

Dear Mr. Means:

You will remember one day when you were here, I suggested to you the question of your taking the Presidency of the Princess Furnace Company, and you said you would not want to do that unless it meant the consolidation of all of the iron works in that section of the country. I have been thinking of this more or less since I saw you and I have talked it over a little with the Longdale people.

You will remember that I told you it would take cash to get the Longdale people into the poposition. I believe now that if there was any way to show the Longdale people that there was a chance of dividends, that I could get them to go into this kind of a deal simply by the exchange of stock, and I believe that I could get the Princess Furnace Company to go into the deal on the same basis. Of course, the exchange of stock would have to be equitable. It would probably be necessary to organize a company to take over these companies at certain valuations. One of the considerations that Matthew Addy & Company would want would be that they would get the sales agency of the combined companies. I do not know how much stock has ever been issued by the Low Moor Iron Company and whether it has ever earned a dividend. The question of valuation and of the ability to earn dividends would enter into the matter.

Suppose you study the matter over and we can talk about it the next time we meet. I would not be very much surprised if the Allegheny Ore & Iron Company could be gotten in on the same basis.

3/23/09. #2 Mr. E. C. Means, We might not be able to get hold of the property until the lease is out, but at any rate, we would be able to regulate the people who are operating under the lease and see that they preserve the property for our future use. As business is so rotten, it might be possible that the Oriskany Ore & Iron Company might be willing to turn over their lease for stock in a consolidated company. One of the important points would be whether we could get the company into such shape that the stock could be listed in New York. If we could, then it would give Lyman and some of the other people a chance to get rid of some of their stock if they wanted This might make it interesting to him. These thoughts and suggestions I throw out to you for your consideration and we can talk about it afterwards. I think we will have to be a little careful about talking to Parrish because while Parrish is a fine lawyer, and I think a very desirable attorney for you or for me, at the sametime, where his own interests are concerned, I think he would be liable to try to drive a pretty hard bargain with us, but you know him better than I do and I am willing to leave the matter largely to your judgment. It has always seemed to me that a consolidation of these various companies would be a matter of very great economy and would make it possible to make money in Virginia.
