to League meeting, and home

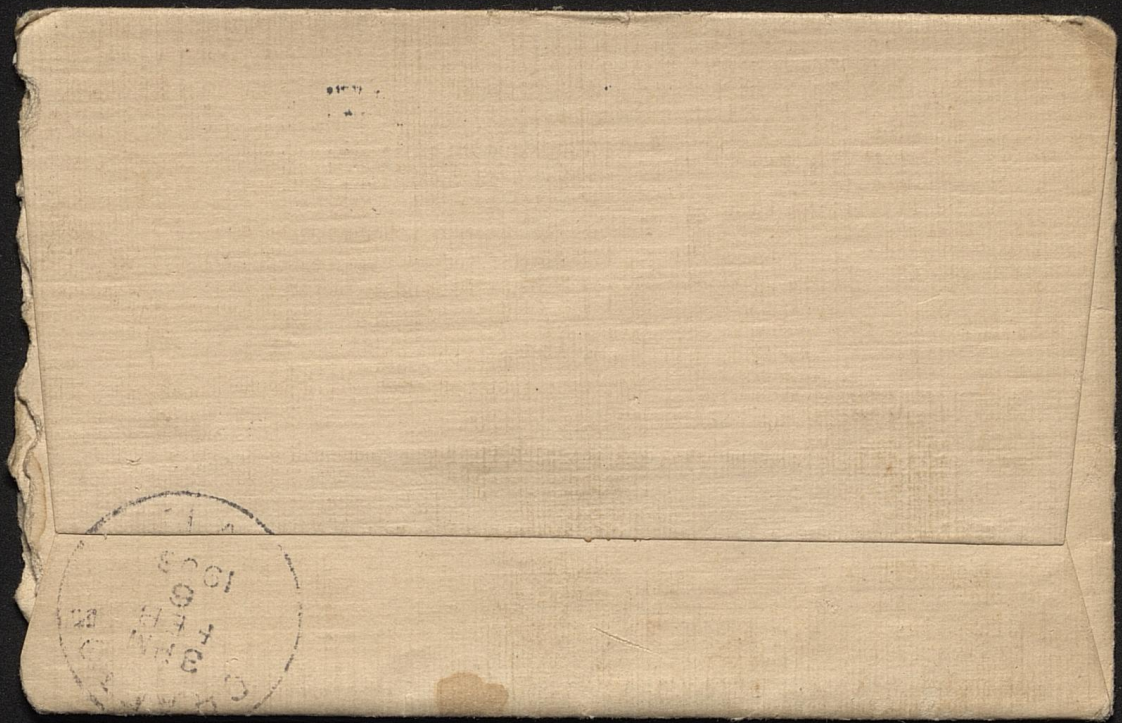

Nellie is pretty sick with them. I heard she was sick so went over there with Duke to see her and found out what was the trouble.

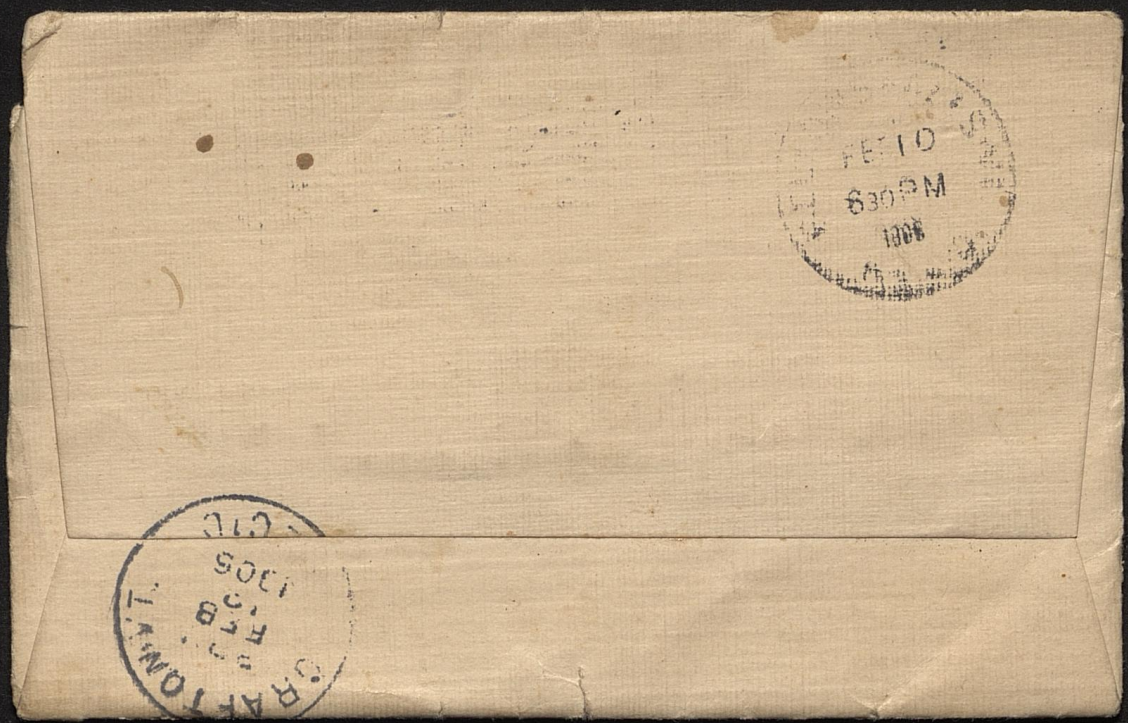

Monday, arent you? I hope so.

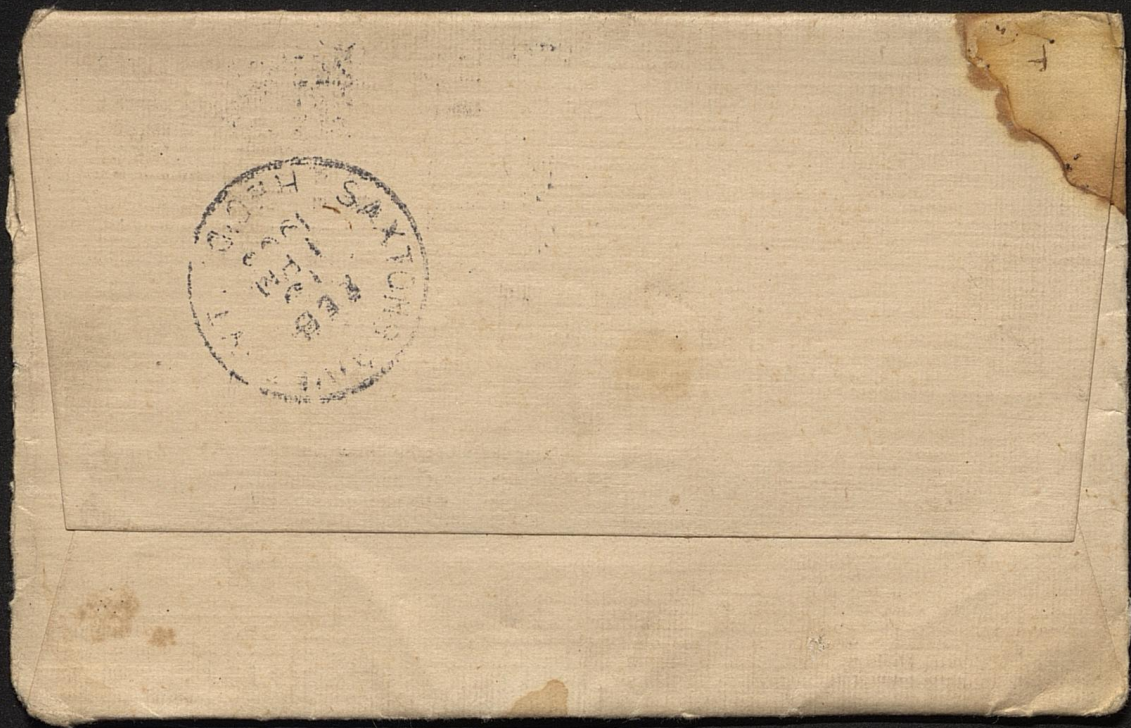

get your letter to ~~you~~ you right.

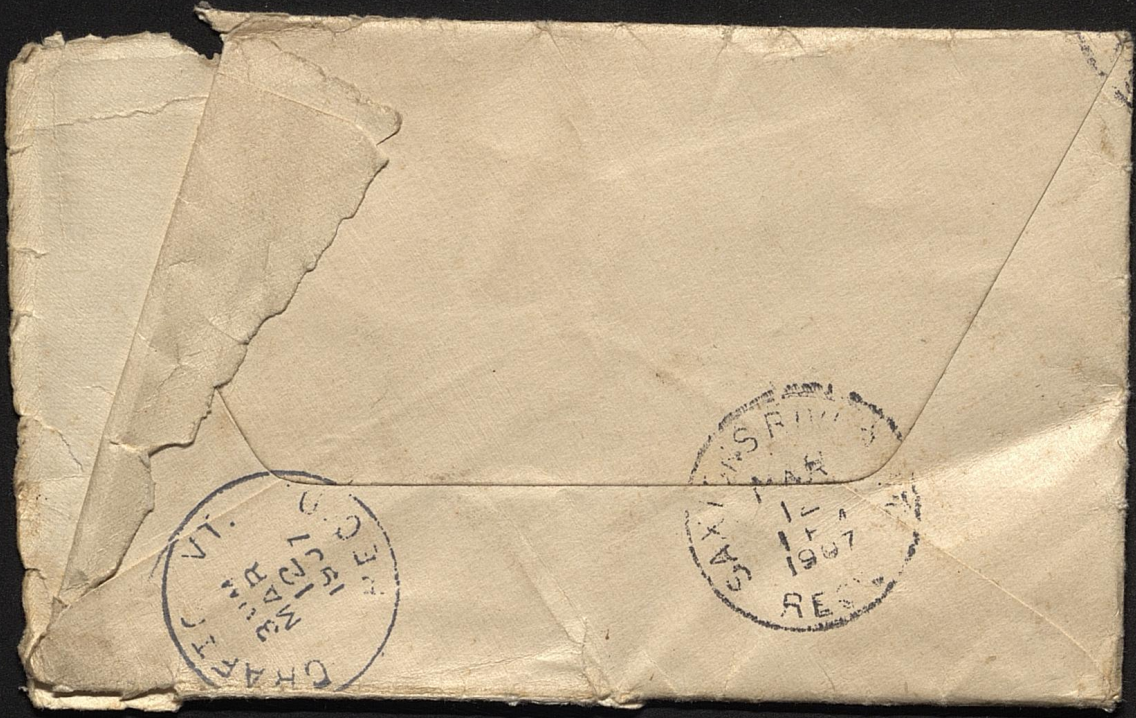

be asked to answer for some of them.

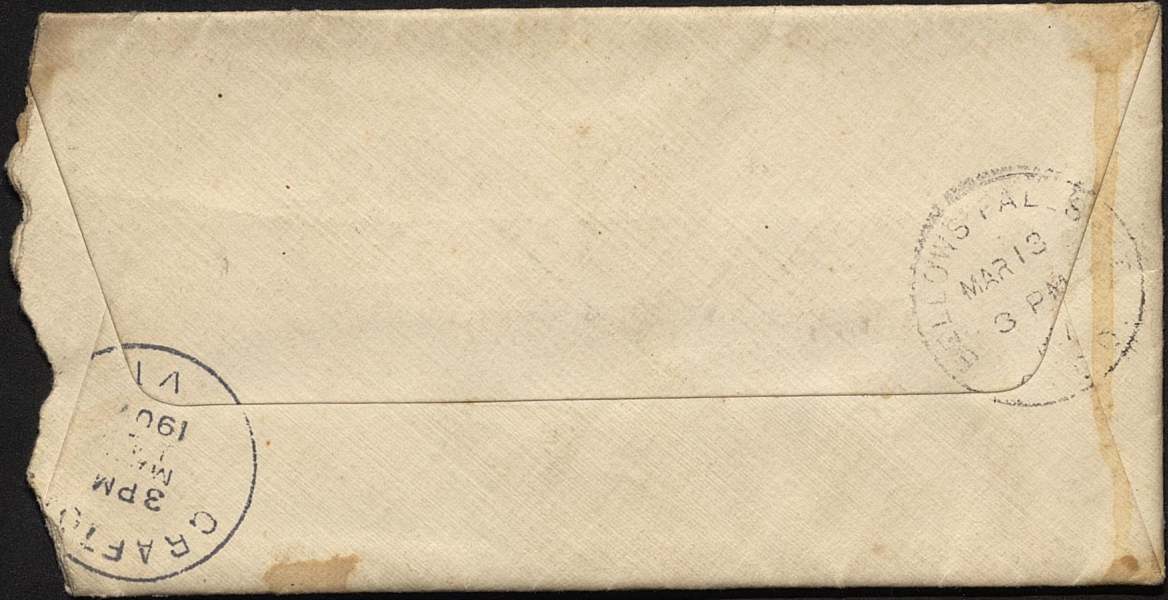
Probably you have got my letter

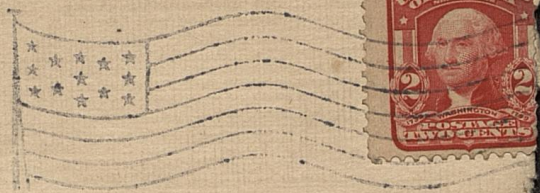
