

For far too long, all students, but especially LGBT students, have had to live their lives daily in fear of being taunted, harassed or harmed while trying to attend school. No longer will we stand for this intolerance and freedom to bully. Lexington Fairness is taking a stand to stop and/or prevent bullying in our schools with its Project Speak Out program. And you can help make it come to reality.

We hear consistent and constant stories of students being bullied for who they are, who they were born to be. And in too many cases (one is too many), we hear of suicides or suicide attempts from those bullied children who feel condemned. Students who feel they are no longer safe living as they are. Children who feel they need to look no further than to end their life in order to stop the pain of harassment and abuse. These stories are so heartbreaking and destructive to the diverse fabric of our nation. We can no longer sit on the sidelines and watch as children have to fight for themselves, deal with the hurtful words and actions of bullies and struggle to live in our society.

We know the bullies do this from learned behavior. No child learns how to bully without being ingrained with intolerance. The adults (parents, educators, family friends, celebrities, etc.) put forth notions of injustice and discrimination which the child sees as normal. With this normality, and possible lowered self-esteem and self worth, bullies are born. We already know it's hard to change the minds of an adult, but children can learn that right is right, discrimination is wrong and acceptance (not necessarily approval) is what makes our world peaceful and just.

With Lexington Fairness' Project Speak Out, we will bring nationally-renowned professional trainers to Central Kentucky. These trainers will help educate a core group of community volunteers, whether they are part of our LGBT community or not. There will be no restrictions on helping educate those who want to make a world of safe and secure schools for all students. From these volunteers, a grassroots training program will be instituted, visiting schools, holding forums for teachers and counselors, providing safe school resources to everyone who wants them. We are determined to provide AT LEAST, but hopefully many more, safe school allies in each and every school, giving all students, LGBT or not, the ability to feel they have an ally who will not tolerate bullying, discrimination and the disgrace so many of our children feel.

We hope you will join Lexington Fairness in bringing Project Speak Out to reality during the 2011-2012 and 2012-2013 school years. We will make a difference. We will provide allies to bring a safe and secure learning environment to our schools. We will help make the world a more just and fair place to live, no matter your sexual orientation or gender identity.

Your next event to attend to help bring Project Speak Out closer to reality is the October 15th To Die For: Get Your Just Desserts murder mystery. Being held at the Loudoun House, the Imperial Court of Kentucky is organizing this event to serve as a fundraiser for Project Speak Out, bringing us the ability to provide schools with the knowledge and resources they need to prevent our children from the fear of being who they were born to be.



Spiritual Disciplines By Pastor Karen Taylor, Contributor

We have been learning about spiritual disciplines the past several weeks at church. Discipline in general is not something we see a lot of in our society these days. As a society we are overweight (I'm right there with you on this one), we tend to do whatever we want whenever we want, most of us do not excise our bodies like we should (guilty as charged), and spiritually we neglect our privileges, rights, and responsibilities. "Ours is an undisciplined age. The old disciplines are breaking down. Above all, the discipline of divine grace is derided as legalism or is entirely unknown to a generation that is largely illiterate in the Scriptures. We need the rugged strength of Christian character that can come only from discipline." V. Raymond Edman.

There are many "disciplines" we could discuss but I would like to focus on three. One is Bible reading. I would say this is the most important and least exercised discipline. We need to know for ourselves what God has said, is saying, and the one sure way of doing that is reading, meditating, and memorizing His Word. Too many Christians are content to hear their preacher tell them what the Bible says and take it as truth without ever looking into it on their own. Matthew 4:4 "Man does not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God." 2 Timothy 3:16 "All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness." So shouldn't we be reading it? I read a story recently about a missionary who went to this very remote village to share the gospel. He found what was being called Christian churches, but what he was witnessing was not what he understood to be Christian behavior. There was lying, cheating, stealing, all manner of free sexual behavior, and more. He couldn't understand what was going on until he realized that no one, not even the pastors had a Bible. How are we to know what God's expectations are of us if we don't know Him and what He says?

Another discipline is worship. In my opinion this is a very misunderstood concept. The Bible Dictionary defines it as follows: "reverent devotion and allegiance pledged to God; the rituals or ceremonies by which this reverence is expressed". We express our worship of God through church attendance true, but also through giving of our time, money, support, etc, as well as how we live our lives. "The real duty of worship is not the outward duty to say or do the liturgy. It is the inward duty, the command - 'Delight yourself in the Lord!'". ("Spiritual Disciplines for the Christian Life" by Donald S. Whitney pg. 90) At Open Arms we used to simply put the offering plate on the center table and people put in their tithes and offerings whenever during the service, before, or after. Until I realized that tithing is actually a way to worship God. Now we have a specific time during the service to worship God through our giving.

The last discipline I would like to talk about is prayer. Prayer is simply communicating with God. Communication is a give and take thing. You talk and listen. What kind of a relationship would you have with another person if all you ever did was talk and never listen to what the other person had to say? Not much of one for sure. The Bible tells us to make our requests known to God, but it also says we must learn to be still enough to hear that still small voice of God. Colossians 4:2 "Devote yourselves to prayer." 1 Thessalonians 5:17 "Pray continually". You might be saying, "I don't know how to pray", and that's ok, the disciples didn't either. They asked Jesus to teach them to pray and He gave them what we know as The Lord's Prayer as a model. That prayer begins and ends in praise and thanksgiving. The heart of the prayer is asking for forgiveness as you have forgiven others, and then moves into petitioning God for your requests/needs. There is no right or wrong way to pray. It's a matter of the heart toward God. Getting to know Him better and feeling close to Him.

You can think of spiritual disciplines as you do physical exercise. You put the right things in, vegetables, protein, etc, and exercise to be in the best physical condition
