Only eight students received their graduate certificates in gerontology this semester, but those numbers will soon be rising, administrators say.

"The program is growing by leaps and bounds," said Mattie Umscheid, educational services coordinator at the Sanders Sanders and the program. That number is nearly half the total of 67 that the program has graduated in the past eleven years, since it began in 1987. (The first class graduated in 1988)

Part of the increased interest in the program is the fact that the job market is rapidly increasing.

"The fastest-growing population in the U.S. is those over 85 years of age." Umscheid said.

### Justice department sues Ohio city

COLUMBUS, Ohio — The Justice Department yesterday sued the city of Columbus, charging a pattern of civil rights violations by the police department. The allegations include excessive force, false arrests and improper searches. The Justice Department said it found a pattern of civil rights abuses in the 1,700-member Columbus police department. The lawsuit, filed in U.S. District Court, demands improvements in the training and supervision of police officers, and the investigation of civilian complaints.



NEW YORK — Claiming the big ideas of this presidential race, Bill Bradley yesterday likened his goal of eliminating child poverty to John F. Kennedy's yow to put a man on the moon, and offered a \$9.8 billion "wholesale rescue effort" for the poor. The Democratic presidential hopeful is proposing automatic, annual increases in the minimum wage and expanded tax credits and child care subsidies.

### Senate backs 1973 abortion decision

WASHINGTON — A narrow majority of the Senate voiced support yesterday for the 1973 Supreme Court decision to legalize abortion. The 51-48 vote was non-binding, but supporters said it would be used in the 2000 elections against senators who voted the other way. Sen. Tom Harkin, D-Iowa said the resolution will be a key weapon during next year's campaigns. Forty-five of the Senate's 54 Republicans voted to kill Harkin's non-binding amendment. Eight Republicans joined 43 Democrats in support of the resolution.

Tiny beetles threaten Calif. oaks

Jose downgraded to tropical storm

CHARLOTTE AMALIE, U.S. Virgin Islands

SAN FRANCISCO — Beetles are killing an unprecedented number of Northern California's majestic oaks from the inside out. The trees are under attack from two types of beetles: the Western oak bark beetle, which burrows under the bark until it falls off, and the oak ambrosia beetle, which tunnels into the wood and deposits a fungus that clogs the trees circulation. The theory is that the tan oaks were somehow weakened by drought and El Nino and developed some kind of disease. Beetles then preyed on the weakened tan oaks, and eventually spread to the live oaks.



Federal judge upholds Clean Water Act, West Viginia environmental agency will appeal

CHARLESTON, W.Va.—A federal judge says environmental regulators have "done adisservice" to the public by interpreting the Clean Water Act to allow the use of streambeds for disposal of strip mine waste. Late Wednesday, U.S. District ladge Charles Haden II said if enforcing the law has the effect of preventing strip mining in steep Appalachian terrain, "it is up to Congress and the Legislature, but not this court, to alter the result." tors are required to reclaim the land after mining to a standard known as "approximate origi-nal contour," similar to the ter-rain that existed before mining.

nal contour," similar to the ter-rain that existed before mining. But in mountaintop re-moval mining, operators are ex-empted from that requirement. They strip away the rock and dirt above the coal seams and dispose of it in nearby streambeds, leaving a finished landscape that is flat or gently rolling, in contrast to the origi-nal terrain's steep hills and val-leys.

Operators say that because rock and dirt swells when it moves, it is impossible to re-turn all the excess material to the strip of the strip of the strip (fills to dispute over mountain-top removal came to a head last year, when the West Virginia Highlands Conservancy and a group of coalfield residents ar-

gued that the use of stream beds to dispose of rock violates the federal Clean Water Act.

In his ruling, Haden said the DEP director has a "nondiscretionary" duty to protect the state's waterways when issuing permits. Since valley fills are used for waste disposal, their use degrades water quality, violating the Clean Water Act, Haden said.

"Valley fills are waste disposal projects so enormous that, rather than the stream assimilating the waste, the waste assimilates the stream," "All the plaintiffs are resilieved and encouraged," said Cindy Rank, spokeswoman for the Highland encouraged, "said Cindy Rank, spokeswoman for the Highland ways believed that the law was meant to protect all our resources, including streams and people, much more than has been done in the past 10 years," she said.



The natural world is a beautiful place. I know that I'll never forget the first time I saw the majestic redwood trees of California captured on the pages of National Geographic. Sometimes we just don't realize the beauty our world contains until it is captured on film. The overall program – the largest chunk of the \$13.4 billion spent on federal programs for children in kindergarten through 12th grade – was up for renewal this year.

## Signs of drinking fountains woes



# **Russian conflict worsens**

GROZNY, Russia — Massive explosions rocked the heart of Grozny yesterday after salvos of rockets slammed into an open air market and other parts of the city. A Chechen official said 118 people were killed and up to 400 wounded.

Chechen officials claimed the rockets were fired by Russian forces moving in on the city. The Russian Defense Ministry in Moscow, however, "categorically denied" its forces were responsible for the blast. The city's central market was littered with bodies, severed body parts and pools of blood after six rockets exploded amid the stalls, which were considered to the city of the control of the city o

Magomed Magomadov, a senior government official, said that 118 people had been killed and 300 to 400 others wounded. Many of the injured were in critical condition, he said.

Hundreds of terrified people, many screaming and crying, ran for cover as the rockets exploded in the Grozyn market. Surrounding streets were almost with survivos and only the said of the survivors who staggered away from the devastated area. "It was dark and then all of a sudden, the place was illuminated and something was sparkling in the air. Then we heard the explosions," said Umar Madayev, a survivor. Grozny's already overcrowded and poorly equipped hospitals were packed with injured survivors. A handful of doctors, working with almost no drugs, operated on some survivors under the jare of kerosene lamps because there was no electricity.


