# FROM THE RABBI

It was supposed to be Spring last month, but we had snow up through the writing of these thoughts. I had gotten so tired of winter that I met the snow with fierce defiance. I shook my fist in the air, as if to say, "Be cursed, you foul snow!" Just as I was at the point of absolute resentment, standing there in the wet cold, a snow flake landed on my nose. It tickled and made me smirk. I went to brush it off and then realized that before I could, it had melted and I realized that I had lost the chance to appreciate it. In just an instant, I had gone from anger to silliness ... to melancholy. In one instant, I had experienced all three emotions and, as I got into the car, the entire moment went by almost as if it had never happened. The psalmist teaches that 1,000 years is but a watch in the night for God, and the span of our lives is but a blink of God's eye. In God's eternity, I am but an eye twitch, but God's eye twitch is my entire lifespan. That said, I wasted an entire lifespan being angry over snow, and it took another whole lifetime to recover from that anger. Now, I do not know how to measure the eye twitch of a being. I cannot even begin to define, but I do know that we waste (relevantly speaking) inordinate amount of time being upset over matters that are themselves fleeting (again relevantly speaking). It takes an equal or greater amount of time to restore from that anger, and in the process, life passes us by.

As we enter the month of Nisan (the first month on the Jewish calendar, we need to make a great resolve to spend less time wasting our lives on the matters that only set us back. Figure out what these things are in your life, make the new year resolution, and join in the celebration of living..

# THE PRESIDENT'S NOTE Ken Slepyan



This April (April 24 to be precise, but who's counting?) marks a year since I was entrusted with the Temple presidency. It has been a challenging and rewarding year for me in so many different ways. I would like to take this opportunity to review some of the happenings that have occurred this past year even as we think about the future

direction of the Temple. In truth, there are so many activities and community leaders that I can mention only a few, though I am profoundly thankful for everyone's contributions.

There have been some notable enhancements to our building, employing funds dedicated to building improvements. This fall Micah Kaufman supervised the installation of a Voice-Over IP system which has significantly modernized our telephone system and has provided wireless access throughout the building. This system has already been put to good use by our religious school students and by congregants enjoying bagels and coffee on Sundays. By tinting the windows in the sanctuary, we have improved our energy efficiency and have cooled the sanctuary during the hot days of the summer and early fall. Finally, there have been important enhancements to the kitchen, including the purchase of a new refrigerator. And, thanks to the efforts of Jo Stone and the religious school, the temple now sports a thriving vegetable garden.

This fall, with the help of Amy Messer and Anne Graff, we conducted on-line and telephone surveys. Among the issues mentioned by survey participants is the need for better communication between the board and the congregation. To this end we've instituted "Coffee Connections," an opportunity for congregants and board members to chat informally about temple affairs. The Temple bulletin now includes "Board Briefs" which summarize the issues discussed at the monthly board meetings. The Publications Committee is investigating ways to update our website as well looking into using other forms of social media to facilitate communications among members. Most significantly, under the leadership of Stephen Auer and the Financial Resources Committee, we have begun holding parlor meetings. Parlor meetings are informal gatherings of 12 to 14 congregants, usually held in board members' homes, at which temple policies and programs are discussed. We hope that within the next year or so that every congregant will have had the opportunity to attend at least one parlor meeting

Another finding from the surveys is the desire for more social events and educational opportunities. With this in mind, the Adult Jewish Growth Committee, under the direction of Debra Booker and Mixon Ware, has revived the temple book club. Rabbi Kline is conducting a large and enthusiastic B'not Mitzvah class. Our musical offerings continue to grow, and led by Lorne Dechtenberg, our adult choir, Shir Adat, now enlivens our Friday night worship. And last, but not least, thanks to Ruth Poley, Pat Shraberg, and a dedicated volunteer corps of sandwich makers, we have our own deli, "TAI on Rye," which has the added distinction of being a fundraiser, a delight to the taste buds, and a wonderful community-builder all-in-one!

In short, much has happened in the past year, with more to come in the next. While we will also have our challenges to face, thinking about the dedication and the energy that is so evident in our community, I am very excited about what this new year will bring.

#### SIM SHALOM NEWS Volume 5 #8

Like many Reform congregations, we have an active youth group. Actually, the present one is our second group. The first one started about 9 years ago, and was so successful that half of our current Board members were in the group. One of them, Peter Radvanski, is in his fourth year of study for the Rabbinate at the Leo Baeck College in London, where our Rabbi, Kati Kelemen, studied, and another, Miklos Budai is our very talented cantor. One of their biggest achievements was to start the first international European Jewish young people's group, Eurojews, which held holiday get-togethers several times a year at various venues in Europe. Lots of present day young Jewish leaders were in that larger group. Well, our group broke up due to university attendance and moving on to bigger things, but then about 3 years ago we restarted our youth group with a new batch of kids. They've done a couple of photo shoots, and made presentations of the results. One is of the Budapest Old Jewish Quarter, which is being redeveloped out of existence by Israeli developers and corrupt city politicians. The other was of the region in northeast Hungary which had a large Jewish population before WW II. This year they have a new activity called Palacsinta, Torah and Us. It's led by Rabbi Kelemen, and is a discussion of various ethical issues from the standpoint of Jewish teachings in the Torah and Talmud. The topic last Monday was whether a protest leader should end the protest under the threat of dire punishment to himself and the group, as is happening everywhere in North Africa right now. The majority thought that the protest shouldn't end, because why would the protesters want to live without freedom, and this was consistent with various quotes from many past Jewish leaders. The palacsinta part is the sweet pancakes, like crepes, which are needed to fill the everempty stomachs of all healthy, growing teenagers. I think a big attraction of the program is that the youngsters like to be treated as adults, dealing with reallife issues of significance. The success of the program is attested by the fact that the attendance has almost doubled since it started last fall. It's not that we suddenly have more youth in the congregation. The kids are bringing their friends, Jewish and non-Jewish, to something that they find important. For fun they are going to put on their annual Purim Spiel soon for the congregational celebration. And then they'll take a week long trip to London next summer.



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

# **PASSOVER 2011-5771**

#### ITEMS NEEDED FOR THE SEDER PLATE

Charoset – Composed of chopped nuts and apples, cinnamon, and wine, charoset represents the mortar used by the Jews in making bricks while they wee slaves in Eqypt.

**Zeroa** – The roasted shankabone or roasted wing of a fowl represents the sacrifice of the Paschal lamb.

**Beitza** – The roasted hard-cooked egg symbolized the festival offering brought to the Temple.

**Moror** – The bitter herbs are represented by horseradish that has been freshly grated from the horseradish root. They symbolize the bitterness of slavery for the Jews in Egype.

*Karpas* – You may use parsley or celery to represent Spring, which brings rebirth and redemption. It is dipped in salt water before it is eaten to remind us of the tears and sweat of the Jewish people in slavery.

**Chazereth** – On most Seder plates, there is another form of bitter herbs. It may be the root of the horseradish (ungrated) or watercress

#### SETTING THE SEDER TABLE

Seder Plate – The most important item on the table is the Seder plate, containing the symbolic foods. Seder plates are usually beautifully decorated, often with scenes from the Passover story or with Hebrew inscriptions.

Three Matzahs – The ceremonial matzah are placed, one on top of the other, in a special mitzvah cover or in a napkin. According to a common interpretation, the matzahs represent the three divisions of the Jewish people; Kohen – priest; Levi – assistants in the Temple; Israelites – people of Israel.

**Additional Matzah** – Additional matzah is placed on a serving plate, for eating during the main meal.

Haggadahs – The Haggadah is the book that is read cover to cover during the evening. It includes the story, prayers, songs, rituals, and commentary that make up the Seder. Make sure you have one at each place.

*Dish of Salt Water* – Part of the Seder ritual is to dip the Karpas (parsley) into salt water, which represents the tears of the Jewish people while in slavery.

**Wine Glasses** – The glasses are filled with the traditional, Kosher for Passover wine.

**Decanter of Wine** – There should be enough wine to pour four cups for each individual. These represent the four divine promises of redemption found in Exodus 6:6-7. You will also need enough wine for serving during the meal.

Cup of Elijah – Fill a beautiful cup with wine and put it in a prominent place on the table to welcome Elijah, the prophet, who heralds freedom and redemption.

Charoset – Although charoset goes on the Seder plate, extra charoset is served for making the Hillel sandwich and to eat during the meal. Rabbi Hillel, a great Jewish teacher who lived between 90 BCE and 70 Cl, may have invented the sandwich of charoset and moror (between two pieces of matzah) to represent the bitterness of slavery and the sweetness of freedom.

**Candlesticks** – The blessing over the candles is recited before the Seder begins.

**Pillows** – Pillows to lean on are traditionally placed on chairs, especially in the chair of the leader of the Seder, as a symbol of freedom from slavery

Among the foods that must contain the "Kosher l'Pesach" label and be certified for Passover use by rabbinical authority are:

Matzah, matzah flour, Passsover noodles Candles, cakes, cookies, jams and jellies Cheeses, milk, and butter Canned and processed foods, such as fruits, sauces, & soups Salad oils, shortenings, vinegar Beverages, wine and liquors Vegetable gelatin Relishes Dried fruits Horseradish

The following foods require no Kosher I;Pesach label if they are in unopened packages or containers or in a natural state.

Coffee, tea, and sugar (but not confectioners' sugar, because It contains comstarch)

Salt, pepper, spices (some herbs should be fresh) All fruits and nuts

All vegetables except legumes such as peas, com, and beans

Fruits and vegetables normally permitted for Passover use are permitted in their frozen state, provided they have not been cooked pr processed in any way.

Chametz – foods with leavening – may not be eaten during Passover

All grains, (wheat, rye, oats, barley, rice, kasha, spelt) any of their derivatives.

Leavened bread, cakes, biscuits, crackers, cereals, and any store bought baked goods not labeled Kosher l'Pesach. Any product with flavoring made from grain alcohol, such as

vanilla extract, brandy, beer, or liquor. Legumes such as com, beans, soy beans, lentils, lima beans, and any product made from them.



#### THE SEARCH FOR CHAMETZ

All chametz must be removed from the house or separated by putting into a room, closet, or cupboard that islocked. Since during the year, chametz may work its way into every corner of the house and even into the household dust, a thorough housecleaning is considered part of the Passover preparations.

To further insure that no chametz will be found in the house during Passover, a final ritual search (Bediklat Chametz) made after dark on the night before Passover. To add interest to the ceremony, especially for children, bread may be wrapped in a napkin and hidden around the house for family members to find. The family goes from room to room, using only a candle to light the way. Traditionally a feather is used to brush the bits of bread into the wooden spoon.

The chametz is ten tied up in a cloth along with the feather, the candle, and the spoon, and burned the next morning. There are blessings to accompany both the search for and the disposal of chametz.



#### THE MATZAH OF UNITY

(To be recited during the Seder at Yachatz when breaking the middle Matzah)

We are about to take the middle matzah and divide it in half. As we break the matzah and set it aside, we link ourselves symbolically with all Jews who have lived in the former Soviet Union. We will not conclude our Seder until the missing piece of matzah is found and brought again to our table. This action reminds us of the indestructible unity which binds all Jews together as a world family.

In Jewish tradition, matzah is "the bread of affliction," used on the road to redemption. As we celebrate Pesach, our festival of freedom, we know that the theme of the Exodus resonates in all that is happening around us. Jews of the Soviet Union resisted decades of suppression. Struggling to live as Jews, many sought valiantly to leave for Israel, the homeland of the Jewish people. Many suffered harassment, some endured prison and some lost their lives.

At last, most Jews can leave the place that represented a prison for so long. For now, the door to freedom remains open. We walk with them in their Exodus. Through Operation Exodus, we commit ourselves to help them in their quest for a new and better future for themselves and their children.

We also remember the several million Jews who still remain behind. We pledge our vigilance, our support, and our solidarity with them, as they endeavor to sustain their community and courageously resist anti-Semitism.

As Jews from the former Soviet Union and other countries settle in Israel by the hundreds of thousands, we know that their reunification with the Jewish people requires our caring and loving concern. May we be worthy of that challenge.

We pray that all Jews may find freedom this year in a world without war and with Israel at peace. Am Yisrael Hu Am Echad. May the Jewish people always be united!

# FROM THE RABBI

"A human being is a human being, and an angel is an angel. If, however, a human being wants it so, the human can be greater than the angel." Rabbi Leibel Eiger authored these words as part of his seminal Torah Commentary, "Torat Emet (19th Century)." Our tradition teaches that angels are one step removed from divinity. If we are one step further removed, this great sage teaches us that the only limitations that impede our embrace of divinity are the ones we impose on ourselves. As a practical application, we speak of angels as those sent by God to intervene in the lives of those in need. We can play that role, and have, as we have shown up, for no apparent reason, in places where we end up having incredible impact. We have all experienced the phone call or the visit, or the per chance meeting that at first seemed mundane or routine, but which ended up being the source of incredible blessing. What Rabbi Eiger teaches us is that we should never be comfortable waiting for this "per chance" meeting or engagement. They will happen, but irrationally, we have no idea of how or when. Where we really want to be more intentional, we can open our eyes a little wider and see where we are needed and pro-actively show up in more places and touch more lives.

This is what it means to commit to being part of a congregational community. No one joins a congregation to pay more bills. Where we treat membership as a burden of sharing costs, we absolutely fail in the core values of building a community. Where see our membership as an opportunity to bring and receive blessings from each other, we find ourselves not paying bills, but investing in the humanity, dignity, security, and spirituality of every member of our family. Where we want it to be so, we provide not incidental or seemingly accidental blessings for each other, rather we create very real relationships and commitments with and to each other. As we take this summer to plan for the year to come, please let us know how we can more deeply engage your family, your interests, and your needs. Let us also know how you can help us show up to better serve and care for the families, interests, and needs of the rest of our community.

# THE PRESIDENT'S NOTE Ken Slepyan



I've heard that there are three topics that one should never bring up at a dinner party: sex, politics, and religion. At the Temple, we certainly talk about the last topic (the other two perhaps not so much). But there is a fourth subject that we almost never discuss, except in the annual letter asking us to renew our financial commitment to the Temple. That subject, of course, is money, and more specifically, the Temple's finances. Circumstances force us now to address this matter head on.

By now, you are probably aware that the projected budget for fiscal year 2011-2012 calls for a \$34,000 deficit. This development was not unexpected, and in past years and in this year, the Budget Committee has worked very hard to find ways to reduce the deficit by minimizing spending. However, the gap between our expenses and revenues is just too large. In this month's column, I will explain our financial position. Next month I will focus on what steps we must take to resolve this situation in these next critical years.

Our expenses for the 2011-12 year include: staff compensation: 66%; building expenses (including utilities, housekeeping and building maintenance, major maintenance, grounds maintenance, and building insurance): 13%; office expenses: 4%; worship, services

and programs: 9%; URJ dues: 8%. These expenses are generally in line with other temples, and indeed with other non-profits, like colleges. Furthermore, our deficit is actually similar to those of other temples around the country. What then explains our particular situation?

The most basic explanation is that for us, like everyone else, costs are going up while our revenues have remained essentially flat. As we all know, utility costs have increased, so it should not be surprising that TAI's utility fees have gone up as well. Our URJ dues have also increased as of late. When the Great Recession first hit, URJ dramatically, but temporarily reduced its fees; these too are now rising again as we were told they would.

Regarding staff salaries and our contractual obligations with the Rabbi, the Budget Committee felt that it was our ethical duty to meet these obligations and to give our staff a modest but well-deserved raise. It should be remembered that two years ago all our staff voluntarily agreed to a salary freeze, and in the following year willingly accepted only a small raise (and in the case of the Rabbi, a smaller raise than was stipulated in his contract). Our clergy and lay staff are a vital and critical part of our Temple family; without them, the Temple would not operate (and I can tell you this from firsthand experience). It is our duty to treat them as fairly as conditions allow.

Our programming budget, central to the Temple's mission, is actually stretched quite thin; we accomplish most of what we do through the strenuous and selfless efforts of our marvelous volunteers. Finally, it is also worth mentioning that the improvements we've made to Temple infrastructure in the past year have not come from our operating budget. Building improvements have been paid for with special funds dedicated for that purpose.

There is no question that a \$34,000 deficit is a daunting figure; indeed, I wouldn't be writing about it if it wasn't so important. Collectively, we are working on possible short term solutions to cover the upcoming year's deficit, but we will need the Temple community to help. There are, however, ways that in the future we can restore the Temple's fiscal health, which I will talk about in next month's column. I also urge you to attend the Congregational Annual Meeting on May 15, as the budget will be the main item on the agenda. Also, please feel to speak with me or with any board member if you have any questions or concerns.

I am constantly in awe of the great things our Rabbi, lay leaders, educators, volunteers, staff, and the congregation as a whole are able to accomplish for the Temple, for the Jewish community, and for all of Lexington. There is a wonderful spirit at TAI, and I have every confidence that we will meet this challenge as we do all others. And we, as a community, will be all the stronger for it.

#### SIM SHALOM NEWS Volume 5 #8

One of the oldest and most popular programs at Sim Shalom is the biweekly Torah Study session. It's led by the Rabbi, who was trained as a teacher of literature and in the analysis of literary texts. The sessions consist of in depth studies and discussions of the Torah text, starting from the original Hebrew, which several people can read fairly well, and then expanding into discussions that can go in almost any direction, depending on the interests of the people participating, ethics, psychology, history, etc. Years ago it often seemed to end up with some aspect of the Shoah, but that is slowly becoming less frequent as the first generation survivors die off. and the traumatic overtones fade away for those who are left. Younger newcomers have other interests. It took about ten years to get through Genesis, using this very detailed method of teaching and discussion. I can still remember the celebration we had in our old premises on Csalogany (Nightingale) utca. Exodus only took about 8 years to finish, and so we had another celebration, with wine and cookies about two weeks ago to mark the end, and the beginning of Leviticus. I think Leviticus will go faster, because of the repetition about all the sacrifices. After we've discussed thoroughly one sacrifice, maybe we'll skip quickly over the next three. So we might finish this book in only 4-5 years!

Two weeks ago, Sim Shalom had a fantastic Purim party. It started with a puppet style Purim Spiel, put on by the Youth group. The puppets were made by one of our adult members, and the whole story of Esther and Vashti and Mordecai and Haman was played out before our eyes to an audience of about 80. This was followed up by a reading of the Megillah. Some of it was beautifully chanted in Hebrew by one visiting Rabbi and read in Hebrew by another. Other people read in Japanese, Chinese, Korean, Hungarian, and English. But the hit of the evening was when Miklos Budai, our very talented Cantor, sang his chapter in Italian, in the style of baroque Italian opera! And he did it ad lib! What a performance! And it was all accompanied with lots of slivovitz and hamantaschen, and greggor noisemaking. Purim is a great holiday. Even though the story never changes, it's always inspiring to hear how the Jews survived another catastrophe.

# TAI CONGREGATIONAL SURVEY

The TAI Congregational Survey and the follow-up phone survey had a great response rate. We received a lot of suggestions that have been very useful in identifying areas of improvement as well as initiatives that help build community. Your suggestions were given to the appropriate committees and the committees have presented action plans to the Board of Trustees. In identifying areas for improvement, trends in suggestions were identified. We were not able to address all comments at this time but we assure you, continued improvement is our goal.

#### **Adult Education**

Suggestions from TAI congregants included offering additional adult education programming specifically introductory Jewish classes, spirituality in everyday life, Jewish history, culture, politics, and interfaith issues. All of these great suggestions have led to the re-establishment of the book club as well as resuming the Introductory to Judaism class. A new monthly class with the Rabbi, "Torah Lishmah: A Look at Jewish Traditions" has been initiated, and other new classes focusing on Judaism, Torah study, and Mussar have begun.

#### **Becoming More Welcoming/Inclusive**

A trend in the survey responses was to have a congregation that is more welcoming of current families as well as new families. To this end, the Board has committed to having at least two Board members at each Shabbat Service to welcome people. New TAI members will be paired with members of established families in order to help the new family be introduced to the community. Congregants will be approached for one-on-one meetings with Board members to get to know individuals better and to match talents and interests with committees and activities. Parlor Meetings have begun consisting of small groups of TAI members and Board members with a guided discussion topic. Finally, Board members are having "Coffee Connections" once a month on Sundays where Board members will be available to you.

#### Leadership

Improved communication between TAI leadership and TAI congregants was a common thread of the survey responses. Both the on-line suggestion box and the suggestion box located in the foyer are available for people to provide their on-going ideas and concerns with the option of remaining anonymous. The TAI President will check the Suggestion Box located at TAI weekly. The on-line Suggestion Box is checked daily and will be responded to promptly. Suggestions will be addressed by the appropriate committee. Long range plans for each committee are being developed. An on-line committee sign up form has been created for congregants to request a committee chair to contact him or her regarding participation on the committee.

#### Worship

While most respondents expressed satisfaction with services, due to the diversity of ages and interests among the congregants, TAI has begun to offer a more varied type of service that will be announced in advance so that congregants can match their personality with the type of service being offered. We have already had a Teacher's Appreciation Shabbat service as well as a Volunteer Appreciation Service. Speakers for guest sermons will be recruited. Other types of services include youth led services, traditional services, and children's services.

#### **Religious School**

The Religious School is working to encourage parents of religious school students to get to know each other. The Matching Mishpachot program brought families together to share stories. The ongoing Community Garden allows everyone to work together to grow vegetables and learn about sustainable living.

#### Building

Many people suggested updates, repair, and maintenance to the building. Many of the issues are larger concerns that will take additional time to address. These include working on air conditioning, ventilation and overall air quality, updating interiors, and making the grounds more inviting.

#### Communication

The Publication Committee has been active in recruiting people to proofread the Monthly Bulletin. Volunteers are still being sought. The Service Pamphlet has been revamped for content and look. The website is currently undergoing a critical review for content and look. Revamping the website will take a few months so be sure to check often to see updates.

**Caring Connections** 

The Caring Connections Committee has been expanded to involve more people. The Mitzvah Meal Groups have been increased in order to support more TAI members. New members are being recruited to continue building the committee.

#### Activities

Many types of activities were suggested by TAI members. TAI congregants would like to see more holiday celebrations as well as an increase in non-religious social opportunities such as biking, hiking, movie nights, discussion groups. Other activities suggested include collaborations with the youth from OZS, TAI Tikkun Trips, and activities for middle aged people who no longer have children in religious school. There were suggestions to use the building as a community center for special interest classes like Zumba and scouts. Body recall classes will be offered.

Stay tuned to fliers, email invitations, and website and bulletin announcements to stay up-to-date about the new activities that will be taking place at TAI. If you would like to organize an event or program, please contact the Temple office or president. Your leadership and participation in activities is both welcome and needed to help the Temple best serve the needs of all of our members.

# THE PRESIDENT'S NOTE Ken Slepyan

Last month I wrote about the Temple's present budget situation, specifically our \$34,000 deficit for this fiscal year. This month's column is devoted to looking at some ways I think we should move forward to work on two intertwined issues: dealing with the deficit and strengthening our Temple as a community. We must not forget that more than just dollars and cents, bricks and mortar, we are a community: a community that worships, learns, mourns, and celebrates together. Our primary goal must to be to build this community, and our visions and solutions must be congregational. I make no claims to having the answers, but these are ideas I think we should pursue.

Before I proceed, a wonderful opportunity has arisen. As you already know from the letter you've received from the Temple, a very generous anonymous donor has offered the Temple \$15,000 if we raise the remaining \$19,000 by July 5 to eliminate the anticipated deficit. It is vitally important that we step forward to meet this challenge in recognition of what TAI means to us. We ask that each Temple family pledge \$100; if you can afford to

give more that would be magnificent, and if \$100 is beyond your means then we would most gratefully accept whatever you are able to offer. Please write a check today and mail it to the Temple so that we may take advantage of this extraordinarily munificent offer by the July 5 deadline. Together as a community we can achieve this goal.

This amazing offer buys us precious time to develop the solutions necessary to resolve the Temple's underlying financial problems and secure its financial future. Some approaches will not work. For example, we cannot eliminate the deficit through budget cuts alone. As I noted last month, most of our expenses are fixed, and are essential to the Temple's maintenance. While we have reduced budget lines when and where we can, and will continue to do so, these reductions will not close the gap. Nor can we rely on the Temple's endowment to cover the deficit. The endowment already supports the Temple's general operations by about \$30,000 per year. However, to draw on the endowment further would undermine its ability to fund the Temple's future development, and this cannot be allowed.

The solutions instead are to be found via other means. One item under review is how we ask families to pledge annual membership commitments. Currently we have no specific guidelines for this annual commitment, suggesting only that members pledge a target of \$1,500, which some families can easily afford while others cannot. The Financial Resources Development Committee will reexamine this policy with an eye towards providing families more guidance about potential commitment levels. We must also increase our efforts regarding fund raising and development, looking for ways to generate funds and build community. To this end, the FRDC wants to expand its membership to facilitate its search for solutions (if you are interested in joining please contact the co-chairs, Stephen Auer and Dale Schermer).

In our search for congregational solutions, the Temple board has been sponsoring parlor meetings. Parlor meetings are small group discussions in which Temple leaders and congregants talk about vital issues facing us, and engaging the many skill sets with which our membership is blessed. Topics of conversation have included the Temple's demographics, finances, the importance of a Jewish education, the significance of worship, all ultimately addressing the question: what does TAI mean to us? These exchanges enhance the Temple's ability to better meet the congregation's needs and empower congregants to lead the Temple through their own ideas and actions. If you have an idea how we can improve our community and meet the challenges facing us, now is the time to put that idea forward, to become involved. If you would like to attend a parlor meeting please contact me. I look forward to hearing from you! Together we can build a strong, compassionate, and fiscally sound community for the next generations.

# SIM SHALOM NEWS Volume 5 #9 By Jesse Weil, from Budapest, Hungary

Congregational Seders are nothing unusual in most Reform/Progressive congregations. Sim Shalom has one every year. But the one this year set some records. First-off, the attendance of 144 people was the largest ever. As usual, we held it in a public place that has the necessary space and the ability to serve a nice meal, since our synagogue can only seat around 70 and that is for services. For the third year in a row we held it in a very nice dining room belonging to a military officer's club. What was special this year was that we used our newly revised and expanded Haggadah. The previous one was put together in a rather messy cut and paste job back in the early 1990's. It was okay for a first try, but for some time it had seemed inadequate, and we wanted something better. In a collaboration between the Rabbi and our cantor, who is increasingly interested in liturgy, the new version was finally produced in a first draft, just in time for this year's Seder. I hope it gets polished up and published with good artwork sooner than it took to get the old one revised.

Our Cantor, Miki Budai surprised us with many new tunes for the prayers, since we chant many of them rather than just reading them aloud. He held a teaching session the week before to teach them to the interested singers in the congregation. But the hit of the evening was a new version of Had Gad'ya. One of the features of the new Haggadah was an amusing Hungarian translation of this traditional song. Playing around on his guitar after the practice session, Miki noticed that the rhythm of the verses fit very well to a medieval French Chanson that he had recently learned, (he's very talented!). So we ended the evening with Had Gad'ya in Hungarian sung to an ancient French melody. It was a very nice experience, and especially enjoyable since everyone could understand the words.

The building housing our synagogue just celebrated its 100th birthday as part of a citywide celebration of old houses. Each of the 100 year old houses held an open house, and Sim Shalom took part in the celebration in our house. It was a great success for us, with over a hundred visitors coming into the synagogue to learn a little about Reform Judaism, which is a bit exotic in Budapest. A few people have started coming to our programs as a result



# JUNE-JULY BOARD BRIEFS

**June Board Meeting** 

There were 18 Board members in attendance for the June 14th meeting.

The Temple President, Ken Slepyan, discussed the resignation of Barry Gerall as Temple Treasurer. Ken stated that Barry was a committed member of the Board and Executive Committee who contributed greatly with his vision and hands-on approach as treasurer.

Board members will continue to host parlor meetings to provide a forum for discussion so that we can better meet the needs of our community.

Ken stated that he is in awe of the response of our Temple from the matching pledge drive with \$23,000 in donations. With the immediate projected deficit taken care of, the Board is planning to work hard to address financial issues and long-range planning.

Amy Messer, chair of the Publications Committee, is working on a new template for the Temple website. She would appreciate Temple photos to include in the website.

Judy Engelberg announced that the musical duo, The Allard's, will be the musicians in residence in October.

Rabbi announced there will be three Bar Mitzvah's this summer and encouraged our joining together to celebrate at these special occasions.

**July Board Meeting** 

There were 17 Board members and one guest (Ben Baker) present for the July 5, 2011 meeting.

The Temple President, Ken Slepyan, presented three goals for the Board to address this year: Developing a long-range plan for the Temple, addressing the financial security of the Temple, and leadership development.

Ken presented guidelines for Temple Committee Chairs. He emphasized the importance of Committee Chairs actively recruiting members, scheduling a summer meeting and having 2-3 goals prepared for the August Board meeting, keeping the Executive Committee liaisons informed about Committee activities, and using the Calendar to coordinate events. Judy Engelberg presented for Jane Grise, Religious School Director, since she is on vacation. She requested approval from the Board for a Children's Library with funding donated to Youth Education in memory of Anita Mersack. The Board discussed the proposal and will vote through email responses.

# THE PRESIDENT'S NOTE

Ken Slepyan



In the last few columns, I have focused on the financial challenges facing the Temple, and the steps we need to take to meet these challenges. I am deeply appreciative of the generosity of the congregation in surpassing the challenge grant. It is a wonderful example of what we can achieve when we work together for a common aim. Stable finances are critical to us as an institution but not as an end in themselves. Rather, they are a means to an end.

But what is that end? According to our mission statement:

Temple Adath Israel is a Reform Jewish congregation linked to a tradition of welcoming those searching for a community committed to honoring the dignity we all share as children of *Adonai* (the one God) by embracing these enduring Jewish values: *AVODAH* (Worship); *TALMUD TORAH* (Torah Study); *TZEDEK* (Social Justice); and *KEHILAH* (Community).

For each of us, the importance of these four values varies. Some of us joined the Temple primarily because of the desire to worship, others for their or their children's religious and cultural education. Still others are attracted by the Temple's strong commitment to social action, or because of the importance they place on belonging to a Jewish community. And, of course, our reasons and priorities for belonging to the Temple change as we change; hence parents who became members so that their children could have a religious education have found themselves on their own spiritual journey. Whatever the initial motivations, one of the wonderful things about this Temple is that it is a place where such wanderings and opportunities for growth can take place.

Much of what the Temple stands for can be achieved by individuals through their own actions. Certainly one can pray, study, and contribute to a community through solitary action. But in the long run, I believe, it is only through action as a community that we can reach our potential, both as individuals and as a group. Through our collective participation, the Temple enhances what we can achieve as individuals. Yes, we can read books on our own. But the fun and most educational part of study is sharing our ideas and learning from others. Yes, we can contribute to a cause on our own. But the feeling we get and the effect we achieve is much greater when we work together to fill food boxes at God's Pantry or to help feed the homeless at the Hope Center. And while we might pray individually, I feel much more spiritually inspired when I'm part of the congregation participating together in worship, or when hearing the wonderful singing of Shir Adat, our choir. By belonging to and participating in the Temple we magnify what we can accomplish, even if our reasons for belonging are different than our neighbor's. For me, in the end, the Temple is about working together to achieve our individual goals and the goals of our community.

It's one of the high points of our year to host those enthusiastic teenagers. I think they have been an inspiration to our own kids to get active in our youth group.

That youth group is touring London, as I write, under the leadership of Rabbi Kelemen and their own leader, Kati Gyarfas. Among their activities, they are learning about the life of Rabbi Hugo Gryn, a Hungarian Shoah survivor who eventually became ordained in England and led one of the great liberal synagogues in London. They're also getting a tour of the Jewish history parts of the British Museum, led by Peter Radvanski, a Sim Shalom member who is studying to be a Rabbi at the Leo Baeck College in London.

Another old London connection was renewed a week ago when Rabbi Fred Morgan and his wife Sue visited Sim Shalom for the weekend. When Fred was just starting his rabbinical career in the early 1990's he was one of the most important visitors to Budapest among all the young Jews who came here in those years. They came to teach the early members of the Sim Shalom Community (as it called itself then) how to practice Judaism, because none of them had learned any such thing from their own parents in those times when it was deemed dangerous to be "Jewish". Fred even spent three months of a sabbatical leave in B.P. teaching and leading the community. So it was very joyous for our old members who were part of those early days to renew old friendships, and the newer members learned something of Sim Shalom's beginnings.

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

# THE PRESIDENT'S NOTE Ken Slepyan



As we announced this past spring, we are beginning an exciting initiative at the Temple this fall: the rabbinical intern program. By the time you read this column, our first rabbinical intern, Matt Cohen, will have already begun his year-long tenure with TAI in this new position. The rabbinical intern program is supported wholly by the Dr. Victoria Greenberg Rabbinical Fund, with a very generous initial donation made by the Greenberg family. I am deeply saddened to note that Vickie Greenberg recently passed away after a long struggle with cancer. The rabbinical intern program is both a tribute to her memory and a contribution to the training of the next generation of rabbis.

In last fall's online and telephone surveys, many congregants expressed a desire for more variety in our spiritual and musical offerings. The rabbinical intern program will enable the Temple to expand its offerings in a number of different ways. Rabbi Matt will be at the Temple approximately two weekends per month, from Friday afternoon through Sunday afternoon. While here, he will be engaged in all aspects of our Temple's life. These will include enhanced educational opportunities for adults on Saturdays and Sundays, working with our youth group, the possibility of regular Saturday morning and/or havdalah services, and in general increased variety of our spiritual and musical programming. Rabbi Matt will also be able to assist in greater congregational outreach and working with congregants in need. As an added benefit, Rabbi Matt's presence will enable Rabbi Marc to visit other religious school classes on Sundays since Rabbi Matt will also be able to assist teaching the sixth grade and confirmation classes.

Many of you know Rabbi Matt, of course, from his wonderful musical contributions to Friday night services. However, his varied experiences in Jewish educational and religious life at Ohio State, Hebrew Union College, as a staff member at a 1,800 family congregation in Cleveland, and as a student rabbi in congregations in Texarkana, Texas, and Terre Haute, Indiana, make him particularly suited to be our inaugural rabbinical intern. In addition to serving as song leader and musical director and teacher, he has been a youth group advisor, taught both adults' and children's classes, and initiated and ran a young adults group. Rabbi Matt earned his Master of Arts in Hebrew Letters from Hebrew Union College in June and is greatly looking forward to this opportunity to enrich our community.

The rabbinical intern program is based entirely on donations from the congregation and does not draw on any funds from our operating budget. To continue the program next year (2012-2013), we will need approximately \$15,000 in contributions to the Greenberg Rabbinical Intern Fund. We will begin a formal pledge drive later this fall to meet this goal. In the meantime, I hope you will enjoy and benefit from this new program. I, for one, am very excited about the opportunities it presents for our individual and congregational growth. We are grateful to the Greenberg family for supporting this opportunity for the enrichment and expansion of Temple offerings.

#### SIM SHALOM NEWS Volume 6 #2

I don't know how much it's been in the news there, but very recently the Hungarian government has completely rewritten its laws concerning its recognition of and relationship to religious institutions. As a result, our financial situation is almost certain to be affected in a serious way for the worse.

Up till now Sim Shalom Congregation was recognized as a registered religious institution. Based on that registration, we were eligible to participate in a program where any person could designate that 1% of his income tax would be given to us. For several years this has been a significant part of our income, averaging 25% of our total income for the past two years. In the new law, our registration was cancelled, and though it is possible to reapply to become registered, the conditions are so stringent that we cannot meet them. For instance, we would have to have at least 1000 members, and even counting all our known supporters, the number of members we could claim would only be a few hundred. All of the other previously registered small religious organizations were similarly affected, with only the largest like the Catholic Church and the largest Protestant churches keeping their registration. It is particularly galling and discriminatory that the other Jewish movements, the Orthodox and Neolog, did retain their registration.

It is even rumoured that the government will not release the 1% donations from the taxes collected this spring so as to meet other budget shortages. Already they have confiscated some private pension funds that citizens have contributed to. They have no conscience in the struggle to stay in power.

There is a huge protest building up about these changes, both from the organizations that have lost their registration, and the Hungarian liberal community that sees this as being very repressive and discriminatory, and completely against the Constitutional claim of religious freedom. It is just one more instance of a government acting more and more like the Nazis in their early days in power. We are in contact with the officers of the World Union of Progressive Judaism (WUPJ) and EUPJ about the situation, discussing what help they can give us by lobbying from outside the country. But it is an open question whether there is a realistic chance to have the new law changed. On Press Freedom limitations, the government has largely ignored strong pressure from the EU to revise new legislation.

If you know of anyone who has governmental or other international influence who would speak out in protest about this changed law, we would be most grateful for their support. I can provide more information if it would be helpful.

This past year, we spent a lot of time planning for ways to better serve our members. Rabbinical student Matt Cohen will be here two weekends a month to serve as an Intern. He will sing some, but he will primarily serve Rabbinically to help us take care of more people. We are working on Shabbat programming for our young children and have already greatly modified our Temple Tots programming. We have increased our energy in creating intra-congregational relationships. Whether it is the Shabbat Dinners that Lori, Rachel and I will be hosting, the parlor meetings, the additional adult education programming, the increase in family programming in our religious school, or a host of other things we are doing, we are gearing up to serve our congregation in new ways. We need your help in doing it. We need to know what talents and time you can devote. We need to know what talents and time you need from others. As we move into this holiday season, amongst the many things over which we will make promises, make sure that one of them is to do more with and expect more from your membership in our TAI family.





Sim Shalom is blessed with a very active and vibrant youth group. During the year it meets monthly with the Rabbi to discuss various ethical issues from a Jewish point of view, as well as putting on an annual Purim Spiel for the congregation. But being young people, sometimes they just want to have fun. Inspired and encouraged by the visits from the British Netzer youth group to Budapest, they decided to have a similar experience for themselves. So last summer, ten of them, accompanied by their leader, Kati Gyarfas and Rabbi Katalin Kelemen, went to London for six days. Staying in a conveniently located youth hostel near Regents Park, they saw lots of the major sights such as the Houses of Parliament, Big Ben, the London Eye, the Globe Theater and Trafalgar Square. A visit to the British Museum was one of the highlights of the trip when our own Rabbi in training, Peter Radvanski, showed them the wonderful offerings of the museum on the ancient history of the Jews in Egypt and Israel. And they didn't stint on their religious experiences since they visited the two largest synagogues of the British Reform/Liberal movement which compare favorably with our own Dohany Synagogue in Budapest in their grandeur and decoration

There are many excellent photographers in the group, and they took lots of photos. This particular one is not yet posted, but you can see some of their previous work in Budapest and the Hungarian countryside if you go to our website, www.simshalom.org, click on Gallery, and then look at the video and at the Youth Group Photo Exhibition 2010. Our first cultural program of the fall season was a presentation of their photos illustrating their individual impressions from this visit to London. #### THE PRESIDENT'S NOTE

As I am writing this column, thousands of runners in twelve-person teams are running in the Bourbon Chase, a two hundred mile overnight round-the-clock relay race in central Kentucky. During the overnight relay, each runner runs three legs, totaling about 18 miles for the entire race. Last year, I was a participant; unfortunately, because this year's race falls on Yom Kippur, I have had to exchange one form of 'cleansing the mind' (as Rabbi Marc has put it) for another.

Despite the aches and pains, these team adventure running events have become extremely popular. Why? While it might be because of the complimentary bourbon at the end of the race, in truth, there is not that much bourbon to warrant the exertion, and in any case, there are easier ways to enjoy a glass. What the Bourbon Chase and other overnight team relays offer is something far more significant: the chance for otherwise solitary athletes to join together in a team-effort in exceptionally challenging conditions to achieve something as a group that is far greater than what they can accomplish as individuals.

What does any of this have to do with Temple life? Quite a lot, I think. While all of us have our own reasons for joining the Temple, ultimately we do so because we have our personal objectives, be they spiritual, social, cultural, or educational, we wish to achieve, but which can only be accomplished as part of a greater community. Unlike the goals of the Bourbon Chase participants, however, (how fast can we finish? CAN we finish?), the Temple represents something much more profound and long-lasting: the continuation and development of a people over thousands of years, building relationships to make for better communities and to enrich us spiritually, individually and communally. Think of the programs and offerings that TAI sponsors: religious school for our youth and the youth activities of the TRYB, caring connections to help congregants in need, social action programs for God's Pantry, Ashland Elementary, and many other forms of community outreach, the fellowship and good works provided by the Brotherhood and Sisterhood, opportunities for adult growth, musicians and scholars-in-residence, the rabbinic intern program, and an increasing number of ways to engage in worship, spirituality, and Torah study.

What makes our programs and our Temple successful is the sum of our individual efforts. A recent dramatic and stirring example was the Temple's response to the anonymous donor challenge to raise \$15,000 to eliminate our budget deficit for this fiscal year. I continue to be amazed and inspired by the devotion and love demonstrated by you, the congregation, for the Temple as we together met this challenge in just a few weeks! Imagine this unified effort used to enhance other Temple programs or to meet community needs. What couldn't we achieve?!



#### FROM RABBI MARC KLINE

""Summertime and the living is easy ..." I love the summer; the air is warm, the outdoor activity flourishes, and the children are all outdoors playing. There is only one thing wrong as I write this piece; it is not summer. It is not summer, and as we witness the dead of winter's arrival, much of the activity outdoors is because of

the homeless people who need to stay warm and active, who create their warmth by the fires they light in trash barrels around which they gather. This is not easy living. In Lexington, we do not see as much of this as can be found in many other communities, but it does exist here and there are people in tremendous need. These are people who range from every social and educational spectrum. These are people who have lost jobs and homes. Some of these people are mentally ill and others devastated emotionally.

For most of us who will sit in warm houses and look outside at the cold, we need to be thankful for the gifts and blessings that we enjoy, and not take them for granted. In the commercialization of the winter holidays and season, it becomes all too easy to forget that for many, the most precious holiday gift they could receive is an offer of help, a warm meal, opportunity for shelter, and hope for a future. Every day, we say a prayer at the beginning of our liturgy that reminds us to take stock of the miracle of being. It is a prayer that makes us be intentional about the opening and closing of our veins, arteries, bowels ... the miraculous and renewing functions upon which our health depends. At the very beginning of each day, we must, if we recite this prayer, take stock of our physical resources, and vicarious to this investigation, the surroundings in which we get to live our lives. This is a prayer that allows those with or without disabilities to pay attention to what we have, not what is missing.

Barukh Atah Adonai, Elohaenu Melekh Haolam, asher yatzar et haadam b'khokhmah, uverah vo n'kavim n'kavim, khalulim khalulim, galooie v'yaduah lifnae khisae khvodekha shehim yipateakh ekhad mayhem, oh yisataem ekhad mayhem. Ee ephshar l'hitkayaem, v'laamode lefanekha. Barukh Atah Adonai, Rofaeh khol basar oomafli, laasot.

(Praised is the Eternal God who creates us with wisdom, making within us the many veins, arteries, and networks that flow and that help maintain the separation between the clean and the unclean, allowing us to stand before the throne of heaven.)

If we truly appreciate the miracle of living, we must share this message and its blessings with the world. This means that we must do what we can to help others who take stock of their lives and find them in need of even the basic dignities of life. Our tradition demands that we do the work of bringing light and healing into the world, not because it is a nice thing to do, rather because it is the only real way in which we can demonstrate that we accept and believe that life is holy. We need to do our part to make sure that people who are in such need feel more warmth from the light that we bring to their world, than from the burning garbage cans to which they must gather to keep from freezing. This will mean supporting shelters so that they can house more people. This will mean bringing a kettle of soup to Triangle and Phoenix Parks at night. This will mean gathering the children who sleep in the streets and helping them keep up with school (for those who still can attend) and helping to enhance their skills (for those who cannot). This will mean being creative in finding ways to do more than we have done before. But for good fortune, I am not amongst them. No one plans to be homeless. No one plans to lose their jobs and their homes. No one plans to lose all hope when these things happen. Ani v'atah, n'shaneh et ha-olam. It will take you and me, but we can change the world. May the holidays bring blessings and cause us to bring blessings to others.

## SIM SHALOM NEWS Volume Six #5 By Jesse Weil, from Budapest, Hungary

The Hungarian Church Laws changed last summer to the detriment of Sim Shalom. We lost our registration as a religious organization and with it some substantial financial benefits.

This hastily passed and carelessly written law is now being disputed and will be voted on again, apparently due to some strong lobbying from sources outside of Hungary. We've been told that our name is once again on the list of registered congregations (along with Catholics, some major Protestant groups and some other Jewish organizations).

The Hungarian government would like to end the corrupt domination of the Neolog Jewish movement, which has refused to accept Sim Shalom because we are too reformed and have a woman rabbi, and disburse moneys under their control in a more equitable manner. If the government is successful, Sim Shalom will receive much greater funding from the Restitution Assets fund. It would mean that we could save enough money in a few years to buy our present synagogue building, for which we now pay exorbitant rent.

But this is not the only thing going on with Sim Shalom. In 2006, there was a split in the congregation and about 25-30% of the members left and formed a new synagogue called Bet Orim. Ever since then, it has been a strong priority of the World Union for Progressive Judaism (WUPJ), which supports both congregations, that they should either reunite or form an umbrella organization to represent the interests of Reform Judaism to the government and other more conservative parts of the Hungarian Jewish community.

Even though we're now on their "accepted" list under the proposed revised law, the Hungarian government is not prepared to accept two small congregations. The drafters of the law think that it would accept a single umbrella organization. This happens to be the WUPJ's goal, too.

Unfortunately, it would mean some long, legal complications as well as trying to bring together two incompatible groups and losing our independence. We feel that our chances that Reform Judaism continue to be recognized officially are much better if we are not part of an umbrella organization.

For the present we have decided to continue with our name on the approved list and hope that we are not removed. We will also do all in our power to see that Bet Orim gets recognized. Government officials and lawyers have recommended a legal procedure that will allow us to to give them assistance in meeting the new requirements.

The presidents of WUPJ and its European subsidiary will lobby Hungarian government officials to recognize Reform Judaism again. Also, they will continue to put pressure on Sim Shalom and Bet Orim to re-unite. Wish us good luck for success.

#### THE PRESIDENT'S NOTE

This time of year is always exciting, if challenging. It is the "Holiday Season", and even if we celebrate only Chanukah, we still cannot avoid the rhythms of the broader culture, be it Christian or secular. For those of us in interfaith families, there are, of course, Christmas celebrations, while in the secular world it seems like every institution feels the need to have some kind of end of year party. And of course, end of year deadlines for many businesses and schools only add to the frenzy. The result is that we all feel rushed, pressured, and unable to enjoy the festivities in the way that we should.

While what I'm about to say is a cliché, it remains no less true: it is important to remember why we are celebrating these holidays and attending these parties in the first place. Chanukah, of course, has many meanings. For some, it is statement of freedom and justice. For others, it symbolizes the reaffirmation of Jewish identity in a non-Jewish world. I particularly look forward to the nightly lighting of the candles and the special night when Karen and I fry up the latkes, which the children tactfully (if not exactly honestly) proclaim to be the best in the world. In short, it's about declaring that there is sacred time for family, friends, and community, and for sharing each other's company in the warmth of the candlelight. Unfortunately—and ironically—the craziness of the season and the demands on our time and energy work against this notion of sacred time.

My personal vow this year is to try to establish this sacred time and not to let the hullabaloo get to me. In other words, I am going to try to stop and smell the latkes! (this is unavoidable if you've spent the evening frying latkes, but you know what I mean). No doubt this will be a challenging endeavor, but I'm going to give it a try nonetheless. May we all have a meaningful and fulfilling Chanukah and a happy and healthy New Year.

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
