Dear Sir:

E. A. Wooten, has filed an answer in the suit brought against him by L. B. Burnett on the notes executed by him to Donnie Railey for part of the purchase price of some lots in the Davidson Addition to Glasgow. In this answer he pleads that he bought the lots from you; that the title was in Donnie Railey but that you were the owner; that you for yourself or as agent for Donnie Railey sold them to him; that to induce him to purchase them you stated and represented that a street would be opened "from the front of said house and lot to the Bowling Green road, and also a street running the full length the rear of said property; and that you would see to it that said streets were opened; and that you and Donnie Railey have failed to have said streets opened; and that without said streets being opened said property is not worth more than \$500, which sum he says he has paid. He says you knew at the time there was no street there and that none would be opened there, that he did not know it, and that said statements were made by you to enhance the value of the property and to induce him to purchase it and to defraud him. He denies that Burnett is an innocent purchaser without notice.

Please write me fully as to these matters. I intend to file a demurrer to the answer, but want to know all the facts meanwhile, so that I will be advised what to plead in my reply to this answer if the court should over-rule my demurrer.

Rowland G. Railey the subject of this sketch, was born and reared at Forkton, Monroe County, Ky., on a farm. His father was nearly four years a soldier in the Northern Army; his mother was the daughter of a Southerner and life-long Democrat.

When a grown boy, he "bached" two years and went to school and sawed stove-wood on Saturdays to pay his tuition. Later, he paid his expenses in college by working on the Kentucky Experiment Station Farm, Lexington. He taught school a few years and attended school and won the degrees of Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Arts. Elected clerk of the Monroe Circuit Court and served six years. Took the Law Course in the Louisville Law School in 1904-5. Admitted to the bar in 1905. Located at Tompkinsville and practiced law a number of years with J. C. Carter, G. M. Miller and others. Held position at World's Fair, St. Louis. One of the founders of the People's Bank of Tompkinsville, and served thereafter as Vice-President, Director, and Attorney for the Bank.

Attorney for J. C. Carter during his campaign, 1909, for Circuit Judge. Appointed by Judge J. C. Carter, 1910, Law Examiner for applicants seeking admission to the bar. Served, 1911, as Counsellor and Campaign Manager for Judge M. O. Scott, when he was elected Senator for the 19th Senatorial District. Elected, 1912, by the Senate, Assistant Reading Clerk of the Kentucky Senate. Author, 1912, of the Exhumation Law of Kentucky. Appointed April, 1913, by Governor McCreary, and represented the State of Kentucky at Birmingham, in the National Good Roads Association. Member of Committee that wrote the Constitution of the National Good Roads Association. Nominated, 1913, at Birmingham, by United States Senator Bankhead and elected Vice President of the National Good Roads Association. Served, 1913, as Counsellor and as one of the Campaign Managers of Hon. H. H. Hays, when he was elected to represent Monroe County in the Legislature. Appointed by Governor McCreary to represent, October, 1913, Kentucky in the Southern Commercial Congress, Mobile, Ala. Established, 1913, on, Ky., his American Ginseng and Golden Seal Gardens. Elected, 1914, by the Senate, Assistant Reading Clerk of the Kentucky Senate. In 1914, in an annual Oratorical Contest at State University Lexington, Ky., he was appointed and served as Judge. Nominated, without opposition, by the Democratic party Circuit Judge of the 29th Judicial District of Kentucky, and the Secretary of State issued, June 30, 1915, his Certificate of Nomi
