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Lexington Fairness By Craig Cammack

Lexington Fairness has been active in the community 18 years. We have seen a lot change throughout those years and are proud of the service we've been able to offer. But, as time changes, so does the responsibility of our community organizations. Now is the time for Lexington Fairness to find partners and allies and spread the word of fairness further into the Central Kentucky region.

Over the past year, Lexington Fairness has worked with likeminded organizations through the Statewide Fairness Coalition. The goal of this group is to bring together voices from around the state to work on broadening the rights of the LGBT community in the commonwealth. Other founding group members include ACLU of Kentucky, Fairness Campaign, Kentucky Fairness Alliance and Kentucky Commission on

Human Rights.

Through organization of the Statewide Fairness Summit in Frankfort, young and old were able to come together and share thoughts and visions on what issues need to be tackled and The organization is also confronted. putting together the Kentucky Advocacy Day on February 24th, which will include training on how to be a citizen lobbyist, as well as a rally being held at the Capitol Rotunda. Lexington Fairness is excited and proud to be a member of this group.

As important as partnerships with other LGBT-oriented groups are, Lexington Fairness also recognizes the need to connect with complementary community groups. We truly have our heart committed to collaborating with local high school and college Gay Straight Alliances, working alongside Imperial Court of Kentucky, AVOL, JustFund KY, Moveable Feast, GLSO

and Lexington Pride Festival. We all work together for a wonderful cause. But, in order to reach out to more allies and supporters, Lexington Fairness is venturing outside our safe zone.

We are excited to be involved with the Lexington Art League for the upcoming Passing: Fashioning Drag exhibit and performances. This event examines the history, art and craft of drag in Kentucky. The state has been deeply steeped in drag history and the exhibit and performances are about bringing the knowledge and craft for the general public to enjoy. Not only will this be an entertaining event, but, it will also be extremely educational, as most citizens do not understand the background Kentucky has with this art form. We hope you will be able to support this exhibit and performances, coming to Lexington April 23 - June.

Additionally, as part of Lexington Fairness' membership with the Statewide Fairness Coalition, we were able to meet with African delegates during a World Affairs Council. Talking with the 20 representatives from across the African continent, all coalition members were surprised how few rights these represented countries provide to their LGBT community. It truly was an educational experience for us, but, we found that the representatives were also educated in how we are able to form a coalition from different organizations, while focusing on distinct goals. Again, Lexington Fairness is proud to be a part of this coalition and have the opportunity to learn from such educational experiences.

Finally, Lexington Fairness is looking to continue community partnerships with churches, arts organizations, social work organizations and others who share complementary visions. We are currently examining ways we can work with the Kentucky Classical Thea-Conservatory's tre

Spotlight on the Beautiful People... by Welena Wandbasket

This column shines the spotlight on people in the community that deserve recognition. Beauty is not always skin deep and these "beautiful people" either devote their time and energy to a worthy cause or just plain make our lives better by entertaining us Either way, it is time that they are recognized for their talents and efforts.

Our spotlight for the month of March is on "Daddy Wayne" who was raised on a farm 5 miles from the town of Benton, Kentucky. He moved to Lexington in 1984 to go to UK and remained



after obtaining a Bachelor of Architecture Degree in 1988. Daddy Wayne has been partnered with Wayne Swope for nearly 17 years. They currently have no pets.

DW: "A pet would probably not survive at our house, because we are never home long enough to provide the proper care for a pet. My community involvement includes being the current President of the Board of Directors of the Imperial Court of Kentucky; Emperor 27 of the Imperial Court of Kentucky, and also the Imperial Crown Prince 26 of the Imperial Court of Kentucky. While reigning as Emperor last year, I chose to dress in Renaissance-themed attire inspired by the Showtime Series "The Tudors". There is a wonderful designer in New York City, David Menkes that created my initial look. Thereafter, many of my outfits were designed by Patrick Howell, here in Lexington."

HH: What would you consider

your favorite charitable organization here in Lexington and why?

DW: "The Imperial Court of Kentucky. This organization has been important to me for many years as it should be for any gay, lesbian or transgendered individual in our community. This organization has a long standing record of raising much-needed funds for other non-profits in our region and beyond, all while providing great entertainment. Very few charitable organizations have such an impressive record of financial credibility. Most of our donations are raised \$1 at a time by individuals who give of their time and talents to help us raise money."

"The Imperial Court has a Board of Directors comprised of nine individuals who work tirelessly planning events and keeping the organization operating as a business. Each one does so without any compensation other than the fulfillment they get from "Giving Back" to the community. Isn't that what "Charity" is all about."

"Most people in our community may not know that the Imperial Court of Kentucky is part of something much greater. The Imperial Court System is one of the oldest and largest predominantly gay organizations in the world. Court System was The Imperial founded by Jose "The Widow Norton" in 1965. Currently there are 66 court chapters in the USA, Canada and Mexico. Each chapter works to raise money for their communities. However, last fall all chapters combined their efforts to raise over \$90,000 for the Matthew Shepard Foundation which is dedicated to eradicating hate crimes in the USA."

"The Imperial Court of Kentucky was a huge contributor to this effort raising \$8,000 for this cause. This just proves that we have one of the hardest working and dedicated group of individuals right here in Lexington as well

as a very generous community that helps us reach our goals. This is especially true this year, as the Imperial Court of Kentucky has currently raised over \$50,000 for our charities (as of the publication of this article). To recognize our accomplishments, the International Court Council has honored Lexington as the host of the 45th Anniversary Gala this year. This event will spotlight our community and recognize gay rights activists from all over the country. "

HH: I am sure people want to know more about Daddy Wayne, the individual. Tell me about yourself.

DW: "My favorite music to listen to is dance, R&B, Jazz, Pop and some Country. My favorite color is purple. As far as a favorite movie, Beaches is still at the top of my list. I have a few favorite TV shows: The Tudors, Brothers & Sisters, White Collar, Drop Dead Diva, Project Runway (Thank God for DVR). My favorite actor is Jonathan Rhys Meyers and my favorite actress is Sandra Bullock.

"The book I am reading right now is The International Building Code, although if you are not an Architect or Engineer this is not a book I would recommend. My dream vacation would be to go to Greece to tour the remains of Ancient Greek Architecture."

"What attracts me to a man most I suppose would be a man's smile but then I would work my way downward! If I was stranded on a desert island, the three people I would want to be there with me would be my partner of 17 years, Wayne Swope. If there has to be two more, I'll go with Jonathan Rhys Meyers from The Tudors and Eddie Cibrian from CSI Miami. I'll design us a hut and watch them build it!"

"The biggest misconception or false rumor about me is that in the past people have implied that I am not very approachable. I am basically a quiet person until you get to know me. Having been an Emperor, I was forced to come out of my shell a little. Growing up, my older brother always told everyone that I only spoke when I had something important to say, then watch out!!"

DW: Everyone would treat others with the respect and courtesy that they expect for themselves.

HH; I strive to make the world a better place by...

DW: Doing everything I can to raise awareness for the GLBT community and raise funds for those in our community that are less fortunate.

HH: The thing I would most want to be remembered for would be...

DW: Shortly after Wayne and I met, his Father told him that I was a hard worker and a good person. That is good enough for me!!! In all honesty, I really do not require much praise for anything that I have done. I believe that truly charitable acts are done so without regard to oneself or expectations of recognition.

HH: Daddy Wayne, I know you are a busy person so it means the world to me that you took the time for this interview. I honor all that you do to make the city that I live in a better place. I wish nothing but love and success for you always. Thank you Daddy! Miss Helena loves ya.

Who Love's Ya?


We have taken a look at two of the more prominent scriptures the institutional church uses against us, but what does the Bible say about who we are in Christ? For the next several weeks we will be looking at a number of verses that describe who we are as Christians and how God sees us. I highly recommend that you read these verses at least once a day and preferably out loud to help you internalize the value God the Father holds for you.

I am loved! "The Lord has appeared of old to me saying: Yes, I have loved you with an everlasting love; Therefore with loving kindness I have drawn you." Jeremiah 31:3. An everlasting love is one that never ends. The scriptures tell us that nothing can separate us from God's love, Rom 8:35. God loved me so much that He gave up His only son to die a horrible death on the cross so I might be able to live in eternity with Him, John 3:16; 15:16. I once felt so unlovable that I couldn't believe that God loved me. I hated myself and was unable to accept any type of love from others. But gradually God began to show His love for me through His people (a group of gay Christians).

Little by little my heart softened and I saw just how much God did love me. Then I had to go through the difficult process of learning to love myself. The one thing that helped me the most was praying that God help me see myself as He saw me. Before Jesus died, He left us two commandments: Love the Lord your God with all your heart, strength, and mind, and love your neighbor as yourself. We are unable to do either of those until we are able to love ourselves in the same way God loves us. Always know that you are loved!

I am accepted. "To the praise of the glory of His grace, by which He made us accepted in the Beloved." Ephesians 1:6. Christ redeemed us, He chose us before the beginning of the earth. He has adopted us as sons and daughters by the blood of Christ. The Greek word for accepted means: to endue with special honor, to be highly favored. This is really an important point to truly get, as many of us are not accepted by our families, friends, co-workers, or our church.

There are many different reasons why some choose not to accept another, but the One who truly matters, does totally accept us. He is able to look through our flaws and see the one He created. The one He desires to be in relationship with. We are accepted by Christ.



I am a child of God. "But as many as received Him, to them He gave the right to become children of God, to those who believe His name." John 1:12. This blends in well with the previous verse in Ephesians. As Christians, we have been adopted by God to become His child with all the positives that go with being royalty, more on that later.

I was raised in foster homes from the time I was 10 years old so the one thing I wanted most in the whole world was to have a family. When it finally sunk in that I was a child of God, I saw that I did have a family, a large family, the family of God. Like most all families, this family of God is not without its problems and conflicts. Like in a natural family, these problems/conflicts do not make me any less a part of the family. There are times I might want to run, or avoid certain members, but that's ok. I am a child of God.

I am Jesus' friend. What better friend to have then Christ. He walks with you, never leaves you, gives help when needed, encouragement, strength, a shoulder to cry on, a hug when you need to be comforted. "Greater love has no one than this, than to lay down one's life for his friends." John 15:13. We have a friend in Christ. In the words of Christ, "You are My friends if you do whatever I command you." John 15:14. His commands were simple, to love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, and might, and to love your neighbor as yourself.

I say it's simple but actually it can be pretty difficult when you do not love yourself. Besides praying for God to help you see yourself as He sees you, there are affirming scriptures to recite to yourself such as "For You formed my inward parts: You wove me in my mother's womb. I will praise You, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made; My frame was not hidden from You, when I was made in secret, and skillfully wrought in the lowest parts of the earth." Psalm 139:13-15. What a friend we have in Jesus.

I am a joint heir with Jesus, sharing His inheritance with Him. "The Spirit Himself bears witness with our spirit that we are children of God, and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ. If indeed we suffer with Him, that we may also be glorified together." Romans 8:16-17. The Greek word for heir denotes a joint participant, coheir, and fellow heir, one who receives a lot with another. I could write several pages on this truth alone.


Jesus, as the son of God, receives everything the Father has. So as a joint heir I also receive everything God has. God has patience, love, endurance, strength, power over the enemy Satan and so much more. As His child we have all that as well. It's just a matter of learning how to access it. When a family adopts a little baby, that baby takes on the name of the parents. With that name comes identity, a sense of belonging, in some cases power, and a right to all that name implies. We are joint heirs with Christ.

I pray that God helps us all to fully understand and accept the truth and power in these five facts: We are loved, we are accepted, we are children of God, Jesus is our friend, and we are joint heirs with Christ.
