QPR Suicide Awareness & Prevention Workshop

Suicide is the second most frequent cause of death for young people between the ages of 15 through 24. Studies have shown that GLBTQQIA youth have a higher suicide rate than their straight peers. You can do something to change these statistics.

QPR gatekeeper training is offered free of charge and is designed to help people learn and practice strategies that are effective in talking to individuals who may be considering suicide. Too often people worry about a depressed friend, family member, or acquaintance but do not know how they can help. Research shows that non-professionals can make a difference.

The workshop will take place at the Commonwealth House, 226 E. Maxwell, on Saturday, June 19 between 2 and 4 pm. It is for adults over the age of 18. (A workshop that will include teens may be offered in the future.)

The workshop is a collaboration between the UK-IN CASE, a federally funded suicide prevention initative of the UK Department of Social Work and the UK Counseling Center, the UK Gay Straight Alliance, UK OUTsource, the GLSO and PFLAG (Parents, Friends and Families of Lesbian and Gays).

Carrie Schurtz, the UK campus suicide prevention coordinator will be the primary contact for coordinating training. Please register for this free event by emailing her at carrie.schurtz@uky.edu.

Dr. Julie Cerel (UK Social Work) is the principle investigator of UK-IN CASE (http://www.uky.edu/SocialWork/incase) the SAMHSA Garrett Lee Smith Campus Suicide Prevention Grant at the University of KY that provides for QPR training.

Suicide prevention cannot be left to professional counselors, therapists, or medical personnel, because at-risk individuals most often communicate their despair to those close to them. Concerned community citizens need to get involved. Taking this workshop can increase your confidence about talking to friends or family members who you think might be considering suicide. Please join us.

Remembering Our History Pride Month Selection Alan Mathison Turing by mary crone

Alan Mathison Turing was an English mathematician, logician, cryptanalyst (code expert), and computer scientist. He was influential in the creation of the modern computer, an expert in code breaking during World War Two, and honored for his academic work in several fields. He was also a gay man driven to an early death by his government.

Born in 1912, Turing's advanced intelligence was recognized early in his life. In 1928, at aged 16, Turing was introduced to the work of Albert Einstein. The depth of his understanding of Einstein's theories amazed his teachers who recommended that he begin college level work.

Also at this age, Turing realized he loved Christopher Morcom, a fellow student. Marcom's death from tuberculosis while still a teen was difficult for Turing and motivated him to pursue a career in mathematics and physics, academic pursuits they had enjoyed together.

Turing went to King's College, Cambridge from 1931 to 1934, graduating with first-in-class honors in Mathematics. In 1935 he was elected a Fellow at King's on the strength of his dissertation, an honor usually reserved for older academics.

During the Second World War, Turing worked for the Government Code and Cypher School at Britain's code breaking centre. He devised a number of techniques for breaking German ciphers, including the an electromechanical machine known as the Bombe. He also worked with U.S. Navy cryptanalysts and was recognized as primarily responsible for the theoretical basis that was the foundation of code breaking during the war.

After the war Turing worked at the National Physical Laboratory, where he created one of the first designs for a stored-program computer, the ACE. He did theoretical work on artificial intelligence that is still referenced today and developed new approaches to mathematical biology.

In 1952, Turing's home was broken into by a young man with whom Turner had had a sexual relationship. Turner reported the crime to the police and during the investigation, acknowledged the former sexual relationship. "Homosexual acts" were illegal in England based on the Criminal Law Amendment Act of 1885. Both men were charged with "gross indecency", the same crime that Oscar Wilde was convicted of fifty years earlier.

Turing was given a choice between imprisonment or probation, conditional on his agreement to undergo hormonal treatment designed to reduce his libido. He accepted estrogen hormone injections which is thought by some to be a form of chemical castration. One effect of the treatment caused him to grow breasts

Turing's conviction led to the removal of his security clearance, and barred him from continuing with his cryptographic consultancy. At the time, with the Cold War building, there was great concern that the Soviet Union had spies within England and the United States. It was thought that homosexuals could be easily entrapped by the Soviets and then blackmailed into being spies. (I wondered about this as a young teen during this era, if the gay person was outed, making no more blackmail possible, why then did they need to fire them?)

Alan Turing died in 1954, several weeks before his 42nd

Without them we wouldn't be able to bring you this Newsletter. birthday, from apparently selfadministered cyanide poisoning. A partially eaten apple containing cyanide was found next to his body. Some people have suggested that the logo for Apple Computers is a homage to Turing. Apple has always denied this.

It is a tragedy that this brilliant man was lost because of the apalling treatment he received, but he has not been forgotten. He is often called the father of computer science. Since 1966, the Turing Award has been given annually by the Association for Computing Machinery to a person for technical contributions to the computing community The computer room at King's College, Cambridge is now named after Turing

In 1985 a play, Breaking the Code by Hugh Whitemore, opened in London and later on Broadway. Thee are several statues and plaques in his honor. There is a road and a bridge named after him in Manchester, England where he worked during the last years of his life.

In 1999, Time Magazine named Turing one of the 100 Most Important People of the 20th Century and stated, "The fact remains that everyone who taps at a keyboard, opening a spread-sheet or a word-processing program, is working on an incarnation of a Turing machine." In 2002, Turing was ranked twenty-first on the BBC nationwide poll of the 100 Greatest Britons

On 10 September 2009, following an intense Internet campaign, British Prime Minister Gordon Brown made an official public apology on behalf of the British government for the way in which Turing was treated after the war. He said, "On behalf of the British government and all those who live freely thanks to Alan's work, I am very proud to say: 'we're sorry, you deserved so much better."

The fact remains, Alan Turing was

a genius who's life was cut short because of homophobia and unreasonable fear. The world would have been a better place if he had lived and continue using his intellect to improve our world.

We are still loosing GLBT people to suicide. You can do something about that. See page 8 for details about upcoming workshops on suicide awareness and prevention.


