JOHN Y. BROWN, JR.
Governor of Kentucky



JOHN Y. BROWN, JR., became Kentucky's 55th governor on December 11, 1979, succeeding Julian M. Carroll.

Born on December 28, 1933, Governor Brown graduated from Lafayette High School in his hometown, Lexington, and obtained a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Kentucky in 1957. He graduated from the UK College of Law in 1960.

The Governor served in the U. S. Army from 1959-1965.

He has been named the Outstanding Young Man of America by the National

Junior Chamber of Commerce (1965), as one of the Outstanding Civic Leaders of America (1967) and Louisville's Outstanding Young Man by the same group. Lions Club International named him to a recipient of the Outstanding American Award (1974) and he is the youngest person to be named to the University of Kentucky Hall of Fame.

He has three children, John Y. Brown, III (16), Eleanore (14) and Sandra (13). He is married to the former Phyllis George. They attend the Walnut Street Church, Louisville.

JAMES G. AMATO
Mayor
Lexington-Fayette
Urban County Government

JAMES G. AMATO took office as mayor on January 2, 1978. In doing so, he became the second mayor of the consolidated city and county governments.

A native of Lexington, Amato has been a practicing attorney since 1964. He is a member of the Fayette County Bar Association, the Kentucky Bar Association, and the Kentucky Law Enforcement. He formerly held positions as Alcoholic Beverage Control Commissioner for the Commonwealth of Kentucky, Director of Citizens for Judicial Improvement, Inc., Municipal Court Judge and City Prosecutor.

As chief executive of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, the mayor is authorized to supervise, administer and control all departments of government.

The mayor is elected on a non-partisan ballot every four years. He is assisted principally by the Chief Administrative Officer and commissioners of the six departments.

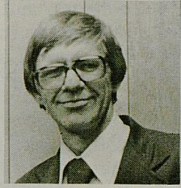

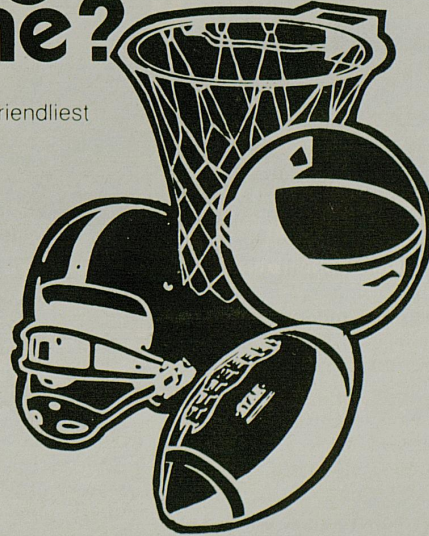

DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY
President, University of Kentucky

The University of Kentucky has become one of the major institutions of higher learning in the United States under the leadership of Dr. Otis Singletary, the eighth president of the University.

Dr. Singletary was named president

of the University in August, 1969. He had previously served as executive vice-chancellor for academic affairs in the University of Texas System and director of the Job Corps program for the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Dr. Singletary, a native of Gulfport, Miss., holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University.

As president of the principal institu-

tion of higher learning in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land-grant institution, a "people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

In the nine years he has been president, the University has grown to where there are now more than 22,000 students on the Lexington campus and more than 17,000 students in UK's 13 community colleges, and the University has become one of the major research institutions in the country.

Recognition of his service to the University was evidenced by the UK Alumni Association, which presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award—an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

Dr. Singletary is the author of two books and several monographs.

A Navy veteran of World War II and the Korean Conflict, he is a commander in the U. S. Naval Reserve. He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot and Kendall.

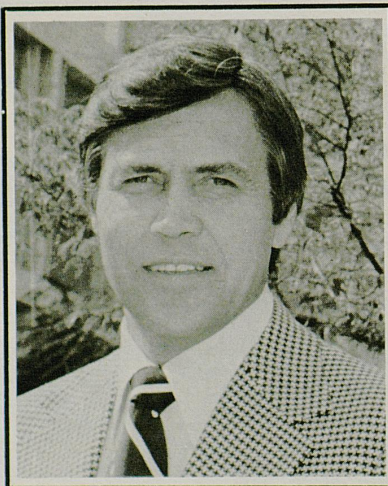

CLIFFORD O. HAGAN
Director

Expansion of the football training room and addition of a beautiful player's lounge at Shively Sports Center, new carpeting in the stadium football offices, a new basketball office complex in Memorial Coliseum, re-arrangement of the baseball fences and a new surface for the running track are just a few of the recent improvements that signify the continuing progress of UK athletics since Cliff Hagan joined the Wildcat Staff seven years ago.

Recognized nationally as a progressive, business-oriented and promotion-minded administrator, Hagan has seen and overseen vast improvements in all phases of an ever-expanding operation that has encompassed 16 sports since the men's and



women's programs were merged in July of last year.

The merger, under Hagan's direction, has been orderly, with office space re-modeled and in some cases created to make room for the women's coaching and administrative staff.

The indoctrination of Hagan into the UK athletics administrative structure

came in 1972, when he was named assistant to Harry C. Lancaster and given the task of implementing the Blue & White Fund for 57,600-seat Commonwealth Stadium and later for Rupp Arena. The fruits of his labors in this area have provided the additional financial support that has elevated the UK athletics program into a first class operation.

Hagan was named Athletics Director in July 1975 following Lancaster's retirement.

Hagan also has been an advocate of a strong scholar-athlete program, feeling "a genuine commitment to provide all the academic support and encouragement we can to help our athletes leave our campus with a college education and a degree."

On the personal side, Hagan received one of his highest individual honors last May when he became the first University of Kentucky basketball player to be installed in the Naismith Memorial National Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass.

He is married to the former Martha Milton of Owensboro. They have four children: Lisa, Laurie, Amy, and Kip.



FRANK HAM

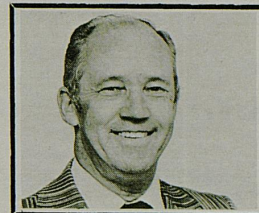
Assistant Director of Athletics

FRANK HAM became Assistant Director of Athletics in July 1975 soon after Cliff Hagan succeeded Harry C. Lancaster as Director of Athletics.

A native of Scranton, Pa., Ham came to the University in 1969 as administrative Assistant to football coach John Ray, and was reassigned to the Athletic Director's staff in 1972 when Ray resigned.

Ham graduated from high school at Niles, Michigan, and completed his undergraduate work at Indiana University and coached high school football and track at John Adams High in South Bend in 1944-46 and then returned to Olivet as athletic director and head football and basketball coach.

In 1951, he became assistant to the president at Olivet, with responsibilities in public and alumni relations. He was in private business from 1954 until 1968.



SUE FEAMSTER

Assistant Director of Athletics

SUE FEAMSTER joined the athletics association July 1, 1978, with the merger of the men's and women's programs. Feamster had been the director of women's athletics prior to her appointment as assistant director of athletics.

A native of Frankfort, she came to the University as a graduate student in 1970, was named assistant director of campus

recreation in 1972 and director of women's athletics in 1974.

Feamster graduated from Franklin County High School where she was an outstanding tennis player and athlete. While in college she earned letters in tennis, field hockey, basketball and track from Indiana University and Kentucky State University, where she earned her B.S. degree and graduated with honors.

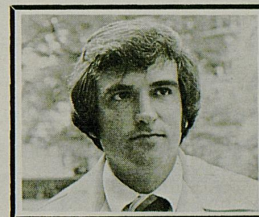


LARRY IVY

JOE B. HALL Head Basketball Coach

JOE B. HALL is beginning his eighth season as coach of the Wildcats, coming off a year in which he took a team depleted through graduations and molding them into a contender for the SEC title and receiving an invitation to enter the National Invitation Tournament. The team finished with 19 wins and 12 losses.

Since becoming head coach in 1972, succeeding the legendary Adolph F. Rupp, Hall has accumulated a record of 154 wins and 54 losses. His eleven year coaching record stands at 230-110. Broken down, it shows a 57-50 five year mark at Regis College, a 19-6



LEONARD HAMILTON is beginning his sixth year at Kentucky after serving three years as assistant coach at Austin Peay. An outstanding recruiter with seemingly tireless energy, Hamilton has contributed heavily to maintaining a high level of young talent at UK. Specializing in coaching defense, Hamilton has had a positive impact on Wildcat defensive

JOE DEAN, JR., played against the Wildcats for three years at Mississippi State University, before serving as Bulldog assistant coach while earning a masters degree in physical education. An outstanding student, Dean was named to the 1976 Academic All-SEC second team. A native of Baton Rouge,

Hall became Rupp's top assistant in 1969 when Harry C. Lancaster was named athletics director. His record as freshmen coach was 60-15, including an undefeated (22-0) season (1971-72) which resulted in the Kittens being crowned National Freshmen Champions by Basketball News.

A popular personality on the clinic and convention circuits, Hall also has had much international exposure. In addition to the Globetrotters tour in 1951, and the "Down Under" tour in 1974, he has helped conduct basketball clinics for the U. S. Army in Anchorage and Fairbanks, Alaska (1968) and at Ramstein Air Base, in Frankfurt, Germany and the RAF Base at Mildenhall, England in 1975. He also was Olympic Trials coach under

DICK PARSONS, in his eighth year as Joe B. Hall's No. 1 assistant, returned to the University as baseball coach in 1969. Before giving up his position to join the basketball staff on a full time basis, he molded a baseball team (1971) which established or tied 15 school records. He is a graduate of UK where he played guard under former Coach Adolph F. Rupp.

Parsons came to the University in 1958 after an outstanding career as a four-sports star at Harlan High School, where

Bill Keightley Has Not Lost Any Luggage...yet!

The middle-aged father peered over his glasses with concerned eyes as he talked on his office phone with a dry cleaning firm, trying to locate his sons' suits. The next afternoon was first home game for Kentucky and his boys needed their suits.

The friendly, smiling face of Bill Keightley, the Wildcats' Equipment Manager, brightened as he learned from the cleaners that the suits would be delivered late that afternoon. The suits were the Kentucky uniforms and warm-up suits and his "sons" are the Kentucky players. Making certain that the team has its uniforms ready for games is one small but important portion of Keightley's job, a job he has held for 15 years.

His dedication to his work is shown by the hours that he devotes. He is up at 3:45 a.m. five days a week and arrives at the Post Office where he is a letter car-

rier at 5 a.m. At 1:30 he changes hats (though he often carries the mail wearing his Big Blue baseball cap) and goes to Memorial Coliseum's equipment room where he dives into his work for UK. Practice starts at 3 p.m. and usually lasts a couple of hours. He usually leaves work at about 7:30 p.m.

He has been with the Postal Service for 24 years and all but eight of those years have seen him use his annual leave-time for UK basketball road trips. Most of the season occurs during slack periods which makes it possible for him to leave his route to another carrier for a day or two.

Among his duties are keeping the team's practice gear ready and in the players' lockers, over-seeing the team's autographing of memorabilia sent by fans, scheduling and notifying the players at Wildcat Lodge, organizing the shipment of the team's equipment on

road trips, and last but not least, being a friend and "father confessor" to the players.

"These kids become like my own sons," remarks Keightley. "They've all got problems and sometimes it's easier for them to talk to me than someone else."

Keeping equipment on hand is not a major problem for Keightley since Kentucky believes in the players dressing uniformly. The only difference in any of the players' appearances when they run onto the floor is that Kyle Macy wears sweat bands on his wrists to help with a sweating problem.

"We are a team and we dress like a team," says Keightley.

Equipment sizes for such things as warm-up trousers are sometimes unusual but not a major problem. Sam Bowie, the Cats' 7-1 center, requires a waistband measurement of 38 inches and a trouser length of 42 inches, five inches longer than his 6-8 teammate Fred Cowan.

Keightley keeps a good supply of shoes on hand including 16½'s for Bowie and 12 DDDD for guard Jay Shidler. Some players even wear one size on one foot and another on the other. Though the shoe sizes are somewhat larger than found commonly in sporting goods stores, special shoes can usually be obtained from the manufacturer within ten days

and even faster in emergencies.

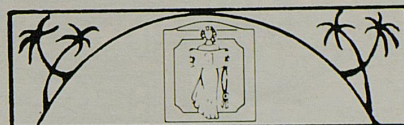
The recurring nightmare for all equipment managers is that one day the team will arrive for a game on the road and the equipment will not. "However, (knock on wood) I have never lost anything," laughs Keightley. "It is bound to happen someday but I hope not. After everyone leaves, I systematically go through everything that needs to be packed for a trip. You can't do it with people around you talking so I just wait 'til I'm alone."

His association with UK has given Keightley a chance to travel. He has been to Japan and Alaska, to most of the major cities in the U. S., and to two NCAA championships.

Because of their responsibilities and livestock on their Fayette County farm, his wife is not always able to travel with him during the regular season but tries to make all the trips to post-season tournaments.

For Keightley, who proudly claims that he hasn't "lost any luggage yet," being Kentucky's equipment manager is a labor of love. A labor that Keightley performs as effectively as the Wildcats win games.

Assisting Keightley this season are head student manager George Fletcher, Tony Sosby, Roger Thomas, and Marshall Harris.

The Last Time

Kentucky vs. Alabama

The Last Time Kentucky and Alabama played, it resulted in what some observers felt was possibly the best basketball game played in the South in 1979. The scene was the Southeastern Conference post-season tournament in Birmingham and the teams butted heads for 40 minutes of almost flawless basketball. Kentucky won narrowly, 101-100.

Kentucky trailed at the half 55-49 despite out-shooting and out-rebounding the Tide. Senior guard Truman Claytor tied the score with a 15 foot jumper midway through the second half. It was the first of numerous times that the score was tied in the final 10 minutes before Chuck

Verderber and Kyle Macy pushed the Cats in front 99-91. Reggie King and Robert Scott closed the score to one point at 99-98 before a pair of free throws with eight seconds left gave Kentucky a three point lead.

The nature of the game caused Ken-

tucky coach Joe B. Hall to comment that it was the best game he'd seen that season and that both teams played so well that both deserved to win it. 'Bama coach C. M. Newton agreed. "It was the kind of a game that you hate to see either side lose," he said afterwards.

As head coach of the University of Alabama since 1969, Charles Martin Newton has compiled a record of 193-111.

When David Mathews assumed the presidency of the University of Alabama in the fall of 1969, he was the youngest man ever to hold that position and one of the youngest university presidents in the entire Nation. Even so, he brought to the presidency a decade of experience in teaching and administration.

A native Alabamian and a graduate of the University, he returned to his alma mater first after military service and again after taking his doctorate in the history of American education at Columbia. As he has advanced through the administrative ranks, he has continued to teach American history and to write in

the fields of his special interest, Southern history and American higher education.

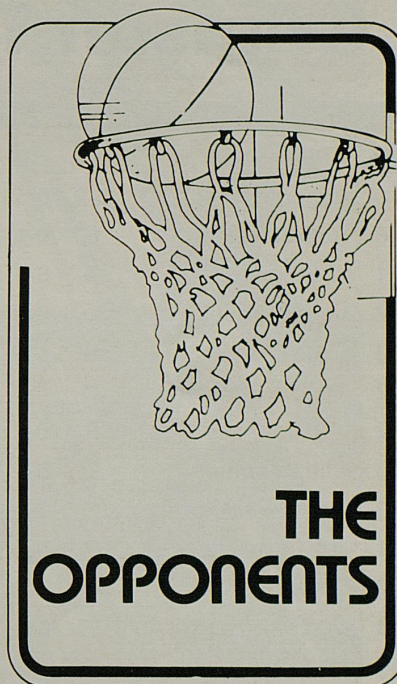
Newton attended the University of Kentucky on a basketball scholarship and was a member of the 1951 Wildcat team that won the NCAA under Adolph Rupp.

After leaving UK, Newton served in the Air Force until 1955.

Upon returning to the Bluegrass, Newton was recommended by Rupp to coach Transylvania University. Rupp later said, "I sent them Newton because he was the best man I knew for the job." In 1963 his TU team won the NAIA District title and compiled a 20-8 record. At Transy, Newton had a 12 year record of 169-137.

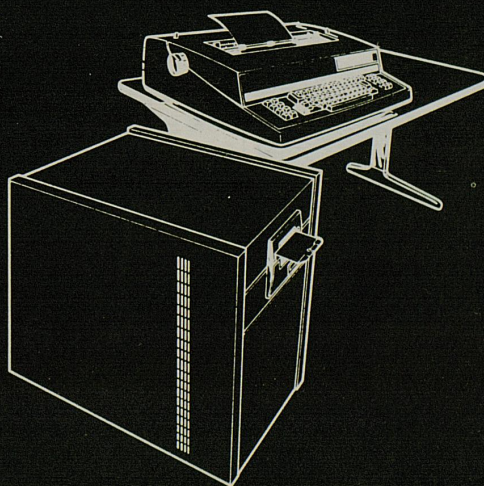
In 1969, after moving to Alabama, Newton was to build a winning team, but success was not instant. The Crimson Tide had a 4-20 record in 1969. Four years later, the Tide had turned. Newton's 1972 squad was 18-8.

Newton has led his team to two NIT tournaments, three SEC championships and two appearances in the NCAA in the past six seasons.

Teaching Student Skills



Ben Averitt, coordinator of developmental studies at Lexington Technical Institute, is both a teacher and counselor.

The following scene could be typical of a student in any one of the University of Kentucky community colleges. He has been advised by a teacher to see a developmental studies instructor. As he waits for the time of his appointment, he leafs through his textbooks. He has feelings of inadequacy because the material seems difficult and unfamiliar.

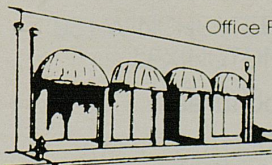
Both have years of teaching experience and have seen dramatic transformations

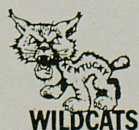

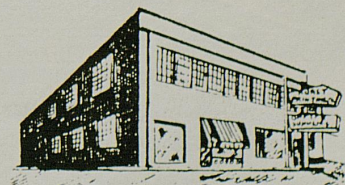

several years," Averitt said. "We remind them that this happens to everyone who has not read technical material in years."

"We find that our students who need help in reading have not read anything more difficult than a newspaper, magazine or paperback book in years," Mrs. Rizk said. "When students return to the classroom they often find that their reading skills have suffered. Some may have difficulty grasping the material in a textbook."

She explained that all UK community colleges have learning laboratories for a student who needs help. The student can use visual aids to re-learn quickly such things as the structure of simple sentences.

In other parts of the laboratory, he can brush up on elementary mathematics. For many students, the skills improve

rapidly as the things they learned in high school are recalled.

Another aspect of the developmental studies program is a team approach to basic skills instruction within the formal structures of classes. For example, textbook reading skills are often taught at the beginning of a course, as in architecture, in the regular hours for the course by using the textbook for that specific course. Also, in advanced short-hand classes, the course instructor and a developmental studies instructor together team teach language mechanics.

An essential part of the program is to instill in students the belief that they can do more than they think they can.

"Once we have succeeded in helping them regain their confidence in themselves, half the battle has been won," Averitt said.

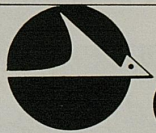

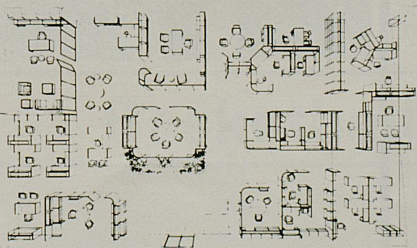

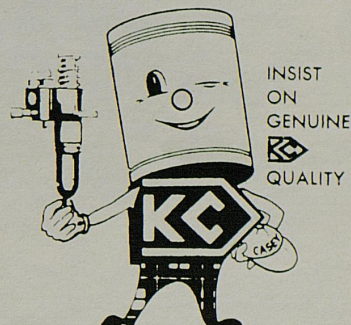
Basketball Trainer

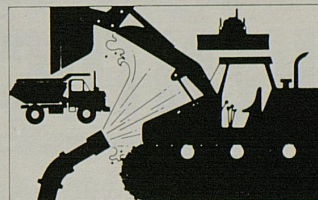

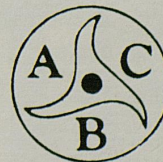

Arena Information

FIRST AID

The University of Kentucky and the Lexington Center provide for your convenience and welfare, a First Aid Station on the Purple Concourse. Persons with any type of chronic medical problem are requested to leave their name and seat location with the nurse on duty at the First Aid Station. A person in need of assistance with a health emergency should report the situation immediately to an usher. For University of Kentucky events, all physicians are requested to leave their name, seat location and any other information required to locate them if they receive an emergency telephone call, at the UK Public Assistance station located on the purple concourse between sections 30 and 31. For all other events in Rupp Arena all physicians are requested to leave their name, seat location and any other information required to locate them if they receive an emergency telephone call at the First Aid Room located on the purple concourse between sections 33 and 34. In the event of an emergency, you will be notified at your seat. In order that the activities and program in Rupp Arena not be disrupted, paging over the public address system is not possible.

CARDIAC CARE

In cooperation with the University Medical Service, the University of Kentucky provides a cardiac resuscitation program at all UK basketball games.

LOST AND FOUND

Lost and found articles should be reported or turned in to an usher or a security officer. You may wish to write to the director of arena security and describe lost articles which will be returned if found.

NO HORNS

Horns are not permitted in Rupp Arena and will be picked up at the entrances. Be considerate and allow your neighbor to enjoy the game. Keep portable radios at a low volume.

GATE INFORMATION

Rupp Arena will normally open one hour prior to any scheduled event. Please do not leave the arena until the conclusion of an event or game or at half-time if you plan to re-enter. No "Pass-out" tickets will be issued and you will not be permitted to re-enter.

LIQUORS

Alcoholic beverages are strictly prohibited within the arena as are all foods and drink containers including hard surfaced materials of any type, bottles, cans, thermos bottles, ice bags, ice chest, and any object related to above. Arena personnel are instructed to enforce this rule in the interest of safety.

PUBLIC ADDRESS

Messages for the public address announcer are acceptable only in emergencies and must be approved by the Sports Information Director at University of Kentucky basketball events.

SIGNS

Signs and barriers are restricted in Rupp Arena in accordance with policies established by arena management and public safety officials.

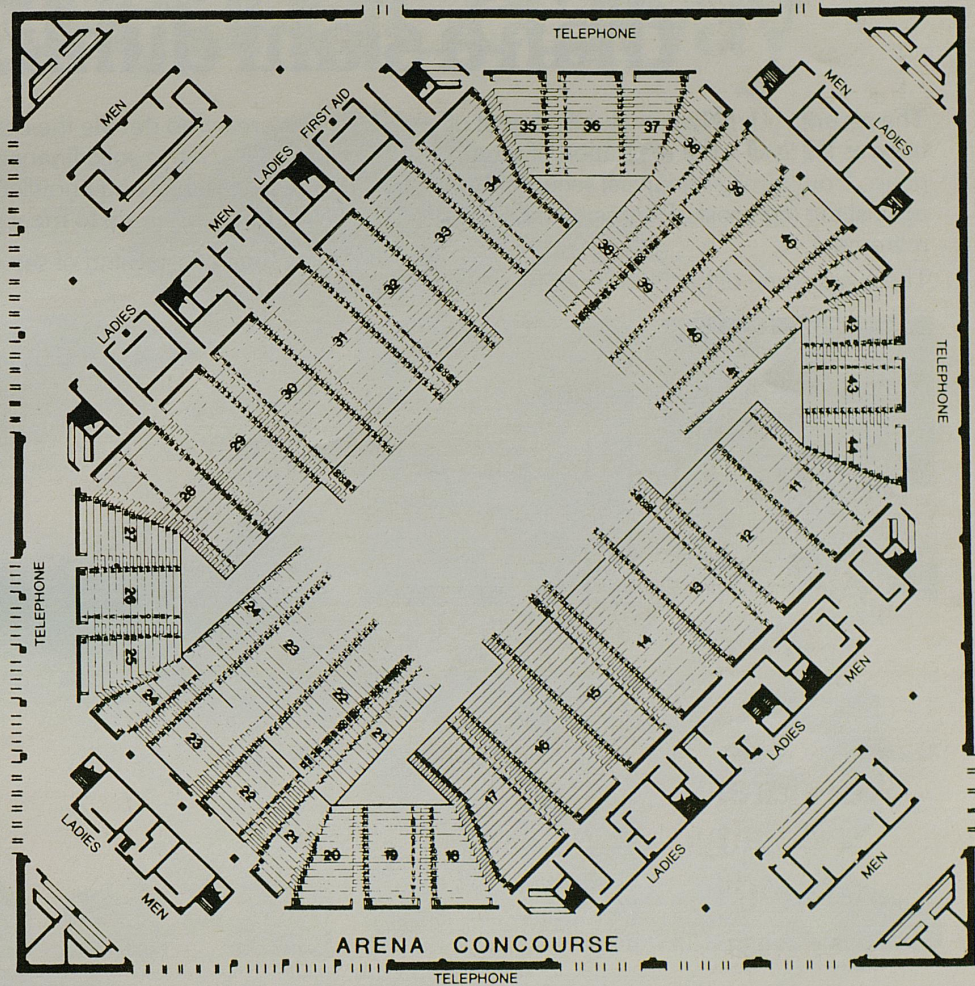
UK Student Code Of Sportsmanship

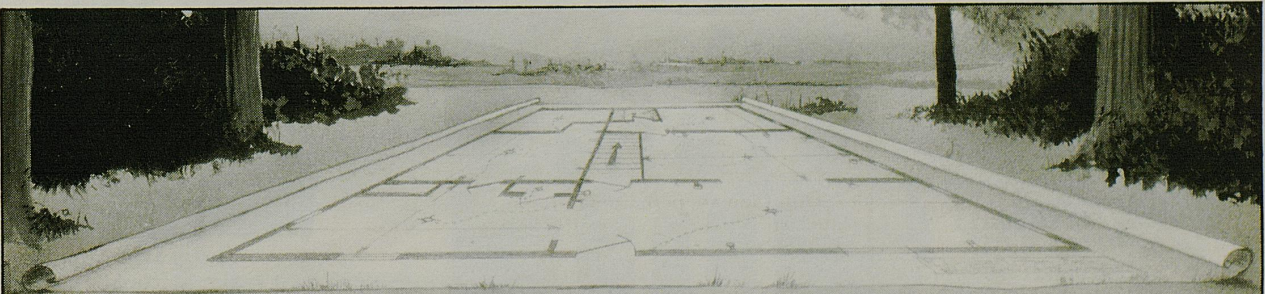
- (1) Winning or losing, an athletic team of the University of Kentucky will have our continued and wholehearted support.

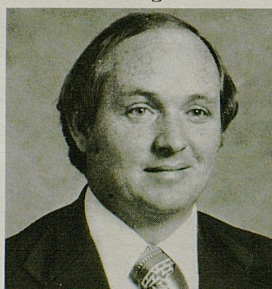

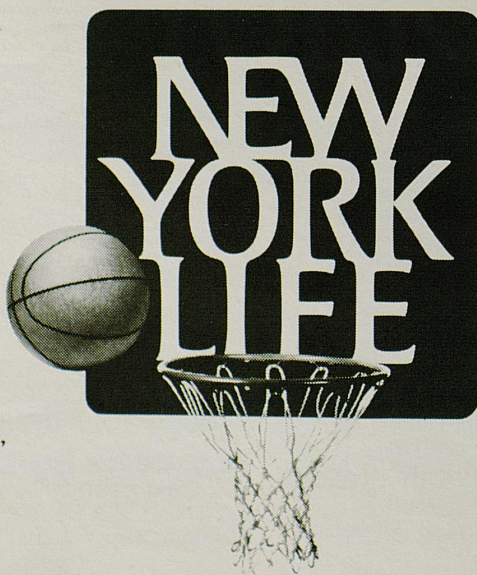

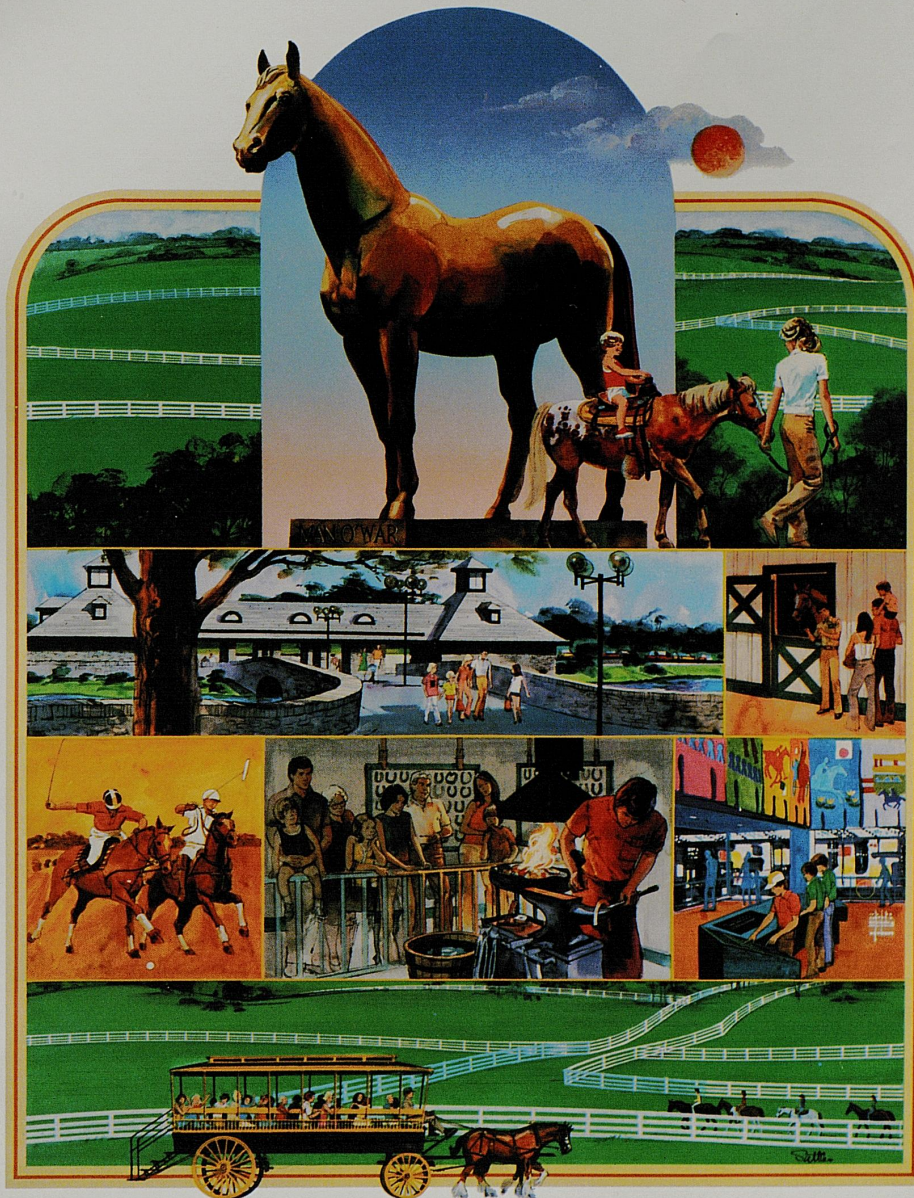
