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## Wilder named Queen

Carrie Sterling Wilder's weekend was one of tears and happiness.

A unanimous vote of the Student Activities Board disqualified the communications senior from the Homecoming Royalty Court after she violated campaign rules.

Wilder, Delta Gamma social sorority nominee, was reinstated ten minutes before the Homecoming Parade Friday.

Perhaps the biggest surprise of her weekend came when she was named 1996 Homecoming Queen.

"All I can remember when they said it was everyone cheering and I was like 'Oh my God!' I didn't even expect it because with everything that had happened, I was just ready for the evening to be over with," Wilder said.

After being disqualified on Thursday evening, Wilder filed an appeal to SAB. Her appeal stated that SAB did not have a quorum when the meeting was called to order. A quorum consists of seven or more people.

Winn Stephens, SAB vice president, said the mistake was allowing the meeting to begin without a quorum.

acted improperly due to my mistake," Stephens said. SAB held a second meeting to rule on the complaint filed by Ceres women's social fraternity. Because the first meeting was ruled null and void, none of the discussions could be carried over to the second meeting.

"We needed to ensure if we could not find a violation (Wilder) could participate in the rest of the Homecoming activities," Stephens said. Ceres did not attend the meeting, but the group was not informed of the meeting. Based on testimony at the second meeting, the board could not find that a violation occurred. All the committee members changed their votes and decided to unanimously allow Wilder back into the Royalty competition.

## Cats offensive to UGA

After seven games of lethargic offense, UK put it all together in its win over Georgia.

The 24-17 Homecoming victory Saturday night was the Cats' first Southeastern Conference win this season, and their first win since they beat Indiana 3-0 Sept. 21 at Commonwealth. The last SEC win for UK came last October when it beat LSU 24-16.

It also was the Cats' first game since it was announced that Coach Bill Curry and his staff would not return next year.

"Kentucky played a lot better than I've seen them play," Georgia Coach Jim Donnan said. "We can make all the excuses we want, but Kentucky just whipped our butt whether we overlooked them or not."

The meager crowd of 34,000 who showed up on the overcast, yet comfortable night witnessed several season-highs for the Wildcats' offensive unit. The Cats (2-6 overall, 1-4 in the Southeastern Conference) gained 293 yards total offense—162 of it on the ground.

"We did enough to score points," Curry said. "The defense gave us the ball and we were able to do something with it."

The running of true freshman Derrick Logan was the highlight of the Cats' performance.

Logan, a 6-foot-2, 218-pound native of Chatham, Va., carried the ball a school-record 41 times for 140 yards.

It marked the first time a Wildcat topped the century mark in rushing since Moe Williams ran for 151 against Tennessee last year.

Logan also scored two touchdowns, one on the third play UK ran from scrimmage and one with 1:30 left in the third quarter, which turned out to be the winning margin.

"I ran hard," he said. "The line blocked extremely well and our passing game opened up the run."

"I can only expect the best out of myself," Logan said. "I wanted to come and do my best. I set high goals for myself so that I can reach them."

The quarterback situation cleared up somewhat, with Billy Jack Haskins getting all the snaps from center.

It was the first time since the Alabama game that Tim Couch did not get any playing time. In that situation, Couch developed tendonitis in his right elbow.

"We told Tim if the starter was hot, we would go with the starter," Curry said. "We told Billy Jack the same thing at LSU."

Haskins, a junior, made the most of the opportunity by continuing the success he had in the loss to LSU by throwing for 131 yards on 13-of-20 passing. He also ran 12 times for 28 yards and scored once with 11:49 left in the third quarter.

It was the sixth game of the season that Haskins has started this season over Couch, the only games he didn't was against Florida and LSU.

"Billy Jack Haskins showed that he was a winning quarterback," Curry said. "Billy Jack wasn't as accurate as he was at LSU, but he had a good performance."

Against the Tigers, Haskins was 13-of-17 for 172 yards.

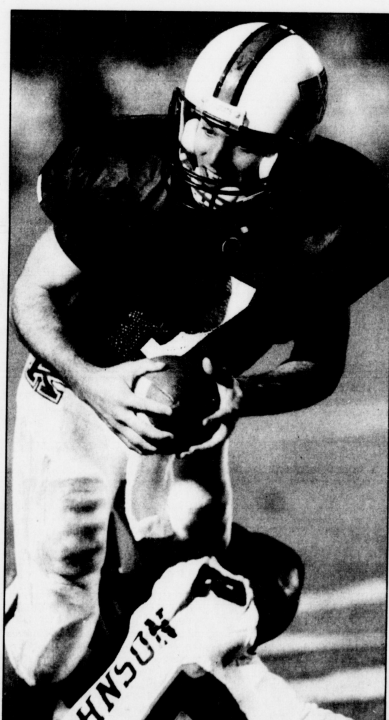
Much of the credit for the offensive improvements goes to the line, Haskins said.

"The offensive line has been playing really well the last two games and it has given us a lot more time with the ball," Haskins said. "It's really made a difference."

The improved line took a big hit, however, when sophomore tackle Jonas Liening went down with a broken ankle. He will be out for the season.

David De La Peralte, a freshman from Montreal, stepped in and took Liening's place at right tackle.

He will have an opportunity to ease into the position, as the Cats have an open date this week before playing host to Mississippi State on Nov. 9.

# Auburn tops Cats; UK downs Tide

Like Popeye without his spinach, the UK volleyball team takes a beating when they are without its version of the necessary element — team blocking.

The Cats, who rank 20th overall in NCAA team blocking, found life without front-line dominance to be painful as UK split a weekend series with Alabama and Auburn, moving their record to 10-14, with a 6-3 mark in Southeastern Conference play.

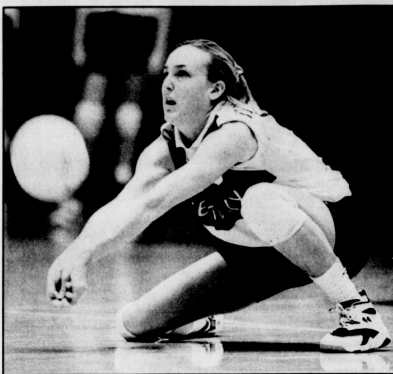
In Friday night's match with the lowly 3-22 Crimson Tide, UK sputtered early and looked dazed throughout the early stages of the match. Alabama won the first game, 15-6.

But the futility of the first game proved to be a wake-up call for the Cats, as they came alive and won the second game handily, 15-5. Despite a conspicuously low block tally for the Cats (only 9 team blocks for the match), UK was able to out-gun the Tide for a 3-1 victory.

UK assistant coach Julie Ibieta believes the young Alabama front line played a major role in the match.

"We came out flat and did not play well in the first game," Ibieta said. "Alabama's inexperience in the middle allowed us to set our (middle blockers) and they helped get us moving."

The UK middle blocker tandem of Jenny Muzzey and Tracy Thompson proved to be too much for UA, as they combined to hit 340 with 22 kills.

Though the Cats were able to roll the Tide with a satisfactory performance on Friday, UK locked up with a much stronger

Auburn squad yesterday playing the same brand of emotionless volleyball.

Things got ugly. The Tigers (15-8, 5-4) came out in a rage and blasted the Cats 15-6 in the first game. As if things couldn't get any worse, Auburn kept putting their offense in progressively higher gears, making the match more lopsided as time went on—the Tigers won, 15-6, 15-7, 15-5.

AU's middle blocker sensation Rani Whitson mangled Big Blue with perhaps the finest individual match of the SEC season, hitting an amazing .654 with 18 kills, seven digs and five blocks.

The Cats' recent affinity for unfocused play has Ibieta perplexed. "It's a concern that we played this poorly at this stage of the season," Ibieta said. "It's definitely disappointing. Rani (Whitson) played well and we needed our middle to be strong today. It didn't happen."

Muzzey agrees the team played poorly, but rejects the notion that middle blocking is the culprit for the team's problems.

"The key to this match was the difference in attitudes," Muzzey said. "They didn't let the balls drop and we did—that's all there is to it."

The Cats now look to regroup before hosting Georgia this weekend.

# Men tie up Eagles while women win

One UK team was successful at the new soccer stadium while one UK team couldn't score a goal.

First the bad. The play of UK's men's soccer team yesterday was almost sloppy at the field condition. The new soccer field divided to a mud pie, and UK floundered around without a single goal as they tied Eastern Michigan 0-0 in overtime.

It was the Wildcats' final Mid-American Conference game before the tournament Nov. 15-17. However, it didn't leave them much to build on.

"There were unbelievably easy chances that we just missed," UK Coach Ian Collins said.

The Cats managed 18 shots, including some close shots in the second half and overtime periods.

One of those shots was off the foot of Sean Mondelli in the first overtime period. Mondelli hit a shot that just barely missed going in. Instead, it hit the corner of the crossbar and went out. To him, it was just an example of what had happened all day.

"Just like the other ones I had, wide open," Mondelli said. "I just had an awful day."

As the second overtime period wound down, UK had one real chance. With 26 seconds left, Michael Sticker had a shot in front of the EMU goal off a pass from Sean Endicott. However, the shot was wide, and UK was left in a tie.

UK lost senior Toby McComas to an injury early in the game, and he is listed as day-to-day. He was injured in front of the goal, and was unable to return to the game.

The tie dropped UK to 7-6-3, 2-2-1 in the MAC. This leaves UK in third place going into the tournament, and they could very well draw EMU in the first round.

But unlike the men's team which has yet to win at the new stadium, the UK women's soccer team had success in their first game Friday.

Kim LaBelle's goal off a tip-in from a Beth Reynolds pass at 69:14 was the game winner as UK defeated Vanderbilt 2-1.

"We were very nervous to come out here and play," LaBelle said. "We all had the jitters but once we got into that rhythm, I felt that we played better than them."

A goal by Alison Rooney, coupled with LaBelle's gave UK their first ever win at their new soccer stadium, which still does not have a name.

This was the final weekend of conference play for the Cats. The win over Vandy and UK's win at LSU yesterday put the Cats in a tie for second place in the Southeastern Conference's East Division along with Georgia.

But because Georgia beat UK earlier in the season, the Cats will be the No. 3 seed out of the East Division for the SEC Tournament which takes place in two weeks in Lexington.

**Anderson's first goes a long way**

What a first kick for Tobin Anderson.

The junior college transfer from Riverside, Calif., put his leg into a 49-yard field goal, narrowly clearing the crossbar to give UK a 10-0 second quarter lead over Georgia on Saturday night at Commonwealth Stadium.

The Cats went on to beat the Bulldogs 24-17. It was Anderson's first field goal attempt as a Wildcat. He had handled the kick-offs for UK but replaced Brian Johnson on the long attempt because of his stronger leg.

"After I hit it," Anderson said, "I looked up and was thinking 'OK, perfect.' I knew I had plenty of power to make it from that distance."

"Then, all of the sudden, it seemed like that ball just got shot

in mid-air and it just started dying quick," he said. "But I was calm because I felt like I had put enough into it."

It wasn't the longest of his career; he hit a 50-yarder while at Riverside Community College.

**Sanford can catch too**

Junior wide receiver Kio Sanford finally ended his six-game catching drought in the second quarter against Georgia when he caught an 11-yard pass from Billy Jack Haskins.

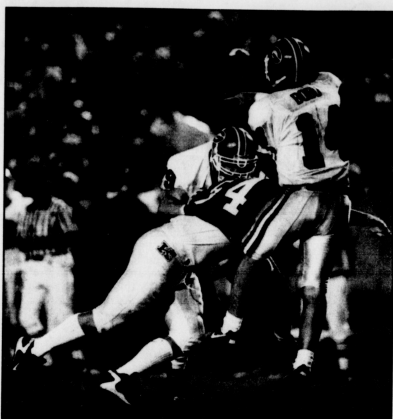
He finished with two catches for 29 yards against the 'Dawgs. It was the first game in which he caught a pass since the season-opener against Louisville, when he caught three for 22 yards.

**Sparse crowd**

The UK fans spoke volumes by not watching the Cats and Bulldogs play Saturday night.

An attendance of 34,000 showed up on the overcast night, making it the smallest crowd of the 1996 season. And what was even worse for UK, about 6-8,000 of the fans in attendance were wearing the colors of Georgia.

The crowd ranks as the third-smallest in the history of Commonwealth Stadium. The only

two games to draw fewer fans was last year's game against Cincinnati (25,231) and the Northeast Louisiana debacle in 1994 (32,000).

**Yet another sack by Ward**

Senior defensive end Chris Ward picked up yet another sack on Saturday night, the sixth consecutive game he has done so.

He leads the team in sacks on the season with six.

On the night, the Wildcats sacked Georgia quarterback Mike Bobo six times.

**UK Homecoming streak**

The 24-17 win marked the second consecutive Homecoming game UK has won. It defeated LSU 24-16 last year on Homecoming.

All told, the Cats are 39-12 in Homecoming games played since 1946.

**Firing the focus despite the win**

Trying to fend off the mixed emotions of his hollow win, the anger swelled in Bill Curry's reddened eyes after the third similar question was asked.

His Wildcats had just sewn up their biggest victory in three seasons of UK football, and all reporters wanted to know were the emotional effects of his firing.

A man whose life was turned upside down last week engineered a victory with a strong ground game, solid, opportunistic defense and a lack of turnovers—the same style of play battered by fans and media as out-of-date.

What he had preached to impatient supporters, administrators, detractors and players for years had worked.

And it worked with Billy Jack Haskins at the helm. Senior free safety Leman Boyd said that for the first time in three seasons, both the offense and defense showed up on the same Saturday.

The focus, however, remained on something uncontrollable which took the spotlight from Curry's boys in blue. So the loving and overprotective father that is Bill Curry choked off any outburst by politely asking that questions be geared toward the efforts of his players.

This is the nature of the man placed in the most unnatural position for any coach, a man who personifies everything that is great about collegiate athletics and a man who has the cleanest image in the UK stable.

He sat in the Wildcat Den fielding questions by the same people who rallied behind the decision to relieve him of his duties with his trademark stoic dignity.

He fought off the tears in his

soul until embracing senior linebacker Mike Schellenberger after Curry's radio show. His glossy eyes and scratchy voice was moving.

The Wildcat head coach molded 99 players into a family, but how did a coach with a sub-500 career record earn the respect and adoration of his players?

Simple down-to-earth honesty.

"I had the opportunity to go to some other schools, but when I met coach Curry, he was so sincere about my future not only while I was here but after my four years of eligibility were up that I knew this was the right decision for me," senior co-captain Van Hiles said. "He really cares."

The ties to their coach were so strong that the seniors organized a statement to the university.

However small it seemed to people outside the program, the removal of one "K" logo from each of their helmets spoke volumes about their loyalty.

Van Hiles said the administration and media took the UK general away from their army and said the move was a small token of gratitude for all Curry gave.

With a sigh he added how sorry he was that it took until the Georgia game for the team to realize their responsibility in losing their coach.

"I personally feel like I let him down," he said. "We all did."

Recruiting pitfalls make C.M. Newton's decision final and the hope for a reversal futile, but when UK begins searching for a man to fill Newton's shoes in the near future, I know a great man who looks good in blue.

And we all let him down.

Besides Anderson and Mercer, freshman center Jamaal Magloire took some spotlight.

The biggest question many UK fans have concerns the center position. Magloire tried to answer those questions by playing almost 37 minutes, going 9-of-13 from the field, and finishing with 20 points.

"He's doing as well as any freshman I've had," Pitino said. "Anything you can have 20 points, eight rebounds, four blocked shots, you're doing remarkably well."

Thus far, Magloire also thinks he has performed well.

"I'm getting a lot of rebounds, blocking a lot of shots and scoring some big points," said the freshman center from Toronto.

## An epic, a horror, and a tear jerker

Epic biography films rely on performance and directing to carry the history and keep interest throughout their extended time. Areas where *Braveheart* and *Schindler's List* succeeded, *Michael Collins* stumbled and eventually took a light fall. Liam Neeson stars as the title character in the latest bio-pic portraying the British as power-mongering, evil oppressors.

*Michael Collins* is based on the life of one of the Irish revolutionaries who fought for his country's independence from the British in the 1920s. Starting as a leader and icon, Collins later became a tragic, political victim for negotiating a treaty that divided the nation.

Written and directed by Neil Jordan, *Michael Collins*, like his previous two efforts (*Interview with the Vampire* and *The Crying Game*) was plagued by inconsistency. With no blood-sucking Hollywood hunks or surprise penises, Jordan's screenplay is, for the most part, dull.

The first half of the film read like a boring history book. While I'm not sure of the film's historical accuracy, it definitely had the feeling of being all-inclusive to the point of irritation.

Neeson combines his *Schindler's List* and *Rob Roy* performances into one, for a character that's not half as likable as the other two. At times, he brings out the fiery and passionate side, at others, his oafish figure appears to be reciting the script, spouting off cliché hero lines.

In a weak attempt to bring a female character into the film, Julia Roberts was thrown into the jumble as a woman who is loved by both Collins and his friend, Harry Boland. True to form, Roberts was simply bad, unable to hold her Irish accent for more than one sentence. Luckily, her

dialogue stayed at a minimum as she spent most of the time looking sad and confused.

Alan Rickman and Aidan Quinn pulled off the best roles as Collins' fellow revolutionaries who turn on him upon the signing of the treaty. Rickman's revered presence and Quinn's beady-eyed intensity were two of the few positive constants in the film. Their engaging characters, although fighting against Collins, were easier to care for than the main figure.

Apart from the holes, a few areas stuck out as brilliant, namely the score, cinematography and costume design. Chris Yung (*The Mission*) gorgeously shot the mass rallies, beautiful landscape and numerous cannon attacks. This, coupled with costume designer Sandy Powell's (*Orlando*) work gave the film a look extremely pleasant to the eye.

By no means is *Michael Collins* a bad film; its epic scale just seemed a bit too much for the filmmakers to handle. The several lapses into a simple re-telling of events counter any of the occasional moments of high emotion. A movie more for the history rather than the film buffs.

Writer/Director Tom Holland, best known for 80's horror staples such as *Fright Night* and *Child's Play*, brings a surprisingly dull touch to this movie. The best part about his previous films was his ability to see the humor in the horror genre and bring it out to the front, but *Thinner* has neither real humor nor horror.

A good deal of the problem with this movie is the complete lack of likable characters. Robert John Burke plays the lead with varying layers of ridiculously fat or ridiculously thin makeup, none of which can hide the fact that he isn't really very good. On top of that we can only feel so sorry for a guy who really did do what he is being punished for.

Kari Whur, the proto-Jenny McCarthy from MTV's old game show *Remote Control*, plays a gypsy girl whose only real purpose seems to be to look pretty and scream.

The occasionally talented Joe Montegna does manage to redeem the film somewhat with his role as the Mafia man who aids Billy. He seems to realize how bad his lines are, and just says them with as much cheese as possible, but it's not enough to make this film worth watching.

If you are looking for a good Halloween movie, stay in and rent *The Lost Boys*, cause this ain't it.

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## Murder and mystery make novel an entertaining read

Call me old fashioned, but I prefer mystery book plots to have a twist. How I long for the days when mystery books all actually had some element of mystery, when the murderer is not known from page ten onwards and the reader actually has a chance to match wits against the detective.

However, if you set aside this excellent tradition, Lynn S. Hightower's latest book, *Eyeshot*, is actually a very good read, and no one should miss tonight's opportunity of meeting her at Joseph-Beth. She writes a suspense novel that will keep you up all night. Despite the fact that Sonora Blair, the detective in charge of investigating the brutal murder of Julia Winchell, knows who the murderer is from the initial stages of her investigation, Hightower still manages to keep the tension at a nerve-wracking stage throughout

the entire book. Moreover, she manages to do this mainly by emphasizing the psychological evil that underlies a series of brutal murders.

Although the grim realities of a murder investigation are not ignored, Hightower does not depend on graphic gormess to create most of *Eyeshot's* adrenaline rushes. Her writing is good enough to avoid this trap.

Hightower also excels at creating realistic characters. Her people are not talking cardboard cutouts put up for the sole purpose of having some way to present the plot. Her characters are refreshingly real. Everyone has their own little quirks, and no one is impossibly perfect or hideously evil. Sonora Blair is not only a detective, she's also a stressed sin-

gle mom who's trying to find a workable relationship and occasionally screws up in the process. The murderer (whose identity I'm going to keep a secret, even if the book doesn't) is not someone who should just automatically be hated. Hightower invokes a great deal of pity and "there but for the grace of God go I" emotion, because you feel that the murderer might have tried to struggle against a twisted fate. A host of other minor characters give the book a very truthful feel. I don't know how the cops at a police station would really interact, but Hightower's representation feels right.

Hightower's final method of making *Eyeshot* into a book worth reading is an obvious amount

detailed research. The police investigation follows believable lines. Sonora and her partner Sam Delarosa don't have incredible lucky breaks or brilliant deductive flashes. They find the murderer and get the evidence necessary to convict him by talking to anyone remotely connected to the case, painstakingly sifting the facts from the gossip, and making a few logical conclusions. I found this immensely refreshing, since I've never had much faith in detectives who can make a convincing case from one slip of the suspect's tongue.

All in all, *Eyeshot* is a book worth having. It's well-written and suspenseful, even if it isn't much of a puzzle. For all those who already have it, or are now eager to buy it, come to Joseph-Beth Booksellers tonight, bring or buy the book, and have it signed by the author herself. A well-written book shouldn't go to waste.

## Crane leaves Kennedy's crushed

A construction accident at the new UK parking structure on Limestone Street gave Kennedy Bookstore a rude awakening yesterday morning.

Around 7:40 a.m., construction workers were moving a 100-foot crane into position on the side of the structure when it collapsed and fell through the roof of Kennedy Bookstore, creating a hole six to eight feet in diameter.

No one was in the store at the time of the accident, said Carol Behr, general manager of Kennedy's. No one on the construction crew was injured either.

She said the crane broke through the roof diagonally from the back left corner ahead through the middle of the store, taking out ceiling tiles, causing structural damage and damaging textbooks and other items in the store.

Less than an hour later, it began to rain through the opening, causing more damage to books, the store's computers and the inside of the store.

"The rain didn't help," Behr said.

The cause of the crane's fall has not been determined, said Ralph Derickson, UK spokesperson.

He said the sub-contractor, Pre-cast Services, Inc., has speculated the accident may be due to mechanical malfunctions, but it is still under investigation.

"They're looking at all things from the weather to mechanical," Derickson said.

The 6,000-pound crane was standing between the structure and the store. It is used to lift pre-assembled sections of concrete up to the higher levels of the building.

"They were pivoting the crane for the day's work," Derickson said. "It didn't stop; it bent and it fell onto the building. The end of the crane punctured the roof."

Derickson said the crane is inspected daily and passed its last safety inspection on Friday.

Lexington firefighters removed the crane from the building yesterday, and Behr said the store will be repaired as soon as possible.

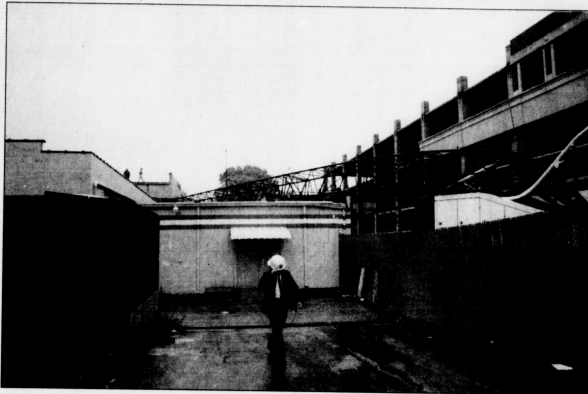
Kennedy's was closed yesterday and will remain closed for at least two more days, she said.

"They are putting a steel beam in the middle for now," said Behr. "It will be a couple of days. We're slow this time of year, but we want to be open for the students."

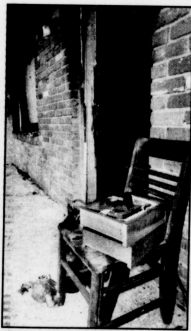
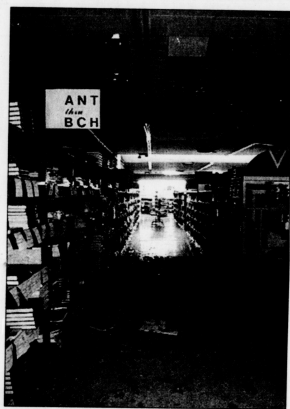
Behr said when the fire department called her this morning she thought the store was on fire. She was relieved to hear the damage was less.

"We're just glad nobody was hurt," she said.

Derickson said Messer Construction Company, the general contractor for the project, is responsible for the damages because the contractor has control over the site and its sub-contractors.

## Aylesford fire deliberately set

Wade Dickerson got his favorite black cowboy hat back from an old friend last night. He managed to make it out of his friend's apartment late Sunday night before the apartment filled with smoke.

According to residents and fire officials, the fire wasn't an accident.

Residents believe that Dickerson, 31, who was arrested last night for two counts of probation violation and one count of alcohol intoxication, used paint thinner to accelerate the fire they say he deliberately set in his ex-girlfriend's apartment.

Residents in the Aylesford Place complex building smelled smoke just after 11:30 p.m. and began looking for the source. Bill Clements, a chemical engineering senior, left his apartment

and went to the lower level of the complex to find smoke seeping from the door of apartment 2.

"The door was hot, and I figured that if anyone was inside that they were toasted," Clements said.

Eileen Rushing, the manager of the eight-unit Aylesford Country Club Apartments, opened the door to the apartment to see if anyone was still inside.

"When (Rushing) opened the door, the flames grew," Clements said.

Units from the Lexington Fire Department were dispatched to 419 Aylesford Place at 11:48 p.m. According to the fire report, upon their arrival, units "found flames and heavy smoke coming from the window of the ground-level apartment."

Eighteen firefighters spent three hours on the scene, which damaged about half of the eight units in the

building. Rushing commended the fire department, saying that their quick response saved the entire building. The first engine arrived at the scene three minutes after the initial dispatch.

"They got here so quick," Rushing said. "The fire department did one hell of a job."

Ann McDonald, a psychology sophomore who lives in the apartment next to the fire, also was appreciative of the fire department's efforts.

"There was one firefighter, a girl, who saw that I was upset," McDonald said. "She came over and told me that everything was going to be all right. They were great."

Although the fire report indicates a damage estimate of \$20,000, Rushing believes the cost of repairing damages will be higher. She said the owners of

"We're appreciative of him coming to speak and educate people how industrial hemp could help the Kentucky farmers and economy," said John David Hampton of AGR.

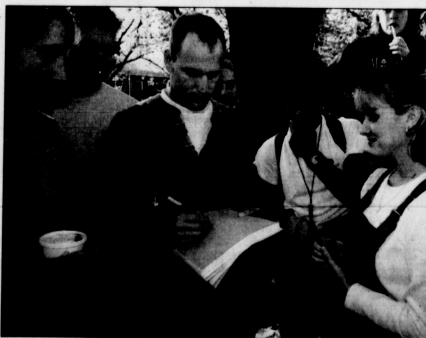
Harrelson said he became interested in the hemp issue through his concern for the environment.

High school principal Owen Barnett and state road foreman Paul Bailey, both Democrats and supporters of Judge-Executive Charles Hardin, were charged with misdemeanor counts of failing to properly fill out voter assistance forms. They were among 18 Magoffin countians indicted on various charges in connection with the 1993 elections.

Defense attorney Ned Pillersdorf made accusations of grand jury tampering to explain why his clients were indicted while more senior Republican precinct workers made the decisions and weren't charged. He called it a case of selective prosecution.

Pillersdorf accused former Sheriff Thomas "Skip" Salyer of rigging the grand jury that returned the indictments. Salyer said he did appear before a Magoffin County grand jury in 1993, but that he had nothing to do with the indictments against Bailey and Barnett.

### NATION Administration to alter imports

WASHINGTON — The Clinton administration will push again next year to allow imports of tuna caught by methods that also kill some dolphins, a State Department official said yesterday.

The official, Brian Hallinan, said in an interview that the administration made the commitment last week at a meeting of the Inter-American Tropical Tuna Commission in La Jolla, Calif.

Representatives of the member countries discussed what steps to take since Congress did not pass legislation that would allow tuna imports from countries that use fishing methods that hold down the number of dolphins killed, and allow the "dolphin safe" label on the tuna.

The bill would reverse the 1988 ban on catching tuna by chasing and encircling the dolphins that travel along with them, killing some of the dolphins. The ban allows only tuna imports that are "dolphin safe," meaning that no dolphins were killed in catching the fish.

### Groups plan to fight review of mergers

WASHINGTON — The nation's leading bank regulator, the Federal Reserve Board, is proposing a dramatic paperwork reduction for big bank mergers, a plan criticized by consumer groups.

The rule, strongly supported by the banking industry, would reward well-run and well-capitalized banks that have satisfactory community lending records with a streamlined application process for major bank mergers or purchases of "non-banking" businesses, such as mortgage companies.

Under the proposed rule, "a qualifying bank holding company would be required to provide only minimal information" about the proposed acquisition. This notice would involve the bank showing how it meets the Fed's conditions for the speedy review, such as strong capital levels.

The Fed could act on an application in just 15 days after its filing, down from the current 30-day review for routine deals and 60 days for complex cases. The bank could give the public a 30-day warning by publishing a notice in the newspaper, but this review period also could overlap with the Fed's 15-day review.

#### Clooney fed up with paparazzi

ARLINGTON, Va. — George Clooney's message is clear — the doctor is out.

The star of "ER" is fed up with paparazzi — he calls them stalkerazzi — trailing his every move and he has announced that he will no longer do interviews with television's "Entertainment Tonight."

The final straw was video of Clooney and girlfriend Celine Baldran aired on tabloid television's "Hard Copy," a Paramount show.

Clooney told "ET," another Paramount show, that the Sept. 23 segment broke a deal he had with Paramount — keep him off "Hard Copy" in exchange for appearances on "ET."

"At some point, you've got to say, 'What are you in control of?'" Clooney said in yesterday's USA Today. "This is kind of a warning shot."

Clooney said he hopes other stars will join his boycott. A Paramount spokeswoman declined to comment.

Take a look at the UK women's basketball roster and you'll find numerous changes from last year. The Cats have only 10 players, five of whom are newcomers.

Those five players should have an impact.

At yesterday's annual media day, head coach Bernadette Mattox said freshman Natalie Martinez will lead at point guard, and junior college transfer Nikki Hay should start at shooting guard.

But as far as how the team will pan out, Mattox is unsure.

"I still have too many young people coming in to play," Mattox said. "So I really don't have an idea yet of where we're going to be. Only right now I know that they're working extremely hard."

Other newcomers include freshmen guard/forward Robyn Embry, center Katie Vieth, and forward Patrice Boyd, who attended Haywood High School in Brownsville, Tenn., alma mater of former UK men's basketball player Tony Delk.

### Waiting to play

The Cats also expect the return of sophomore Tiffany Wait. The forward from Hot Springs, Ark., had her season cut short due to stress fractures in her feet.

When Wait did play, she made an impact. The 5-foot-10 forward

played almost 20 minutes a game and averaged 11.7 points.

"(Wait's) a tremendous asset to the program. She would just lift the level of our play up two notches," Mattox said. "Whenever she's on the floor, we're immediately a better basketball team. We've got to have her back."

Last season Wait only played six games and it has been almost a year since she's played.

"I'm ready to play and that's all I have to say about that," Wait said.

### Good seats still available

In general, women's hoops has been on the rise. The college game has gained national publicity, and this year there are two new women's professional basketball leagues in the United States.

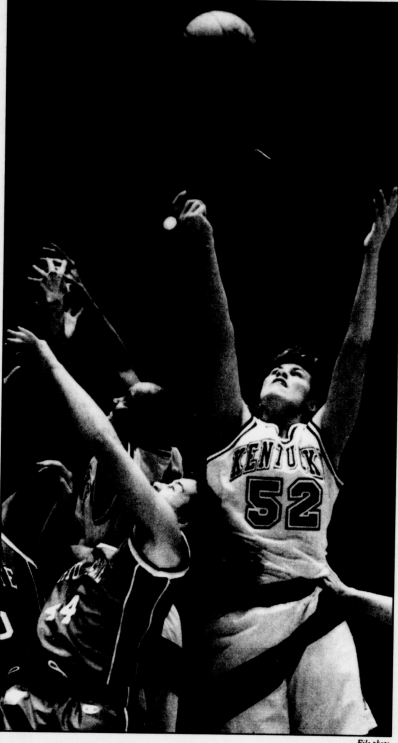
Nationwide the game may be growing, but it has not caught on in the Bluegrass.

Last year, the Cats averaged 769 fans per game. It was their lowest recorded average, and UK's average attendance has been declining ever since the 1992-93 season. There were days when UK received strong fan support. In the 1982-83 season, the Cats led the nation by averaging 3,645 fans.

Mattox remembers those days and she wants to bring the fans back.

"I think a lot of people ... have forgotten that Kentucky women's basketball filled up a long time ago," Mattox said.

She added, "They averaged seven or eight thousand. I know because I played (at Georgia) and I walked in that arena with eight or nine thousand. So it's nothing new to Kentucky basketball that the excitement is there."

After the game, Miami linebackers coach Randy Shannon was hit on the head by a trash can that had been thrown onto the field from the stadium's second level. He was treated by team trainers for a bruise.

West Virginia President David Hardesty said yesterday he was embarrassed by the behavior during a sold-out game on national TV.

"The vast majority of our students and fans were well-behaved," Hardesty said. "But we obviously have a minority that was intent on behaving in a way that hurt us all. And I'm very disappointed."

He said he would extend a formal apology to Miami.

Miami Coach Butch Davis said his players and coaches feared for their safety because of the atmosphere at the game, which Miami won 10-7 on a blocked punt in the final minute.

"Outside the stadium, the driver had difficulty leaving because fans were rocking the ambulance, and he feared they were going to tip it over," said Bob Burda, Miami sports information director. "He called for a police escort, but all the police were being used inside the stadium."

Ed Pastillog, West Virginia athletic director, said he watched as Ferguson was transported to his ambulance outside the stadium grounds and saw no fans nearby.

## State-wide issues

### Return ethics to government by electing proven public servant

This could indeed be a pivotal year in Kentucky political history. For more than one hundred years running, the Commonwealth of Kentucky has chosen one political party to run the General Assembly in Frankfort.

I think almost everyone would agree that this state is hurting in many ways. Kentucky ranks near the bottom in per capita income and education, but near the top in governmental corruption and taxes. I believe it is time for the citizens of this state to hold their elected leaders accountable.

I was born and raised in rural eastern Kentucky, where my father spent his career in a coal mine. Coming from a hard-working blue-collar family, I never thought I would have the money to go to college. As luck would have it, I was asked to serve my country in the Korean Conflict. Because of that service, I earned three and a half years of "GI Bill" credit. With that credit, I worked my way through UK, where I earned both my bachelor's and my law degrees.

Most in this community know me from my 25 years of service as Fayette circuit court judge. I truly believe that I have tried more cases than any other judge in the Commonwealth of Kentucky, since I tried all cases in Fayette County for the first four years of my service on the bench. I retired in 1994 as chief circuit judge in Fayette County.

One of my proudest accomplishments is my 16 years of service on the Judicial Retirement and Removal Commission, which enforced judicial ethics. This board was created to watch over the judges of this state to assure Kentuckians that they toyed by the rules. I have spent my entire career enforcing ethics. That is why I was so upset to see the last session of the legislature

totally gut the Legislative Ethics Reform. Just a few years ago, corruption swept through our General Assembly, and the FBI sting operation BOPROY sent more than 10 percent of our legislators to prison.

The General Assembly saw fit in the months following to adopt a strong code of ethics. Many other states applauded our efforts and even tried to pass legislation to mirror ours. For once, Kentucky was leading the way on this issue...

The Kentucky General Assembly ripped apart ethics reform, and I can assure you it is just a matter of time until yet another set of investigations engulfs our legislature.

During my time as a judge, I always kept in touch with our correctional facilities, touring them frequently. I felt if I was going to be sending people to jail, I ought to know exactly what it was I was sending them to. I have toured these facilities often, so I know better than anyone that we need correction reform desperately. We spend more than \$15,000 a year to house a criminal in prison. There must be more for criminals to do in jail than to simply idly sit by and plan their next escape.

The activities I witnessed most often in our prisons were basketball playing, pumping iron and watching television (usually cable TV). I believe this is a bad situation not only for the taxpayers of this state, but also for the criminals.

I think we should put these people to work while they are in prison. By allowing private industries to pay these people a minimum wage, we could force the criminals to pay for their incarceration and to pay restitution to their victims. (Remember, every crime has a victim.) I would also mandate that these prisoners

further their education in some way while they are incarcerated, by at least earning a G.E.D.

The kicker is this: If an inmate failed to participate in these programs, I would legislate that we take away their good time credits, their basketballs, their weights and even their color television. The last issue I'd like to address is taxes. I know it is cliché, but taxes in Kentucky are simply too high.

The Herald-Leader documented in April that Kentucky taxes its lowest wage earners higher than any other state in the union. Because our standard deduction is so

## UK foundation for successful life in shaping state's future

I'll never forget first coming to UK 34 years ago. For a country boy from the small town of Dawson Springs, my education at UK and in UK's school of law made all the difference in my life. It's what allowed me to become attorney general, lieutenant governor and a successful businessman.

UK students are the lucky ones. You've made it this far. With hard work and perseverance, you'll graduate with an education that will help you get a good job and build a bright future.

But think about the people who haven't made it to UK or another college or technical school. You probably all have friends back home who couldn't afford college or don't have access to the training they need to make it. Many of you know people who had to drop out because they ran out of money. For them, the future is less bright. They will likely face unemployment or struggle to survive on low-wage jobs with no benefits and little prospect for advancement.

I want to change that. I firmly believe that a good education is the key to a better economic future for working families. But for too many, the promise of a college education is out of reach. That is why I will fight to protect the student loan program.

This past year, Congress tried to cut \$11 billion from the student loan program. It was part of their so-called balanced budget plan. It was just plain wrong.

As far as I'm concerned, there is nothing "balanced" about taking

away the chance for people to get an education just to give tax breaks to the rich.

We need to give more young Kentuckians the opportunity to go to college or get job training — not fear. The fact is, it's hard enough trying to pull the money together to cover the cost of tuition. There are some things we could be doing to lessen the financial burden on students and their families.

First, I believe we should make at least a portion of the costs of college tuition and job training tax deductible for working families. This would immediately benefit hundreds of thousands of families right here in Kentucky.

Second, I support President Clinton's "America's Hope Scholarship" tax cut — a guarantee of two years of tuition at a community college for any student who earns a B average or better in high school. This new proposal provides all students with a \$1,500 refundable tax credit for full-time tuition in their first two years. The credit could also be used as a down payment on tuition at more expensive four-year schools.

But we all know that our education doesn't begin at 18. Elementary and high school education must be improved, too, if young people are to be suitably prepared for future study or training.

As our economy becomes increasingly technology-oriented, we need to give more kids access to computers in the classroom.

I also believe it is critically important that we do a better job

of emphasizing the teaching of morals and personal responsibility in America's schools. We've got to work more closely with parents to instill strong values in our children so they'll be more conscientious, considerate citizens.

Unfortunately, my former UK law school classmate Mitch McConnell and I disagree on many things. Apparently, McConnell took some different lessons from his years at UK than I did and does not share the same commitment to education.

McConnell voted time and again to cut student loans. I want to protect them. He wants to cut job training programs and even voted against the School-to-Work Act that prepares and assists young people in the modern workplace. I want to expand these opportunities.

I voted against funding to help bring the information superhighway to rural areas. McConnell even voted against the school lunch program. I want to give every child in Kentucky a fair chance.

I believe this election offers a very clear choice for Kentucky's young people preparing themselves to be productive adults. If you believe, as I do, that education is the key to improving lives, I hope you'll consider sending me to the U.S. Senate. Next to marrying my wife, Jane, attending UK was the best decision I ever made for myself. 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# Body piercing offers new form of expression

Pain can lead to pleasure. Something that began hundreds of years ago in tribal societies has evolved into a commonplace form of art and self-expression.

Although body piercing is generally associated with punks and freaks, it now appeals to all types of people.

The piercers of today are not weird misfits of society, but are grandmothers, professionals and, most importantly, any type of college student.

Greg Dinkens, owner and piercer of The Hole Thing body piercing studio, said body piercing is natural.

"There is a natural human desire to adorn the body by perforating," Dinkens said.

According to the Association of Professional Piercers, the majority of piercings are between ages 18 and 35.

The Commonwealth of Kentucky does not have any legislation to regulate piercing, and the results of incorrect and unclean piercings can be fatal.

Any activity that enters into and through body tissues carries an element of risk with it. Clean conditions are hard to identify. Since there is no actual certification or training that labels a piercer inherently qualified, it is difficult to know who would be best for the job, according to the APP.

Schools for tattooing exist, but actual piercing schools do not. However, workshops and conventions are available for those piercers who desire to learn more about their profession, according to the APP.

Robert Munden, piercer at the Fiery Dragon, claims to be the only certified piercer in Lexington. He said that he is certified by the I. Hewitt Corporation, a marketer of piercing guns.

"I went to school for 12 years for body piercing and tattooing," Munden said. "Body piercing don't take that long."

Dinkens said Munden's schooling does not in any way certify him for body piercing.

"The certification that he claims to have just teaches you how to pierce with a gun at the mall," said Dinkens, the only

member of APP in Kentucky. Kevin Warner of Club Tattoo said he is regulated by the Health Department as well.

Students need to know what to look for when they are going to have a piercing of any kind done. This includes ears, Warner said.

Piercing guns should not be used on anything except ear lobes. They have been proven to transmit diseases such as hepatitis B and other various bacterial infections, according to the APP.

Although the gun itself may not touch the ear, bacteria and other microspray may get on the guns.

Another good thing to look for is a portfolio of previous piercings.

Club Tattoo and The Hole Thing do not use piercing guns. The Fiery Dragon uses guns only on ear lobes.

Other things to look for in a piercing shop are the general cleanliness of things in the shop, and whether they have a separate, extremely clean room for piercing, the APP said.

The piercer should always wear

gloves and be constantly aware of the threat of cross-contamination.

Surgical stainless steel, niobium or 14K gold jewelry should be used. Sterilized, single-use needles and sterilized and bagged tools should be used.

Another good thing to look for is a portfolio of previous piercings.

Regardless of what you are getting pierced, get the facts first. Check out the piercing studio, and ask lots of questions. If you are uncomfortable in the studio or with the piercer, the APP recommends you leave.

Know your rights as a piercee, and set high standards.

# Dorm offers taste of foreign cultures

After sitting in the lobby of Jewell Hall for a few minutes, it becomes obvious that it is not the average residence hall.

Only 50 percent of the students are from the United States.

The other half are from countries around the world — Bosnia, Greece, Germany, Korea, Malaysia and Russia, just to name a few.

Jewell Hall International Living-Learning Center was formally established in April 1990. A joint committee of students and officials in the Office of Residence Life, the University Housing Office, the Office of International Affairs and the Dean of Undergraduate Studies were responsible for the project.

All of the students who live in the hall seem to agree that the best part about living there is the family-style atmosphere.

"This dorm feels a lot like a family because everyone is so far from home that you have to take care of one another," said Ajlina Karamelic, a communications sophomore from Bosnia.

The fact that the international students all come to UK in a similar situation and share similar problems is probably part of the reason the residents of the hall are so close, said Nadia Khan, an international economics and French sophomore from the United Arab Emirates.

Khan said there are some problems with a close-knit residence hall, like the fact that gossip spreads quickly. But the advantages outweigh the disadvantages.

"Living here is a true cross-cultural experience," said Satish Kedia, anthropology doctoral candidate and hall director of Jewell.

"Students tend not to be in the mainstream, but are very outgoing and want to know and learn about international cultures. Many find their new sense of independence shocking, but all have some control over their lives."

He also said he would recommend living there to anyone who wishes to understand international cultures.

"This is a lifelong experience," Kedia said.

While it's often decided early that students from abroad will be living in Jewell, many Americans choose to live there only after they've heard about it from previous residents.

"I decided to live here because my sister lived here and I liked how she interacted with students from other countries," said Shelly Berong, business marketing senior.

"I thought it would be neat to live with a person from another country."

Meredith Hattle, an education senior and R.A. at Jewell, said living in the dorm has had more positive effects than she ever expected. She has a teaching job waiting for her in South Korea that she got through a friend she met in the hall.

But she never loses sight of her original reasons for choosing the hall.

"This is a new experience," she said.

"It is a living and learning center that opens new opportunities."
