





for not writing sooner as Will
& Emma wrote, thought I would
wait awhile, then you would have
latter news; Tis very dry here at
present, not had much rain since
I wrote to you last. If it does not
rain before long our garden & small
grain will dry up. We washed yester-
day. Bell & Gracil are ironing. Know
your house looks awfully nice & clean
wish I could see it. Glad you are
having plenty of rain, do hope you
will have bountiful crops of all
kinds. Don't think you go to clear old

Salem Church very often; I hope
the Scarlet fever has run its course back
there; you must try & keep them dear
little children away from it; as it
is a very dangerous fever; I came
very near dying with it when I was
a little baby. The baby must look
very sweet with short cloth; kiss & hug
her all over for me. & sweet Ethel
how I love her! Grandma often thinks
of her. We went to Springfield last
Sunday to meeting Presiding Elder
from Denver was there Bro. Chamberlain
Chamberlain is his name; he read a
splendid good sermon; Was preach-
ing here at our house also last Sabbath
at 3 o'clock will be here again in
4 weeks; you & your little family come
over if you can. O yes I have got my
new teeth 3 weeks ago; Tell you they
was quite a mouth full at first; am
getting a little used to them now; I
cannot chew much with them yet &
am as awkward & with them; lower
part is the hardest to get used to guess
I have got a perfect fit; at first, not
had to work them over one bit; A

Dentist from Kansas Topeka
done the work; he come here about
the middle of last winter; done right
Smart of work before he done mine
but mine was the only whole set;
Some had half a set made; He
come here the very first place too; but
I was almost afraid to trust him

He was so sorrowful to hear of their loss of their dear sweet little Rosebud, darling little baby; gone from the evil to come, just opened her clear little eyes for a short time & then closed them forever on this earth, gone to be an Angel, never ~~know~~ what sin was. Taken in her innocence. Viola wrote that there was such a change in John, said he grieved so much. She said that he said he was going to try & do right. O! I do hope & pray that he will. Poor boy, I am afraid he is not long for this world. I want you all to talk to him give him a word of encouragement to help him in
