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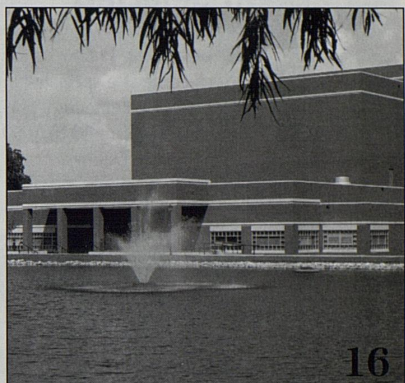

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## A&S Dean Selected

Howard Groth is the new dean of UK's College of Arts and Sciences. A Fellow of the American Physical Society, he is a specialist in quantum electrodynamics and elementary particle physics. He is the author of more than 90 research articles and co-author of a physics textbook.

He had been interim dean of the Eberly College of Science and professor of physics at The Pennsylvania State University. He joined Penn State as a research associate, was promoted to full professor in 1976 and appointed head of the Department of Physics in 1988, a position he still held when he decided to join the University of Kentucky.

## Special Art Exhibitions

Two special exhibitions are being featured at the UK Art Museum. *Something New Under the Sun: Recent Acquisitions* and *New Acquisitions: Photographs by Ansel Adams*. They honor the continuing and generous support the UK Art Museum receives through gifts of art, and celebrate the strength and diversity of its permanent collection.

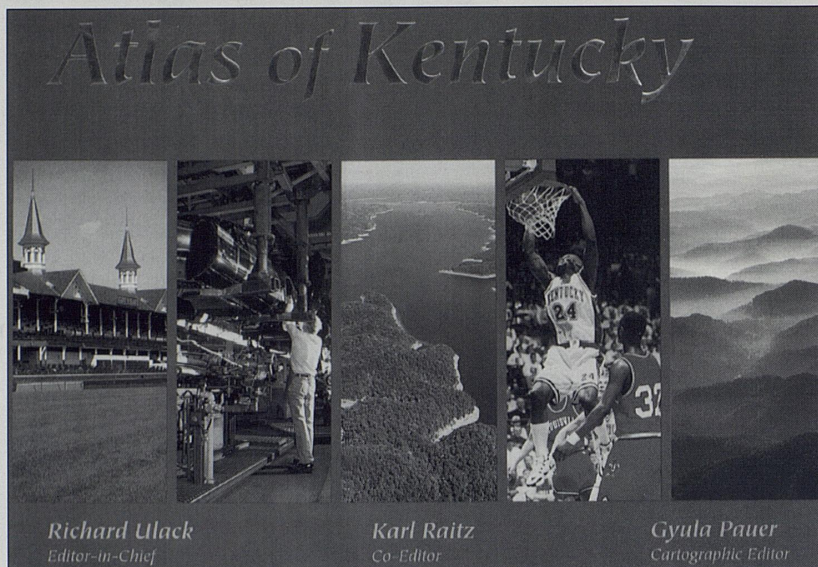

## Athletics Establishes Wethington Fellowship

Outstanding graduates from UK now have another option for fellowships at UK, thanks to the UK Athletic Association.

At its May meeting, the association established the Charles T. Wethington Jr. Graduate and Professional Fellowship Fund. Earnings from the \$500,000 quasi-endowment will be used to award fellowships annually to UK graduates who intend to enroll for graduate or professional study at the university.

UK athletics director C.M. Newton said the fund honors Wethington's "extraordinary contributions to the success of the athletics programs of the university . . . and to support his long-standing commitment to excellence in all of the university's programs."



## First Copy for the Governor

The first copy of the *New Atlas of Kentucky* was presented to Gov. Paul Patton in the capitol rotunda in Frankfort in May.

The atlas includes 200 photographs and more than 600 color maps and graphs addressing nearly every aspect of Kentucky land and life, including the natural environment, settlement patterns, population, communication, tourism and recreation, politics and urban growth. It is the first atlas of the state published in more than 20 years.

Production of the atlas involved faculty and staff from five state universities and likely will be of interest to those involved in business and industry, planning and development, state and local government as well as to aficionados of Kentucky history and trivia. Publication of the atlas was anticipated with the same enthusiasm as the University Press's two most successful books, the *Kentucky Encyclopedia* and *A New History of Kentucky*.

The University Press of Kentucky is a scholarly publisher serving the state's eight public universities, five of its private colleges and universities and two of its historical societies.

## New Collaboration for Chemistry and Engineering Graduate Students

A \$2.25 million National Science Foundation grant will establish a graduate program involving 15 UK chemistry and engineering students a year. The program, called the Integrative Graduate Education and Research Training Program, will provide classes and research training on the development of chemical sensors. UK's proposal was one of 18 funded by the NSF and was chosen from among 626 proposals. Nine professors from the departments of chemical and materials engineering, chemistry and electrical engineering will be involved. Leonidas Bachas of chemistry will be the program's director.

## Eighth Graders in Eastern Kentucky Qualify for Robinson Scholars Opportunity

One hundred and sixteen 8th graders from 29 eastern Kentucky counties are qualified for scholarships to UK under the Robinson Scholars Program. UK will pay tuition, room and board and fees if the students succeed in high school. The program is funded by earnings from mining and logging operations permitted on nearly 5,000 acres of the 14,000-acre Robinson Forest in Breathitt, Perry and Knott counties.

## Study Finds Optimism Boosts Immune System During Stress

An assistant professor of psychology at UK, Suzanne C. Segerstrom, is the principal author of a new study that shows higher levels and functions of the immune cells in people who confront stressful situations with optimistic attitudes.

Segerstrom, who joined the UK faculty last August, reports her findings in the latest issue of the American Psychological Association's *Journal of Personality and Social Psychology*.

The study says optimists tend to experience events as being less stressful and are less subject to negative moods such as anxiety and depression, which may account for the differences in the immune system.

## Benefits From Children's Miracle Network Show

The UK Children's Hospital, a part of the 11th annual Children's Miracle Network campaign in May to raise funds for 165 children's hospitals across North America, raised \$658,988 from the telecast. This brings the total of the 11-year fund-raising effort to \$4.9 million.

## Donovan Scholars in Research Project

A random sample of 168 Donovan Scholars has been selected to participate in a research project on the use of over-the-counter medications by the elderly. The study is being conducted by a doctoral student at the University of Mississippi's pharmaceutical marketing and management research program.

## LCC Receives Funds for Troubled Youth Program

The Lexington Community College Leadership Education Odyssey program, which provides leadership training for first- and second-time juvenile offenders has received \$3,000 from the Lexington Mayor's Office. The project was founded by faculty member Charlene Walker and provides a diversity program with LCC students serving as the trainers.

## UK Hospital Performs Firsts in Liver Transplants

The UK Hospital transplant surgeons performed central and eastern Kentucky's first kidney/liver transplant May 6. Dinesh Ranjan and Thomas Johnston led the surgical team. The recipient, a 60-year-old Frankfort woman, had been suffering from chronic kidney and liver disease for about three years and was discharged from the hospital less than two weeks after the surgery. Also, Johnston and Ranjan led a team that performed UK's first pediatric liver transplant May 18. The surgery was performed on a 13-year-old Eastern Kentucky girl who had been listed with the United Network for Organ Sharing since November 1997.

# Friend-Raising the Whitaker Handprint

Bob Whitaker retires as director of the UK Alumni Association July 31 after 23 years in alumni work, the last eight as director. While Bob guided the Association through an historic time, his legacy lies in the friend raising he did along the way.

Bob joined the Alumni Association as associate director in 1975. Responsible for the club program, he built the number of groups participating from 25 to over 60 from coast to coast, border to border before becoming the director in 1990. He encouraged the already established clubs like the Jefferson County Alumni Club, and "new" clubs like Birmingham. These clubs have since raised the bar in programming for current clubs everywhere.

When Bob was hired as director, Richard Bean of Louisville, then national association president, said Whitaker is "a man whose abilities we've come to appreciate and depend on over the years. Bob knows no strangers and has always made everyone feel as if he or she is a vital part of the Association." Reminded of his comments recently, Bean said, "Our faith in Bob's leadership has now been proven and we know that leadership has left the Association in good stead for the future."

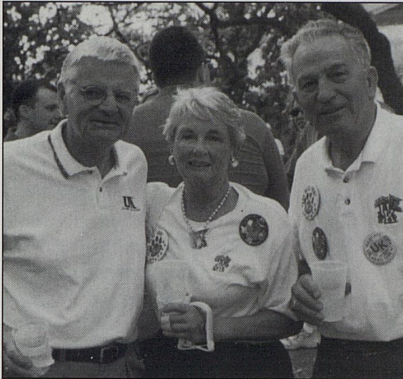
During his tenure, many a Wildcat alumnus and fan enjoyed the camaraderie of the basketball tournament trail, thanks to Bob. Alumni still talk about the 1993 pre-game party at Michal's in New Orleans and the festivities in San Antonio this year. The Wildcats racked up three championships during his time, and Bob

was right there at each one with a planning hand and a welcome smile for everyone. Bob also provided for the football faithful at the Peach Bowl and Hall of Fame Bowl appearances. There's nothing better than having a coach or university administrator for a club speaker, either. With Bob's help, UK representatives have always been willing to show up all over the state and the country from time to time.

"We'll really miss him," observed athletic director C.M. Newton. "We all, coaches and administrators, spent a lot of time on the road with Bob. He's one of those people who kind of stays in the background by choice, yet his handprint is everywhere. There's no question about his leadership of the Association."

But, only half of the job takes place out among the alumni. The other half takes place on campus. Bob led the Association in three historic events in the life of the university and the association. For the first time since becoming a dues organization, the association participated in a fund-raising campaign, the campaign to build the William T. Young Library. Participation in the campaign was then surpassed by the association becoming one of the integral partners in the construction plan for the new facility. It will be a beacon on campus far into the next century. It already has enhanced the academic stature of the University of Kentucky.

"I just have to commend Bob for his leadership and the role the Association plays in the life of the university," says Joseph T. Burch, vice president for univer-

sity relations. "Today all of the leaders of the Alumni Association and its members feel very close to the university and its leadership because of Bob who is held in such high esteem. Bob leaves the Association in great shape financially, in terms of membership, and with the house renovation, he leaves the facility in great shape as well. Personally, I'll miss Bob very much. He has become a great friend. I know we will miss him more than we expect."

Bob's final project is the renovation of the King Alumni House. The house is getting its first total makeover since it was built in 1963-64. The original black and white floor in the foyer has been replaced with Brazilian cherry wood with the UK logo ensconced in the center in walnut. Changes include a new color scheme (beige and blue), new ceilings, new lighting, re-upholstered furniture and a usable patio area with access through French doors off the library.

Among the final tributes to Bob were the act by an anonymous friend who designated a Fellow's membership for Bob and his wife, Julia Ann; and, the establishment of the Bob C. Whitaker Scholarship Endowment in English. Bob, a journalism graduate with a great love of good writing and good books, hopes the fund will provide a stipend for an aspiring creative writer. Perhaps that person will follow in the footsteps of other UK alumni like Walter Tevis, Bobbie Anne Mason, Guerney Norman, Ed McClanahan, James Baker Hall or Lynn Hightower.

# Come and Smell the Roses

*You've heard this before.  
Wherever you go, there you are.  
So go someplace nice.*

Try the arboretum on UK's campus. It's beautiful and quiet and could get to be habit forming.

Not too far from Commonwealth Stadium on Alumni Drive, there are about 100 acres known as the UK

Arboretum. It's a unique cultural asset for the entire state.

A 99-year agreement with the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government provided a \$500,000 contribution to the arboretum. In return, UK is fully responsible for its maintenance. The land is reserved for "passive recreation."

The first director of the arboretum is Mary Witt, who had a long-term career at

UK as an extension professor in horticulture. This post-retirement career is one that she approaches with enthusiasm and energy. As Lexington mayor Pam Miller said, "no garden can flourish without an able gardener."

Being developed in stages, the first phase of the master plan, completed in 1991, features a 1.5 acre home demonstration garden of ornamental and edible plants. The garden includes arbors, walls, fences, patios and benches that serve as backdrops to plant displays. It's what many people try to do in their home landscape—take that half-acre or quarter-acre and meld it into living spaces, or little rooms. For example, by following an S-shaped path in the demonstration garden visitors find an especially appealing little room, the butterfly garden. This area is lush with plants that include orange Butterfly Milkweed, purple Coneflowers, yellow Thread Leaf Coreopsis, orange/red Blackberry Lilies, and Shasta Daisies.

Another must-see are the roses donated by agronomy professor Tim Phillips. Because Phillips is living in a rented home where it's too shady for roses, and because he wanted a permanent home for them, he moved more than 150 plants to the arboretum. He continues to care for them and works about five hours a week at the arboretum, usually in the evening. He likes being there so he can "enjoy other things at the arboretum while I keep the roses nice." He also appreciates having them where more people can see them.

The collection includes what he calls the usual modern roses including miniatures, floribundas, grandifloras hybrid teas and eight David Austin English roses. He has planted 144 new plants just inside the Home Demonstration Garden entrance gate.

"The arboretum's rose collection could easily be further expanded," Phillips says. "For example, a larger AARS (All American Rose Selection) trial and test garden could be installed." A natural parent group for such an effort would be the Lexington Rose Society.

A two-mile display of native plants of the seven physiographic areas of Kentucky is called the Walk Across Kentucky. Parts of it are not completely planted, but the bluegrass area is about 80 percent done.

Right now the staff and volunteers have a bad case of the 'we-wantas' for the arboretum. They want things like a visitor-education center with constant program-

ming, a full staff of 10 or 12 people, a winter garden "so that we'll have year 'round appeal," a water feature of some kind, a children's garden, an amphitheater, and, adds Witt, "we're even dreaming in terms of a Japanese garden."

Nearly all colleges have arboreta, says

Witt. "We want a green area on our campus for our students to have a place to relax and put it together. A quiet place . . . low key . . . green spaces on campuses are becoming rare, and an arboretum is a refuge. It's a way the university gives back to the community as well.

Although there is no specific picnic area, people bring their blankets and picnic baskets nearly every day of the year. Witt, who sees her role as "guardian of the arboretum master plan," says that an area near the parking lot would be a good place to set up picnic tables. "When 100 fourth-graders on a field trip get off the bus with their lunches, we really need a place for them to gather." The arboretum is popular for field trips, and is sometimes an extra stop to or from trips to the Singletary Center for the Arts and the Lexington Children's Museum.

Witt thinks her favorite time of the year at the arboretum is September or October when the annuals are in full bloom and the trees are colored. But then she says, "we have a beautiful spring . . . we planted 5,000 bulbs . . . well, summertime is nice, too, with the perennials . . ." The low time is winter. "That's one of the reasons we need a conservatory that could be utilized year 'round."

Even though UK's physical plant employees take care of the day-to-day maintenance of the arboretum, volunteers are always needed to lead tours, help raise money, do publicity, produce newsletters, and work on the grounds. "Right now," says Witt, "we have 38 adopt-a-plot groups or individuals who actually maintain a portion of the garden area. We have families, Boy Scouts, 4-H groups . . . the size of the plots vary according to what the volunteer wants to do."

Under the management of Susan Capley-Vinton '97, everyone who works at the arboretum is encouraged to demonstrate responsible landscape management techniques. It's a teaching/learning situation for all of the volunteers as well as the UK personnel who work there.

The herb garden and the vegetable garden are being managed by the Fayette

County Master Gardeners.

Marcia Farris '70, president of Friends of the Arboretum, feels that people need to feel ownership of the arboretum. "I find there is nothing like a few hours of pruning, seeding, planting, weeding or just general cleanup to make me feel I can lay claim to a portion of it."

An individual membership in Friends of the Arboretum is \$25. Membership benefits include 10 percent off at participating garden centers, advance notice of upcoming arboretum events, invitations to "members only" events, and special cultural and educational opportunities.

And, of course, money is needed to implement the master plan that includes the desired buildings, the children's garden and other special plant collections. Witt is concerned about the lack of facilities on the grounds. There are no rest rooms or water fountains there, either.

Public hours are dawn to dusk. There is no electricity now, and as Witt says, "it gets dark out there, and we don't want people getting hurt."

So, while daylight is lingering longer, bring your picnic, your kids, your book, your kite, your camera, and enjoy the UK Arboretum. IT'S FREE!!!

An arboretum is an ever-evolving thing, and as such, Witt invites and values comments from others. "We're in the process of strategic planning and we value all input. We've finished phase one of the master plan. We're ready to implement phase two and are trying to prioritize."

# A Loaf of Bread . . .

Like to eat?

'How's this sound? Start with a Caesar salad and some poppy seed muffins, then choose from lemon chicken, herbed baked fish, or pasta with marinara sauce, add a vegetable medley or rice pilaf, following all that either Mississippi mud cake or caramel custard, and of course, your choice of beverage.

All for \$6.50 at the Lemon Tree Restaurant, a student-run dining experience tucked away in old Erickson Hall on the second floor.

The Lemon Tree, open each Tuesday and Thursday for lunch during the fall and spring semesters, is operated by the College of Human Environmental Sciences as part of the curriculum for NSG 342, quantity food preparation, a required course for dietetics and hospitality majors.

With a capacity for about 45 patrons, reservations are a must and usually have to be made well in advance. Alumni are welcome among the usual clientele of faculty, staff, and students.

Claire Schmelzer, who oversees the Lemon Tree, also is program director for hospitality management, which includes students preparing for careers in the restaurant, hotel or the tourism industry.

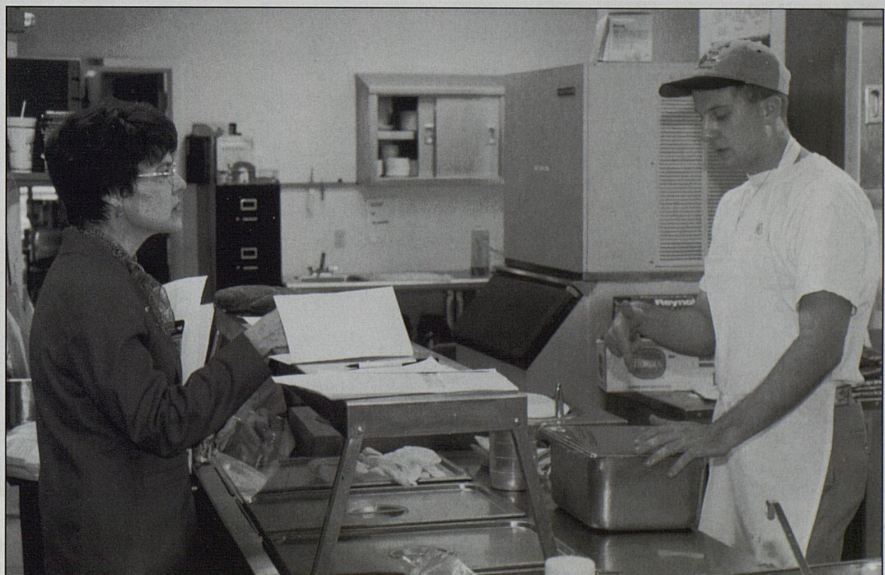
The course is worth five credit hours. Lectures cover principles of management as they relate to food production, and food production sites. The lab is The Lemon Tree, where students are required to work four-and-a-half hours each week.

On Tuesdays and Thursdays, from 9:00 a.m. until 1:00 p.m., each student has a particular responsibility, so the team as a whole produces, serves and cleans up after each meal. Usually 10 students work in the kitchen, and four of those also will serve.

"It's interesting," Schmelzer says, "how much students dread going into this class . . .

"I say they dread taking the class, but when they finish, it's interesting

how they talk about it. For the most part they like it and have developed a camaraderie and major appreciation of the complexity of preparing food for the public."

But, "Some of them just never like it, and we understand that . . ."

Moira Tidball from Rochester, New York, is one of the two TAs who teach the class. She explains that some of the students feel threatened by the class because "the most they've ever made is toast - so think how they feel about coming in here

and preparing a four-course gourmet meal." She recalls an incident when a student misread a recipe for mashed potatoes and added four quarts (instead of four cups) of milk to the mixture. "So, we made it into potato soup."

Tidball, who received her master's degree in community nutrition this May, hopes to go to work for a public health agency in Washington, D.C.

On this Thursday morning around 10 o'clock, three students are in the dining room scooting tables and chairs around

for the expected lunch crowd. Scanning the reservation list as they work, snatches of conversation include . . . "where do we want the birthday person to sit . . . is Dean Walker on the list today . . . we need another menu here . . . who has this eight-top . . ."

Meanwhile things are steaming up in the kitchen. Marc Haines, a TA from Lexington, who now manages the McDonald's restaurant where he has worked since high school, moves quickly among the students, offering encouragement and practical advice. "You might want to use one (a pan) a little deeper. The ziti gets real tall."

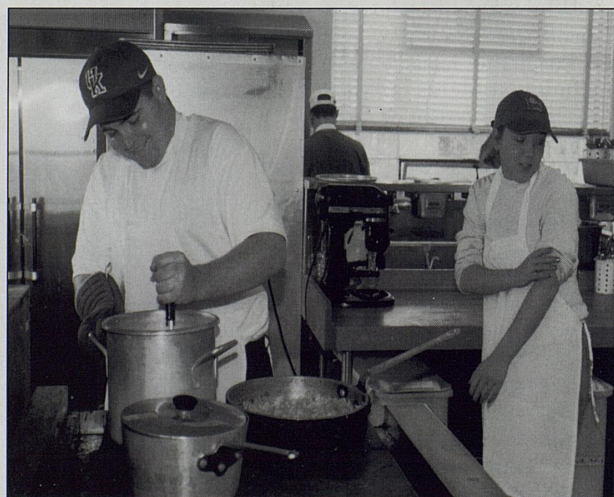
The kitchen is crowded, hot, busy, loud, . . . and sometimes fun. Over the din, from the back of the room, Haines is heard to exclaim, "I have exorcised the demons! This refrigerator is CLEAN!"

Today's menu: broccoli and cheese soup, pepper bread sticks, a choice of baked ziti with four cheese sauce, Creole shrimp with rice, or stuffed pork chops, with parsley potatoes or southern style green beans, followed by amaretto cheesecake or brownie fudge nut pie.

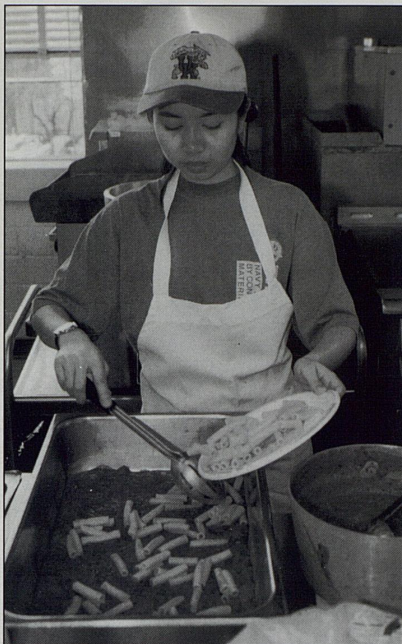
Libby Allen of UK Food services is manager of both the Lemon Tree and Block and Barrel Deli, situated right next door. Block and Barrel is open 7:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m., Monday through Friday offering bagels, pastries, gourmet coffees, a variety of soups, chili, hot and cold sandwiches and fruits. This is the second year

of a partnership between the two eateries. Money generated by the deli supports the Lemon Tree teaching lab, as well as the deli "holding our own," says Allen.

"We are not a culinary program. Ideally we would have a chef who could manage the kitchen and also teach culinary skills at the same time. That would be really great - I hope we can do that sometime."

Grades are based on how well each student functions as a team member, how well they follow instructions, how much responsibility they take in completing the day's assignment - "how well they handle the whole operation in general. Because," says Schmelzer, "it really is a team-building experience."

Hospitality is an industry of growing popularity. Schmelzer says that in 1992 there were 29 students in the hospitality management program. Now there are 110. In that same five years, the dietetics program has grown from 50 students to 150.

A teaching lab for the past 20 years, many UK faculty, staff and students on central campus are already familiar with the student-prepared meals at the Lemon Tree. Erickson Hall is within easy walking

distance of McVey Hall, the Chemistry-Physics Building, the Gatton College of Business and Economics, the Law School, and the College of Engineering complex.

There are several regulars, people who eat every week at the Lemon Tree. And, regarding these health-conscious times, Schmelzer says, "We've tried to do things like limit fat in meals and offer nutritional desserts . . . but you know, they don't sell very well. It seems people just want to pay

the money, enjoy the meal, and eat light at other times."

## Lemon Tree Pepper Bread Sticks

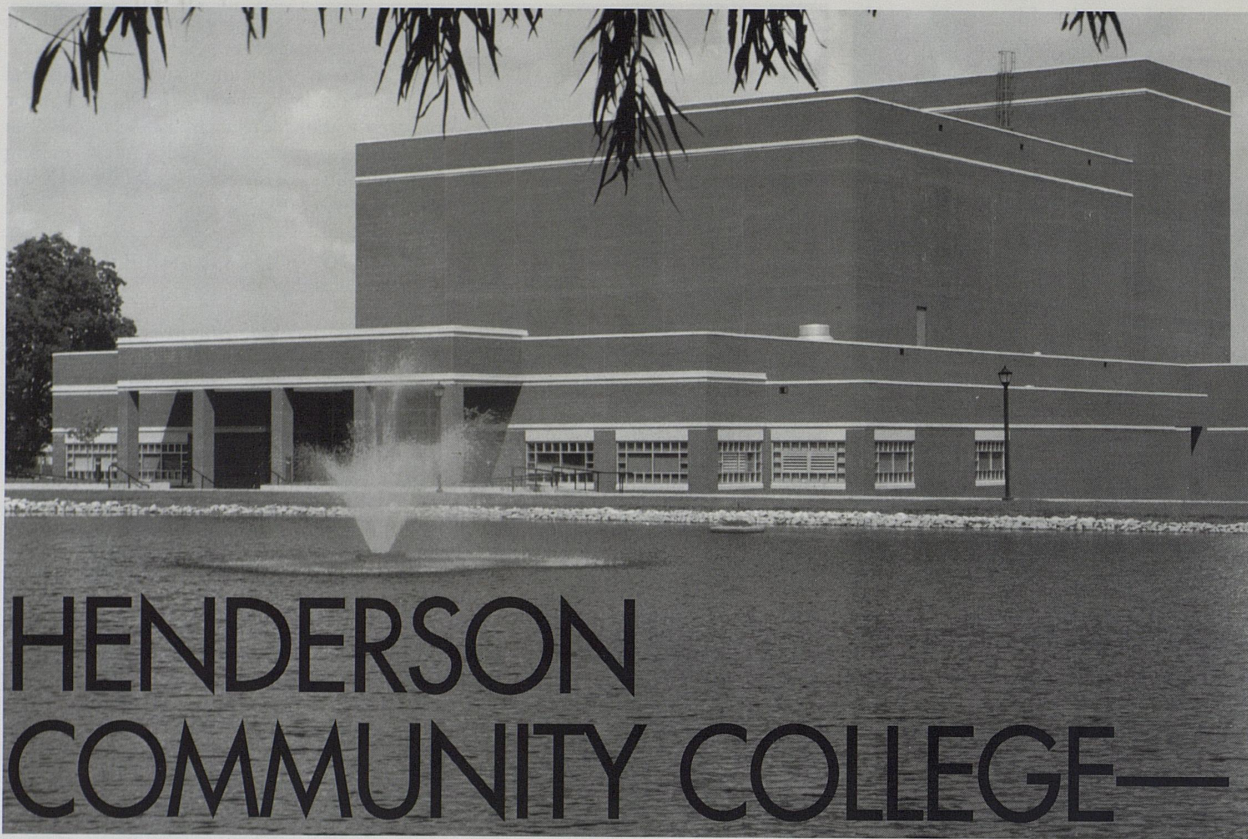


Rolling enough pepper bread sticks to serve the lunch crowd keeps Phil Dieckhoff on the job for a while. Dieckhoff, a senior hospitality major from Elizabethtown, created the bread sticks recipe.

### Ingredients

- In large mixer bowl, combine 3 (4 1/2) C flour, yeast salt, sugar, rosemary, Parmesan cheese and pepper; mix well.
- In a large glass bowl, microwave water and oil until water (120-130 degrees). Add to flour mixture.
- Blend at low speed until moistened; beat 3 more minutes at medium speed. Gradually stir in enough remaining flour to make a firm dough. Knead 5 more minutes.
- Place in a greased bowl, turning to grease top. Cover and refrigerate until ready to use and it has risen.
- Punch down dough. Divide into 12 equal parts. Divide each part into 6 pieces. Roll each piece into a 12-inch rope. Place 1 inch apart on greased cookie sheets.
- Combine egg white and water; brush tops of breadsticks. Sprinkle with sesame seed. Bake at 400 for 25 to 30 minutes until deep golden brown.



# HENDERSON COMMUNITY COLLEGE—

## *A Hallmark of Adaptability*

There is a quiet place in the University of Kentucky Community College System.

It's located a short walk on the back side of Henderson Community College — a double row of tall oak trees that probably lined the old farm road.

Walk back there with Henderson Community College President Pat Lake and feel it happen. Tensions ease, tempers soften, and life in general doesn't look too bad.

Henderson Community College is one of the seven original colleges in the 1964 founding of the UK Community College System. Operating in Henderson since 1960 — originally as the Northwest Extension Center — it sits on a 120-acre site off U.S. 60 about four miles west of Henderson. The land was purchased and given to the university by a group of concerned citizens.

When then Gov. A.B. "Happy" Chandler came to Henderson for the groundbreaking in 1959, it was reported that he was welcomed by a number of these local leaders including Dr. Robert H. English and former Henderson Mayor Hecht Lackey — names which have become synonymous with the college campus as in the English Student Center and the Lackey Administration Building.

After twelve years as president, Lake points with pride to a variety of accomplishments at Henderson Community College —

not the least of which are the physical improvements that have been made on the campus.

"Most people look at the obvious — new Fine Arts Center, the Academic Technical Building, the renovated administration building, the landscaping, the parking lots. However, I am more proud of the achievements of our faculty, staff, and academic programs," he said.

Not only have other people noted these accomplishments, many attribute them directly to the leadership of Pat Lake. Jacqueline Addington, who recently finished her first year as president of Owensboro CC, pointed to Lake as one reason she became a candidate for the presidency.

"Owensboro and Henderson share a number of academic programs and activities. They are so close — only about 30 miles apart. I welcomed the opportunity to come to Owensboro and work with such a talented, proven leader as Dr. Lake," she said.

Mary Gail Wilder, division chair in biological sciences and professor of nursing, has been active at the college since the 1960s.

"Working with Dr. Lake is really fun," she said. "He provides our programs with the best, state-of-the-art equipment, and insists on an informed, professional staff. At the same time, he welcomes new ideas. In fact, he will back any idea that contributes to our graduates being among the best in the nation."

Wilder laughed about several "ideas" that bombed. "We've done some crazy things, but Dr. Lake always says failure is part of the learning process," she said.

Some educators around the state are said to look "with envy" at Henderson CC. Although it is among the smallest of the UK community colleges, the college was among the first to have computers and be on-line with the Internet. In fact, Henderson has led the way in many areas since it was founded.

Henderson's two-year nursing program was the first in the UK Community College System. Its *Literary Magazine* has published every year since 1962 — making it among the oldest current literary magazines in Kentucky. The college newspaper, *The Hill*, places at the top in most college newspaper contests it enters and was the first in the UKCCS to publish on the Web.

The dental hygiene mobile training unit has begun the second year of its three-year stay at Henderson CC. There are two units that travel throughout the community college system — one in the western half of the state and the other in the eastern half. Lake would like to expand the program and develop a one+one curriculum with Kentucky TECH that would combine the delivery of didactic instruction (lectures) over interactive television and the completion of laboratory work in local dental offices.

"This would eliminate the inconvenience of waiting for the mobile dental program to come to your area," Lake explained. "Now only two colleges can offer the program at one time. If this plan were implemented, our colleges could be more responsive to local employers."

Community leaders such as Bruce Begley, executive director of the Henderson Community Methodist Hospital, take great pride in the community college and the significant role it plays in the community. The partnership between the college and the hospital is long-standing — as evidenced by the scholarships HCMH provides for many nursing students at the college each semester.

Last year, the hospital gave the college \$100,000 for an endowed professorship in nursing.

"The HCMH Endowed Professorship will be awarded to a deserving nursing faculty member for a two-year period," Lake said.

Requirements for the award state the recipient must have "demonstrated excellence and the potential

for continued excellence in the field of nursing education."

In addition to studies in health-related careers, one of the more popular majors at Henderson is the human services technology program. Graduates work in social service agencies throughout the region. Many opt to transfer to one of the regional universities or to colleges in Southern Indiana.

"Overall, we have experienced a balance of growth. Our faculty is familiar with the needs of the community," Lake said. "They are not complacent."

Lake encourages his faculty and staff to take new approaches to new ideas, to train and retrain in the use of new technology, and to engage in long-range planning. "We have been known to marshal several sources of money in order to get the technology when and where it's needed."

One of the first observations Lake made when he took over the reins at Henderson CC was the linkage between the college and the community. "I determined that one of my first responsibilities would be to reconnect the community to Henderson Community College."

Lake's observation proved well-founded. Local leaders were quick to respond to his efforts. In 1989 the college launched its first major fund drive — a

community effort to raise money for the new Fine Arts Center and the Academic Technical Building. The fund-raising campaign ended about the time it kicked-off — the \$600,000 goal was exceeded in 90 days.

This past year over 50,000 people visited the Fine Arts Center for concerts, stage productions, art exhibits and other special events. "We take pride in the fact that the people of Henderson consider this their building," Lake said.

"People love the college," said Bill Clements, senior vice president and branch manager at Hilliard Lyons who played a major role in that first fund drive. "When someone from the college or the university speaks at our Rotary Club they always ask, 'who's involved at the college?' Virtually every hand goes up."

Clements was the lead gift chair in the college's \$3 million plus Partners in Progress Campaign.

"I first met Dr. Lake when our children played soccer together," Clements said. "It wasn't until we started working together to raise money

for the college that I realized that he is much more than my first impression — a professor at the college.”

Clements, who refers to himself as a salesman, talks with pride of his success in “teaching the professor the skills of salesmanship.”



“When we first started calling on people Pat was laid back, watching me,” Clements said. “Then he got caught up in the excitement of going after the big bucks. After two or three presentations, he was leading the way. We’ve spent a lot of time together and had a lot of fun raising money for a good cause.”

Clements agreed to work on the campaign for several reasons — the top one being personal. “I want our children who are not financially or academically secure to have the opportunity to learn and compete in an international environment. I want them to train on the Internet and experience new technology,” he said.

“Pat Lake has the foresight to know what’s best for our community,” Clements said. “He recognizes the importance of developing a highly trained work force.”

One of Lake’s dreams for the future of Henderson CC is that it become “the hallmark of adaptability.”

“If you were to drop into the year 2005, you probably would not find many physical differences in the campus,” Lake said. “Unless we have a dramatic increase in students, most of our buildings are in place. However, I would hope that you see a dramatic difference in the way we teach.”

Lake foresees a combination of the traditional face-to-face teaching with lectures on the Internet. He sees more use of interactive television, satellite courses, and quicker responses to the needs of the organizations served.

He pointed to the varying skills in high school graduates as a major factor in changes that will be made in the curriculum. “Life-long learning — the third part of our mission — will become much more prominent in the future,” he said. “We will be expected to offer more short-term, expedient courses.”

Lake, who has served as Henderson CC’s president since 1986, is a product of Kentucky’s community colleges. He and Sally, his wife of 30 years and sweetheart since junior high school in Ashland, are both graduates of Ashland Community College.

Prior to his appointment at Henderson CC, he served as the academic dean at Jefferson CC’s Downtown Campus.

Sally Lake also works in the UK Community College System. She is a professor and director of the Learning Assistance Department at Owensboro CC.

Not only the community colleges, but the University of Kentucky has played a major role in the life of Pat Lake and his family. The entire family — Pat, Sally, daughter Erin and son Ryan — are UK alumni. The elder Lakes graduated in 1969, Erin in 1995 and Ryan, in May 1997.

In the past several years, between the obligatory professional meetings and the normal family college visits, one or more of the Lake family cars have averaged at least one trip to Lexington a week.

The family doesn’t complain too much about the travel. They know it won’t be long before they return home to their quiet place.

## Cum Laude Achievements

I hope that each of you is enjoying your summer. It is a busy one here at the University of Kentucky.

As we prepare for the next academic year, I hope we will remind ourselves of the accomplishments of the 1997-1998 year.

Perhaps the most important, and certainly the most prominent, among the past year's achievements were the opening of the new William T. Young Library and winning the NCAA Men's Basketball championship. I know I can never forget the sheer beauty and enjoyment that each of these brought to UK alumni and followers worldwide.

But there was so much more to report over the past year. Permit me to mention just a few of the highlights.

I am delighted at the action of the Kentucky General Assembly which this year authorized the \$100 million Research Challenge Trust Fund. UK will be eligible for two-thirds of these dollars by raising pri-

vate matching funds.

This is in addition to \$4 million in recurring research dollars made available in 1997 by the state and also matched by the University. Thanks to the efforts of the Kentucky state legislature, this is the first real opportunity UK has had to say to prospective donors that the state is willing to match private contributions for research purposes. This is a great opportunity to begin to move toward becoming a top 20 public research university.

This welcome funding came on the heels of the report of the Reedy Task Force on Research and Graduate Education that identified University-wide areas of strength and targets of opportunity for attracting national and international interest and attention

A year-long effort involving the active participation of faculty, staff and students from throughout the University has led to the development of a new, five-year Strategic Plan for the University of Kentucky. This plan is the blueprint that will set the tone for the allocation of resources in meeting pinpointed goals and objectives. I am pleased with the success the University has achieved in meeting the vast majority of key objectives in the University's previous, five-year Strategic Plan, and look forward to even greater progress in reaching future goals.

A significant change of the past year was the transfer of the day-to-day management of 13 of the 14 community colleges from the University to the newly-formed Kentucky Community and Technical College System. I am pleased that UK will continue to be very much involved in the approval and degree-granting process of the academic programs of these institutions. Management of Lexington Community College remains with the University. The new engineering building

in Paducah is the latest example of the tremendous cooperation that has long existed between these communities and the campus in Lexington.

New technology is keeping UK at the forefront of higher education. One of the best illustrations of this is our participation with five other southeastern universities in the creation of the high-speed data network that provides researchers access to information up to 30 times faster than before. It's called the South East Partnership to Share Computational Resources (SEPSCoR).

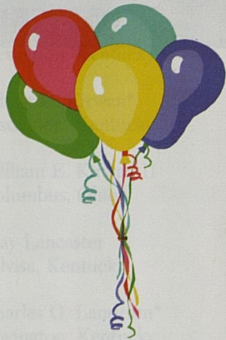
In May we were able to initiate It's About Staff, the new system involving an improved and streamlined evaluation, job classification and compensation system that provides a far more equitable method of administering these important personnel functions for UK employees.

And, the UK Athletic Association has renegotiated a more equitable lease for the continued use of Rupp Arena, a lease that gives the University a number of good options for the future, all focused on providing our students, alumni and other fans tremendous facilities for watching the Wildcats play basketball.

Of course, this University, like any major corporate or governmental entity, does not operate in a one-year time capsule. Virtually every accomplishment that we have achieved during the past year is part of a multi-year effort of progress and advancement, designed to meet specific goals and objectives.

I will be reporting to you on these later in the academic year, but for now let's get ready for the second season of Hal Mumme's exciting brand of college football. Get out the blankets, air out the K flag and check out the thermos as we prepare to cheer for Tim Couch and his teammates.

Thanks as always for everything you do in support of UK.
