Dearest little boy:

The very first thing I'm attempting this morning is to write my sweetheart. I say the first thing, it really isn't the first — I got up and dressed, washed myself and combed my hair for the first time. I can walk all around up stairs and will get down stairs maybe today. Then next week I can go out doors. I am being very careful, maybe more than really necessary, but this influenza is so dangerous it pays to be careful. The doctor isn't coming any more, but left me a tonic and cough medicine, and told me just what to do.

I knew that papa + mama were planning to pay my doctor bill and I didn't want them to. So I told Mr. Warren when asked to say he couldn't tell just what it was but would mail it in. And I gave him my Hanover address. He did just what I told him. I do hope the bill won't be forwarded while I am here at home. I expect it will be around twenty dollars. Mama already paid him five dollars. But most of the Detroit doctors charge four dollars a call, but I
