ism and loyalty. Such purely military credit may be given as may be permitted by the regulations of the institution.

B. As a principle, no blanket credit should be allowed for war service.

C. The case of each applicant should be considered on its merits and credit be given for such war work of the student as may be recognized as of academic value for the individual."

The following recommendation from the College of Arts and Science was approved:

"The faculty of the College of Arts and Science desires to make the following changes in scheduled courses:

Physiology 1 to be changed back to physiology 1a and 1b, three hours a week first and second semester.

Geology 2 (elementary geology) changed from 3 hours to 2 hours a week.

Geology 7 (engineering geology) changed from 3 hours to 2 hours a week."

MINUTES OF THE SENATE AUGUST 2, 1919

The Senate met in special session in the chapel of the University August 2, 1919, President McVey presiding.

President McVey stated that the special meeting was called to consider the question of admission of graduates of accredited schools, especially from the Smith-Hughes schools, who had not conformed to our present entrance requirements.

Mr. Boyd, Chairman of the Committee on Accredited Relations of Higher Institutions, presented the following resolution:

"That for this year, the Committee be allowed to handle irregular cases of entrance as they arise."

Mr. Patrick, Director of Extension, asked some questions regarding the Extension courses and expenses. He was requested by President McVey to present it to the Committee on University Extension.
