## Family Movies

Interweave and the Women's Spirituality Group of the UU Church are planning a series of videos for pride month. On Tuesday, June 8 and Wednesday June 9, from 7 to 9 we will be showing three videos that make up the Women and Spirituality Series. These films will be of particular interest to pagans, feminists, and anyone wanting to know more about the modern day pagan movement.

We will start with the first two films on Tuesday. Goddess Remembered weaves together the work of archaeologists such as Marija Gombutus, and art historian Merlin Stone with contemporary leaders in the women's spirituality movement to examine how ancient goddess centered cultures may have functioned. The Burning Times looks at the "witch burning" years of the European Inquisition through the eyes of historians and theologians (Starhawk, Matthew Fox). Although it is not specified in this film, lesbigaytrans people as well as women in general were targeted by the witch trials throughout Europe.

On Wednesday night, June 9, we will see the third in the series, Full Circle, which examines present day goddess beliefs and practices. A number of authors, social activists, and teachers are filmed in discussion about why earth based spirituality is of particular importance at this time. We will have an hour for discussing all three films on this evening.

On the remaining tuesday nights in June, Interweave will show gay themed videos at 7:00 in one of the air conditioned classrooms. We will put up a sign on the front door giving directions to the room in case you arrive late.

The video festival begins Tues. June 15 with *Billy's Hollywood Screen Kiss*. This independent film written and directed by Tommy O'Haver spoofs those 1950s melodramatic romances starring Doris Day. Only this time, the lead is gay photographer Billy, who has a crush on a sexually ambiguous new boy in town.

On the 22nd the festival turns to serious drama with the controversial Indian film, *Fire*. The renown Indian director Deepa Mehta wrote and directed this excellent film, which tells the story of the relationship that develops between two women, sisters-in-law trapped in loveless marriages. If you refuse to see foreign films because of subtitles, don't worry, Mehta filmed this one in English.

Finally on the 29th, we'll examine the newest trend in commercial films the gay best friend of a straight woman. The Object of My Affection stars Jennifer Anniston as a woman who falls in love with her gay best friend and roommate played by Paul Rudd. We hope you'll join us Tuesday nights at the UU Church for this video festival. Best of all, it's free. Remember, these titles can change, depending upon availability of videos.

#### GOSSIP REDEFINED

So do your part to support local restaurants. Help yourself to the variety of loud conversations. Remember to use good manners and keep a low profile so that you can hear every single word from the woman seated at the next table. 
