IN THIS CORNER

It was a bitterly cold Washington, D.C. day. Sandy and I felt the wind penetrate our clothes and sting our faces as we ascended the escalator leading out of the Metro tunnel. Because it was Sunday, there were not many riders on the Metro and the quietness of the ride allowed us time to think about what lay before us this day. Sandy and I made our long awaited and much anticipated visit to the United States Holocaust Memorial.

In 1971, I went to Yad V'Shem in Jerusalem for the first of what was to be many, many visits. The assault of the horror on the senses by the acts perpetrated against my people, our brothers and sisters, by those whose mindless and senseless hate murdered 6,000,000 Jews and tens of millions of others, produced overwhelming sadness on the first and every visit. In the late 1960's, I saw films and heard testimonies. Each of those experiences helped prepare me for Yad V'Shem, but they could not stop or suppress the emotional responses. And all of my visits to Yad V'Shem did not prevent or hinder or desensitize the trip to the U.S. Holocaust Memorial. I thought I could handle this experience. As a baby boomer, I was not alive during the 1940's, but I have read and seen as much as anyone of my generation - at least until this Sunday.

Originally, the first reports said that the walk through the Memorial would take 2 1/2-3 hours. People returning said that you needed 4-5 hours. Our walk lasted 5 1/4 hours and we left in a state of emotional and mental exhaustion. What we saw and experienced is quite difficult to put into words, but I must try as best I can. The first floor you walk through (which is actually at the top of the Memorial - you ride up in an elevator that gives you the feel of the inside of an army green cargo container) details the rise of Nazism and German anti-Semitism. There are films on TV monitors overhead, visuals to read, items to look at and wonder. "How could this happen?" is a question often asked. The facts and images portrayed on this floor attempt an explanation.

I gasped at one point as I turned a corner and confronted the horror of Kristallnacht. In this section in a glassed area are pages of Torah scrolls. These scroll pages are the remains of pages ripped apart by hate and left lying in the street only to be carefully picked up and cared for by loving Jewish hands. Then there was a picture of the insides of a magnificent synagogue and the after picture following its



destruction. And the names of the communities -- hundreds of names are inscribed on the glass windows.

The second floor depicted the war itself with pictures of ghettos, mobile killing units, a train car, and visuals portraying the death in the showers. The shoes, everyone mentioned the shoes, but you cannot imagine the scene until you see it for yourself. By this point you are worn down from the previous 4 hours and you are unable to imagine what else there could be to see. Then comes liberation and you confront the first footage shot in the camps, the war crimes' trials, the resistance fighters and at the end - Israel.

Before you leave there is one last film that grabs you as survivors tell their stories. I listened and watched and cried. I cried for the 6 million, for the children, for a world that encouraged hate instead of love, for those who helped

and for those who survived and continue to live with the memories of lost family members, sleepless nights, and the memories of hell.

Finally, Sandy and I walked into the Hall of Remembrance, a beautiful room with its flame burning at one end. We took a moment to decompress, breathe, and prepare to enter a world beyond the exit doors. I knew inside that the world had not changed in those 5 hours, but I had. I can only hope that every person will go through this memorial and learn. Maybe, and only then, we will truly be able to say, "Never Again."

BOARD BRIEFS DECEMBER 7, 1993 MEETING

The nomination of John Harrison, M.D. to the office of Secretary was approved.

The Board approved the membership of Paul and Beth Engel, H. Brian Hershinow and Anne and Lee Hoffman and accepted the resignations of Steve Webne, Sharon Casper and John Mendler.

A proposal was presented from the Dues Review Committee which would have modified the Temple's current dues system. The proposed new system called for a minimum annual dues contribution of \$700.00 or 1 1/2% of gross family income, whichever is greater, with a committee being established to determine exceptions to the minimum. After a lengthy discussion the Board voted to table the proposal.

The Nominating Committee for Board positions was announced.

Tuition and fees for the upcoming PreSchool year were approved.

A motion from the Executive Committee to limit all Sunday morning fund raising activities to the Social Hall was approved

Appreciation was expressed to the Fund Raising committees of the Temple and Sisterhood for their efforts, which resulted in the extremely successful "Phantom of Monte Carlo" event.

CAR COMMITTEE

On November 8th the second "CAR" Committee meeting was held. The focus of the meeting was a review of the Rabbi and of the congregation.

Our opening discussion centered on the diverse expectations the congregation holds for the Rabbi. The committee discussed what it felt were the Rabbi's responsibilities and how his time was spent. Rabbi Adland then described his efforts and responsibilities to the committee. It was agreed that both the committee's perception of the Rabbi's job and the way Rabbi Adland fulfills these responsibilities were compatible.

The primary concern of the committee and the Rabbi was the lack of feedback from the congregation, both positive and negative. Too often our members do not use the channels of communication open to them. It was felt that if we are to alter the perceptions that the congregation is run by a clique, and that its leaders - both professional and lay - are not available for discussion, a certain amount of initiative is required on the congregation's part to speak up.

The meeting concluded with a discussion of possible ways to encourage involvement and to provide a means for a continuing review.



FIRST GRADE

Anita Mersack, Teacher

The first graders have been very busy this year. We began by learning about all the holidays that come at the beginning of our Jewish calendar year. Our next unit was Jewish life-cycle events. We learned to name and define them and each student drew a picture of a lifecycle event to hang on our Tree of Life.

In November, for Jewish Book Month, we went to the library and each chose a book. After reading the book, each student wrote a book report and illustrated it. For Hanukkah we discussed why and how we celebrate the holiday and made a dreidel to decorate our home. We also did some creative writing.

We have also been learning some of the letters of the Aleph-bet and have enjoyed music with Aaron and art with Alyson.

SECOND GRADE

Sandy Adland, Teacher

Our second graders are a terrific and enthusiastic group. We spend our Sunday mornings reading Jewish books, singing Jewish songs, learning Israeli dances, tasting Jewish foods, creating Jewish art, and sharing each other's Jewish experiences. In the past several weeks, we've been learning about Jews-by-Choice, the major differences between Christmas and Hanukah, and the story of Noah. We're learning the letters of the Hebrew alef-bet. A big thank you to Jessica Rosenberg's mom Laura for making latkes in our class during our Hanukah celebration.

FIFTH GRADE

Jane Grisé, Teacher

The Fifth Grade has been studying social action. We have studied various prophets and created our own prophetic statements about the world situation. We have examined concepts such as tzedakah, gemilut, chasidim and pikuach nefesh. We are also in the process of writing and producing a play dealing with the story of Cain and Abel - The Trial of Cain. This story deals with a variety of social action ideas including capital punishment and the responsibility we have for other people.

In January we will begin a unit on the elderly. We will study the way in which Jewish literature teaches respect for the elderly. We will also be spending a morning with residents at Mayfair Manor.

SENIOR BLOCK - JEWISH HISTORY I & II

Fannie Miller, Teacher

The students in the senior block course in Jewish History I & II have completed their study. The text we used was My People - Abba Eban's History of the Jews.

This course begins with the period in which Judaism is formed and grew to maturity. It continues with a study of Jewish History during the American Revolution, a study of the Jews of Eastern Europe, the waves of immigration to the United States, the Jewish State of Israel reborn, and a review of American Jewry since World War II. Throughout the study we related Jewish History with World History and how Jews have affected the non-Jewish world and have been influenced by it. We also included in this course what it means to be a good Jew in today's world and the special role Jews have played. In addition, we discussed Jewish current events and how they affect our lives today.

Media materials such as video tapes, periodicals, and newspaper clippings were used to relate Jewish History of the past and what is happening in Jewish History today.

IN THIS CORNER

I came across a small article in a periodical that outlined the serious internal problems being caused by the prolonged illness and impending death of the Lubavitch Rebbe. His death will leave the Lubavitch Hasidim without a leader. Many of us read stories in recent years concerning this Hasidic Rebbe and his followers belief in him as the messiah. We rolled our eyes at the absurdity and arrogance of the Lubavitch Jews living in Brooklyn to believe in the fact that this man is the messiah.

Two issues are raised by this burning desire to see their rabbe proclaimed messiah. The first is our understanding the Jewish concept of the messiah. What does Jewish tradition teach us about the idea and concept of messiah? Second, what will happen to the Lubavitch movement when its rebbe proves not to be the messiah the followers are longing for today?

The word messiah comes from the Hebrew word mashiach which means anointed. Anointing with oil was a popular and special method of marking individuals who gained a special status or distinction in their community or in the country. The kings and priests in Israel, and holders of these offices were regularly referred to as "anointed" with reference to this symbolic act. Saul, David, Absalom, Solomon, Jehu, Joash, Jehoahaz, all kings in either Israel or Judah, were anointed.

In the Anchor Bible Dictionary, the following is written about the word messiah:

An investigation of Jewish writing around the beginning of the common era reveals the term "Messiah" was by no means generally used as a designation for God's representative or intermediary at the beginning of a new age of peace for Israel and the nations. The expectations of a radical and definitive change brought about by God did not necessarily include a task for (human or angelic) agents of divine deliverance, and the fact the God's agents were anointed need not be stressed. The term "Messiah"/"Anointed One" is not found very often in the Hebrew Bible and the Jewish writings of the period between 200 BCE and 100 CE The Jewish understanding of the messiah is the hope



prosperity and security. It is also believed that this individual would live to an old age and be a strong leader. The Lubavitch Rebbe has lived to an old age, but other than that he has not accomplished, in my opinion, any of the other criteria needed to be anointed a messiah. Finally, Judaism did not proclaim the belief in only one ultimate messiah, but when the need arose in the community, a messiah would come.

The outcome of this desire of the Lubavitch Hasidim in believing that their Rebbe is the messiah may be disastrous and this brings me to my second issue: putting one's faith and belief in another human being in such a fanatical manner can only lead to a tremendous letdown when the faith is proved false. In Jewish history there have been other false messiahs who led the people toward the pot of gold at the end of the rainbow only to have the rainbow vanish and the people left in turmoil with no sense of direction, all hopes dashed. Jacob Frank and Sabbatai Tzvi are two of these false messiahs. People believed in them and they left the people in a state of confusion when they were proved false. The Lubavitch Hasidim are in for a great crash when they realize that their hopes are false. Too many of the rebbe's followers are committed to his messianic nature. No plans are made as to what may occur internally in their movement with no successor in the wings when he dies.

As Liberal Reform Jews, a long time ago we rejected the nature of a personal messiah over 100 years ago, putting our energies into the concept that we call the messianic era. The messianic era, the age of peace and comfort and humanity, will happen but only through our collective energies in making the world whole and our personal lives at peace. Each person must believe that he or she possesses a peace of the messiah in his or her soul. Each and every day we must reach into our soul and pull out that messianic portion. When we do, it will drive us and encourage us to do

good in the world, to make the world a better place for ourselves, our children, and our children's children. Whether it is a Temple project of building or serving or collecting, or another community project, each adds to the goodness in the world and brings this messianic era one step closer. We put our faith and our energies into ourselves, and our friends and neighbors. That is one place where the messiah resides.

The other place the messiah exists is in our Jewish lives and souls. By celebrating holidays and holy days, affirming our past in the present, celebrating *Shabbat* in the synagogue or lighting candles and saying *kiddush* at home, we bring a measure of peace to our lives, the members of families, the people we touch, and maybe even to the whole world. The Jewish messiah exists in our doing the ethical mitzvot each and every day and the ritual in its season. As Reform Jews, we must recapture the messiah and bring about the messianic era. We can do this by living Jewish lives and believing in ourselves to do the right thing.

I feel sorry for the Lubavitch Hasidim. Their self-righteousness has taken control of their minds and is preying on their souls. They lost sight of K'lal Yisrael, the Jewish people as a whole, deciding, instead, to try and make the Jewish people just like them. While we acknowledge their right to behave in their Jewish manner, it is time for them to acknowledge our rights as Liberal Jews who love being Jews in our own manner and style. I encourage my Lubavitch brothers and sisters to resist this desire to proclaim their Rebbe as messiah and turn their creative energy back to this world. Together we can finish God's creation. Then, with all Jews working together, the messianic era they so desperately want will arrive.

THE PRESIDENT'S SPOT

Many years ago our congregation received a wonderful gift. A core group of individuals spent a great deal of time raising funds to refurbish and expand our Temple building. For many years, repairs had been neglected and finding the money to make these repairs was postponed from year to year. To make this new facility a reality, several things have to happen.

First, the need for the repairs was explained. Our congregation was made aware of the ramifications of the continued postponing of maintenance. Secondly, the future impact on our religious school, if we chose not to expand, was explained. As the principal purpose of our existence is worship and education, this need was strongly felt. Lastly, the entire congregation financially supported this endeavor. Everyone understood the benefits derived from this course of

For a while this level of education seemed to continue. Our members were proud of the result of their support of this decision and continued to see the need. But, as with any enthusiasm, with time, that support and understanding waned.

We are now at a time when that education and understanding need to be reinvigorated.

Our budget committee is now finalizing the budget numbers for our coming fiscal year. At this time the projections are that the General Fund will have a \$17,000 shortfall and our Programming Fund will have a \$15,000 shortfall. These numbers will have a great impact on our day to day operations, not to mention the future of Temple Adath Israel.

When I speak with members in our congregation each of you talk about a different aspect of importance to you. We all have different needs and therefore have differing priorities. It is a difficult assignment to decide which is the most important. However, we may be facing just such a time when these decisions will have to be made.

Religious School parents may be asked to cover more or all of the cost of Religious School. Having a choir for the High Holy Days may become a thing of the past. Routine maintenance on the building, not to mention needed repairs, may have to be postponed. I feel certain that this is not the direction the congregation wishes to take.

Each year our members are asked to evaluate their dues levels. Many of you decide that your money is better spent elsewhere or that someone else will take up the slack. Until this attitude changes our problems will not change.

As leaders of this congregation, we have apparently failed in educating the congregation about the cost of operating our current facility. Utilities, postage, insurance and maintenance cost, to name a few, continue to increase. We know that these costs will not go down. As the building ages and more maintenance is required, our problems will only compound.

For our part, we will do a better job of informing the congregation of the costs incurred during the course of the year. In our future bulletins a breakdown of costs on varying services will be provided. We need you to meet us the other half of the way.

As this time we ask you for 1 ½% of gross annual income for a dues level. Projections show us that if every membership unit gave 3/4 of 1% of their gross annual income, our current budgetary problems would be solved. I know that at times it seems that all we do is ask for money and that is not what any Temple's priority should be. If each of us would take a little more financial responsibility, then we

could shift our focus to the business of worship and tikkun olam.

It does take money to operate. This responsibility is one that all members can share in. With this joint level of responsibility the burden will rest equally among our members and our focus can be on those matters integral to the survival of our congregation. I ask that each of you reevaluate your current level of giving. If it is possible to raise your level of commitment please do so. It has taken a long time to reach our current level of offerings. It would be wonderful to continue to be able to go forward instead of going back.

FROM RABBI STEPHEN PINSKY FLOOD DAMAGE IN IOWA CITY

As you may very well know, our office was the recipient of over \$25,000 collected by Reform congregations throughout the United States to assist those displaced by this summer and fall's floods. Significant funds were also received by Temple B'nai Jeshurun in Des Moines, Iowa and Temple Adath Joseph in St. Joseph, Missouri. While the emergency was in progress, I received dozens of calls inquiring as to whether of not any of our congregations were damaged. At that time, I reported that as far as I knew the answer was no. As you can tell from the excerpt of the letter I received from Rabbi Jeffrey Portman of Agudas Achim Congregation in Iowa City, Iowa, that assessment was a bit premature.

...The basement had about seven inches of water; and after it was all drained there was about \$30,000 in damages. This included the loss of Sunday School and library books, office supplies, carpet, some dry wall, kitchen and bathroom linoleum, repair of the furnace and elevator, replacement of the water heater, doors, tables, and other miscellaneous items, and painting of the new dry wall.

I am therefore, asking for your assistance for our friends in Iowa City. Since much of their loss will not be reimbursed by their insurance company, they need help from outside sources. I would appreciate any donations your congregants can give to help this small congregation in our region. Almost all of the monies collected this summer came from outside the Midwest Region. It is now our turn to help one of our own. To expedite this drive, please mail your checks to UAHC, Midwest Council, 10425 Old Olive Street Road, Suite 205, St. Louis, Missouri 63141. May your checks payable to "UAHC/Flood Relief" If there should be an excess collected, we will make sure that it will be distributed to appropriate Jewish agencies to assist those still suffering the effects of this summer's calamity.



FROM THE HALLS OF THE RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

SEVENTH GRADE

The seventh grade continues to explore different religions and different religious viewpoints. In the last four weeks we have visited a Baptist service (as well as a Sunday school class) and a Unitarian service and open discussion with their middle school students. The Baptists had a very traditional service and they welcomed us into their church. But they also made it clear that their religion stressed a strong belief in Jesus in order to be saved and not go to On the other hand, the Unitarian church stressed the unity of God from a cultural point of view. The Unitarian Church appeared to be open to anyone who wanted to belong to a group of people who served the community and had a belief in the unity of mankind. They were very open in accepting gays and lesbians into their church and they raised money for many groups of homeless and needy people.

We have also explored the reality of intermarriage among Jews and the difficulties that this presents in raising children and in the survival of the Jewish religion. In the future we hope to attend a service at a black church and we also hope to have a presentation from a representative of the Church of the Later Day Saints (the Mormons).

The hours of operation are 9 AM to 12 PM and the four year old class has an optional extended day on Thursdays until 2:30 PM.

IN THIS CORNER

Not long ago, when a family came to me to discuss Bar/Bat Mitzvah invitations, I realized that our congregation has changed since my arrival in 1986. Then, everyone in the Temple community, even the entire Jewish community, was invited to a Bar/Bat Mitzvah service and celebration through the Temple bulletin and community publication. You did not need a personal invitation to know that you were welcome. This was, after all, a Jewish community and the community celebrateda simcha together.

I thought about the receptions that we had when I came here in 1986. Friends would invade the kitchen to prepare the meal after the morning service. It would be loving Jewish hands making kugel and tuna fish and challah and more. We held up our community efforts over and against the big city celebrations. It was friends and family, community effort, support and love that made these celebrations more special. After a year of more Bar and Bat Mitzvah celebrations than any year in our recent history, I must say that I long for the notion of community. I hope that we can return to the process of using the bulletin to invite the congregation and cut down the expense that goes into celebrating a child coming of age. I look forward to friends preparing the reception and the taste of Jewish made

If you ask why this happened, why this change took place, I believe I can hazard an answer. Our congregation is no longer primarily made up of native Lexingtonians, but of people who have come from somewhere else. Many people arrived here from larger communities and brought with them knowledge of how it was done elsewhere. Jews from Lexington have traveled to the larger communities and experienced "real" Bar/Bat Mitzvah celebrations which made our attempt at small town hominess seem quaint.

What we have had in Lexington is not simply quaint, but wonderful and special: Jews caring about other Jews; Jews looking out for other Jews; Jews celebrating with other Jews. It is important for all Jews to be part of the community, but even more, it is important for Jews to participate in and build up the community. We do not always do this.

At Consecration/Simchat Torah, no one comes but the families of the Consecration (Kindergarten) class to see these beautiful young Jews initiated into their formal religious education. At Confirmation, to me the most significant event in the life of a young Jewish adult, no one comes to the

THE PRESIDENT'S SPOT

In last month's article, I wrote about our projected shortfall in funding for the coming year. Many of you have called or written or spoken with me concerning the article. I appreciate your taking the time to give me your comments, to think about Temple's future and to share in its fiscal concerns.

By now you have received a packet of information from Kevin Freund and the Budget Committee. Our congregation owes Kevin a sincere Todah for all the time he has put into his presentation of the coming year's budget.

This year, our budget is presented in terms that are readily comprehensible, yet, very telling in their projections. The most important aspect of this proposed budget is that it is unbalanced. This year, instead of "balancing" the budget by inserting a contrived dues number, we are using an expected actual dues amount and, are, therefore, taking the problem to you.

The projections show that at current levels of growth, our expenses will exceed our ability to generate income.

Although we are making every attempt to keep expenses at a

minimum, the costs of properly maintaining our building will inevitably increase, and maintaining a qualified staff is no longer an inexpensive proposition.

At this year's annual meeting, our congregation will receive a budget presentation that has already been viewed by the Executive Committee and the Board of Trustees. I strongly urge each of you to attend this meeting and to be prepared for a discussion.

Ultimately, it is our money that will be discussed, ours as a congregation. As members, we have a responsibility to see to our Tempie's fiscal structure and continuance.

As I said last month, it has been quite a while since we were educated about our financial needs and our future. Thanks to Kevin and the Budget Committee we will have that opportunity again.

OUR MEMBER - ERNST JOKL

Sports medicine is an accepted and popular specialty in the medical profession, but it wasn't so when Ernst Jokl was getting his medical degree in the 1920s in Germany.

In a career spanning five decades in Germany, South Africa and Kentucky, he was a pioneer scholar in the field.

Since retiring from UK in 1975, Jokl has continued to write and lecture and has received awards and commendations from throughout the world.

Most recently, he received a gold medal from the International Council of Sports Science and Physical Education, a UNESCO agency, which said "Your dedication and vision constituted the base of our Council's existence and continues to inspire our quest for excellence".

The council also named a lecture series in Jokl's honor, to be held every fourth year coinciding with the summer Olympic games. Jokl himself was an Olympic athlete for his native Germany in 1928.

The University of Wroclaw, Poland (formerly Breslau, Germany), Jokl's alma mater, named its new Academic Sports Medicine Clinic in his honor, and he was the honorary speaker at the opening of the facility in 1992.

At UK in the 1950s, Jokl introduced the first graduate course on sports medicine in the U.S. and founded the American College of Sports Medicine. He was named Arts and Sciences Distinguished Professor in 1966-67.

Jokl is also an aviator and wrote several of the earliest books and articles in the field of aviation medicine. He is now, in his words, "truly retired" at his Lexington home, enjoying playing the piano and writing a book of his reminiscences.

IN THIS CORNER

As you receive this bulletin, we conclude the celebration of Yom Ha'atzmaut - Israel Independence Day. Israel was born in a United Nations Resolution passed in November, 1947. On May 14, 1948, the United Nations declared that there would be a Jewish State, an Arab State and the country of Jordan on the land previously known by the names Palestine and Trans-Jordan. The land partitioned for the Jews was small, narrowing to only 7 miles at a point between Tel Aviv and Haifa. To the east, between the Israeli border and the Jordan river, an Arab State was created. These borders and states did not last long.

As an independent Jewish State was declared, the Arab community attacked Israel from all directions determined to drive the Jewish presence from the land. Israel successfully defended herself. The War of Independence ended with Israel in control of slightly more land than the partition stated and Jordan now occupying the Arab State known later in history as the West Bank. As we know, the tiny nation of Israel fought wars in 1956, 1967 and 1973 against many of her neighboring Arab countries. Thousands of Israelis and Arab soldiers and civilians died in these battles born out of hate, prejudice and mistrust. It seems that 46 years after our Jewish homeland was born, the situation has not changed all that much. Israel is still technically at war with every neighboring Arab State, but Egypt. Threats of destruction and annihilation spew forth from the mouths of those whose minds are filled with hate and violence, destruction and murder. People are murdered every single day in the name of self-proclaimed victory.

On the cover of this month's *Moment* magazine, is a picture depicting a series of tombstones. Each stone reminds us of a massacre by one side of the conflict or the other. The first stone is Hebron 1929 when Arabs murdered 67 Jewish men, women and children. We see the stones of Kiryat Shmona and Ma'alot where this type of terrorism resumed with murders of more women and children. We note the murders on the Tel Aviv Coastal Highway and the Tel Aviv-Jerusalem Highway. At the same time, on this cover we are reminded that the Arabs are not the only ones engaged in murder. In Hebron in 1983 and on the Temple Mount in 1990, Jews murdered Arabs in the name of peace and God.

Now, in 1994, on Purim, a Jewish doctor named Goldstein walked into the Moslem part of the Holy Cave of the Machpelah and shot dead more than 30 Arabs while these human beings were engaged in their Friday prayers. Goldstein was part of Kach, a right wing terrorist organization whose goal was to eliminate Arabs from the land of his fathers Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. These Jews carried their weapons defiantly, ready to defend themselves at the least provocation. The members of Kach, a splinter group from Kahane's narrow-minded right wing political party, oppose any effort by the Israeli government to bring about peace, to return occupied land to the Arabs, to remove settlers from the territories. They shout that this is the land of God's promise to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, and therefore, it is their land forever.

My response to these Jews is that they are no better than their Arab terrorist counterparts. They disgust me on every level. I believe that Judaism must stand for bringing healing into the world and peace into the human heart. Jews should not take up arms and, with premeditation, walk into a holy site and murder human beings. To me, what Goldstein did and what terrorists like Goldstein stand for, set those Jews outside the Jewish community. Though I can't excommunicate them, we must do everything we can to delegitimatize them. The Israeli government took the first step by declaring them terrorists. The rest of the world Jewish community must say to them, Never Again will you murder other human beings in cold blood and out of vengeance. That is not who we are as Jews and that is not what our commandments, ethics and morals teach us.

If peace is going to come to Israel, then all of us must learn to live together. The Arabs must understand that when one of theirs murders a Jew, the murderer must not be considered a hero and martyr. The Arab community must learn from their Jewish and Israeli counterparts to mourn the death of every living soul. The Israeli community must understand the frustration of the Palestinian community which is rejected by all her neighbors, left adrift at sea with no paddle. The Israelis must provide the oars, the boat and even some of the provisions to get the Palestinians going in the right direction. If both sides can move forward by responding within themselves to the other side, then, after 46 years maybe there will be peace.

THE PRESIDENT'S SPOT

It is difficult for me to believe that it has already been two years since I sat down to write my first bulletin article. Some of those articles were fun to write, others somewhat difficult, but always they pertained to what I felt was most important at the time.

As I look back, what seems most important at this time is the honor and privilege of leading this congregation. I will always remember each of your words of praise and encouragement. The most rewarding part of being president was knowing that you had confidence in my abilities. My sincere thanks to each of you for the trust you placed in me.

There are also some other leaders in our congregation who will be leaving our Board. Our Immediate Past President, Ben Baker and our Treasurer, Holly Barnhill. Both of these individuals have given their heart and soul to our Temple. The positions that they have held are not the most enjoyable ones, but our congregation is better off because of their involvement.

There are five retiring Trustees: Bruce Engel, Jeff Heller, Garry Hoover, Jack Miller and David Wachtel. Tomas Milch, H. has also finished his term as one of our CKJF Representatives. I know that you join me in thanking these Board members for their many years of service.

While we will miss all our retiring board members and officers, we also look forward to our new Trustees and officers who will be installed at our annual meeting.

I hope that you will join me on May 1st to participate in the installation of our new Board and officers, which will be led by our incoming President, Rob Rosenstein. All will be devoting a great deal of their time for the benefit of our congregation. We are fortunate that they care enough about the future of Temple Adath Israel to put the congregation's needs first. I know when they call upon you for support that it will be there just as your support was always there for me.



BOARD BRIEFS - MARCH 1, 1994


At the March 1 Board meeting, Treasurer, Holly Barnhill reported the transfer of \$12,000.00 of Building Fund holdings from a money market account to the Endowment Fund for greater investment income potential.

The Board accepted the resignation of Sanford and Kathleen Caprow who have moved to New York.

John McDonald informed the Board of the need to replace a through-the-wall heat pump unit in one of the PreSchool rooms. Approximate cost \$1,200.00.

Kevin Freund of the Budget Committee made a presentation of the 1994-95 budget as proposed by the committee. Included in the presentation was a five year history of income and expenses. A number of graphs and charts illustrating this information, including several detailing dues collection data, were distributed. As proposed, the 94-95 budget results in a \$17,000.00 shortfall in the General Fund.

The Board decided that the budget information it had received should be made available to the congregation through a special mailing. The proposed budget will be discussed and voted upon at the April meeting, then presented to the congregation for approval at the annual meeting on May 1.

CONFIRMATION SERVICE 5754WILL BE HELD MAY 15

Confirmation is held annually on *Erev Shavuot* - the holy festival remembering the revelation of Torah to Moses by God. Just as God handed the Torah to Moses, we pass on our Jewish heritage, our hopes and dreams for a Jewish future, to our confirmands. Therefore, Confirmation is the most significant Religious School experience in which our students participate. 
TAI PRESCHOOL NEWS

THE HOLOCAUST

Samye N. Miller, Teacher Fannie H. Miller, Teacher

The Holocaust class used two textbooks this year: Never to Forget - The Jews of the Holocaust and Hitler's War Against the Jews. These textbooks discuss Jewish values to consider in coming to terms with what happened and making sure the world will not see it happen again.

The Holocaust was an important, world-shaking event, not only for Jews but for humanity as a whole. In our study, we examined the sequence of events that led to this terrible occurrence, and also how Jews and Judaism have been dedicated to ethical ideals which stand against cruelty and immorality.

In addition to our classroom discussions and textbooks, we used video tapes, newspaper and magazine articles, posters, pictures, art work, slides and charts.

IN THIS CORNER

One of the beautiful aspects of Reform Judaism is the idea of personal/individual autonomy. Each Reform Jew is responsible for the Jewish decisions in his or her Jewish life. The celebration of Shabbat and Holy Days, dietary restrictions, participation in life-cycle events, observance of the particulars in living as a Jew are all determined by the individual Jew. The conclusions and actions each Jew takes are, of course, predicated on a certain level of study which will assist the Reform Jew in coming to an informed decision. Whatever the decision reached in the life of the Reform Jew, as long as it does not go beyond the boundaries of normative Jewish life or thought, it is accepted by the Reform Jewish community as operative. The decisions may not always be in line with traditional Jewish experience, but even traditional Judaism came to some of its conclusions after much internal debate, as noted in the Talmud, as well as compromise and trial and error.

A Temple community such as ours is linked with a larger Reform Jewish community, and the experiences of that larger Jewish community become the basis for the organism we call Reform Jewish life. For example, many Reform Jewish congregations enacted Temple By-laws to ban the use of pork products or shellfish in meals served at Temple functions, but do not prohibit the mixing of milk and meat together. Reform Jewish congregations do not require kipot to be worn in the sanctuary, but leave it as optional. Friday evening Shabbat candles are lit during the Erev Shabbat service. While these issues may violate the letter of Talmudic law, Reform Judaism does not believe that they violate the spirit of the celebration of Shabbat, ritual decisions or dietary decisions as understood from Biblical law. Reform Judaism believes that every Jew and Jewish community must participate directly in this decision-making process and not just accept it without questioning the traditions. Differences will exist in the level of observance among Reform Jewish congregations, but every congregation comes to conclusions based on the philosophy of autonomy as a basis for Reform Jewish life. When I attend a convention of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, the organization with which our Temple is affiliated, it is incredible to note how 4,000 Reform Jews can act so differently in their behavior, but feel such kinship in their philosophy of Jewish living.

Reform Jewish life does have some consistency within its member Temples and rabbis. As in any group where autonomy is considered a virtue, there is variation. In looking at the totality of the Reform Jewish movement today one can note some common threads. For example, most Reform Jewish congregations returned to the Bible for the proscription on the length of their holiday celebrations and join with Jews in Israel today celebrating Pesach 7 days and not 8, Shavuot 1 day and not 2, and Rosh Hashanah for only 1 day. Shabbat observance begins Friday evening and ends Saturday evening without regard to the exact hour on the clock. Musical instruments are used during the Shabbat service. Social Action and Social Justice are pillars of the community's strength. Temples enact certain By-laws for Jewish life and celebration within the building proper, but do not invade the private life of the member family.

Without question, there are times when Reform Judaism is at odds with traditional Judaism and traditional Jewish celebration. When it comes to celebrations sponsored as a community event, Reform Jews accept the rules of traditional Judaism. When it comes to events sponsored within the Temple, Temple rules apply. When it comes to

private events outside of the Temple, each Reform Jew must use the authority of autonomy and make his or her own decision. Reform Judaism sees its philosophy and practice as stemming from the same basic root as traditional Judaism. The difference is in the approach to that tradition. Reform Judaism sees tradition as flexible and adaptable to new ways of thinking, lifestyle and the individual. Reform Judaism believes that its approach to tradition is part of the ongoing, progressive revelation begun at the destruction of the Second Temple and continuing on to today. Being a Reform Jew is demanding because it requires of us the responsibility to know, learn, understand, and decide what it means to be a Jew. It means living a Jewish life in the context of living in a secular/Christian world. It means being tolerant of the beliefs and practices of others and other Jewish movements. Finally, being a Reform Jew means being an authentic Jew by accepting what has come down to us and interpreting it for our own lives today. labbifor adling





IN THIS CORNER

This bulletin will arrive in your home just about the time we gather for Yom Kippur. This holy day, the holiest of all days, is a time that we set aside for introspection and self-realization through prayer and meditation. Services are conducted almost all day during this 24 hour period, from sundown one day to sunset the next. We offer words of atonement to God in exchange for purification and spiritual cleanliness. It is long day for those who stay all day and worship and pray. It is a hard day for those who participate in the tradition of fasting, living without food and water for 25 hours. It is also a day of community. It is through this air of communal feeling that we are sustained on this holiest day of the year.

The break-the-fast, worked on by our wonderful Temple Sisterhood, is one of those moments on our Jewish calendar I anticipate with excitement. The anticipation is not because I will eat for the first time after an extremely long and tiring day; rather, the break-the-fast is a moment of community in Temple Adath Israel. More than 200 people --women, men, children -- gather to conclude Yom Kippur by sharing an extensive meal prepared by loving Jewish hands. Members of this community, many new and some old, wish each other a *Shana Tova* -- a happy new year. Friendships are renewed, new ones made, and the Temple begins its new year together.

Creating and sustaining community is very important to the life and success of a religious group. It is even more important to this Jewish community which is small, spread out, and at times overwhelmed by the non-Jewish world around us. There are moments during our calendar year that a large community gathers: the opening day religious school picnic, the Hanukah Shabbat dinner, family night Shabbat services (sometimes), second night Passover Seder, and a few others. There are moments when a smaller community gathers: Torah Study, Adult Education, Young?? Adults, Sisterhood programs, Shabbat services. Regardless of whether the community is large or small, I believe for Jews, community is part of being Jewish.

This Temple serves Jews from a wide geographic area. We have members in places such as Frankfort, Paris and Danville, Somerset, Hazard and Mt. Sterling, Maysville and Morehead and Salyersville. They affiliate with the Temple to be part of a Jewish community. It may be for Jewish education for their children or the High Holy Days or because their families belonged, but they seek community



Temple Adath Israel needs to continue to find ways to build and shape Jewish communal lives. Our congregation is growing. By the time you receive this bulletin, we may reach a new high in membership of close to 350 family units. We are a community of single adults and families; young, middle age, and seniors; men and women; Jews, Jews-by-choice and non-Jews who are married to Jews; individuals from traditional and non-traditional backgrounds. 

The Jewish community and Temple Adath Israel welcome Vladimir and Zoya to the Temple family and the United States.



IN THIS CORNER

Temple Adath Israel initiated a new Religious School program on September 18, called *Temple Tots*. This special program is designed for children 2 & 3 years old and their parents. The parents and children meet together one Sunday a month from 10 AM - 11:30 AM. Everyone benefits. The children, even at this early age, see that their parents are interested in their Jewish education. Parents get the opportunity to learn about Judaism right along with their children. Each parent received a notebook at the first class for handouts which will help and guide them toward enhanced Jewish home experiences. Parents and children are learning Judaism together.

Intergenerational Jewish learning: yes, it is new; no, it is not so new. There was a time in our Jewish history and even not so distant past when there were no Sunday Religious School classes. There was a time when families still lived in the same community as their parents and grandparents, when intergenerational Jewish learning was exactly how Judaism was transmitted from one generation to the next. We moved away from this concept in America. Families moved apart. Jewish children received their primary and secondary education in secular schools. Temples created Sunday schools and mid-week schools as compensation to pass on Judaism to the next generation. Jewish learning and education began to leave the home and move to the Temple or synagogue. Parents became less and less involved, although not necessarily less interested, in the Jewish education of their children. They left the teaching up to strangers or acquaintances in the formal setting of the Sunday Religious School.

We can see the lingering effect of this move reflected in who comes to the Youth Education Committee meetings. Basically, it's the same people who went when I first arrived in 1986. Maybe a few faces have come and gone, but generally it is the same people. Parents of children new to the Temple or the Religious School don't seem too interested in what we teach as long as we do it. Fewer and fewer people are interested in the content of Sunday morning.

I want to tell all of our membership that we do an excellent job in our Religious School. Judi Higdon is a fine principal, deeply committed to her job. She understands Jewish education and children. She has organized and helped standardize what we teach. Our rate of teacher turnover is very low. Our teachers give of themselves as much as they can to teach under difficult conditions. Not



difficult physical conditions. Our building and space is more than adequate. I am talking about the condition of time. Our children receive less than 70 hours of formal Jewish education a year. Add on an additional 50% if they are in Hebrew School or preparing for a Bar/Bat Mitzvah. The total may be 800 hours of formal Jewish education in all the years that they attend Religious School. In perspective, that is a little over a semester of time spread out over more than 10 years. The odds are stacked against the Jewish Sunday school's health and survival. Our job is to not to be the primary teacher of Judaism, but the supplement to their Jewish home education. We provide an opportunity for communal learning which, in effect, substantiates all of the other things taught about Judaism. Without parent support, we will not succeed as we should.

Some parents truly care what happens in the classroom on Sunday. Their children come eager to learn and develop their Jewish identities through the lessons we prepare, the activities we offer, and the extras we provide. You can tell a lot from the child who is at Temple on time, who doesn't talk back to the teacher, who responds and leads in class. You can tell that the parents care.

This is what Temple Tots is going to do for us in the long run. Parents are going to see once again that Jewish learning is fun and important. The parents who chose to enroll in this new program do not just drop their children off. They come into the building. How exciting! Maybe as these children move through their Jewish education at T.A.I., the parents will keep on coming to class, asking questions, learning right along with the children, and taking the information home to make a part of their secular Jewish lives in the every day world.

My hat is off to Sandy Adland, who teaches this class, for making real a dream of parent education in our Religious School classroom. The challenge is to see if we can do more. My hat is off to the parents who come and care what happens both on Sundays and at the committee meetings. We need new, interested, committed, and creative souls to move us toward the year 2000. My hat is still on though as dozens of parents still need to come forward to give us their time and talent and strength.

Finally, I salute our Religious School staff who teaches each Sunday: from the 4 year old program through Confirmation; to the teachers of Hebrew, music, art, the aides and assistants. Everyone comes together to make Sunday work. On November 4, 1994, we will recognize our Religious School staff and say thank you. This will take place during our 3rd annual Teacher's Shabbat Service beginning at 8 PM. Dr. Peter Flynn, the new superintendent of Fayette County Schools, will speak during the service. Families are encouraged to bring their child's teacher(s) to the service. I want to show our children that secular Jewish education is as important as their religious Jewish education, that their teacher on Sunday is as important as the teacher on Monday. By having all the teachers in the sanctuary together at one time, public school and Jewish school, I believe we will accomplish this feat. Rabbi fon Odland


PRESCHOOL NEWS







In this corner...

Temple Adath Israel is a good congregation and a good community. There exist a variety of programs for our Temple membership ranging from Adult Education to youth education. There are youth groups that meet periodically. Sisterhood holds its monthly meetings. Worship services are conducted every *Erev Shabbat* and on Shabbat mornings when there is Torah Study. After reading this booklet I am now convinced that, like the vision of the Jewish communities noted in the booklet, we can be an even more active community, embracing more people into our midst, involving more people into our offerings and inner workings, reaching beyond the limits that presently exist for ourselves. If this idea of community growth, growth as in spirit, programs, opportunities, personal Jewish development, is important to you as a member of Temple Adath Israel, then read on as I present a vision of what we as a community can become. If you are content with the Temple as it is, then this vision of possibilities will not be important to you. Stopping here will not affect your life as a current member. Temple will continue to serve your needs tomorrow as it does today.

First, I believe that we must begin with Shabbat. Shabbat must be more than a worship service, it must be a transforming experience that moves someone from the every day world into the realm of holiness and spirituality and rest. IN THIS CORNER

sharing traditions of celebrating Shabbat every week at home. As a Jewish community, we should not only be able to recite *kiddush* and bless the candles and sing *motzi*, but we should be able to sing *zemirot* (Shabbat melodies), understand the nature of Shabbat, sing the blessing at the end of the meal, and learn to make *havdalah* on Saturday night. How wonderful it would be to have a *Shabbaton*, a weekend Shabbat experience, a

few times a year where everyone is thinking about the holiness of Shabbat and not about that day's sports schedule.

Second, I would love to see Temple as a place of study not only for children, but adults. I am not speaking of Adult Education as we now have it, but on a larger scale with courses offered on Sunday mornings, Tuesday evenings, Wednesday at noon, in people's homes, in the Temple library or conference room. We also need to look beyond the confines of the Temple's walls to new opportunities for study and, along with this, Jewish spiritual, emotional, and intellectual growth. The idea of having learning fairs at Temple once a year so that we can delve deeper into serious aspects of celebrating and living a Jewish life should be commonplace and not extraordinary on our schedule. Jewish camping trips which harmonize a Shabbat with Jewish learning could be a possibility. We must find a way to make Jewish learning for adults accessible, inviting, and important.

Third, our Social Action program must expand to encompass more issues, as well as more community involvement. I dream of the day when our building is in constant use by people tutoring those who need help, cooking for those who need food, and maybe even sheltering those who are cold. In several congregations, the idea of a *Mitzvah Day*, when the congregation is involved with a variety of service/social action projects on a single day, becomes a yearly event in their community. We have nothing to be ashamed about as far as community involvement is concerned. The HOPE Center, God's Pantry, Habitat for Humanity, CKBC all benefit from our willingness to care, but there is so much more that we can do.

Sandy has a dream of a Sukkah in every backyard. I have a dream of the holidays and holy days becoming more important than they are today. We know what the Jewish holidays are and what they mean, but we turn aside from celebrating them beyond a basic acknowledgment. Why can't we work to fulfill Sandy's dream and spend a day going from home to home, looking at each other's handiwork? Why can't we come together on Simchat Torah and celebrate with fervor the source of our laws, ethics, morality, and history? I would love to have a time when we not only celebrate, but study these holidays learning what they mean and can mean to us.

Finally, I have a vision of participation in all the above that the building couldn't hold all the people who want to attend an event. I see every woman joining Sisterhood, every man joining brotherhood, every eligible child participating in youth group.

If anyone in this congregation shares my vision or beliefs that we can transform this congregation from a

good one to an outstanding one, then let me know. I am looking for people willing to help stir the pot with me. I cannot do it alone. I need people willing to commit to become part of a programming team that reaches beyond the individual programming committees to encompass and embrace them all. The possibilities are endless. I am not looking for another long range task force, but for people willing to dive into a serious project, follow it through, and work to have positive, powerful results. The opportunity for change is now. Call me and tell me that you want to see Temple Adath Israel grow and change too.

A HANUKKAH GLOSSARY

HANUKKAH - A Hebrew word meaning "dedication". When the Jews had sent the Syrians down to final defeat, their first act was to cleanse the Temple in Jerusalem and remove the various pagan symbols and idols from it. They then held a ceremony dedicating the Temple once again to God. The holiday derives its name from the ceremony.

JUDAH MACCABEE - The name comes from the first letters of the Hebrew prayer Mi Kamocha Ba-elim Adonai ("Who is like Thee, O Lord!") inscribed on the Maccabean battle banner. Another reason that Judah was called the Maccabee is that he struck with the force of a mighty hammer. The Hebrew word for hammer is "makav". Judah became known as "The Hammer" or The Maccabee.

MACCABEES - Hebrew soldiers who fought the Syrians. Named after their leader, Judah the Maccabee.

MENORAH - Hanukkah candle holder. Contains places for 8 candles and a 9th candle, the shamus, is raised above the others. Each of the 8 candles represents one of the 8 days of Hanukkah.

DREIDEL - A four-sided top used on Hanukkah. Each side has a different Hebrew letter: nun, gimmel, hay, and shin. This stands for "Nes gadol ha-ya sham" ("A great miracle happened there").

SHAMUS - Helper candle used to light all the other candles.

LATKES - Potato pancakes. Traditional Hanukkah delicacy.

MATTATHIAS the Hasmonean - Priest who started revolt against the Syrians. Father of Judah Maccabee.

THE STORY OF HANUKKAH

After the death of Alexander the Great (323 B.C.E.) his Empire was divided into two smaller kingdoms - Egypt to the south and Syria to the north.

In the year 175 B.C.E. there arose a new king in Syria - Antiochus IV. He was a harsh ruler and treated all those whom he conquered cruelly.

Antiochus sent officers to the cities of Judea to proclaim, "The king has ordered all his kingdom to become one people and that everyone should forsake his own laws and his own religion." The king commanded the people to break the Sabbath and ignore the holy Jewish festivals. He instructed the Jews to ignore their prayers and religious practices. An idol was placed on the altar of God and incense burned in its honor.

The kings' officer came to the city of Modin and said to Mattathias, a priest who dwelt in Modin, "You are a great man and well-known in the city. Come and fulfill the king's command and you shall be counted among the king's friends." But Mattathias turned to the officer and answered in a loud voice, "Neither I or my sons nor any faithful Hebrews will ever worship an idol."

The Syrian officer called for another volunteer. When, in the sight of all the people, one of the Jews came forward to sacrifice to the idol, Mattathias was filled with anger, and struck him down.

Then Mattathias leaped to the top of the altar and shouted, "All those who are faithful to the Lord, follow me."

One of Mattathias' sons, Judah (called "The Maccabee"), became the commander-in-chief of the Hebrew army and led the people into battle. Never did people fight more bravely against such odds. Because they were dedicated to their religious heritage and to the principles for which it stood, they were filled with the courage and strength to achieve the final victory.

Judah, his brothers and all loyal Jews came to rededicate the Temple in Jerusalem. However, when the people gathered to celebrate the "rededication" the High Priest could find only one small jar of Holy oil with which to light the Ner Tamid (the Eternal Light). This was just enough oil to burn for one day. Then it was that a wondrous thing occurred. For the oil in the lamp burned for eight days!

In remembrance of this great occasion, Hanukkah - the Feast of Dedication - is observed every year for eight days, beginning with the twenty-fifty day of the month of Kisley.

Since the time of the Maccabees the battle for religious freedom has been fought over and over again throughout the world. After each victory, grateful men, women and children have dedicated themselves to their traditions and kept alive the remembrance of the struggle for religious freedom. As we celebrate the festival of Hanukkah, this year and every year, let us always give thanks for the freedom which our ancestors won so bravely. May we always treasure this precious possession, and ever seek to build a world in which all people may live in freedom and peace.

The candles are placed in the Hanukkah Menora from right to left and kindled from left to right.

As the Shamus (servant) candle is kindled, we sa each day: As one candle may kindle many other and yet lose none of its own light, so Judaism ha kindled the light of truth for many religions in m lands and still shines brightly through the eyes.

FIRST NIGHT - FREEDOM

We kindle these Hanukkah lights in memory of the dedication and courage of the Maccabees. Believing that they should be free to worship God as their hearts and minds dictated, willingly gave their lives for freedom. Now, kin these candles, we rededicate ourselves to work for the equal rights of all people, and for the realization of a society of democracy and freedom.

SECOND NIGHT - FAMILY

Tonight as we celebrate Hanukkah together we are conscious of our precious gift of family. So often we take one another for granted, forgetting to express our love and devotion. Let us, now, as we kindle these festive lights rededicate ourselves to sharing our interests and time with one another. Like the Maccabees of old, let us always face the tribulations and the joys of life united by our family bonds. Kindling these lights, we pray that through kindness and thoughtfulness, our love for one another will increase form strength to strength.

THIRD NIGHT - TORAH

On the third night of Hanukkah, we rededicate ourselves to the study of our tradition. As the Maccabees courageously fought to preserve our faith, we, too are duty-bound to sustain our heritage by deepening our understanding of it through study. By increasing our knowledge of Judaism we have become more sensitive to its abiding values, more aware of our responsibility to realize these values in our society. Study opens our minds and fortifies us against tyranny. Learning secures our freedom. Let us, then, as we kindle these candles rededicate ourselves to the study of our tradition.

FOURTH NIGHT - HOPE

Our ancestors have taught us that in hope a person's future is illumined and made creative. Ours are times when many people live in fear and great despair. Like the Maccabees, we need to build our lives on hope. Hope that ultimately, truth will triumph over superstition and confidence, that trust and understanding will finally depose superstition and tyranny. Now as we kindle these Hanukkah lights, may our eyes be directed to the loftiest visions of our faith.

FIFTH NIGHT - CHARITY

Our tradition tells us that during the Maccabean war for freedom, all Jews, both children and adults, contributed toward the cause of defeating the oppressor. There are many forms of oppression still existent in our world today.

There are people afflicted by sickness, hunger,

ignorance and prejudice. Tonight we, like our ancestors, put aside gifts of Tzedakah in order that we, too, may help to bring an end to oppression. We pray that the humble gifts we offer will provide food for the hungry, medicine for the sick, knowledge for the ignorant, and equal opportunity for those afflicted by prejudice. Now as we kindle our Hanukkah lights, let us rededicate ourselves to the ideal of Tzedakah, righteousness and justice, found in our Jewish tradition.

SIXTH NIGHT - SHALOM

The candles of Hanukkah remind us of our chosen mission as Jews. Like the Maccabees we seek to rededicate ourselves to the service of God. Today one of our foremost tasks is to secure peace in our

troubled world. When we end disagreements through mutual understanding, when we seek to mend hurt and wounded feelings, we make peace a living idea. Then let us, as we kindle our Hanukkah candles, rededicate ourselves with renewed strength to the task of securing peace.

SEVENTH NIGHT - BROTHERHOOD & SISTERHOOD

Brotherhood and Sisterhood is founded upon a total respect for the liberty and freedom of all people. The Maccabees of old sought to protect themselves when their rights were violated. Our Hanukkah lights serve as a reminder that peace is secure only when we honor the precious liberty and property of our fellow neighbor. As we kindle these lights, let us rededicate ourselves to the cause of peace which alone can bring dignity to all everywhere.

EIGHTH NIGHT - FAITH

Tonight we kindle all the candles of our Hanukkah Menorah. Throughout the centuries the Menorah has been a symbol of our Jewish faith. Like the Maccabees, when they celebrated this festive holiday, we rededicate ourselves to the living of a more meaningful Jewish life. We pray that throughout this coming year, we may fulfill the ideals of freedom, Tzedakah, family, study, hope, shalom, brotherhood and sisterhood, all of which are symbolized by the candles of our Menorah.






