## FROM MISSOURI.

St. Louis, Aug. 2 Quite a number of people have written me recently concerning board and lodging during their visit to the Fair, and as I am very busy about sixteen hours per day and haven't time to write them all, I desire to give through your paper, to all who contemplate visiting the Fair, some economical advice. Here in the glare of Electricity and in the shadow of the great Exposition night becomes day and Sunday, Monday. All is rush and hurry therefore dont get run over and killed. Don't get robbed by the high-price-man. Good nice rooms can be rented for two dollars per week, and the best meals in the city can be had for 15cts and 25cts at the restaurants. There are also many one dollar per day boarding houses, many of these are good some are not. After three months experience here I think I am amply prepared to give eek, my friends a few financial pointers along the line of eco-Tex- nomical living while here. I and therefore should advise that sush- immediately upon your arrival you rent a room on some now street whose cars run direct to as a the World's Fair. This done, he you should next locate a good restaurant where you can get has good meals at 25cts. The city is full of fine restaurants, in fact the , whole city has been connected so to speak, into one large Boarding and Rooming house. Barber shops are likewise all over the city, shave 15cts, hair cut 25cts, shoes shined 5cts. While these prices and prevail and are known to us who are here, yet the legalized robber is here also and is always on the alert to victimize the innocenct and unsuspecting. Some barbers rob by over charging the strangers. Some of these however have been recently put in jail. Some boarding and rooming houses up over charge you unless you have a plain understanding before you enter their houses. tives Therefore occupy no room on this so called "reasonable rates" ed to but know exactly and specifibut cally what you are going to ister pay before you occupy the g so same. Best and cheapest to

put pay in advance for rooms and

and worry about rooms. These remarks are made for the benefit of those who, like myself desire to realize the very best resuls from the money expended. If there be those who prefer higher living you can be accommodated at either the "Jefferson" or the "Monticello" at forty dollars per day.

I should like to say something concerning the great Exposition and its thousands of exhibits and its strange and pecular people from every land under the sun, but time and business forbid. Will merely add that it is the biggest thing in the world. Never expect in my life time to see anything like it again. I was quite fortunate in getting a position of any kind and thrice fortunate in getting so good a one as I have. It is an educational opportunity of a life time. Thousands come and applied for positions and went away without any. I spent sixty dollare myself before I got one. Stood two physical examination passed alright and secured at last one of the best positions.

Before I left Monroe last April, many of my friends ask me to aid them if possible in securing positions here. I desire to say that it was impossible. First, you had to be here in person, Second you had to stand physical examinations and pass successfully and get certificates from the Board of Physicians. Thousands were here in person, passed the examinations and failed to get positions and returned to their respective homes. Nearly all employees are college and professional men. Some are graduates of Yale, Howard, John-Hopkins and other institutes of equal ranks. I must now close and go on duty. I hope these briefly scribbled remarks may prove beneficial to those at least who contemplate visiting the Fair. On account of hot weather, I should advise you not to come Letore Sept. or Oct. Will add, however, that if any one desires a copy of the World's Fair Official Guide Book, you can get a copy of it by remitting to me 25cts in stamps.
