We'll start the day with a get-together at 8 am to train those folks who want to meet their legislators one-on-one. We'll provide you with talking points and all the materials you'll need to have a successful visit with your elected official.

After those meetings (which we'll set up in advance), we'll re-convene at 1 pm in the Capitol Rotunda to Rally for a Fair Kentucky. If you believe in fairness for everyone, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity or expression, you should join us for the rally.. Michael Thompson by Marlon. W. Austin

When Michael Thompson died January 1st, 2007. Lexington lost a hero. Not the kind who sacrifices their lives on a distant battlefield or serves in uniform. No, rather one of the more innocuous heroes that goes unnoticed about their calling, but with no less resolve than most battle hardened veteran.

Michael's heroism was to see a few simple needs and fill them. His dedication to the nutritional requirements of HIV/Aids patients, his commitment to their good care, and the compassion of human contact for people often isolated by their condition became examples of courage and altruism at its highest. His joy in his work was as infectious as his devotion. It inspired innumerable others to give of their time and selves to help the organization he founded, Moveable Feast.

I've had the pleasure of knowing Michael since 1975. My admiration for him, for his amazing talent as an actor and his humanitarian activism have grown with the passing years. My love for him as a friend and mentor has increased exponentially. He made me want to be a better man.

The last role I saw Michael perform was that of "Peanut" in ActOut's production of "Southern Baptist Sissies." Peanut is a barfly whose parting line is a little advice to a young man: "Don't turn out like me!" Unlike Peanut, I wish all young men and women would turn out like Michael Thompson. I hope they'll find the happiness that he did in the action of helping others.

Michael has gone to a better destiny I know, leaving his great organization and compassion as proofs of his passing. There will be no statues raised, no great honors will be accorded, but the world is a better place because of him. His memorial will be the continued work of Moveable Feast and the people who benefit from its services, both the patients and the care givers. His desires to fill a few simple needs will help fulfill the needs of countless people before it is through, if it is ever through.

Gender and Women's Studies Spring Film Series

The film series hosted by UK's Gender and Women's Studies started in January It's February film, Ruthie and Connie: Every Room in the House, is scheduled for Tuesday, Feb. 13 at 7 pm at the Gaines Center's Bingham-Davis House, 218 E, Maxwell.

In 1959, Ruthie Berman and Connie Kurts were married mothers of young children, living in a working class Jewish neighborhood in Brooklyn. In 1974, they left their husbands, moved in with each other and turned their entire worlds upside down. This documentary tells their story in an honest and intimate manner that helps to illuminate the larger social issues involved.

After the film, Melanie Otis who's academia research has focused on LGBT issues, will lead a discussion. This film won audience awards for "Best Documentary" at gay lesbian film festivals in New York City, Los Angeles and Toronto, Canada.

KFA Prepares for Success Paul Brown

Although this legislative season is a short one, the Kentucky Fairness Alliance is taking it very seriously. The bills that KFA will be supporting and those they oppose are listed ibelow

KFA hosted its first lobby training in Lexington on Jan. 10th. Several participants said the training was informative and gave them insight as to the issues on the table for 2007's legislative season. Wes Wright, Fairness Legislative Liaison, hosted six additional trainings around the state. If you were not able to attend one of these sessions, you can still learn the basics on

February 22 in Frankfort.

KFA hopes to attract between 200 and 500 people to the state capital on Feb. 22nd for a Day of Action. The day will start at 8 am with training where you will be given talking points. You will then have the opportunity to meet with legislators and express ideas and opinions. At 1 pm, we will gather in the rotunda for a Fairness Rally.

KFA asks that everyone who believes in a fair and just Kentucky come out and show their support. This is a great opportunity for fair-minded Kentuckians to stand up and be counted. For the latestinforamtion about, go to www.kentuckyfairness.org or call 1-

GLBT Related Bills Introduced to the Ky State Legislature

Equal Healthcare Access Ban (HB 48)

Sponsored by Stan Lee, this bill would prohibit Kentucky's state colleges and universities from offering equal healthcare access to all coupled employees, regardless of marital status. It would overturn the University of Louisville Board of Trustees' decision to include unmarried employees in the university's health insurance plan, and take coverage away from families who entered the plan on January 1, 2007. We Oppose this bill.

Anti-Fairness Bill

This bill targets gay people for discrimination by tearing down existing protections against discrimination for LGBT people in Metro Louisville, Lexington/Fayette County, and Covington, KY. It would also prohibit other cities and counties from enacting Fairness ordinances, restricting them from passing civil rights protections beyond those already in Kentucky law. Kentucky law doesn't protect people from discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation or gender identity neither does Federal law. **We Oppose this bill.**

Statewide Fairness Bill

This bill would prohibit discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation and gender identity throughout Kentucky in employment, housing, public accommodations, and credit. Right now only residents of Louisville, Lexington/Fayette County, and Covington, Kentucky are protected by city ordinance against discrimination. No one should be fired from a job, denied an apartment, turned away by a restaurant, or refused credit simply because they are gay, lesbian, bisexual or transgender. **We Support this bill.**

Hospital visitation Bill

This bill would allow any adult hospital patient to designate another individual to be treated as a member of the patient's family with regard to visitation. We support this bill.

School Bullying Bill (HB 64)

This bill, sponsored by Mike Cherry, provides school districts with tools for dealing with harassment and intimidation against any student, including young people who are targeted because of their perceived or actual sexual orientation or gender identity or expression. We Support this Bill

African American History Month

Keith Boykin: Black and Postgay

This year for Black History Month we have chosen to share some of the writings of Keith Boykin. First, a brief introduction:

After graduating from Dartmouth in 1987, Boykin spent a year and a half working for the Michael Dukakis for President Campaign. He then entered Harvard Law School, where he realized he was gay and came out on campus. (Senator Barak Obama was also at Harvard Law School at this time)

Upon receiving his law degree in 1992 Keith joined the Clinton/Gore Campaign. When Bill Clinton became President, Boykin became a Special Assistant to the President and the highest-ranking openly gay person in the Clinton White House. Boykin helped to organize and participated in the nation's first meeting between gay and lesbian leaders and a U.S. President.

In an article in The Advocate in 2001.

Boykin wrote about the next period in his life this way:

"By 1995, I had become a full-fledged 'gay activist,' a term I now despise. I left the White House, wrote my first book, and signed on as the first executive director of the National Black Gay and Lesbian Leadership Forum. For the next three years my sexual orientation consumed my identity. Everyone from the grocery store clerk to the FedEx man seemed to know I was a gay public figure.

"Since 1998, I have discovered a more comfortable and peaceful place in the "postgay" world. While I still write columns and give speeches about race and sexuality, I no longer consider myself an "activist," and I have carefully avoided accepting any leadership positions in gay organizations. I no longer feel compelled to stay informed about every "gay issue," and I rarely attend GLBT political or fund-raising events. I still support the GLBT struggle, but my sexual orientation identity is now more social than political.

"I have also evolved racially in the past 10 years. I started out deeply ensconced in the (white) GLBT communities in Boston and San Francisco and then moved to Washington and became active in black GLBT causes. I have since limited my financial contributions solely to black GLBT organizations and causes.

"But I still feel more comfortable as an individual than as a member of any political group. My friends and I joke that we are "postgay" because we have found a space where our sexual orientation neither limits nor identifies us. But we also feel liberated from the whiteness of the GLBT movement and unthreatened by the self-perpetuating white images generated by the mainstream GLBT community. We have moved on from white gay America and found our own space. My greatest contribution today is simply to live my life as who I am.

In an article available on his web site, Keith wrote about while male dominance and privilege in our country.

"White males make up just 38% of US population, yet they account for 82 % of the Forbes 400 (folks worth at least \$275 million), 77 % of Congress, 92 % of state governors, 70 % of tenured college faculty, almost 90 % of daily newspaper editors, and 77 % of TV news directors. So this Black History Month, spare me the four weeks of self-congratulatory speeches. Don't try to appease me with inane rhetoric on how far we've come when we still have so far to go. Don't try to make me forget that white men, a minority, still run this country. Don't insult me with 28 days of attention only to be followed by 337 days of neglect.

Boykin's first book, One More River to Cross: Black and Gay in America, was published in 1996. His second, Respecting the Soul, Daily Reflections for Black Lesbians and Gays, published in 1999, won the Lambda Literary Award. In this book, Boykin tops each page with a quotation such as this one:

"If the African American Community is to thrive and prosper, it will require the talents and commitment of all its members, regardless of their sexual orientation." *Maxine Waters*

Boykin then writes his thoughts in relations to the quotation.:

"Black culture has been shaped by the poetry of Langston Hughes, Countee Cullen, Audre Lorde, and June Jordan. The music of Jhonny Mathis, Billy Strayhorn, Nona Hendryx, and Me'shell Ndege'Ocello. The literature of James Baldwin. The popular fiction of Alice Walker and E. Lynhn Harris. The fashion design of Willi Smith and Patrick Kelly. The activism of Angela Davis and Bayard Rustin. The political savvy of Barbara Jordan. The gospel music of Reverend James Cleveland. And the theater productions of Lorraine Hansberry and George C. Wolfe. All of these same gender-loving women and men have helped shape and define who we are as a people, and we bear responsibility to value those who have enriched our community."

Boykin ends each page with a affirmation. On this page he says "We're making a difference in the world."

His third book is *Beyond the Down Low:* Sex, Lies and Denial in Black America. We would welcome the donation of any of these books to the Pride Library.

Chapter 1: The Positive View By Dr. Sherry and Dr. Skippy

A few weeks after the November 2004 election, Skippy was taking a walk with her neighbor, Sue. Members of the GLBT community in Kentucky were very disappointed, sad, and angry (and a whole lot of other emotions) after the passage of the anti-marriage amendment. As they walked, talk turned to the negative impact of the public debate and passage of the amendment on minority stress in the community.

Seemingly, negative messages about gays and lesbians were all around and the stigma against same-sex relationships had just been enshrined in the state constitution. Sue asked, "What are the good things about being a lesbian (or gay man)? I want to hear about the positive aspects of being gay."

Being good scholarly researchers, we decided to conduct a survey, asking gay men and lesbians to, "Please tell us what you think the positive things are about being a [gay man/lesbian or man-loving-man/woman-loving-woman]?" Within a couple of weeks, 553 gay men and lesbians in 45 states had responded to an online survey. With Joy Whitman (DePaul Univ.), Amber Olson (Univ. of Denver) and Sue Strong (EKU), we analyzed the responses and discovered 11 themes representing positive aspects of being a lesbian or gay man. Over the next year we will present those positive themes in this newsletter.

Sadly, a few people who responded to the survey perceived nothing positive about being lesbian or gay. And some told us that being gay or lesbian is neither positive nor negative; "it just is" or it is "just who I am." But over 500 gay men and lesbians had plenty to say about their perceptions of what is positive.

We were somewhat surprised at how many respondents wrote to thank us for simply asking the question. Many admitted they had never pondered this question before. Sometimes just by asking the "right" question, we can begin a transformative process. Discussing persons of color, Constantine and Sue (2006) have offered that pride in one's race and ethnicity and the experiences of oppression, "sharpen and hone their survival skills to such a degree that these skills are now deemed to be assets" (p. 235). The same may well apply to GLBT persons in facing adversity, we may transform that experience into personal growth.

So take a few moments today to think about what you find to be positive about being a lesbian, or a gay man, or bisexual, or transgender, or queer, or whatever self-identification you wish to choose. While we asked specifically about being a lesbian or gay man, we believe that many of the themes apply to other members of our community and we are continuing our research to explore this.
