From The Rabbi's Study

The recent effort on the part of the Israeli government to bring the Falashas of Ethiopia to Israel and the unfortunate halting of this effort because of the publicity which occurred has highlighted the tragic plight of this long forgotten Jewish community. They have lived in the northern part of Ethiopia and are primarily farmers and craftsmen. They are relatively poor and have eked a precarious existence as a minority in that country.

Over the years there have been efforts to assist some of the Falashas to get to Israel. The American Committee for Ethiopia Jewry has spearheaded this work, visiting the Falashas in their home territory, as well as helping those who escaped by walking for almost two weeks through the desert to Sudan to get to Israel. However, the number of people so assisted was small, and many of those who attempted the trek out of Ethiopia did not survive the rigors of the journey.

Thus, the long awaited efforts of the Israeli government were greatly applauded by those persons who know the history of the Falashas' efforts to seek refuge in that country. We can only hope that this aborted work of saving lives will be able to be resumed very soon.

To help the plight of the Ethiopians, the Temple has sent \$50 each from our Tzedakah Fund to the Joint Distribution Committee, Operation Moshe and the Shaare Zedek Hospital in Jerusalem which is tending to the medical needs of Falashas who arrive in Israel. If you wish to add to this sum, as one member has already done, send your donations to the Temple office with the recipient appropriately designated.

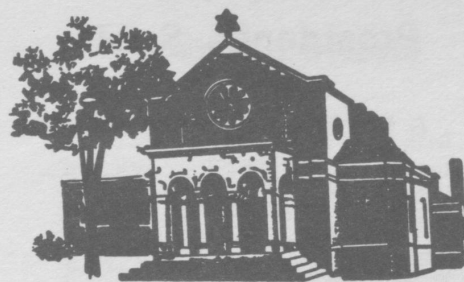

A UNIQUE OPPORTUNITY

These are but a few of the subjects which we have the opportunity to address and build upon for our future.

I hope that each of you will attend the meeting on February 3 in order to consider the recommendation of your Board. I look forward to seeing each of you there and all of us taking advantage of this unique opportunity.

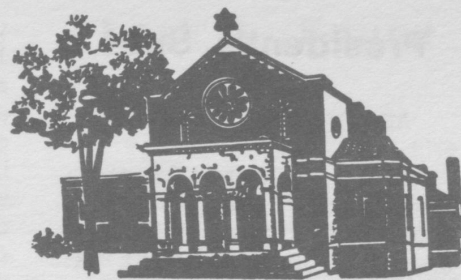

From The Rabbi's Study

In the current issue of Moment, a bi-monthly Jewish periodical which we have in the Temple library, there is a series of articles on church-state relations. In one of these articles, Ted Mann, a lawyer and past chairman of the Conference of Presidents of Major Jewish Organizations, speaks of the Jewish concern to maintain the separation of church and state, and our willingness to use the courts to help us in this effort.

He compares this current situation with how we as American Jews behaved in the 30's and 40's when the American Jewish community tended to perceive itself in terms of "outsiders", "guests" in this country, where most Americans were Christians.

Today, Mann asserts the situation is very much different. We have achieved a "sense of at-homeness" as Jews in America, not by "shucking our Judaism", but rather by feeling "free to assert ourselves as Jews".

Mann documents his thesis in a most cogent fashion, concluding that the continuing battle for separation of church and state through the use of the courts "is ours to wage".

Very much akin to this topic is a letter which we received recently asking for our support for the Jewish Advocacy Center in its efforts to help a synagogue in Silver Spring, Maryland, which was defaced by Anti-Semitic graffiti, bring suit against those persons who desecrated their building. This is a historic action. Instead of sweeping "this incident under the rug, the synagogue" responded by filing a landmark civil lawsuit against all the men involved in the desecration, with whatever monies are recovered to go to the County Human Relations Commission "to fund its education

views, if you would like to express them, are certainly welcome at the meetings. It goes without saying, however, that each time we struggle with these questions, I am thankful that we have such a beautiful and functional facility which has given rise to the dilemma.

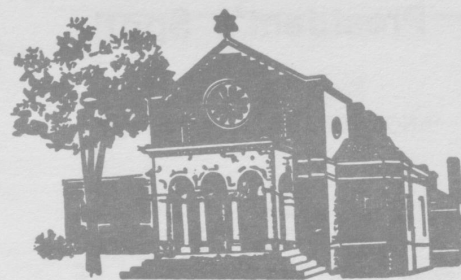

From The Rabbi's Study

Stuart Altshuler died on February 15. He was eighteen years old and had been President of his temple youth group in Milwaukee. He had suffered from leukemia for about five years and had come to the Bone Marrow Transplant Unit at the U.K. Medical Center as a last hope.

Stuart's parents, Roger and Rocille McConnell, came here knowing no one in Lexington. They were concerned not only for Stuart's condition but that they might be strangers in a strange city. They made two phone calls, to me and one other person in the Jewish community. We in turn made some calls and in no time the McConnells discovered that we had opened our hearts and homes to them in so many ways that they were overwhelmed by our Lexington Jewish hospitality.

The McConnells also had many friends and family come to visit them here. None of them were allowed to stay in a motel. Our homes were open to them too. They were overwhelmed by the outpouring of love and caring that we showed for Stuart and his family to such a degree that they spread the word of what we were doing in their congregation in Milwaukee as well as in a congregation in Minneapolis. Our "caring community" here in Lexington quickly became a model for two other communities to emulate.

After Stuart died, I accompanied the McConnells on their sad journey home so that I might be present and participate in the funeral. Stuart was much beloved at home and there were more than two hundred people present to hear him eulogized, and also to hear his rabbi speak of how we had shown our caring for Stuart and all of his loved ones who had been here during his illness. I was teary eyed when he spoke of how we had reacted. It was a great tribute to Lexington Jewry.

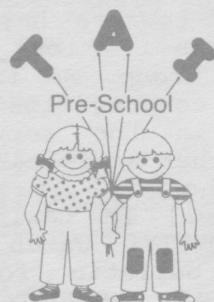

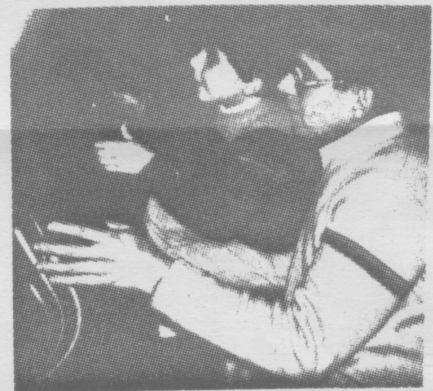

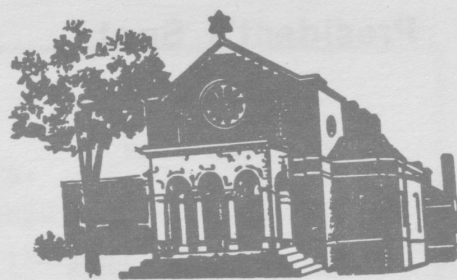

From The Rabbi's Study

At the recent awards banquet of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, our past president, Stan Rose, was one of the recipients of this year's recognition. I am sure that you read of his accomplishments in the newspaper articles about the dinner.

During the late 60's and early 70's, I worked closely with Stan in many of his efforts to improve the civil rights picture here in Lexington. It was a time of a good deal of tension - between those persons and groups who did not want to see changes occur and those who did. Fortunately, the changes did occur and they took place here without the turmoil that went on in other communities.

Stan's award, as well as the recognition of Abby Marlatt who was very much involved in the civil rights movement of the time, triggered many memories and reactions. I shared them with Stan and quoted below are two of the paragraphs of my letter to him, which I share with you also.

"I recall working closely with both you and Abby on so many endeavors of the Lexington Committee on Religious and Human Rights in the 1960's and early 70's, especially in the area of housing integration and overcoming the narrow views of the newspapers. It was a struggle worth making! And while the situation is far better today than it was two decades ago, there are still pockets of residual attitudes that continue to need attention. The awards focused in on both what has been accomplished, as well as what still remains to be done.

"In Jewish tradition, one of the legacies that we can leave our children is what is known as an Ethical Will, in which we state the values and standards by which we have lived and which, in addition to our material possessions, we want to bequeath to our

President's Spot

AN EXCITING TIME

I am writing this article fresh from attending the Board meeting on March 7. As the Board meeting progressed, and as various activities coming up in the next two months were discussed, each of us on the Board began to feel a sense of excitement which I thought appropriate to share with you.

In May, the U.A.H.C. is sponsoring, in Lexington, a weekend on parenting and congregations from this general area are being invited. You have already received one communication describing the plans for the weekend,

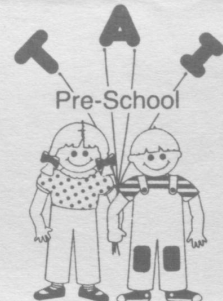

From The Rabbi's Study

Pesach is a holiday of hope. This message is found throughout the Haggadah.

There is the hope for the coming of the Messiah, for the time when there will be universal freedom and well-being. Jewish tradition holds Elijah to be the forerunner of the Messiah. We have a cup for Elijah on the Seder table and open the door for him. At the very end of the Seder we say "next year in Jerusalem," again a Messianic statement, for our tradition holds that with the coming of the Messiah somehow all Jews throughout history will return to Jerusalem and will live in peace.

Freedom itself is a hope and the message is repeated many times in the Seder. We went from the slavery of Egypt to the freedom of Sinai. We say, "Next year may all people be free." And this freedom is not just political freedom, but we can include economic freedom, psychological freedom, freedom in the fullest sense of the word.

Hope is also present in the season at which we celebrate Pesach - spring. The green is returning to the earth. There is now growth visible everywhere. We look forward to the warmer days of spring and the pleasure of being able to go outdoors without being all bundled up. This hope is reflected in the parsley and the egg on the Seder plate. It is found in the words from Song of Songs recalling that "Lo, the winter is past". Spring is a season of hope.

These are only a few examples of the message of hope that we find in the Haggadah. Notice them as you enjoy your Seder.

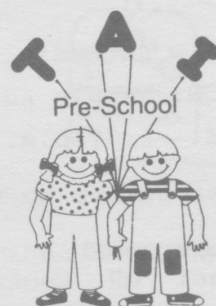

From The Rabbi's Study

This year marks the 40th Anniversary of the opening of the Nazi death camps, an aspect of modern history which is unique. The systematic slaughter of one people by another for no other reason than their religion, using the most advanced of scientific techniques and occurring in what was considered to be one of the most advanced nations in the world. Six million Jews died for no other reason than they were Jews, transported by the command of an obsession ridden leader who even placed more importance on this task than winning the war and executed by Nazis who blindly followed the commands of their leader, and who learned to view their victims not as human beings but as non-human beings.

The horrors of this period are well documented. They speak to us of the depth to which human life can sink when hatred takes over, when people become apathetic to the ills done to other people, as well as when tyranny gains the control of human morality and destroys the sense of common human concern that we have. The Nazi era was a nightmare for the Jews, as well as all of the other victims of Nazi oppression. In observance of this anniversary we shall have three programs recalling the Holocaust in Lexington this year. They are:

April 16th - 7:30 P. M. - Interfaith Holocaust and Memorial Service in the sanctuary of our Temple with Catholic and Episcopal clergy sharing the preparations.

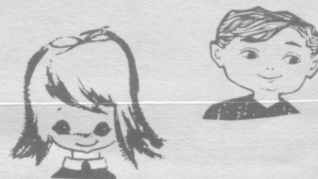

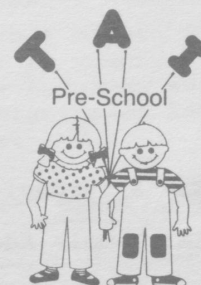

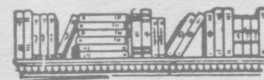

The upcoming CONSULTATION ON CONSCIENCE promises to be one of the most exciting Washington social action events of recent memory. Just for openers, Alex Schindler and Jerry Falwell will square off in a debate on church-state separation. We also expect the newly-elected senator from Illinois, Paul Simon, Representatives Jack Kemp, Richard Gephardt and Julian Dixon. Other senators and representatives have indicated their interest, including Ted Kennedy. The issues to be tackled include church-state separation, the status of Soviet Jewry, legislative programs to deal with African famine, South Africa, tax reform, Central America and the impact of social cuts on American life.

ETHIOPIAN FAMINE

You will be pleased to know that the UAHC initiative in support of Abie Nathan's tent village in Ethiopia is becoming an effective instrument for fighting famine in that anguished country. Indeed, because of the success of the first village, the Ethiopian government asked him to establish five more.

Following an advertisement the UAHC placed in THE NEW YORK TIMES, and a mailing to our leadership, we have raised more than \$200,00. Needless to say, many of the responses have been poignant and moving, and some have been surprising. We expected the usual checks from children giving up their Chanukah gelt, their bar/bat mitzvah gifts, etc., and we were not disappointed. One bar mitzvah boy wrote... " I feel how lucky I am, and I would like to share some of what I have with people who are not as lucky." Religious school classes voted their Keren Ami money to Ethiopian relief, some in place of "grab bags."

And we received a startling number of checks from non-Jews, or at least those with definitely non-Jewish names. One donor sent in his check in honor of a hospital and included first names of a host of those who had obviously ministered to him. Many came through members of our congregations, who were friends, but many came from the newspaper ad, and from all over the country, not just in the New York area. We received \$100 from residents of a home for the aged in Jersey City, who collected it themselves and sent it on to our congregation, Temple Beth-El. The Baha'is in Wilmington, Delaware, sent a check. "Our Baha'i community is neither large nor wealthy, but we know that the mighty ocean of compassion and assistance needed so desperately by the people of Ethiopia is made up of countless drops. We welcome the opportunity to (be) of help" Even received a check from a famous Hollywood actor.

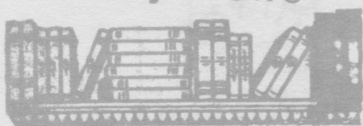

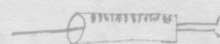

The Latest from Sisterhood



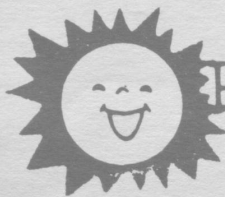
As Temple Adath Israel has grown so too has Sisterhood. We are a vibrant, changing group with interests as different as the members themselves.

CHARLES STERN WILL HEAD LEXINGTON
ISRAEL BOND REINVESTMENT CAMPAIGN

Charles Stern has accepted the post of Chairman for Reinvestment of Israel Bonds for Lexington, the General Chairman of the local Bonds campaign has announced.

"The appointment marks the beginning of a major community effort to secure early reinvestment of Israel Bonds which will mature in 1986," Charles Stern explained.

It has been pointed out that a large number of Fifth Development Issue Savings and Coupon Bonds, purchased in the period beginning in March 1971, will mature beginning in March, 1986.

"The Government of Israel has agreed to permit these Bonds to be reinvested a year early, as it was explained. "This means that Bonds maturing in April, 1986 will be available for reinvestment in April, 1985, and so on.

"Israel's current economic difficulties make it more important than ever that Israel's friends demonstrate their partnership with Israel by reinvesting their Israel Bonds," he continued.

"Maturing Israel Bonds represent an excellent potential for extra investment dollars to further develop Israel's industries. Friends who purchased Bonds are confident that the nation's economy will soon be restored to its former growth. If they are reminded in advance that their Bonds will soon come due, I am sure they will reaffirm their commitment to Israel."

As part of the advance reinvestment effort, it was said that holders of Bonds due to mature next year will soon be contacted by our Reinvestment Committee.

"We are hopeful that, given the opportunity to reinvest, friends of Israel will once again express our partnership with Israel," it was continued.

ROGER E. JOSEPH PRIZE TO THREE
INTERNATIONAL RELIEF AGENCIES
FOR EFFORTS IN ETHIOPIA

\$10,000.00 Prize to be divided
between Catholic Relief Service
Church World Service and the
American Jewish Joint Distribu-

Three international relief agen-
cies which have conducted an
extraordinary effort to provide
aid to the victims of famine in
Ethiopia will be honored with
the 1985 Roger E. Joseph Prize
by Hebrew Union College-Jewish
Institute of Religion, it has
been announced by Dr. Alfred
Gottschalk, President.

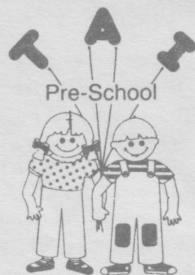
The prize, which carries a cash
award of \$10,000.00, will be
presented to Catholic Relief
Services, Church World Service,
and the American Jewish Joint
Distribution Committee at the
annual ordination and investit-
ure ceremonies of the New York
School, Sunday, June 9th, at
Temple Emanu-El in New York
City. The representatives from
each of the honored organi-
zations scheduled to attend are
Msgr. Andrew Landi, special
consultant to Catholic Relief
Services; Dr. Robert Marshall,
chairman of Church World Service
and Heinz Eppler, president of
the American Jewish Joint Dis-
tribution Committee.

Burton M. Joseph, president of I.F. Joseph Company,
Minneapolis, and his sister, Mrs. Betty Greenberg, estab-
lished the Roger E. Joseph Prize, through the Joseph
Foundation, in their brother's memory. It has previously
been awarded to Dr. Gerhart M. Reigner, the man who first
disclosed Hitler's plans for the destruction of European
Jewry; Raoul Wallenberg, the missing hero of the Holocaust
who saved tens of thousands of Jews in Hungary during
World War II, Victor Kugler, one of the principals involv-
ed in hiding Anne Frank and her family; and to the French
village of Le Chambon which sheltered and saved large num-
bers of Jews during the war. "The Roger E. Joseph Prize,"
Dr. Gottschalk noted, "was established to pay tribute to
an individual or organization whose conduct or work en-
hances or encourages ideals and values derived from religious
teachings. We feel it is a most fitting choice," he con-
tinued, "to honor these three relief agencies which have
striven so heroically to bring food, clothing and medical
supplies to the starving people of Ethiopia."

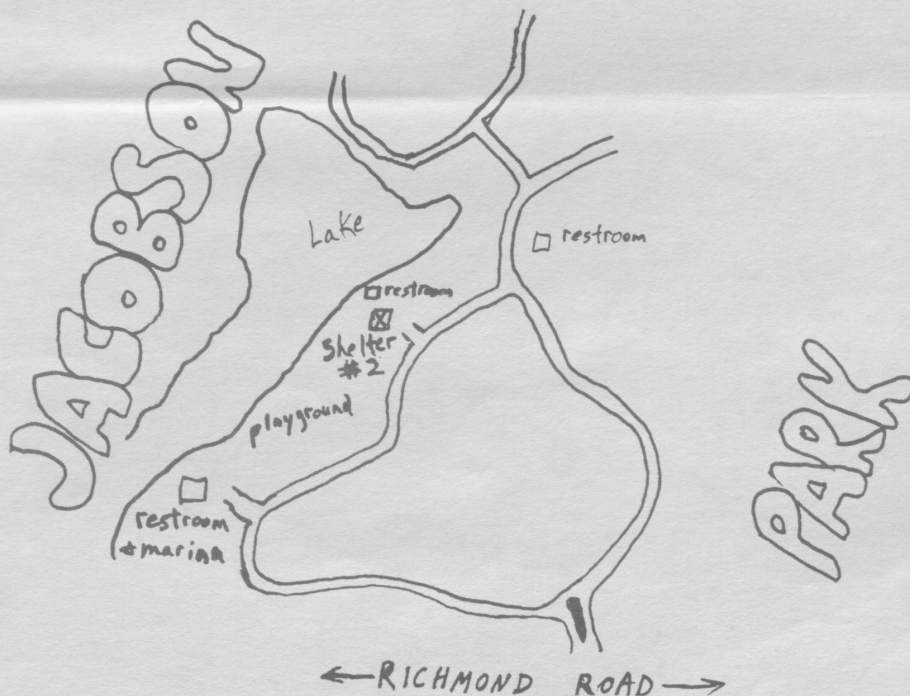

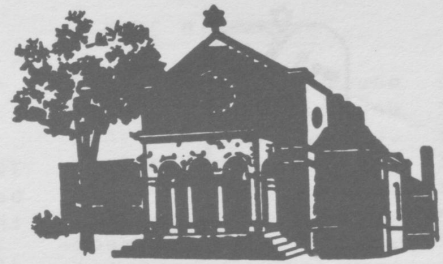

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

A while back I was in Huntington, W. Va. for a visit and noticed the political signs on lawns that we are currently seeing in Lexington advertising who is running for what office. I noticed a number of Jewish names among the candidates and upon inquiring about the number of Jews in politics in West Virginia, found that there were quite a number in both elected and appointed offices. I found this to be in marked contrast with Kentucky, where we see hardly any Jews in local or state government. This comparison is even more pronounced when one considers that the Jewish population of Lexington and Louisville is larger than the Jewish population of either Charleston or Huntington. I am not sure why there is this difference between the Jews of these two states, but I do find it an obvious difference.

Thus I find it significant that Jack Miller is running this year for Commonwealth Attorney and Alan Stein for Metro Council in Lexington, and Jerry Abramson for office in Louisville. Their candidacies are a genuine change in political involvement for the Jews in Kentucky and I believe, such an important change in the attitude that we Jews as a community should be represented in the political structure of the state.

The relative size of the Jewish population of a state is not a determining factor as to whether Jews are involved in its politics. There are Jewish senators from both Minnesota and New Hampshire neither of which has a very large Jewish community. And West Virginia is the same. Whether Jack, Alan and Jerry are successful (and I would hope they are) their candidacy marks an important change in the presence of the Jews of Kentucky.

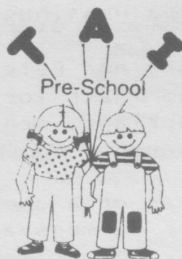

SHAVUOT

Shavuot occurs on Sunday, May 26th. It is one of the three pilgrim festivals of the Bible, when all Jews were expected to make a pilgrimage to Jerusalem and participate in the sacrificial worship in the Temple. The other two are Pesach and Sukkot.

In the Torah Shavuot is called the Holiday of the First Fruits and was the agricultural celebration marking the harvest of the spring crops. However, at an early time, it became connected with the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai. This connection occurs because the Torah tells us that the children of Israel came to Sinai in the month after the Exodus Nissan, Iyar, Sivan. - Thus Shavuot fits this description. We celebrate the holiday with our Confirmation service on the 26th at 2:00 P.M. Join with our class in marking the giving of the Torah as they confirm their Judaism at that time.

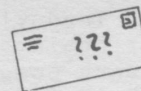

ARZA Offers Mission to Study Reform Judaism in Israel

How does a Reform kibbutz function? How are Reform congregations in Israel different from those in America? What is the status of the legal cases instituted by the Reform Movement to expand Reform rights in Israel? For answers to these questions, and for a very different kind of Israel experience, go to Israel with ARZA (the Association of Reform Zionists of America). ARZA's next Leadership Mission is being planned for the first two weeks in March of 1986. The purpose of the Mission is to provide in-depth knowledge of Israel's Progressive Movement, and a full discussion of the role American Jews can play in building Reform Judaism in the Jewish state.

Sessions have been scheduled with the lay and rabbinic leaders of the Reform Movement, including the new Sabra rabbis; with legal experts who will brief us on religious pluralism; with leaders of the Reform youth movements; with officials of the Hebrew Union College and the World Union for Progressive Judaism; with Orthodox spokesmen; with Jewish Agency officials, who will discuss the degree to which American philanthropic funds are used to support Reform programs; and also with leading government officials. The group will visit the Reform kibbutzim, and the new free-enterprise Reform settlement in the Galilee.

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

A new year is about to begin. This will be my last one as Rabbi of this congregation. As you know, I have asked that my contract, which runs through the end of August, 1986, not be renewed. I do not yet know what I shall be doing thereafter, nor where I shall be doing it. Life holds many challenges and opportunities. I look forward to them.

Serving as Rabbi of this congregation was also a challenge, with its opportunities. There have been successes and non-successes. Life is full of both. We have had some worthwhile and inspiring events over the past two decades. We have tried new programs and projects. Some have proven worthwhile and we have continued them over the years. Others were not as well received and we did not continue them. This is the nature of all programming.

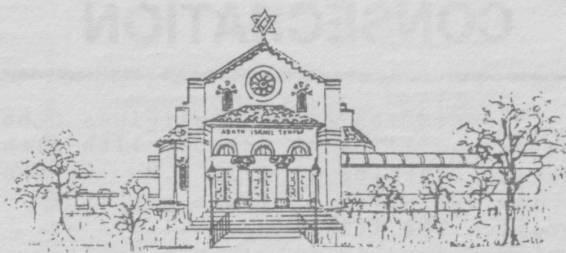

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

Sukkot is a fascinating holiday. I don't know of any other holiday in which people build huts in which to worship, take meals and celebrate a festival. We Jews often have our own special way of doing things to communicate our religious messages to ourselves. Here is just one more example of the specialness of Judaism.

The Sukkah, in spite of its beauty and fragrance, is very temporary. Even the lovely one in the Weil Garden at Temple, which the Brotherhood erected this year, blew over before it was properly stabilized. It is in sharp contrast to our homes which are certainly much more secure and protect us from the elements.

And yet, after seeing the photographs of the destruction which hurricane Elana recently brought to the Gulf Coast, or the pictures of destroyed buildings in Mexico City, those structures might just as well have been a Sukkah. So many of them collapsed just like fragile booths. With all their seeming permanence, they fell prey to nature's destructive forces.

Life, too, can be like this. We tend to think of it as permanent, like proper buildings of brick and stone. And yet in reality, life is like a fragile Sukkah. What seems secure, can be shaken by the breeze of change; what seems substantial can be brought low by unpredictable circumstances - an automobile accident, sudden disease, the change in the economy, political machinations, human stupidity.

As we gather in the Sukkah, we need to give thought that its temporariness is much more akin to life than the solidarity of the bricks and mortar which surrounds the courtyard, that for us as humans, in reality, nothing is permanent.

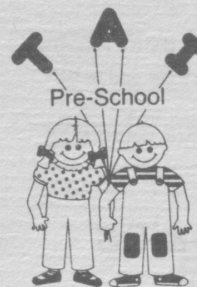

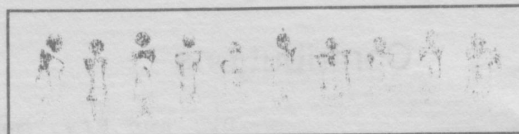

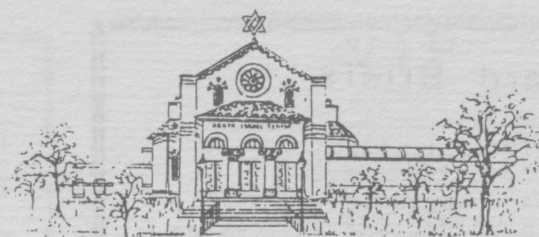

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

Steven Bram, our Temple Administrator, has been here since mid July, and is working very hard to help us organize our Temple procedures in the office, in the use of our new Temple facilities, in the House Rules that set guidelines for the proper oversight and utilization of our building.

In the past, most of these areas of concern were very informal. We really did not pay much attention to who came into our building and how things functioned. The structure was old; we gave little thought to proper oversight stewardship.

Now things are very different. The haphazard approach of the past is no longer appropriate. We must have proper procedures so that we can monitor what goes on within the building, so that we have adequate control of costs, so that our security is not lackadaisical. Steve is working long hours to tighten up these areas of our functioning.

Expectedly, these changes have caused discussions. They are new; they are different; they upset our former casual, laid back patterns. But they are also necessary. We are a growing congregation. Certainly, our new building indicates this fact. The increase in our Religious School indicates this fact (we are already realizing that it is too small). Our enlarged budget indicates this fact.

Growth is not always easy or smooth. Just consider most adolescents. We are somewhere in that stage in our current growth patterns. We will make it, but it will take patience, forbearance, a willingness to adapt, good will, an understanding of what growth entails, and above all, the willingness to cooperate and participate in this process.

REFORM MOVEMENT REQUESTS \$20M FROM JEWISH AGENCY

New York, N.Y. - Five Reform organizations have requested \$20 million for the first year and a total of \$88 million over five years for Reform programs in Israel. Application was made to the Jewish Agency, which provides social and educational services to the Jewish State, and is supported largely by the United Jewish Appeal.

The historic application was submitted jointly by the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, Hebrew Union College, the Central Conference of American Rabbis, the World Union for Progressive Judaism, and the Assoc. of Reform Zionists of America. The project, which reflects the vast support that Reform Judaism renders the Jewish State, was coordinated and staffed by ARZA. Detailed funding requests for forty specific Reform programs in Israel were included. The programs fall into four categories: 1) Programs in Israel advancing Israeli Progressive Institutions, 2) Education programs in Israel for Diaspora Jewry, 3) Aliyah and absorption programs, and 4) Programs of Zionist education for the Diaspora.

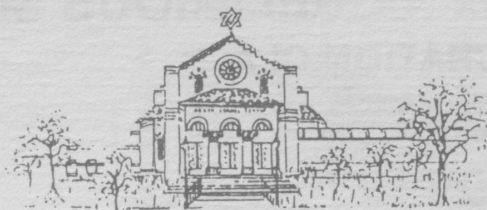

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

The recent hijacking of the Achilles Lauro indicates the increased scope of PLO activity. And as we saw in Lebanon with the kidnapping of four Russians, even the Soviet Union is no longer exempt from being a target of terrorism.

I recently received a monograph from a foundation in Washington that is concerned about peace in the Middle East. Their outlook is that Israel should invite the PLO to begin talks. I was rather amazed at this simplistic approach. I subsequently read another monograph on the long history of inter-Arab conflict and saw in broad spectrum the antagonisms and struggles between the various Arab nations, indicating so very clearly that what we witness in Lebanon is only a microcosm of long standing internecine warfare among the Arab peoples. Thus, for Israel to meet with only the PLO would be futile. The PLO-Israeli conflict is only one small aspect of the long standing antagonisms and power struggles in that part of the world.

The recent speech at the UN by Prime Minister Peres encouraging the peace process to move along and addressed to a number of Arab states may be a sign of hope. However, I must admit to a great deal of hesitancy in being hopeful. There are still too many Arab states standing by ready to torpedo any effort to bring stability to that long troubled part of the world.

Hope for peace is ethereal. It appeared when Sadat went to Jerusalem, and with the Camp David Accords. However, doves are vulnerable birds. The dove of peace requires much nurturing. I am still not sure the nations of the world are prepared to do so yet.

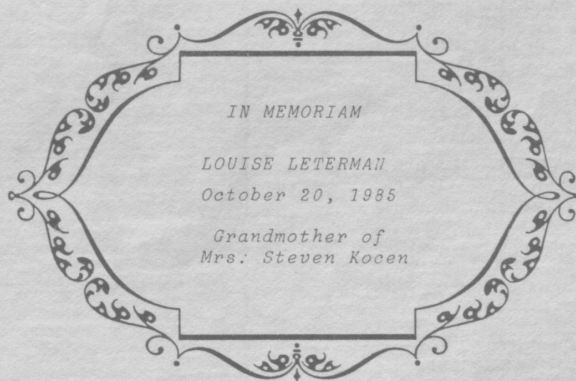

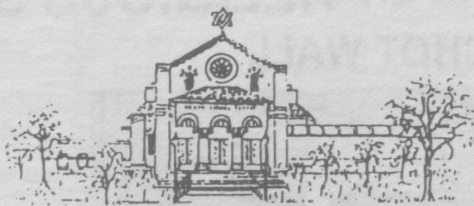

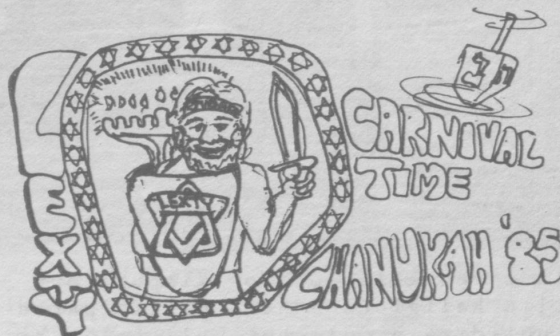
FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

The UAHC Biennial was a very worthwhile meeting. More than 350 congregations were represented and the resolutions at the Plenary ranged over a wide area of topics - providing sanctuary for Central American refugees, the establishment of Reform Jewish Day Schools, support for research and information on AIDS, terrorism and many other subjects. The discussions were spirited and concerned.

A topic that came up a number of times - both in the Plenary and in other sessions - was the tension that is being experienced today between Orthodoxy and non-Orthodoxy, both in Israel and in the Diaspora. There was a resolution which addressed this topic, urging Reform Jews to work for continuing unity within world Jewry.

At the same time, there were many expressions of concern about the efforts of the Orthodox establishment in Israel to disenfranchise non-Orthodoxy as Jews, as well as about conflicts which are occurring in this country, primarily in metropolitan areas, between Orthodox and non-Orthodox Jewish organizations. These discussions focused on such subjects as the observance of the Sabbath, conversion practices, and marriage and divorce requirements. There is a great need for cooperation and discussion to continue, and for no segment of Judaism to assume that it has all the answers and privileges. This is not an easy matter. It is highly emotional laden and will generate much debate. Yet it is a serious question that must be confronted for Judaism to continue to flourish.

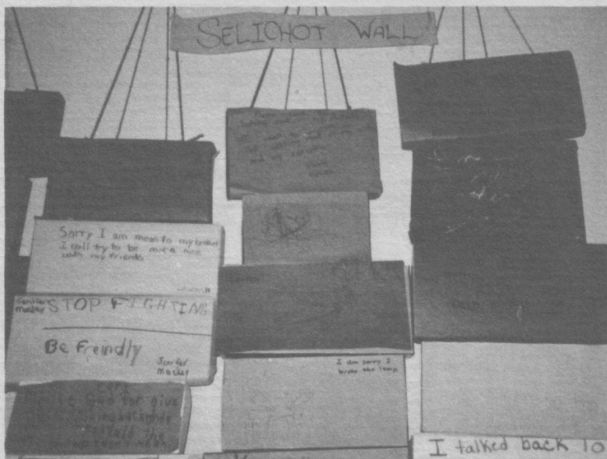

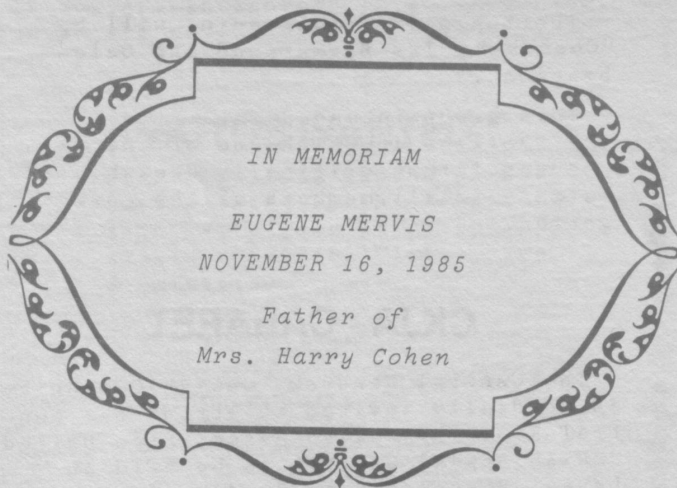

Eyewitness Auschwitz, by Filip Miller

This account of three years spent in the concentration camp Auschwitz is an important document. It is one man's story of what happened to him and what he saw happening to others.

Night/Dawn/Day, by Elie Wiesel

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

Recently, the Central Kentucky Jewish Association began its annual drive to raise funds for Israel and also for programs here in this country. Rabbi David Saperstein, Director of the UAHC Social Action Center, spoke at their big donors' dinner last month and pointed out many of the major challenges confronting the American Jewish Community today - arms sales to Jordan, relations with Israel, church-state issues, Anti-Semitism, and a number of other situations - all of which require money in order for them to be confronted and dealt with in adequate fashion. Some of the funds the CKJA collects go to agencies that address these issues.

A much larger part of the funds go directly to support human needs agencies in Israel, agencies which provide the services and programs that assist our co-religionists there. Israel is still very much in need of foreign support in these areas because of the drain on her resources due to the continuing hostilities of her Arab neighbors.

And a small part of the funds collected go to support CKJA programs here in Lexington, programs that are intended for all Jews in our community, not just for one congregation or organization, that we may function as a total community in spite of our various and different affiliations.

The Temple has three representatives on the CKJA Board. It functions with our input and not in competition with us. It merits our annual support of its fund drive.

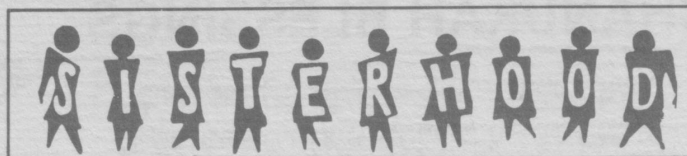

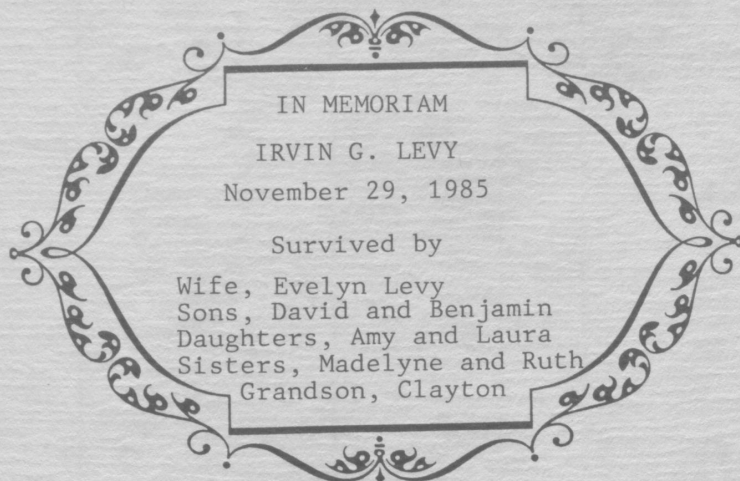

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

The recent news stories about the Pollard's allegedly selling American military secrets to the State of Israel has caused a temporary rift in U.S.-Israel relationships. The Israeli government has apologized to the United States for this incident and Secretary of State Shultz has accepted this apology, predicting that "the overall damage to U.S.-Israeli relations will be short-term and minimal".

This issue raises a number of questions in the area of international relations, which I am sure will be easily solved between the two countries. What is more crucial for us as Jews in America is how we react to this incident, for I sense a good deal of ambivalence. We are Americans and feel betrayed whenever there is a spy incident - regardless of which foreign nation is involved. We are Jews and embarrassed when Israel is involved in something that does not bring credit upon her.

The latter reaction clearly indicates our emotional tie to the State of Israel as Jews, in the same way that we feel a tie to the plight of Jews in other lands.

However, because Israel is a political state, there are other factors which come into play when she is involved and which, in this situation, have brought about our ambivalence. Judaism is the religion of an historic group of people, and we react to what a part of that people does as it affects us as Jews - and in this case also as Americans.

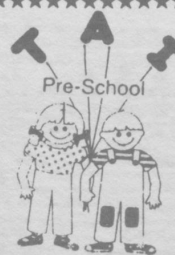
