Clinton tour hits campus

President Bill Clinton and first lady Hillary Rodham Clinton will be on campus today at 4:30 p.m. to address an election-eve rally of supporters on Administration Lawn.

Event organizers expect between 10 and 15 thousand people to visit UK for the rally.

UK Basketball Coach Rick Pitino, actress and UK alumna Ashley Judd and the musical group REO Speedwagon along with several other entertainers will be at the event, the last rally before tomorrow's election.

According to Clinton's Kentucky communications director, Ernie Gibble, the President plans to use the rally to drum up support for Kentucky's Democratic U.S. Senate candidate Steve Beshear.

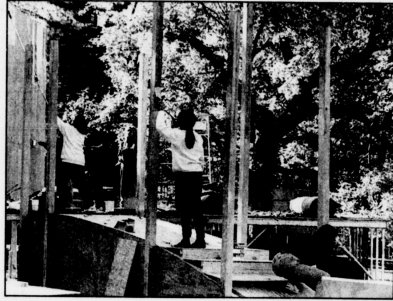
A number of Democratic candidates will speak prior to the President's address.

Gov. Paul Patton and Sen. Wendell Ford will be campaigning with Steve Beshear today.

Democratic candidates will not be the only individuals playing their party tunes today.

Some of the commonwealth's top bands, winners of Saturday's Kentucky Music Educators Association Marching Band Championships, including bands from Nicholas, Mercer, Harrison and Lafayette counties will perform during pre-rally festivities.

will perform as a part of the pre-rally festivities.

A number of local candidates including state Rep. Ernesto Scorsone, 75th District candidate Kathy Stein and countless Democratic leaders from throughout the commonwealth will be in attendance.

"This will be a rally we will remember many years from now," Dale Howard, a political science junior said.

"President Clinton will be one of the first Democrats re-elected

in many years."

A few UK students plan to let their Republican voices be heard at the rally.

"I may be voting for Dole, but I believe it is quite historic that President Clinton will be here," David Thomas, an economics sophomore said.

"I want to hear what he has to say, because it is obvious he will win the election."

Rally organizers plan to provide food and drink for rally participants.

Gates will open at 1 p.m. and Democratic candidates will begin to address the rally at 2 p.m. today.

The visit of the president and the first lady is being sponsored by NextGen, the Student Government Association and UK Young Democrats and College Democrats.

Angry vets rally against senator

A number of veterans across the state are now harshly criticizing the military records of Senator Mitch McConnell.

Citing a story that appeared in the Kentucky Kernel last Friday, the Vietnam Veterans Association held a rally Saturday at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial at the State Capitol in Frankfort.

The chapter raised questions about McConnell's military and health record and allegations that the junior senator from Louisville received preferential treatment to avoid military service.

James A. Hinkle, vice president of the VVA, addressed a crowd of participants, which included representatives from veterans groups around the commonwealth.

"More than 58,000 died in Vietnam, we speak for them today," Hinkle said.

Hinkle said McConnell received special treatment to avoid serving in the military at the height of the war.

"Why won't the senator release his medical records and why won't the junior senator release his military records?" Hinkle said.

"Why is he trying to hide?" McConnell was highly critical of President Bill Clinton's military record during the 1992 campaign.

"We agreed with McConnell in 1992 and we think the same is true now with McConnell's military service," Hinkle said.

"What is McConnell's explanation?" Marvin Runyan, a Vietnam veteran from Louisville is angry

about McConnell's decision to not release his military records.

"This man got a powerful senator to write a letter and get him out and then he used the excuse that his eye was itchin," Runyan said.

At one point during the rally, Hinkle became enraged while speaking about the UK College of Law graduate.

"Senator McConnell has done nothing for veterans in Washington."

Les Johns, chair of UK College Republicans, called the allegations against McConnell a last ditch effort from Democrats who he thinks do not have a chance of winning the senatorial seat.

"They are at the end of their ropes," Johns said.

McConnell's franking Just days before the election, McConnell used taxpayer money to send out unsolicited campaign-style mailings defending his decision to cut Medicare and Medicaid.

"The Senate does not allow unsolicited mass mailings this close to the election precisely to keep abuses like this from happening," U.S. Senate nominee Steve Beshear said.

In 1990, McConnell voted against eliminating the use of franking for unsolicited mass mail in HR 2348.

By September of 1990, McConnell had sent 848,040 pieces of mail at a cost to taxpayers of \$138,010.

McConnell has spent more than four times the amount Sen. Wendell Ford (D-Ky.) spent on mass mailings since 1985.

"Apparently \$12 million in special interest campaign contributions aren't enough for Mitch McConnell — now he's using taxpayer money to finance his campaigns," Beshear said.

Representatives of McConnell's campaign would not comment on the matter.

Journalist to speak on campus

How does a person go from a life of crime to a reporter at a major newspaper? This question is answered within the life story of Nathan McCall.

McCall, a best-selling author and reporter for the Washington Post, wrote in his book, *Makes Me Wanna Holler*, about his experiences as a street hustler, gang member and convicted felon. In his own life, he showed the self-hatred that young black men felt and how they expressed it.

He also showed how this hatred was visible in his relation to black women.

McCall believes that black men grow up with hatred, despised and feared, which turns into an inward hatred and makes them become self-defeating and violent.

In an interview with the *Oracle*, McCall said that "people proceed in life according to how they perceive their futures, too many young black men think that they have no future."

While serving time in prison for armed robbery, he read Richard Wright's *Native Son* and it changed his life. The main character, Bigger Thomas, lived a life parallel to McCall's. The feelings of restless anger, hope-

lessness and false appearances among blacks and a deep fear for whites were familiar to McCall, yet he didn't know how to express them.

Wright's book led McCall to books about religion, philosophy, anthropology and history. He also received guidance of older men in prison and a spiritual awakening.

Also in an interview, McCall said in prison, "I learned a very important lesson about life in general and my life in particular, I came to understand that race and violence didn't make me a criminal or not to commit a crime or resort to violence."

He said that race does dehumanize and dehumanize you, and people that are dehumanized are more apt to choose violence because violence is considered less than human. McCall will speak tonight at 8 in Memorial Hall. Admission is free and all are welcome.

Steve Beshear addresses student concerns Friday

Steve Beshear, Democratic candidate for U.S. Senate, implored UK students to find their way to the polls tomorrow for their own benefit when he spoke at the Free Speech Area Friday.

"This election is more vital to students than any other group of people," Beshear said. "It will determine the future of students."

Beshear was introduced by former Kentucky Governor and Chair of the UK Board of Trustees Ned Breathitt, who described him as being "very committed to public service."

Breathitt's comments were followed by a brief introduction from Student Government Association president Alan Aja. "I've chosen to support Steve Beshear because of his willingness to support student issues," he said.

With a moderate crowd in attendance, Beshear discussed primarily student issues. "I want to make sure you will succeed in the 21st century," he told the crowd.

Beshear explained his concerns about the Republican attempts to cut educational funding, saying that such cuts would prove drastic to students' futures.

He said last year Congress attempted to cut \$11 billion from the student loan program and additional funding for the Head Start program.

He said such drastic cuts would prevent many Kentuckians from receiving higher education.

"They (Republicans) are proceeding on the idea of 'if they've got it, fine, if they

don't, too bad."

"I want to make sure that those loans will be there for those that don't have it."

Beshear also advocated the restoration of research and development funding, an area which has recently suffered cuts.

"We need to restore research and development funds," he said. "They are extremely important to the future of education."

He also cited the need to keep the Department of Education on the federal level.

"There are two reasons why we should keep the department on the federal level. One is that it does a good job of giving aid to those who need it. We should also have a cabinet level office for education. Someone that would have direct access to the President to help solve some of the problems," Beshear said.

Beshear differed with Republicans on the issue of tax cuts. While Bob Dole and other Republicans advocate cutting taxes, Beshear said there are more important issues at hand, one being education.

"Taxes are not the priority," he said. After his speech, Beshear fielded questions from the crowd.

One student asked his opinion of the welfare reform act, to which Beshear responded, "Welfare reform has the right idea, but some folks might fall through the cracks."

Another student, a veteran of the Gulf War, asked Beshear about his views on federal funding for veterans.

"We need to support our vets, and they (Congress) have been cutting it year after year," Beshear said.

"We need to make sure they get the medical benefits they need, and that they get the funding that they need."

CONTRACT Girl defends Christian T-shirts

DELAWARE, Ohio — A school that discouraged the wearing of satanic T-shirts is trying to decide whether to extend that policy to all religious messages, including Christian ones.

That doesn't sit well with eight-grade Sarah Hyatt, whose wardrobe includes shirts with the slogans "Pray Hard," "It's a God Thing" and "Jesus."

"I've been wearing these shirts since the sixth grade, and nobody has said anything until now," the 13-year-old said Friday.

"There's nothing wrong with them. They're not offensive."

The issue arose a couple of weeks ago when students who wore shirts with satanic themes were asked by school officials to leave them at home, said Principal Santha Stall-Friedman.

The principal said she hopes they will make a recommendation to the school board this week.

UK sheds apathy; eases past Dawgs

There may be no "I" in "team," but there is "ez" in "Muzzey," as UK middle blocker Jenny Muzzey made things look easy.

Muzzey helped lift the UK volleyball team over the visiting Georgia Lady Bulldogs yesterday, 15-9, 4-15, 15-6, 15-13.

Although the Cats won the match, they continued to play shiftless volleyball for the early portion of the contest.

But in the third game, Muzzey decided to take control. The sophomore from Smyrna, Tenn., became a one-woman wrecking crew, torching the Lady Bulldogs with .545 hitting over the final two games. Though Georgia set up dozens of blocks in an attempt to slow her down, UGA learned the hard way that a confident Muzzey is a major liability.

"We weren't playing well and I felt like it was needed," Muzzey said of her third and fourth game dominance. "I feel that I'm looked to and I wanted to come through."

And come through she did — to the tune of .419 hitting for the match, including a team-leading

17 kills and seven blocks. In addition to a big offensive performance, Muzzey helped shut down Georgia's super-freshman Rebecca Dady. For Muzzey, shutting down Dady became a personal vendetta.

"She seems so cocky to me," Muzzey said. "I just wanted to get in there and put her away."

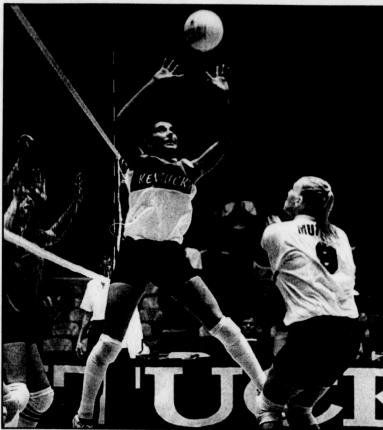
Coming into the match, Dady had been hitting .280, averaging a Southeastern Conference-best 4.63 kills per game. But the UK front line silenced the Dawgs' boisterous hitter, allowing Dady a futility — .039 hitting percentage.

"Dady is the key for Georgia," Ralston-Flory said. "She carries an unbelievable load and she has to be tired. If she goes, they go."

And so UGA went. Aside from their second-game win, the Dawgs' hit a miserable .051.

On the other side of the net, UK outside hitter Gina Heustis helped the cause, notching 14 kills and 14 digs. Katie Eiserman chipped in with a .375 hitting performance, yielding nine kills.

The win moves the Cats to 11-14, including a 7-3 SEC record. They now prepare for a home-and-home against Tennessee this weekend.

Wildcats lose 3-1 on Senior Night

Vanderbilt came into last night's game against UK with a 12-5-1 record and had gone through the Sun Belt season undefeated. On top of all that, the Commodores were winners of seven of their last eight games.

Make that eight of their last nine.

UK played a lackluster second half and came out with a 3-1 loss to Vandy on Senior Night. It was the final home game for the four seniors: Sean Endicott, Greg Lobring, Toby McComas and David Muse.

UK captured a 1-0 lead before halftime on a score by Sean Mondelli at the 22:32 mark off an assist from McComas.

There was some excitement in the first half when a Vandy defender grabbed Endicott as he dribbled into Commodore territory. Endicott swung an elbow, touching off a skirmish. Both teams were separated, but no cards were given out.

In the second half, however,

the Cats lacked the same fiery emotion.

"It happens to us all the time," Endicott said. "We didn't play that much worse, but the own goal killed us."

The own goal came at the 70:31 mark when UK's Jason Bell knocked the ball past goalie David Muse. The team never quite recovered, while Vandy seemed to feed off the Wildcat miscue.

The Commodores followed the gift with a goal from Colin Danaher at the 78:21 mark. Vandy's Brian Hinkey crossed to Danaher who knocked it in off of his chest.

About nine minutes later, Danaher sealed the game, scoring on a penalty kick.

UK came into the game without three of its starters: Lobring, junior Brian Baltzell and freshman Rob Frey. All are listed as day-to-day, but none will see action on Wednesday against Marshall. Freshman Todd Stonestreet went down to injury in the second half, but his status was unknown.

Cats split in weekend Invitational

UK held their own with the Badgers and played a better game than Wisconsin, but sometimes the team that plays the better games leaves the field with a loss.

That's what happened to the Cats. After playing scoreless soccer for more than 87 minutes, the Badgers Mara Miller scored on a counter attack to give Wisconsin a 1-0 win.

There were numerous opportunities for the Cats to score.

At the 62-minute mark UK's Carrie Staber had a breakaway opportunity but was stoned by Wisconsin goalkeeper Julie Johnson and at 78:47 Staber had a header off a free kick which was stopped by Johnson.

The No. 12 Cats outshot Wisconsin, had more corner kicks and controlled the tempo of play against the powerhouse Badgers.

"I thought we deserved to win it. That is how close we are to being a top ten team. It gets frustrating."

But after a day of rest, UK came back yesterday afternoon to battle Northwestern.

Much like Friday's disappointment, neither team was able to find the back of the net for more than 80 minutes.

This time it was UK who pulled out some late game heroics.

Ironically it was a freshman who scored at 85:14 to give UK a 1-0 win on senior day.

UK's Allison Peppers scored with assists from senior Torie Hesser and junior Kim LaBelle to give put the Cats on top.

"It's sad. It's real sad," Hesser said. "You choke up but it's great to look back on the great four years on the fact that we all did a lot to help this program out. I think all eight seniors feel that way."

Over the past four years, the seniors compiled a 53-27-2 record, won UK's first Southeastern Conference women's soccer title and appeared in the Cats' first NCAA Tournament last year.

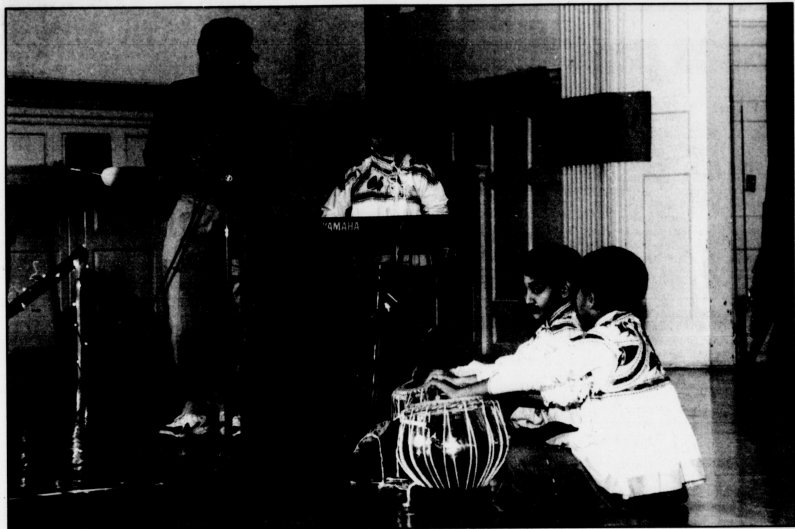

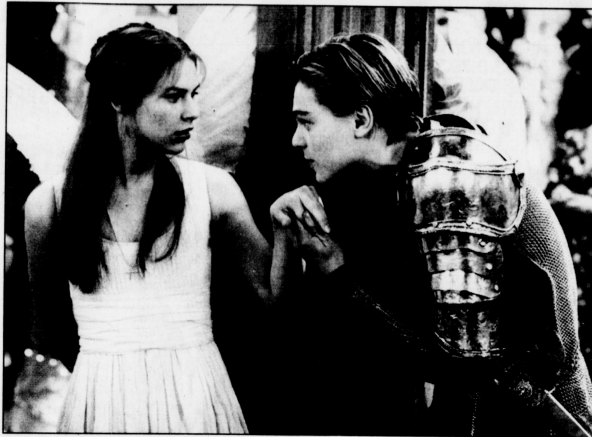

The Greatest Love Story Ever Told Just Got Better

William Shakespeare, welcome to 1996.
Baz Luhrmann (*Swing Kids*) has brought the greatest love story ever told, *Romeo and Juliet*, into a modern day setting and it has all the impact that it had when it was first introduced in the Globe Theater exactly 400 years ago.

This modern version captures the Bard's vision of passion, violence and recklessness that is essential in *Romeo and Juliet*. And instead of working against the complex language that has made Shakespeare so dif-

icult to perform, this cast embraces, conquers and makes the language their own.

Leonardo DiCaprio (*What's Eating Gilbert Grape?*, *The Basketball Diaries*) and Claire Danes (*My So-Called Life*, *Little Women*) do an excellent job portraying the star crossed lovers in fair Verona Beach. Their characters are believable, and even though you know what's going to happen to the two in the end, you hope with all your heart that things work out.

The first ten minutes of the film seem choppy. Relying on MTV camera angles and computer graphics to name the characters, the mood and atmosphere of the film is quickly set. In these days, the

Montagues and the Capulets own the biggest corporations in Verona Beach, and Captain Prince rides around in a helicopter keeping peace in the city.

After the opening scenes, however, the film quickly smoothes out. DiCaprio hits line after line, making a *Romeo and Juliet* with the *Butthole Surfers* in the soundtrack very believable and very real despite certain oddities.

Powerful scenes abound in the film. For example, when the two lovers finally meet, you can feel the emotion emitted between them. With their passion, they suck you into the film and don't let you out. A strong supporting cast also propels this movie.

Pete Postlethwaite (*The Usual Suspects*), John Leguizamo (*To Wong Foo, Thanks For Everything, Julie Newmar*) and Paul Sorvino (*Nixon*) work wonderfully, and hold this powerful film together.

The best thing about this film is the lack of elitism. Director Luhrmann has made a film that appeals to everyone, as evidenced by the crowd. The sold-out show Saturday night was full of rednecks, frat boys, punks and alternatives all happily seated together.

Traditional straight-edge Shakespeare fans may not be too thrilled with this interpretation, but if you have an open mind you are in for a wild ride.
