

The Last Will and Testament of

Joel Quisenberry

In the name of God amen I Joel Quisenberry of the County of Clark and State of Kentucky being of sound mind but knowing that it is appointed unto all men to die do hereby make ordain and constitute this my last will and testament.

1st. It is my will that after my death all of my just debts and funeral expenses be paid by my Executors hereinafter.

In the second place it is my will that my son Thomas Jefferson Quisenberry have three hundred and fifty acres of the land and plantation that I now live upon, said three hundred and fifty acres to include my mansion house and to be bounded as follows; to begin on my Father's old line down the creek and to run up the creek and to adjoin the lands of Nathaniel Ragland, Tandy Quisenberry, William Quisenberry and to be laid off as nearly a square as may be not to injure the shape, form or value of my other lands adjoining said 350 <sup>acres</sup> ~~acres~~ but not to include any of the Elkin Place bought of Tandy Quisenberry. But my said Son Thomas J. Quisenberry is charged with the maintenance and support of my beloved wife for and during her natural life and should my son Thomas J. Quisenberry die without any lawful child or children then in that event said three hundred and fifty acres of land is to belong to my other children and the children of such of them as be dead.

In the next place I give unto my wife for and during her natural life the following named slaves to-wit: Phil, Pete and Louisa and after her death said three above named slaves and the increase of said Louisa if any are to be divided among my children and the children of such of them as then be dead.
