Truly one of the leading land grant institutions in the nation, the University of Kentucky has a national and international reputation in such diverse fields as medicine, business, engineering, law and agriculture.

More than 23,000 students are enrolled on the main campus in Lexington. Another 19,000 students are enrolled in the 13 community colleges operated by UK across the state at Ashland, Henderson, Cumberland, Hazard, Elizabethtown, Prestonsburg, Hopkinsville, Somerset, Louisville, Paducah, Maysville, Madisonville and Lexington.

UK has a graduate school and 17

academic colleges . . . Arts and Sciences, Agriculture, Engineering, Business and Economics, Education, Home Economics, Library Science, Social Work, Architecture, Communications, Fine Arts, Law, Medicine, Nursing, Dentistry, Allied Health Professions and Pharmacy.

The UK library, one of the finest in the nation, has some 1.7 million volumes and ranks 13th in the nation in its microform holdings.

The UK Honors Program for students who have shown a record of academic achievement has more than 600 students enrolled. The UK debate team consistently ranks among the top debate teams in the nation.

UK has an outstanding faculty with some of the top teachers in the nation.

The UK mathematics department has seven faculty members who have been awarded the prestigious Sloan Fellowship and the political science department consistently ranks among the top such departments in the nation in the number of scholarly papers published.

UK also is noted for its research efforts, especially in the fields of energy, tobacco and cancer.

In the arts, thousands of people attend the many art, music and theater productions at UK. The UK Marching Band is one of the best collegiate contingents in the country, and the UK orchestra, the chorus and the theater offer sterling performances throughout the year.

The Honorable John Y. Brown, Jr. Governor of Kentucky

John Y. Brown, Jr., became the 51st governor of Kentucky on December 11, 1979.

Born on December 28, 1933, Governor Brown graduated from Lafayette High School in his hometown, Lexington, and obtained a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Kentucky in 1957. He graduated from the UK College of Law three years later.

The Governor served in the U.S. Army Reserve from 1959 to 1965.

He has been named the Outstanding Young Man of America by the National Junior Chamber of Commerce (1965), as one of the outstanding Civic Leaders of America (1967) and Louisville's Outstanding Young Man by the same group. Lions Club International gave him an Outstanding American Award (1974) and he is the youngest person to be named to the Uni-




versity of Kentucky's Hall of Fame.







This past summer, Gov. Brown was elected vice chairman of the Democratic Governors Conference and states' co-chairman of the Appalachian Regional Commission.

He has three children by a pre-





OTIS A. SINGLETARY
University President

The University of Kentucky has become one of the major institutions of higher learning in the United States under the leadership of Dr. Otis Singletary, the eighth president of the University. His tenure has been marked by rapid growth and a commitment to excellence.

"The University, with all its problems, is still the single most important institution in the state," Dr. Singletary has said. "Its network of influence is felt throughout the state, not just in the instruction of the state's young people but in the great pattern of research, the things we are doing to improve the quality of human life and the wide range of services we are providing throughout the state.

"Contrary to popular opinion, our institutions of higher education are not operated exclusively for students, or for faculty members, or for administrators, or for trustees — or, for that matter, for all of these. Historically speaking, universities have been created and supported by our society to perform important functions for the common good of society. This is the larger meaning of the term, 'the public interest,' as it applies to institutions of higher education."

Before being named UK president in 1969, Dr. Singletary served as executive vice chancellor for academic affairs in the University of Texas system and as director of the Job Corps program for the Office of Economic Opportunity.

The Gulfport, Miss., native holds

degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University. He is a nationally recognized history scholar and is the author of two books and several monographs.

In the 12 years he has been president, the University has grown to where there are now more than 23,000 students on the Lexington campus and more than 19,000 students in UK's 13 community colleges. UK has gained an international reputation in such diverse fields as medicine, business, engineering, law and agriculture. The University also is noted for its research in the fields of energy, tobacco and cancer. The Sanders-Brown Research Center on Aging is one of the first facilities of its kind.

The UK Alumni Association has recognized Dr. Singletary's special

service by presenting him its Alumni Service Award. It is an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

Dr. Singletary is in the second year of his two-year term as president of the Southeastern Conference. As University President, he serves as chairman of the board of directors of the UK Athletic Association, the body which maintains overall policy supervision of the athletic program.

A Navy veteran of World War II and the Korean conflict, he is commander in the U. S. Naval Reserve. He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot and Kendall.

The Singletarys live at Maxwell Place, traditional home of UK presidents.

Athletics Director

The story of Cliff Hagan's reign as chief of the UK Athletics Department has been one of fine attendance at the two big revenue-producing sports, increased attendance in Lady Kat basketball and men's baseball, and a steady upgrading of facilities.

The University will be host to the SEC Basketball Tournament in March of next year and the NCAA Championship Finals in 1985. The UK Relays were renewed this past spring.

Hagan, who has seen and over-

seen vast improvements in all phases of the UK athletics program since returning to his alma mater as assistant athletics director in 1972, has under his command a total of 20 sports ranging from football and men's basketball in Level I, to women's basketball in Level II, and a baker's dozen sports in Level III.

He was named in 1972, assistant to Harry C. Lancaster and given the task of implementing the Blue & White Fund for 57,600-seat Commonwealth Stadium and later for Rupp Arena. Hagan replaced Lancaster as athletics director in July, 1975.

Hagan received one of his highest individual honors three years ago when he became the first University of Kentucky basketball player to be installed in the Naismith Memorial National Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass. At UK, he played on teams that won 86 of 91 games and an NCAA championship (1951). He went on to star in the NBA with the St. Louis Hawks and in the ABA with the Dallas Chaparrals as player-coach.

He received his M.S. in education from Washington University in 1958.

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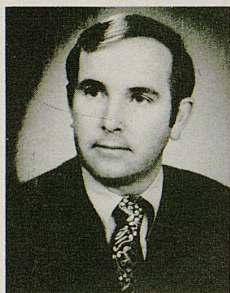
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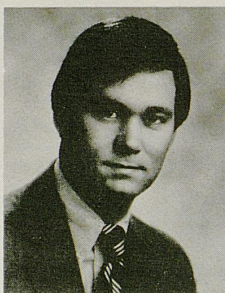
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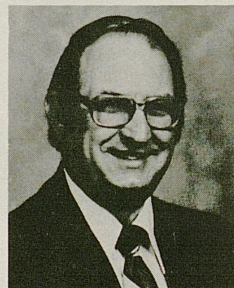
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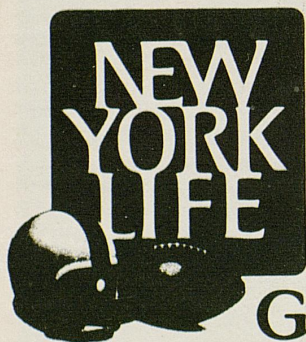
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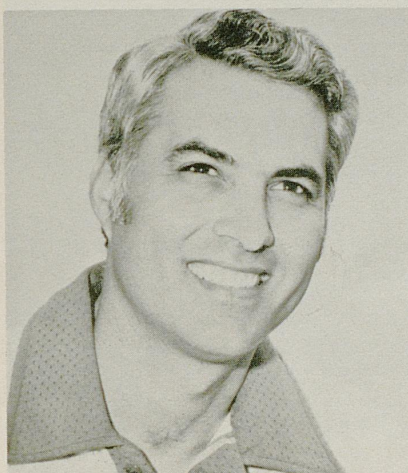

Fran Curci Enters Ninth Season At Kentucky Helm

With his second good recruiting crop in a row, Fran Curci enters his ninth year as University of Kentucky football coach with hopes of returning the Wildcats to



their fine back-to-back seasons of 1976, when they finished 8-4 and were Southeastern Conference co-champion and Peach Bowl champion, and 1977, when they finished 10-1 and were undefeated in conference play.

Curci's victory total at UK now stands at 44 (44-43-2), second only to the 60 victories registered by Paul Bryant (60-23-3, 1946-53) and ahead of the 41 by Blanton Collier (41-36-3, 1954-61).

Youthfulness, inexperience and injuries took their toll of the Wildcats last year, when four games were lost in the closing seconds, including two with no time left on the clock, en route to a 3-8 record.

During his tenure at UK, Curci has been named SEC "Coach of the Year" by both wire services—UPI in 1973 and AP in 1977—and has finished high in the national balloting (1977).

He has produced four All-Americans and three Academic All-Americans at UK, which did not have an All-American of any type during the

nine years before he came to Lexington. He also has produced 10 All-SEC players named 15 times to the honor squads.

Curci came to UK from the University of Miami, FL, where he was head coach two years. He started his career as freshman coach there in 1962 after earning All-American honors as a quarterback for the Hurricanes in 1959 and playing QB for the old Dallas Texans in the AFL.

Curci went to Tampa as head coach in 1968, putting together a 7-3 season that included victories over Mississippi State and Tulane and earned him the Florida Sports Writers Association's "Coach of the Year" award, a recognition repeated in 1970.

His 1969 team finished 8-2, while his 10-1 record in 1970 included a 31-14 triumph over Miami and brought the Tampans the nation's No. 1 College Division ranking. Curci was runner-up for the College Division "Coach of the Year" honors.

He coached the Hurricanes in 1971 and 1972.

A native of Pittsburgh, PA, Curci played his high school football in Miami, where he lettered three years as a quarterback at Archbishop Curley High and was All-City, All-Conference, Catholic All-State and his team's Most Valuable Player.

At Miami, where he was known as the "Mite-y Magician," he parlayed intelligence and desire to become All-America as a senior in 1959 after receiving All-America honorable mention in 1957.

He set Hurricane seasonal and career marks for total offense, most passes thrown, most passes completed and most yards gained passing. He was co-holder of the record for most passes thrown.

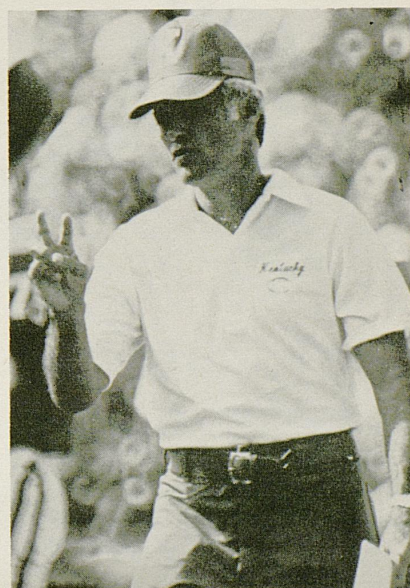
He rolled up 2,767 yards rushing and passing during his varsity

career, breaking a total offense record that had stood for more than two decades. He captained the Hurricanes his senior year and climaxed his career by engineering a stunning upset of Michigan State.

After graduation in 1960 with a degree in marketing, he played one year for the Texans and then served as a lieutenant in the Army, coaching and playing football for the Fort Eustis team, which won the National Service championship in the Missile Bowl.

Curci has been selected seven times to coach in all-star games. He assisted Bear Bryant with the South team in Tampa's first annual American Bowl game five years ago, then served as South head coach the next year. He helped Charlie McClendon of LSU and Alex Agase of Northwestern direct the East in the Coaches All-America game and has also appeared at the North-South Game, Japan Bowl, East-West Game and Hula Bowl.

He was elected to the Miami Sports Hall of Fame in 1980.

Kentucky Kickoff Spotlights:

Tom Turchetta

Wildcat offensive line coach Tom Turchetta doesn't think the game has changed much since his playing days at the University of Miami. He was co-captain and MVP of the Hurricanes in 1971.

"Football is still a game of blocking and tackling," he says. "What you try to stress a lot more now is the technique, being in position. With the offensive linemen, the one thing you want to make sure is you want your players to feel comfortable. You don't want them to be uptight or nervous about making a mistake."

That philosophy is reaping benefits now that Turchetta has been working with so many young linemen. While the starting offensive front includes three seniors, a junior and sophomore, the backups are young, very young.

"The thing you try to impress up on them is just go out and play,

give it the best shot and whatever happens is going to happen. I think as far as philosophy goes, I like to put pressure on them in practice



but they also know that it's the kind of pressure that is pressure for them to succeed and to do the

things they are supposed to do," he adds.

Turchetta moved up to a fulltime assistantship two years ago after serving as a graduate assistant at UK in 1978. He came to the Wildcats from North Miami Beach Senior High School where he served two years as an assistant and three years as head coach. The Pennsylvania native was an All-Catholic offensive and defensive tackle at Altoona Catholic High. He was also co-captain and JuCo All-American in 1969 as a center and linebacker at Taft Junior College in California before transferring to Miami.

Coach Turchetta says if he has learned one thing in his coaching career, it is that it is important to know the players individually and personally.

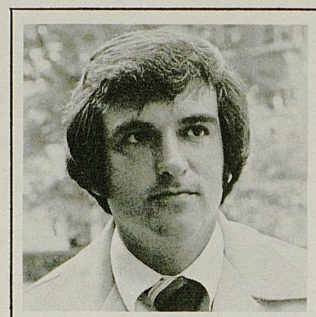
"There's no two people the same and some people can be pushed further than others," he explains.

Frank Ham became assistant director of athletics soon after Cliff Hagan succeeded Harry C. Lancaster as director of athletics.

A native of Scranton, Pa., Ham came to the University in 1969 as administrative assistant to football coach John Ray, and was reassigned to the athletic director's staff in 1972.

Ham graduated from high school at Niles, Michigan and completed his undergraduate work at Olivet College. He did graduate work at Indiana University and coached high school football and track at John Adams High in South Bend. He then returned to Olivet as athletic director and head football and basketball coach.

In 1962, he became assistant to the president at Olivet, with responsibilities in public and alumni relations. He was in private business from 1956 until 1968.

He is married to the former Rosemary Woods of Niles, Michigan. They have two sons, Michael, of Raleigh, NC, and Craig, a U.S. Army Captain, and two daughters, Mrs. Andy Hunsberger of Casopolis, Michigan and Jennifer a 1978 graduate of UK.

Sizing Up the Wildcats' Offensive Line

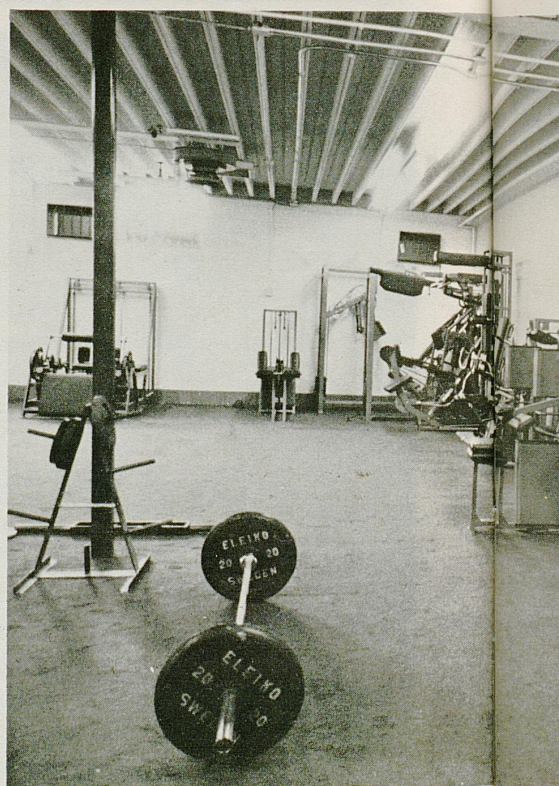
Offensive line coach Tom Turchetta feels especially close to his current crop of Wildcat linemen. It's not just because this crew knows the virtues of hard work.

"One of the things about them that is so unique is that they do everything as a group," Turchetta was explaining over the lunchtime clatter at the football team cafeteria.

"These kids communicate with each other, they work out together. These kids are good enough players individually that they **can** succeed and I think they are going to be good enough as a group that they **will** succeed," he adds.

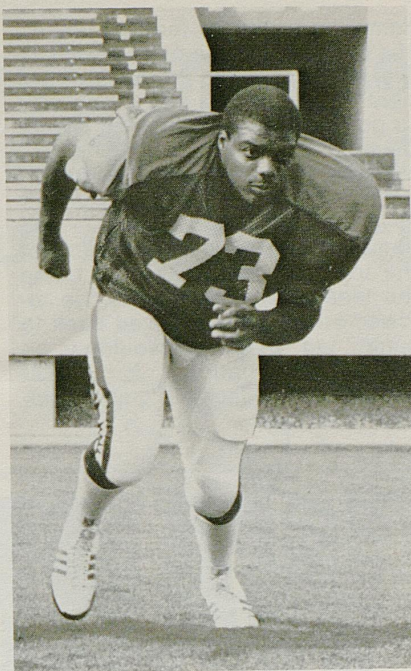
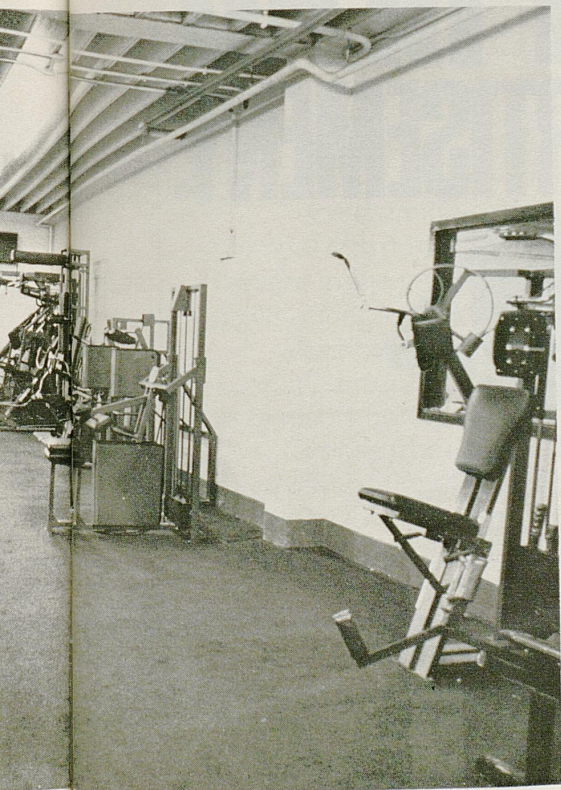
With two-a-day practices just concluded and the season now upon them, Turchetta and the rest of the Wildcat coaching staff are ready to find out what their charges are made of. A fine recruiting year has helped their outlook but Coach Fran Curci has said many times that Big Blue fans should not expect miracles. Some young players are going to have to mature awfully fast if the Wildcats are to contend for the SEC title.

"I am confident the offensive line is going to mature," says Turchetta. "I think they will because of their attitude and their willingness to work."



Members of the offensive line have used the weight room to good advantage.

The starting offensive line includes three seniors, a junior and a sophomore. The beginning of spring practice saw the Wildcats without a true center to replace the departed All-SEC performer Ken Rourk. Others would have to fill some big shoes also. These Wildcats will not be the kind of group which blows opponents off the line of scrimmage, according to their coach.

"We're not very deep," says Turchetta. "We'll really be geared a lot more to what we feel we're capable of doing according to who we play week in and week out."

"Our game plan will dictate what we will try to do as an offensive line," he adds.

The coaching staff has been impressed with the attitude of all the players and, while speaking very cautiously, one gets the feeling Turchetta thinks the team has a future.

"The offensive line has been characterized by a great willingness to work. Everytime they've been at practice, the weight room, even throughout spring practice, it's been a group of kids that have a strong determination to succeed. I think up to this point, one of the keys to the offensive line is that we didn't have one offensive lineman miss any of spring practice."

"We've been very fortunate that they've been together since the beginning of fall practice so that they are getting the consistency and continuity and amount of work and repetition that you need to get your assignments and techniques down," said Turchetta.

Turchetta offered a capsule analysis of the individuals who will be starting on the Wildcat front wall:

Gerald Smyth, Left Tackle: "He's been through all this as a freshman

and sophomore. He's a very steady player, a very quiet individual. I'd say at this point, he's probably our most consistent offensive lineman. Gerry lost 30 pounds since spring practice. He's got to help us and be our leader this season."

David Bond, Left Guard: "David has been very consistent and he al-



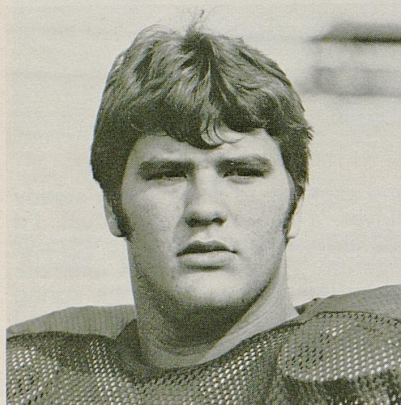

so is going to have to be one of our leaders because he is a senior."

Steve Hricenak, Center: "Also a senior, who we had to move to center during spring practice because we didn't have anybody else. Steve's done very well. He's not

quite as big and as strong as some of the guys but we are very pleased with his progress."

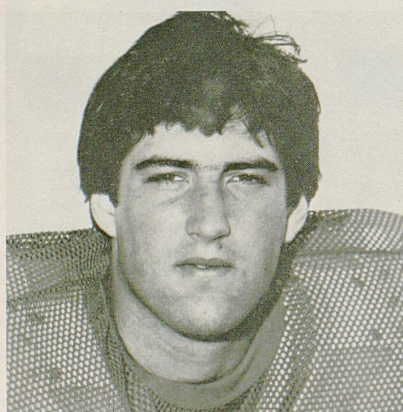
Robert Cobb, Right Guard: "Robert started 11 games last year. He's a steady performer who we're hoping can give us stability on the right side because standing right next to him will be **Don Corbin** (Right Tackle) who will be a sophomore. But even though Don's inexperienced, he has a wealth of potential."

And backing up the starters:

"Behind Don Corbin, naturally, is **Doug Williams** and I said it earlier in the year and I said it right after Doug decided to come to Kentucky: it's just going to take him a period of adjustment to college football. He has great potential, size and strength and he can run. But again, he's playing against

competition that will not allow him to just come off the ball and blow someone out with pure strength. He's got to work a lot on technique but he will play.

"Right behind Cobb is **Steve Wil-**

liams, an excellent football player. His big thing at this point is he's in the best shape he's ever been in here — and he still has a long way to go as far as conditioning. We're pleased with his progress.

"**John Maddox** is backup center. John pumped up a lot this summer — probably about 15 lbs. — and came in about 250. And because of the injury to Kevin Kearns, being the team player that he is, he allowed himself to be moved back to center so that we wouldn't be caught short-handed. He's also capable of moving to a guard posi-

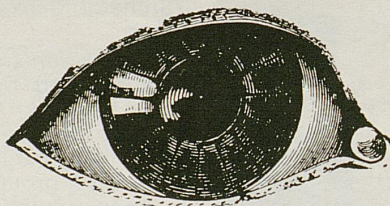
tion.

"Behind Dave Bond is **Jerry Klein**, a walk-on, and we are pleased with his development. He put on some weight this summer so he will help us also.

"And at left tackle is another freshman named **Bobby Shurtleff**, who was a very pleasant surprise so far this camp.

"Again, these young kids need a little time to mature and adjust to playing Southeastern Conference-style football and when and if they do, they are going to be pluses," Turchetta says of the reserves.

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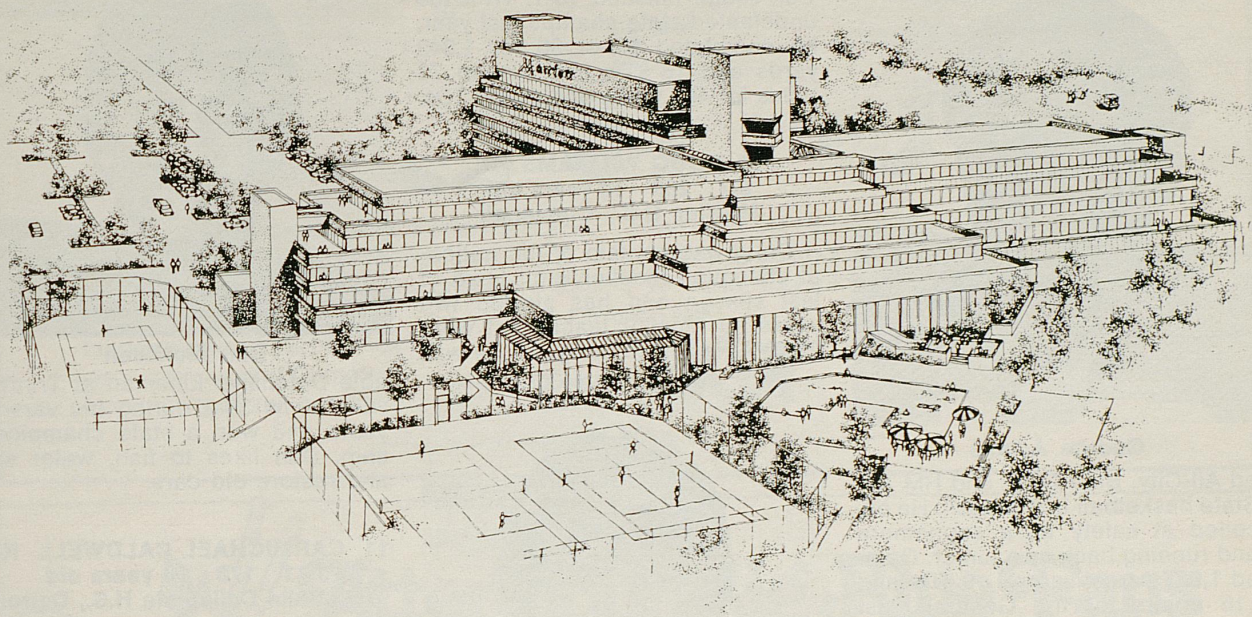
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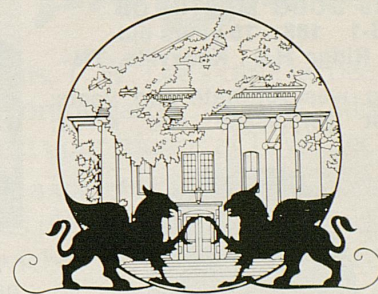
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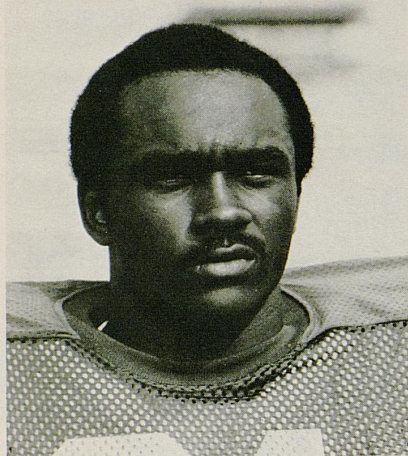

Doug was captain of the national champion Moeller High team of last season and has started two years for Moeller teams that were 25-0. After his senior year, he was

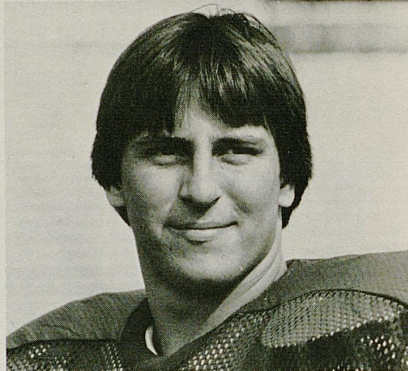

Veteran NTSU Features Wide-Open Offense

Anxious to get started could be the best way to describe first year coach Bob Tyler and the 1981 North Texas State Eagles.

For North Texas State football, 1981 will offer a new experience. Bob Tyler has brought to North Texas a winning record and a winning attitude. That, combined with

the quality athletes should mean excitement this season.

In terms of lettermen, 40 of 57 return from the 1980 squad that posted a record of 6-5. Among that group of returnees are a total of 13 starters. Included are five on offense and eight on the defensive squad.

On the offensive side of the football, one of the strengths should be a solid, proven crop of receivers. That group is headed by Pete Harvey, who caught 47 passes for 496 yards in 1980 and tight end Mark Witte, who will return after missing the last eight games of 1980 with a knee injury.

At fullback the Eagles should be sound with Lee English leading the

charge. Last year English was one of the top blockers and finished with 652 yards on the ground. On the offensive line the Eagles will return two standouts in center Toby Bowen and tackle Zene Renfro.

At quarterback Rusty Hill and Greg Carter have battled for the starting spot. The NTSU coaches feel Hill has the stronger arm but that Carter is quicker on the option. Expect a wide-open offense with the Eagles throwing 25-30 times a game.

On defense, North Texas will be relying on several experienced players in the defensive secondary. The four deep secondary returns nine of 10 players. Contributing will be Dale Moses at free safety and Phil Broadus at strong safety.

The Eagles will also return several seasoned veterans at the line-backing positions. That group includes '80 starters Louis Haynes and Zac Cypert. Other linebacker candidates are Lester Harper and Art Molina.

On the defensive line Paul Nance has continued to improve at the right end position. Last year he finished with 46 tackles and one interception. Charlie Young, a 6-5, 280 pound defensive tackle, has also made steady improvement in the Eagle scheme. Others to watch in the '81 defensive line are Randy Bruns, Mack Faggett and Paul Wleczyk.

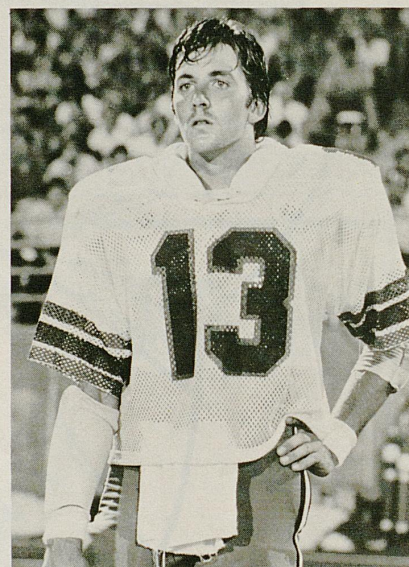
In the specialty team play Carlen Charleston has proven to be a dangerous threat as a sophomore return specialist on both punts and kickoffs. Last season the Waller product returned 22 kickoffs for 587 yards.

In 1981, Tyler and his assistants will return 31 of 44 players from the 1980 depth chart.

"We are anxious to get started," Tyler said. "The staff and I are impressed with the attitude and the physical conditioning of the squad.

We just want to continue to strive at getting our team in the best order possible. And we are very excited about the way North Texas State football is moving in 1981."

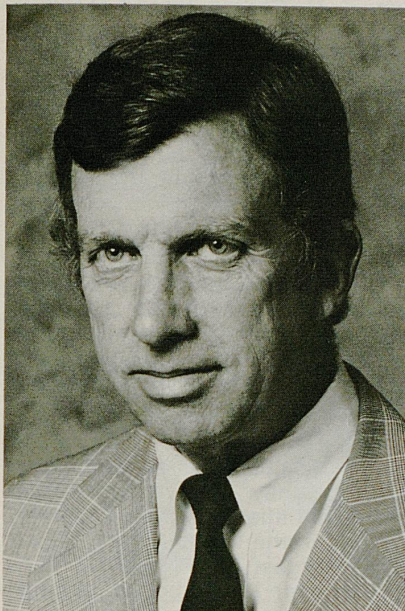

history. Wildcat tackle Bob Gain, slated to win the Outland Trophy as the nation's outstanding lineman, blocked a NTS punt, picked up the ball on the 30, and returned to the 19, to set up a TD plunge by Vito "Babe" Parilli, who also would make All-America that year. Parilli completed only four of 11 passes in that game, but some were dropped by receivers. The Kentucky players agreed that North Texas State had a good football team . . . five of the Eagles later would play professional football. Kentucky outscored its opponents, 393-62, that year.

BOB TYLER
Head Coach

In 24 seasons as a football coach, Bob Tyler has rarely experienced the taste of a losing campaign. North Texas State's new head football coach and athletic director, has a long history of bringing home winners.

Tyler served as head coach at Mississippi State University six years. From 1973 through 1978 Tyler compiled a record of 39 wins, 25 losses and three ties. Two of his teams posted nine wins and his 1974 team defeated North Carolina in the Sun Bowl.

During Tyler's last three years at Mississippi State he did serve in a dual capacity of head football coach and athletic director.

Tyler began his coaching career in 1955 at Water Valley Mississippi Junior High School. His 1956 team went undefeated and Tyler then moved to Water Valley High School the next season.

Tyler was a head coach on the high school level for 11 years. He produced five conference champions and twice won the state championship in Mississippi. Tyler finished with an overall record of 91-19-6 in the high school ranks.

In 1968 Tyler joined the staff of John Vaught at the University of Mississippi. The three years Tyler

was involved with the program the team made trips to the Liberty Bowl, the Sugar Bowl and the Gator Bowl.

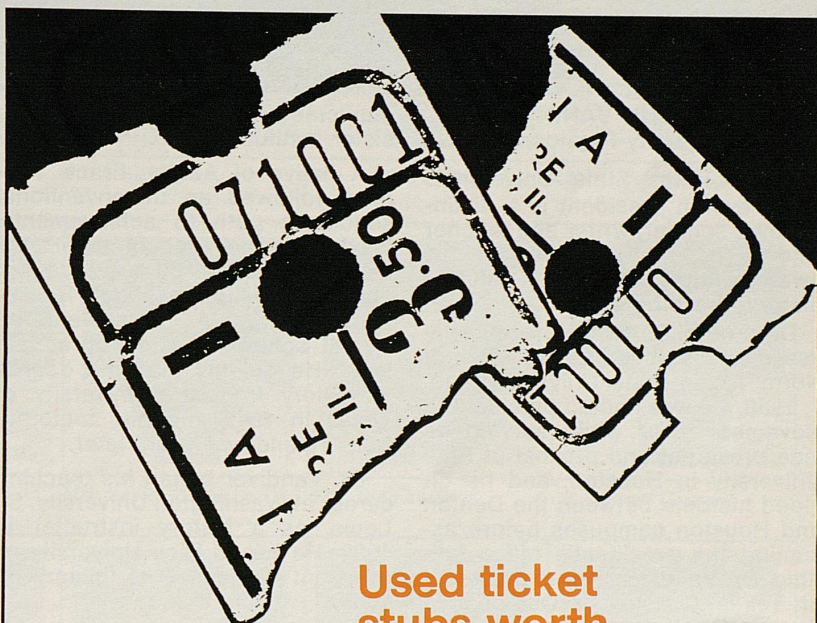
Tyler spent the 1971 season as an offensive coach at Alabama under the legendary Paul "Bear" Bryant. That year the Crimson Tide participated in the Orange Bowl. He also served as an assistant offensive coach at Mississippi State under Charlie Shira in 1972. It was after the 1972 season he was named head coach at the same school.

Before taking over the AD-head coach position at North Texas

State, Tyler was working as a part-time scout for the Dallas Cowboys. Tyler served in that capacity for two years.

While in the Cowboy organization, Tyler also completed one year toward a law degree at Ole Miss. He holds a B.S. degree in physical education and a master's degree in school administration from Ole Miss.

The 48-year old Tyler is married to the former Dale White. They have three sons, Breck, a wide receiver at Ole Miss, age 22; Cam, 16, and Drew, 12.



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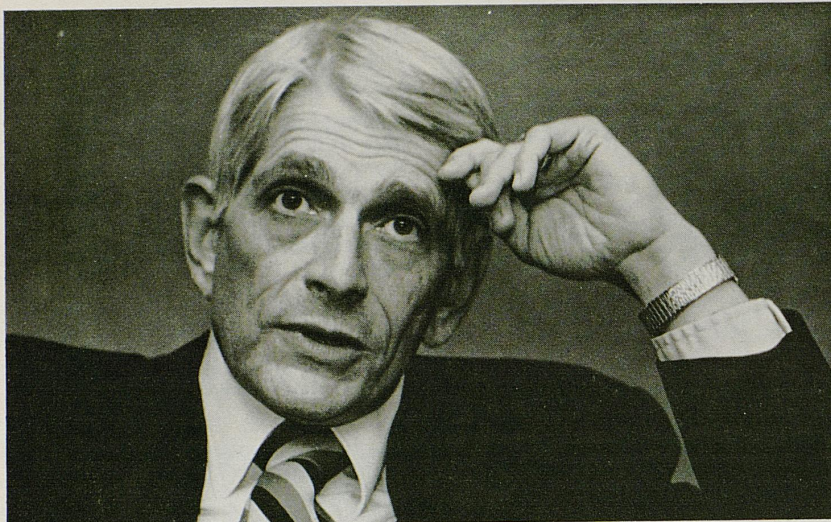

DR. FRANK VANDIVER
University President

North Texas State University's eleventh president is a distinguished scholar, writer and teacher who is nationally known for his award-winning works of military history and biography.

Dr. Frank E. Vandiver officially assumed his duties as president of North Texas State University Aug. 1, 1980. He was named president in November 1979 while serving as vice president and provost of Rice University in Houston, and he divided his time between the Denton and Houston campuses before assuming the president's office full-time. Dr. Vandiver also is president of Texas College of Osteopathic

Medicine in Fort Worth, NTSU's sister institution.

A native of Austin, Frank Vandiver followed an unconventional scholastic path to achievements, leaving formal school after the seventh grade to pursue independent study. After receiving a Rockefeller fellowship, he re-entered formal schooling at the graduate level. He got his master's degree in history from the University of Texas in 1949 and his doctorate from Tulane two years later.

Dr. Vandiver began his teaching career at Washington University, St. Louis, as a history instructor in 1952. He joined Rice University as assistant professor of history in 1955.

North Texas State University was originally established in 1890 as a normal College in the city of Denton. J. C. Chilton leased facilities and was the school's first president until the term 1893-94, when he resigned. In 1899 the Texas Legislature accepted the buildings and grounds of the North Texas Normal College, offered to the State by the city of Denton. Eight presidential terms and three name changes have occurred since the school became state-supported.

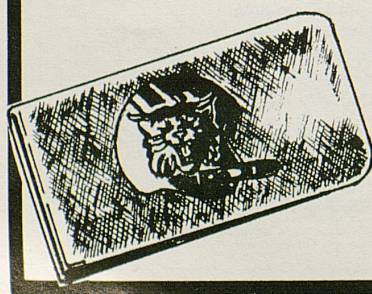
Originally established as a teacher education facility, the University has broadened its academic scope to include eight colleges and schools with a strong graduate education emphasis.

The University Libraries house over 1,300,000 catalogued volumes and currently receive over 4,800 periodical titles. The Music Library, located in the Willis Library, is one of the largest in the country, containing over 79,000 books, periodicals, scores and sheet music, as well as extensive phonographic disc and tape collections. The Willis Library is a depository for United States government publications.

Through the University's membership in the Association for Higher Education of North Texas, the Libraries provide access to the bibliographic resources of 15 area college and university libraries. Active participation in the AMIGOS Bibliographic Council provides a variety of computerized library services, including interlibrary loan, bibliographic date base searching, and shared cataloging.

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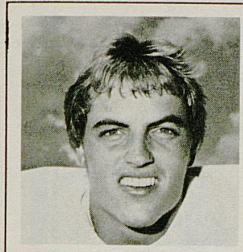
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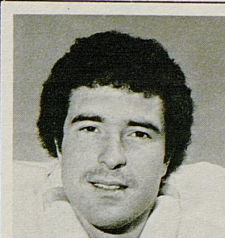

UK Artist Series Features Pops, Classics

Famed pianist Andre Watts returns to Lexington September 20 making a second appearance in the University of Kentucky Artist Series.

Watts will perform with the Cincinnati Orchestra at 8 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 20 in the Concert Hall of the UK Center for the Arts.

The UK 1981-82 series also includes four concerts billed "tops in pops." Pearl Bailey and Count Basie lead the list of top artists scheduled to appear on the Lexington campus.

The classic series also includes such internationally-known artists as violinist Itzhak Perlman and the Juilliard String Quartet.

There are five concerts in the classic series:

Sunday, Sept. 20, Andre Watts performs as featured soloist with the Cincinnati Orchestra, one of the principal orchestras west of New York and the first American orchestra to undertake a world tour.

Watts, who was warmly received in Lexington last fall, gained national acclaim when introduced by Leonard Bernstein during a New York Philharmonic Young People's Concert.

Saturday, Oct. 31, The Juilliard String Quartet, a unique American ensemble of four ideally matched virtuosi, is acclaimed as "the first family of chamber music."

Tuesday, Nov. 10, Garrick Ohlsson, internationally recognized as one of the foremost pianists of his

generation, is the first and only American to ever win the coveted First Prize in the Chopin International Piano Competition in Warsaw.

Friday, Feb. 26, St. Paul Chamber Orchestra is noted for its innovative programming which includes works for full ensemble as well as smaller groups. Pinchas Zukerman, featured soloist with the St. Paul

Orchestra, was encouraged to come to America by Isaac Stern and Pablo Casals to study at Juilliard.

Monday, March 8, Itzhak Perlman, hailed as the consummate master of the violin, whose style has been described as "formidable—communicating a love of playing that is, quite simply, irresistible."

There are four concerts in the pops series:

Wednesday, Oct. 14, The New England Ragtime Ensemble, directed by Gunther Schuller, is a nationally-renowned musical group with universal acclaim, a Grammy award, and a place atop the national sales charts. The repertoire includes the works of Scott Joplin, James Scott and other early ragtime and jazz greats.

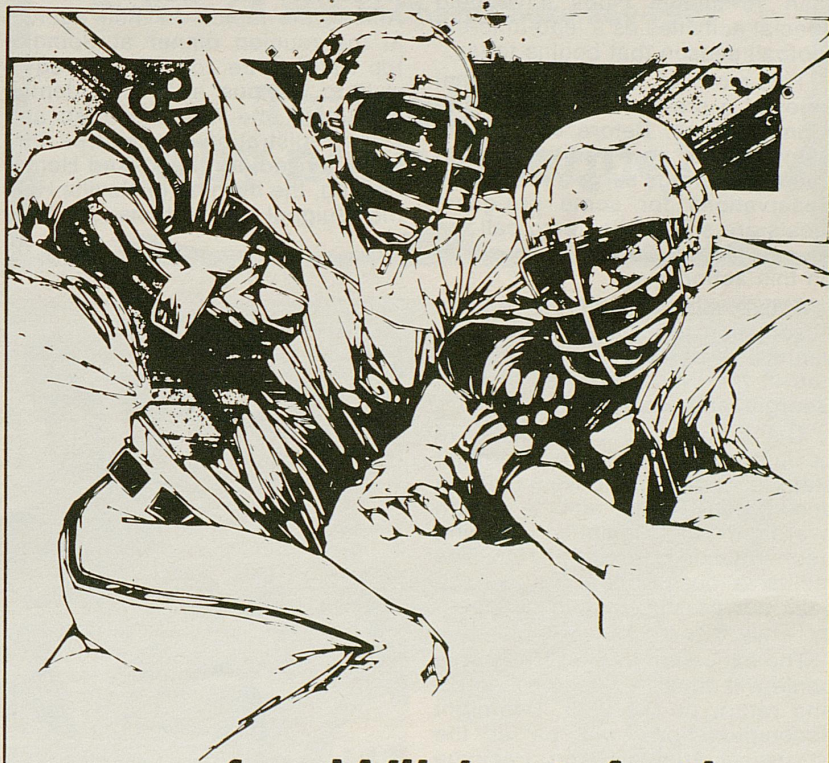
Friday, Dec. 4, Pearl Bailey, who has entertained at the White House more often than any other performer except Bob Hope, calls herself the "Ambassador of Love." She was honored with a special Tony Award for her performance in "Hel-

lo, Dolly," in Broadway's longest running company of the hit musical.

Tuesday, March 30, The Swingle Singers are hailed as a champion of classical scat or "mouth music" in folk tradition. This unique choral ensemble have mastered the art of using the human voice to imitate instrumental sound. Their extensive repertoire ranges from Bach to ragtime and includes original vocal as well as vocally-transcribed instrumental pieces.

Tuesday, April 13, Count Basie returns to Lexington with his simple, swinging, elliptical piano style that has been a trademark of the electrifying "Basie sound." A modern music immortal, Basie and his band have been voted the "Greatest Ever" by their fellow musicians.

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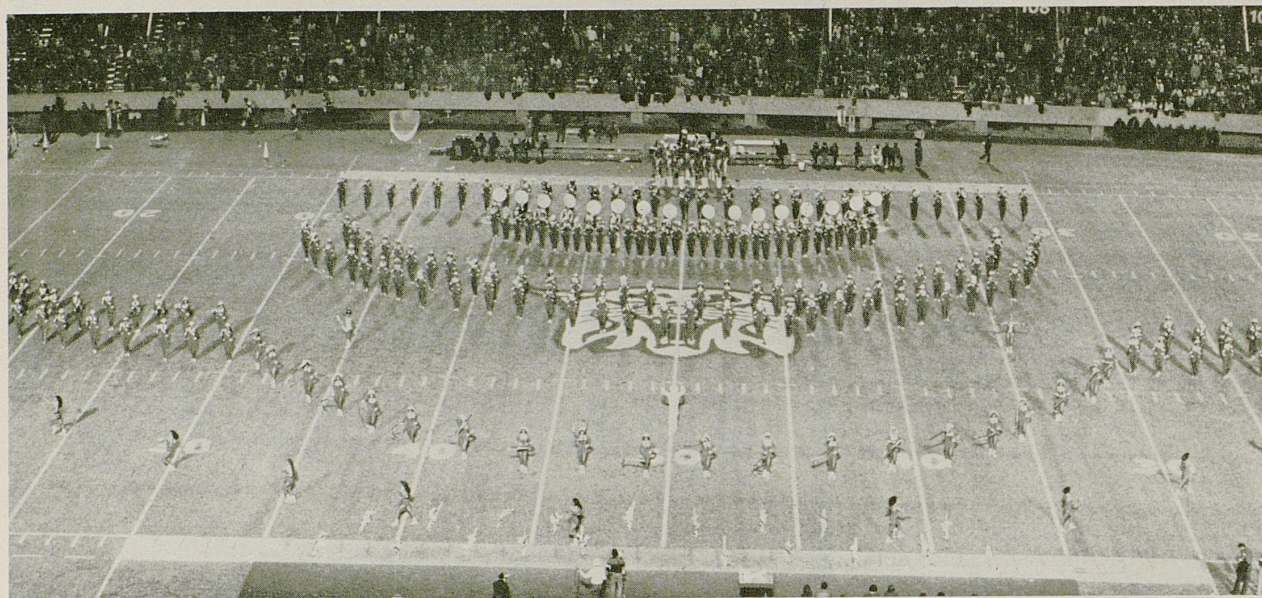

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Wildcat Band



The 1981 University of Kentucky "Wildcat" Marching Band includes some 280 members and features a 28-member percussion section, 32 flags, 10 majorettes, 2

feature twirlers and three drum majors.

Known for its progressive drills and innovative musical staging, the "Wildcat" Band has developed into

one of the nation's leading college marching bands. Easily recognized by its bright blue Kentucky Colonel uniforms, its massive sound and its crowd pleasing dramatics, the band is a near perfect cross-section of the UK student body. The band members represent 47 different academic majors and these students come from all parts of Kentucky and from eleven different states.

The band's halftime performance opens with special drill to "Festival Prelude" by Alfred Reed. In concert, the band plays "Birdland" by Chick Corea and "Ice Castles" by Marvin Hamlisch, featuring trumpet soloist Vincent DiMartino. DiMartino is the trumpet teacher at UK and director of the Jazz Ensemble. He has become the perennial and popular soloist for the Wildcat Band.

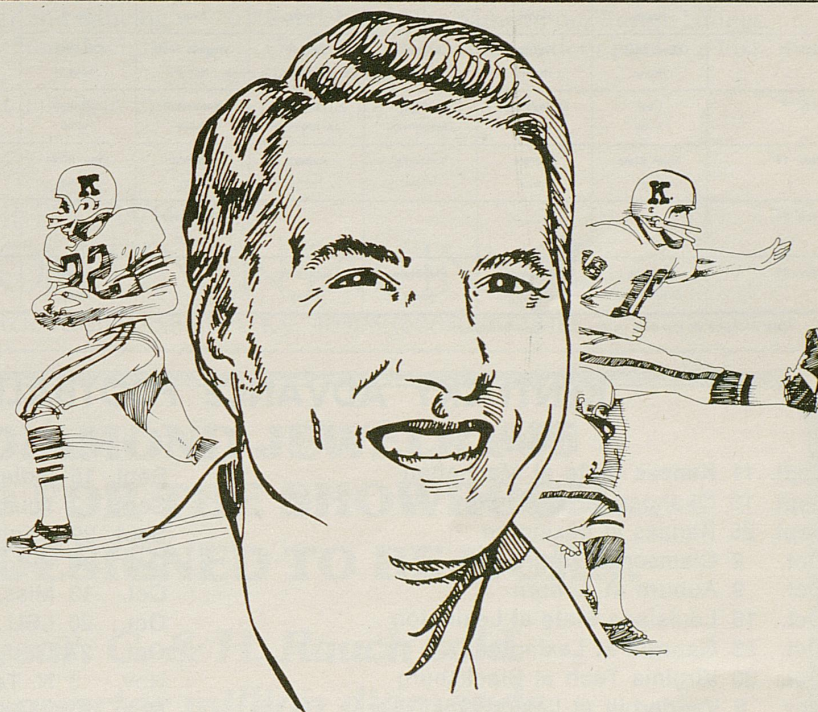

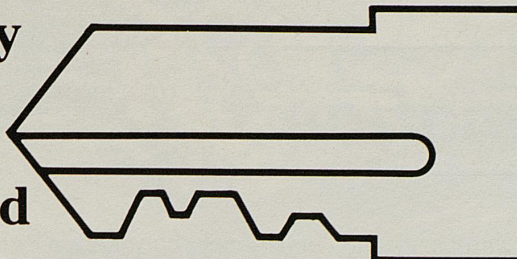

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Stadium Information

First Aid—The University of Kentucky provides, for your convenience and welfare, First Aid Stations on the ground level on both sides of the stadium. On the West side is Room 156, the East side, Room 172. An ambulance is available at each corner of the stadium. Twenty doctors on duty are spotted in each section of the stadium and are easily accessible to Boy Scouts and ushers. Two golf cart ambulances are equipped for immediate aid and located on the second level on each side of the stadium. Persons with any type of chronic medical problem are requested to leave their name and seat location with the nurse on duty at either First Aid station. A person in need of assis-

tance with a health emergency should report the situation immediately to the nearest Boy Scout or usher.

Cardiac Care—In cooperation with the University Medical Services, the University of Kentucky provides a cardiac resuscitation program.

Crowd Noise Penalty—Uncontrolled crowd noise can result in a five yard penalty against your team. Please observe quarterback and official's signals for quiet.

No Horns—Horns are not permitted in Commonwealth Stadium and will be picked up at gates. Be

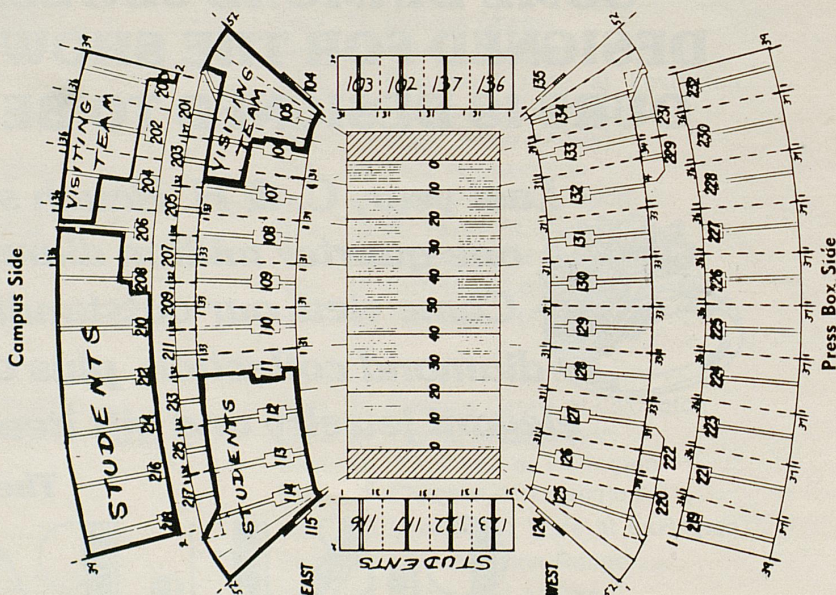
considerate and allow your neighbor to enjoy the game. Keep portable radios at a low volume.

Liquors—Alcoholic beverages are strictly prohibited within the stadium as are all food and drink containers including hard surfaced materials of any type, bottles, cans, thermos bottles, ice bags, ice chests, and any object related to above. Gate personnel are instructed to enforce this rule in the interest of safety.

Signs—Signs and barriers are restricted for Commonwealth Stadium in accordance with University regulations and policies established by the Public Safety Division.

General Ticket Policy for Stadium

- All persons must have a ticket.
- No pass out checks permitted at any gate.
- All sales final.
- Tickets cannot be refunded or replaced if lost, stolen or destroyed.
- The University of Kentucky Athletic Association reserves the right to revoke tickets by refund of purchase price.
- Holder of tickets to University of Kentucky athletic events agrees to abide by stadium and University policies.
- Tickets may not be sold on UK premises (parking lots, stadium grounds, etc.) except by authorized personnel.



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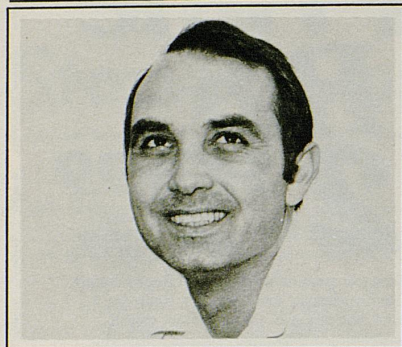
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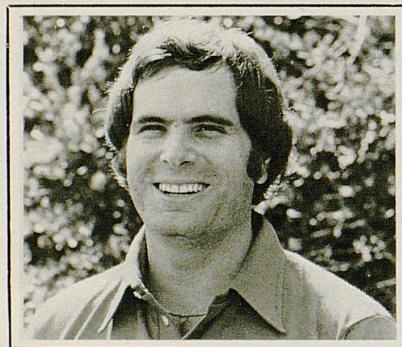

Head Trainer

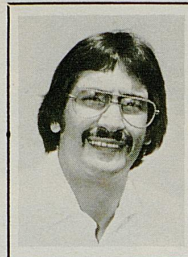

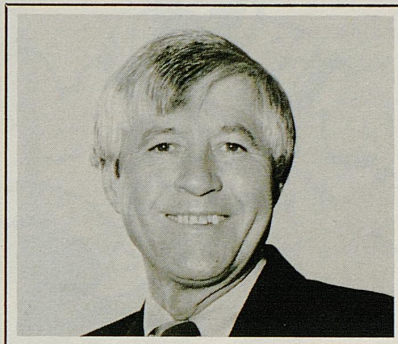

Russell Rice was named sports information director at U.K. in May, 1969, after serving two years as assistant to Ken Kuhn, who retired after more than two decades of service with the University. Rice came to the Wildcats from **The Lexington Leader**, where he was a general reporter eight years and sports editor five years. A native of Paintsville, Ky., he won letters in football, basketball and baseball at Van Lear High, served with the U.S. Marines in World War II, attended Kentucky Wesleyan College and received his bachelor's at the University of Kentucky in 1951.

He has served as manager of the NCAA Mid-East Basketball Tournament (1969), and chairman of the Basketball Hall of Fame Committee of the College Sports Information Directors Association and was recipient of the 1971 Churchmen's "Sportswriter of the Year" award.

As a newspaperman, his duties ranged from agricultural hearings

in Washington to spending three months as the traveling companion to a Kentucky gubernatorial candidate. He reported the activities of



such Wildcat teams as football coach Charlie Bradshaw's "Thin Thirty" and "The Runts" of basketball coach Adolph Rupp. He is a former Kentucky area correspondent for **Time-Life-Fortune** magazines and was Kentucky editor of **Tobacco Magazine** and Religious

News Service.

For the past 13 years, he has pursued a hobby of researching Kentucky basketball and football. He authored "The Wildcats: A Story of Kentucky Football," and "The Big Blue Machine: A Story of Kentucky Basketball." His latest work is the Kentucky portion of a "History of the Southeastern Conference," updates of "The Wildcats" and "Big Blue Machine," and a new work to be published in November. He edits the K-Men's Newsletter and has been named an honorary member of that organization. He also was honored by WAVE-TV for "Outstanding Contribution to Televised Sports." He was the first member of the Southeastern Conference Publicity Directors Association to be elected to a two-year term (1977-78) and recently completed his second year as president of the Blue Grass (Kentucky) chapter of the U. S. Harness Writers Association, which was organized in 1977.

a 400-seat recital hall, a 1,500-seat concert hall and the UK Art Museum which is open daily except Monday from Noon to 5 p.m.

UK's Albert B. Chandler Medical Center has a wide range of programs in education and research. The five colleges of the Medical Center — Medicine, Dentistry, Nursing, Pharmacy and Allied Health — have more than 2,000 students pursuing bachelor, masters and doctoral degrees in health-related fields.

Of major significance in the area of medical research is the Sanders-Brown Research Center on Aging, one of the first facilities of its kind in the nation.



UK graduates almost 6,000 students each year from the main campus and the community colleges. The UK Alumni Association, therefore, continues to grow in number of clubs (64) and paid members (22,000). Besides the 34 clubs in Kentucky, there are 30 organized alumni groups outside the state from Los Angeles to New York.

For old alums and other visitors to the University, there's a tour of the UK campus any weekday on a double-decker bus, "Old Blue." The free, guided tour of the campus departs each Monday through Friday at 2 p.m. from near the Administration Building.

The University of Kentucky has had only eight presidents since its founding in 1865. Dr. Otis Singletary, now in his 13th year as UK president, is a history scholar and nationally-recognized university administrator.

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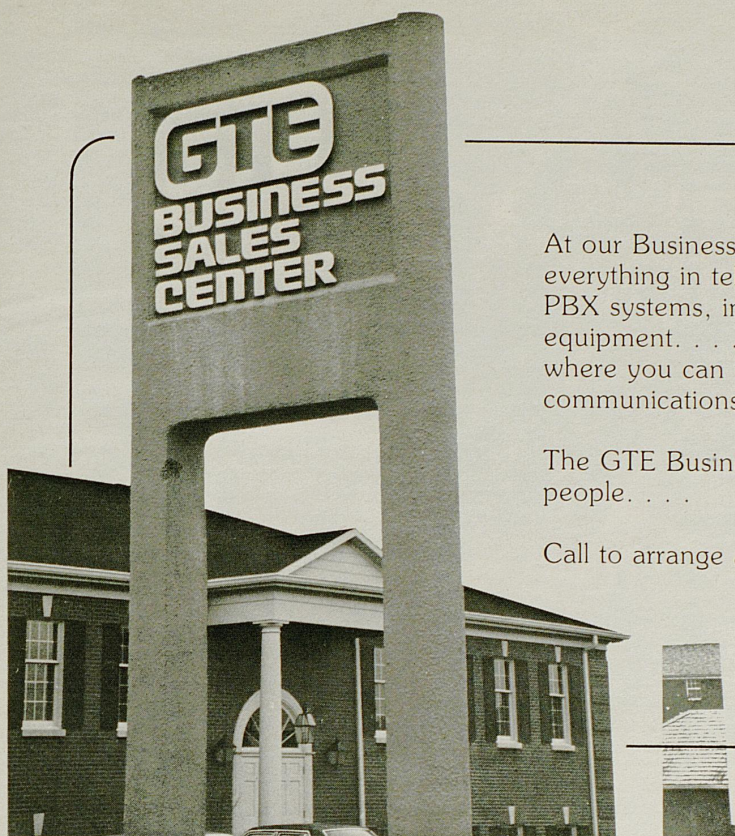


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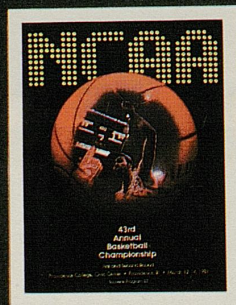
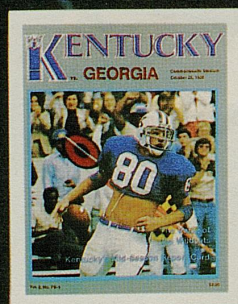
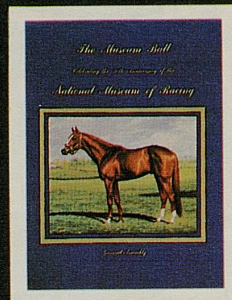
