

IN THIS CORNER

Last month I wrote an article encouraging the membership of this congregation to consider looking at a new vision of ourselves as a congregation. I wanted us to rethink the way we do our programming and the kinds of programs we offer. I put forward the argument that we needed to become more inclusive of everyone in our community, to consider new avenues of spirituality and celebration, become more active in *Tikkun Olam*, our Jewish responsibility to repair the world. The article concluded by asking anyone interested in working on this project to step forward and call me.

I assumed that a large number of people shared my desire to help move this congregation in new and expanded directions by organizing programs that are not only for the young or old or gender specific, but to bring together a cross section of our community at any given time to celebrate, learn, and rejoice. My expectation was not realized. Only a handful of people showed interest in this idea of creating a new, more vibrant, expanded living Jewish community and congregation. I want to thank the few that said yes and guess at the reasons more didn't volunteer.

I can see three reasons for the lack of response, though there may be many others. One reason people didn't volunteer is that they thought the vision was ill-conceived. These people read the article and either dismissed it or thought it wrong. The second reason people didn't volunteer is that they thought the other person was going to volunteer, take the leadership role, and do what he or she has always done. Let me assure you that, for the most part, the individuals who volunteered to help did not come from those who have or are serving in positions of leadership in our congregation. Those who said yes are quiet people desiring to see this experiment we call Judaism be maintained and strengthened. The third reason people didn't volunteer is because they see no reason for this congregation to make any changes at all. Either the programs are fine or why rock the boat.

In this corner...

My friends, let me tell you that Jewish life in this country is undergoing a tremendous struggle to maintain any sense of stability. The most publicized aspect of the pressures on contemporary Jewish life is intermarriage. We read about the rate of intermarriage, but rarely do we discuss the long term ramifications of such unions. Let us not be fooled though, the issue of intermarriage in determining the future of American Jewish life is only the tip of the iceberg. More pressing is the decrease of seriously educated Jews; the decrease of Jewish financial support of the Synagogues and Temples; the overall number of Jews who attend Shabbat worship; the overall number of Jews who can't encourage their Jewish teenager children to attend worship, study, youth group or camp because it conflicts with their secular lives; the declining participation in Temple auxiliaries such as Brotherhood and Sisterhood, and so on.

If we are a congregation that is serious about making Jewish life a viable personal, spiritual, and community experience, then we must address the issues as a congregation and find a better, more vibrant and

contemporary way of creating a living Jewish community. This means encouraging individuals from every corner of our congregation to say, "Yes, I want to make Jewish life more meaningful for me and my children, my friends and relatives". This cannot be done by a few people sitting around thinking out loud. It will take a host of individuals who are willing to think, act, be committed, and see things through to a positive, uplifting final result.

If you need to be invited to participate, then I am inviting you. I need you. If you are overwhelmed with personal commitments, then remember Temple needs your time too. Whatever it takes, please consider this a priority, consider Temple a priority. Everyone's voice will be heard and in the end lives might be affected, uplifted, or changed.

Please call me at Temple and say yes to making Temple Adath Israel a model for Jewish living.



FROM THE UAHC BIENNIAL MEETING

I recently attended our Regional Biennial for the Union of American Hebrew Congregation in Nashville, TN. It was a wonderful opportunity to meet with other members of the Midwest council and to share in the lives of our varied congregations.

The theme of this year's regional was "Being Reform in the 21st Century". Our focus was not so much on being successful dues collectors but on making our congregations into houses of Judaism. Not an easy task in our busy and fast paced lives of today.

Our weekend started with a Shabbat dinner for the delegates, followed by a service led by the two Rabbis in Nashville. Two of the speakers captured what I feel are questions we, at Temple Adath Israel, should address. While our region includes parts of twelve states spanning three time zones from Knoxville, TN to Boulder, CO, it is all of us together, that will shape the future of Reform Judaism.

Stephen Pinsky, our region's head Rabbi, reminded us that "our synagogues are houses of God not because they contain sacred objects of our past, but because they uphold the ideals which the love of God implies and implores and impels". It is this heart of Judaism that will enable us to continue to thrive.

Many of us are asking what is happening to Reform Judaism? Are we moving from Classical Reform Judaism to the point that some of our members are feeling uncomfortable? What continues to distinguish us from the other branches of Judaism? In looking back to the dreams of Rabbi Issac Mayer Wise, it would seem that it is our continued ability to change to meet current needs that allows us to thrive.

In fact, many of our trends are changing. Last summer, 7,000 young people attended our Reform camps, making the Reform camping movement the largest in North America. There is an elevated level of Hebrew in our services and more individuals are choosing to worship with Tallit and Kipa. Just fifty years ago, women were not able to serve as ordained Rabbis. It was Reform Judaism that recognized the passing of tradition from father to child and not only mother to child. To quote Mel Merians, President of our Union, "It is the kind of innovation, not the amount of Hebrew we read, that is the hallmark of Reform Judaism. It is our willingness to allow for creative changes to meet the challenges confronting Judaism, not whether we wear kippot, that distinguishes us from the other major forms of Judaism".

We are still striving to make our worship services welcoming and inviting to all. Reform Judaism will continue to be a movement which challenges us, and each generation will develop their own way to express their beliefs.

I believe it is our charge, not to count the number of tallit, but to count the number of new members in our midst. To listen, not to the amount of Hebrew in our service, but to what our children and grandchildren say about Reform Judaism. They, not we, are our basis for evaluation.

Our region addressed the application of Beth Adam in Cincinnati and the implications of a humanistic congregation on our Union. We also addressed the proposed name change, to be voted on next year. It was felt that The Union of Reform Jewish Congregations, as opposed to the current Union of American Hebrew Congregations more aptly describes our movement.

None of these issues are ones that Temple Adath Israel can address alone. Through our membership in the Union and our continued dialogue with other member congregations, we will emerge even stronger and better able to meet the needs of our own congregants.

IN THIS CORNER

In my endeavor to encourage this congregation to look toward tomorrow with eyes open to the many possibilities of new Jewish visions, it remains important for all of us to continue to look to see the trees and not just see the forest. In the next few bulletin articles, it is my goal to present the current situation or status of various parts of our community's life. After presenting those aspects, I will offer suggestions as to possible directions or ideas for us to consider. Some of these ideas may be significant departures from our present practice where others may just be minor variations on a theme. Regardless of the amount of change, it is time for us to go boldly into the future.

We must accept the fact that life in this country for Jews is changing. Intermarriage is scraping away Jews who are only marginally connected to Judaism and Jewish life. They are forsaking their Jewish heritage for other paths that are laid in front of them. Jewish attrition is not new, but it is always sad. Our numbers cry out to the members of our heritage to remain connected and affiliated and active.

Where attrition sees Jews leaving our fold, assimilation continues to lower the priority of Judaism in the lives of Jews who are connected and affiliated, even if only marginally. The choices we have regarding everyday decisions reflects who we are. Many of us never consider the choice of Judaism as an option, or when it is weighed against the alternatives, the alternative wins. Economic realities find Jews offering less of their financial resources to help sustain synagogue budgets which are pared down as far as they can go without the existing life of the synagogue being threatened. If a synagogue wants programs, if it wants efficient management, the best teachers, choices and opportunities, then dollars or many, many volunteers are required. Without adequate resources, the synagogue building will become an empty shell.

Finally, the number of individual's committed to an active, vibrant, Jewish synagogue based life seems to be decreasing. Offering programs at which only a handful respond or asking for assistance with limited response may eventually cause the remaining core to become frustrated, apathetic or quit.

With the above as a premise, how do we conceive a congregation which will sustain the Jewish lives of our children, excite the present membership to participate, encourage many toward leadership, and provide a sound Jewish environment?

The first place to look is worship. Regardless of all



the other parts of being a Jew, the first focus must be our covenant with God. It is how we began as a people. God called Abraham to go forth and establish a new people in a new land. Abraham understood that to accept this call was also an acknowledgment and acceptance of this one, universal, untouchable God. Since that moment we have sought ways to connect, relate, pray to this One God. We created a Temple with sacrifices to say thank you and I'm sorry. Our ancestors sought communal worship experiences through the early synagogue even as the sacrificial fires burned on Mt. Moriah. The rabbis projected the people's deepest religious and spiritual feelings in a series of set prayers and times for prayer.

The early Reformers attempted to modernize prayer by rewriting prayers to fit a new moral, social agenda. And, now in recent days, in all forms of Jewish life, communities strive to find new and creative ways of prayer.

In my next article I will explore some ideas I've seen, heard, discussed or thought about concerning Reform Jewish worship. The ideas of worship and prayer seem to offer enhanced opportunities for a greater spiritual center of worship.

The march will end with a ceremony in memory of Martin Luther King, Jr. at 11 AM.


RICHARD FREED TO ADDRESS CONGREGATION JANUARY 20TH

In this corner...

Is the glass half-empty or half-full when it comes to understanding the Shabbat worship experience at TAI? That depends on how you look at the glass. Many people judge a successful Shabbat by the number of people attending. If a successful worship experience is judged by the number of people attending, then the average attendance has easily doubled since my first years at TAI. If a successful worship experience is judged by the percentage of congregants attending a Jewish Shabbat service against the national average, then we are still ahead. If a successful worship experience is judged by the percentage of our congregants attending services, then we must ask why more people don't attend services. Our sanctuary holds more than 230 people. Attendance ranges between 60 and 90 people. Demographics are wonderful as individuals of all ages worship together Friday evenings. It presents the image of an extended family. Yet, there are too many empty seats which could and should be filled by members of our community coming together in prayer, community, and in the joy of celebrating Shabbat. Is the glass half-empty or half-full?

Another way to look at the worship experience at TAI is by the content and style of the services. Without question, many aspects of the worship experience have changed since I began leading services in 1986. Suffice it to say that members view the changes differently. There is more Hebrew in the service. The Haftarah portion is read regularly. Torah and/or sermons make up the teaching part of the service. The music is more contemporary and the congregation is singing more and more. Members are invited off of a long list to sit on the bimah. (Unless you are an officer or board of trustees member it may take as long as two vears before your name is reached again on the list). Bimah participants are invited to participate in the service and many say yes. Children are encouraged to attend services with a once-a-month service dedicated to them. We say the Bircat Hachodesh each month at the appropriate time. There are conversions, wedding blessings, and baby namings. Is the glass half-empty or half-full?

People offer reasons, excuses, apologies for not attending services. Some say that services are too late and they are too tired after a long week of work. Some say that they are boring. Some say that they live too far away. Some say that it is because their children would be out too late. Many of these reasons may be valid, but there are many Temple members who anticipate the relaxation of a Shabbat service after a long work week. Some people are spiritually

stimulated by the notion of prayer and responding to God. Distance for many of us is not an issue when it comes to other aspects of our lives. As one congregant recently said when discussing service attendance, "Napping our children in the afternoon would provide for an adventure of going to Temple in the evening."

Taking into account everything what I said above, it is time to ask where we want our Temple worship experience to be in a few years and how do we get there? At what point will our services be such that we don't even consider the glass half-empty, but when will it be full enough? In my opinion, the three components that contribute to a successful Shabbat worship experience are community, liturgy, and participation.

Community is an area that I believe we succeed in more often than not. I watch members of this congregation greet the "stranger in our midst" and escort him or her into our sanctuary. I see Temple members make sure that visitors have a *siddur* from which to pray and participate in the service. At the Oneg Shabbat, I see people milling about and speaking with others. There are times though that the eyes of a new congregant look to share the Shabbat experience with another Jew, but the stranger doesn't feel comfortable asking. There are times in the Oneg that the new person sits alone sipping hot tea waiting for a friendly smile and hello. Forming a complete community means without reservation asking the visitor to sit with you and joining the loner during the Oneg.

Community is also formed by attitude. We must work as a congregation to bring a positive, spiritual attitude with us into the sanctuary. There are times when Temple is for the mourner, the sad person, or a person contemplating weighty decisions. We must be there for them. Yet, there are those who come for the sheer joy of Shabbat. People must wear this outwardly, not stowing it away or hiding it. Knowing that in coming to Temple on Shabbat or on the High Holy Days you will walk into the midst of a community filled with the joy of Shabbat or the reverence of a Holiday will set the stage for a successful prayerful moment.

Liturgy is an area in which we can all grow together. Twenty years ago the <u>Union Prayer Book</u> was replaced by the <u>Gates of Prayer</u> or the <u>New Union Prayer Book</u>. In a few years, the Reform movement will publish another new prayer book. I am sure that it will produce two responses: some will like it; some will not like it. Rabbis don't possess the miracle answers to what makes a good prayer. As a congregation, over the next few years, we must look to produce worship services of our own reflecting the inner spiritual yearnings and journeys of our own membership. Many of us have read beautiful passages of prose or poetry which can be included as meditations or readings in a worship service.

When our children go to Reform Jewish camps, they write about their feelings of God, nature, camp, friendship, community, etc. These writings and readings are interspersed among traditional Jewish prayers. With music being sung as an entire community, voices lifted up to God, these children leave camp longing for the same spiritual experience at home. They don't find it. Though Temple is not the same

Bar/Bat Mitzvah Date Setting for Children born in 1984 scheduled for March 8, 7:30 pm. environment as an outdoor chapel, the spiritual feeling of creating your own service can be duplicated leading all of us to a higher spiritual existence. We must seek to create liturgy which is meaningful, uplifting, comforting, exciting, and Jewish. No longer will we say services are boring. The services will be ours.

Finally there is the component of participation. On Shabbat mornings, after an hour of Torah study, we have a service that lasts about 30 minutes. For years I led this service and the rest of the people present acted as the congregation. Secretly I longed to involve other people. Finally, one Shabbat morning I asked who would like to read and since then, worship is not only led by me, but many others in attendance.

I believe that our Erev Shabbat worship must move in this direction as well. Along with new services that we create ourselves, along with a feeling of friendship and belonging, must be the feeling of ownership in the worship experience. Yes, the rabbi is trained to lead services, but this shouldn't preclude others from doing so as well. It doesn't need to happen only from the lectern, but a participant can stand up in his or her place and read a passage. I would love for others to volunteer months to read Torah, deliver a sermon, tell a story at Family Shabbat, or give a drash. The freedom to do this comes from ownership in the service and the opportunity comes from the rabbi who says that he or she doesn't need to be the focus, the central point in the sanctuary. God and Torah are the focus, the rabbi is a Jew praying with every other Jew.

The first thing I will do to accomplish this is to join the congregation in prayer. When everyone rises to recite the *Shema* or *Avot v'Imahot*, facing toward the Holy Ark. I too will face toward the Holy Ark. We are participating in this experience together. I want to pray with you, not at you. The second thing I must do is encourage any of you who wants to participate in a service to say so. If it is to give a sermon, read Torah, etc. tell me and we'll find a date. Eventually, hopefully soon, our sanctuary will be such that it is ours together.

Is the glass half-empty or half-full? The answer is hard to say, but with a look toward tomorrow and what it could be, the glass may be completely full always.

From the Rabbi's Library



As many of you know, I have an extensive Jewish library in my Temple office. After receiving some books recently in the mail that possibly would benefit many of you in enhancing your Jewish lives, I realize that I should be sharing with you the titles of some of the books that I read and/or purchase. Therefore, each month I will feature a small article containing the titles and descriptions of books that might be useful in building a personal Jewish life, a Jewish library, and a strong Jewish home.

40 Things You Can Do To Save The Jewish People (Jason Aronson Inc., Northvale, NJ, 1995) is the latest book from the author/educator Joel Lurie Grishaver. Just listen to some of the table of contents which is divided into nine overall sections. Under Shabbat some of the sub-topics read: Do Not Make Them Go to Services; Create Reasons They'll Want to Go; or Always Insist that Shabbat Come First. Under Holiday Celebration it says: Make Kiddush and ha-Motzi on Thanksgiving; and Begin Your Passover Seder in the Kitchen and Finish the Second Half of the Seder for the Adults. Other topics include things such as A Jewish Home, Jewish Education, Dating and Marriage, and so on.

For children (small children), I just received the book Thank You, God!: a Jewish child's book of prayers (Kar-Ben Copies, Inc, Rockville, MD, 1993) by Judyth Groner and Madeline Wikler. It is a simple, well-illustrated book of Jewish prayers that come from a variety of holidays and different moments in a Jewish person's life. This book can be read at bed time and eventually used by the child as a reference book as he or she ages.

As I receive books that are useful, I will offer the titles and descriptions to you. I am sure that these books can be ordered from a bookstore such as Joseph-Beth.

Shmurah matzah is matzah that is specially prepared under the strictest guidelines according to the Kosher for Passover dietary rules. The matzah is mixed, kneaded, rolled, scored and handbaked. IN THIS CORNER...

Looking at our Adult Education program, I see success and failure. What I don't see is any plan or direction that builds from one year to the next. Over the last nine years we offered classes in a variety of Jewish subjects and taught classes that gave birth to Jewish ideas or fulfilled others people's Jewish dreams. As I review the process of Adult Education at TAI, I don't see any consistency or method for an individual participating in the program which would lead directly to building a strong foundation for living a Jewish life.

Blame for the lack of vision in creating an adult education is not the issue. As I read many Temple bulletins, I don't see a plan in their programs either. Sometimes a congregation is teaching the hot subject in Jewish thought at the time. Other congregations may be investing energy into studying the basics of Jewish life. Some have little things going on in a variety of places, but no common thread linking them together. It is time to examine what we need as a Jewish community in terms of continuing Jewish education and figure out a way to implement it.

The most successful programs at TAI are the classes for which an individual pays a tuition fee. Since 1986, over 150 people have participated in the Basic Judaism course and over 100 in the Introduction to Hebrew class. Four B'nai Mitzvah classes (adult Bar/Bat Mitzvah) and one B'nai Avraham v'Sarah class have completed their studies. All of these classes run for several weeks and charge a fee to cover materials. The other successful adult education program at TAI is the Saturday morning Torah Study. Beginning in 1986, we met once-a-month with about 10 participants. In 1987, this increased to twice-a-month with about the same number of people participating. In 1995, approximately 20+individuals are attending Torah Study.

The grandest failures of the Temple Adult Education program are all of the noon time classes. We tried Bible Study, a study of the Prophets, and Talmud Study. None of the programs could draw more than a handful of people at any one time. The oddity behind the failure of these classes is that daytime classes are very successful in many other congregations.

Our Temple Adult Education consists of two other components. One is the scholar-in-residence program which is always successful, at least in part. Friday evening, at Shabbat Services, there is a nice turn out to hear the address. By Sunday morning, only a handful of individual attend the lecture.

Every year the Temple offers mini-courses. We have looked at the Bible, the New Testament, Reform Judaism, Talmud, Midrash, history, life-cycle events, and more. These mini-courses run from 2-4 weeks and are attended by 5-15 people. For a congregation of 500+ adults, 3% or less attendance is not very good.

Before moving on in this article, it should be stated that the Temple Book Discussion group continues as a separate learning opportunity at TAI and is a success for its longevity and in attendance. Also, Outreach, the program for Jews-by-Choice and intermarried couples continues to be a vital source of education at Temple.

I am not sure why members of this community don't attend the Adult Education program. One of the highest values in Jewish life is education/study. Study sustained the minds of our ancestors as they toiled in poverty stricken lives. Instead of giving in to the desolation, our ancestors continued to look at the holy tomes of the rabbis, add commentaries of their own, and expand their ability to think and reason. The government could take away their land, their possessions, expel them, abuse them, and harm them, but it couldn't take away the ability to think and reason and understand.

The generation of Jews who came to this country poor, dirty, and unknowing used their ability to think to pull themselves up and out of poverty in a society that encouraged individuals to advance and better themselves. Immigrant Jews saved their pennies to send their children to school to get an education, but no longer was the education a Jewish education as in the old country. Knowing Talmud and Torah was not on the paths of streets paved in gold. Science and law replaced Mishnah and Midrash and Rashi as the tools to a thinking, creative mind. For most of the Jewish community, post-religious school education was not and is not important. We don't seem to yearn for a deeper understanding of who we are as Jews.

Some of this is time. Our daily lives are so busy that the thought of attending an education course in the evening is out of the question. It also precludes participating in daytime classes. Sunday morning is an ideal time for Adult Education, but good learning space is not available Therefore, as we look to a new method of Adult Education at TAI, time, as well as topic, must be considered.

It is time now to look at a different way of doing adult education. I believe that the important building blocks are an integration of educational programs and an organization of classes which build on the foundation of previously held classes. Integration and organization are not dependent. Integration means, in this context, to tie together what is going on in the various components of Temple life so that the sermons, lectures, classes, and book discussions are working together in general themes and in a common direction. Organization means to structure the program in such a way as to see a beginning, middle and end, but not to do it in a manner that would eliminate the participation of someone new to the Temple or to the process of Jewish Adult Education

ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING - SUNDAY, APRIL 30

My vision is a three year cycle of courses which would include some of the following:

- the building blocks to an effective and creative Jewish life;
- · philosophy, theology, and liturgy;
- an adult confirmation program;
- beginning, intermediate and advanced Hebrew;
- scholars brought in yearly who would coordinate lectures based on our course of study;
- working knowledge of Talmud, Mishnah, and Midrash;
- · Bible study;
- history.

At the end of three years (or four or five years), the course of study would start over again. For individuals who have completed the program, study hevrahs would be created for continuing Jewish education.

The key to all of this is a plan. We need to decide what we want to learn and how we will go about accomplishing that task. Yet, without Jewish adults feeling the need to expand and deepen their Jewish knowledge, even the most creative and ambitious of Temple Adult Education programs will fail. I believe that this won't happen. I believe that Jews want to learn about Judaism. The time is now to look to a better way to present Adult Education. Please come and help.



From the Rabbi's Library



This may seem a strange question to ask, but do you have a copy of The Hebrew Scriptures, The Holy Bible, in your home? I am surprised at the number of Jews who don't own or don't know whether they have a copy of The Bible at home. Although Judaism is not a Bible thumping or quoting religion, the essence of who we are and our early history and writings are found in The Bible, especially in the first 5 books which we call The Torah.

In my office I have several different Bibles. I have copies of The Hebrew Scriptures in Hebrew and English and copies of the New Testament in Hebrew (believe it or not) and English. I have Bibles with commentaries and Bibles without commentary. I own one set of books called the Anchor Bible series in which each book is an individual volume of the Hebrew Scriptures, New Testament and Apocrypha.

Of all the Bibles I own, the most useful is The Torah: A Modern Commentary. This volume does not include the prophets or writings. It is the Torah with the appropriate Haftarah portions. The volume includes a commentary written and edited mainly by a Reform rabbi named Gunther Plaut. This commentary is from a liberal and modern religious perspective. It is not a hammering or rehashing of the ancient rabbis' words on Torah though many rabbinic comments are included in the volume. Rather, it is a fresh approach from the modern world to enable us to understand very old, but timeless words.

The Torah: A Modern Commentary is the text we use in our Saturday morning Shabbat Torah Study group. We are reading it page by page. I encourage each of you to own this book (it is available through the gift shop) and read it as often as you can.

THANK YOU DR. FLYNN

The Fayette County Schools made a conscious decision that in each of the next two years one of the High Holy Days will be a day off from school for students. In 1995, Rosh Hashanah will be a professional day and in 1996, on Yom Kippur, school will not be in session. Of the remaining two High Holy Days, only Yom Kippur in 1995 is still a school day. (Rosh Hashanah 1996 falls on the weekend).

This decision was not made arbitrarily. In my discussion on this matter with Dr. Flynn, he said that in setting the school calendar the Jewish community's Holy Days were taken into account. As a member of the Jewish community, I want to publicly thank Dr. Flynn and his staff for the sensitivity shown to the Jewish community. I have written a note of appreciation and thanks to Dr. Flynn. Many issues still need to be addressed, especially what happens in December in the schools, but this act is more than just a good faith effort, it is deeply appreciated.

I hope that every member of this congregation who is concerned about the attitude toward minorities -- racial, religious, ethnic -- in Lexington and in the public schools will take a moment to write a thank you note to Dr. Peter Flynn and his staff. It is nice to be noticed.



ITEMS NEEDED FOR THE SEDER PLATE

A. Charoset -Composed of chopped nuts and apples, cinnamon and wine, charoset represents the mortar used by the Jews in making bricks while they were slaves in Egypt.

B. Zeroa - The roasted shankbone or roasted wing of a fowl represents the sacrifice of the Paschal lamb.

C. Beitza - The roasted hard-cooked egg symbolizes the festival offering brought to the Temple.

D. Moror - The bitter herbs are represented by horseradish that has been freshly grated from the horseradish root. They symbolize the bitterness of slavery for the Jews in Egypt.

E. Karpas - You may use parsley or celery to represent Spring, which brings rebirth and redemption. It is dipped in salt water before it is eaten to remind us of the tears and sweat of the Jewish people in slavery.

F. Chazereth - On most Seder plates, there is another form of bitter herbs. It may be the root of the horseradish (ungrated) or watercress.

SETTING THE SEDER TABLE

Seder Plate - The most important item on the table is the Seder plate, containing the symbolic foods. Seder plates are usually beautifully decorated, often with scenes from the Passover story or with Hebrew inscriptions.

Three Matzahs - The ceremonial matzahs are placed, one on top of the other, in a special matzah cover or in a napkin. According to a common interpretation, the matzahs represent the three divisions of the Jewish people; Kohen - priest; Levi - assistants in the Temple; Israelites - people of Israel.

Additional Matzah - Additional matzah is placed on a serving plate, for eating during the main meal.

Haggadahs - The Haggadah is the book that is read cover to cover during the evening. It includes the story, prayers, songs, rituals, and commentary that make up the Seder. Make sure you have one at each place.

Dish of Salt Water - Part of the Seder ritual is to dip the Karpas (parsley) into salt water, which represents the tears of the Jewish people while in slavery.

Wine Glasses - The glasses are filled with the traditional, Kosher for Passover wine.

Decanter of Wine - There should be enough wine to pour four cups for each individual. These represent the four divine promises of redemption found in Exodus 6:6-7. You will also need enough wine forserving during the meal.

Cup of Elijah - Fill a beautiful cup with wine and put it in a prominent place on the table to welcome Elijah, the prophet who heralds freedom and redemption.

Charoset - Although charoset goes on the Seder plate, extra charoset is served for making the Hillel sandwich and to eat during the meal. Rabbi Hillel, a great Jewish teacher who lived between 90 BCE and 70 CE may have invented this sandwich of charoset and moror (between two pieces of matzah) to represent the bitterness of slavery and the sweetness of freedom.

 ${\it Candlesticks}$ - The blessing over the candles is recited before the Seder begins.

Pillows - Pillows to lean on are traditionally placed on chairs, especially in the chair of the leader of the Seder, as a symbol of freedom from slavery.

Among the foods that must contain the "Kosher l'Pesach" label and be certified for Passover use by rabbinical authority are:

Matzah, matzah flour, Passover noodles
Candles, cakes, cookies, jams and jellies
Cheeses, milk, and butter
Canned and processed foods, such as fruits, sauces, and soups
Salad oils, shortenings, vinegar
Beverages, wine and liquors
Vegetable gelatin
Relishes
Dried fruits
Horseradish

The following foods require no Kosher l'Pesach label if they are in unopened packages or containers or in a natural state:

Coffee, tea, and sugar (but not confectioners' sugar, because it contains cornstarch)
Salt, pepper, and spices (some herbs should be fresh)
All fruits and nuts
All vegetables except legumes such as peas, corn, and beans





IN THIS CORNER...

Which prophets' words spoke most loudly to the founders of Reform Judaism? Was it Isaiah, Micah, Amos, Jeremiah, or Hosea? These men from our historic past exhorted our ancestors to do justice and love mercy; to beat swords into ploughshares, to not offer sacrifices in vain, but to follow the commandments; to remember the needs of the orphan and the widow, to feed the hungry and clothe the naked and shelter the homeless. As Reform Judaism broke away from the path of Orthodoxy, the founders of this great movement turned to the words of those who once spoke to our people. They reminded us that ritual may be important to the individual's soul and his/her connection to God, but that we must never forget that Judaism's mission is more than just following the ritual mitzvot, it is raising up the ethical mitzvot as well.

Moving out from behind the ghetto walls in the 19th century into the larger world community also meant taking responsibility for trying to correct and heal the ills of the world Judaism does not believe either that the world was once perfect or that Adam and Eve's action in the Garden of Eden caused humankind to fall from its lofty position.

Rather, Judaism looks to the words in Genesis 1:31:

And God saw all that God had made, and it very good.

The text does not say that God made everything perfect or that creation was complete. In Genesis 2:2 it does say:

On the seventh day God finished the work which God had been doing, and God ceased on the seventh day from all the work which God had done.

According to the beginning of Genesis, God created and did as much as God could before resting on Shabbat. It was not perfect, but *very good*. The rest was left up to us to complete. This is our mission: To finish God's creation — Tikkun Olam.

From the Pittsburgh Platform of 1885 which helped define a direction for Reform Judaism by emphasizing God, universalism and a commitment to humanity, to the Reform Judaism of today which has seen a renewed interest in observance, particularism, and a turning inward, Social Action has struggled to maintain its place at the top of Reform Judaism's priority list.

Without question, Reform Judaism reached its zenith in the 1950's and early 60's when it found itself committed to

and participating in the Civil Rights movement. Great Reform Jewish rabbis marched arm-in-arm with the leaders of the Black movement throughout the south and into Washington, D.C. The Union of American Hebrew Congregations, the collection and coalition of Reform Jewish congregations through North America, established a Religious Action Center in Washington, D.C. to be vigilant within our government concerning the rights of those who have no voice. Reform Judaism continues to champion every issue that affects the poor, the widom, the orphan, just as our prophets of old fought for them in days gone by.

Our movement's leadership can't do it all. Every congregation must respond to the call for justice by looking at its community and seeing what can we do. As I asked in my article two months ago on worship, "Is our glass half-empty or half-full?" We do and have planned many activities in the area of Social Action. Marty Kaplan, Bruce Engel, Lowell Nigoff, and Cookie Wenneker have all chaired our Temple Social Action Committee. Each has brought their passion for Social Justice to the meetings and the activities. None of them would succeed without the participation of the congregation. Temple Adath Israel attempts to do many things, but only a segment of the congregation supports the programs. Sometimes we ask for money, other times we ask for donations, and other times we need you to come out and help.

Here is a review of some of the things we have done:

- Collected money for 4 years for the Clergy Campaign for the Homeless with approximately 33-50% of the congregation responding;
- Collected money and physically helped build 2 houses for Habitat for Humanity with approximately 1/3 of the congregation responding;
- Served the dinner meal at the H.O.P.E.
 Center the first Monday of each month where the number of Volunteers appears to be sufficient enough to take on other tasks;
- Participated in 2 CKBC Blood Drive at Hanukah and our Annual Meeting with an adequate response, but could be better;
- Marched as a congregation at the MLK march with only a handful participating last January;
- Collected non-perishable food items in fall for God's Pantry with a good response of about 1/3 of the congregation, but there hasn't been an increase in 3 years.
- With the cooperation of the TAl Religious School, provided Thanksgiving baskets to needy families;
- The Sisterhood participates in Social Action by collecting items in its Mitzvah Crib, selling house - people - book pins with the money donated to worthy organizations.

We certainly ask our membership to participate in a host of Social Justice projects, but we certainly don't ask too much. Our youth are involved as well. Bar/Bat Mitzvah students are doing service projects within Lexington. Many

are collecting things for different agencies. By supporting their projects, we can teach them that you can make a difference if you try. The 5th, 9th, and 10th grades spent a Sunday morning at God's Pantry. And our Confirmation students are supposed to complete 18 hours of community service by the end of April.

There is still so much we can do, but we need people to say yes to **Tikkun Olam**. We can:

- ⇒ tutor students at Ashland Avc. Elementary in reading;
- ⇒ participate in the Bone Marrow Registry (see inside);
- ⇒ join in a study circle to fight racism;
- ⇒ sensitize ourselves to the needs of the disabled;
- ⇒ preserve fall vegetables for the H.O.P.E. Center rather than seeing this food rot.

Our current Social Action chair, Cookie Wenneker said that meeting unmet needs is why she is involved. My hope is that everyone who is able will look at this list of projects and say, "I can help." Sometimes the work is physically demanding. Other times it means writing a check. Other times it means buying an extra can of food or a bag of diapers and dropping them off at Temple.

In the area of Social Action, I would say that the glass is more than half-full, but we need to make the "cup runneth over." We can do more to finish God's creation, but it takes you and me, everyone, working together.

This volume is a gender sensitive, expanded version of the Gates of the House which was published in 1975. Anyone who takes seriously the celebration of Judaism in the home must have a copy of this book. The book includes the following topics:

- Prayers and Readings for Every Day
- Prayers and Readings for Shabbat, Festivals, and Special Days
- ♦ The Path of Life
- Weekday Services
- O Psalms, Poems and Readings

"Now included are prayers for pregnancy, birthdays, anniversaries, festivals and achievements, and for the more painful events in life: times of anxiety, the death of a child, illness and disappointments."

For most of Temple Adath Israel's membership, the first two sections may be most helpful. The sub-sections are easy to use. There is Hebrew, English, and many times the transliteration is provided. The first section includes the blessings said before and after a meal, as well as other blessings for food. The second section includes prayers said at Shabbat and Holy Days in the home.

The final section of the book, "Psalms, Poems, and Readings" was beautiful. There were many different passages to read and ponder from Biblical, Rabbinic and modern writings.

A BOOK REVIEW

COMBATTING CULT MIND CONTROL

Author, Steven Hassan

Our Senior Block students are so fortunate to have Joe Miller teach them about cults. In Joe's honor, my family donated this book to our Temple library. I recently made time to read it and want to share highlights of this book with you.

The author, Steven Hassan, a "nice Jewish boy" from Queens, NY, became involved with the "moonies" while in college. He tells of his two years with the cult, explains mind control, and offers suggestions about how to deal with loved ones who are involved with cults (even after they leave). There is an extensive list of resource organizations and rehabilitation facilities for former members.

Steven was in a serious car accident with the "moonies" and while in the hospital and post surgery, his parents were able to arrange for his deprogramming by several former cult members. Since then (14 years ago) he has become a leading "exit counselor" using non-coercive techniques which are different from the stressful and popular "kidnap deprogramming".

I highly recommend this book for those who want to understand cults and mind control--- the process, its dangers and what to do about it. It is catalogued and on the shelf #300.15 in the Temple library.







Some thoughts as we move into summer....

Show your parents that Judaism matters. Show your children, no matter how old they are, that Judaism matters and there will be a Jewish future.

We must never become de-sensitized to these tragedies. We must never think it won't or can't happen again. We must be vigilant, strong, never close our eyes. It will happen again until humanity says no more!! Maybe then, and only then, will the Messianic age of peace and community become a reality.

♦ Thank you to those serving on the Vision Committee. I know that the fruits of this labor will bear ripe fruit for everyone in the congregation to enjoy. Your commitment to this project and the ability to be patient is very much appreciated and wise.

From the Rabbi's Library



Leo Trepp's The Complete Book of Jewish

Observance is one the most usable books on Jewish living that I own. It gives enough depth and meaning to the various aspects of Jewish life that we feel versed on the subject.

Trepp stops before going beyond what we really need to know

The book is divided into two parts. Part one is called, "The Celebration of the Year." Part two is called, "The Celebration of Life." Each section has multiple subsections which break down into the individual components of Jewish living: The Covenant and the Jewish Way of Life, Prayer: Concentration on the Ultimate; Kashrut: Discipline Through Diet, and so on. Each section offers historical perspective and the modern celebration from the liberal to the traditional. Appropriate prayers, blessings, ceremonies, and traditions are presented and discussed.

If you are looking for a book on Judaism as a way of life and how to live that way of life, consider Leo Trepp's, The Complete Book of Jewish Observance. It can only enhance your depth of knowledge and help you achieve a higher sense of spirituality through Jewish living.

KABBALAT SHABBAT SUMMER SERVICES

With the arrival of the months of July and August comes a different, more low-keyed style of worship at TAI. Beginning July 7, we move into our traditional summer 6 PM Kabbalat Shabbat worship. My hope is that more people who are interested in these areas of our congregations life will participate in all levels of their implementation from the detail work of the committee to the fruit of the work in the program. If we are to become an excellent congregation in all aspects of our community life, then these areas must grow to become comprehensive and visionary.

The chairs and co-chairs of the Adult Education, Worship, and Social Action committees are ready to lead us forward. They know that the task is not an easy one. People don't always want Temple to be the center or mainstay of their lives. Congregants don't feel they need to enhance their Jewish knowledge, to participate in *Tikkun Olam* -- to finish God's creation, or to attempt to find other paths to deeper spiritual fulfillment. Yet, there are some who care, who desire, who want Judaism to be important in their lives and the lives of their families and community. It is this group of individuals and families who must be the models for others by showing them what participation in Temple life can mean.

We live in an age where the pressures and stress of the everyday world can be enormous. We live at a time where the ethical and moral structure of our community is challenged on so many different fronts. Our children see messages in the media which threaten and confuse. Families struggle to make ends meet and, as a result, some children don't receive the nurturing and love necessary to build the sound basis for all the decisions they must make. We live in a time when the word family doesn't even mean what it used to. Therefore, it is up to each member of this congregation to be a role model for the next generation by living a life which is of the highest ethical and moral level that is possible. This where Judaism, our religion, community, lifestyle, culture, and heritage fits in.

By participating in areas of Social Action, we demonstrate the importance of making a difference in a troubled world. As you will see in the bulletin over the course of the year, any number of opportunities for participating in a Social Action program is available. Some require hands on work, while others are simply a contribution of food or money to help others. Each is a mitzvah that may lead to the performance of another mitzvah.



Worship at Temple Adath Israel is constant. Every Erev Shabbat there is a service. Most Erev Shabbat services we use *The New Union Prayer Book: Gates of Prayer*, while at Family Shabbat services we read from a creative service pamphlet. Shabbat morning, following our hour long Torah Study, we use the new gender sensitive version of *Gates of Prayer*. The time is ripe for new services, written by our own members, based on the traditional model. This is the third time I have asked for anyone interested in writing an Erev Shabbat service to let me know. It is an opportunity to share a spiritual experience with the congregation. I am also interested in inviting Temple members who would like to read Torah, in Hebrew, to let me know. So far, two Temple members have expressed interest and will read Torah at an Erev Shabbat service in the coming year.

Finally, after a long year of reflection, the Adult Education committee is about to unveil a very ambitious 3-year Adult Education program which will include not only B'nai Mitzvah (adult bar/bat mitzvah ceremony), but also an Adult Confirmation program. For the next three years, the Adult Education program will be an in-depth expansion of my Basic Judaism course. By coming to the various mini-series, students can earn credits toward the Confirmation program. The hope is that Adult Education will not only take place in the evening, but on Sunday mornings as well.

Along with the various courses, we will have a scholar-in-residence at the beginning of March, Rabbi Norman Cohen, professor of Midrash at HUC-JIR in New York. Also, on February 25th, in cooperation with the Central Kentucky Jewish Federation, Temple Adath Israel will sponsor The Hebrew Reading Marathon. This is a one day program run by a rabbi from Silver Spring, MD. This rabbi has gone all over the United States visiting congregations and communities to erase Hebrew illiteracy by teaching people in a one day course how to read Hebrew and leaving them with a 160 word vocabulary. More information will be available in a few months, but there will be a charge to cover costs and a maximum number of spaces available. If you have ever wanted to learn to read Hebrew, this is your golden opportunity.

It is time for us to become a great congregation, a congregation of knowledgeable, committed, participating Jews. To do this, we must work together.

From the Rabbi's Library



Among the books I read this summer was one that hit particularly close to home. And THEY SHALL BE MY PEOPLE: An American Rabbi and His Congregation, by Paul Wilkes is the story of Rabbi Jay Rosenbaum, a Conservative rabbi serving a congregation in Worcester, MA. Paul Wilkes, an award-winning Catholic author rings an outsider's unbiased eye to the difficulties Rabbi Rosenbaum faces as the spiritual leader of a modern congregation tempted by an affluent, secular society.

Paul Wilkes spent a year in the life of Rabbi Rosenbaum learning his likes and dislikes, his family life, his relationship to the congregation, and his position in the community. The book is not written as a diary, but does follow the rabbi's life from a meeting in the fall about a trip to Israel the next summer, through the trip, and the weeks following his return. We meet congregants who are religiously committed and those that aren't involved with Jewish life. We meet those that like the rabbi and those that don't care him. We see the rabbi leading services, counseling, teaching, celebrating, and in personal reflection.

As a rabbi reading this book, I was able to identity with the struggles and successes of Rabbi Rosenbaum. He reminded me about commitment to my purpose and to stand steadfast in what I believe. He reminded me of vision to the future to see the past with clarity.

I encourage anyone who cares about congregational life and the survival of American Judaism to share the story of Rabbi Rosenbaum. It is the story of who we are today as Jews in this country and glimpse at where we might be heading.






TAI MAKHELA TO BEGIN REHEARSALS SEPTEMBER 17



In This Corner

The High Holy Days are upon us again. It is that time of year when we turn our attention inward. We reflect on the past year and anticipate how we can make the next year better. This intensive period in Jewish life is called the *Yamim Noraim--The Days of Awe*.

An important part of the Yamim Noraim is a section in the morning service, both on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, called *U'netaneh Tokef*. According to the *Gates of Repentance*, our High Holy Day Mahzor (prayerbook), the words of the *U'netaneh Tokef*, "...were born of the martyrdom of Amon of Mayence....He said, '*U'netaneh Tokef kedushat hayom*, Let us proclaim the sacred power of this day; it is awesome and full of dread. Now the divine Judge looks upon our deeds, and determines our destiny."

On Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, the words following the *U'netaneh Tokef* speak about who shall live and who shall die. Many of us are uncomfortable with this sort of predestination. We don't believe that our futures are predicted. Yet, though our futures may not be predicted, our actions can make them predictable. If we act in a moral and upright fashion, then the people we associate with will respect us, as well as vice versa. If we treat others kindly, both friends and strangers, then we will receive kind treatment as well.

Therefore, I wish to create a "who shall..." for Temple members and Jews not yet affiliated with a religious institution. As we enter the year 5756, may this year be filled with renewed spiritual and emotional growth, a renewed commitment to *Tikkun Olam*, and a commitment to making Judaism a more active part of our life.

Who shall live and who shall die;

who shall make Judaism a life priority and who shall forsake their Jewish soul;

who shall join a Temple or synagogue and who shall say it is not important;

who shall come to worship as a member of the community and who shall separate from the community;

who shall celebrate Rosh Hashanah and worship at Yom Kippur and who shall go to work or to school; who shall contribute freely to a better Temple life and who shall turn away:

who shall strive to increase their Jewish knowledge and commitment, and who shall not;

who shall celebrate the *simcha* of a Temple family and who shall not pay any attention;



HIGH HOLYDAYS 5756-/1995 TESHUVA - REPENTANCE; TZEDAKAH - JUSTICE

As we observe our High Holydays, *teshuva* is uppermost in our minds and hearts. *Tzedakah* is in our hearts and hands throughout the year. At this season, the two are closely linked: our repentance depends largely on our actions toward those in need.

There is no traditional Jewish blessing for either teshuva or tzedakah.

Some say this is because we do not offer a blessing for a commandment we cannot complete on our own - and our *teshuva* is not complete until God accepts it. Our *tzedakah* is not complete without the participation of another person - the recipient.

THE SYNAGOGUES OF KENTUCKY: HISTORY AND ARCHITECTURE

by Lee Shai Weissback (Lexington University Press of Kentucky, 1995. Pp xiv, 184 Illustrations, photographs, maps, tables, appendices, notes, index (24.95)

At its title denotes, this volume looks -- both in terms of events and design -- at the buildings housing Kentucky's Jewish congregations through the years.

Organized Jewry in Kentucky began in the summer of 1842 with Louisville's Temple Adath Israel. Since then, at one time or another, there have been Jewish congregations in Ashland, Covington, Henderson, Hopkinsville, Lexington, Newport, Owensboro and Paducah -- two dozen all told, and most of them having their own house of worship.

"Of all the synagogue buildings in Kentucky," the author points out on pages 44-45, "only fifteen were erected as Jewish places of worship and never served any other purpose; these include the nine synagogues that are still in use by Jewish congregations today."

Architecturally, Kentucky's synagogues are representative of what occured in American synagogue design during the same 150 years. On page 53, Professor Weissbach, informs us that "Kentucky Jews have tended to follow national trends in synagogue construction, and as a result the history of synagogue design in the commonwealth reflects quite reliably the history of synagogue architecture in America as a whole."

The discussion of synagogue design is divided into two chapters; before and after World War II, following which there was an exodus of Jews to the suburbs, with the accompanying need for new buildings to accommodate swelling congregations. Historical styles that had dominated American synagogue architecture were abandoned after the war. As the importance of Jewish communal activities increased, it became usual to place the Sanctuary adjacent to the social hall, with movable partitions between the rooms.

The author claims that Kentucky's synagogues can tell much about Jewish life at the local level and bear witness to the commonwealth's diverse and fascinating architectural heritage. This is indisputable. In addition, he affords a somwehat rare look at American Jewish life outside large cities.

Every synagogue that has ever stood in Kentucky is represented in picture, and there is helpful information throughout, such as the differences among Orthodox, Conservative and Reform Judaism -- along with the translation of Hebrew congregational names and comments on the variations of their spellings.

The author is professor and chairman of the Department of History at the University of Louisville, and he is highly qualified to produce such a study -- apparently the

first published examination of synagogue buildings in an individual state.


The Hebrew word *mitzvah* can mean two things: "commandment" or "meritorious act." With this book, Professor Weissbach has surely performed the latter for significantly helping expand the appreciation of Kentucky's cultural diversity as well as its architectural heritage.

PLEASE CONSIDER BECOMING A BONE MARROW DONOR

Bone marrow transplants have increased survival rates for patients with leukemia, asplastic anemia and other life threatening diseases. In these patients, bone marrow has stopped producing the correct amounts of blood cells. (Marrow is responsible for producing blood components including red blood cells, white blood cells and platelets.) Twenty-five to thirty per cent of the patients requiring bone marrow transplants find a match within their family. Other patients contact The National Marrow Donor Program (NMDP) to search for an unrelated donor. The best chance individuals have of finding a match is from a donor who is of the sam racial or ethnic background. There is a shortage of minority donors registered with the NMDP.

Temple Adath Israel is encouraging members of the Jewish community to become volunteer marrow donors. The first step in becoming a volunteer is to have a small amount of blood drawn. The blood sample is characterized by key tissue types and this data is entered in the NMDP data base. If a volunteer appears to match a patient, he/she is contacted and if they agree, further tests are performed to determine compatibility. If this volunteer matches after this point, then arrangements are made to remove a small amount of bone marrow (less than 5%). The marrow is removed near the pelvic bone while the volunteer is under general or local anesthesia. The prodecure takes about an hour. The body naturally replaces the marrow within a few weeks. Aside from some discomfort in the lower back, there is very little risk to the volunteer.

The Bone Marrow Donor Drive will take place on October 29, 1995 from 9 AM to 1 PM at the Temple. If you are between the ages of 18 and 55 and in good health, you may become a donor. If you are interested in helping in ways other than donating marrow, volunteers are needed to work at the drive. Additionally, contributions are needed to help cover the cost of the tissue typing. (The approximate cost of tissue typing is \$45). A federal grant covers half of each fee and a Temple fund and donations must cover the balance of the fees.




YOM KIPPUR MEMORIAL BOOK

WELCOMING Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur: Two Services for the Home

Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are the great festivals of the Jewish year. They draw us to the synagogue with their promise of repentance and new beginnings, although each festival also offers opportunities to bring something precious into our homes. The meals that precede services can themselves also become special, and it is in that spirit that this pamphlet is offered to you and your family. The blessings and readings enclosed (Hebrew and/or English) are yours to use as you wish in welcoming the New Year Shana Toya!

Yom Kippur

(Because Yom Kippur is a fast day, the Erev Yom Kippur meal must technically be eaten before Yom Kippur and its fast begin. The candles are therefore lit after the meal. to mark the formal beginning of Yom Kippur and the beginning of the fast. Kiddush is also not said at this meal because kiddush can only be said after the lighting of the candles. Once the candles are lit, however, the fast has begun and so the wine for kiddush and hence the kiddush are not appropriate.)

MOTZI Before the Meal

According to Maimonides (of the twelfth century), "Free will is given to every human being. If we wish to incline ourselves towards goodness and righteousness, we are free to do so; and if we wish to incline ourselves towards evil, we are also free to do that. By our own faculty of intelligence and understanding we can distinguish between good and evil, doing as we choose. The power for this choice between good and evil is altogether in our hands."

As we approach Yom Kippur we pray for the power to make worthy choices all through this year. May our hands do good. May our hands always lead us towards blessing.

In This Corner...

Trying to find new ways to enhance the spiritual and emotional experience of the Shabbat worship service, so that it will meet the needs of those in attendance, is challenging. Reform Judaism's population consists of individuals who come from a variety of backgrounds including the various Jewish denominations, Jewish communities throughout the United States and the world, and Protestant and Catholic Christianity.

We bring to an Erev Shabbat service different needs and desires. Some people at services want to feel the peacefulness of Shabbat rest. Some people read the words of the *siddur*, searching for a ray of light that can offer hope and comfort. Some people want to sing. Some people want to learn. Without question, the worshippers at any given Shabbat service are an eclectic group of Temple members, guests, and visitors.

Recently, the worship committee agreed to two new additions at Shabbat services. Actually one is an adjustment and the other one is new. The adjustment is moving the *kiddush* to the end of the service. Before I explain the reason behind this move, let me say that where I grew up as a Jew, the *kiddush* was said at the end of the service. Like most people, what you experience in your own congregation is the way you expect worship to be done everywhere. As I have learned and many of you have experienced by attending services in other communities, rarely is a service identical from place to place. I have seen the *kiddush* said in the middle of the service, as well our tradition of doing it right after the candle blessing.

Traditional Jews don't celebrate *kiddush* at an Erev Shabbat service at all, but say it at home preceding the Shabbat meal. Reform Judaism added both the candle lighting and *kiddush* to the Erev Shabbat service because the rabbis feared that many people were not doing it at home at all. These rituals were too important to be forgotten. They probably were and are right.

The *kiddush* is a wonderful prayer which celebrates Shabbat, reminds of creation and redemption, and proclaims the *kedusha*, holiness of Shabbat. When it is sung, it is joyful and uplifting. The *l'chaim* at the end is said with fervor and love.

A Temple member returned from a visit to another congregation and commented to me that this congregation says *kiddush* at the end of the service. She told me that the (Continued on page 2)

children are invited onto the *bimah* and the children in child care brought into the sanctuary at that time. What a wonderful way to end the service. We will sing the closing song, invite the children onto the *bimah*, say or sing the kiddush, say a *motzi*, and then say "Shabbat Shalom."

The second innovation is more serious. We have not done well in acknowledging the pain in the lives of our congregants as their friends and relatives faced illness. There is a traditional prayer called *Mi she-bei-rach* which asks for God's blessings of strength and courage for those who are ill. Debbie Friedman, a dynamic Jewish woman songwriter who has written many songs that are being sung in Temples and by our youth for over 25 years, put *Mi she-bei-rach* to music. The words are:

Mi she-bei-rach a-vo-tei-nu M'kor ha-bra-cha l'i-mo-tei-nu May the source of strength Who blessed the ones before us Help us find the courage To make our lives a blessing And let us say, Amen

Mi she-bei-rach i-mo-tei-nu
M'kor ha-bra-cha l'a-vo-tei-nu
Bless those in need of healing
With r'fu-a sh'lei-ma
The renewal of body
The renewal of spirit
And let us say, Amen

We will include an opportunity in every service for the *Mi she-bei-rach*. All of us should have the opportunity to seek healing in our lives and the lives of those who may be in need.

From the Rabbi's Library



Every Person's Guide to

<u>Judaism</u>, by Stephen J. Einstein and Lydia Kukoff, is a wonderful entrance into the world of Judaism. This book is written in a concise form, giving the Jew looking for basic Jewish information and the non-Jew seeking a door to open into the Jewish world an easy first step.

The book is divided in four major sections. The first is called "The Cycle of the Year." Here we learn about Shabbat, the High Holy Days, as well as the major and minor festivals. Each holiday description is enhanced with historical information, customs, foods, and observances. The second section is "The Cycle of Life." Not only do we learn about the Jewish life cycle events, but we are introduced to the idea that Judaism is a lifetime commitment both in and out of Temple and the home. The next section is about faith. Views about God, liturgy, and prayer ritual move us deeper into the Jewish world. The final section considers "Contemporary Jewish Life." We learn about the different Jewish denominations, the idea of community, and the role of the synagogue.

If you are looking for a book about basic Judaism, Every Person's Guide to Judaism, will give you a nice introduction.

PLEASE CONSIDER BECOMING A BONE MARROW DONOR

Bone marrow transplants have increased survival rates for patients with leukemia, asplastic anemia and other life threatening diseases. In these patients, bone marrow has stopped producing the correct amounts of blood cells. (Marrow is responsible for producing blood components including red blood cells, white blood cells and platelets.) Twenty-five to thirty per cent of the patients requiring bone marrow transplants find a match within their family. Other patients contact The National Marrow Donor Program (NMDP) to search for an unrelated donor. The best chance individuals have of finding a match is from a donor who is of the same racial or ethnic background. There is a shortage of minority donors registered with the NMDP.

Temple Adath Israel is encouraging members of the Jewish community to become volunteer marrow donors. The first step in becoming a volunteer is to have a small amount of blood drawn. The blood sample is characterized by key tissue types and this data is entered in the NMDP data base. If a volunteer appears to match a patient, he/she is contacted and ithe individual agrees, further tests are performed to determine compatibility. If the volunteer matches after this point, then arrangements are made to remove a small amount of bone marrow (less than 5%). The marrow is removed near the pelvic bone while the volunteer is under general or local anesthesia. The procedure takes about an hour. The body naturally replaces the marrow within a few weeks. Aside from some discomfort in the lower back, there is very little risk to the volunteer.

The Bone Marrow Donor Drive will take place on October 29, 1995 from 9 AM to 1 PM at the Temple. If you are between the ages of 18 and 55 and in good health, you may become a donor. If you are interested in helping in ways other than donating marrow, volunteers are needed to work at the drive. Additionally, contributions are needed to help cover the cost of the tissue typing, balance of the fees.



Board Discussion Topics

At the Temple Board of Trustees meeting in September, two issues were discussed about which the membership should be made aware. The first is our participation in the building of another house in the "Habitat for Humanity" program. Temple Adath Israel participated in the building of two houses in past years. The first we built with Maxwell St. Presbyterian Church and Walnut Hill Church. The second we built with the churches of the Episcopal Diocese of Lexington. We have raised, through the generosity of this congregation, nearly \$15,000 for these programs. "Habitat for Humanity" wants us to participate in building another house with the churches of the Episcopal Diocese of Lexington. A motion was passed that the Temple will try to raise, without obligation, up to \$5,000. We are looking at late spring 1996 to build the house.

The second issue is not yet totally resolved. This summer, when Rabbi Adland was on vacation, a member of this congregation passed away. Rabbi Adland and his family returned early from their vacation, but before that was determined the thought of flying him into Lexington and back to his family was discussed. The question this raises is who is liable for picking up the costs for such an emergency. The direction the board is leaning is to create a budget line for such a situation so that a grieving family would not need to worry. A common practice is for the family to bear the burden of the cost.

Both of these issues above are important ones for our Temple membership. If you have any thoughts on the above, please contact Rob Rosenstein in writing and, if necessary, he will share these thoughts with the Executive Committee and the Board

Many of you in attendance at the Yizkor service on Yom Kippur afternoon commented on the beautiful story I read. The story titled, "Sarika's Story," by Rabbi Susan Talve, is from the book Chosen Tales, edited by Peninnah Schram. The book contains a variety of stories which are told by a number of different Jewish storytellers. The storytellers wrote down their magical and beautiful stories to share with you and me.

I haven't read every story in this book; there are about 75 stories from nearly 70 different individuals. Some of the stories are original. 



PISION COMMITTEE

A meeting of the Vision Committee was held on 25 October at the home of Beth Engel. The Vision Committee is a group that gets together once a month to discuss actions and activities that will encourage and support a sense of community within the Temple.

The following ideas were discussed:

Volunteering: By working together on Temple projects we all get to know one another better. When coordinating a project, we should try to include anyone who says they can help, even if is by asking them to do small jobs like making phone calls or picking up project materials. People should be assured that it is good and helpful to volunteer small amounts of time to do tasks that easily fit into their schedules.

Younger Youth Groups: Social and educational programs for children in early primary grades will help develop relationships among children and parents who might otherwise only see each other at religious school.

Tot Shabbat: Once a month the Temple could have a special early Shabbat service aimed at children between the ages of 1 and 3. The service could be followed with a family dinner. A regular Shabbat service would be held at the usual time.

Yearbook: Expand the information in the yearbook to include information about congregants' special skills, interests, hobbies, and employment.

Shabbat at Home: On September 27, 1996 volunteer families will have a Shabbat service and dinner in their homes for members of the congregation. (A brief early service will be held at the Temple.)

Mitzvah Day: The Temple will sponsor a day when we reach out to the community and help others. Working with social and community service organizations and through the Temple resources we will identify what types of tasks we can perform and send out groups to do them. The day will begin and end with some type of worship at the Temple. Activities will also take place at the Temple so that people of all ages and all skill levels may participate.

Religious School listing: A list of the names, addresses, phone numbers and family members for each class can be prepared and distributed. This would make it easy to learn what classmates are neighbors and also make it easy to contact one another.



A HANUKKAH GLOSSARY

HANUKKAH - A Hebrew word meaning "dedication" When the Jews had sent the Syrians down to final defeat, their first act was to cleanse the Temple in Jerusalem and remove the various pagan symbols and idols from it. They then held a ceremony dedicating the Temple once again to God. The holiday derives its name from the

JUDAH MACCABEE - The name comes from the first letters of the Hebrew prayer Mi Kamocha Ba-elim Adonai ("Who is like Thee, O Lord!") inscribed on the Maccabean battle banner. Another reason that Judah was called the Maccabee is that he struck with the force of a mighty hammer. The Hebrew word for hammer is "makav". Judah became known as "The Hammer" or

MACCABEES - Hebrew soldiers who fought the Syrians. Named after their leader, Judah the Maccabee.

MENORAH - Hanukkah candle holder. Contains places for 8 candles and a 9th candle, the shamus, is raised above the others. Each of the 8 candles represents one of the 8 days of Hanukkah.

DREIDEL - A four-sided top used on Hanukkah. Each side has a different Hebrew letter: nun, gimmel, hay, and shin. This stands for "Nes gadol ha-ya sham" ("A great miracle happened there").

SHAMUS - Helper candle used to light all the other candles.

LATKES - Potato pancakes. Traditional Hanukkah delicacy

MATTATHIAS the Hasmonean - Priest who started revolt against the Syrians. Father of Judah Maccabee.

THE STORY OF HANUKKAH

After the death of Alexander the Great (323 BCE) his Empire was divided into two smaller kingdoms - Egypt to the south and Syria to the north

In the year 175 BCE there arose a new king in Syria - Antiochus IV. He was a harsh ruler and treated all those whom he conquered cruelly.

Antiochus sent officers to the cities of Judea to proclaim, "The king has ordered all his kingdom to become one people and that everyone should forsake his own laws and his own religion." The king commanded the people to break the Sabbath and ignore the holy Jewish festivals. He instructed the Jews to ignore their prayers and religious practices. An idol was placed on the altar of God and incense burned in its honor.

The kings' officer came to the city of Modin and said to Mattathias, a priest who dwelt in Modin, "You are a great man and well-known in the city. Come and fulfill the king's command and you shall be counted among the king's friends." But Mattathias turned to the officer and answered in a loud voice, "Neither I or my sons nor any faithful Hebrews will ever worship an idol."

The Syrian officer called for another volunteer. When, in the sight of all the people, one of the Jews came forward to sacrifice to the idol, Mattathias was filled with anger, and struck him down.

Then Mattathias leaped to the top of the altar and shouted, "All those who are faithful to the Lord, follow me."


One of Mattathias' sons, Judah (called "The Maccabee"), became the commander-in-chief of the Hebrew army and led the people into battle. Never did people fight more bravely against such odds. Because they were dedicated to their religious heritage and to the principles for which it stood, they were filled with the courage and strength to achieve the final victory

Judah, his brothers and all loyal Jews came to rededicate the Temple in Jerusalem. However, when the people gathered to celebrate the "rededication" the High Priest could find only one small jar of Holy oil with which to light the Ner Tamid (the Eternal Light). This was just enough oil to burn for one day. Then it was that a wondrous thing occurred. For the oil in the lamp burned for eight days!

In remembrance of this great occasion, Hanukkah the Feast of Dedication - is observed every year for eight days, beginning with the twenty-fifty day of the month of Kislev.

Since the time of the Maccabees the battle for religious freedom has been fought over and over again throughout the world. After each victory, grateful men, women and children have dedicated themselves to their traditions and kept alive the remembrance of the struggle for religious freedom. As we celebrate the festival of Hanukkah, this year and every year, let us always give thanks for the freedom which our ancestors won so bravely. May we always treasure this precious possession, and ever seek to build a world in which all people may live in freedom and peace.

The candles are placed in the Hanukkah Menorah from right to left and kindled from left to right.

FOR EACH NIGHT

As the Shamas (servant) candle is kindled, we say each day: As one candle may kindle many others and yet lose none of its own light, so Judaism has kindled the light of truth for many religions in many lands and still shines brightly through the eyes.

FIRST NIGHT - FREEDOM

We kindle these Hanukkah lights in memory of the dedication and courage of the Maccabees Believing that they should be free to worship God as their hearts and minds dictated, they willingly gave their lives for freedom. Now, kindling these candles, we rededicate ourselves to work for the equal rights of all people, and for the realization of a society of democracy and freedom.

SECOND NIGHT - FAMILY

Tonight as we celebrate Hanukkah together we are conscious of our precious gift of family. So often we take one another for granted, forgetting to express our love and devotion. Let us, now, as we kindle these festive lights rededicate ourselves to sharing our interests and time with one another. Like the Maccabees of old, let us always face the tribulations and the joys of life united by our family bonds. Kindling these lights, we pray that through kindness and thoughtfulness, our love for one another will increase form strength to strength.

THIRD NIGHT - TORAH

On the third night of Hanukkah, we rededicate ourselves to the study of our tradition. As the Maccabees courageously fought to preserve our faith, we, too are duty-bound to sustain our heritage by deepening our understanding of it through study. By increasing our knowledge of Judaism we have become more sensitive to its abiding values, more aware of our responsibility to realize these values in our society. Study opens our minds and fortifies us against tyranny. Learning secures our freedom. Let us, then, as we kindle these candles rededicate ourselves to the study of our tradition.

FOURTH NIGHT - HOPE

Our ancestors have taught us that in hope a person's future is illumined and made creative. Ours are times when many people live in fear and great despair. Like the Maccabees, we need to build our lives on hope. Hope that ultimately, truth will triumph over superstition and confidence, that trust and understanding will finally depose superstition and tyranny. Now as we kindle these Hanukkah lights, may our eyes be directed to the loftiest visions of our faith.

FIFTH NIGHT - CHARITY

Our tradition tells us that during the Maccabean war for freedom, all Jews, both children and adults, contributed toward the cause of defeating the oppressor. There are many forms of oppression still existent in our world today.

There are people afflicted by sickness, hunger, ignorance and prejudice. Tonight we, like our ancestors, put aside gifts of Tzedakah in order that we, too, may help to bring an end to oppression. We pray that the humble gifts we offer will provide food for the hungry medicine for the sick, knowledge for the ignorant, and equal opportunity for those afflicted by prejudice. Now as we kindle our Hanukkah lights, let us rededicate ourselves to the ideal of Tzedakah, righteousness and justice, found in our Jewish tradition

SIXTH NIGHT - SHALOM

The candles of Hanukkah remind us of our chosen mission as Jews. Like the Maccabees we seek to rededicate ourselves to the service of God. Today one of our foremost tasks is to secure peace in our troubled world. When we end disagreements through mutual understanding, when we seek to mend hurt and wounded feelings, we make peace a living idea. Then let us, as we kindle our Hanukkah candles, rededicate ourselves with renewed strength to the task of securing peace.

SEVENTH NIGHT - BROTHERHOOD &

SISTERHOOD
Brotherhood and Sisterhood is founded upon a total respect for the liberty and freedom of all people. The Maccabees of old sought to protect themselves when their rights were violated. Our Hanukkah lights serve as a reminder that peace is secure only when we honor the precious liberty and property of our fellow neighbor. As we kindle these lights, let us rededicate ourselves to the cause of peace which alone can bring dignity to all everywhere.

EIGHTH NIGHT - FAITH

Tonight we kindle all the candles of our Hanukkah Menorah. Throughout the centuries the Menorah has been a symbol of our Jewish faith. Like the Maccabees, when they celebrated this festive holiday, we rededicate ourselves to the living of a more meaningful Jewish life. We pray that throughout this coming year, we may fulfill the ideals of freedom, Tzedakah, family, study, hope, shalom, brotherhood and sisterhood, all of which are symbolized by the candles of our Menorah.
