U. K. PROFESSOR GIVES REPORT

James W. Martin, of Commerce College, Attends Conference of National Tax Association in Atlanta

Prof. James W. Martin, director of the bureau of business research at the university, chairman of the national tax association committee on taxation on motor vehicle transportation will present the committee's report at the meeting of the national tax association at the Biltmore hotel in Atlanta, Ga., tonight.

The report dealt primarily with business taxation of motor vehicle enterprises of all classes. According to the report, the tax situation respecting motor bus and truck business—by common carrier, by contract and privately—is made difficult by the interstate commerce clause of the federal constitution. Any effort at fair taxation of interstate transportation must provide largely futile as long as present constitutional restrictions remain.

But realizing that it will be several years before such an amendment could possibly be adopted, the committee outlined a plan for the taxation of motor vehicle transportation business at the present time. As was pointed out, the report indicated that it is constitutionally impossible to impose a tax directly on the business of interstate motor vehicle carriers. While the Supreme Court has not yet decided on the tax imposed on interstate motor vehicle for the privilege of using the public highways of Connecticut on the basis of vehicle mileage, the committee expressed the belief that it would be expedient to employ this measure as it would induce the substitution of larger vehicles for those now in use. This would mean more wear and tear on the highways and less frequent repairs.

BOOK REVIEWS

THE ROMANCE OF LEONARDO DA VINCI By Dmitri Merejkowski (Random House Publishers, \$5.00)

One of the most exquisite volumes which has come from the hands this season is the Random House Edition of Merejkowski's Life of Leonardo da Vinci, translated from the Russian by Bernard Guibert Guernsey. Random House's edition is a masterpiece of rare and beautiful volumes, may always be relied upon for books which, by their sheer beauty of binding, and their accepted content are likely to endure the double opposition of time and obsolescence.

One more biography, this one manages to be as the same time highly technical, as well as thoroughly readable, though in no instance is history sacrificed for style, or accepted facts for the personal irrelevancies of the subject himself.

One feels instinctively that the writer understood the artist, but it cannot be said that his admiration is likely to run away with his firm tendency to report things as they were, and not as posterity would like to think that they occurred.

We see the man Leonardo clearly in his many roles of artist, chemist, astronomer and biologist, as one possessed of far greater talent, and more glaring weaknesses than have ever before been imagined. But there is no attempt to tear down his character for sensationalism, and no wish on the part of the author to point to the feet of clay of a brilliant, cultural hero.

Those who know and love art in all its forms have always ranked da Vinci among the greatest painters in art history; his Mona Lisa and 'The Lord's Supper' are known to everyone, and valued as highly as their sheer merit deserves, but few realize that he was the mathematician and inventor, first, the brilliant scientist, second, and the artist, third.

His writings and drawings, of which the author tells us there are three thousand unspecified manuscripts scattered in museums and libraries throughout France and Italy, show him to have been a mathematician and civil engineer of such remarkable ideas, that it is hard to conceive that he lived in the comparatively ignorant age of which he was so inconspicuously a part.

His whole personality is brought to light with such wisdom and sympathy, that we can readily understand his paradoxical precision and carelessness, his brilliancy and fits of apathy, and the other characteristics which made him so loved on one hand and so feared and despised on the other.

Perhaps the most beautiful part of the book is that chapter which deals with the one love of his life, Lisa Giocondia, in whose calm and unscrutable smile Leonardo found the way, as finely executed as the artist's own paintings. In short, the book is one which you will read again and again, both for its excellent information and cultural charm, and for the whimsical content of the story itself.

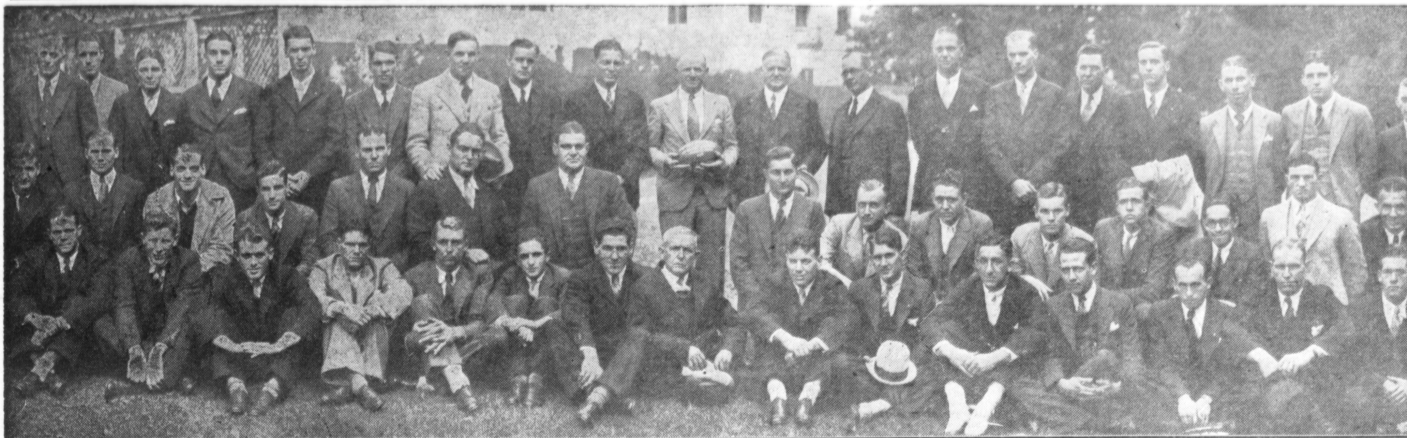

Dr. W. D. Funkhouser and Prof. W. S. Webb Spend Summer Investigating Archaeology of Kentucky

Dr. W. D. Funkhouser and Prof. W. S. Webb spent the summer procuring material for their forthcoming volume of the archaeological survey of the state. In procuring this data they traveled more than twenty-five hundred miles and visited 68 counties in Kentucky. The work consisted chiefly in surveying, mapping, and photographing prehistoric sites in various parts of the state and in obtaining information regarding various ancient mounds, fortifications, and village sites of the aboriginal inhabitants of the country.
