Again this year, several members of the organization have been nominated to the community's highest award - The Pantheon of Leather, to be presented in Chicago this July. The club has also been nominated to receive the Pantheon's Small Club of the Year award.

Over the years the organizations membership has included many titleholders, including several Mr. Kentucky Leathers, Mr. International Rubber, Kentucky Leather boy, to name a few.

Imperial Court of Kentucky Begins Reign 27

The Imperial Court of Kentucky concluded Reign 26 in early June with its annual Coronation Ball. Empress 26 Lawren LaMoore and Emperor 26 Brad Shepherd welcomed visiting courts and local guests to several events including the In-Town Show, Out of Town Show, the State Dinner, and an After Party at Bang Nightclub. The weekend culminated on Sunday, June 8th, with the Coronation 27: Wonka's Circus Trip.

Coronation was well attended by the community and visiting courts with nearly 200 attendees filling the Grand Ballroom at the Radisson Plaza Hotel. A circus and Willy Wonka themed opening production featuring many of the court's members and volunteers, wowed the audience. Several entertainers from visiting courts performed for the crowd as well and there were also final performances from Empress Lawren and Emperor Brad.

The annual elections of the court were held that evening. Incoming board members for Reign 27 will be Jason Asher, Louis Vite, Dary Royse and Brad Shepherd. They will join John Ridener, Richard Hembree and Donnie Royse, who were elected last year to 2-year seats on the board. Daryl Royse was elected to the newly created position of Parliament Member, who will represent the Imperial Court of Kentucky at the International Imperial Court Parliament. Donnie Royse was elected as the alternate for that position and they will both represent the Kentucky Court in San Diego later this year a the inaugural Parliament meeting.

Highlighting the evening was the election and crowning of the new monarchs for Reign 27. Eve St. Mychal was elected as Empress 27 and


Lexington Insight







Rediscovering Our History GLBT Publishing in the Nineteenth Century

How long has positive material about LGBT people been openly published? Where are the newsletters, books, poetry and articles that make up our history? We have a rich history but, no doubt, more has been destroyed than we know. Several of the articles or lists I found in my search to answer these questions started their accounts of publications in the second half of the Nineteenth Century, ignoring earlier work. They were also Eurocentric, which has limited what I can write about at this time.

We clearly have written about ourselves for centuries. Sappho wrote poetry about women loving women on the Isle of Lesbos in 580 BC. Much of her work was burned. Perhaps a topic for a later article.

German activist Karl Heinrich Ulrichs, a pioneer of the LGBT rights movement, was one of the earliest published authors of gay related material in Europe. Ulrichs came out publicly in 1860 when he published books about same-sex love and gender variance. Ulrichs coined the term *Uranians* to describe people with a range of gender expressions and same-sex desires. He considered himself "a female psyche in a male body".

The word "homosexual" first appeared in German in an 1869 political pamphlet by Karl Maria Kertbeny (the pseudonym of Karl Benkert) to protest the inclusion of sodomy statutes in the constitution of a unified German state. (the legal antecedents of the infamous Nazi Paragraph 175)

In the 1890s, Havelock Ellis and John Symonds co-authored the first English medical text book on homosexuality, Studies in the Psychology of Sex, Volume 2: Sexual Inversion. They used the term

"inverts" and stated that homosexuality was not an illness, criminal activity or immoral. The book was suppressed and in 1897 a bookseller was prosecuted for stocking it. Ellis is sometimes said to be the person who first used the term 'Homosexual' but he said "(It) is a barbarously hybrid word, and I claim no responsibility for it." In addition to supporting inverts, Ellis supported a woman right to use birth control (considered radical at the time), the need for eugenics to build a better human race, and sexual freedom for adults. Eugenics became a cornerstone of Hitler's reign something unforseen by Ellis.

Ellis married Edith Lees in 1891. Lees was an English author and proponent of women's rights. She was openly in relationships with women and did not live with Ellis for most of their marriage. This "open marriage" was the central subject in Ellis's autobiography, My Life. A number of books authored by Havelock Ellis including the ones listed here are available on Amazon. Some of them are new editions of his work. Indicating that they are still relevant The most expensive book found in my search was by" Stories and Essays, 2 volumes, " by "Mrs. Havelock Ellis" (yours for \$325).

Among the earliest publications addressing GLBT issues was a scholarly journal dedicated to the study of homosexual concerns published in 1899 by Magnus Hirschfeld. Jarhbuch für sexuelle Zwischenstufen, the first journal for the study of issues of interest to homosexuals. Hirschfeld collected materials concerning human sexuality from around the world. However, Hitler's rise to power included the ransacking of Herschfeld's institute. One of the most famous pictures of Nazi book burning was one taken as every book in Hirshfeld's collection was burned as his Institute was smashed.

Hirschfeld nevertheless had an impact on other people writing about and researching human sexuality. In the United States, Kinsey based some of his research on Hirshfeld theories and published articles.

Although often published in academic journals, Urlichs, Ellis and Hershfeld were read all over the world. People who knew they were different were hungry for new ways of understanding themselves. The following article about Radclyffe Halll demonstrates the connection between their scholarly research and the growing number of authors who used their ideas in poetry and fiction.

Radclyffe Hall The Well of Loneliness

Marguerite Radclyffe Hall was born in England in 1880. She grew up in some isolation from her parents but her father's wealth provided her with a means of support as she created a life for herself as a writer. Her first publications were books of poetry and a number of poems were put to music. They were quite popular up until the time of the First World War.

In 1907 Hall met and fell in love with Mabel Batten, a well-known amateur singer who was 51 and married. After Batten's husband died they set up residence together. Batten gave Hall the nickname John, which she used the rest of her life. Mabel died in 1916.

Hall described herself as a "congenital invert", a term taken from the writings of Havelock Ellis and other turn of the century sexologists. Hall had relationships with many women throughout her life, possibly including American blues singer Ethel Waters. Lady Una Troubridge was her most consistent friend and love, Una named three of Hall's books including The Well

of Loneliness...

Hall's first novel was *The Unlit Lamp* published in 1924. It told the story of Joan Ogden, a young girl who dreamed of establishing a home with her friend Elizabeth and studying to become a doctor. Hall discribed how intolerance and social isolation made Joan's life miserable. The book was long and depressing and did not sell well.

Two years later she published Adam's Breed (1926), which became her most critically accalaimed novel. The story concerns a Italian headwaiter who stugggles with his identity and eventually gives away his belongings and lives as a hermit in the forest. The book's mystical themes have been compared to Hermann Hesse's Siddhartha. It sold very well and won two significant prizes, Prix Femina and the James Tait Black Prize, a feat previously achieved only by E. M. Forster's A Passage to India.


Hall is best known for *The Well of Loneliness*, the only one of her eight novels to have a character that identified as an invert. Because of the success of Adam's Breed, Hall believed that her growing audience would be willing to read a story about a masculine female who was an appealing and sympathetic person. Self published in 1928, the book was immediately banned in Britain due to it's lesbian theme even though it was not sexually explicit. The book was allowed to be sold in the United States after a long court battle.

The novel concerns a girl born into a wealthy English family at the turn of the century. Her father, Sir Phillip, desperately wanted a boy and names his daughter Stephen. Sir Phillip sees that his daughter is different and seeks to understand her. He reads Karl Ulrichs theories and gains an understanding of his daughter. (This is one of the ways that Hall used the work of sexologists to explain her characters and educate her readers.)

Stephen grows up to be a masculine woman who identifies as an invert. She falls in love but feels compelled to forsake the woman she loves in order to protect her from a life of ostracism. We might consider this internalized homophobia today, but for the time period it was a realistic ending.

The Well of Loneliness sold more than 20,000 copies its first year and paved the way for other works with lesbian themes. Through this book, Hall was successful in educating and influencing public opinion about women loving women. For years, it was one of the only books available for women struggling to come to terms with their sexual orientation. Today, some people feel that Stephen is best understood as a transsexual character. Indeed, Radclyff Hall might have considered herself transsexual if alive today. The Well of Loneliness is number seven on a list of the top 100 lesbian and gay novels compiled by The Publishing Triangle in 1999.
