity, Notes, subject to the limitations of the Act and the Budget Act. The SPBC in its sole discretion shall, based on sound financial practices, establish the interest rates, maturities, sale price and other terms and conditions of Bonds from time to time issued pursuant to this Financing/Lease Agreement and shall issue and deliver Bonds and apply the proceeds thereof to financing the acquisition of the Project or retirement of the Related Notes.

Section 4. 02. The Commission hereby agrees that in accordance with its lawful authority and powers and according to the Act and the request and authorization of the SPBC, as applicable, the State Agency and the Cabinet pursuant to KRS 56.867, it will, responsive to such request, proceed with all reasonable dispatch to authorize in its own name and issue Notes to provide interim financing for the Project, at the time and in the amounts necessary, as determined by the Commission, to provide adequate interim financing for the Project, subject to the limitations of the Act and the Budget Act. The Commission in its sole discretion shall, based on sound financial practices, establish the interest rates, maturities, sale price and other terms and conditions of Notes from time to time issued pursuant to this Financing/Lease Agreement and shall issue and deliver Notes and apply the proceeds to financing the acquisition of the Project.

#### ARTICLE V

### INITIAL TERMS; OPTIONAL RENEWALS; FINANCING PAYMENTS; RENT

Section 5.01. The Commission hereby agrees to provide interim financing for the Project to the State Agency, for an initial term ending June 30, 2002, with the right and privilege by the State Agency to continue this Financing/Lease Agreement and have the Project for succeeding biennium periods in the event this Financing/Lease Agreement is renewed as provided herein. The State Agency shall pay or cause to be paid as Financing Payments during such initial period ending on June 30, 2002, the Debt Servicing Obligation, as hereinafter defined, applicable to the Related Notes, due on each Debt Servicing Date, as hereinafter defined, during the term of the Financing Lease Agreement so long as any Related Notes are outstanding or any amounts are due under a Credit Facility Agreement or Liquidity Facility.

The SPBC hereby agrees to provide permanent financing for the Project to the State Agency, for an initial term commencing on the date of issuance of the Bonds and ending June 30 of the first even numbered year after the issuance of the Bonds, with the right and privilege by the State Agency to continue this Financing/Lease Agreement and have the Project for succeeding biennium periods in the event this Financing/Lease Agreement is renewed as provided herein. The State Agency shall pay or cause to be paid as Rent during such period, the Debt Servicing Obligation, as hereinafter defined, applicable to the Bonds, due on each Debt Servicing Date, as hereinafter defined, applicable to the Bonds, during the term of the Financing/Lease Agreement so long as any Bonds are outstanding.

#### Section 5.02. For purposes hereof:

"Debt Servicing Date" shall mean, as to Related Notes that are outstanding, (i) the date on which the Commission has estimated that capitalized interest in the Note Payment Fund that is attributable to the State Agency will no longer be sufficient to pay interest on the Related Notes (which date is set forth in Annex A hereto) and August 1 each year thereafter, (ii) any Interest Payment Date on which the amount in the Note Payment Fund that is attributable to the State Agency (as determined by the Commission) is not adequate to pay the amounts set forth in clauses (i) through (vi) of the definition of Debt Servicing Obligation, and (iii) if no capitalized interest is attributable to the Related Notes on the date of their delivery, the date of delivery of the Related Notes; and as to any Bonds of the SPBC outstanding, the interest payment dates for the Bonds established by the Bond Resolution or otherwise agreed to by the SPBC and the State Agency, which dates shall be established to provide for timely payments of principal and interest on the Bonds.

"Debt Servicing Obligation" shall mean, as to Related Notes that are outstanding, the entire amount included in its budget (the "Budgeted Amount") for the payment of debt service with respect to the Project, less any amount in the Note Payment Fund on the date of the payment thereof which is attributable to the State Agency (as determined by the Commission). The State Agency shall approve a Budgeted Amount that is no less than the amount reasonably estimated to be required to be paid in respect of the Related Notes during the period to which the Budgeted Amount relates (the "Budget Period"), including (i) the scheduled maturity of principal of any Related Notes for which Bonds or renewal Notes are not being issued and the principal amount of Related Notes for which Bonds are not being issued, if any, called or to be called for redemption during the applicable Budget Period, and the premium, if any, with respect to such Related Notes, (ii) the interest required or estimated (by the Commission) to be paid on the Related Notes which will be outstanding during the applicable Budget Period, (iii) Credit Facility Obligations applicable to the Related Notes (to the extent not paid under clauses (i) and (ii)), (iv) Liquidity Facility Obligations applicable to the Related Notes, (v) its Proportionate Share of any Financing Expenses and (vi) the reasonable and agreed fees of the Credit Facility Provider, the Liquidity Facility Provider, the Remarketing Agent, the Trustee, the Paying Agent and the Registrar, but only to the extent not otherwise paid directly by the State Agency. In addition to the foregoing, if on any Interest Payment Date, the amount in the Note Payment Fund that is attributable to the State Agency (as determined by the Commission) is not adequate to pay the amounts set forth in clauses (i) through (vi) above, the State Agency shall pay, regardless of the Budget Amount, the amount required to satisfy such deficiency from whatever sources are available for such purpose.

Debt Servicing Obligation shall mean, as to Bonds that are outstanding, the aggregate amounts required to be paid in respect of the Bonds on any Debt Servicing Date, including (a) the scheduled maturity of principal of the Bonds maturing on such Debt Servicing Date and the principal amount of the Bonds, if any, called for redemption on such Debt Servicing Date, and the premium, if any, with respect to such Bonds, (b) the interest required to be paid on the Bonds which were outstanding immediately prior to such Debt Servicing Date, and (c) the reasonable and agreed fees of any credit facility provider, liquidity facility provider, remarketing agent, trustee, paying agent or registrar for the Bonds, but only to the extent not otherwise paid directly by the State Agency.

The State Agency shall be entitled to a credit against the Debt Servicing Obligation otherwise required to be paid on any Debt Servicing Date to the extent there are funds attributable to it, as determined by the Commission, in the Interest Account of the Note Payment Fund or in the Operating Account of the Expense Fund or, if applicable, the Bond Payment Fund (as determined by the SPBC), prior to the payment of the Debt Servicing Obligation hereunder which, under the terms of the Indenture or the Bond Resolution, as applicable, and applicable law, can be used to meet the

Debt Servicing Obligation. It is understood that, (1) pursuant to the Indenture, all income derived from investment of the Project Fund may, at the discretion of the Cabinet and the State Agency, be transferred to the Note Payment Fund and, if so transferred, shall be a credit against Financing Payments due and payable by the State Agency and (2) if provision is made therefore in the Bond Resolution, all income derived from investment of the Project Fund may, at the discretion of the Cabinet and the State Agency, be transferred to the Bond Payment Fund and, if so transferred, shall be a credit against Rent due and payable by the State Agency. Amounts transferred from the Expense Fund, established by the Indenture, to the Note Payment Fund, shall be a further credit against Financing Payments due and payable by the State Agency. Amounts transferred from any cost of issuance fund, established by the Bond Resolution, to the Bond Payment Fund, shall be a further credit against Rent due and payable by the State Agency.

Upon issuance of the Bonds, the final Debt Servicing Obligation for the Related Notes shall be the amount determined by the Commission in accordance with Section 5.04.

Section 5.03. Beginning June 30, 2002, the Commission and the SPBC hereby grant unto the State Agency exclusive option to renew the Financing/Lease Agreement for successive ensuing Renewal Terms, commencing July 1 in each even-numbered year, and ending June 30 of the next ensuing even-numbered year, and the last Renewal Term shall end June 30 of the even numbered year next following the final maturity date of the Bonds, or such other date as may be set forth in a Supplemental Financing Agreement entered into pursuant to the provisions of Section 5.10 hereof or otherwise agreed to by the SPBC and the State Agency; and for each such Renewal Term, if renewed therefor, the State Agency shall become obligated to pay, and hereby agrees that in the event of such renewal it will pay or cause to be paid, to the Commission, as Financing Payments and, if applicable, to the SPBC, as Rent for such biennium, each Debt Servicing Obligation which comes due on each Debt Servicing Date during the Renewal Term as a general obligation of the State Agency for such period, secured by amounts budgeted by the State Agency in its agency fund for such purpose.

Section 5.04. Financing Payments and Rent becoming due during the first term ending June 30, 2002, and for each Renewal Term, if the Financing/Lease Agreement shall be renewed for any such Renewal Term, shall be made or caused to be made by the State Agency to the Commission on each Debt Servicing Date during each such term, in such minimum amounts as will enable the Commission, solely from such source, to pay its Debt Servicing Obligation as of such date. Upon the issuance of the Bonds by the SPBC, the SPBC and the Commission shall advise the State Agency of (i) the trustee appointed for such Bonds and (ii) the Rent payable to such trustee as a result of such issuance of the Bonds. Upon the issuance of the Bonds, the Commission shall also advise the State Agency of the remaining Financing Payments and the State Agency's remaining Proportionate Share of Financing Costs payable to the Trustee for payment of any Related Notes which remain Outstanding.

Section 5.05. Each of the successive options to renew shall in each instance be deemed automatically exercised, and the Financing/Lease Agreement automatically renewed for the succeeding Renewal Term, effective on the first day thereof, unless a written notice of the State Agency's election not to renew, signed by an authorized officer of the State Agency, shall have been delivered to the Commission and the SPBC, as applicable, before the close of business on the last business day in May, immediately preceding the beginning of such succeeding Renewal Term.

Section 5.06. The State Agency covenants and agrees to pay "Additional Payments" for the term of the Financing/Lease Agreement and for any Renewal Term during which Related Notes are outstanding, to the extent such payments are not a part of the Debt Servicing Obligation, as follows:

- (i) To the Trustee, when due, a Proportionate Share of all fees of the Trustee for services rendered, all fees and charges of any Paying Agent, Registrar, counsel, accountants, and others incurred in the performance on request of the Trustee of services for which the Trustee and such other persons are entitled to payment or reimbursement which are not paid as Financing Payments;
- (ii) To the Credit Facility Provider and Liquidity Facility Provider, when due, a Proportionate Share of all fees, expenses and other charges payable to the Credit Facility Provider under the Credit Facility Agreement and to the Liquidity Facility Provider under the Liquidity Facility which are not paid as Financing Payments;
- (iii) To the Remarketing Agent when due, a Proportionate Share of all fees, expenses and other charges payable to the Remarketing Agent under the Remarketing Agreement; and
- (iv) To the Commission, upon demand, all reasonable expenses incurred by it in relation to the Project which are not otherwise specifically identified and required to be paid by the Commission under the terms of this Financing/Lease Agreement.

The State Agency covenants and agrees to pay "Additional Rent" for the term of the Financing/Lease Agreement and for any Renewal Term during which Bonds are outstanding, to the extent such payments are not a part of the Debt Servicing Obligation, as follows:

- (i) To the trustee for the Bonds, when due, a Proportionate Share of all fees of such trustee for services rendered, all fees and charges of any paying agent, registrar, counsel, accountants, and others incurred in the performance on request of such trustee of services for which such trustee and such other persons are entitled to payment or reimbursement which are not paid as Rent;
- (ii) To any credit facility provider and liquidity facility provider for the Bonds, when due, a Proportionate Share of all fees, expenses and other charges payable to such credit facility provider under any credit facility agreement and to such liquidity facility provider under any liquidity facility which are not paid as Rent;
- (iii) To any remarketing agent when due, a Proportionate Share of all fees, expenses and other charges payable to such remarketing agent under any remarketing agreement; and
- (iv) To the SPBC, upon demand, all reasonable expenses incurred by it in relation to the Project which are not otherwise specifically identified and required to be paid by the SPBC under the terms of this Financing/Lease Agreement.
- Section 5.07. It is the intention of the parties that this Financing/Lease Agreement be an absolutely net agreement, and that all of the Financing Payments and Rent available for debt service on the Related Notes and Bonds and this Financing/Lease Agreement shall be construed to effectuate such intent. Except as provided in Section 5.05, so long as any of the Related Notes or Bonds, or any Credit Facility Obligations or Liquidity Facility Obligations are outstanding or remain unpaid, the obligation of the State Agency to pay the amounts provided for in this Article V shall be absolute and unconditional, irrespective of any rights of set-off, recoupment or counterclaim it might otherwise have.
- Section 5.08. This Financing/Lease Agreement may be supplemented from time to time whenever Bonds or additional Notes are issued by the SPBC or the Commission, respectively, at the request of the State Agency under the provisions of Section 6.11 of the Indenture or as may be provided in the Bond Resolution.

Amounts payable under the terms of such supplemental agreement shall constitute Financing Payments or Rent, as applicable, under this Financing/Lease Agreement and such Financing Payments shall become Pledged Receipts under the Indenture if such supplemental Financing/Lease Agreement is with respect to additional Notes, or Rent which shall constitute revenues available solely and only for the payment of Bonds and pledged therefor under the Bond Resolution if such supplemental Financing/Lease Agreement is with respect to Bonds.

Section 5.09. In addition to the duties and obligations of the State Agency set forth in this Financing Agreement, the State Agency hereby covenants and agrees to perform such duties and obligations of it as may be set forth in the Indenture or the Bond Resolution.

#### **ARTICLE VI**

### EFFECT OF THE STATE AGENCY'S EXERCISE OF ITS OPTION TO RENEW

Section 6.01 In the event the successive renewal options are exercised, according to the automatic renewal provisions hereinabove set forth, then upon the first day of the biennial Renewal Term for which such option is exercised, the State Agency shall be firmly bound for the entire amount of the Financing Payments, Additional Payments, Rent and Additional Rent becoming due and payable for such Renewal Term as a general obligation of the State Agency, limited to amounts appropriated for such purpose, payable from any and all funds of the State Agency, including, but not limited to, appropriations, contributions, gifts, matching funds, devises and bequests from any source, whether Federal or State, and whether public or private, so long as the same are not conditioned upon any use of the Project in a manner inconsistent with law; provided, however, nothing herein contained shall be construed as binding the State Agency to pay Financing Payments, Additional Payments, Rent or Additional Rent for more than one biennial Renewal Term at a time.

#### ARTICLE VII

#### EFFECT OF THE STATE AGENCY'S ELECTION NOT TO RENEW

Section 7.01. In the event the State Agency shall give written notice to the Commission or the SPBC, as applicable, of the State Agency's election not to renew this Financing/Lease Agreement for any ensuing optional biennial Renewal Term, prior to the automatic renewal hereinabove provided for, the State Agency shall not become obligated to pay Financing Payments, Additional Payments, Rent or Additional Rent beyond the last day of the then current term, and the State Agency shall thereby forfeit all of its future options to renew and shall peacefully surrender to the Commission or the SPBC, as applicable, possession of the Project on or prior to the last day of the then current term; provided, however, an election on the part of the State Agency not to renew for a future term shall not in any manner alter or diminish any obligation of the State Agency hereunder for the then current term; and shall not preclude subsequent reinstatement of the Financing/Lease Agreement for any future renewal term, if agreed to by the Commission or the SPBC, as applicable, upon the same terms and conditions as would have been applicable if the Financing/Lease Agreement had been renewed according to the provisions hereof, except that if such reinstatement is sought when one or more installments of Financing Payments or Rent or any Additional Payments or Additional Rent for such Renewal Term are overdue and unpaid, it shall be a condition of such reinstatement that such overdue Financing Payments or Rent or Additional Rent be tendered.

#### ARTICLE VIII

#### STATE AGENCY TO HAVE PEACEFUL POSSESSION SO LONG AS THE FINANCING/LEASE AGREEMENT IS IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT

Section 8.01. The Commission and the SPBC covenant that during the initial term of this Financing/Lease Agreement and during each successive optional Renewal Term for which this Financing/Lease Agreement may be renewed, if the State Agency shall continue in good standing according to the provisions hereof, the Commission and the SPBC shall maintain the State Agency in peaceful possession and enjoyment of the Project.

#### ARTICLE IX

# STATE AGENCY TO REQUIRE SUFFICIENT AMOUNTS IN ITS BUDGET IN ORDER FOR FINANCING PAYMENTS AND RENT TO BE MADE

Section 9.01. The State Agency covenants and agrees that on each and every occasion when appropriations bills are prepared for introduction in the various successive Sessions of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth, the State Agency will cause to be included in its budget and seek an appropriation for, sufficient amounts in the aggregate (over and above all other requirements of the State Agency) to enable the State Agency to pay Financing Payments, Additional Payments, Rent and Additional Rent and thereby provide to the Commission moneys sufficient for the payment of the principal and interest on the Related Notes and Bonds as such amounts are due and payable, subject to the SPBC's obligation to issue Bonds or the Commission's obligation to issue renewal Notes upon the maturity of any Related Notes, and to pay any and all Credit Facility Obligations and Liquidity Facility Obligations applicable to the Related Notes or Bonds.

#### ARTICLE X

#### **EVENTS OF DEFAULT AND REMEDIES**

Section 10.01. Each of the following events is hereby defined as and shall constitute an "event of default":

- (a) default in the due and punctual payment of any Financing Payments, Rent, Additional Payments or Additional Rent; or
- (b) default in the performance of any of the covenants, terms, and conditions of this Financing/Lease Agreement, and failure to remedy such default within thirty (30) days after written receipt thereof if the default relates to matters other than the payment of rent (but the State Agency shall not be deemed to be in default if the State Agency commences to remedy said defaults other than related to payment of Financing Payments, Rent, Additional Payments or Additional Rent within said thirty (30) day period, and proceed to and do remedy said default with due diligence).

If an event of default occurs, the Commission or the SPBC, as applicable, in addition to all other remedies given to the Commission and the SPBC at law or in equity, may by written notice to the State Agency terminate this Financing/Lease Agreement or, without terminating this Financing/Lease Agreement, take possession (actually or constructively) of the Project. In such event, the Commission or the SPBC, as applicable, may lease the Project or portions thereof, to any party it deems appropriate and in the event of

a leasing may apply the rent therefrom first to the payment of the Commission's and the SPBC's expenses incurred by reason of the State Agency's default, and the expense of leasing, including but not limited to any repairs, renovation or alteration of the Project, and then to the payment of Financing Payments, Rent, Additional Payments, Additional Rent and all other sums due from the State Agency hereunder; provided, that prior to any such reletting, the Commission or SPBC, as applicable, shall deliver to the Trustee an opinion of nationally recognized bond counsel to the effect that such subletting or reletting will not cause the interest on the Series A Notes, the Series B Notes, or the Bonds to be includible in gross income of the owners thereof for federal income tax purposes. All remedies available to the Commission and the SPBC are declared to be cumulative and concurrent. No termination of this Financing/Lease Agreement nor any taking or recovering of possession of the Project shall deprive the Commission or the SPBC of any of its remedies or actions against the State Agency.

#### ARTICLE XI

# PROVISIONS OF FINANCING/LEASE AGREEMENT ARE FOR BENEFIT OF THE HOLDERS OF THE NOTES AND BONDS AS THIRD PARTY BENEFICIARIES

Section 11.01. All of the provisions herein contained are made for the benefit of each of the Holders and any Credit Facility Provider and any Liquidity Provider. Each and all of the Holders, such Credit Facility Provider, such Liquidity Provider and the Trustee on behalf of the Holders have the rights of third party beneficiaries to enforce all of the provisions of this Financing Agreement herein contained; subject, however, to the provisions of the Indenture with respect to enforcement of rights.

#### ARTICLE XII

#### TAX COVENANT

Section 12.01. To the full extent that it has the legal right to do so, the State Agency agrees to all of the provisions of the Indenture authorizing the Notes and, unless it objects in writing prior to the issuance of the Bonds, to all of the provisions of the Bond Resolution authorizing the Bonds; and that it will neither take any action nor omit to take any action which taking or omission would result, in the exclusion of the receipt of interest on any of the Related Notes or Bonds from the treatment afforded by Section 103(a) of the Code, to the extent the interest on such Related Notes or Bonds is intended to be excludible from gross income for federal income tax purposes, under the terms of the Indenture or Bond Resolution.

Section 12.02. It is agreed that nothing has been done or will be done by either the Commission or the State Agency which will cause the Related Notes or Bonds to be private activity bonds within the meaning of Section 141 of the Code, including performance of any of the covenants contained herein, to the extent the interest on such Related Notes or Bonds is intended to be excludible from gross income for federal income tax purposes, under the terms of the Indenture or Bond Resolution.

#### ARTICLE XIII

#### TERMINATION OF FINANCING/LEASE AGREEMENT

Section 13.01. Upon the payment in full of the total principal and interest due or to become due on the Related Notes, including premium, if applicable, at the times and in the manner stipulated therein, in the Indenture, or upon defeasance of the Related Notes in accordance with the terms of the Indenture, and the payment of all Credit Facility Obligations and Liquidity Facility Obligations, this Financing/Lease Agreement and all covenants, agreements and other obligations herein applicable to the Related Notes and

the Commission shall cease, terminate and become void and be discharged and satisfied; provided that, so long as any Bonds of the SPBC are outstanding the covenants, agreements and obligations relating to the SPBC shall continue to be in full force and effect. In such event, the Commission, upon the request of the State Agency, shall execute and deliver all such instruments as may be desirable to evidence such discharge and satisfaction of the State Agency's obligations applicable to the Related Notes.

Upon the payment in full of the total principal and interest due or to become due on the Bonds, including premium, if applicable, at the times and in the manner stipulated therein, in the Bond Resolution, or upon defeasance of the Bonds in accordance with the terms of the Bond Resolution, this Financing/Lease Agreement and all covenants, agreements and other obligations herein applicable to the Bonds and the SPBC shall cease, terminate and become void and be discharged and satisfied. In such event, the SPBC, upon the request of the State Agency, shall execute and deliver all such instruments as may be desirable to evidence such discharge and satisfaction.

#### ARTICLE XIV

#### SECURITY AND ASSIGNMENT

Section 14.01. This Financing/Lease Agreement secures (i) the payment of Financing Payments, Rent, Additional Payments and Additional Rent hereunder, (ii) the payment of the Notes in the aggregate principal amount which may from time to time be outstanding under the Indenture set forth, with interest thereon at the rates per annum borne by the Related Notes, (iii) the payment of the Bonds in the aggregate principal amount which may from time to time be outstanding under the Bond Resolution, with interest thereon at the rates per annum borne by the Bonds, (iv) the payment of the Credit Facility Obligations, and (v) the payment of the Liquidity Facility Obligations.

This Financing/Lease Agreement is given subject to all of the terms, conditions and provisions of the Indenture and the Bond Resolution. In the event that any conflict should exist or appear to exist between the provisions of this Financing/Lease Agreement and the Indenture, the provisions of the Indenture shall prevail. In the event that any conflict should exist or appear to exist between the provisions of this Financing/Lease Agreement and the Bond Resolution, the provisions of the Bond Resolution shall prevail.

#### ARTICLE XV

#### PROVISIONS OF FINANCING/LEASE AGREEMENT ARE SEVERABLE

Section 15.01. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Financing/Lease Agreement shall be held invalid, the invalidity of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this Financing/Lease Agreement.

#### ARTICLE XVI

### INDEX AND HEADINGS PRECEDING SECTIONS ARE NOT PART OF THE FINANCING/LEASE AGREEMENT

Section 16.01. The Index and the headings preceding the text of the several sections hereof shall be solely for convenience of reference and shall not constitute a part of this Financing/Lease Agreement, nor shall they affect its meaning, construction or effect.

#### APPROVAL AND CONSENT OF FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION CABINET

The Secretary of the Finance and Administration Cabinet (the "Cabinet") of the Commonwealth of Kentucky hereby acknowledges his approval and consent and the approval and consent of the Cabinet to the terms and provisions of this Financing/Lease Agreement and to evidence acceptance of the obligations and covenants of the Cabinet contained in such Financing/Lease Agreement and on behalf of the Cabinet confirms that the provisions of this Financing/Lease Agreement are consistent with the public interest. This approval and consent is applicable only insofar as the same are within the jurisdiction, functions and powers of the Cabinet or within the jurisdiction, functions and powers of the Secretary of the Cabinet.

#### FORM OF RESOLUTION

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY ("STATE AGENCY") APPROVING A FINANCING/LEASE AGREEMENT AMONG THE STATE AGENCY, THE KENTUCKY ASSET/LIABILITY COMMISSION, THE COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY STATE PROPERTY AND BUILDINGS COMMISSION AND THE FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION CABINET OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY FOR THE PURPOSE OF PROVIDING INTERIM FINANCING FOR AN AUTHORIZED PROJECT IN ANTICIPATION OF THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS TO PROVIDE PERMANENT FINANCING FOR SAID PROJECT.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 56.860 et seq. of the Kentucky Revised Statutes (the "Act"), the Kentucky Asset/Liability Commission (the "Commission") was created and exists as an independent agency and constituted authority of the Commonwealth of Kentucky (the "Commonwealth") and is authorized to issue Project Notes, as defined in the Act, at the request of the Cabinet, as defined in the Act, to provide interim financing for Authorized Projects, as defined in the Act, in anticipation of the issuance of bonds; and

WHEREAS, the General Assembly pursuant to H.B. 321 of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, 1998 Regular Session, H.B. 502 of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, 2000 Regular Session (collectively the "Budget Act") authorized certain expenditures in certain amounts for the hereinafter described Project to be financed with bonds, which Project constitutes an Authorized Project, as defined in the Act; and

WHEREAS, the Finance and Administration Cabinet (the "Cabinet") has applied to the State Property and Buildings Commission ("SPBC") for the issuance of bonds (the "Bonds") on behalf of the Cabinet and various other State Agencies to provide permanent financing for the Projects and has requested, in accordance with the Act, that the Commission issue and sell Project Notes to provide funds for the Projects in anticipation of the issuance of the Bonds; and

WHEREAS, the SPBC has determined, based on such request and the authorizations set forth in the Budget Act, to issue its revenue bonds for the Projects, and in anticipation thereof and based upon the request of the Cabinet and the SPBC, the Commission has determined to provide interim financing for the Projects through the issuance of its Project Notes, 2000 Agency Fund Series (the "Notes");

WHEREAS, the State Agency wishes to authorize the Financing/Lease Agreement (the "Financing Agreement") among the State Agency, the Commission, the SPBC and the Cabinet to provide interim financing for the Project as evidence of its commitment to issue the Bonds, which Bonds constitute the Bonds described in the Financing Agreement.

NOW THEREFORE, it is hereby resolved and ordered by the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky as follows:

Section 1. <u>Determinations</u>. The State Agency hereby finds and determines that (a) it hereby ratifies and affirms its request that the Commission issue the Notes in anticipation of the issuance of the Bonds, for the purpose of paying the costs of the Project; (b) it is necessary to execute and deliver the Financing

Agreement in order to provide for a source of payment for the Notes and Bonds; and (c) approval of the Project described in the Financing Agreement is hereby ratified and confirmed.

Section 2. The Financing Agreement and Other Documents. As evidence of its obligations in this Resolution, the Chairman is hereby authorized to execute, acknowledge and deliver, on behalf of the State Agency, the Financing Agreement, in substantially the form submitted to the State Agency, which is hereby approved, with such changes therein not inconsistent with this Resolution and not substantially adverse to the State Agency as may be permitted by the Act and approved by such officer. The approval of such changes by such officer, and that such changes are not substantially adverse to the State Agency, shall be conclusively evidenced by the execution of the Financing Agreement by such officer. The Chairman and Secretary are hereby separately authorized to take any and all actions and to execute such other instruments that may be necessary or appropriate in the opinion of Peck, Shaffer & Williams LLP, as bond counsel for the Notes, in order to effect the issuance of the Notes and the intent of this Resolution.

Section 3. <u>Effective Date</u>. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

I am general counsel for the University of Kentucky (the "State Agency"), and in such capacity, am familiar with its organization, statutory authority, regulations (if any), agreements and resolutions, all as in effect on the date hereof.

I have examined an executed copy of the Financing/Lease Agreement (the "Financing Agreement") among the State Agency, the Kentucky Asset/Liability Commission (the "Commission"), the Finance and Administration Cabinet of the Commonwealth of Kentucky (the "Cabinet") and the Commonwealth of Kentucky State Property and Buildings Commission ("SPBC") relating to the issuance of Kentucky Asset/Liability Commission Project Notes, 2000 Agency Fund Series (the "Notes") under the terms of the Indenture. I have also examined the original photostatic or certified copies of such records of the State Agency and other documents and materials, and have made such inquiries, as I have deemed relevant and necessary.

Based upon the foregoing, I am of the opinion that:

- (1) The State Agency is an agency of the Commonwealth, duly organized and validly existing under the laws of the Commonwealth and constitutes a "State Agency" within the meaning of Sections 56.440, et seq. and 56.860, et seq. of the Kentucky Revised Statutes.
- (2) The Financing Agreement has been duly authorized, executed and delivered by the State Agency and creates a valid, binding and enforceable agreement of the State Agency and the Financing Agreement creates a valid, binding and enforceable obligation of the State Agency to pay to the Commission the payments as are provided for therein, subject only to biennial appropriations by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth.

- (3) The execution, delivery and performance of the Financing Agreement by the State Agency is not subject to any authorization, consent, approval or review of any governmental body or regulatory authority not heretofore obtained or effected as required.
- (4) To the best of my knowledge, after due inquiry, there is no litigation pending or threatened against the State Agency, which would affect the creation, organization or existence of the State Agency or the title of its present members or officers to their respective offices, or contesting or affecting the validity or enforceability of the Financing Agreement.
- (5) The execution and delivery of the Financing Agreement and the performance by the State Agency of its obligations thereunder, does not and will not conflict with, violate or constitute a default under any court or administrative order, decree or ruling, or any law, statute, ordinance or regulation, or any agreement, indenture, mortgage, lease, note or other obligation or instrument binding upon the State Agency, or any resolutions heretofore adopted by the State Agency.
