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## NEW UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY ATHLETIC COUNCIL ORGANIZES AND TAKES UP WORK

The new athletic council of the University of Kentucky, recently appointed by President McVey and approved by the University Senate, has held its first meeting and organized. At this meeting Doctor J. J. Tigert, head of the Department of Psychology, former football star, and coach of the football team of 1916, was elected chairman and Professor H. E. Curtis, member of the staff of the experiment station and secretary-treasurer of the former athletic committee, was elected to hold a similar position on the new board. The by-laws of the new association were adopted and the old association declared an end.

Secretary Curtis read his financial report covering athletic activities for the current session which, although track and baseball engagements are yet to be played, shows a satisfactory balance placed in the hands of the council to begin the work of the new organization. This financial report was ordered prepared for publication at a later date.

The council then proceeded at once to the general discussion of a coach for teams for the forthcoming year. Names of a number of men, some of whom are of national repu-

tation, were presented and informally discussed. No definite action was taken but a committee of the council was appointed to canvass recommendations and make a report at a meeting to be called at an early date by the chairman.

The council's purpose is to choose both a resident coach and a special or field coach, provided satisfactory men are available. The council also discussed improvements in the athletic field, notably a concrete stadium to supplant the existing wooden one. While no definite action was taken in this matter it is hoped by the council that it may be able to construct such a stadium by building a section of it annually.

## University Faculty Man Gets Notable Honor

In recognition of the notable work on the Homoptera by Doctor W. D. Funkhouser, head of the Department of Zoology, University of Kentucky, Doctor V. Lallomand, great Belgian Entomologist, has, in the last issue of the "de la Revue Zoologique Africaine" named a new insect for the university professor.

The insect is a new species of ceropid discovered in the Belgian Congo, Africa, and rejoices in the name of Loeris Funkhouseri. The honor is unique and is regarded as a fitting and impressive recognition of the scholarship of Doctor Funkhouser, who is one of the most eminent scientists in this country in his particular field of instruction and study.

## Miller's Book Reviewed By Professor Schuchert

The latest issue of the American Journal of Science contains a review of "The Geology of Kentucky," a book published by Professor A. M. Miller of the Department of Geology and Forestry of the state of Kentucky and Professor of Geology at the University of Kentucky. The review is written by Professor Charles Schuchert, Department of Geology, Yale University. In substance Professor Schuchert says:

The Woman's Club, the Business Woman's Club, the city Y. W. C. A. and a number of other organizations are already preparing programs to be given in the theater this month.

The Campus Playhouse is a miniature theater complete in every detail, with a seating capacity of approximately two hundred. Scenery has been made for it by students of the College of Engineering and draperies are being prepared by the class in dramatic production.
