since I came home. Henry is very
well now. I wish I was back.

this be any intrusion on your
part. I guess you were a little
discouraged when you were here
but I will say this one thing but
not to flatter you at all but
I hope you will receive every thing
from me. The impression you left
on my Father was very good but

Mother has not expressed hers yet
but I think that will be all right
I never spend such a week in my
life I have just been in a way
all the time I know Rosa is cross
she send me such a short postal
last week now please be so kind
and tell me what she said to
you when you got back. I would
not have her cross at me for any
thing in the world. if she is then
I will not wait long to see you
of course you know the whole
U.S. cant change me I just have
my mind set. I hope you will
not think I am a little too much
but you know just how I am
and how I talk I write as I talk
too. and when I am writing to
you I know that is as far as
it goes. I am afraid I can not
stand this in your it will be
most as long as I care for till
the 1st of April and what will
a year be I am afraid you will
have to take me with you I hope
you have not changed your mind
any yet. I wish you could bring
Rosa over now real soon I am
awfully in a hurry to see you

five minutes and explain things
to you did you expect me to
write to you first I will not
write to you again now until
you answer this letter even if I
get one from you I have written
twice to you now you know

over. and try and come real

Dear Friend

I received your letter Saturday
I read the contents with great
deal of pleasure I guess I have
read the letter over a goodly time
out still I find I have an aching
void that can not be filled
only by your presence I am
sured I can not endure being
alone this year I never see
in such a way as my life
I think if I could only see you
five minutes I would be satisfied
but if I had that privilege
I know I would not unless
I could stay with you always
I am glad Rosa is not cross
for I trusted her as my only

friend I dont take you just for
a friend I almost think you are
a part of myself. I trust you as
such. how soon do you think
you can bring Rosa over here for
a reasonable excuse. I want a talk
with you so much I cant write
half in a letter and folks do not
know I heard from you or that
I have written to you at all but
you must come real soon and bring
Rosa then I will tell you all.
I hope you were not cross at
me because I told Rosa what it
was but no one else knows
it and they will not I will
tell you when I see you how
I came to tell her. I have heard
from her since I came home but
they did not say any thing
much. you need never fear
I will ever go back on you

never will forsake you as long as
life lasts. I only fear you might
forget that you once loved me I
did not know how much I loved
you till I was separated from
you it seems to break all my
nerves it is wearing on me
most to hard if you dont go
to Buf I am coming to you
I believe I can keep plenty too
I wish you could have been
with me out to my sisters to
dinner yesterday you would have
enjoyed it I know she always
has every thing very nice I am
awful lonely and long for a
welcome to your bosom as my
own dear friend I hope when
we are one we will not
be I like Betham is is he cross
at me I hope not he has no
reason I had if I would have

week Father was not at home

me write to you if she knew
it - but she went to Hingham
this afternoon she told Father and
I was out riding with him
yesterday and we talked about
it - he said it was all right -
as far as he knew any thing
about you - but he said he
would not like to see me ever
many a man that got drunk
and was not decent - but if
you was all right and nothing
wrong and I thought you was the
man for me he said he had
no objections and I would get

of course I told him I did

ashamed now because they collect
as they did they have not written
to me since and I never answered

in on Monday evening a while
well we are having warm
weather now but it is trying
to rain to day again I scarcely

to you that will be interesting
