EXHIBITS AT ART MUSEUM

Works by the late Lexington artist Victor Hammer, including "The Resurrection" and other religious works are currently on display at the University of Kentucky Art Museum in the Singletary Center for the Arts. The exhibit opened March 19 and will remain up until May 28.

An exhibit of the works of the painter and printmaker Harlan Hubbard will open at the Art Museum on Sunday, April 2 and remain on view until June 4. There will be an opening reception and a lecture by Wendell Berry, the Kentucky writer, on Sunday, April 2, at 3:00 p.m. The exhibition is presented in conjunction with Mr. Berry's 1989 Blazer Lecture on Harlan Hubbard.

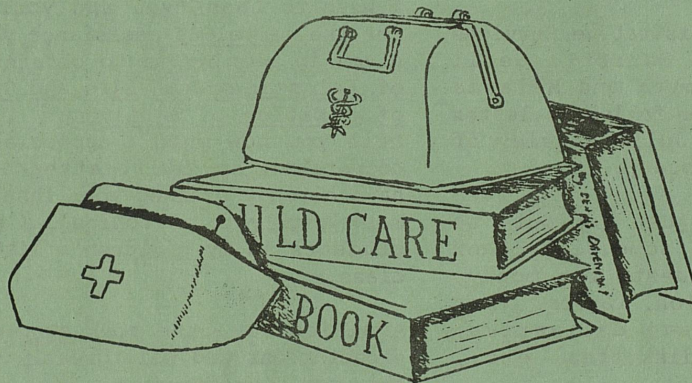
