2006 Imperial Court Calendar **Bombshells**

The Imperial Court of Kentucky has partnered with Lexington artist and photographer Kurt Gohde to produce "Bombshells, a pinup calendar featuring local female impersonators to be sold as a fundraiser for Moveable Feast Lexington.

The calendars will be unveiled at a reception and Bombshell-themed show at The Bar Complex on November 16th. The reception will start at 8 pm. and the show will start at 9:30 pm. Cover for the show is \$5. Calendars are \$12 each or 10 for \$100. Purchase of a calendar will allow for free admission to the show.

This is Gohde's third calendar in collaboration with the Imperial Court, having produced the immensely popular "Femme Fatale" and "Fairy Tales" calendars in 2002 and 2004 respectively. "Bombshells" features such local favorites as Natalie Gaye, Cammie Dietrich, Phoenix Gaye, J.D. Vaughn, Tracy Taylor, Eden Towers, and Lady Marmalade in all their unintentionally exhibitionistic glory. They are the girls next door whose charms are revealed in that moment when they realize they've been caught in what might be an embarrassing pose.

Gusting winds grab at their long legs. They are ogled as they take what they thought were private baths. Their skirts get hung on tree branches and door knobs and blown into the air by haphazardly-placed fans. The elements conspire to deprive them of their clothing.

Today we find ourselves at war abroad and at home. The war on terrorism and battles for social justice begged for the creation of this calendar. The pinups troops originally placed on their footlockers in WWII were meant to motivate them and remind them of home. These pinups are meant to do the same, yet there is more significance to their existence.

The models featured in "Bombshells" are at times model and soldier. The drag community is often at the forefront of community mobilization efforts (think Stonewall). Here, they are portraying the helpless "girl" next door, yet are just as likely to be unsung activists fighting for equal rights for all Americans and raising money for local organizations that do the same.

SisterSound


SisterSound is rehearsing for its winter concert to be held on January 21. This is our tenth anniversary season and it is not to late to join the chorus as we





What Is Imago?

Imago--this word is from the latin word "Image". The theory is this: We choose partners on the basis of unconscious attraction. We have a template in our brains of familiar love, imprinted upon us as young children by our caretakers.

We could easily come up with 10 traits that we would want in a partner. We find somebody that might have 9 out of the ten traits. A friend says, "Hey how is it with Joe?" And you reply, "No he just isn't the one."

We "fall in love" with the person who has both the negative and the positive characteristics of our caregivers. We see them across the room, maybe we only see them walk, our "antennae" go up....."HEY" Then BAM, we are head over heals in love. And that is what is supposed to be. It is all unconscious.

Our brains are very smart. There is that template that we have built in from the infancy on. Our relationship, this person to whom we were unconsciously attracted, was "meant" to be in our life.

Oh, and doesn't that romantic stage feel good with all those hormones running through our blood stream. But those hormones don't last forever, this stage ends in about two years.! Just as we make a commitment, the hormones stop and then "BAM"- things our partner does begin to drive us crazy!

This is where this "theory" of imago was created. Harville Hendrix was teaching a course about relationships at a University in Texas. But he felt like a total hypocrite because he was on his way to divorce court.

Boomshells Imperial Court Calendar 2006



During the 1930s, pinup art became popular as painted calendars, advertisements, and photographs of legendary icons Rita Hayworth, Marilyn Monroe, and Betty Grable enchanted legions of Americans, including troops stationed abroad during World War II. For many of these troops, pinups were their only links to the homes they'd left behind.

After Esquire magazine began printing George Petty's one panel cartoons featuring seductive women being ogled by mischievous suitors, America's mainstream fascination with the pinup began its long, interesting history. Calendars, magazine covers, matchbooks, and other advertisements offered naughty glimpses into the world of the girl next door. Many glamour models became cultural icons before and after they posed for artists, Marilyn, Judy Garland, Bettie Page, and Joan Crawford, to name just a few.

By 1960, America's fascination with pinups was waning. Paintings became increasingly realistic and explicit, perhaps due to the allure of nudity that was being fed by magazines such as Playboy. Pinup art seemed to have met its demise.

Some forty five years later, pinups have undergone a rebirth. The advent of the internet has allowed for wider distribution of pinup pictures and many artists are still working exclusively in this genre, although digital media are playing a much larger role in their creation.

hardest things in our lives?" he wondered.

Hendrick "dropped out" and started studying and researching relationships. He theorized that we choose relationships "unconsciously" in an effort to heal ourselves, to become whole. But this process does not work smoothly.

However, he found that when we make the relationship process conscious, we can begin to heal the parts of ourselves that were wounded when we were children. We can then learn how to have healthier relationships and become "whole".

Imago relationship work takes you on this journey. There are techniques to help you make your unconscious wants and needs conscious. Both partners make discoveries about themselves and share these with each other. Imago gives us "tools" for good relationships that we were not shown during childhood.

Intentional Dialogue: a communication tool that gives empathic listening, and validation to your world.

Reinvisioning: seeing your partner in a new way. Discovering that they really are on "your team" and do not want to rewound you as happened in childhood.

Re-romantizing: getting the fun and connection back into your relationship.

Our "skin" is the biggest organ in our body. When we were first together, we touch, hold hands but as time goes by we drift apart. We stop laughing as much and doing as many fun things together. Good energy is important to infuse back into the relationship.

Restructuring Frustrations: an important tool to have in our tool box. This is a "dialogue" that we have when our partner frustrates us. In this dialogue we tell our partner what we need from them.

Relationship Vision: what we want our relationship to be, our relationship "mission statement". We write our vision of our relationship in all aspects, sex, fun, communication, vacations, family. Our partner writes their relationship vision, and we combine the two. It is written in the present tense, and gives us the "path" to live the relationship of our dreams.

So what is imago? It is a set of tools to help you get what you need in your relationship. It is the single most effective tool to get passion and intimacy with your partner. GLAD's "Spirit of Justice" Award Given to Unitarian Universalist Association President

UUA President William G. Sinkford received the GLAD (Gay and Lesbian Advocates and Defenders) "Sprit of Justice" award on Sept. 30, 2005 in a packed ballroom at the Boston Westin Hotel. The award, which was presented to Sinkford on behalf of GLAD by Hillary and Julie Goodridge, was given to recognize and honor "those individuals whose work and achievements reflect a profound dedication to our ideal of a just society.

GLAD is New England's leading legal rights organization dedicated to ending discrimination based on sexual orientation, HIV status and gender identity and expression. GLAD filed the lawsuit that became know as Goodridge v. the Massachusetts Dept. of Public Health. Victory in this case in November, 2003, ended discrimination against same-sex couples who wish to be married by the state. On May 17, 2004, Sinkford joined the Goodridges in marriage at the UUA's national headquarters on Beacon Hill.

Reflecting on the changes over the past 16 months, Sinkford observed, "Gay and lesbian married couples in Massachusetts now enjoy the same legal protection that heterosexual couples enjoy. Families have been strengthened; children are better protected. And we have taken a huge step forward in advancing the American ideal of equal rights for all."

"I had the great blessing of being married myself in April, to a woman I've known for 44 years. Back when we met our marriage would have been illegal in 16 states because I'm Black and she is White.

It took 19 years from the time the first state legalized interracial marriage (that state was California) until the Supreme Court made such marriages legal throughout the land in a case ironically named "Loving v. Virginia. 19 years.

I'm angry and I'm frustrated and I bet there are many here who are as well. But I'm also completely committed. Whether it takes 19 months, or 19 years I promise you that I will be speaking up for simple justice. And whether it takes 19 years or 90 years, I promise you that Unitarian Universalism will be standing with you, standing on the side of love. This is a great honor. Thank you so much."



KFA Education Seminar Coming Out: An Opportunity for Self and Community Empowerment By Shannon Stuart-Smith

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Wow! Do people need to hear this stuff. On Saturday October 15, a lucky few were held spellbound by EKU Professor Marta Miranda's fascinating presentation: "The Coming Out Process: A Call to Action" at this year's Kentucky Fairness Alliance (KA) Bluegrass Chapter's Education Seminar.

Do you think you know what it means to come out? Do you believe that coming out is just a personal thing that we all have to just get through the best way we can? Have you ever wanted to tell your best friend you're gay, but can't? Do you know someone who came out of the closet only to turn around and go running back in, or worse, became a homophobe?

Have you felt ashamed when you let yourself "pass" or confused if you retreated back into the closet when you tell yourself you are out and proud? Are you ever resentful of straight people for never having to "hide" their lives, even to the point of not wanting to have straight friends? Then you should have heard what Professor Miranda had to say.

Professor Miranda took all in attendance on a journey through "the stages" of coming out. With warmth, savvy insight, boundless energy, and poignant humor Prof. Miranda combined 30 years of personal and professional experience into an absorbing story that she calls, "the model of identity development."

Prof. Miranda described with painful accuracy the early stages of coming out, one that has both an internal process of self-awareness, shame and denial, the stage she calls, "The closet has a window," and an external component that often includes choosing a safe person to tell our secret to, where "The closet has a visitor."

But the marvel of Prof. Miranda's presentation was that it was not a dry academic talk about the stages of development, or a painful remembrance of things we'd all like to forget, or even an uncomfortable talk about how to come out. The message of the model was one of true validation, one of liberation, and eventually, empowerment. Guess what? The model is the same model of development we all go through, to become human beings, to become adults, to become healthy social beings.

The model is also the same model that predicts the stages of identity development that we all go through to over come other forms of social oppression, such as racism, gender discrimination, classism, ageism, disability discrimination. The model predicts that there are common psychological responses to all forms of oppressions, feelings of anger, feelings of depression when we block expressing those feelings, and even feelings of identifying with the oppressors.

How is this a different message then the usual stories of coming out? Prof. Miranda made clear how coming out, social oppression, and adult development share a common underlying structure or theoretical framework.

What is coming out? Growing up all over again whether you are 16 or 60. Going through the normal stages of development, seeking safety and eventually developing personal responsibility, only this time with a twist. This time we come of age being socially, legally, and politically discriminated No, you are not crazy. against. turmoil of coming out is a real phenomenon, a perfectly normal response to an imperfect situation. And although, just like life, you may not have created all the problems, you will have to learn how to live and thrive despite them.

Cindy Downey, who helped organize and attended the event, is co-chair of KFA

who hosted the seminar as part of its Outreach Community work had this to sav:

"The seminar was excellent! Marta, as always, was very engaging and informative. Although, attendance was low, I truly feel that the seminar accomplished its' purpose. We had someone there who recently graduated from seminary and was just beginning the coming out process - so new to the community that I'm surprised he even showed up. But it goes to show that people need the help and resources that I feel we provided."

"Marta said something that really stuck with me - individuals change public opinion and public opinion changes public policy. I really believe that until the LGBT community becomes more visible (and I don't mean TV shows, etc.) to their family, friends, co-workers, etc. we will continue to fight the same battles over and over."

What was so powerful about Prof. Miranda's fascinating model at this year's KFA Education Seminar? The message was about our right to flourish, to be healthy, to be whole. It never felt so good to feel normal. The feelings we feel, the good and the bad, are all real and painfully necessary, (like the stages of grief) to complete the process that is a journey, with many breakthroughs and missteps along the way, and not a destination. And although silence feels like safety, our silence will not protect us. It is the ultimate act of courage and love to create safety for ourselves and for others by taking the journey to become visible.

A Curious, Wanting Thing: The Charms of the BBC's Fingersmith by Lori O'Connor

Reading a Sarah Waters novel is like watching a movie, so vivid are the author's emotional, physical, and historical details. Waters researched extensively to create the 19th century worlds of her first three novels, Tipping the Velvet, Affinity, and Fingersmith, and her dedication shows in every word. The stories are full of tension, passion, desperation, sadness, and tenderness leaving readers (especially lesbian readers) on the edges of their seats and wanting more.

The Welsh-born, London-based Waters is such a compelling storyteller that it only seems natural that movies would be made based on her intriguing stories. And fortunately two TV movies have been made for Britain's BBC: the controversial but hugely successful Tipping the Velvet in 2002 and most recently the muchacclaimed Fingersmith, which was broadcast in the UK earlier this year and was released on DVD in the US in September.

Fingersmith is a Dickens-inspired, Wilkie Collins-type Victorian thriller and romance set in 19th century England. London con-artist Richard "Gentleman" Rivers enlists Sue Trinder, an orphaned "fingersmith" (a petty thief or pick-pocket), to swindle the young heiress Maud Lilly out of her fortune. A twisting tale of deception, betrayal, and unexpected passion unravels sending the characters, and the viewers, on a rollercoaster of mixed emotions.

Much of the BBC adaptation's success can be credited to the screenplay's faithfulness to the book and to the sensitive and nuanced performances by the lead actresses, Sally Hawkins (Sue Trinder) and Elaine Cassidy (Maud Lilly). The story unfolds in a way that required them to repress their characters' overwhelming emotions and to reveal their

feelings for each other in more subtle ways until the sexual tension builds to the point of inevitable release.

The London-born Hawkins, who also appeared in Tipping the Velvet, is allowed to be more expressive and gives an outstanding performance through the wide range of emotions experience by Sue. Cassidy, a native of Ireland, is more subtle but evocative in the first part of the movie and later stunningly reveals the full depth of Maud's complex character and love for Sue.

Fingersmith also features strong performances by Rupert Evans as Gentleman, Charles Dance as Uncle Lilly, and Imelda Staunton, who was nominated for an Academy Award last year for Vera Drake, as Mrs. Sucksby.

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In a recent interview, Waters revealed that screenwriter Andrew Davies, who adapted Tipping the Velvet, has written a screenplay for Affinity and is shopping it around as a feature film. Sarah Waters' next novel, The Night Watch, set in 1940s London, will be published in February 2006.

Fingersmith will be shown at the Pride Center in December. See our next newsletter for day and time.

Amy Errett, CEO of Olivia, says that ""Gay and lesbian seniors often go back into the closet" when they to go to retirement homes. Errett also notes that some out gays and lesbians in retirement homes have been abused and/or neglected because of their orientation.

Olivia hopes to build 150 residences by 2010 and although Olivia will advertised primarily within the GLBT community, they will sell to straight people. The cost, however, will be high, \$300,000 and up for each unit.
