Minutes of the Meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees, University of Kentucky, March 16, 1948.

The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in the President's Office at 10:30 a.m., Tuesday, March 16, 1948. The following members were present: R. P. Hobson, Harper Gatton, and J. C. Everett. Absent: Judge Richard C. Stoll and Thomas Cutler. Vice President Chamberlain and Secretary Peterson met with the Committee.

# A. Temporary Chairman Appointed.

Members of the Executive Committee took note of the absence of Judge Richard C. Stoll, Chairman of the Executive Committee, due to illness, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, Robert P. Hobson was appointed temporary chairman.

# B. Minutes Approved.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the minutes of the Executive Committee of January 9, 1948, were approved as published.

# C. Report of the Comptroller.

The Comptroller read a summary analysis of general and plant fund operations.

I submit hereto attached the operating report of the University of Kentucky for the period of eight months ended February 29, 1948.

The following statement is a summary analysis of general and plant fund operations:

During the period covered by the report, 92.9% of the total estimate of income had been realized. The General fund had realized 92.0% of the general fund estimate. The Plant fund estimate had been realized in full.

Charges for expenditures and encumbrances were 68.1% of General and Plant fund appropriations. The charges were 59.0% of General fund appropriations and 87.3% of Plant fund appropriations.

Expenditures and encumbrances charged during the period covered by the report were 97.8% of the income realized during the same period.

Restricted fund balances on February 29, 1948, were \$1,222,304.58. Restricted fund investments were \$608,744.05.

The report contains a summary of the loan, endowment and agency fund transactions that occurred during the period covered by the report.

Unexpendable funds amounted to \$249,731.13, consisting of the principal balance of the loan and endowment funds. Unexpendable funds invested on February 29, 1948, amounted to \$243,081.96. The balance uninvested amounted to \$6,649.17.

The increase in the special maintenance appropriation is necessary to provide funds to furnish the new F.W.A. class room buildings for the Botany, Geography and Sociology Departments, and to set up shops and storeroom facilities in the new F.W.A. Shop Building and other special restoration projects. The increases in the plant funds are to provide for bank charges in connection with payment of principal and interest on the second P.W.A. bond issue and for an increase in the contract price of the new Dairy Center.

It has been recommended and requested that the Music Department receive an increase of five hundred dollars to its capital outlay account, 460-4, to replace music equipment lost in the fire of the Art Center.

I also recommend that the budget estimate of income from student fees be increased by the amount of \$250,000.00.

Dear Mr. Peterson:

You will probably recall that during the beginning of this school year, you wrote me a letter in which you indicated that you would be willing to increase the non-personal budget of the Music Department at a later date during the present fiscal year, to compensate for the extra expenses incurred in the replacement and the repair of materials and equipment suffered by the Music Department through fire loss of the Art Center, and for which the University received a check for over three thousand dollars from the Insurance Company.

For instance, we had the following such expenses:

- \$275 for repair of the Steinway grand injured by its hasty removal from the building-
- \$405 for purchase of the Harvard Classics for Men's Glee Club, as a partial replacement of the \$900 University Men's Glee Club library destroyed completely by the fire-
- \$78 for repair to stringed instruments, injured by hasty and excessive handling during and after the fire-

My record of expenditures as of this date, discloses that we will be in deficit of approximately \$50 when all present requisitions are processed, on our non-personal funds. There will be other necessary requisitions before the close of the school year.

May I recommend that a sum of \$500 be added to the Music Department fund #460.

The recommendations were discussed and, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the budget increases were authorized, and the estimated income for the fiscal year 1947-48 from student fees was ordered increased in the amount of \$250,000.00.

# E. Construction -- Western Kentucky Substation.

Doctor Chamberlain submitted plans and specifications for a machinery building at Western Kentucky Substation, and recommended that same be approved, with such modifications in specifications as might be necessary to secure competitive bids. The building was estimated to cost about \$8,000.00.

Members of the Committee examined the plans, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, approved the recommendation of the Vice President, and authorized the Comptroller to secure bids for the construction of the machinery building.

F. Application of Lexington Water Company for Special Connection Approved.

Doctor Chamberlain submitted a letter from the Comptroller accompanying application for special connection from the Lexington Water Company.

I transmit hereto attached application for special connection from the Lexington Tater Company. I have had this application checked by Professor Frank Murray. It is in the regular form for such applications and provides for the placing of a fire hydrant near the Dairy Barn, which will furnish water and fire protection to the Combined Shops, the Maintenance storage building and the Dairy Barn. The application is in good form and is permitted by the University. I recommend that same be submitted to the Executive Committee for consideration.

#### APPLICATION FOR SPECIAL CONNECTION

This application made and entered into this day of , 1948, by and between the LEXINGTON WATER COMPANY, hereinafter called the "WATER COMPANY" and the UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY, hereinafter called "THE APPLICANT".

THE APPLICANT, upon the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth, hereby applies to the WATER COMPANY for one (1) standard fire hydrant to be installed approximately 1,000 feet east of the intersection of Rose Street and South Limestone Street and connected to the WATER COMPANY main.

FIRST: That the extent of the rights of THE APPLICANT under this application is to take, but only at times of fire, such supply of water as shall then be available through APPLICANT'S hose or through public fire fighting equipment. That THE APPLICANT agrees the WATER COMPANY shall not be considered in any manner an insurer of property or persons,

or to have undertaken to extinguish fire or to protect any persons or property against loss or damage by fire, or otherwise, and that it shall be free and exempt from any and all claims for damages on account of any injury to property or persons by reason of fire, water failure to supply water or pressure, or for any other cause whatsoever.

SECOND: That the rights of THE APPLICANT hereunder shall be further subject at all times to the rates, rules and regulations of the WATER COMPANY now existing or which may hereafter be lawfully adopted, and THE APPLICANT agrees to pay or cause to be paid to the WATER COMPANY any and all sums of money that may become due and payable to the WATER COMPANY by THE APPLICANT pursuant to this contract under the aforesaid rates, rules and regulations, and to pay or cause to be paid any and all such sums of money at the times and in the manner contemplated or provided in the aforesaid rates, rules and regulations.

THIRD: That the WATER COMPANY has the right to discontinue or disconnect said hydrant and hydrant branches and terminate this contract thirty days after APPLICANT has been notified, for failure to pay any bill when due or for any violation of any of the terms and conditions of same, or for any violation of its rules, and also has the right to shut off all or any part of its plant and discontinue the service when deemed necessary by the WATER COMPANY, for the purpose of making any repairs, alterations or additions, and such right may be exercised without any abatement of charge agreed herein to be paid by THE APPLICANT.

FOURTH: The acceptance of this application by the WATER COMPANY must be executed by its Manager and President or Vice President before same becomes effective.

# G. Purchase of Equipment from Pratt and Whitney Aircraft.

Doctor Chamberlain submitted a letter from Dean D. V. Terrell, recommending the purchase of equipment, instruments, new spare parts and gasoline from Pratt and Whitney Aircraft.

A letter from Professor A. J. Meyer, Director of the Aeronautical Research Laboratory, detailing the equipment, instruments, etc., to be purchased was also presented.

My dear Dr. Chamberlain:

I am enclosing herewith a report from Professor A. J. Meyer, Director of the Aeronautical Research Laboratory, which covers an inventory of all equipment, instruments, new spare parts, and some 24,000 gallons of gasoline owned by Pratt and Whitney Aircraft. The enclosed letter from Professor Meyer is self-explanatory.

Since there are sufficient funds in the laboratory's account and since the price does not represent more than five cents on the dellar depreciated value, and since the equipment will be needed by the laboratory for future research projects, it is my recommendation that authority be given to purchase the property as set out in the attached report.

I also wish to recommend that the disposal of the gasoline be authorized and that the funds realized by the sale be applied to the overall purchase price agreed upon and estimated to be \$4,600.00.

Dear Dean:

I. Attached is an inventory of all equipment, instruments, and new spare parts owned by Pratt and Whitney Aircraft, and installed or stored in the Aeronautical Research Laboratory. In addition, they own 8,000 gallons of gasoline, stored in our tanks, plus 293 barrels containing a total of about 16,000 gallons of high grade aviation fuel of 100 Octane or better rating.

The equipment represents an original investment of over \$62,000. In the column marked "Depreciated Price", we have listed either a heavily depreciated value, or for some expendable items, our replacement cost. This column totals in excess of \$27,000, and is considered underrated, in case we can use the set-up, as is, for other work. The large amount of work to install and develop the installation has not been evaluated.

The tanked fuel can only be used as automotive gasoline after mixing it with a volume of standard gasoline at least ten times as large. The barrelled fuel will improve any gasoline it is mixed with, or it can be used straight.

Federal taxes have only been paid on the barrelled fuel. State taxes have not been paid on any of it.

- II. We have negotiated a settlement with Pratt and Whitney Aircraft, which will enable us to keep the set-up intact. In their letter dated October 22, 1947, copy of which is attached, they offer us their entire interest for the depreciated book value of the durable goods involved. In the attached telegram, this value is estimated at \$4,600 as of March 31st, 1948.
- III. In order to determine whether or not our set-up, as is, can still serve a useful purpose, we have conducted a survey by sending a form letter and descriptive report, a sample of which is attached, to a total of fourteen large corporations. The reaction received is as follows:
  - 4 have expressed no interest.
  - 2 have not answered.
  - 5 have expressed interest and their intention to consider our facilities in future programs.
  - l is interested, but still investigating.
  - 2 are serious prospects.

The serious prospects are:

a. Standard Oil Development Company, Elizabeth, N.J.

b. The Ethyl Corporation, Detroit, Mich.

Both companies have sent representatives for inspection and further discussion. Standard Oil Development is considering a six year, long range program of research on aircraft lubricants, and Ethyl Corporation wants to continue the work on lead scavengers that we did for Pratt and Whitney, and which attracted nation-wide attention.

We further have under consideration an extensive program of research to be sponsored by the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics (NACA), Washington, D.C. A copy of a recent letter is also attached.

IV. Finally, we want to bring to your attention that the balance sheets of the Laboratory, as of February 1, 1948, show Receivables to be in excess of Payables by about \$25,000, after profits of approximately \$9,000 by the Kentucky Research Foundation have been allowed for. The Cash Balance, as of February 1, 1948, was \$3,500. It is much better now.

# V. From the above information, we conclude:

- 1. That the prospects for additional sponsored research, using our test facilities, plus those now owned by Pratt and Whitney Aircraft, are good.
- 2. That the investment required to take over Pratt and Whitney's property, after the remaining gasoline has been sold, will be very small.
- 3. That the Laboratory has accumulated enough funds to pay for the investment.

For these reasons, we recommend that the Pratt and Whitney inventory be purchased for the amount of their depreciated book-value, or approximately, \$4,600.

# H. Contract with Board of Education of Covington, Ky.

Doctor Chamberlain submitted contract between the Board of Education of Covington, Ky., and the University of Kentucky, for space necessary to house the newly established University of Kentucky Northern Extension Center at Covington.

The contract was read in its entirety, and upon motion made, seconded and carried, the contract was authorized executed on behalf of the University.

# I. Agreement with Miss Billy Jackson for Instruction, and Contracts for Rental of Horses for Light Horse Husbandry Courses.

The following contracts were submitted to the Executive Committee:

AN AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE ANIMAL HUSBANDRY DEPARTMENT, UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY, AND MISS BILLY JACKSON, LEXINGTON, KENTUCKY.

Miss Billy Jackson agrees to furnish her skilled services as temporary part-time instructor in Animal Husbandry for the purpose of instructing students enrolled in A.I.5, Light Horse Husbandry, during the spring quarter 1948. For this service Miss Jackson agrees to accept, and the University to pay, the sum of \$900.00.

Miss Jackson agrees to release the University of Kentucky of all responsibility for any accident or damage to herself, her horses, or her equipment which may occur while the above agreement is in force but does not agree to assume any responsibility for accidents occurring to students enrolled in this course.

Doctor Chamberlain stated that the contracts for instruction and the rental of horses for use in Light Horse Husbandry course had been recommended by Dean Cooper and were necessary in order to give the course. He further stated that the contract was similar to those approved in previous years. On motion made, seconded and carried, the contracts with Miss Billy Jackson, Gene Scott and Mrs. H.V. Rouse, Jr., were authorized executed by Vice President Chamberlain on behalf of the University.

# J. Agreement with Sherman Benge Approved.

Doctor Chamberlain submitted the following agreement:

#### AGREEMENT

I hereby agree to lease to the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station for the purpose of testing the effect of fertilizers on burley tobacco, an area of one acre of land on my farm located on the Piney Grove Road near Sublimity City, approximately 1-1/4 miles south of London in Laurel County, Kentucky, for a period of one year from the date of this agreement. I further agree to give the Experiment Station the option of renewing the lease annually for two years under the terms as stated below for the first year. The location of the area to be leased was agreed upon by myself and representatives of the Experiment Station on March 8, 1948.

I further agree in a satisfactory way to prepare the land for planting, furnish the plants (Ky.16 variety), plant the crop, keep the crops free of weeds and injurious insects, harvest, house, and cure the crop and aid in taking the crop down and loading on a truck for transportation to the Experiment Station farm at Lexington.

I will be paid for leasing the land and for producing the crop as above stated in any one year the sum of Five hundred dollars (\$500.00) as follows: One hundred dollars (\$100.00) when the lease is signed, one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00) when the plants are set, and two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00) when the tobacco is loaded on the truck for delivery to Lexington.

The Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station agrees to furnish and apply the commercial fertilizers and to exercise supervision over the work, and is to have right of entrance to the area as necessary for this purpose. The Experiment Station retains ownership of the crop.

The agreement was recommended by Dean Cooper, and concurred in by Doctor Chamberlain, and upon motion made, seconded and carried, was authorized executed by Dean Cooper on behalf of the University of Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station.

# K. Experiment Station Department of Chemistry Transferred to Department of Agronomy.

Doctor Chamberlain read the following letter from Dean Cooper concerning the discontinuance of the Department of Chemistry in the Experiment Station and transfer of same to the Department of Agronomy as a Section of Minor Elements Research.

January 15, 1948

President H. L. Donovan University of Kentucky

Dear President Donovan:

Effective with the close of business January 31, 1948, I recommend the discontinuance of the Department of Chemistry in the Experiment Station.

I recommend that, effective February 1, 1948, the Section of Minor Elements Research be set up in the Department of Agronomy and the work now in progress in the Department of Chemistry be transferred to that section. I further recommend that Dr. Lynne K. Wood be designated as In Charge of the Section and Spectrographer and Research Chemist. The other staff members to be transferred to this section are Dr. Forrest G. Houston, Assistant Chemist, and Mr. Calvin M. Austin, Assistant Chemist. The remaining funds in the budget of the Department of Chemistry are to be set up as a budget for the Section of Minor Elements Research and for Mr. O. M. Shedd, Research Chemist, who will continue his present duties with later reassignment if necessary.

This change in organization should result in certain savings and should definitely magnify research in minor elements in plants, animals, and soils. The proposed organization provides a logical relationship in carrying on such fields of work as may be needed through other sections of the Department of Agronomy. It is my judgment that the proposed arrangement will be advantageous in the research activities and provide relationships which, in some instances, will make the work more effective.

# L. <u>Membership in Association of Governing Boards of State Universities and Allied Institutions.</u>

Doctor Chamberlain submitted statement from the Association of Governing Boards of State Universities and Allied Institutions for membership of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky for the calendar year 1948, and upon motion made, seconded and carried, the Comptroller was directed to continue the membership in the Association of Governing Boards of State Universities and Allied Institutions for the calendar year 1948.

# M. Gifts.

#### From General Education Board.

Doctor Chamberlain reported that the General Education Board has made available to the University of Kentucky \$2,500, or as much thereof as may be necessary, of which \$1,500 shall be used toward a school building conference in cooperation with the State Board of Education, and \$1,000 toward a workshop for training school librarians, to be used principally for scholarships. The termination date of the grant is December 31, 1948, and any part remaining unused on that date is to revert to the Board.

On motion made, seconded and carried, the Committee ordered the acceptance of this grant.

# From Council of Jewish Women.

Doctor Chamberlain reported the offer of the Council of Jewish Momen to pay \$400 toward the cost of conducting a course in speech defects for the summer term, which will enable the University to secure the services of an outstanding teacher in the field of speech pathology.

The Committee expressed appreciation for this offer and, upon motion made, seconded and carried, the gift of \$400, to be used in conducting a course in speech defects for the summer term, was ordered accepted, and Vice President Chamberlain was requested to write a letter to Mrs. Hugo Bloomfield, President of the Lexington Section of Council of Jewish Women, expressing the appreciation of the University of Kentucky for this gift.

From Mr. Alexander Bonnyman.

A gift of \$1000 from Mr. Alexander Bonnyman, Knoxville, Tennessee, was reported. Doctor Chamberlain stated that the purpose for which the gift was made would be made known at a later date, and recommended that the gift be accepted without designating the purpose at this time.

Members of the Committee expressed their deep appreciation to Mr. Bonnyman for the gift, and upon motion made, seconded and carried, ordered the gift received, and directed the Vice President to write a letter of appreciation to Mr. Bonnyman on behalf of the Committee and the University.

# N. Change in Retirement Plan for County and Home Demonstration Agents.

Doctor Chamberlain stated that it seemed desirable to amend the retirement plan for county agricultural and home demonstration agents to permit employee contributions to be applied on the salary of the employee without regard to a maximum.

It was further stated that the plan at the present time provided that contributions should not be made on any salary over \$4,000 per year. He read a letter from Dean Cooper.

Dear Dr. Chamberlain:

The recent salary increases provided by the Board of Trustees for county agricultural and home demonstration agents placed the salaries of a number of these staff members above \$4000.00 a year. It is anticipated under the present salary schedules and with a continuation of our present economic situation, that increasing numbers may receive salary payments in excess of \$4000 a year.

In 1941 the Board of Trustees passed the retirement plan for county agricultural extension employees. The employer's contributions to this plan are obtained from funds of Federal origin, appropriated by Act of Congress which made provision for the "retirement of employees of land-grant colleges" and that provided authorization "to withhold from expenditure from Federal funds advanced under the terms of said acts, amounts designated as employer contributions". In the original retirement plan adopted by the Board of Trustees at its meeting April 1, 1941, with

revisions and addition May 16, 1941, the plan was made effective May 1, 1941. Item 10 of the retirement plan provides that:

"The salary of any member of the system shall consist of only his regularly stated monthly remuneration, exclusive of temporary or special additions or deductions. Any salary of over \$4000 per year shall be counted as \$4000 per year only."

As I have pointed out, the salary of many of the agents now exceeds \$4000.00 a year and it is expected that in future years, a larger number may receive a salary in excess of this figure. Therefore I wish to recommend that Item 10, which I have quoted, be revised to read as follows:

"The salary of any member who participates in the system shall consist only of his regularly stated remuneration, exclusive of temporary or special additions or deductions."

The Board is aware that the retirement plan was established under the plan of the Teachers Insurance and Annuity Association, which provides that the staff member shall contribute monthly an amount equal to that contributed by the employer. Contribution made depends upon the age and varying percentages of 3½ to 5½ percent of the salary. Members participating in the plan are retired at the age of 70, established by the Board of Trustees, but may be retired at an earlier age.

The retirement plan as adopted by the Board is an excellent one and it is my judgment that through the years, it will be increasingly valuable as well as important to staff members. The change which I have requested will include in the retirement program, the salaries above the \$4000.00 figure.

# O. Request of Dr. W. T. Rowland.

The Comptroller stated that the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees, at its meeting on January 9, 1948, had before it for consideration a request from Dr. W. T. Rowland, through the office of Dean W. S. Taylor, concerning back salary for Doctor Rowland, who worked during the summer session a few years ago.

Doctor Rowland had declined to accept the salary at that time because to do so might place him in an embarrassing position in view of the fact that he was receiving the maximum salary provided for an officer under the Constitution.

The Executive Committee at that meeting directed the Comptroller to submit the question to the Attorney General for an opinion.

The question having been submitted to the Attorney General and his answer received, the opinion was read to the Board.

Dear Sir:

In your letter of some time ago, you raised the question of whether or not Mr. W. T. Rowland, Superintendent of the Lexington City Schools, could be paid for work done at the University prior to July 1, 1947. While it is true that public employees may be paid for extra work over and beyond their regular duties, still I do not believe that this could apply to Mr. Rowland, who is a public officer rather than a public employee. There are scores of decisions of the Court of Appeals which have held that superintendents of schools are officers rather than employees. Because of this fact alone, Dr. Rowland is limited to the Constitutional \$5,000 limitation. I also have considerable doubt as to the right to go beyond the budget year and make retroactive the payments, even should the foregoing condition not exist.

# P. Injury to J. E. Abrams.

Doctor Chamberlain submitted for consideration of the Committee the following report of the Comptroller summarizing developments on an injury to Mr. J. E. Abrams.

March 10, 1948

Dr. L. M. Chamberlain Vice President University of Kentucky

Dear Dr. Chamberlain:

In February 1946, I reported an injury to Mr. J. E. Abrams, shop foreman in the Division of Maintenance and Operations. Mr. Abrams was injured by a fall from a ladder which he had climbed in an attempt to pull some lumber out of storage bins approximately ten feet above the floor level. In pulling long dimension lumber, he lost his balance, falling approximately eight feet to the floor below. Mr. Abrams sustained a fracture of the right elbow, a fracture of the pelvis bone on the right side, and a minor injury of the head. He was taken by ambulance to the Good Samaritan Hospital, where he was attended by Dr. Harry J. Herring. Mr. Abrams remained in the hospital until such time as the doctor saw fit to There were no witnesses to the accident: release him. however, Mr. Cary Burns, who passed the scene of the accident shortly afterwards, reported same to Mr. Farris, who summoned the ambulance.

Invoices from the Good Samaritan Hospital in the amount of \$345.70, Sagaesar Pharmacy, \$22.45 and Dr. Harry G. Herring for \$250.00 were ordered paid by the Executive Committee at its meeting February 15, 1946.

The injury to Mr. Abrams was again reported to the Board of Trustees on April 2, 1946, at which time the Board authorized paid an X-ray account from the Good Samaritan Hospital in the amount of \$12.00.

A third report was made to the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees under date of May 1, 1946. The report was to the effect that Dr. Herring had reported that Mr. Abrams hip was healing nicely and that he should be able to walk shortly. At the meeting, I reported that

Mr. Abrams had been carried on the payroll, using sick leave and vacation earned, but that both leaves had been exhausted. I requested direction concerning the case of Mr. Abrams. The Board received the report on the progress of Mr. Abrams and directed that he be continued on the payroll for another month.

On May 25, 1946, I again reported the injury of Mr. Abrams, and at that time, the Executive Committee directed that Mr. Abrams be carried on the payroll for the months of June, July and August, or "until further order of the Board". On November 21, 1947, the injury of Mr. Abrams was again reported to the Executive Committee. At that time the Comptroller was directed to continue the present arrangement with Mr. Abrams and to report to the Executive Committee at its meeting in March.

Mr. Abrams is fifty-six years of age. His rate of pay is ninety cents an hour. He is unable to return to his original position as foreman of the carpenter shop. He does walk with the aid of a cane, sometimes with a cane and a crutch. It is possible that he might be assigned as a watchman.

The members of the Committee discussed at length the question involved, and upon motion made, seconded and carried, Mr. J. E. Abrams was ordered transferred to a position of watchman in the Division of Maintenance and Operations, on and after April 1 to June 30, 1948, at a rate of pay usually received for such services.

# Q. <u>Appropriation for Architects' Fees for Supervision of War Memorial Auditorium-Fieldhouse Authorized.</u>

The Comptroller reported that the Board of Trustees had approved the employment of John T. Gillig and Associates as architects on the War Memorial Auditorium-Fieldhouse, and that the Board had authorized a fee for plans and specifications paid from Restricted Funds.

The original contract calls for supervision, which is now being rendered by the Architect and his Associates, of the construction of the foundation and erection of structural steel. The Comptroller reported further that, to date, no provision had been made for the payment of the architects' fees for supervision which, according to the original contract, would amount to 426,000. He stated that a

requisition had been forwarded to the Department of Finance at Frankfort, seeking to have issued an incumbrance to the Architect and Associates for supervision on this building. He recommended that an
appropriation be made from unappropriated surplus of the University
budget to pay for architects' fees for supervision, according to the
original contract.

Members of the Committee discussed the original agreement, and the progress on the building, and upon motion made, seconded and carried, appropriated the sum of \$26,000 from unappropriated surplus of the general University budget for architects! fees for supervision in accordance with the original contract.
