






JULIAN M. CARROLL Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

JULIAN MORTON CARROLL became Kentucky's 58th governor on December 28, 1974, succeeding Wendell H. Ford, who was elected to the U. S. Senate. Carroll then won a full four-year term in the 1975 general election.

Born in McCracken County in 1931, he attended Paducah Junior College after graduating from Heath High School. He was graduated from the University of Kentucky in 1954 and received his law degree from UK in 1956. Before becoming governor, Carroll served three years as lieutenant governor and ten years as a member of the Kentucky House of Representatives.

He is currently chairman of the National Governors' Association, the first Kentucky Governor to hold that post. He is an active member of the Optimist Club and a former Jaycee. He attained the highest office in Kentucky for laymen of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in 1966-77 when he was named moderator of the Kentucky Synod.

The Governor and his wife, Charlann, have four children.

JAMES G. AMATO Mayor Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government

JAMES G. AMATO took office as mayor on January 2, 1978. In doing so, he became the second mayor of the consolidated city and county governments.

A native of Lexington, Amato has been a practicing attorney since 1964. He is a member of the Fayette County Bar Association, the Kentucky Bar Association, and the Kentucky Law Enforcement. He formerly held positions as Alcoholic Beverage Control Commissioner for the Commonwealth of Kentucky, Director of Citizens for Judicial Improvement, Inc., Municipal Court Judge and City Prosecutor.

As chief executive of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, the mayor is authorized to supervise, administer and control all departments of government.

The mayor is elected on a non-partisan ballot every four years. He is assisted principally by the Chief Administrative Officer and commissioners of the six departments.

University of Kentucky

Dr. Otis A. Singletary University of Kentucky President

Now in his ninth year as president of the University of Kentucky, DR. OTIS

A. SINGLETARY is a Mississippian whose route to the Bluegrass State curled through Louisiana, Texas, North Carolina

and Washington, D. C.

He came to Lexington from a position as University of Texas vice-chancellor for academic affairs. Previously, in Washington, he had been director of the U.S. Job Corps in the early stages of its development before moving to the American Council on Education as vice-president. He had gone to the capital in 1964 after three years as chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro.

The UNC appointment terminated Dr.

Singletary's first association with the University of Texas, this a seven-year stay that saw him, as a young historian, rise rapidly in rank from instructor to full professor and begin the shift to administrative work, first as associate dean and

The Kentucky president, and his wife the former Gloria Walton, met when both were students at Millsaps College. He later earned master's and doctoral degrees at Louisiana State. The Single-tarys have two daughters, Bonnie and Kendall, and a son, Scott.

Cliff Hagan Director of Athletics

"I've been preparing for this all my life," CLIFF ĤAĜAN said before taking over as athletics director at the University of Kentucky in 1975. Hagan succeeded Harry Lancaster as director after serv-

ing as assistant director for three years.

Hagan's path to the athletics directorship began in Owensboro, Kentucky, where he established a then state high school tournament record of 41 points in leading Owensboro to victory over Lafa-yette in the championship game of the 1949 high school tournament.

At UK, he played on teams that won 86 of 91 games and an NCAA champion-ship (1951). The 1954 team, undefeated in 25 games, elected not to participate in

the national tournament.

Under his leadership, the UK athletics department continues to develop success in all areas of endeavor including a strong dedication to the academic wellbeing of the athletes.





JOE B. HALL

LEONARD HAMILTON is beginning his fifth year at Kentucky after serving three years as assistant coach at Austin Peay. An outstanding recruiter with seemingly tireless energy, Hamilton has contributed heavily to maintaining a high level of young talent at UK. Specializing in coaching defense, Hamilton has had a positive impact on Wildcat defensive

JOE DEAN, JR., played against the Wildcats for three years at Mississippi State University, before serving as Bulldog assistant coach while earning a masters degree in physical education. An outstanding student, Dean was named to the 1976 Academic All-SEC second team. A native of Baton Rouge,

Joe B. Hall University of Kentucky Wildcats Head Basketball Coach

JOE B. HALL is beginning his seventh season as mentor of the Wildcats, coming off a year in which his senior dominated team captured the 1978 NCAA Championship. Since becoming head coach in 1972, succeeding the legendary Adolph F. Rupp, Hall has accumulated a record of 135 wins against 42 losses. His eleven year coaching record stands at 211-98. Broken down, it shows a 57-50 five year mark at Regis College, a 19-6 record at Central Missouri, and a 135-42 record at UK.

Hall became Rupp's top assistant in 1969 when Harry C. Lancaster was named athletics director. His record as freshmen coach was 60-15, including an undefeated (22-0) season (1971-72) which resulted in the Kittens being crowned National Freshmen Champions by Basketball News.

A popular personality on the clinic and convention circuits, Hall also has had much international exposure. In addition to the Globetrotters tour in 1951, and the "Down Under" tour in 1974, he has helped conduct basketball clinics for the U. S. Army in Anchorage and Fairbanks, Alaska (1968) and at Ramstein Air Base in Frankfurt, Germany and the RAF Base at Mildenhall, England in 1975. He also was Olympic Trials coach under Hank Iba at the Air Force Academy in July 1972 and was a member of the 1976 Olympic Basketball Committee. In 1978 he coached the U.S.A. team that hosted the first International Invitational Tournament.

DICK PARSONS

DICK PARSONS, in his seventh year as Joe B. Hall's No. 1 assistant, returned to the University as baseball coach in 1969. Before giving up his position to join the basketball staff on a full time basis, he molded a baseball team (1971) which established or tied 15 school records. He is a graduate of UK where he played guard under former Coach Adolph F. Rupp.

Parsons came to the University in 1958 after an outstanding career as a four-sports star at Harlan High School, where he had a three-year basketball scoring total of 1,276 points.

He was a two-time (1960-61) recipient of the coveted A. B. Chandler award, given annually for the player best exemplifying the qualities of leadership, scholarship, character and ability. Only four other Wildcats have twice been so honored since the award was originated in 1951.

He is married to the former Celia Cawood of Harlan. They have a daughter, Kathy, and a son, Ed.





FRANK HAM Assistant Director of Athletics

FRANK HAM became Assistant Director of Athletics in July 1975 soon after Cliff Hagan succeeded Harry C. Lancaster as Director of Athletics.

A native of Scranton, Pa., Ham came to the University in 1969 as Administrative Assistant to football coach John Ray, and was reassigned to the Athletic Director's staff in 1972 when Ray resigned.

SUSAN FEAMSTER Assistant Director of Athletics

SUE FEAMSTER joined the athletics association July 1 with the merger of the men's and women's programs. Feamster had been the director of women's athletics prior to her appointment as assistant director of athletics.

James Lee heads upcourt against Arkansas in NCAA semifinals.








Rick Robey describes how it feels to win an NCAA championship.

Defending UKIT Champ Kentucky In David Versus Goliath Role

Since its 1953 birth, the University of Kentucky Invitational Tournament has become a Yuletide tradition for residents of the Commonwealth. With regular season tickets to UK games usually sold out well in advance, the tournament offers many Kentuckians an opportunity to attend a Wildcat game and draws fans from the far reaches of the state. This year's tourney will be held December 22-23.

Participants will include nationally ranked Syracuse, Texas A & M and the University of Illinois. Their attendance will bring the total to 48 the number of visitors to have taken part in the annual event. Seven of those visitors have managed to take home the championship trophy.

The Wildcats have captured it 18 times with West Virginia being the only other team to have more than one UKIT title (1957, 1959). Other teams to have won UKIT titles are Dayton in 1955, St. Louis in 1960, Illinois in 1964, Purdue in 1970 and Utah (1976).

This year's field looks like the strongest group of contenders since the beginning of the Joe B. Hall era in 1972. It could possibly be even stronger than the 1976 tournament when Utah won the championship while the Cats played without three leading players who were benched for disciplinary reasons.

"I think the rankings of the teams alone tell the kind of field the tournament will have," comments assistant coach Dick Parsons. Texas A & M and Syracuse are contenders for top twenty ranking and Illinois is a veteran team with great potential.

As an example of the caliber of play these teams are producing, Texas A & M, Kentucky's first round opponent, has lost 81-65 to North Carolina State this season but defeated top ten ranked Indiana 54-49 in the Seawolf Classic.

Shelby Metcalfe's Aggies will have a trio of returning starters and has added junior transfer Dave Britton from Potomac State Junior College in West Virginia. He also has freshman Rudy Woods, a 6'11" center that was heavily recruited by Kentucky during his high school

Returning from last year's 12-15 squad will be David Goff, nicknamed "The

Prince." Goff led the team in assists and steals and contributed 5.5 points-pergame (ppg). Sophomore Vernon Smith, a 6'7" forward, led the Aggies with an 8.4 rebound average per game and was second in scoring at 14.0 ppg. At the other forward spot will be Rynn Wright, a 6'6" sophomore who averaged 8.5 ppg. in 1978

By the time the UKIT rolls around, the Aggies will be well versed on tournament play, having taken part in the Golden Gate Classic which includes national powers San Francisco and Nevada-Las Vegas.

The Cats have defeated the College Station team in two previous games. In 1941, Kentucky downed the Aggies 49-29 and in 1946, UK roared to a 83-18 win. This will be the Aggies' first UKIT appearance.

Another newcomer to the UKIT will be Syracuse, a team over which Kentucky holds an 8-4 advantage.


The Orangemen will return nine lettermen to this year's squad, including 6'11" center Roosevelt Bouie who averaged 10.5 ppg. last season.

Coach Jim Boeheim was pleased with the performance of some of his players during a post-season tour in Russia and Yugoslavia and is optimistic about the team's season.

"Our backcourt is the key for us," Boeheim told a national sports publication recently. It will be led by Hal Cohen and Marty Head, a pair that averaged just over a combined 12 ppg. with last year's 22-6 team.

Other top players to watch are Louis Orr, a 6'8" forward and Dale Shackleford, a 6'6" forward-guard.

Rounding out the visitors for this year's tournament will be Illinois, a virtually unknown commodity.

Last year the Fighting Illini managed only a 13-14 record with a seventh place finish in the Big 10.

But this season, coach Lou Henson is optimistic with seven returning lettermen and an outstanding transfer from Indiana University in Derek Holcomb (6'11", 230).

Returning starters for the Illini are guard Rob Judson, who tallied 7.3 ppg., and forwards Neil Bresnahan and Mark Smith, who averaged 8.1 and 11.6 ppg., respectively. James Griffin is Henson's outstanding freshman recruit, a 6'10" forward from Texas.

"I think we'll be an extremely fine team, said Henson, "but we'll still be behind at least four or five teams in the Big 10."

This is the best field we've ever had," commented Kentucky head coach Joe B. Hall. "Syracuse is expected to be the favorite. They're very strong, very big and nationally ranked.

Hall adds that he doesn't expect his 1978 Wildcats to be picked to even finish second. "We'll probably be the third pick. I hope we're third and not fourth. I doubt if we will be playing our best ball then," Hall added.

However, it is the Cats' invitational tournament and they can be expected to make fur fly before relinquishing the championship.

Founded in 1970, and originally named West Texas State Normal College, West Texas State University later became known as West Texas State Teachers College.







West Texas State: 'Under New Management'

The outlook for the 1978-79 West Texas State basketball team involves a new head coach, returning veterans, and a new offense.

Ken Edwards, former coach of Portland State University, has taken the head coaching job and will be concentrating on turning around last years 9-18 rec-ored which placed the Buffaloes eighth

in the Missouri Valley Conference.
While top scorers Ron Addison and Maurice Cheeks are gone, Edwards inherits nine returnees including starter Carl Johnson, Dan Elmer and Tony Ellis.

Ellis, a 6' 4" sophomore forward, who averaged 8.3 points per game (ppg.) has lost his starting position to Erskine Robinson. Robinson is 6' 5" and averaged 17.0 ppg. in his senior year of high school.

Two other newcomers to the Buffs lineup will be freshman Eddie Harris and junior George Sims. Harris has been compared to Portland State standout Freeman Williams. During three intersquad scrimmages, the 6'3" guard averaged 33 ppg. Last year in high school, Harris averaged 23.5 ppg.
Sims, a junior college transfer, is a

6'5", 215-pound center, who averaged

21.5 ppg last year. During his freshman year of college, he attended Kansas State where he was a starting tight end on the football team.

Joining the three newcomers for Edwards, will be Elmer who averaged 8.7 ppg. as a sophomore last year and Johnson, who served as the team's second leading rebounder and third leading scorer.

"I feel like we're 10 players deep," commented Edwards. "Our depth will be our strong point."

When leading PSU to one of the nations leading scoring teams, Edwards used a running game. He isn't expected to change things for the Buffaloes.

"We'll run the whole game and run a defense to compliment our offense. We'll press the entire 40 minutes. We might give up some easy baskets but we'll also get some," elaborated Edwards.

In their initial game of the year on Nov. 28, West Texas State defeated Panhandle State 89-59. The Buffaloes started slowly, scoring only 31 points in the opening 20 minutes and led 31-24 at the intermission.

Early Scrimmages Offer Cats Chance To Visit With Fans

Perhaps more than any other institution in the state, the University of Kentucky basketball Wildcats belong to the people of Kentucky. From the remote mountain hollows of far Eastern Kentucky to the banks of the Mississippi in Western Kentucky, basketball talk centers around the fortunes of the Wildcats.

In an attempt to allow those who may never see a UK game in Rupp Arena the chance to see their beloved Cats in action, the team traditionally stages several intrasquad scrimmage games just prior to the regular season opener. These scrimmages are usually held in high school gyms in small towns in various parts of the Commonwealth.


This year three communities in the Central Kentucky area were chosen for scrimmage games. Residents of Danville, Shelbyville and Shepherdsville hosted the Wildcats in the latter part of November.

UK basketball players take the game seriously, even when playing against their teammates. Any ideas that the players would be easy on one another because they all play for the Big Blue, or that all-out effort was not really called for, can be dispelled by recalling two events of the Shelbyville game.

In that contest, Clarence Tillman, a 6-7 freshman forward from Philadelphia, suffered a chipped tooth while playing for the White team. And Chuck Verderber, a 6-6 freshman forward from Illinois, had Coach Joe Hall a little worried as he dived out of bounds for a loose ball and once hit the floor real hard after a rebound tussle.

The first scrimmage at Danville was noteworthy for an interesting display of scoring by UK's three freshmen, Verderber, Tillman and Dwight Anderson. Verderber poured in 29 points, Tillman had 25 and Anderson contributed 20. Verderber played the post position and showed deft inside moves against 6-10 Chuck Aleksinas, who will likely be UK's starting center.

Dependable Kyle Macy, UK's 6-3 junior guard who is an All-America candidate, led the White team to victory with 30 points. 6-8 sophomore forward Fred Cowan led the blue team with 25 points, followed by Truman Claytor, 6-1 senior guard, with 20.

Verderber's scoring tailed off in the second scrimmage at Shelbyville as Aleksinas showed more aggressiveness, using his 258 pounds to good advantage in scoring 28 points for the White team. This scrimmage proved to be the most interesting game for the fans as it went down to the final seconds before a baseline jump shot by Macy gave the Whites an 88-87 win.

Macy continued to score well, getting 26 points, while Claytor, playing for the Blue team, was high scorer for the evening with 32. Tim Stephens, a 6-3 junior who has played both guard and forward for UK, hit 16 points from the forward position and rallied the White team with key baskets late in the second half.

For the third and final scrimmage at Shepherdsville, Hall put together a tentative starting lineup when he paired Macy and Claytor at guard, Cowan and LaVon Williams at forward, and Aleksinas at center to make up the White team. Once again, Verderber put on quite a scoring show with 34 points, going up against Aleksinas in the pivot. The White team easily won the game, 112-96, as Claytor's 27 points and Macy's 26 led the way.

When the scrimmages were over, Wildcat fans in three communities had had a chance to see their heroes closeup


in game situations. For many, it would be the only time they would actually see the Cats play in person.

For Hall, it gave him and his coaching staff the opportunity to see just how players were developing in the different positions. The speed and quickness of the guards were apparent in all three games, and the front line became more aggressive from game to game. Though Hall indicated Aleksinas would be the starting center, the play of Verderber

made his decision more difficult.

It would be hard to keep Macy out of the starting lineup, and Claytor was shooting the bottom out of the basket. But waiting in the wings should either falter were Anderson, Dwane Casey, and Jay Shidler. Tillman will provide backup at forward for Cowan and Williams.

Leading scorers for the three scrimmage games were Macy, 27.3, Verderber, 26.7, and Claytor, 26.3.

Kentucky's last meeting with West Texas State was its only meeting, a convincing 73-43 win over the Buffaloes on December 1, 1950.

But the game is most remembered as the opening of Memorial Coliseum, "The House that Rupp Built." Before the year ended, Adolph Rupp captured his third NCAA Championship, defeating Kansas State 68-58 in the finals.

During this memorable year, the Cats not only captured the National Championship, but were Southeastern Conference Champions and were ranked first by the AP and UPI polls. The only low point of the Kentucky year occurred in a 43-42 loss to St. Louis in the Sugar Bowl Tournament. Kentucky did manage to defeat Syracuse for third place.

Shelby Linville, a 6'5" junior forward, opened the scoring against West Texas State. On the year, Linville averaged 10.4 ppg.

Kentucky also started Bill Spivey, Bobby Watson, Frank Ramsey and Walt Hirsch, all of whom were chosen to the Southeastern Conference team. Spivey and Ramsey received All-American hon-

Funding for the approximately \$200,000 project will come from tax-deductible donations from the public. Operation of the museum will be funded by a small admission charge "not to exceed \$1," according to Hisle.





UK Network Largest in Nation

Captivating play-by-play announcing by Cawood Ledford and expert color commentary by Ralph Hacker highlight the University of Kentucky basketball broadcasting network, the largest network of its kind in the nation.

This season's network lineup features 94 stations in Kentucky, Ohio, West Virginia and Tennessee, an increase of 12 stations over 1977. There are two 50,000-watt stations on the network, WCKY in Cincinnati and WHAS in Louisville. The signal coverage of these two stations alone carries the UK broadcasts over vast areas of the eastern and midwestern United States.

Cawood Ledford, sports director for WHAS radio and television, is now in his 26th season of calling the play-by-play for Wildcat basketball games. He is known throughout the Commonwealth as "The Voice of the Wildcats" and has become something of an institution with UK football and basketball.

Ledford has been honored eight times as "Kentucky Sportscaster of the Year," and is the only on-the-air broadcaster to have received the Kentucky Broadcasting Association award.

Ralph Hacker, station manager of WVLK radio in Lexington, is in the midst of his seventh season as color commentator for the UK sports network. His knowledgable and articulate observations on the game have won for him the respect of UK fans and his peers in

the broadcasting profession.

The popularity of the network is seen in the fact that it was chosen 17 times during the course of last year's football and basketball seasons to be featured on the American Services Network, beaming the UK games to a world-wide audience.

The basketball network is administered for the University of Kentucky under the terms of a contract with Jim Host and Associates, Inc., a Lexington public relations firm. The Host firm also administers the UK football network and

the NCAA basketball championships network.

In addition to WHAS and WCKY, other primary stations on the UK network are WAMX-FM, Ashland; WLBJ-AM, Bowling Green; WCTT-AM and FM, Corbin; WKIC-AM and WKDQ-FM, Hazard; WSON-AM and WKDQ-FM, Henderson; WHOP-AM and FM, Hopkinsville; WVLK-AM and FM, Maysville; WOMI-AM and WBKR-FM, Owensboro; WPAD-AM and FM, Paintsville; and WSFC-AM and WSEK-FM, Somerset.

Wildcat TV Network Cooking With Microwave

VHF and UHF . . . probably everyone knows that depending on the area in which they are located, the television stations transmit on one or the other frequency. But when you talk "network," whether it be national, like CBS, or regional, like the Wildcat Football Network recently put together by WKYT-TV in Lexington, you're talking microwaves . . . and we don't mean

Network transmissions must be done on a frequency other than VHF or UHF so that only those stations set up to receive the network programs will, indeed, receive them. Consumer television sets are designed to only receive VHF and UHF transmissions.

The first step in putting together a network is to contact commercial television stations in the various market areas. Ideally, the network originator wants those stations which can deliver the largest number of viewers as "network" stations. After network stations have been selected, AT & T sets up microwave lines from the originator station


(during Wildcat football this was WKYT-TV in Lexington using their million dollar mobile unit) to each of the stations in the network. This step is further complicated by the fact that microwaves are "line-of-sight" waves;

they cannot be transmitted through mountains or any other solid object and must be routed around such obstacles.

BROADCASTING

Preparation for the actual broadcast of any Wildcat sports event begins weeks





ahead of the game. Game announcers must research players on both teams, memorizing names, jersey numbers and basic facts and statistics. Basketball games give announcers even more of a challenge due to the swift action of the game and the close proximity of the players to the announcers booth. Most announcers chose to memorize faces and corresponding jersey numbers to be able to deliver a smoother, quicker play-by-play. Denny Trease, sports director of WKYT-TV, says "it's not too difficult memorizing Wildcat ball players, but trying to quick-study the members of each week's visiting team is sometimes pretty tough."

In addition to the research that the announcers do, statistics on all players must be gathered and programmed into an "electronic graphics generator". These stats can be called up during the game and are usually seen by television viewers superimposed over the action.

A couple of days prior to the game, engineers from the originator station, the station which will be transmitting the game to its network stations, arrive at the event location and begin the tedious task of wiring and placing cable for the equipment which will be used during the taping or televising of the game. In Rupp Arena, cable trays are suspended

from the ceiling and engineers string approximately 2 miles of cable along these trays within the arena.

The day of the game, production crews work closely with the engineers and the director to finalize plans. Types of shots and sideline shots are discussed and in some instances, practiced, to determine the very best camera coverage for every inch of the playing area. Everyone is at their place, with headsets to receive directions from the director,


at least an hour before game time.

During the game, the director will preview the pictures from each camera and call out the camera whose picture will be taped. If a shot is missed, there's no second chance; directors have to make snap judgements as to what the television viewer will see.

The taped, or live, show is then transmitted, via microwaves, to the network stations for live broadcast or possibly for taping and then airing at a later date.

Arena Information

FIRST AID

The University of Kentucky and the Lexington Center provide for your convenience and welfare, a First Aid Station on the Purple Concourse. Persons with any type of chronic medical problem are requested to leave their name and seat location with the nurse on duty at the First Aid Station. A person in need of assistance with a health emergency should report the situation immediately to an usher. For University of Kentucky events, all physicians are requested to leave their name, seat location and any other information required to locate them if they receive an emergency telephone call, at the UK Public Assistance station located on the purple concourse between sections 30 and 31. For all other events in Rupp Arena all physicians are requested to leave their name, seat location and any other information required to locate them if they receive an emergency telephone call at the First Aid Room located on the purple concourse between sections 33 and 34. In the event of an emergency, you will be notified at your seat. In order that the activities and program in Rupp Arena not be disrupted, paging over the public address system is not possible.

CARDIAC CARE

In cooperation with the University Medical Service, the University of Kentucky provides a cardiac resuscitation program at all UK basketball games.

LOST AND FOUND

Lost and found articles should be reported or turned in to an usher or a security officer. You may wish to write to the director of arena security and describe lost articles which will be returned if found.

NO HORNS

Horns are not permitted in Rupp Arena and will be picked up at the entrances. Be considerate and allow your neighbor to enjoy the game. Keep portable radios at a low volume.

GATE INFORMATION

Rupp Arena will normally open one hour prior to any scheduled event. Please do not leave the arena until the conclusion of an event or game or at half-time if you plan to re-enter. No "Passout" tickets will be issued and you will not be permitted to re-enter.

COURT REGULATIONS

Spectators must keep off the court at all times. Spectators must use the arena stairs and vomities. There are no public facilities located on the arena floor level. Public facilities in Rupp Arena are located on the entry concourse level. You will find all refreshment stands, drinking fountains, public telephones, restrooms, vending machines and first aid on the concourse level.

LIQUORS

Alcoholic beverages are strictly prohibited within the arena as are all food and drink containers including hard surfaced materials of any type, bottles, cans, thermos bottles, ice bags, ice chest, and any object related to above. Arena personnel are instructed to enforce this rule in the interest of safety.

PUBLIC ADDRESS

Messages for the public address announcer are acceptable only in emergencies and must be approved by the Sports Information Director at University of Kentucky basketball events.

SIGNS

Signs and barriers are restricted in Rupp Arena in accordance with policies established by arena management and public safety officials.

U. K. STUDENT CODE OF SPORTSMANSHIP

We, the students of the University of Kentucky, having an abiding faith in the value of intercollegiate athletics as an instrument in promoting friendly relations among universities, do adopt this code of sportsmanship:

- (5) Bearing in mind the rich athletic traditions of the University of Kentucky, we pledge ourselves to a standard of conduct which will uphold and expand this tradition for the future.
- (6) We call upon all who join us in the support of the University of Kentucky athletic teams to join us likewise in support of this code.






TWO LEXINGTON LOCATIONS
