It wasn't because she didn't understand the subject matter, but because she was unable to cope without fear at most of many who suffer from test anxiety. #### Civil war threatens aid delivery

WASHINGTON — The government of Ethiopia has blocked the delivery of tons of emergency American food aid to areas of civil war in that country, an action that threatens to spread starvation, U.S. officials said yesterday. "It is just unconscionable," said Peter McPherson, administrator of the Agency for International Development, describing restrictions on the movement of food shipments to provinces in northern Ethiopia.
