UPDATE ON WAYS TO SUPPORT THE TEMPLE WHILE JUST DOING WHAT YOU NORMALLY DO: NOTE INCREASING FIGURES

1) Buy groceries at Kroger's with Kroger Gift Cards. We have received \$3,060.34 from Kroger scrip since May 1, 2013.

Here's how it works: Get your Kroger Gift Card at the Temple from John McDonald. Cards can be charged with up to \$500 at any Kroger Customer Service counter or cash register using cash, check, or credit card. TAI receives 4% immediately. After that, buy your groceries, prescriptions, and gas, and then reload it as needed. (Hint: If you reload your Kroger scrip card with your airline points charge card, you get the benefit of accruing your airline points, as well. Such saychel!)

2) Shop at Amazon.com. We've received \$247.27 since May 1, 2013.

Here's how it works: First, go to the TAI Website (www.lextai.org). Next, hit the "Donate" tab on the left-hand side (or just hit this link here: http://www.amazon.com/?encoding=UTF8&tag=temadaisr-20).

This will take you to a page with a link to Amazon.com. When you shop and buy from Amazon USING THE TEMPLE LINK, TAI receives 4% percent of your total purchase amount.

3) Recycle and the Temple earns cash. We receive \$20 credit to spend at Staples each month from cartridges recycled.

We continue to collect old inkjet and laser cartridges. There is a drop-off box in the Temple office. The Temple will receive \$20 a month in Staples coupons for each 10 cartridges that we recycle on a monthly basis. There is no cost to the Temple and it helps the environment. All cartridges are accepted. Thanks to all who continue to donate. Keep them coming and help TAI continue to profit. Staples credits are used for office and religious school supplies.

4) Getting rid of your old car? Donate it to the Temple and take a tax break! Contact John McDonald to find out how.

Appointments are recommended but not mandatory. Call Bruce Engel at 252-3734.



ANNUAL FOOD DRIVE

Every year, we celebrate our own renewal as we welcome the High Holy Days. We are blessed to have all that we have, and use this time to check in with ourselves to make sure that we appreciate these blessings. Every year, we make sure that we share these blessings with others. We are entering our annual "GOD'S PANTRY" gathering of food. The need is only growing, and there are many who work 40 hours a week, but still live below poverty levels. The barrels will multiply in our foyer through the end of Sukkot, so that there will be plenty of room to collect all that we bring. We hit the 3000 pound benchmark every year, but this year, let's strive for a full 2 tons. You will receive shopping bags during the holidays ... fill them up ... several times! If we consider that the average human consumes between 4 and 5 pounds of food a day, 3000 pounds of food sustains 100 people for less than two weeks. Let's be thankful enough to help others be thankful, as well.

On August 2nd, Beate Popkin, president of the local chapter of "The Wild Ones", spoke after services in the library on The Four Reasons Why We Should Garden With Native Plants. For those who were unable to attend this very illuminating talk, her main four points were as follows:

Native plants are very beautiful and add color and variety to what might otherwise be a more restrictive looking landscape.

Native plants are adapted to our climate and can handle the changes in temperature and moisture without needing a lot of care.

Native plants have evolved over millennia with our native fauna and therefore provide food and shelter for them. This is important because our modern neighborhoods have largely eliminated habitat environments for native fauna, especially pollinators. Without pollinators we would not have food (remember honey bees are not native to America and may be becoming endangered right now)

Native plants help keep the non-native invasives at bay. Non-native plants do not have natural controls to restrict their growth, so over time they take over an environment and keep spreading as birds carry their seeds from one place to another. Pollinators do not proliferate in their presence because they have not adapted over millions of years to the non-native

characteristics

Some undesirable non-native plants in our area are ornamental pear trees, burning bush, honeysuckle, winter creeper and Japanese Siltgrass. Local sources for native plants are: Shooting Star Nursery, 160 Soards Rd., Georgetown; Springhouse Gardens, 6041 Harrodsburg Rd., Nicholasville; Michler's Florist, 417 E Maxwell St., Lexington. An excellent book on this subject is Bringing Nature Home by Douglas Tallamy.

A MESSAGE FROM RABBI ARIEL NEVAH

Last semester, as part of a class teaching *Mussar*, which loosely translates to 'ethics,' our professor tasked us with writing ethical wills to our hypothetical children imparting upon them the values, ideologies and lessons that we found the most important. While this may seem a tad morbid, as it presupposes that we have already died – even before many of us (including myself) have had children – it gave me an opportunity to explore the values to which I hold fast; the ones most worthy of being shared with the next generation. As such, I came upon a quote that shaped my project, from a somewhat unlikely source: The Rav Abraham Isaac Kook, the spiritual father of the Religious Zionist movement. While Rav Kook and I don't always see eye to eye on most issues, his statement that "there is no such thing as the unholy, only the holy and the not-yet holy" really speaks to me.

This perspective allows for people – in fact it charges people – to connect to the world as if every opportunity for interaction is sacred, creating a certain level of mindfulness of the world around us, and subsequently an imperative to act according to that mindfulness. Seeing the holiness in people helps to break down artificially created barriers and walls between each other, decreasing unnecessary ignorance and bias; seeing the holiness in the world around us impels us to true environmental stewardship, making sure the world we leave to our children is better than the one we inherited. Most importantly, this perspective shows us that our conversations with God must be both horizontal and vertical: that holiness can be attained in many ways outside of just prayer.

As your rabbinical intern, I hope to help you find the holiness in our interactions together, in your interactions with each other, and in your interactions with the world around you. I most look forward to learning with you, laughing with you, worshipping with you — and growing with you as a nascent Jewish leader. As you may have heard, I have a particular passion and penchant for expressing my Judaism through social justice work, so I am excited to help the work that your community is already doing, and am seriously impressed with what I have already seen. May we start this New Year ready and willing to take on the holy tasks ahead of us, and may it indeed be a sweet year for us all.

FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK Judy Engelberg, President



For several weeks now, about a dozen or so people, under the leadership of Rabbi Kline, have been delving into Talmud, namely Pirke Avot. Pirke Avot, the Sayings or Wisdom of the Fathers, is the part of the Talmud which mainly deals with living a righteous and fulfilling life. It is the most studied and widely known part of the Talmud. Judah Goldin, author of The Living Talmud, explains Pirke Avot this way:

"Pirke Avot is a collection of maxims, sayings of the synagogue fathers of the Great Assembly (sometime between the latter half of the fifth and the third centuries BCE) down through the descendants of Rabbi Judah the Prince in the third century CE. These sayings came to be studied and commented on with the thoroughness which has always characterized the study of Talmud. That is to say, teachers and sages undertook to derive implications from these sayings and to make clear the permanent relevance of the teachings. In every generation Talmud students took up the text, commented on it, sentence by sentence, clause by clause, drew upon the interpretations of their predecessors and added something of their own."

Here are a couple of sayings from Pirke Avot:

Shammai taught: "Say little and do much".

Hillel taught: "Don't judge your fellowman until you are in his place . . . and don't say I will study when I have time, lest you never find the time".

Don't be intimated by the words "Talmud Study". We are using a modern text, easy to understand but challenging to our intellects. We dig into these sayings to get the meat out of them.

Come join us every other Saturday morning at 9 in the Temple library and add your own interpretation. The discussion is always lively and fun. Here are the dates for our October sessions. October 12 & 26. Please come, you won't regret it.



1) Buy groceries at Kroger's with Kroger Gift Cards. We have received \$3,778.17 from Kroger scrip since May 1, 2013

Here's how it works: Get your Kroger Gift Card at the Temple from John McDonald. Cards can be charged with up to \$500 at any Kroger Customer Service counter or cash register using cash, check, or credit card. TAI receives 4% immediately. After that, buy your groceries, prescriptions, and gas, and then reload it as needed. (Hint: If you reload your Kroger scrip card with your airline points charge card, you get the benefit of accruing your airline points, as well. Such saychel!)

2) Shop at Amazon.com. We've received \$416.88 since May 1, 2013.

Here's how it works: First, go to the TAI Website (www.lextai.org). Next, hit the "Donate" tab on the left-hand side (or just hit this link here: http://www.amazon.com/? encoding=UTF8&tag=temadaisr-20).

This will take you to a page with a link to Amazon.com. When you shop and buy from Amazon USING THE TEMPLE LINK, TAI receives 4% percent of your total purchase amount.

3) Recycle and the Temple earns cash. We receive \$20 credit to spend at Staples each month from cartridges recycled.

We continue to collect old inkjet and laser cartridges. There is a drop-off box in the Temple office. The Temple will receive \$20 a month in Staples coupons for each 10 cartridges that we recycle on a monthly basis. There is no cost to the Temple and it helps the environment. GREEN TEAM NEWS

From Ten Jewish Teachings on Judaism and Environmentalism by Rabbi Lawrence Troster: 1. God created the universe.

This is the most fundamental concept of Judaism. Its implications are that only God has absolute ownership over Creation (Gen. 1-2, Psalm 24:1, I Chron. 29:10-16). Thus Judaism's worldview is theocentric not anthropocentric. The environmental implications are that humans must realize that they do not have unrestricted freedom to misuse Creation, as it does not belong to them. Everything we won, everything we use ultimately belongs to God. Even our own selves belong to God. As a prayer in the High Holiday liturgy proclaims, "The soul is Yours and the body is your handiwork." As we are "sojourners with You, mere transients like our ancestors; our days on earth are like a shadow..." (I Chronicles 29:15), we must always consider our use of Creation with a view to the larger good in both time (responsibility to future generations) and space (others on this world). We must also think beyond our own species to that of all Creation.





A MESSAGE FROM THE RABBI

While I never thought I would eat latkes for Thanksgiving, I find myself stuck with this really weird craving now. Yes, Hanukkah is coming really early this year. Yes, it means we have to get our shopping done early, but more poignantly, and really wonderfully, I think that we have an opportunity to celebrate the holiday in its greatest sense of authenticity. Every year we get caught up trying to keep up with Christmas, and the holiday ends up being as watered down for Jews, as Christmas is for Christians. Both end up being more about the presents and the parties than about any miracle of dedication or enlightenment.

This year, we get to celebrate our holiday of dedication on a different holiday, set aside solely for the purpose of dedication. Thanksgiving is itself, a Jewish holiday. Most authorities claim that it is fashioned after the eight day fall harvest festival of Sukkot, during which the Messianic Age is supposed to bring peace to the world. I know, Thanksgiving has become more about over-eating turkey while watching football and parades, preparing to run through the malls for "Black Friday" shopping. It does not have to be, though. Perhaps we have an opportunity to change - even redeem - both holidays this year.

Hanukkah is the holiday of rededication. Yes, there is a story about oil that attaches itself to the holiday centuries after the fact, but the essence of the day revolves around staring over and renewing ourselves. We are called on to give gifts not to keep up with our neighbors or to line the pockets of merchandisers. We are supposed to share the gifts of our hearts and souls with each other. Where we have strained relationships, this holiday can give us the impetus to make them whole. Even taking Thanksgiving out of its Biblical origins, it too is a day where people set aside the attitudes that separated them in order to find some common ground.

So, here is the challenge: even while we are observing the "Americanized" holidays coincident, commit to spending some time and energy on each of our eight days of festival to heal past relationships, to forge new ones, to ensure that those you love know how you feel, and adding at least one new person into your life. For at least the night of Thanksgiving, commit to giving gifts that come from your heart and not from your wallet. May we have a great "Thanksanukkah," "Khanugiving," or as I heard it today, "Thanksgivingkah," and in the spirit of Sukkot, may we do the work of healing and restoring our world.

Thanksgiving—A Link to Torah

The holiday of Thanksgiving will be celebrated on Thursday, November 28th. As everyone knows, the holiday started in November 1621, in the Plymouth Colony when the Pilgrims and several Indian tribes shared a harvest/autumn feast. The Thanksgiving holiday has been celebrated in the United States for almost four hundred years. During the Civil War, President Lincoln proclaimed a national Thanksgiving day to be held in November.

The Pilgrims suffered during their delayed sailing from England and arrival in New England. Because of severe storms at sea, late arrival in the new world, they couldn't plant crops. They suffered through a harsh New England winter, living aboard ship with dwindling supplies. In the spring of 1621, they made friends with the Indians, who helped the Pilgrims establish their settlement, taught the settlers to cultivate corn, extract sap from maple trees, catch fish, and avoid poisonous plants.

The Pilgrims were devoted to Bible study. After their first corn harvest proved successful and mindful of biblical feasts of thanksgiving to God, they organized a celebratory feast of their own. The Indian tribes wee also invited to participate. The Indians brought five deer.

The Thanksgiving holiday is very familiar to the first night of Sukkot, one of three Biblically mandated festivals during which the Israelites lived in booths for seven days and feasted on the harvest, as commanded in Leviticus 23:34-44. God instructed Moses to have the Israelites to construct and live in the booths, like when they were brought out of slavery in Egypt into the wilderness. Similarly, the Pilgrims fled religious slavery in England to establish religious freedom in the wilderness and forests of the new world.

In Lexington, congregants from Temple Adath Israel join with congregants from other denominations to celebrate Thanksgiving with an inter-faith service.

This year the service will be held at TAI on November 27 at 7 PM. In addition to the interfaith service, we will have the pleasure of the community joining us when we light our first candle for Hanukkah.

UPDATE ON WAYS TO SUPPORT THE TEMPLE WHILE JUST DOING WHAT YOU NORMALLY DO: NOTE INCREASING FIGURES

1) Buy groceries at Kroger's with Kroger Gift Cards. We have received \$4,432.18 from Kroger scrip since May 1, 2013.

Here's how it works: Get your Kroger Gift Card at the Temple from John McDonald. Cards can be charged with up to \$500 at any Kroger Customer Service counter or cash register using cash, check, or credit card. TAI receives 4% immediately. After that, buy your groceries, prescriptions, and gas, and then reload it as needed. (Hint: If you reload your Kroger scrip card with your airline points charge card, you get the benefit of accruing your airline points, as well. Such saychel!)

2) Shop at $\underline{\text{Amazon.com}}.$ We've received \$416.88 since May 1, 2013.

Here's how it works: First, go to the TAI Website (www.lextai.org). In two places on any page on the website (top and bottom) you'll find an Amazon icon. Click on the icon and this will take you to Amazon.com. When you shop and buy from Amazon USING THE TEMPLE LINK, TAI receives 4% percent of your total purchase amount.

3) Recycle and the Temple earns cash. We receive \$20 credit to spend at Quill each month from cartridges recycled.

We continue to collect old inkjet and laser cartridges. There is a drop-off box in the Temple office. The Temple will receive \$20 a month in Quill credit for each 10 cartridges that we recycle on a monthly basis. There is no cost to the Temple and it helps the environment. All cartridges are accepted. Thanks to all who continue to donate. Keep them coming and help TAI continue to profit. Quill credits are used for office and religious school supplies.

IMPORTANT "911" SERVICE EXPANSION IN LEXINGTON, JESSAMINE COUNTY & THREE OTHER KY COMMUNITIES

Anyone can have an emergency and the Lexington 911 system has taken a giant step toward meeting the need for superior emergency responses by partnering with "Smart911" which is a free service to the public.

Previously, when citizens called 911, the Emergency Call Center automatically recognized the address of the caller but nothing more. Call Center dispatchers had to get other important information verbally and that wasn't always possible.

People who go to < http://www.smart911.com > can enter as much (or as little) information about themselves and their families as they wish. The information is secure; nobody but the citizen or the emergency responders can see it. When a call comes in from a number recognized by the Smart911 system the information is immediately displayed and responders arrive with a wealth of critical information they wouldn't otherwise have.

The information can include anything potentially critical in an emergency including, but by no means limited to:

HEALTH CONDITIONS
ESSENTIAL MEDICATIONS
PHOTOS OF THE OCCUPANTS

LOCATION OF HIDDEN DOOR KEYS AGGRESSIVE / NONAGGRESSIVE PETS LOCATIONS OF BEDROOMS

Smart911 isn't just a matter affecting the elderly and infirm. Anybody can have an emergency; Heart attacks, injuries, life threatening situations of any sort can strike anytime, anywhere affecting people of all ages. Children go missing, there are fires, medical emergencies, and accidents at home... The list goes on

In circumstances like these, seconds count; all members of the community, their relations, friends, neighbors, and colleagues are strongly encouraged to go to < http://www.smart911.com > and register.

Smart911 is free, the information is secure, and it saves lives.

September 3, 2013 Board Briefs

The Board met September 3, 2013. Twenty-three members, staff, and guests were in attendance. Judy and Rabbi Marc wished us a Happy New Year and noted that this was a time to begin afresh. Judy asked us to be supportive of one another. Rabbi Marc reminded us that the new year is a time to begin afresh with thinking, planning, and programming, and that we're setting a new tone for the future. Judy noted that the new sanctuary sound system is up and running, though some more work will need to be done before Yom Kippur.

The following items were discussed:

—The new rabbinical intern, Ari Nevah, will be arriving shortly and giving a sermon on *Rosh Hashanah*.

—The owner of Big Ass Fans has offered to provide a fan for the sanctuary, if the Temple pays for installation and allows the company to use the Temple in its publicity materials.

—The board voted to accept the generous bequest of Jon and Sandy Adland's insurance policy, earmarked to support contemporary Jewish music.

—The ad hoc committee on insurance will continue to explore ways to provide health insurance to Temple staff.

—The board voted to set October 15 as the deadline for agreement on the rabbi's contract and to secure an ombudsman for negotiations.

—Charlie Crouch was approved as a new Temple member. Welcome, Charlie!

—The technology committee will work with the staff to back up office computers with Carbonite. The committee has provided the board with cost estimates and equipment required for offering live-streaming of services

—The *oneg* following the *Rosh Hashanah* service will be hosted by the board.

She encouraged 100 percent participation from both the sisterhood and the board. -- Joe Grobstein and Rick Greenberg discussed a new draft of a rabbi's discretionary fund policy. --Announcements included: 1) Amy Ogle, Union of Reform Judaism lay liaison, will be here October 16 to work with the board and the executive committee; 2) Tikva Meroz-Aharoni, professor of Hebrew literature at the Ashkelon extension of Bar-Ilan University, will present a talk titled "Story of a Place: Ashkelon 1967-Present following the October 18 oneg; 3) Camp Shalom went well, but Elissa Weinstein would like to see more volunteers; 4) Janet Taff has a new granddaughter, Emily Kate Robinson. Mazel tov, Janet! --The board adjourned at 8:15 and went into executive session to discuss personnel matters.

SIM SHALOM NEWS Vol. 2 #4

From Jesse Weil

The Rabbi's sermon at Rosh Hashanah was based on a tale from Rebbe Nachman of Bratslav, and it was so impressive, that many people were immediately saying "Skaya" when she finished, which is what one says here after a particularly fine reading of the Torah. Yom Kippur was celebrated in our usual fashion, services on Kol Nidre Eve and the next morning, followed by two study sessions in the afternoon, a short memorial and closing service, and a very well prepared Break Fast. Our congregants are slowly learning how to make this a real feast, having never grown up with this tradition, as non-practicing Jews.

We repeated for the third time our Sukkot-in-the-Park celebration for our own members and the inhabitants of the modern Jewish neighbourhood near the Danube. We erected a large sukkah seating about 40 people in St. Istvan Park, and there were programs every evening and during the day on the weekend. Every evening started with the lulav and etrog ceremony, and singing of the Hallel psalms. After that there were either services, or lecture/ interviews with eminent people (an ecologist and a theologian/philosopher), or music or movies. But one of the most popular and successful programs was for families with pre-school children, of which there are many in the St. Istvan Park area. This was financed by a generous donation from an American supporter, who wanted to honor the birthday of her grandson. Zsuzsana Gyenes and Kristina Szmirnov are Jewish professionals at telling tales to small children and engaging them in simple arts and crafts. They held over 20 youngsters spellbound with the stories they told, and the chance to make and decorate things was also very popular.

Then on Simchat Torah, Sim Shalom hosted the kindergarten class of the Lauder Jewish Day School, who came to participate in the Torah dancing that is always part of our celebration. The children were delighted to participate in the dancing, and also enthusiastic about the hard candies that were being thrown around. But it was the parents who were most impressed by the warmth and openness of our celebration. They'd been received so strictly and negatively in previous years when they visited the synagogues of the Neolog and Orthodox movements, that they and their children were quite turned off from any further attempts

at synagogue participation. So we're hoping that some of them will be encouraged to try again with us. If we can find the needed funding, we plan to offer monthly programs for families with young children given by Gyenes and Smirnov. And if successful, we'll need to figure out how to send some of our maturing young people to workshops on teaching in a religious school.



A HANUKKAH GLOSSARY

HANUKKAH - A Hebrew word meaning "dedication". When the Jews had sent the Syrians down to final defeat, their first act was to cleanse the Temple in Jerusalem and remove the various pagan symbols and idols from it. They then held a ceremony dedicating the Temple once again to God. The holiday derives its name from the ceremony.

JUDAH MACCABEE - The name comes from the first letters of the Hebrew prayer Mi Kamocha Ba-elim Adonai ("Who is like Thee, O Lord!") inscribed on the Maccabean battle banner. Another reason that Judah was called the Maccabee is that he struck with the force of a mighty hammer. The Hebrew word for hammer is "makay". Judah became known as "The Hammer" or The Maccabee

MACCABEES - Hebrew soldiers who fought the Syrians. Named after their leader, Judah the Maccabee.

MENORAH - Hanukkah candle holder. Contains places for 8 candles and a 9th candle, the shamus, is raised above the others. Each of the 8 candles represents one of the 8 days of Hanukkah.

DREIDEL - A four-sided top used on Hanukkah. Each side has a different Hebrew letter: nun, gimmel, hay, and shin. This stands for "Nes gadol ha-ya sham" ("A great miracle happened there").

SHAMUS - Helper candle used to light all the other candles.

LATKES - Potato pancakes. Traditional Hanukkah delicacy.

MATTATHIAS the Hasmonean - Priest who started revolt against the Syrians. Father of Judah Maccabee.

EIGHT WAYS TO CELEBRATE HANUKKAH

Let the first night be BIG GIFT night. On this night the parents supply gifts to the children.

Let the second night be MOMMY night. On this night let the family honor and give gifts to the mother.

Let the third night be DADDY night. On this night let the family honor and give gifts to the father.

Let the fourth night be POEM night. Let each member of the family write or choose a favorite poem. Let the fifth night be SMALL GIFT night. On this night let each member of the family give a gift and get one.

Let the sixth night be a GIFT OF SELF night. On this night let each one promise to do something nice for the family.

Let the seventh night be WORD night.
On this night let each one find and teach the family a new word

Let the eighth night be GIFT OF GIVING night. On this night let each one give a gift to a favorite Tzedakah again throughout the world. After each victory, grateful men, women and children have dedicated themselves to their traditions and kept alive the remembrance of the struggle for religious freedom. As we celebrate the festival of Hanukkah, this year and every year, let us always give thanks for the freedom which our ancestors won so bravely. May we always treasure this precious possession, and ever seek to build a world in which all people may live in freedom and peace.

The candles are placed in the Hanukkah Menorah from right to left and kindled from left to right.

THE STORY OF HANUKKAH

After the death of Alexander the Great (323 B.C.E.) his Empire was divided into two smaller kingdoms - Egypt to the south and Syria to the north.

In the year 175 B.C.E. there arose a new king in Syria - Antiochus IV. He was a harsh ruler and treated all those whom he conquered cruelly.

Antiochus sent officers to the cities of Judea to proclaim, "The king has ordered all his kingdom to become one people and that everyone should forsake his own laws and his own religion." The king commanded the people to break the Sabbath and ignore the holy Jewish festivals. He instructed the Jews to ignore their prayers and religious practices. An idol was placed on the altar of God and incense burned in its honor.

The king's

officer came to the city of Modin and said to Mattathias, a priest who dwelt in Modin, "You are a great man and well-known in the city. Come and fulfill the king's command and you shall be counted among the king's friends." But Mattathias turned to the officer and answered in a loud voice, "Neither I or my sons nor any faithful Hebrews will ever worship an idol."

The Syrian officer called for another volunteer. When, in the sight of all the people, one of the Jews came forward to sacrifice to the idol, Mattathias was filled with anger, and struck him down.

Then Mattathias leaped to the top of the altar and shouted, "All those who are faithful to the Lord, follow me."

One of Mattathias' sons, Judah (called "The Maccabee"), became the commander-in-chief of the Hebrew army and led the people into battle. Never did people fight more bravely against such odds. Because they were dedicated to their religious heritage and to the principles for which it stood, they were filled with the courage and strength to achieve the final victory.

Judah, his brothers and all loyal Jews came to rededicate the Temple in Jerusalem. However, when the people gathered to celebrate the "rededication" the High Priest could find only one small jar of Holy oil with which to light the Ner Tamid (the Eternal Light). This was just enough oil to burn for one day. Then it was that a wondrous thing occurred. For the oil in the lamp burned for eight days!

In remembrance of this great occasion, Hanukkah - the Feast of Dedication - is observed every year for eight days, beginning with the twenty-fifty day of the month of Kislev.

Since the time of the Maccabees the battle for religious freedom has been fought over and over

As the Shamus (servant) candle is kindled, we say each day: As one candle may kindle many others and yet lose none of its own light, so Judaism has kindled the light of truth for many religions in many lands and still shines brightly through the eyes.

FIRST NIGHT - FREEDOM

We kindle these Hanukkah lights in memory of the dedication and courage of the Maccabees. Believing that they should be free to worship God as their hearts and minds dictated, they willingly gave their lives for freedom. Now, kindling these candles, we rededicate ourselves to work for the equal rights of all people, and for the realization of a society of democracy and freedom.

SECOND NIGHT - FAMILY

Tonight as we celebrate Hanukkah together we are conscious of our precious gift of family. So often we take one another for granted, forgetting to express our love and devotion. Let us, now, as we kindle these festive lights rededicate ourselves to sharing our interests and time with one another. Like the Maccabees of old, let us always face the tribulations and the joys of life united by our family bonds. Kindling these lights, we pray that through kindness and thoughtfulness, our love for one another will increase form strength to strength.

THIRD NIGHT - TORAH

On the third night of Hanukkah, we rededicate ourselves to the study of our tradition. As the Maccabees courageously fought to preserve our faith, we, too are duty-bound to sustain our heritage by deepening our understanding of it through study. By increasing our knowledge of Judaism we have become more sensitive to its abiding values, more aware of our responsibility to realize these values in our society. Study opens our minds and fortifies us against tyranny. Learning secures our freedom. Let us, then, as we kindle these candles rededicate ourselves to the study of our tradition.

FOURTH NIGHT - HOPE

Our ancestors have taught us that in hope a person's future is illumined and made creative. Ours are times when many people live in fear and great despair. Like the Maccabees, we need to build our lives on hope. Hope that ultimately, truth will triumph over superstition and confidence, that trust and understanding will finally depose superstition and tyranny. Now as we kindle these Hanuk-kah lights, may our eyes be directed to the loftiest visions of our faith.

FIFTH NIGHT - CHARITY

Our tradition tells us that during the Maccabean war for freedom, all Jews, both children and adults, contributed toward the cause of defeating the oppressor. There are many forms of oppression still existent in our world today. There are people afflicted by

sickness, hunger, ignorance and prejudice. Tonight we, like our ancestors, put aside gifts of Tzedakah in order that we, too, may help to bring an end to oppression. We pray that the humble gifts we offer will provide food for the hungry, medicine for the sick, knowledge for the ignorant, and equal opportunity for those afflicted by prejudice. Now as we kindle our Hanukkah lights, let us rededicate ourselves to the ideal of Tzedakah, righteousness and justice, found in our Jewish tradition.

SIXTH NIGHT - SHALOM

The candles of Hanukkah remind us of our chosen mission as Jews. Like the Maccabees we seek to rededicate ourselves to the service of God. Today one of our foremost tasks is to secure peace in our troubled world. When we end disagreements through mutual understanding, when we seek to mend hurt and wounded feelings, we make peace a living idea. Then let us, as we kindle our Hanukkah candles, rededicate ourselves with renewed strength to the task of securing peace.

SEVENTH NIGHT - BROTHERHOOD & SISTERHOOD

Brotherhood and Sisterhood is founded upon a total respect for the liberty and freedom of all people. The Maccabees of old sought to protect themselves when their rights were violated. Our Hanukkah lights serve as a reminder that peace is secure only when we honor the precious liberty and property of our fellow neighbor. As we kindle these lights, let us rededicate ourselves to the cause of peace which alone can bring dignity to all everywhere.

EIGHTH NIGHT - FAITH

Tonight we kindle all the candles of our Hanukkah Menorah. Throughout the centuries the Menorah has been a symbol of our Jewish faith. Like the Maccabees, when they celebrated this festive holiday, we rededicate ourselves to the living of a more meaningful Jewish life. We pray that throughout this coming year, we may fulfill the ideals of freedom, Tzedakah, family, study, hope, shalom, brotherhood and sisterhood, all of which are symbolized by the candles of our Menorah.




