For Our Lives, For Our Children's Lives: Women Talk About AIDS

A free program on women and AIDS will be presented at 7pm on March 4 at the Lexington Public Library Theater on Main St. "For Our Lives, For Our Children's Lives: Women Talk about AIDS" features two advocates for women living with AIDS: Dazon Dixon of Atlanta and Jeannie Pejko of Chicago. Also, (In) Visible Women, a video by Marina Alvarez and Ellen Spiro, will be shown. The program will be repeated March 5 from noon to 1pm at the Martin Luther King Cultural Center at the U.K. Old Student Center.

Before the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) changed the definition of AIDS at the beginning of this year to include cervical cancer when in the presence of HIV infection as an AIDS-related condition, women died of AIDS without ever being technically diagnosed with it. And women with HIV-related illnesses which are not included in the official CDC definition are denied the government benefits granted to those who do meet the case definition. Basically they are officially invisible.

The CDC's change to include cervical cancer and opportunistic infections, such as pulmonary tuberculosis and recurrent bacterial pneumonia in its official definition of AIDS has been deathly slow, and comes only after years of protest and work by women activists, educators, caregivers and clinicians. Through their sustained effort the once invisible women now have a face and a voice.

Dazon Dixon is the founder and coordinator of SISTERLOVE Women's AIDS Project in Atlanta, a non-profit organization which provides education and support for women, by women, who are at risk or already infected with HIV/AIDS.

While SISTERLOVE addresses the problems of all women, the project particularly focuses on the needs of African-American women. Dixon writes, AIDS "has opened up a gigantic Pandora's box of social ills and oppression that women of color are surviving. Now we are seeing the Western-white-

male-dominated culture behave in its true form. In the name of investment and profit, poor health care planning, and lack of interest in the affected lives, they are watching people die...We need to be clear that no situation or condition is isolated from others...We must recognize how our choices help us to participate in taking unnecessary risks. We must face our realities and keep them in the perspective of our life situations. We must work to change—to stop surviving and start living.

Jeannie Pejko is a mother, an AIDS activist with ACT UP/Chicago (AIDS Coalition to Unleash Power), and both client and volunteer at the Chicago Women's AIDS Project. She is also one of the women

featured in (In)visible Women.

Alvarez' and Spiro's video is a 26 min. documentary which focuses on the heroic and empowered responses of three strong women who

Lesbians' Kids Do Just Fine

A study of 37 San Francisco area children with openly lesbian parents finds that they were no more likely to have difficulties with social skills or sexual identity than children of openly heterosexual parents. Dr. Charlotte Patterson of the Univ. of Virginia directed the study and says that it suggests the quality of parenting is important, not the sexual orientation of the parents. Most of the children were conceived by artificial insemination. An estimated 5-10 million children in the U.S. have lesbian or gay parents and were conceived in earlier heterosexual relationships.

There are some notable differences in children raised by lesbians and by a strayt couple. Lesbians' children seem to experience more stress as shown by episodes of insomnia, anxiety and anger. But, they also show a greater sense of well-being and adjustment.

Other child psychologists have applauded the study but point out that children living in relatively liberal San Francisco may not face the same stresses as children living in more homophobic areas. Later studies on the children once they are in adolescence are planned.

Do not leave a message for all representatives and senators. Those messages are placed on a large bulletin board and seldom read by legislators. Messages for specific legislators go to their desks.

Calls and letters have a tremendous impact! Call and write and get your friends and neighbors to do so as well!

are living with AIDS. Through community education, art, and activism, the women shatter the notions of female complacency and invisibility in the face of AIDS. Women with AIDS are confronting those people, as Jeannie Pejko puts it, that "they have raised and nurtured" and who are now turning them away. Ellen Spiro also made the video **DiAna's Hair Ego: AIDS Info Upfront**.

The events are sponsored by AIDS Volunteers of Lexington (AVOL). Generous financial support was received from Central Kentucky Council for Peace and Justice, GLSO, Second Presbyterian Church, Unitarian Universalist Church, UK Office for Minority Affairs, UK Women's Studies Program, Women's Center of Central Kentucky, and numerous individuals.

Lesbian in Clinton's Cabinet?

Donna Shalala, Pres. Clinton's new Secretary of Health and Human Services, has been the chancellor of the Univ. of Wisconsin-Madison and the chair of the Children's Defense Fund. She has also been rumored to be a lesbian and has faced repeated "out-ing" by various radical gay activists. Gay activist Ken Sherrill, dean at City Univ. of NY and longtime Shalala friend, says that Shalala has many openly lesbian and gay friends but has never been seen to date anyone. If anything, Sherrill says that Shalala could be "outed" as an asexual, a career woman, and an excellent friend for the lesBigay community in her new DC post. Shalala put pressure on the ROTC for its ban on homosexuals while at UW-M and was a signer of a full page ad in the NY Times denouncing the military's ban on homosexuals in the military.

It is hoped that she will institute some of the recommendations suppressed by Sullivan, Bush's Secretary of HHS, that aimed at lowering the extremely high and disproportional number of suicides and attempted suicides by lesBigay youth. Under pressure from conservatives such as former Rep. Dannemeyer (R-CA) who claimed it would undermine "family values," Sullivan did not include these recommendations on lesBigay suicide in the final report to the

President.


Girls, and Michelle Shocked are all nominated for Best Contemporary Folk Album.

Adoption Options: Private Domestic Adoption by Laura Jones

Adoption for gays and lesbians is a really mixed bag. First, you need to understand there are two different types of adoption: private and public. I spoke with local attorneys about both these options. The first type of private adoption is arranged by knowing someone (on your own) who is pregnant and willing to give you the child to raise. This requires only an attorney who will complete the necessary legal work for adoption. The other types of private adoption are domestic and international. On domestic adoption, I was told that they had never had a pregnant woman opt for an adoptive situation with a "single" woman or man (much less a "gay" woman or man.) Their explanation for this was that these women are trying to provide their child a "family unit" that they themselves do not have to offer. This social standard apparently includes "morally" and financially solvent heterosexual couple of appropriate color. I can certainly understand this decision by birth mothers, especially after all the years of fundamentalist bad press. But, it is still so frustrating and saddening. And, this is not just Lexington- in Atlanta we were told pretty much the same thing.

Ann and I looked into the second type of private adoption, international adoption, while living in Atlanta. After I inseminated twice without pregnancy, we made an appointment with an Atlanta attorney who specialized in adoption. She had already spoken to one of our Atlanta "baby group" meetings, so we knew Rhonda did not have

a problem with gays and lesbians adopting. She offered international adoptions as an alternative to the elusive domestic adoption option. She explained that at different times, various countries have been "open" for adoptions. For many years it was Korea, Vietnam and India. All these countries to my knowledge are now "closed." Romania was recently in the news with many adoptions occurring but again, I believe they too have closed most adoptions. Rhonda told us about several South American countries that were "open" for adoptions and indeed, we know several women in Atlanta who have beautiful daughters from South America. But also we know of one couple who never got their son from India. It is these tales from South America and India that point out the joys and pitfalls of international adoption. So, be prepared next month for: Parent Tales: International Adoption.

Roman Catholic Church Sends Unclear Signals

1992 was a year of different and sometimes conflicting messages from the Roman Catholic Church. Last summer the Vatican Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith issued a letter to U.S. bishops calling homosexuality an "objective disorder" and urged the bishops and faithful to oppose civil rights laws for gays. This letter brought about a series of protests by Dignity groups (gay support groups within the Catholic church) and several Catholic bishops including the bishop of Hawaii.

In the face of these protests the Vatican issued a statement saying that the letter was merely a

"background resource."

Locally, this letter may have had an influence on Louisville Archbishop Thomas Kelly's public opposition to the Fairness Campaign. In turn, Kelly's opposition led to the disclosure of Rev. Joseph Vest of the St. Ann's inner city parish that he was gay to the Louisville city council. Fr. Vest maintains his vow of celibacy as do most priests of all sexual orientations.

Fr. John Curtis, pastor at Lexington's St. Paul Church and head of the diocese's HIV/AIDS ministry, was both "angered and embarrassed by the document" according to the diocesan newsletter, CrossRoads. He believes the letter is a departure from earlier Vatican teachings on protecting homosexuals from discrimination.

The current letter says there are legitimate needs for protecting homosexual people but not laws that legitimize homosexual behavior. Confusingly, the letter spells out adoption, military service, housing and employment as areas that are open to discrimination against homosexuals.

Bishop J. Kendrick Williams of the Diocese of Lexington issued a statement saying that the Vatican's letter was not an excuse for acts of hatred nor for leaving the Church.

Also locally, retired homophobic Monsignor Harry Welp of Villa Hills, KY, called for the resignation of Covington Bishop William Hughes for offering Mass at the 3rd Nat. Symposium of Lesbian & Gay People. Welp links homosexuality to witchcraft and Satanism. Local Covington priests, however, have rallied in defense of Hughes as having kept to Catholic teachings in his ministry.

Last fall the Roman Catholic Church also issued its first catechism since the 1300's. Currently only available in French and Latin, the catechism reiterates the Church's position that homosexuals are not evil but that homosexual behavior is a sin. It also calls for an end to discrimination against homosexuals.

As with any large, global bureaucracy, it is apparent that there are different views within the Church on matters relating to homosexuality.

AIDS Policy Advisory Council Created

The Dept. of Human Resources has created a council to advise state officials on AIDS/HIV policy as announced Dec. 21, 1992. Including four HIV+ members out of the 19 councilmembers, the council is co-chaired by Michael Kretman, president of KIPWAC, and Dr. Rice Leach, Dept. of Heath Services commissioner. Some Rural Gays Playing Unsafely

The most comprehensive study of gay male sexual practices outside of large urban areas finds some disturbing facts. A study carried out by Dr. Jeff Kelly at the Medical College of Wisconsin focuses on a survey of 1,858 men in gay bars in 16 cities of <180,000 population and at least 50 miles from other urban centers. 10% of those surveyed are HIV+, and a shocking 31% had engaged in anal intercourse without a condom in the previous 2 months! Also, each man averaged 8 encounters in a two month span. Kelly points to the need of identifying respected community leaders whose advocacy of safer sex with change behavior in both rural and urban areas.

1. The Generous Jefferson Bartleby Jones by 90 yr. old Forman Brown, \$7.95 in softcover: The main character, Jeff Jones, has two dads, and his friends are jealous of all the fun he has with them. So, he shares a dad with each friend and learns some lessons in this illustrated children's book by the Alyson Wonderland series by Alyson Publications. Hey, the name of the main character is worth the book in itself!

2. **Coming Out Conservative** by Marvin Liebman, \$19.95: This autobiography relates Liebman's career as a conservative Republican strategist and his coming out as a gay man. The book has several interesting moments such as when Ronald Reagan talks to Liebman about Ron, Jr.'s decision to become a ballet dancer: "but aren't dancers...aren't dancers sort of...funny?"

3. The Night Audrey's Vibrator Spoke by Andrea Natalie, \$8.95 (paperback): This hilarious second collection of gay political cartoons by Cleis Press is just a hoot and a half! Natalie spoofs everything from safer sex to fashion, the NEA to Merv Griffin. Natalie's first collection, Stonewall Riots (Venus Press), was a 1990 Lambda Literary

Award finalist. 4. Maybe the Moon by Armistead Maupin: My favorite gay author has come out with a new book that follows up on the continuing success of his Tales of the City series. This novel follows the adventures of petite actress and heroine Cadence Roth in Hollywood as the ultimate outsider. Has more sex scenes (largely heterosex) and a new style for Maupin, a North Carolina native and former employee of none other than Jesse Helms! 5. Honor Bound: A Gay American Fights for his Right to Serve his Country by Joe Steffan, Former Naval Academy cadet Joe Steffan relates his story of coming out in Annapolis and being forced out of the Navy. Although interesting, Steffan's writing is quite unemotional, and the reader gains little insight into his relationships. He's cute, but don't expect many juicy behind-the-scenes info.

6. **Daisy Fay and the Miracle Man** by Fanny Flagg, \$7.99: By the author of **Fried Green Tomatoes at the Whistlestop Cafe**, this bestseller follows the life of sassy, truth-telling Daisy Fay as she escapes 1950's coastal Mississippi via a beauty contest.

NEWS SHORTS



WASHINGTON, DC: Both The Army Times and The Air Force Times, unofficial newspapers for these branches of the military, have issued statements calling for a lifting of the ban on homosexuals in the military. The Navy Times earlier said that the ban should not be enforced but should remain in place.

CALIFORNIA: Over \$7.3 million were withdrawn from BankAmerica by people angry over BankAmerica's financial support of the Boy Scouts of America. BSA bans homosexuals, and BankAmerica originally suspended funding the BSA. BankAmerica reversed itself after conservatives began closing accounts and cutting up credit cards. Now BankAmerica faces a second loss from angry human rights supporters. This second loss is expected add up to betweeen \$50-100 million.

LITTLE ROCK, AR: Due to complaints about harassment by heterosexuals who have wandered into a Discovery, a local Little Rock gay bar, the management has now placed a sign out front reading: "This is a gay bar! If you can't handle it-don't come in!"

MONTANA: Public health officials are calling for the repeal of Montana's male-only, same-sex only, felony sodomy law to remove barriers to HIV testing by fearful clients.

SAN DIEGO: The San Diego Human Relations Commission voted to condemn the Boy Scouts of America for its policy of excluding and expelling homosexuals. This BSA policy violates the San Diego anti-bias law. This resolution by the HRC recommended the city take legal action to break its leases with the BSA and urged the San Diego area United Way to follow the lead of other United Way agencies by cutting off the BSA's funding. This resolution followed on the official removal by the BSA of an openly gay police officer who served as the liason between an Explorer program and the El Cajon police department.

NEW YORK: The NY Human Rights Commission ruled on Oct.28 that the Irish Lesbian & Gay Organization (ILGO) must be allowed to participate in the city's St. Patrick's Day Parade. The parade's sponsor, the Ancient Order of Hibernians, claims that the parade should be exempt from NY's human rights code on grounds of religious freedom and that ILGO are an affront to the Roman Catholic Church. The city ruled that constitutional rights to religious freedom did not apply because the parade's stated purpose was to "celebrate Irish heritage."

Similarly, more than 50 members of the South Asian Lesbian and Gay Assoc. (SALGA) took part in the NYC India Day Parade after parade officials attempted to block their participation.

RUSSIA: President Boris Yeltsin has condemned Russia's law banning sex between men (lesbians are ignored) and has proposed deleting this article in a major revision of the Russian penal code.

WASHINGTON, DC: The nation's first gay inaugural ball, the Triangle Ball, was held at the National Press Club at Pres. Clinton's inaugeration. The \$100 a ticket even raised money for the Human Rights Campaign Fund, the Nat. Gay & Lesbian Task Force and the Gay & Lesbian Victory Fund.

ATLANTA: The Centers for Disease Control announced that AIDS is now the 9th leading cause of death in the U.S. In other AIDS news, the **Washington Post** revealed that the Nat. Institute of Health is diverting nearly 40% of the federal AIDS drug research monies towards drug studies on pediatric AIDS. Children with AIDS make up less than 2% of infected Americans.

TENNESSEE: Cracker Barrel promised a Tennessee judge that it would not violate state law again by blocking perceived Queer Nation shareholders in the company from attending its annual shareholders meeting. Cracker Barrel faced a restraining order brought by the Lambda Legal Defense Fund. Cracker Barrel has an anti-gay hiring policy that resulted in the firing of gay/lesbian employees in 1991. The policy is on a store-by-store basis today.

ALBANY, NY: The City Council barely passed an omnibus human rights ordinance including sexual orientation in a close vote. Gov. Mario Cuomo and his office lobbied councilmembers to pass the ordinance.

LOUISVILLE: Three neo-Nazi skinhead members of the Chaotic Brothers were charged in Oct. with the brutal beating of a gay man in Cherokee Park in Oct. Ramon Dale Julian, 21, is one of the three charged with the assault on Mark Bailey, 30, which resulted in Bailey's hospitalization in critical condition. Bailey is recovering.

The Louisville-based Community Health Trust is beginning its 1993 membership drive to raise \$155,000 for AIDS/HIV care and education. CHT also runs two Glade Houses for HIV+ people who have no home. Membership includes a subscription to the quarterly newsletter, **Heart Beat**, discounts to CHT events, and voting rights at CHT meetings. Memberships begin at \$25 and are tax deductible. AIDS Insurance Slashed

The U.S. Supreme Court issued a decision on Nov.9, 1992, in Greenburg v. H&H Music Co. that allows companies to arbitrarily reduce insurance coverage for workers with catastrophic illnesses such as cancer and AIDS when the worker files a reimbursement claim. The Greenburg case revolved around the H&H Music Co. that slashed an employee's coverage for AIDS-related care from \$1 million to \$5,000.

Community Spotlight Introduction to Paganism

I recently learned that the GLSO Gayline has received a number of calls about the Neo-Pagan Group listed under my name in the **GLSO News**. Some are Pagans interested in making contact with other Pagans while others want to know what neo-Paganism is. Hopefully, this article will help answer these questions.

First of all, I would like to point out that there have been a number of articles published in **GLSO News** touching on the subject of neo-Paganism. There have been articles on the Women's Spirituality movement which incorporates a great deal of Paganism in the worship of the Divine Feminine in the form of numerous Goddesses. The October 1991 and 1992 issues also have featured articles on lesBigay witches. Wicca and other forms of witchcraft are another manifestation of contemporary Paganism.

The words "Pagan" and "witch" have negative connotations for many people. That is why many contemporary Pagans seek to reclaim them while others prefer to identify themselves by other terms such as "Nature Religionists." This is analogous to today's lesBigay community where some members advocate (and other oppose) attempts to reclaim terms such as "queer", "faggot" and "dyke."

Contemporary Paganism in all its many and diverse forms seeks to provide a positive, life-affirming alternative to the negative beliefs encouraged by some Christian sects. The vast majority of Pagans see homo/hetero/bisexuality as normal and worthwhile. This is a major reason why many lesBigay people are attracted to Paganism with its acceptance of sexual minorities deriving from ancient roots. Most Pagan cultures accepted homo/bisexuality, and in a great many cultures, religious specialists were predominately lesBigay. Many incorporated gay/lesbian sexual activities into their religious worship.

Contemporary Paganism seeks to affirm the interconnectedness of all things through worship of various Gods and Goddesses. These deities are usually seen as masks or manifestations of the Cosmos or Source of All Being. Respect for each individual's choice of a spiritual path and a belief that all religious paths ultimately converge in Truth are held. Paganism is non-hierarchical and nonauthoritarian in most forms. Most of us believe in reincarnation, karma and the Three-fold Law (both the good and evil one does come back to us three times over.) Thus, willfully and wantonly harming others is an incredibly stupid thing to do! From this, it can be seen that notions of hellfire and eternal damnation have little place in Pagan thought. Serious Pagans do not indulge in black magick and other negative, non-life-affirming practices. If we do any "magickal" cursing, the recipient will be a friend's tumor or a fugitive rapist. And, by the way, those most famous practitioners of "black magick," the Satanists, are not Pagans at all but rather members of a deeply disturbed and highly negative Christian sect.

Historically, the spread of Christianity in Europe either extinguished many Pagan cultures or led to a masking of Pagan faiths under the guise of Catholic saints and the Marian cult. Modern Paganism began receiving widespread attention only in the 1950's with the works of Gerald Gardner, a retired British civil servant and witch. Today, there are an estimated 250,000 Pagans in the U.S. with this figure doubling every ten years. This figure does not include the hundreds of thousands of other individuals such as Native Americans. Buddhists, Hindus, Shintoists who still practice traditional faiths akin to Paganism. This also includes Hispanic and African Pagan faiths such as Vodoun (voodoo popularly), Santeria, and Macumba whose members publicly identify as Roman Catholics. Here in Kentucky, several Pagan groups are currently active.

Republicans Move Away from Hate Politics

A coalition of moderate Republican politicians including Nancy Kassebaum (KS) and William Cohen (ME) is seeking to redefine a more inclusive platform for the party. This group seeks to return the GOP to its historic roots in fiscal conservatism and libertarian views on individual rights. Among the goals of this coalition is to lift the Party's strict, anti-choice position on abortion and to moderate its rigid and intolerant "family values" platform that condemns homosexuals and demands the teaching of creationism/prayer in schools. The GOP has been heavily infiltrated in the last decade by Christian extremists at the urging of Pat Robertson's Christian Coalition after Robertson failed in a 1988 GOP presidential bid. These extremists both within and without the GOP condemn the separation of church and state and envision a puritan theocracy built on one interpretation of Christian morality. Although some estimates by Robertson's own group put the number of born-again, Christian fundamentalist delegates at the 1992 GOP convention at around 40%, the new coalition hopes to broaden the Republican Party's base with mainstream America and minorities. State Republican governors are among the areas most filled by GOP moderates and the rare, elusive, Republican liberal.

KGAY, a new "superstation" out of Denver, has begun broadcasting an alternative music format hosted by lesbians and gay men. Broadcasting 24 hours a day, KGAY can be picked up anywhere in North America via satellite S3, Transponder 22, Discrete Stereo Audio Frequency (narrow) 6.2 and 7.4. If you have a 7 ft. or large satellite dish, you should be able to pick this station up. Billing itself as broadcasting from the "Heartland of Hate" (Colorado), KGAY has a toll free request line too: 1-800-733-5429.

What Mia And Woody Mean for Us

On Dec. 17, 1991, the Surrogate Court of NY granted a possibly historic request: it allowed Mia Farrow and Woody Allen, an unmarried and now bickering couple, to adopt two children. This is possibly the first time an unmarried couple have been allowed to adopt a child together. The Court did not issue a precedent, so it is unknown is this will become a landmark case for hopeful homosexual couples who hope to adopt but are not allowed to legally marry in the U.S. currently.

HIU/AIDS Legal Project Provides Help

A 1991 survey found that 75% of Kentuckians with HIV had incomes below the poverty level. Combined with discrimination faced by PLA's, the Legal Aid Society of Louisville has started a HIV/AIDS Legal Project to address the legal needs of those with HIV relating to such issues as access to health care, insurance, housing, powers of attorney, wills, health care surrogacies, entitlement programs, etc. The Project also aims at educating the legal, HIV and general communities about legal concerns relating to AIDS. Hate State Update

On Nov.3, 1992, the people of Colorado voted in Amendment 2 to the Colorado constitution which outlaws any chance of providing homo/ bisexuals with any type of civil protections from anti-gay bias. Since its passage, hate crimes against lesBigays have quadrupled. A national boycott of the state is underway. Here are some

updates since last press time:

-U.S.Conference of Mayors pulled out its prestigious conference from Colorado Springs, HQ for the group that sponsored A2. The mayors focused on A2 as a human rights abuse and abuse of home city rule in that it overturned Denver, Aspen and Boulder's protections covering homosexuals. (All 3 cities voted down A2 but are now covered by this state law.)

-A growing list of major U.S. cities including Atlanta, Philadelphia, Seattle, New York and others have officially barred city employees from using city funds to travel to conferences in Colorado. Use of Colorado companies and contractors is also prohibited by some of these

-Hate crimes continue to escalate in Colorado with gay documentation projects reporting a 4 fold increase in average monthly reports of harassment, vandalism and assault on lesBigays in Colorado. Many attackers are apparently focusing on persons with buttons, yard signs and bumper stickers protesting Amendment 2. One lesbian mother was recently assaulted at a fast food restaurant by two openly heterosexual women while the woman's daughter witnessed it. The mother says that her daughter will not leave the house now without asking her mother to be sure to she "has her mace."

-Celebrities are placing fun above gay fear. Although Barbra Streisand, Whoopi Goldberg and others are respecting the boycott, other Hollywood stars are flocking to Aspen and other ski resorts as usual. The nominally "progay" stars rationalize their behavior by saying that Aspen did not carry A2 in the election.

 A Colorado judge blocked A2 from going into effect on Jan. 15. He said that he expects A2 to




