been reading a daisy book.

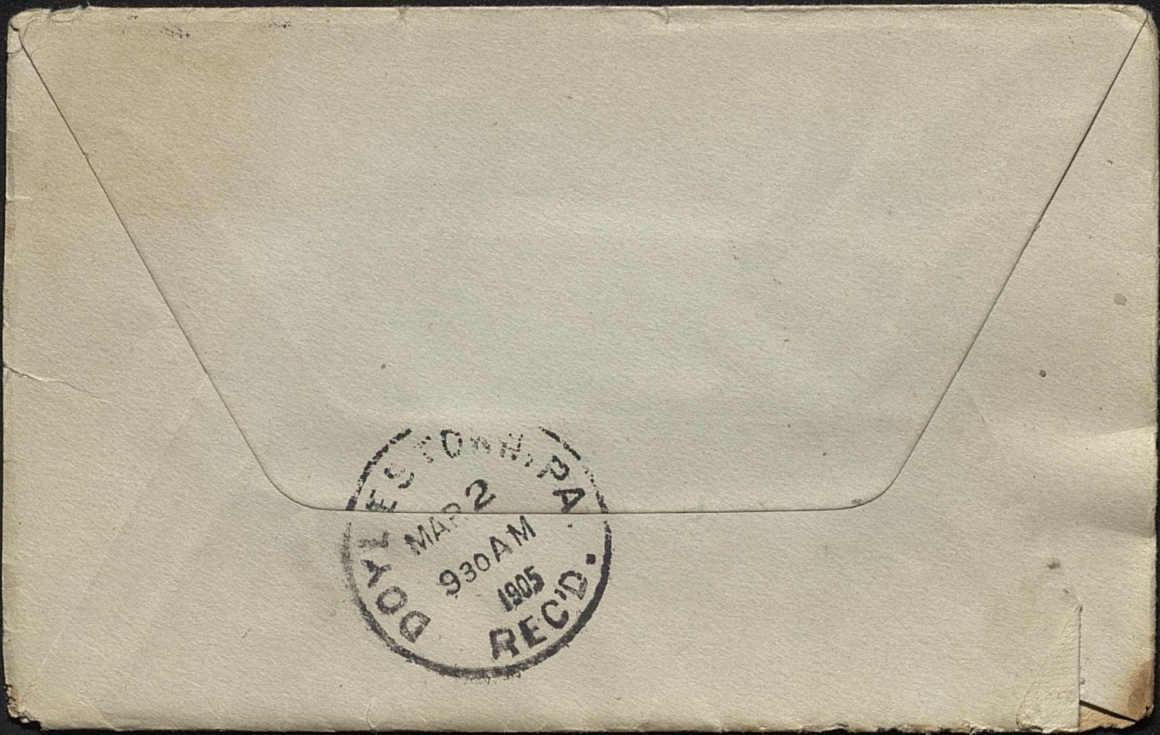
We had the dress-maker noon day,
