

A & M College of Kentucky, Apr 8th 1902.

The Faculty met in regular monthly session in the President's office at 3.30 P.M., those present being Pres. Patterson, Profs. Neville, Patterson, Kastle, Pryor, Anderson, Mathews, Miller, Pence, Brooks, Mackenzie, M. Kee, Kiley, and Miss Offutt.

Prof. Kastle, chairman of com. appointed to consider cause of poor quality of work done by students, reported progress, and asked for further time.

Prof. Miller, chairman of Com. appointed (with power) to consider the application of F. C. Taylor and others for permission to establish a chapter of Phi Gamma Delta fraternity at this college, reported favorable action upon the application.

Ky. Educational assoe.

Prof. Miller read a communication from the chairman of Ky. Educational Association asking that, inasmuch as thirty minutes had been set apart ^{at the coming meeting} for addresses from officers of the State College, the college should respond at any early date with a list of speakers upon this part of the program indicated.

It was moved and seconded by Profs. Kastle and Anderson that Pres. Patterson be requested by the faculty, to address the Association for thirty minutes. President Patterson thought it somewhat doubtful if he would be physically able to do this, and believed that in any case, the allotment of time would better be divided among several speakers.

Upon motion it was ordered that a com. of three should be appointed, with power to act,

Tandy-charges
against

Mr. Clark Tandy was ordered to appear before the
 faculty to answer to the charge of committing a
 breach of propriety in permitting certain verses
 written by him which contained reflections upon
 members of the faculty, to be given publicity in
 the local press and otherwise, when permission
 to give such publicity to the verses had been withheld
 by the professor in charge of the Dept. of English.

Prof. Mackenzie briefly stated the facts of the
 case; that the verses in question had been sub-
 mitted to him by Miss Smith as a precedent to
 giving them the desired publicity; that the young
 woman was specifically told that the verses were
 unsuitable for publication, but that nevertheless
 they had been printed in a morning newspaper of
 Lex. on Apr. 1st.

Mr. Tandy disavowed any intention of setting
 at defiance any regulations of the college; he stated
 that one verse of his production had been expunged
 in deference to the criticism of the professor of English
 and that he did not know that the censorship of
 said professor extended to matter which was to be
 published in the city papers.

Mr. Tandy was excused and action upon his
 case was deferred until later in the session.

An official communication from Capt. H. A. Hoising
 of Co. C. approved by Maj. W. Bee, was read, in which
 he recommended the reduction to the ranks of
 Kelly, for conduct unbecoming an officer.

Charges against
Cravens, Riggs &
Hughes.

Upon motion of Prof. Miller, seconded by Dr. Pryor
 it was ordered that this communication be referred to
 the military council, with power to act.

Messrs. John Cravens, H. Riggs, and W. N.
 Hughes. were cited to appear before the faculty to
 answer to charges preferred by Miss Offutt,
 to the effect that these men had violated
 the law excluding the young men from the

gymnasium until 3.45 P.M. on Friday, during which time the building is in use by Miss Offutt's class, and were hence guilty of a breach of propriety in being on the premises before the time at which they are admissable to the privileges of the gymnasium.

Miss Offutt briefly stated the facts in support of the charge; that she had discovered upon Friday, before the dismission of her class, that four young men had gained access to the basement, one of whom was taking or attempting to take photographs of the young ladies, while others were preparing for the gymnasium floor practice.

Mr. Riggs testified that he entered the gym. by the front door following Hughes and Cravens, in anticipation of a class between 4.05 P.M. He did not know what time it was, was accustomed to go as early as practicable, because of interest in the work and was not aware until he got below that the ladies class was still on the floor.

Mr. Cravens stated that he went to the gym. as charged; that he observed, in passing to the basement room, several young ladies standing in the doorway of the gymnasium (main floor) in ordinary costume. Consequently he walked into the basement, and sat down without proceeding to put on his gymnasium costume until later.

Mr. Hughes went in with Mr. Cravens to the basement room and proceeded to dress for gymnasium practice, but was sure that he could not have been seen from the door as he stood behind the lockers. He was sure that it was half past three when he went into the building.

Each earnestly disclaimed any thought or intention of committing any indiscretion or of violating a college regulation, Mr. Kiler testified to the especial interest taken by these three men in the gymnasium work and stated that they were always present.

Upon motion, it was unanimously voted that in each of the three cases the charge was sustained and each was declared guilty:

Faculty investigation cases of Cravens, Riggs and Hughes.

The faculty was unable to discover the identity of the person charged with taking pictures as charged by Miss Offutt.

Upon motion of Prof. Kastle, seconded by Dr. Pryor it was unanimously ordered that Mr. Riggs be admonished in the presence of the faculty, and be warned that a second offense of this character would render him liable to dismission from the college.

Sentence - Cravens, Riggs Hughes.

Upon motion of Prof. Miller seconded by Prof. Brooks it was ordered by unanimous vote that the same punishment be inflicted upon Mr. Cravens.

Upon motion of Prof. Kastle, seconded by Prof. Miller it was ordered by unanimous vote that the same penalty be fixed for Mr. Hughes.

Sentence - Case of Clarke Pandy.

The consideration of Mr. Pandy's case was resumed. Upon motion of Prof. Brooks, it was ordered by unanimous vote that "it is the sense of this faculty that Mr. Clarke Pandy has been guilty of an impropriety in making public the verses reflecting upon the members of the faculty, recently published in the Lexington newspapers"

Upon motion it was further ordered by unanimous vote, "that Mr. Pandy be admonished in the presence of the faculty."

Eligibility of Seniors for Bach. degrees.

Prof. Anderson submitted and moved the adoption of the following recommendation of the U. E. Faculty at their meeting of March 25-1902.

It was moved and carried that the ruling of the general faculty of Oct. 4th, 1901, "that no senior shall be considered eligible to receive his bachelor's degree who shall have any condition in any subject at the beginning of the third term of his senior year" be amended as follows and submitted to the general faculty for adoption, viz: "that no senior shall be considered eligible to receive his bachelor's degree, who shall have any conditions in any subject at the beginning of the third term of his senior year; excepting conditions in studies taken during second term of his senior year, which may be removed at a second examination to be given within three weeks after the first examination. "Seniors conditioned in third term classes shall be given a second examination."

The motion was seconded by Prof. Kastle. Carried.

Disrespectful publications in regard to mem. of Faculty.

Prof. Neville offered the following resolution. "If any student of this college, shall by name or otherwise publicly mention or refer to, or cause another publicly to mention or refer to, any member of the faculty, assistant or officer of the college without due respect, he shall be liable to dismission from"
