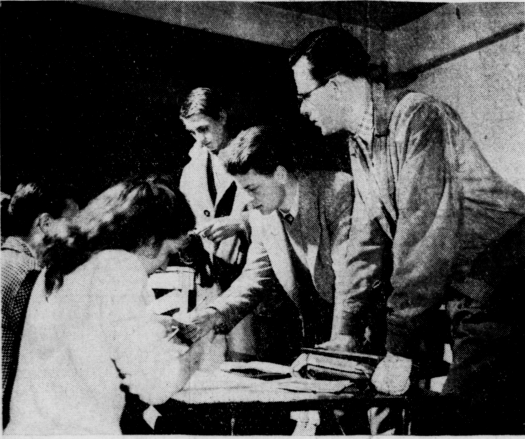

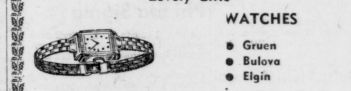

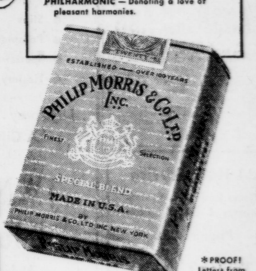

Photo Exhibit Depicts Navajo Indian Life

A photographic exhibit on the Navajo Indians opened Nov. 8 in room 221 of the Social Science Building. It will continue through Dec.

Sponsored by the departments of anthropology, sociology, and geography, in collaboration with Life Magazine, the exhibit is open to the public from 12-1 p.m. and 3-5 p.m. on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday; and from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Tuesday and Thursday.

The 27 photographs comprising the exhibit are mounted on aluminum plates, and are the work of Life photographer Leonard McCombe. The pictures cover the daily life of a Navajo family, illustrating domestic chores, butchering, herding, baking, and primitive business transactions.

The exhibit is being presented in connection with the course, "Societies Around the World," which is a joint undertaking on the part of the social science departments. Approximately 400 students are now enrolled in the course, which makes use of visual materials such as movies and photographic exhibits.

Prof. Frank J. Esene, of the department of anthropology said the University is taking the lead in developing the course, which integrates the several social science fields.

Assembly Approves SGA Activity Budget

The assembly of the Student Government Association recently approved a budget of \$7275 to cover SGA activities for the 1948-49 school year.

The budget is based on expenditures of previous years, and is financed by the \$1 contribution made by each University student through annual registration fees.

The following is a summary of the new budget, by Fred Nichols, SGA treasurer:

1. Student Directory (\$2000). SGA finances the annually published booklet containing names and addresses of all University students. The editorial staff of the Directory is composed entirely of SGA assembly members.
2. The Kentuckian (\$800). The annual SGA appropriation for the yearbook varies with the size of the student body. Technically, the \$800 is in payment of the pages on which junior and senior classes' pictures appear, thereby eliminating the necessity of a blanket assessment of juniors and seniors for the pages devoted to activities of those classes.
3. Clerical and Stenographic Expenses (\$250). This is a fixed annual expenditure and is used to defray expenses for supplies and clerical help in the SGA office.
4. Election Expenses (\$100). This sum covers costs of ballots, election publicity, and incidental expenses for the two campus-wide SGA elections held each year.
5. Social Fund (\$1000). Most of the social fund appropriation goes for the annual Senior Dance, given in the spring for graduating seniors. Included are such items as rental of the ballroom, and cost of the orchestra.
6. Vocational Guidance (\$500). This amount covers costs of lectures and other general aids to the student body to be presented during the school year.
7. Keys for SGA Assembly (\$125). The SGA budget annually includes an item for the purchase of keys to SGA assemblies.
8. Freshman Orientation (\$300). SGA works closely with other departments of the University in the Freshman Week program each year. "College Night," including a dance in the SUB with an orchestra, is financed exclusively by SGA.
9. Freshman Handbook (\$500). The appropriation for the K Book pays most of the expense of its publication each year. Although other organizations contribute, according to the space devoted to them in the booklet, SGA furnishes the largest single amount.
10. Convocation and Forum (\$800). At least once each year SGA brings an outstanding speaker to the campus. This event is financed by the budget, as are other similar projects.
11. Convention and Travel (\$500). This section of the SGA budget is broken down as follows: National Student Association annual dues, \$300; travel to the annual convention in August, four people at \$75 each to Milwaukee, \$300.
12. Contributions and Solicitations (\$100). This item is intended to take care of needy campus projects affecting the entire student body, and not for off-campus solicitations.
13. Miscellaneous (\$200). This is a fund set up to take care of unforeseen emergencies.

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Player Of The Week: Ralph Genito Miami Game

Fullback Ralph Genito has been selected for Player-of-the-Week for his splendid running in the Miami tilt last Friday night. Genito scored Kentucky's first two touchdowns—the initial one coming early in the game and the second late in the third quarter. In the final period, the Wildcats pushed across two more TD's to tie the game.

Quarterback George Blanda, played his final game for the Big Blue was outstanding both in passing and punting. He completed nine in 17 serial attempts. Other standouts for the UK eleven were Johnny Melhaus, Wah Jones, Jerry Chalhorne, Bob Cain, Lloyd McDermott, Harry Ulinski, Doc Perrell and Pat James.

Harold Woodell, sophomore from Beckley, W. Va., scored his first touchdown for Kentucky with a pass interception and a five 7-yard runback into paydirt as the game ended.

Genito Goes For 82 Yards
The Kentucky-Miami game was only two minutes old when Ralph Genito, running like a deer in front of a forest fire, scored on a beautiful 82-yard dash to put the Cats ahead 6-0. Then in the third quarter, he scored again on fourth down from the one-foot line after the Miami line had stiffened to stop John Melhaus, Clayton Webb and Genito in three previous back.

Miami Mistake
In one of the Miami papers before the game there appeared the following item:

"Keep an eye peeled for Ralph Genito. He has averaged 45.9 yards per carry and is the speedster Midget's Andy Gustafson said 'probably will run over us.'"

The typographical error was corrected in a later edition, but Genito did average over 45 yards per try in his first few runs as a result of the 82-yard sprint in the first quarter. He boosted his 4.5 average yards per try for the season up, as he gained a total of 128 yards in 17 runs for an average of 8.1 against the Miami eleven.

One Season Left
Ralph has one big season left. He is expected to have his best year in 1949, as the foot-footed Pennsylvania came along fast in the final six games of this campaign.

He is the older brother of Carl, UK's No. 2 quarterback. Both were stars for Duquesne, Pa. High a few years ago, Ralph is 24 years old, while Carl is 26.

They only played two games together in high school, for Ralph was playing his last season when Carl was just a freshman.

In three years as regular fullback for Duquesne High, the 176-pound back and his teammates lost only a total of four games. He was selected as All-Western Pennsylvania and second team All-State after scoring 16 touchdowns in his senior year.
