Dear Harriet.

I have this morning just returned from Athens, where I went to attend the funeral of Uncle Pardon. He died on Friday night, May 12th, 1871. I received a dispatch from Mr Moore and Mr Sheldon, Saturday forenoon, and went over in the afternoon. He was buried Sunday afternoon in the Athens Cemetery, by the side of the remains of Grand mother Cook and Aunt Barker who died in 1856. The funeral services were conducted by

The Rev. Mr. Hagar, the Methodist minister of Athens, at 2 P.M. at the house of Mrs. Hibbard - Hon. E. H. Moore directing the funeral ceremonies.

Uncle Pardon was born in New Bedford Mass. August 8. 1789. and was 80 years and 9 months old, at death. It is now over 4 years since the commencement of the cancer of the eye, which steadily progressed to a fatal termination. I think Mrs. Hibbard will write to you and give some further particulars. There was no very marked change in symptoms but a gradual failure; the pain attendant having been measurably controlled by a free use of laudanum.

He made a will last summer, giving every thing to Mrs. Hibbard, excepting some money in the Athens bank, which he willed to me, after a deduction of funeral expenses. If any thing remains, I shall direct the executor to pay it over to Mrs. H.

We are under great obligation to her for her unremitting, kindly treatment of one so afflicted and lonely.

I called to see Uncle Isaac Barker who at the age of 92 is able to walk about, and talks well.

His son Charles died, insane, at the Longview Lunatic Asylum, a few months ago. I saw Mrs. Maria Lyons, who seems in good health, and rather fleshy. The Constables, are in average health. The son, Robert C. Jr, who married a Miss Dana of Athens, lives with his father. He has three girls; the oldest about 18, is teaching in the public schools, and is a very bright girl.

I think Mrs. Hibbard will receive about seven hundred dollars, and as she will soon come into possession, it will not probably be necessary to send her any more money.

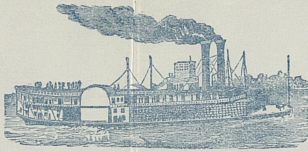

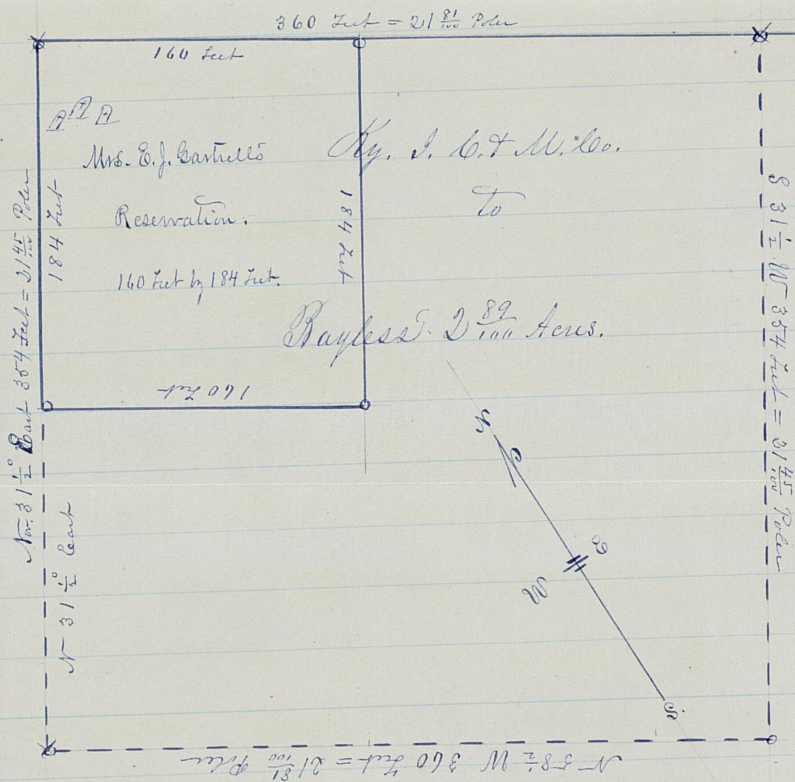

The Elizabethtown, Lexington and Big Sandy Railroad Company having made application, through John C. Breckinridge, the Vice President of said Company, to the County Judge of this County to submit to a vote of the qualified voters of this County the question whether a subscription of One Hundred Thousand Dollars to the capital stock of said Company shall be ordered and made on behalf of said County, payable on the terms and conditions specified in said application, which application is as follows, to wit:

CATLETTSBURG, KY., }
Sept 25, 1871. }

Hon. John D. Ross, Judge of the County Court of Boyd County.

SIR: By the direction and on behalf of the President and Directors of the Elizabethtown, Lexington and Big Sandy Railroad Company, and in pursuance of the provisions of the Charter and Amended Charter of said Company, I respectfully request you to submit to the qualified voters of the County of Boyd the question whether the said County shall subscribe One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) to the capital stock of said Company on the following terms and conditions, viz:

1st. Said subscription to be paid in coupon bonds of said County, of the denominations of \$1,000 and \$100, as may be requested by the President and Directors of said Company, payable fifteen years from their date, with the option on the part of said County to redeem them at any time after two years from their date, bearing six per cent. from their date, payable semi-annually, and both principal and interest payable in the city of New York.

2ND. The bonds for said subscription shall be executed, dated and delivered to said Company, when the said Elizabethtown, Lexington and Big Sandy Railroad Company shall be completed through the County of Boyd, and trains be running thereon

3RD. So much of the line of Railroad as shall be constructed through said County shall be completed before or sometime during the year 1874.

4TH. The Road shall cross the Big Sandy River at some point between its mouth and the mouth of Chadwick's Creek; and if the Railroad Company shall decline to fulfill the above conditions, then no Bonds shall be issued by the County.

And if a majority of the qualified voters, voting at said election, shall vote in favor of said subscription, on the above terms and conditions, then I respectfully ask you to order the said subscription to be made accordingly. Respectfully,

Ordered, that the Sheriff of Boyd County give to each of the above named officers notice of their appointment in the same manner as provided by law in other elections, and in case of any of the officers appointed shall fail to attend, or shall refuse to act, others will be appointed in the same manner as at general elections.

The Third (3d) Section of the Amended Charter of the Elizabethtown, Lexington & Big Sandy Railroad Company, approved February 15, 1870, is as follows:

"The persons acting as Sheriffs at the several precincts shall return to the Clerk of the County Court within three (3) days after the day of such election, the poll books of their respective precincts, and on the next day thereafter, the County Judge and County Clerk shall count the vote, and if it shall appear that the majority of those voting voted in favor of the subscription of stock as proposed, the County Judge shall order the votes to be entered on the record, and a subscription to be made by the Clerk on behalf of the County on the terms specified in the order submitting the question to a vote."
