## IN THIS CORNER...

On Shabbat Hanuka, I delivered a sermon about the current situation in Israel concerning the attempt by the Orthodox Jewish community to change the "Law of Return" and therefore the status of "Who is a Jew?". For those of you who are familiar with the term, the "Law of Return", grants any Jew the right of immediate citizenship in Israel should they choose to immigrate. The question of "Who is a Jew" stems from the right to determine Jewish status and what that status means.

Since the creation of the State of Israel, the Orthodox Jewish community's rabbinate has controlled the answer to the question of Jewish status. Individuals considered Jews outside of Israel who were either converted by non-Orthodox rabbis or considered Jewish by virtue of patrilineal descent (born of a Jewish father and non-Jewish mother, and raised as a Jew) had to undergo a conversion by an Orthodox rabbi in Israel in order to be married in Israel. They could move to Israel, live in Israel, and be citizens in Israel, but individuals not considered Jewish by the Orthodox rabbinate had no Jewish rights in Israel. In the eyes of the Orthodox community in Israel, these converts or children not born from Jewish mothers weren't Jewish.

The Orthodox rabbinate's dominance on this issue comes from its continuing role as a coalition member with the party in power (now Likud). As such they have demanded that the portfolio for the Ministry of Religion be given to them. They have made several attempts over the years to amend the "Law of Return" which would change the status of "Who is a Jew." The attempts repeatedly failed due to pressure from Jews in the diaspora. Now things may be changing.

On October 14, 1996, a group of Knesset members from the Orthodox religious parties proposed a bill which will severely restrict conversion to Judaism in Israel. In essence the bill is a back door way of modifying the "Law of Return" and will change the definition of "Who is a Jew" to include only those converted to Judaism under Orthodox Rabbinical authority. This problem is further exacerbated because it appears that the government coalition may back the proposed bill and ram it through the Knesset as quickly as possible.

## IN THIS CORNER (from Page 1)

The proposed amendment says that "there shall be no legal validity whatsoever to a conversion unless it receives the approval of the highest religious court in Israel of the religion to which the aforementioned wishes to join." This means that a convert who approaches the Jewish Agency abroad and requests aliyah based upon his or her conversion, would be forced to seek the approval of the Chief Rabbinate as a condition for immigration (of course, this approval would be denied).

The Council of Jewish Federations (of which CKJF is a member) meeting at their annual convention in

November held this year in Seattle passed a strong resolution against changing any aspect of the Law of Return, "which is one of the pillars of Jewish identification with the State of Israel in each and every Jewish community around the world." They also said, "[we] urge the leaders of Israel not to underestimate the strength of feeling on this matter, and its detrimental effect on Jewish unity and Israel-Diaspora relations. We direct the leadership of CJF to convey to the political leaders of Israel, in the most vigorous, immediate, and continuing way possible, they must not risk dividing the world Jewish community."

My friends, this is a serious challenge by the Orthodox Jewish community in Israel, supported by the Orthodox Jewish community in the United States, to undercut non-Orthodox Judaism and the authority of non-Orthodox rabbis. All of the concerned religious movements and their leaders are responding with the full force of their offices. It is important that we stay informed. It is important that we stay concerned. It is important that we don't respond with a knee jerk reaction, but that we consider our options if the amendment is passed. As a community, we will decide.

What I don't want you to do is turn your back on the people in Israel who still need us. I have asked our local

federation to provide a list of where our money goes when we give to UJA. Before we turn away from Israel, let us find alternative paths of helping. If you want to fight the fight, then join ARZA-Association of Reform Zionists of America. That can be done through the TAI office. Give directly to Reform Judaism in Israel. By contacting the Union of American Hebrew Congregations at 838 Fifth Ave, NY, 10021. Contribute to the Federation, but designate the money for local use only. Increase your Temple membership contribution so that we can do more programs at TAI and support the present and next generation of Reform Jews.



"Haftarah is the name given to certain Biblical selections that are read after the Torah portion of the day, at Shabbat and at festival services."



## IN THIS CORNER...

Though I have been back from my Sabbatical and working hard for the last few weeks, I wanted to share some thoughts with you that came to me during my time away. First, let me thank the congregation again for the opportunity to rejuvenate my mind and soul.

My major preoccupation during this sabbatical period was teaching at Lexington Theological Seminary. The January courses at the seminary are four days a week, three and one-half hours a day, for three weeks. During the first two weeks of the course, I was on Sabbatical. By the third week of the course, I was back at work at Temple, at least in the afternoons. If you weren't aware, I co-taught a new course at LTS with Dr. Michael Kinnamon, Dean of the Seminary, titled, "Dialogue Between Christians and Jews". There were 15 students in the class representing various Christian denominations including Roman Catholic, Presbyterian, Methodist, and Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). The class was a wonderful opportunity and a powerful spiritual experience for all of us involved.

As I listened to the students talk about their churches and their pastoral experiences, I realized what a wonderful congregation we have at Temple Adath Israel. There are so many activities happening and so many people who care about the Temple's life. We should be very proud of what we have accomplished.

Yet, after more than 10 years here, there are some areas of Temple life that need help if we are to grow, mature, and prosper emotionally and spiritually as a community. Most notably, we need to rethink our commitment to maintaining the Temple's infrastructure-those things which support the day to day operations and activities at Temple Adath Israel. Over the years, the number of people participating in the committee system has dwindled significantly. Sadly, only a few people show up at Youth Education or Worship Committee meetings, two committees which play a crucial role in this Temple's mission.

We need input into the life of our worship schedule. The changes that have been made over the years are the result of the committee's action: gender sensitive language, kiddush and motzi at the end of the service which encourage the inclusion of children, Kabbalat Shabbat services, bimah guests participating in the service, as well as the addition of a 2nd day Rosh Hashanah service this fall. Without debate and discussion at Worship Committee meetings no changes will be made in what happens at Shabbat or Holy Days services.

The Youth Education Committee oversees what is taught to our children and the general nature and atmosphere of the Religious School. Though our Religious School functions well from week to week, it is also important to look into the future and decide what we want our children to learn and to do in our Sunday Religious School program. For many years, we have used the same basic curriculum. Is it time for something new or different? What is it our parents want our children to learn? What about discipline? What about standards? It is very important for the parents of our children to sit and talk, think and be creative about this important part of our Temple's life.

There are several other committees that are part of the infrastructure. Some involve the finances, personnel and building and grounds of the Temple. Others involve programs or are supportive of the ongoing life at TAI. Step forward and say yes to working towards a better community. If you see a meeting scheduled in the bulletin and you want to come, don't wait to be invited. Just come. Don't leave it up to a few people to make decisions for the many. Instead, increase the small number of people who do say yes to a larger number. Everyone benefits from your involvement, including those who are an immediate part of your life.

It is good to be back after this short time away. There are so many things happening this spring. Take advantage of life at TAI. It is for everyone.




# LET'S WATCH "GENESIS" TOGETHER AND TALK ABOUT IT

# IN THIS CORNER...

I didn't want to watch Schindler's List again. Once was enough. Despite some of its flaws, the 3½ hour movie is riveting, depressing, hopeful, tormenting, and sad. It was 7:25 PM on that Sunday night and the movie was about to start. I still didn't want to watch. Then, Sandy and I looked at our son and asked him if he wanted to see the film. He shrugged his shoulders in the common way that adolescents do and I said, "Go downstairs. Get yourself settled in and turn it on. I will watch it with you." I realized the time had come for him to see the horrors, even Hollywood produced horrors, that he had heard Sandy and me speak about many times before. So we watched together. Eventually, the two of us ended the viewing upstairs with Sandy after Rachei had gone to bed.

Schindler's List doesn't show the incredible inhumanity and evil perpetrated by the Germans and others against the Jews. The movie doesn't show the interminable suffering that went on in the ghettos. It doesn't show the resourcefulness that enabled Jews went to survive another day or a mother to live just one more hour. The movie certainly cannot show you everything that took place during the 12 years of demonic Nazi rule.

The movie does show murder without reason. The movie does give us a glimpses of Jews moving off to be gassed and the smokestacks spewing force the remains of our loved ones. The movie shows us evil. It exposes people's unwillingness to take risks for the sake of others and it reminds us brutally where hatred of Jews by adult and children leads.

What this movie is about though is one man: Schindler, a self-centered womanizer. He is a bad businessman who uses his charm to get rich. He sees opportunity for money in Poland and doesn't really care how he gets it. Yet, along the way, Schindler begins to care. He is appalled at the German atrocities against the Jews. He is moved by the Jewish community's devotion to him. He learns to see Jews as human beings. As a result, he undermines the war effort by making defective artillery shells so that his Germany loses the war. He impoverishes himself while saving his 1,100 Jews. He saved 1,100 Jewish lives; men, women, and children. Incredible.

# IN THIS CORNER (from page 1)

What makes this movie so sad is that Oskar Schindler was nearly unique in this role. So few others took the time to care. Raoul Wallenberg helped thousands. Others hid a family or an individual. We honor and bless these brave people. Indeed, we watch this movie because of the righteous few. We wonder about what others could have done to save our families in Poland, Russia, Germany, Holland, France, Austria, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Italy, Greece, Bulgaria, and more. We wonder why others didn't help instead of turning away. We look at the faces in this film trying to see the reflection of a cousin who perished in Auschwitz or was burned in a synagogue or was shot dead for no reason or who died quietly in the Warsaw ghetto because there wasn't any food.

It is the end of the movie that rips my heart out as we watch Schindler's Jews place the rock of memorial on his grave as they file past one at a time. We look at these faces, now aged, bless and remember this man, this one individual who cared. Then the title appears and with it the announcement that while there are only 4,000 Jews in Poland today, there are more than 6,000 descendants of Schindler's Jews. Look what one man gave us!

So I looked at Joshua as he went off to bed, and realized that now is the time to teach him about the Holocaust. It is time to walk with him through the Memorial Museum in Washington, D.C. It is time to answer his questions. It is also time to teach him about being a Jew. It is not enough to say, "I am a Jew," and end the sentence. As Edmund Flegg wrote, "I am a Jew because...." Being a Jew is not just a passive existence, but an active participation. If we want Judaism and the Jewish people to survive, and if we don't want the demonic Nazis to win their war against the Jews and fulfill the *Final Solution to the Jewish Problem*, then we must live our lives as Jews and teach our children how to live as Jews.

Schindler's List is an open door inviting us to remember that there are Jews who survived. These Jews want us to be Jews each and every day.

# IN THIS CORNER...

For several weeks in a row our sanctuary was filled at the Erev Shabbat Services. During this time there were a couple of Family Shabbat Services including one with a Bat Mitzvah leading the service. One Shabbat, our Hymson Scholar-in-Residence delivered the sermon. Another week was Teacher Shabbat. Still, another week found our congregation hosting several Christian Church groups and some students from UK, all of whom witnessed a conversion ceremony, and experienced a Bat Mitzvah leading the service. There was energy and excitement in the congregation.

I have noticed this air of spiritual uplift when our sanctuary's seats are full. There is a buzz of positive energy flowing through those who have come together to welcome Shabbat, pray to God, learn from the Torah, or just to meditate amidst co-religionists. During these services the singing gets louder. This not due to the increased number of voices, but from the enjoyment of being part of a large group lifting its soul to God. During these services people seem more focused on what is going on at the front of the sanctuary. Granted this is hardly an objective oberservation, but it is what I subjectively notice.

Generally at Shabbat Services there are 80 people that come. Some of those who attend are regulars, meaning that they attend at least 75% of the Erev Shabbat services. Some of those in attendance come once or twice a month. The rest are people who come rarely, once in a while, or are here for the first time.

Having long wondered how we compare to other congregations, I was excited to read a recent article in Reform Judaism, "Worship that Works". The article described several congregations where worship services are particularly joyous and spiritually alive. For example, in San Diego, there is a congregation with a layrabbinic led Shabbat morning minyan. Twice a month, the rabbis lead the service. The other Shabbat mornings, the service is led by lay people who also give the sermon and read the Torah. The service is an alternative to the (continued on page 2)

regular Shabbat morning worship which often is led by a Bat or Bar Mitzvah. Where the Bar/Bat Mitzvah service is formal, the minyan is less formal and more interactive. In some ways this parallels our Shabbat morning Torah Study and worship. I don't lead the group in study; rather, we study together. I don't lead the worship; we take turns reading the prayers. It is informal and in the library. We sit around the table and say our prayers together.

In Lexington, MA, the rabbis greet and introduce the worshippers to others before the service. In too many congregations the rabbi hides in the office until the service begins. The rabbis here try to personalize the service by bringing the community together as one. Through the singing of Mishebeirach and working to support mourners, people leave the service connected.

Similar stories are true for the two other congregations featured in the article. They bring people together. They extend the Gates of Prayer by using liturgies from other prayer books. They sing together and lead each other in prayer. In some ways we have tried to do this too. Having different people sing at our services offers variety. Not making every reading come out of Gates of Prayer helps bring fresh thoughts and ideas to the service.

I believe that our worship works too. We are always trying and experimenting with changes in the service. Some of the changes are small and not noticeable. Others are obvious. Certainly I get suggestions about what to do to enhance worship, but experience has taught me that what works best are people. When people are here at TAI, praying together, singing together, then all the little things we do and all the big things we do make no difference. You make the difference, and these nights with a difference are incredibly spiritual for me and I hope for you as well. Rabli for aland


# TAI PRESCHOOL **CLOSING PROGRAM**

### ITEMS NEEDED FOR THE SEDER PLATE

A. Charoset -Composed of chopped nuts and apples, cinnamon and wine, charoset represents the mortar used by the Jews in making bricks while they were slaves in Egypt.

B. Zeroa - The roasted shankbone or roasted wing of a fowl represents the sacrifice of the Paschal lamb.

C. Beitza - The roasted hard-cooked egg symbolizes the festival offering brought to the Temple.

D. Moror - The bitter herbs are represented by horseradish that has been freshly grated from the horseradish root. They symbolize the

bitterness of slavery for the Jews in Egypt.

E. Karpas - You may use parsley or celery to represent Spring, which brings rebirth and redemption. It is dipped in salt water before it is eaten to remind us of the tears and sweat of the Jewish people in slavery.

F. Chazereth - On most Seder plates, there is another form of bitter herbs. It may be the root of the horseradish (ungrated) or watercress.

### SETTING THE SEDER TABLE

Seder Plate - The most important item on the table is the Seder plate, containing the symbolic foods. Seder plates are usually beautifully decorated, often with scenes from the Passover story or with Hebrew inscriptions.

Three Matzahs - The ceremonial matzahs are placed, one on top of the other, in a special matzah cover or in a napkin. According to a common interpretation, the matzahs represent the three divisions of the Jewish people; Kohen - priest; Levi - assistants in the Temple; Israelites - people of Israel.

Additional Matzah - Additional matzah is placed oh a serving plate, for eating during the main meal.

Haggadahs - The Haggadah is the book that is read cover to cover during the evening. It includes the story, prayers, songs, rituals, and commentary that make up the Seder. Make sure you have one at each place.

Dish of Salt Water - Part of the Seder ritual is to dip the Karpas (parsley) into salt water, which represents the tears of the Jewish people while in slavery.

Wine Glasses - The glasses are filled with the traditional, Kosher for Passover wine.

Decanter of Wine - There should be enough wine to pour four cups for each individual. These represent the four divine promises of redemption found in Exodus 6:6-7. You will also need enough wine forserving during the meal.

Cup of Elijah - Fill a beautiful cup with wine and put it in a prominent place on the table to welcome Elijah, the prophet who heralds freedom and redemption.

Charoset - Although charoset goes on the Seder plate, extra charoset is served for making the Hillel sandwich and to eat during the meal. Rabbi Hillel, a great Jewish teacher who lived between 90 BCE and 70 CE may have invented this sandwich of charoset and moror (between two pieces of matzah) to represent the bitterness of slavery and the sweetness of freedom.

Candlesticks - The blessing over the candles is recited before the Seder begins.

Pillows - Pillows to lean on are traditionally placed on chairs, especially in the chair of the leader of the Seder, as a symbol of freedom from slavery.

Among the foods that must contain the "Kosher l'Pesach" label and be certified for Passover use by rabbinical authority are:

Matzah, matzah flour, Passover noodles
Candles, cakes, cookies, jams and jellies
Cheeses, milk, and butter
Canned and processed foods, such as fruits, sauces, and soups
Salad oils, shortenings, vinegar
Beverages, wine and liquors
Vegetable gelatin
Relishes
Dried fruits
Harseradish

The following foods require no Kosher l'Pesach label if they are in unopened packages or containers or in a natural state:

Coffee, tea, and sugar (but not confectioners' sugar, because it contains cornstarch)
Salt, pepper, and spices (some herbs should be fresh)
All fruits and nuts
All vegetables except legumes such as peas, com, and beans

Fruits and vegetables normally permitted for Passover use are permitted in their frozen state, provided they have not been cooked or processed in any way.

Chametz - foods with leavening - may not be eaten during Passover.

All grains (wheat, rye, oats, barley, rice, kasha, spelt) or any of their derivatives

Leavened bread, cakes, biscuits, crackers, and cereals, and any store bought baked goods not labeled Kosher l'Pesach Any product with flavoring made from grain alcohol, such as vanilla extract, brandy, beer, or liquor

Legumes such as corn, beans, soy beans, lentils, lima beans, and any product made from them



# THE SEARCH FOR CHAMETZ

All chametz must be removed from the house or separated by putting it inot a room, closet, or cupboard that is locked. Since during the year, chametz may work its way into every corner of the house and even into the household dust, a thorough housecleaning is considered part of the Passover preparations.

To further insure that no chametz will be found in the house during Passover, a final, ritual search (Bedikat Chametz) is made after dark on the night before Passover. To add interest to the ceremony, especially for children, bread may be wrapped in a napkin and hidden around the house for family members to find. The family goes from room to room, using only a candle to light the way. Traditionally, a feather is used to brush the bits of bread into the wooden spoon.

The chametz is then tied up in a cloth along with the feather, the candle, and the spoon,and burned the next morning. There are blessings to accompanyting both the search for and the disposal of chametz

# THE MATZAH OF UNITY

(To be recited during the Seder at Yachatz when breaking the middle Matzah)

We are about to take the middle matzah and divide it in half. As we break this matzah and set it aside, we link ourselves symbolically with all Jews who have lived in the former Soviet Union. We will not conclude our Seder until the missing piece of matzah is found and brought again to our table. This action reminds us of the indestructible unity which binds all Jews together as a world family.

In Jewish tradition, matzah is "the bread of affliction," used on the road to redemption. As we celebrate Pesach, our festival of freedom, we know that the theme of the Exodus resonates in all that is happening around us. Jews of the Soviet Union resisted decades of suppression. Struggling to live as Jews, many sought valiantly to leave for Israel, the homeland of the Jewish people. Many suffered harassment; some endured prison and some lost their lives.

At last, most Jews can leave the place that represented a prison for so long. For now, the door to freedom remains open. We walk with them in their Exodus. Through Operation Exodus, we commit ourselves to help them in their quest for a new and better future for themselves and their children.

We also remember the several million Jews who still remain behind. We pledge our vigilance, our support, and our solidarity with them, as they endeavor to sustain their community and courageously resist anti-Semitism.

As Jews from the former Soviet Union and other countries settle in Israel by the hundreds of thousands, we know that their reunification with the Jewish people requires our caring and loving concern. May we be worthy of that challenge.

We pray that all Jews may find freedom this year in a world without war and with Israel at peace. Am Yisrael Hu Am Echad. May the Jewish people always be united!



# Dear Congregant:

As Passover approaches, think for a moment about the time in the seder when the youngest child at the table asks the four questions. I ask an important fifth question.

Will you and each family at your seder table invite one hungry person to enter and eat?

I ask you to do so by contributing the money you would spend to actually invite one hungry person to your Seder table to MAZON: A Jewish Response To Hunger. 



## IN THIS CORNER...

This is my last bulletin article for the year and I very much want to touch on several different items. Therefore, I will bullet each one and do so as briefly as possible

The worship committee, after much deliberation, has decided to try and bring more consistency to the time our Erev Shabbat worship service begins. Presently, services may begin at 6 PM (summer, secular holiday weekends, late December), 7:30 PM (Family Shabbat), or at

8 PM (normal service time).

Beginning mid-June, the normal service time for all services will either be at 6 PM or 7:30 PM. The earlier service time will run from mid-July through Labor Day weekend and from the end of December through the end of January. The later service time will be every other remaining Shabbat Service whether it is Family Shabbat or a regular Erev Shabbat Service.

The Worship Committee will evaluate this new procedure your opinions will be solicited and heard at the committee's spring meeting

"A Taste of Judaism: are you curious" is a new UAHC program designed to reach out to unaffiliated Jews in our community and non-Jews interested in learning about Judaism. It was field tested a few years ago in two cities with an overwhelming response. Since then, several other cities have held the course with the same results.

In the fall of 1996, the UAHC offered congregations the opportunity to apply for some grant money to run "A Taste of Judaism." The grant stipulated that the synagogues be in cities where there was only one congregation and that the city be somewhat isolated. We received one of the 12 UAHC grants offered which paid for the necessary advertising. The grant also stipulated that the advertising not be in the Jewish press or on the Religion page of the local

In response to the ads in the Herald-Leader, we received more than 90 requests for registration forms of which 70 have been returned. Since there are only 40 spaces in the class we have a substantial waiting list.

There has been some discussion among our membership who saw this class as a move toward proselytizing. This is not true. As I said above, the first purpose of this class is bring Jews back into the organized Jewish community by giving them "A Taste of Judaism." Some of these Jews may not have had any Jewish education while others may have had a negative experience, but now are seeking to reconnect with their roots. This course provides such an opportunity.

For non-Jews, "A Taste of Judaism" is an opportunity to learn more about Judaism. If there are individuals interested in pursuing Judaism, then they will have to contact me at a later time to discuss that option.

Obviously, from the numbers responding, we have hit a live and active nerve. I believe only good things will come from this class and I look forward to doing it next year.

- Goldman Union Camp Institute is our regional Reform Jewish camp. This year, we will have at least 22 campers there. Along with the campers, Sandy and I will be at camp for one month. Sandy works in the infirmary in the administrative end and teaches some music. I will be "Dean of the Faculty" which is a new position created to organize the rabbinical staff so as to make their time most effective while at camp. Twenty-two campers is a lot from a community this size. The benefit will be obvious in the years ahead with youth group leaders and participation.
- I want to urge you to look inside the bulletin for the ad about our fall Shabbaton. Consider this as an opportunity to enhance your Jewish life. I promise that it will be well worth it. Space is limited so sign up immediately.
- Remember that the Confirmation Service is June 10, at 7:30 PM. Religious School is a large part of our congregation's life. It is important that we gather and support our youth at this special moment as they go through a ceremony that formally brings to an end religious training.

Finally, I want to wish all of you a safe and healthy summer. May God's blessing be with you always.




#### TEMPLE ADATH ISRAEL MISSION STATEMENT



The cost of the Sukkah is \$45. There are 2 kits remaining in the Temple office from last year at last year's price of \$40. Call the office at 269-2979 if you wish one of these. First come, first served. After a long search, and many dead ends, we have found what may be the ideal sukkah wall material: "Sukkah Fraps". It comes in rolls \$4 inches wide and long enough to warp continuously around the sukkah from doorpost to doorpost. The material is cut to the required length with sessors or a knife and then tacked or stapled to the posts and crosspaces of the sukkah. After the holiday, it is rolled back up around its cardboard shipping tube and stored for next year. The cost is \$50 and may be ordered when you place your sukkah order.

For those buying sukkahs from the Temple office, you will need to order your wrap (if you wish to use) separately from your sukkah nurchase at the Temple office.







## IN THIS CORNER...

The other day I opened up an invitation I received to an upcoming Temple Bat Mitzvah and I noticed an extra little piece of paper in the envelope. As I read the words written there, my heart pounded and a smile crossed my face. What this young woman included in her invitation was a simple request. Since her Bat Mitzvah celebration will take place during Sukkot, she asked everyone who will attend to bring a canned food item. Throughout the country, Sukkot is the time when the Jewish community collects food items because Sukkot is the harvest festival in Jewish tradition. At Temple Adath Israel, we donate our collection to God's Pantry. Elsewhere, congregations contribute to their local community food bank.

What pleased me so much was that this young woman recognized the connection between her Bat Mitzvah on Shabbat Sukkot and our Temple food drive. She saw an opportunity to fulfill the meaning of *mitzvah* in Bat Mitzvah by participating in, as well as encouraging others to do *tzedakkah*/righteousness. I know that this young woman understands the meaning of Tikkun Olam, the repair of the world. She saw an opportunity to make a difference and acted. Her family and community should feel quite proud that she has learned her Jewish ethical lessons well. Therefore, let me personally thank Alison Plavin for taking that extra step in becoming a responsible Jewish adult.

All of the children participating in the Bar/Bat Mitzvah program at TAI are asked to complete 18 mitzvot along the journey to the day of the celebration. There are three areas of focus: study, worship, deeds of loving kindness. Included as part of the 18 mitzvot each young person is asked to do is a project called, "Community Mitzvah Project." These projects have ranged from volunteering at Mayfair Manor or the Ronald McDonald House, to collecting books for children in need of books, to making book tapes for children in the hospital, to volunteering at the Humane Society or elsewhere. Sometimes all of the work is done at the agency such as going to Mayfair Manor. Sometimes the childrenask the congregation for donations of food, books, health items, etc. It is very important that we support the programs and projects of the Bar/Bat Mitzvah students so that they can succeed and learn what it means to make a difference in the world. Alison's main project was not the canned food drive. This was an extra mitzvah she chose to do on her own to help feed the hungry of Lexington and it is a very appropriate Jewish thing to do during Sukkot. (continued on page 2)

Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are not just for the absolution of our sins and the wiping clean of our slate as we start a new year. The Holy Days are also for considering our place as Jews and human beings in this world. The words of the Mahzor challenge us to do better in the coming year by reminding us of all the things we failed to do in the last year. The Holy Days aren't only about correcting what is wrong with our lives. They are about enhancing our present lives, finding paths to make our lives more meaningful and fulfilling by incorporating into them more positive and affirmative acts. Each act is another step that enhances our Jewishness and, hopefully, the world as well.

Being Jewish and being a Jew are two separate things. Technically being a Jew is a matter of birth or choice. Being Jewish is what one does to illuminate their personal Jewish soul. It is easy to say, "I am a Jew." It is much more difficult to proclaim, "I am Jewish." Being Jewish means celebrating the holidays with the community. Being Jewish means a commitment to lifelong Torah study. Being Jewish means participating in Tikkun Olam.

Alison and all the rest of the Bar and Bat Mitzvah students are well on the way to understanding the meaning of being Jewish. Let all of us learn from their example, support them on their Jewish journey, and act as role models for them in the way we live our Jewish lives.

May these High Holy Days be one of spiritual growth and renewal. May each one of us find within ourselves a place for God, Torah and the people of Israel. May all of us live lives in the coming year that we can truly say are blessed.


Names on our Temple's memorial tablets as well as the names of those who died in the past year are automatically listed in the booklet.

The cost of the Sukkah is \$45. There is 1 kit remaining in the Temple office from last year at last year's price of \$40. Call the office at 269-2979 if you wish this one. First come, first served.

After a long search, and many dead ends, we have found what may be the ideal sukkah wall material: "Sukkah Wrap". It comes in rolls 84 inches wide and long enough to wrap continuously around the sukkah from doorpost to doorpost. The material is cut to the required length with scissors or a knife and then tacked or stapled to the posts and crosspieces of the sukkah. After the holiday, it is rolled back up around its cardboard shipping tube and stored for next year. The cost is \$50 and may be ordered when you place your sukkah order.

For those buying sukkah from the Temple office, you will need to order your wrap (if you wish to use it) separately from your sukkah purchase.



- The roof on the Temple also needs to be replaced. Water leakage has already caused damage to several walls in the Temple. After extensive discussion, the Board accepted Tristate's bid of \$70,340 to replace the Temple's roof.
- The Board authorized the expenditure of up to \$8,000 to repair the brick wall on the east end of the Sanctuary and up to \$14,510 to repair the west (Ashland Avenue) side of the Sanctuary.
- The Board voted to allocate up to \$4,200 to hire an interior design consultant.







## IN THIS CORNER...

Beginning with the Erev Shabbat Service on November 7, our son, Joshua Eliezer, will celebrate his Bar Mitzvah. By now, all of the Temple Adath Israel community should have received our home made and home printed invitation. I must begin by apologizing for the addresses on the envelopes. I used the official Temple mailing list off of a computer file to print them. The addresses don't always list all the adults living in the home, nor does the address reflect our desire that your family be with us as well. Please know that Sandy and I invite you and your family members to join with us in this special celebration that weekend. You and your family members are invited to join with us Saturday evening, beginning at 8 PM, for dessert, drinks and dancing. There will be childcare provided at the Erev Shabbat Service on November 7, and at the Shabbat morning service on November 8. In order to adequately prepare for the childcare, please let the Temple office know in advance.

I believe that since Joshua was born I have anticipated this moment. As I celebrated the Bar and Bat Mitzvahs of your children, grandchildren, relatives and friends over the last 111/2 years, I looked forward to the day my children would be called to lead the service, read from the Torah and read the Haftarah. I have wondered what they would say in their commentary on the week's portion. I have wondered about their composure in the face of the pressure that is placed squarely on the shoulders of another emerging

Jewish adult.

As I listened to dozens upon dozens of parents speak to their children in that awkward moment of "public display of affection," I wondered what Sandy and I would say. Over the years, there have been parents who have made me laugh and parents who have made me cry. I know that it is not easy to stand in front of a congregation and speak about your children. However, when we do it, we not only affirm who they are in the presence of family, friends, and God, we also announce what is so important for our children to hear--that we love them and are proud of what they have accomplished.

Sandy and I have never spoken seriously about the words that we will speak to our children. We have laughed about some of things we could say, but can't or won't. These special, profound, even holy words, must come from us alone. They must come from deep inside of our souls.

In our congregation, what a Bar or Bat isn't is the end of a young person's Jewish life. Those who choose to have a Bar or Bat Mitzvah celebration at Temple Adath Israel must promise me, in front of their parents, that they will continue on to Confirmation which is a moment equal in portance to Bar/Bat Mitzvah. I take this commitment seriously, because I believe that religious education is as important a component in a young person's life as are his or her secular education and extra-curricular activities. We try and teach about the basis for morals and ethics. We provide as much information as we possibly can to help a child learn about Jewish tradition and celebration. We can and must impress on our children that understanding one's Jewish identity is a lifelong pursuit. Therefore, Bar/Bat Mitzvah is but a stage in a person's Jewish development, not the end of it. For Joshua, as for our other post Bar/Bat Mitzvah students, Confirmation must be the end of the formal religious education process, but certainly not the end of the quest for Jewish knowledge.

Let me conclude with a few personal words. I am very proud of what Joshua has done. He accepted the challenge of learning the prayers, the Torah reading and the Haftarah reading without hesitation. I have loved being his teacher for this moment. He is eager, bright, inquisitive, and fun. I have to believe that every rabbi values this moment as much as I do. I got to spend quality time with my child in a way that most parents don't. I got to truly be his teacher.

November 7 & 8, 1997, will be memorable days for Sandy and me. Our son, Joshua Eliezer, will take his place as an adult in the Jewish community. The responsibilities of being a Jew are now passed on to him. With this knowledge, I feel secure in the future of Judaism.



- The Board voted to contract with Fayette Concrete for \$2,500 to install an enlarged dumpster pad.
- The Board has contracted to have the entry doors refinished and painted for the sum of \$1,948.
- Lloyd Mayer has been appointed to serve on the Endowment Committee.



## IN THIS CORNER...

Although I strongly believe that a moment of prayer or meditation is integral to religious education, we have not had a worship service as a regular component of our Religious School weekly schedule. Certainly, over the years we have had assemblies at the beginning of Religious School, at the end of Religious School, for the lower grades, for the upper grades, weekly, bi-weekly, monthly, sometimes and occasionally. Sadly, nothing seemed to work quite right. Either the children arrived late and missed the opening assembly, or they left early for a variety of reasons and missed the closing assembly. Further, classes often straggled into the sanctuary after the assembly had begun and were generally disruptive. We needed to change the hodge podge nature of the assembly into something more formal, more holy, more spiritual.

After much thought, we decided to hold a weekly morning worship that would include on opening and closing song, the Sh'ma and V'ahavta, a thought for the day, and a few comments about the weekly Torah portion from the previous Shabbat or the next Shabbat. We decided to hold this service at 9:45 AM sharp with later arrivals joining the worship in progress, and we hoped that parents would join with their children to create a special worship setting.

From my perspective, it is truly beautiful to see our Temple parents sitting with their children for a few moments of prayer. Judaism emphasizes family, and family gathers not just at home, but in the sanctuary as well. I want to thank all the parents who have taken this seriously. You demonstrate to your child that the spiritual is important and that being together in the sanctuary is important.

I find it very disturbing that some parents drop off their children at the entrance to the Temple and do not come into the building. I encourage you to rethink what Religious School is all about. Although your children are with us for only a few hours each week, this time is very important in the growth and development of your child's Jewish identity. My friends, we need to be partners in the education of our children and in their spiritual growth. I can't do it alone. Our teachers can't do it alone. We need to do this together. Come on Sundays. Join with your children for fifteen minutes of worship. Bring you children to Tot Shabbat or Family Shabbat. Yes, God exists everywhere, but it is in worship that God exists for us alone.

#### A HANUKKAH GLOSSARY

HANUKKAH - A Hebrew word meaning "dedication". When the Jews had sent the Syrians down to final defeat, their first act was to cleanse the Temple in Jerusalem and remove the various pagan symbols and idols from it. They then held a ceremony dedicating the Temple once again to God. The holiday derives its name from the ceremony.

JUDAH MACCABEE - The name comes from the first letters of the Hebrew prayer Mi Kamocha Baelim Adonai ("Who is like Thee, O Lord!") inscribed on the Maccabean battle banner. Another reason that Judah was called the Maccabee is that he struck with the force of a mighty hammer. The Hebrew word for hammer is "makav". Judah became known as "The Hammer" or The Maccabee.

MACCABEES - Hebrew soldiers who fought the Syrians. Named after their leader, Judah the Maccabee.

MENORAII - Hanukkah candle holder. Contains places for 8 candles and a 9th candle, the shamus, is raised above the others. Each of the 8 candles represents one of the 8 days of Hanukkah.

DREIDEL - A four-sided top used on Hanukkah. Each side has a different Hebrew letter: nun, gimmel, hay, and shin. This stands for "Nes gadol ha-ya sham" ("A great miracle happened there").

SHAMUS - Helper candle used to light all the other candles.

LATKES - Potato pancakes. Traditional Hanukkah delicacy.

MATTATHIAS the Hasmonean - Priest who started revolt against the Syrians. Father of Judah Maccabee.

#### THE STORY OF HANUKKAH

After the death of Alexander the Great (323 B.C.E.) his Empire was divided into two smaller kingdoms - Egypt to the south and Syria to the north.

In the year 175 B.C.E. there arose a new king in Syria - Antiochus IV. He was a harsh ruler and treated all those whom he conquered cruelly.

Antiochus sent officers to the cities of Judea to proclaim, "The king has ordered all his kingdom to become one people and that everyone should forsake his own laws and his own religion." The king commanded the people to break the Sabbath and ignore the holy Jewish festivals. He instructed the Jews to ignore their prayers and religious practices. An idol was placed on the altar of God and incense burned in its

The kings' officer came to the city of Modin and said to Mattathias, a priest who dwelt in Modin, "You are a great man and well-known in the city. Come and fulfill the king's command and you shall be counted among the king's friends." But Mattathias turned to the officer and answered in a loud voice, "Neither I or my sons nor any faithful Hebrews will ever worship an idol."

The Syrian officer called for another volunteer. When, in the sight of all the people, one of the Jews came forward to sacrifice to the idol, Mattathias was filled with anger, and struck him down.

Then Mattathias leaped to the top of the altar and shouted, "All those who are faithful to the Lord, follow me."

One of Mattathias' sons, Judah (called "The Maccabee"), became the commander-in-chief of the Hebrew army and led the people into battle. Never did people fight more bravely against such odds. Because they were dedicated to their religious heritage and to the principles for which it stood, they were filled with the courage and strength to achieve the final victory.

Judah, his brothers and all loyal Jews came to rededicate the Temple in Jerusalem. However, when the people gathered to celebrate the "rededication" the High Priest could find only one small jar of Holy oil with which to light the Ner Tamid (the Eternal Light). This was just enough oil to burn for one day. Then it was that a wondrous thing occurred. For the oil in the lamp burned for eight days!

In remembrance of this great occasion, Hanukkah - the Feast of Dedication - is observed every year for eight days, beginning with the twenty-fifty day of the month of Kislev.

Since the time of the Maccabees the battle

for religious freedom has been fought over and over again throughout the world. After each victory, grateful men, women and children have dedicated themselves to their traditions and kept alive the remembrance of the struggle for religious freedom. As we celebrate the festival of Hanukkah, this year and every year, let us always give thanks for the freedom which our ancestors won so bravely. May we always treasure this precious possession, and ever seek to build a world in which all people may live in freedom and peace.

The candles are placed in the Hanukkah Menorah from right to left and kindled from left to right.

As the Shamus (servant) candle is kindled, we say each day: As one candle may kindle many others and yet lose none of its own light, so Judaism has kindled the light of truth for many religions in many lands and still shines brightly through the eyes.

#### FIRST NIGHT - FREEDOM

We kindle these Hanukkah lights in memory of the dedication and courage of the Maccabees. Believing that they should be free to worship God as their hearts and minds dictated, they willingly gave their lives for freedom. Now, kindling these candles, we rededicate ourselves to work for the equal rights of all people, and for the realization of a society of democracy and freedom.

#### SECOND NIGHT - FAMILY

Tonight as we celebrate Hanukkah together we are conscious of our precious gift of family. So often we take one another for granted, forgetting to express our love and devotion. Let us, now, as we kindle these festive lights rededicate ourselves to sharing our interests and time with one another. Like the Maccabees of old, let us always face the tribulations and the joys of life united by our family bonds. Kindling these lights, we pray that through kindness and thoughtfulness, our love for one another will increase form strength to strength.

#### THIRD NIGHT - TORAH

On the third night of Hanukkah, we rededicate ourselves to the study of our tradition. As the Maccabees courageously fought to preserve our faith, we, too are duty-bound to sustain our heritage by deepening our understanding of it through study. By increasing our knowledge of Judaism we have become more sensitive to its abiding values, more aware of our responsibility to realize these values in our society. Study opens our minds and fortifies us against tyranny. Learning secures our freedom. Let us, then, as we kindle these candles rededicate ourselves to the study of our tradition.

#### FOURTH NIGHT - HOPE

Our ancestors have taught us that in hope a person's future is illumined and made creative. Ours are times when many people live in fear and great despair. Like the Maccabees, we need to build our lives on hope. Hope that ultimately, truth will triumph over superstition and confidence, that trust and understanding will finally depose superstition and tyranny. Now as we kindle these Hanukkah lights, may our eyes be directed to the loftiest visions of our faith.

#### FIFTH NIGHT - CHARITY

Our tradition tells us that during the Maccabean war for freedom, all Jews, both children and adults, contributed toward the cause of defeating the oppressor. There are many forms of oppression still existent in our world today. There are people afflicted by sickness, hunger,

ignorance and prejudice. Tonight we, like our ancestors, put aside gifts of Tzedakah in order that we, too, may help to bring an end to oppression. We pray that the humble gifts we offer will provide food for the hungry, medicine for the sick, knowledge for the ignorant, and equal opportunity for those afflicted by prejudice. Now as we kindle our Hanukkah lights, let us rededicate ourselves to the ideal of Tzedakah, righteousness and justice, found in our Jewish tradition.

#### SIXTH NIGHT - SHALOM

The candles of Hanukkah remind us of our chosen mission as Jews. Like the Maccabees we seek to rededicate ourselves to the service of God. Today one of our foremost tasks is to secure peace in our troubled world. When we end disagreements through mutual understanding, when we seek to mend hurt and wounded feelings, we make peace a living idea. Then let us, as we kindle our Hanukkah candles, rededicate ourselves with renewed strength to the task of securing peace.

### SEVENTH NIGHT - BROTHERHOOD & SISTERHOOD

Brotherhood and Sisterhood is founded upon a total respect for the liberty and freedom of all people. The Maccabees of old sought to protect themselves when their rights were violated. Our Hanukkah lights serve as a reminder that peace is secure only when we honor the precious liberty and property of our fellow neighbor. As we kindle these lights, let us rededicate ourselves to the cause of peace which alone can bring dignity to all everywhere.

#### EIGHTH NIGHT - FAITH
