I desire to say to your Committee
through you that the resolution
quoted above is a violation
of the contract made between L. B.
Wallace on behalf of the Ex. Com.
of Ky. University, and myself on
behalf of the Board of Visitors of
the Agr. & Mech. College of Ky. The
contract provided for the payment
by Ky. University of half the Landstons
and Carpenter's salary for the entire

they and not the janitor should
have been informed of your

and inasmuch as the negotiation
was conducted through me I
beg further to say that I do
not see how the Ex. Com. of the
University can recede from the
contract without the consent
of the Board of Visitors, the
