from up here the dog?

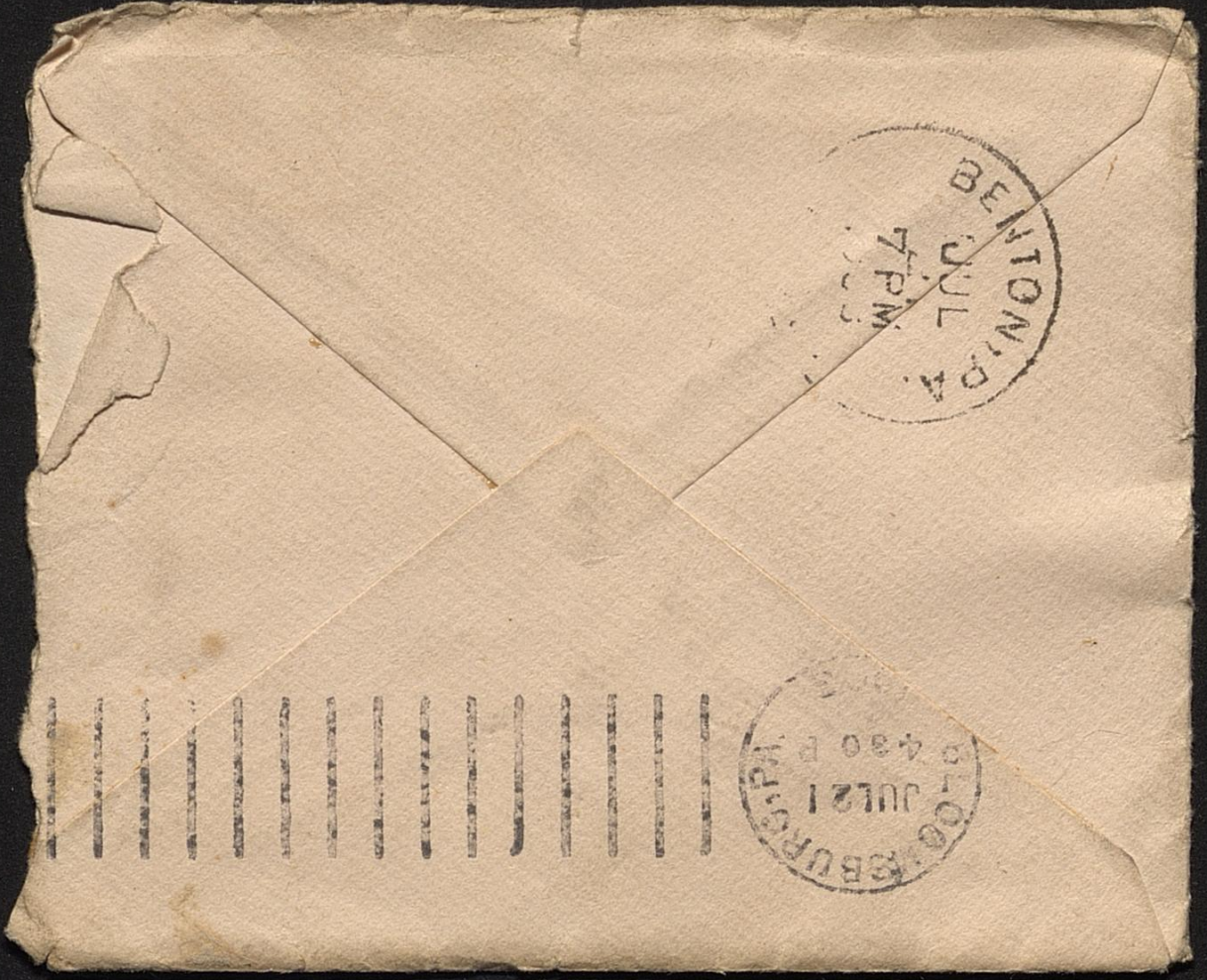

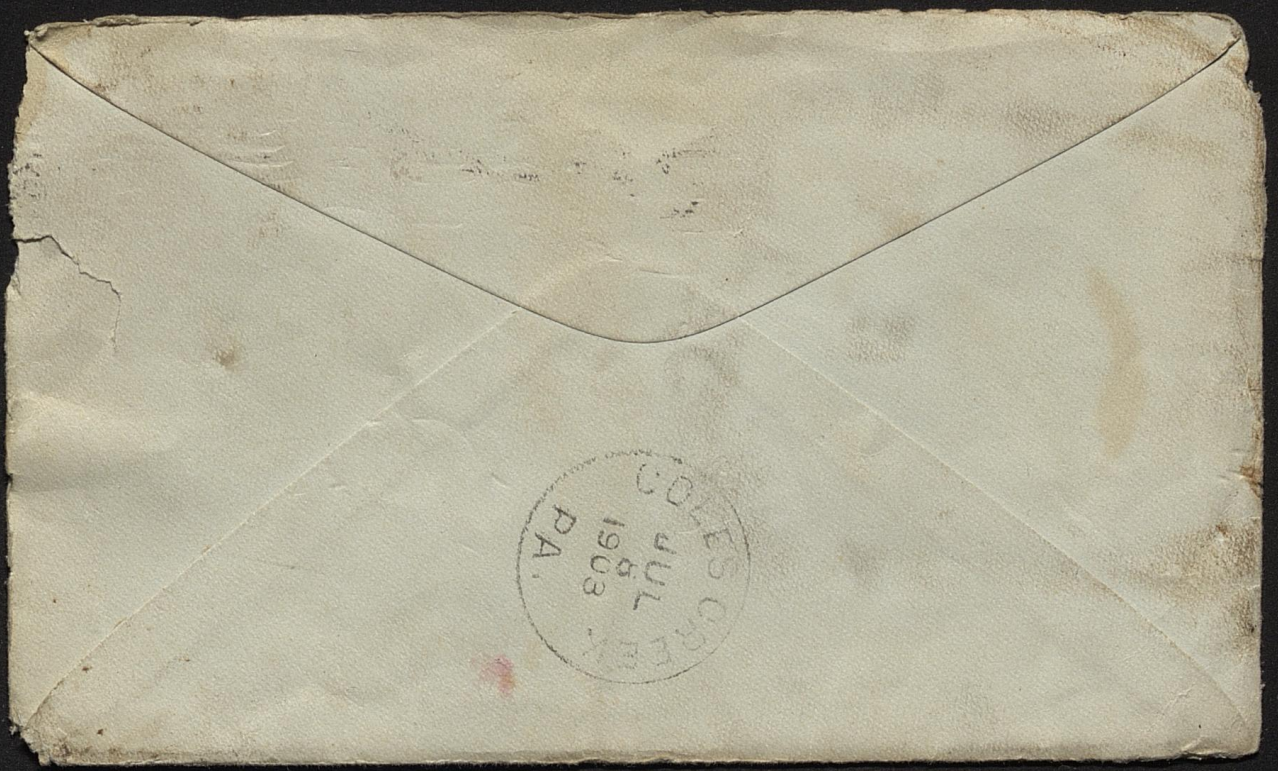

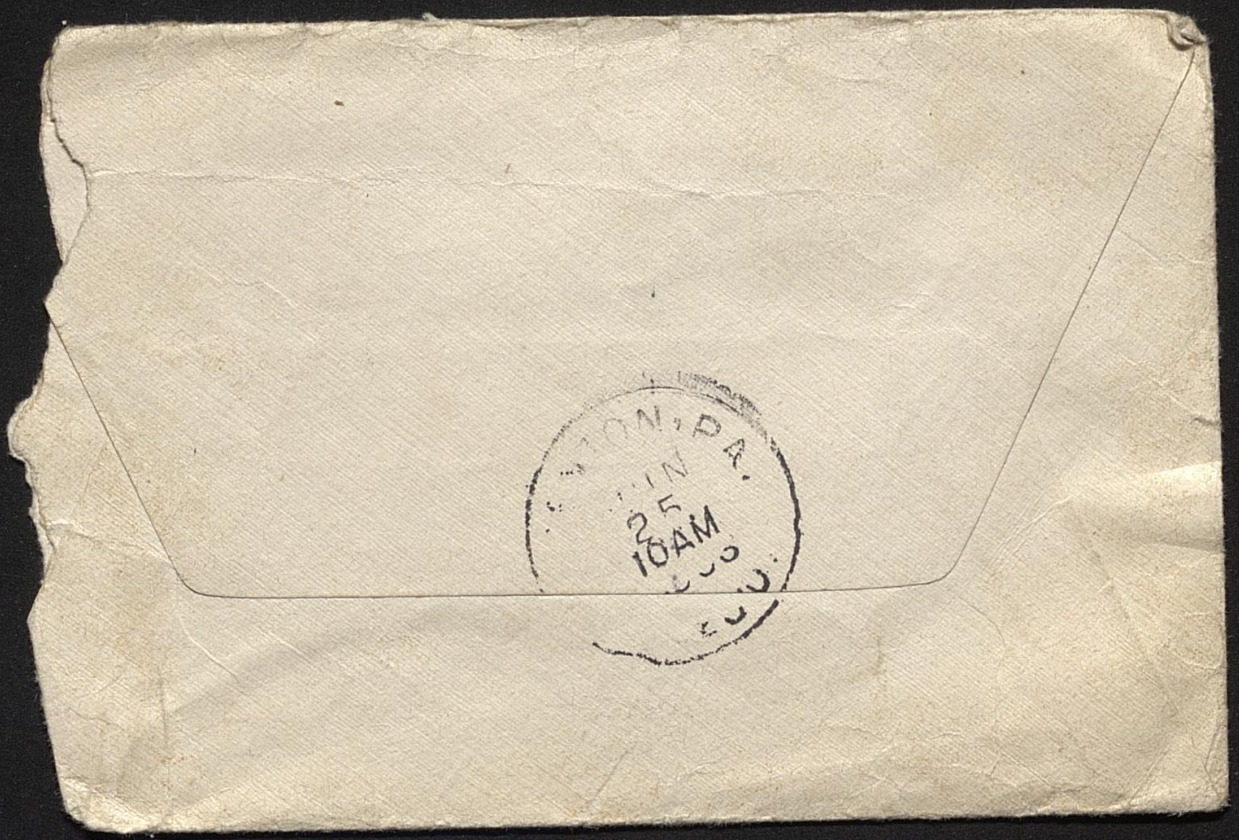
Dear Will

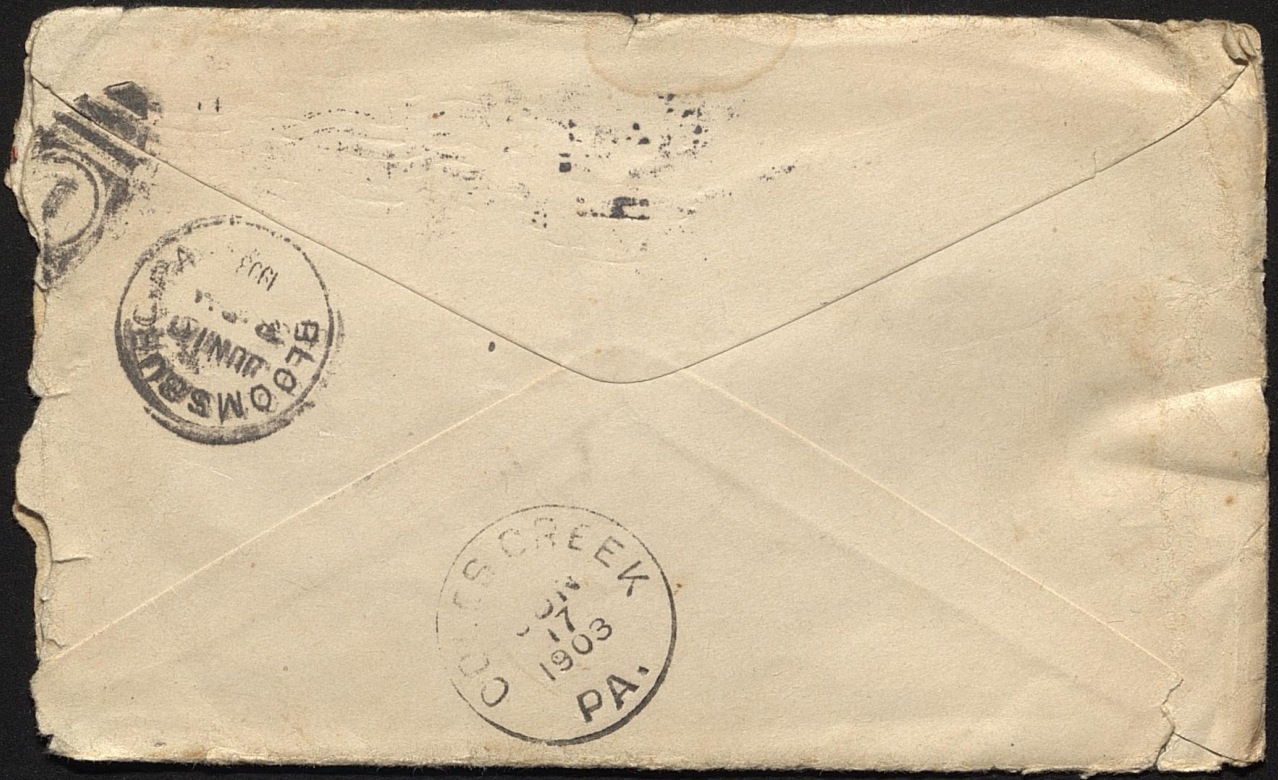

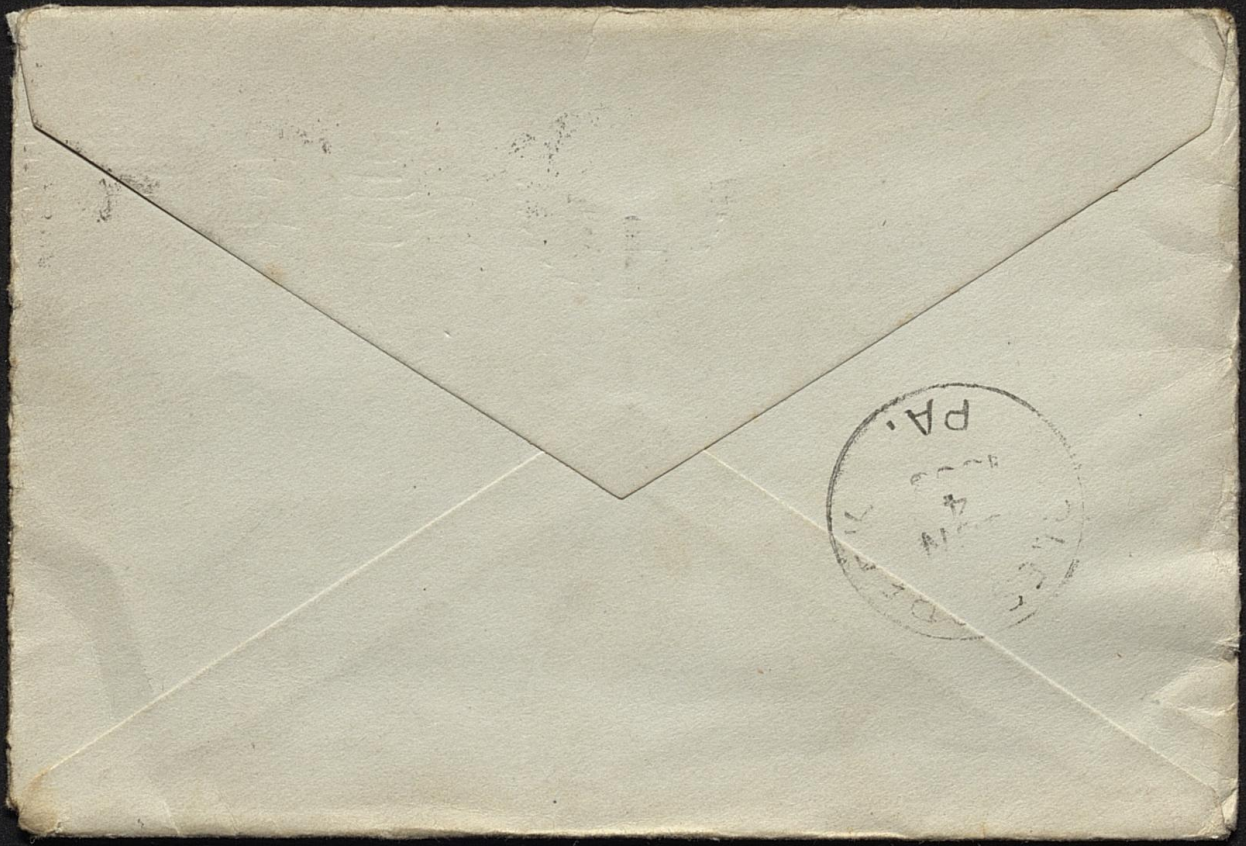

size.

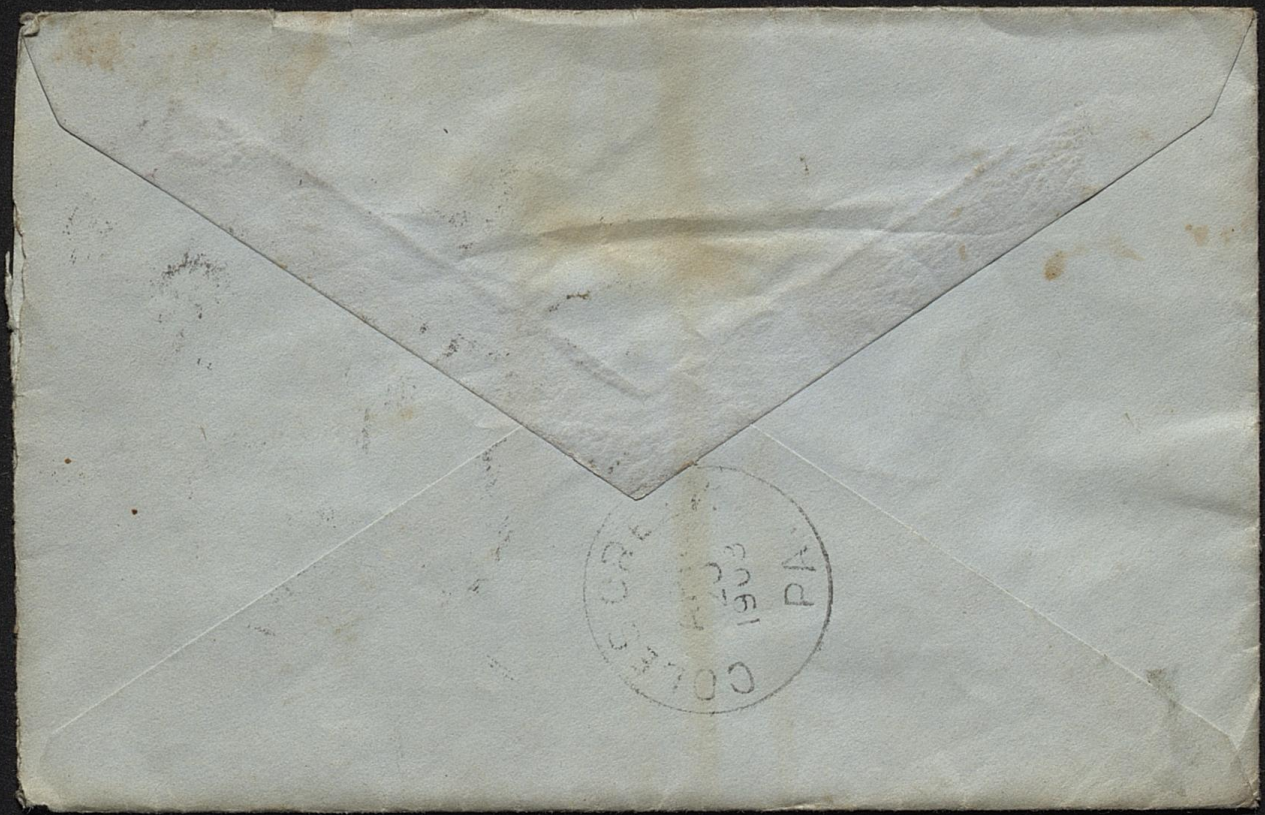

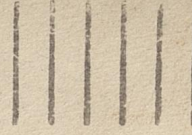
