# Gov. Wilkinson won't get honorary degree

#### Action breaks long-held tradition of conferring honor to governors

UK will depart from tradition for only the second time in more than 50 years by not recommending Kentucky Gov. Wallace Wilkinson for an honorary de-

Four informed sources have told the Kentucky Kernel that Wilkinson was not among the list of candidates submitted to the UK Board of Trustees for approval by the presidentially appointed honorary degrees committee.

Aside from Gov. Louie B. Nunn, who was elected in 1987, but did not receive an honorary degree until 1970, Wilkinson will be the only governor who has not received the honor within two years of being elected.

University officials have expressed privately that reporting that Wilkinson was not recommended for an honorary degree could lead to a cooling of relations between the governor and UK President David Roselle.

Some officials had perceived the relationship as improving, pointing to a recent lunch between the governor and the president at Maxwell Place following the announcement of a \$1 million gift from Toyota U.S.A, Inc. to the UK library system.

A review of trustees' minutes and graduation programs dating back to the early part of this century shows that since 1907, only four Kentucky governors have not been given an honorary degrees. All four governors held office before 1935.

Since Nunn received his honorary Doctorate of Laws in 1970, every Kentucky governor has received an honorary degree from UK within two years after being elected.

Yesterday's vote by the University Senate is the next to last step for final approval. The graduate faculty also approved the committee's recommendation at its January meeting.

The Board of Trustees, which has final say on all honorary degree nominees, will consider the candidates at its meeting, which will be held in March.

Fearing that word might leak about whom the honorary degree candidates are, the University Senate closed its meeting to the public yesterday.

No one interviewed after the meeting would comment on who the other candidates for honorary degrees are.

Most of the faculty members and administrators familiar with the process of approving honorary degree candidates declined to comment about the meeting, because they did not want to risk the University's reputation.

## Reagan involved in aiding contra nations, Sullivan says

WASHINGTON — Former President Reagan "participated personally and directly" in giving favored treatment to countries that supported the contras in Nicaragua, lawyers for Oliver North say in a court filing aimed at having charges against their client dropped.

North attorney Brendan Sullivan, opposing a compromise between the independent counsel and the Justice Department, said in court papers released yesterday that that proposed deal on keeping certain secrets out of the trial would prevent him from introducing this evidence which he said was central to North's defense.

He also criticized Attorney Gen-

He also criticized Attorney General Dick Thornburgh for declining "to take the political heat" and make a separate secrets-protecting move that could lead to charges being thrown out. Sullivan said. "At the heart of this case are the quid pro quo and this case are the quid pro quo and the second protection obtained military support for the resistance during the so-called Boland Amendments, and the policy that those third-country arrangements would not be disclosed outside a limited group of executive branch officials."

The Boland amendments, passed

by Congress, restricted and at times prohibited the spending of federal funds in support of the guerrilla war against the leftist government in Nicaragua.

Former National Security Adviser John Poindexter testified at the congressional Iran-contra hearings in 1987 that Reagan favored making up for that lack of official U.S. support with money from other nations. But the assertion that Reagan was personally involved in arranging to return the favors is new.

Patricia Woods, a 64 forward, heads up the Tiger offensive attack by scoring 144 points a game and hauling down about five boards a contest. 



## Shipman shouldn't get shock probation

A few days after the September drunken driving accident that killed one UK student, critically injured another and sent a third to jail, Howard Kinney of the Alcohol Beverage Control Board summed up the incident:
"This is a perfect example of how three lives can be wasted."

"This is a perfect example of how three lives can be wasted."

Now, attention has turned to the possibility that this tragedy can be used to prevent other lives from being wasted in similar alcohol-related accidents.

Bradley J. Shipman, a Zoy-ear-old former UK student, consumed 14 nine-ounce beers before the Sept. 7 car accident. He admitted to police after the crash that he was "showing off" his new car. As a result, UK student Lisa Whalen was killed and Michael Thomas Swerczek, also a student, was critically injured.

Shipman was sentenced to two concurrent five-year prison terms in December. He spent the Christmas holidays at the Fayette County Dentention Center. He is being held at a minimum-security lacility in Marion County.

Last week, Shipman's attorneys motioned that Fayette Circuit Judge James E. Keller allow Shipman to be placed on shock probation. Shock probation is a procedure where an individual serves an abbreviated prison term and is then placed on probation for one to five years. It is intended to "shock" individuals like Shipman, who have committed serious but unintentional crimes.

In support of shock probation, the attorneys argue that if Shipman is released from prison and allowed to speak at high schools and colleges around the country about his experience, it may prevent accidents like his from occurring again. On the other hand, they argue, if Shipman is tucked away in a state prison for the full prison term, his story will be forgotten and little good will come of it. We disagree.

Officials from several of the state's correctional institutions say that no hard evidence exists to support the argument that a Shipman speaking circuit will be effective in deterring drunken driving. Also, they say, it is possible for Shipman — who will undoubtedly be held in a minimum security institution — to speak outside of prison on a limited basis while serving his term.

In a Sept. 21 editorial, the Kernel said that stricter penalties for DUI offenders should be implemented. We still feel that way. Although Bradley J. Shipman's crime was unintentional, it was serious. A person died as a result of his actions. Judge Keller has the opportunity, with Shipman's case, to show that regardless of the age, social standing or prior police record, an individual is responsible for his actions.

Baker leaves missile dispute behind By BARRY SCHWEID Associated Press

made in Western European pub-lic opinion.
"There is just an attraction, an intriguing quality to Gorba-chev that you have to answer somehow," said the official, who participated in most of the meetings Baker has held on his trip.

"We have no answer," the of-ficial told reporters as Baket flew back to West Germany for talks with Chancellor Helmut Kohl and Foreign Minister Hans-Dietrich Genscher.

Hans-Dietrich Genscher. Responding to strong disara-mament trends among the Ger-man people, Kohl last week pro-posed a delay of two or three years in upgrading the short-range Lance missile deployed in the country.

The North Atlantic Treaty Organization faces a decision in a few months on whether to double the range of the U.S.-built rockets from 70 miles to about 150 miles.

After talking to the chan-cellor, Baker told reporters he hoped the issue could be settled at a NATO summit meeting, which is being planned for late May in Brussels.
