Replying to your favor Oct. 25th, I beg to say that the Capital Stock has been reduced to 50000., in accordance with the permission of the Comptroller of the Currency, by setting apart that amount out of the assets of the Bank to be collected and paid pro rata to the Shareholders.

Consequently, Kentucky University owns 10 shares in the Bank as it now exists, and will get her proportionate part for the other 10 shares out of the amount collected on the notes I have mentioned.

No new Bank was organized: the Charter of the old was merely extended for 20 years.

I have been working considerably on my lecture  
course & reading since my arrival here & so have not  
processed my monograph on Higher Education in Ky to  
a final conclusion. I propose now however to begin put-  
ting it into final form & wish some further continuation  
of the kind cooperation you have already extended to me  
in the work. First in regard to Ky. University proper  
I would be pleased to know as early as convenient a  
few facts which I know I shall need to complete my  
article. I will indicate just what these are in the form  
of questions:—

- (1) when was Ky Univ. moved from Georgetown to Hannibalburg  
(I have seen it stated both 1839 & 1840)? Summer of 1839.
- (2) what important changes since 1878 when the separation from  
the A. M. College ~~was~~ <sup>occurred</sup> ~~in place~~, have taken place (if any) in its plan  
of management, in its curriculum (including new departments), &  
in its ~~fundations~~ <sup>buildings & apparatus</sup> (Education has been fully  
introduced has it not?)?

- (3) Have any important benefactions been received since those raised mainly by Mr. Burman & if so, from whom & for what special purpose; also what is the approximate total of the present property & funds?
- (4) What is the approximate total of the alumni of Ky. Univ (exclusive of those of Transylvania) & what would you specially mention that any of them has accomplished?
- (5) Would you designate any object as a special aim of the Univ. for the future?

I will also ask you to please give me corresponding answers to the last four questions, or kindly refer them to some member of its Faculty who will give the answers in reference to the College of the Bible. I would also like to know in regard to it just how its management is provided for as a separate institution associated with Ky. Univ, the courses it offers & the degrees it confers with their conditions, also its different presidential administrations since 1878 with any thing of special interest in each which you would mention.

I have secured very good photographs of the early Transylvania buildings from the Caldwell's Memoirs you kindly lent me & will soon return it with the other pamphlets sent me some time ago by President Lins. Thanking you for your very kind cooperation, I remain
